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In brief

Deadline near

Prospective school board candidates have only one week in which to file nominating petitions before the Feb. 9 deadline. The annual school election is April 4. Four incumbents and one former candidate have said they will run for the four openings. Incumbents Loretta Smith, Marc Kelley and Robert Smith along with Len Chandro, who ran in 1985, will run for the three three-year terms and incumbent Malcolm Pringle will seek a one-year unexpired term.

Judge orders student in special education to residential school

After nearly three years of legal battles between a Cranford family and the Board of Education, a federal judge has ruled that a 14-year-old boy should be educated in a residential facility for emotionally disturbed children. The judge recently upheld the parents' position and ordered the school board to pay the \$55,000 annual fee for all costs connected with the residential placement.

In a separate ruling, however, Judge Alfred Wolin of the United States District Court in Newark, said the parents are not entitled to reimbursement from the school board for placing the child in an out-of-state residential school. The first decision was made in December 1986 and affirmed in September 1987 by the same administrative law judge, who also had recommended that the family not be reimbursed for the two years the child spent in a program the parents chose.

Wolin upheld the administrative law judge's finding that a school child study team erred in classifying the youngster as perceptually impaired when a classification of emotionally disturbed would have been appropriate. The judge said that five independent psychologists who examined the child recommended a residential placement, but the child study team "rejected" these reports as "inconsistent with behavior the

child exhibited." In denying the family reimbursement for the two years their child attended an out-of-state program, Wolin said the program was not a true residential educational setting and it was not recommended by the state. He said the parents "unilaterally" placed the child in the program "without prior notice or discussion with the board."

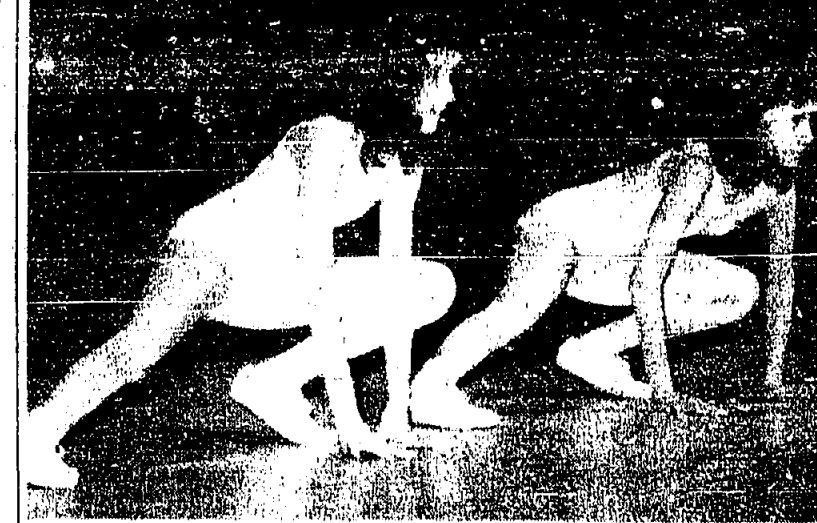
Wolin said the child study team was at all times "ready, willing and able to discuss a negotiated program" with the parents. "Whoever disrupts that cooperative venture," the judge wrote, "and thus interferes with the child's right to whether it be parents or school authorities — does so at his or her financial peril."

The school board will not appeal Wolin's decision about the residential placement. William Cashman, assistant superintendent for pupil services, said he "backs the child study team 100 percent. They were very professional and did what they were charged to do in the educational realm."

He said the school district should be charged only for the educational portion of the residential program and that the parents, insurance company or an agency like DYFS should pay for the residential component. "I don't think the educational agency is all things to all people," Cashman said.

POW activist wins Jaycees award

Jonathan Lehner, senior class president at Cranford High School and organizer of an effort to erect a POW-MIA memorial in town, will receive the Cranford Jaycees outstanding young citizen award.

The award will be presented Feb. 10 at Cortina's Restaurant. This is the first time in three years that the Jaycees have presented the award. Lehner, an honors student and varsity athlete, was chosen by the Jaycees for "exemplifying the image of public service on the highest level, with integrity and enthusiasm."

Over the past year the youth has spearheaded a campaign in Cranford to focus public awareness on the POW-MIA issue and led an effort to raise \$4,000 for a memorial to servicemen still listed as prisoners of war and missing in action in southeast Asia. The memorial is expected to be unveiled during Memorial Day services this year.

Lehner also led a lobbying group to Washington, D.C., to urge federal involvement in the POW-MIA cause. As president of the CHS contemporary affairs club, he organized a local program about the issue.

The student also serves as chairman of the CHS prom committee, holds varsity letters in football, track and tennis, is a member of the National Honor Society and CHS law club, and is a peer facilitator. He was a participant in the Model United Nations program, was a semifinalist in a Japan-United States Senate ex-

change program and visited Germany during a YMCA summer exchange program.

Lehner was named a Garden State Scholar and was selected an outstanding statesman during the 1988 state Youth in Government program. He also is the youngest deacon at First Presbyterian Church. Lehner is assistant to the director of the National League of POW-MIA Families.

He is the son of Alexander and

Lydia Lehner of 42 Beech St. Jonathan's brother Christopher is junior at West Point and his sister Linda is a sophomore at Trenton State College.

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Plan board lists rankings for 1989 capital projects

The proposed Jackson Dr. ramp and increased parking at the Cranford Library are at the top of a preliminary list of recommended capital projects compiled by the Planning Board for the township government.

Finance director Tom Grady said the Planning Board broke down potential projects for the year into four categories ranked from "urgent" to "unclassified" in order of importance. Grady said the board will meet again this month to list the projects in numerical order, a new process, before sending the completed list to the Township Committee by the early spring.

The Jackson Dr. ramp and the proposed extension of the library parking lot both were included in the "urgent" category. The ramp, which is awaiting final design approval from the state Highway Authority and could be in place before the year is out, is listed at a cost of \$575,000. The estimated cost for improving the parking at the library is \$170,000.

Other projects receiving an "urgent" ranking included \$100,000 in various road resurfacing projects, \$50,000 worth of sidewalk replacements, and \$25,000 for a detention basin at Carpenter Pl.

Less expensive projects which received an "urgent" rating include a new recording system for the township clerk at \$5,500, \$5,000 worth of new radios for the Fire Department, and a court computer for the Municipal Court, estimated at \$12,500.

The second tier of potential projects were ranked "necessary" by the Planning Board. Topping the list in that category is the reconstruction of Lexington Ave. at an estimated cost of \$550,000. A portion of that project, \$225,000, will be funded by the state and could get underway later this year. Other top money projects in the second tier include a combined \$410,000 for the reconstruction of Myrtle St., and the addition of a jughandle on the road.

Other projects ranked "necessary" include drainage work on Williams St. and Rankin Ave. at a combined cost of \$75,000. A \$30,000 sprinkler system for the Municipal Building, computer systems for the health and drug counseling depart-

ments, and a new scooter for parking enforcement for the Police Department were also ranked as "necessary."

The third tier of projects was listed as "desirable" by the board. Topping the list in that category are the Belgian block court program and the sidewalk assessment program.

Township engineer Manu Patel said the township may offer residents an "incentive program" to redo their sidewalks and curbs through cost sharing with the township. Patel listed the estimated cost of the two projects as \$1.8 million. The program will have to be approved by the Township Committee.

Other top cost projects in the "desirable" category include a \$100,000 parking lot for the Community Center, \$125,000 for an upgrade of the Police Department's computer program, and \$40,000 in improvements to the Rahway River. All third-tier projects have a less than average chance to be funded.

The Planning Board compiles a list of prioritized projects for the Township Committee's consideration each year. The board is scheduled to meet Wednesday at 8 p.m. to compile the final list to send to the governing body. The Planning Board meets at the Municipal Building in Room 108.

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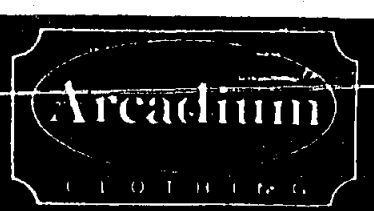
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Business people raise parking questions

Questions regarding the proposed parking program still lingered as some downtown business people left an emergency meeting of the Downtown Management Corporation. While most of the audience was happy with the plan, which will increase the number of indoor parking spaces from 125 to 350, concern over the sticker program remained.

Linda Eberling, of Linda's Book Exchange, first thanked the committee for its work, and then continued, "Why do we need prepaid stickers? Why not set up a system where a sticker allows you to park in a lot, but you still pay by the meter? This would help defray the cost to our part-time help."

Charles Stevens, chairman of the parking subcommittee, explained the procedure for part-time help. "Employees may purchase permits that would be moveable from employee to employee. These permits are transferable, allowing flexibility when dealing with part-time help."

Edward Murphy, township administrator, explained the purpose of a sticker program. "The sticker program lets us control who parks where, otherwise we will always have a losing battle. This system will allow us to segregate the inbound commuter from bus/train riders. Each will have their own lots, which in turn will cut down on competition," he said.

Several members of the audience were concerned that businesses with a large number of employees would be able to buy all the permits before stores with one or two employees would be able. "I would like to see an equal distribution of permits; everybody could get one, before anybody gets two," stated Ronni Markakis, of Labels for Less.

Stevens explained that permits would not be overvalued, but that they would be sold on a first-come, first-served basis and urged everyone to come as soon as permits go on sale. Last week two petitions surfaced in town opposing the parking plan; one addressed the proposed fee of \$8 a quarter. Mr. Stevens explained the reasoning behind the fee. "We originally proposed an \$80 a quarter fee, which was rejected by the township committee due to constraints imposed by New Jersey Transit. Currently, in our meter situation, the average cost for parking is 70 cents to \$1 a day. Under our new plan, it will cost \$1.09 a day to park."

Stevens also explained that in addition to providing funding for additional parking proposals, the money generated from the parking plan will supply seed money for a parking facility, should one be needed in the future.

In response to a question about towing zones, Mayor Ed Force said,

permit parking will allow us to handle violators, towing will open up spaces." He added that customers who might be towed would be "abusers who will have received eight to 10 tickets, and paid graduated fees according to our new fee schedule."

The meeting began with a brief explanation of the plan by Police Chief Robert Guertin, who said that he was "comfortable" with the mix of parking as it was established in the plan.

After the hour-long meeting ended, Stevens remarked, "I was very impressed with the results. The public reaction was superb; I think everyone's questions were answered. I'm happy we had the meeting."

The audience seemed to agree: "I think the plan is excellent and will help solve parking problems. I had a few little worries, but feel they were

all addressed tonight," said Sandra Barnaby, of Geiger's Fine Women's Clothing.

Parking permits for the new program went on sale yesterday at the Municipal Building in anticipation of a March 1 start-up date. Permits for March will be on sale throughout this month at the police records division from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday, as well as Feb. 8 and Feb. 16 from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m.

In a related matter, the DMC approved a motion to ask the township committee for a \$55,000 capital expense allocation to reconfigure the park-and-shop lot. "That lot will be used to reduce any parking needs that come to light after the permit parking is active," explained Stevens, who proposed the motion at the regular meeting of the DMC held after the parking meeting.

Town elders begin a review of '89 departmental budgets

The Township Committee began a preliminary review of departmental budgets during a special meeting Tuesday night in anticipation of beginning cuts on Cranford's 1989 municipal budget.

Finance director Tom Grady said complete figures for expenses in 1989 are not yet available. Grady said several departments have yet to submit budgets for this year, and an estimate for this year's total budget is still unavailable.

The governing body reviewed proposed budgets from seven departments Tuesday night, including recreation and parks, health, recycling, township counselor, welfare, municipal court and finance.

Recreation and parks director Frank D'Antonio said his budget is up over \$55,000 to \$90,531 in 1989, the majority of which is a nearly \$22,000 increase in salaries and wages for employees.

The committee suggested setting up fees for various programs, and possibly increasing fees in other areas. "Recreation is getting as expensive as anything else," said Force. He told D'Antonio to "try and offset some of the expenditures. We are looking for creative financing and we are open to suggestions."

The next scheduled budget meeting is Feb. 11 at 9 a.m. at the Municipal Building.

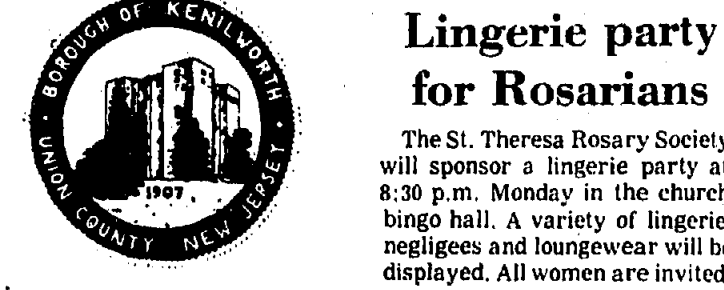

Greenhouse land being sold for houses, effort made to save 1870's home on plot

The Kenilworth Greenhouses, which have served the community for a half-century, are in the process of being sold by their longtime operators and are slated to be torn down to make room for several houses. Although this redevelopment would be enough to alter the face of the Cross Street property, the most serious consequence, in the minds of borough heritage buffs, is the possibility of Kenilworth's losing one of its oldest buildings.

The old Frost home, which stands on the same plot of land as the greenhouses, was constructed in the 1870s by seed merchant Charles Frost.

The Frost family sold the property in 1939 to the Roesses, who established the Kenilworth Greenhouses. The Roessels family operated the establishment until last October, when they were forced to close. According to Rudy Roessels, the borough's reassessment last year resulted in a 20-percent increase in taxes, which was partially to blame for closing the business.

According to Bob Woods, chairman of the trustees of the Kenilworth Historical Society, it would be feasible for the builder to maintain the Frost home rather than tear it down. "The house appears to be in good shape," he said. "It might be profitable for him to keep it." The house sits on the northernmost section of the lot, adjacent to the high school, according to Woods, and thus would not interfere with the development of the remainder of the property.

The borough governing body recently received petitions from the historical society and the Kenilworth Homeowners Association requesting its help to save the home. The letter from the KHA said the organization

\$4.35 million school budget is up 9.5%

A preliminary budget for the 1989-90 school year totaling \$4,350,014 was approved by the Kenilworth Board of Education at a special meeting Monday. The budget is \$377,676 more than the current budget for an increase of 9.5 percent.

Most of the hike is earmarked for negotiated 9 percent salary increases for teachers, 10 percent increases for the cost of medical insurance for employees, and \$18,000 for additional computers.

The budget includes a projected current expense of \$4.3 million, an increase of \$379,811 over the 1988-89 expense of \$3.9 million, along with repayment of debts totaling \$44,835, a decrease of \$1,665.

The tax increase on the proposed budget is estimated at five points or an estimated \$82 on a house assessed at \$168,500.

The largest account in the budget, teachers' salaries, is projected at \$1.7 million, an increase of \$159,550 over the current expenditure of \$1.55 million. The 10.2 percent increase in this account includes the 9 percent salary increase plus the salary for a new computer teacher for the upcoming school year.

The cost of health insurance for employees will increase from \$311,600 to \$365,600, an increase of \$54,000 or 17 percent.

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The council trimmed dollars from the requests of virtually every department at Saturday's budget session. In the area of garbage dumping fees alone, \$60,000 was cut from the department's request of \$510,000. Cerullo was concerned that the governing body was only postponing the inevitable. "You might as well bite the bullet now," he said. "By cutting in the area of dumping, you're planning an emergency and you're just deferring it to next year's budget."

In addition, the council reduced the fire department's proposal by \$22,000, from \$68,000 to \$46,000. Many of the large increases came

in areas over which the council has no control. Insurance premiums, for instance, are going up \$53,000 from \$482,000 last year to \$535,000, \$260,500.

Kenilworth's bill to the Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority is about \$16,000 higher than last year's \$260,500.

The municipal budget, pending further cuts, will increase taxes by four points or 57.1. Early projections of the impact of the county budget indicate a two-point tax increase or \$33. The four budgets would raise the 1989 tax rate to \$1.61, an increase of 18 points over the 1988 rate of \$1.43 per \$100 of assessed value.

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Beecham opposition takes 'wait and see' approach

Area business and civic leaders have expressed their opposition to the proposed development of a 60,000-square-foot supermarket on a 1.2-acre lot on the Beecham property, but the next move appears to be up to Hartz Mountain Industries Inc., the developer who owns the site but has yet to file with the Planning Board for a zoning change of the area.

Hartz representatives unveiled plans for the 60-acre site on Walnut Ave. to residents of the area late last year. Plans at that time included the addition of a 60,000-square-foot supermarket, a retail store on the scale of a K-Mart or Caldor, 20 to 30 smaller retail stores, a 10-theater movie complex, three office buildings, parking spaces for 1,800 cars, and a six-lane road that would run from Raritan Rd. to the Walnut Ave. overpass.

Hartz senior vice president Mort Goldstein confirmed the scale of the plans last week, but as of yesterday no plan for the site had been presented to the township.

Meantime, area business and civic leaders are taking a wait and see approach. "The plans, while, also preparing to mount opposition to the plan from Hartz if and when it is filed with the township."

Downtown Management Corp. chairman Tom Mack said he will represent the DMC in the battle against the plan, and would aid the Sunny Acres Civic and Improvement Association in opposition as well.

"Cranford doesn't need this mall," said Mack at Monday night's DMC meeting. "This mall will attract many people from great distances. They will draw from a large area. The cost factor of operating the mall will offset any real estate or income from the mall."

Mack said a mall would "change the lifestyle of Cranford, a lifestyle that existed for more than 100 years. I don't think we want to change our lifestyle, I don't think we want it to change."

"No doubt it would hurt the downtown," said the DMC chairman. "There are a certain number of stores that always will do business in the area because of their reputation and products. But even they would see a drop in retail sales, if not permanently at least for the short run."

Downtown manager Robert Lang said she could not comment in detail because she had not seen any specific plans for the site, but expressed "concerns about the plan and how it would affect the community as a whole." Lang said the type of tenants that would occupy the site would determine the exact effect on businesses in downtown Cranford.

Kim Coket, the vice president of Sunny Acres neighborhood group that has come out in opposition to the plans, said he made no plans on how to oppose the plan.

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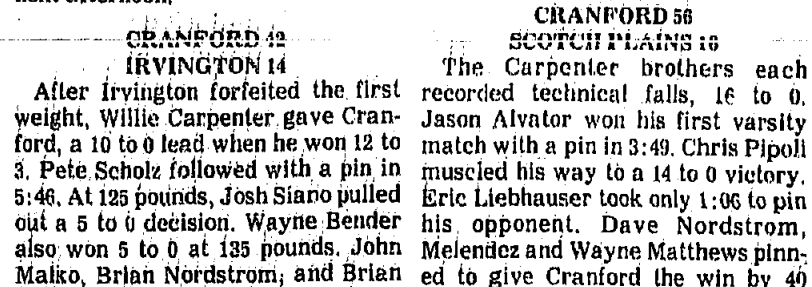

LoBianco hopes to pursue a career in journalism or law and probably will attend a college in New Jersey.

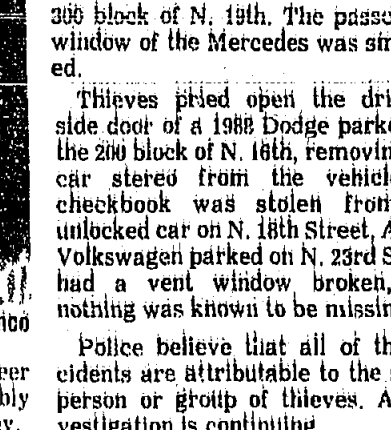

601 North Ave. The property will be developed by Gary Criscitello of Plaza Properties of Kenilworth.

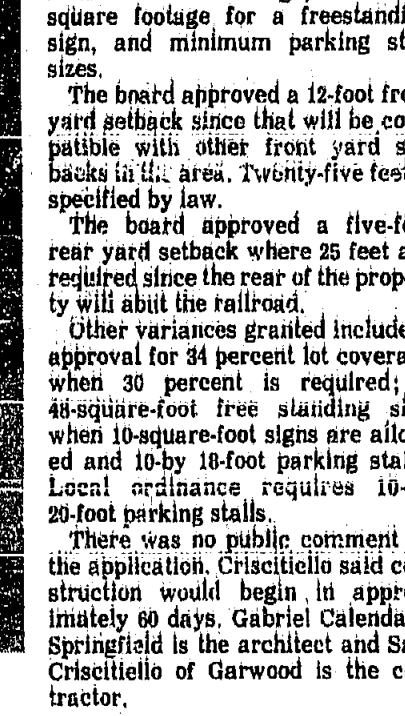
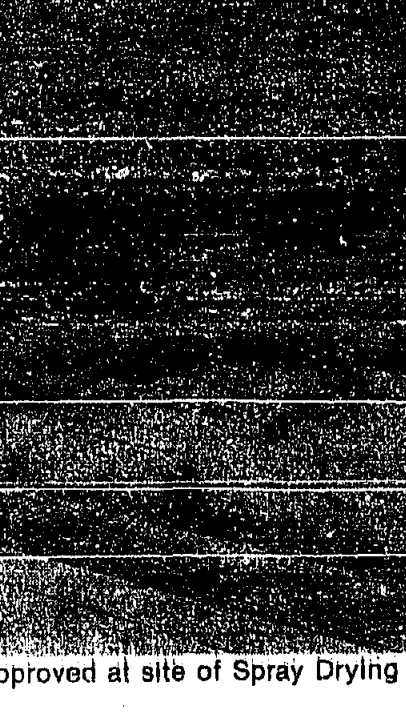
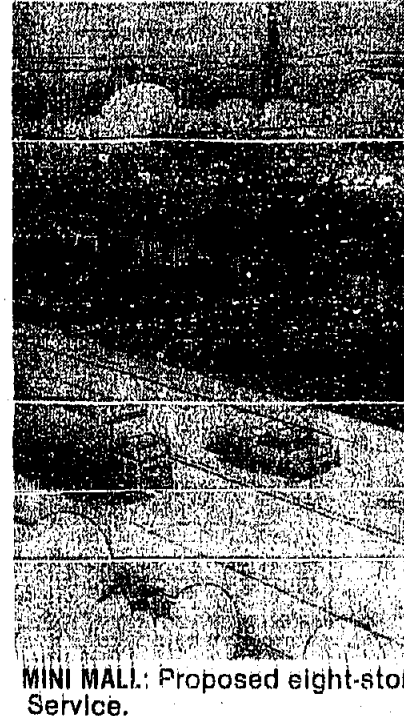
The design of the mall will be "Aztec contemporary," said

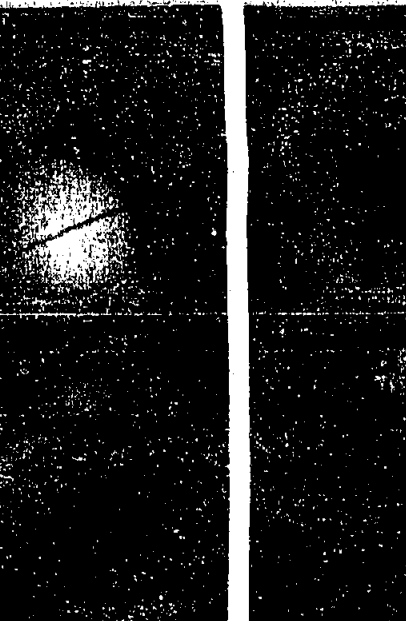
MINI MALL: Proposed eight-store mall on North Avenue was approved at site of Spray Drying Service.

Josephine Troiano, a math teacher who retired this week in protest over changes made by the school administration in the math program, is a candidate for the school board in the April election.

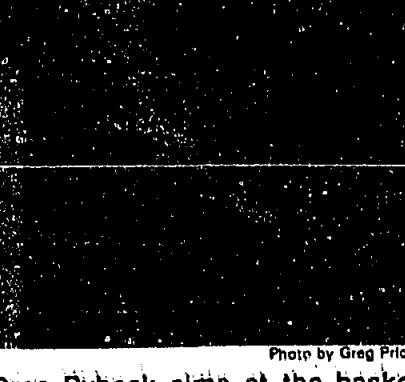
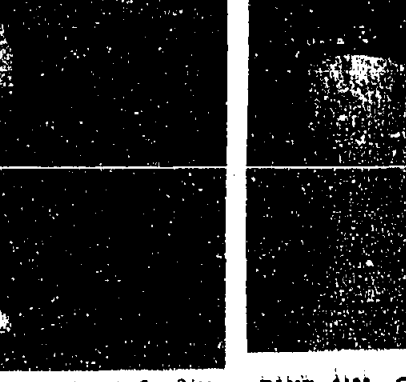

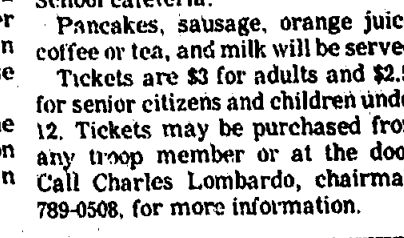
A Colonia man was charged Monday with the unlawful possession of several weapons.

A decision by the United Kingdom to raise the tipping fee at the AMS Transfer Station in London probably will have little effect on residential garbage prices in Cranford.

The AMS voted last week to increase the current tipping fee at the transfer station to \$132.05 from the current \$137 per ton. But local garbage haulers say the increase is so slight that it will have little if any effect on residential garbage prices in Cranford.

The new rate was scheduled to go into effect on Jan. 1, but first must be approved by the state Board of Public Utilities. The BPU has decided not to rule on a separate rate hike for the regional transfer station, but will set the tipping fee at the Linden site to \$135.50 per ton.

An AMS executive director Joseph J. Kazan said the rate reduction "will be a small amount. It's only pennies an estimated \$1.1 million per year in residential garbage disposal fees."

Acting UPU chairman Gerald C. Nelson said the rate increase the BPU will quickly review the new rate and approve it, at least on an interim basis. We then trust that the haulers

directed to the AMS station "will reflect this new rate in what the haulers pay."

But haulers who serve Cranford predicted little if any decrease in monthly residential rates.
