Show will explore visual memory

FRENCHTOWN

"Annunusciis and Memory" is the theme of a solo exhibition by Linda Guneste at the Atelier Fine Art Gallery, Frenchtown.

Guneste has taken the role of an amanuensis, one who writes from dictation, or copies from a manuscript. She has extended this role a step further by imparting an artistic interpretation of the individuals and their memories. The process is a collaboration between artist and subject, according to Guneste, with the landscapes probably not at all like the actual places the subjects have been to.

The landscapes, she said, are "between the subject and the artistic interpretation."

The portraits are inspired by the subjects' personalities as revealed in the interview process. Artists, family members and Tibetan monks, who have become dear friends of the artist, are the subjects.

Guneste uses oil paint on Venetian red gesso, allowing the surface to show through and reveal the process of creation. Great contrast, chiaroscuro, minor exag-

geration of prominent features and the large size of the paintings highlight the subjects' inner personalities. Working in this genre is a departure for this artist who has established a reputation mainly in landscapes.

She lives in Chalfont, Pa., and has taught many painting workshops for adults and teens.



Union stars victorious in wild Snapple Bowl

EAST BRUNSWICK — In an upset finish to an all-star game that one could expect to see,

Gary Cousar found himself right in the middle of the stunning ending to the Snapple Bowl Thursday night.

With his team facing apparent defeat with 24 seconds left and

Middlesex County setting up for a clinching field goal, the Scotch Plains-Fanwood graduate got the call from then sidelines, repeated it in the huddle and the Union County defense did the rest to turn an apparent loss into victory last Thursday night.

When the snap went through the holder's hands, Linden High's Brandon Bracey broke through, scooped it and rambled 70 yards to knot the game at 16-16. After Steve Andriola's extra-point placement barely cleared the crossbar after being partially deflected, Union County had an improbable 17-16 victory that evened the Snapple Bowl rivalry at 4-4.

"I called the play," Cousar said. "The coach said for everyone to go and that's what I told them. I was coming from the left, and I don't think they had enough guys on our right side to pick up everyone. As soon as I saw (Bracey) pick up the ball I started blocking. I thought he was gone when he picked it because he's probably the fourth fastest guy on the team."

And it all happened while Union players were lamenting the loss.


"It was one of the best feelings in the world," said Kenilworth's Chris Tyne. "It was a win no one expected. Everyone was standing around on the sidelines shaking hands and saying 'nice game,' and then everyone's running down the field after Bracey."

Cranford's Ryan Stark went though the same kind of experience. "There was so much excitement at the end of the game, so many different emotions," he said. "There were 17 seconds left and everyone thought we were going to lose and then somehow we managed to win the game. (Bracey) looked like he could go all the way, but I wasn't sure how fast he was."

Atlantic City's Paul Johnston is almost a case of déjà vu. "I almost thought they had fumbled on purpose because they said we couldn't fake a kick. It was kind of shocking to see him running down the field," he said. "It was also kind of weird because the guy was from Linden and a couple of years ago Linden broke a long one late in the game and beat us 6-0."

The Chronicle and Record-Free Press area sent five players to the game, and all of them came away with a lasting impression of the experience while also pleased with their performances.

"It felt very good winning the game," said Cranford's Steve Bobrowski, who shared time on the offensive line. "It was pretty intense, and I enjoyed it a lot. It was a lot of fun playing against the other all-stars. I'm going to try and walk on at Marshall

ankle ligaments in a May 16 base-running mishap, Pats starter Wayne Hoy was roughed up Friday night, allowing five hits, two walks and five runs (three earned) in 2 2/3 innings at The Sandcastle.

Hoy, who also hit a batter, gave up three straight hits to open the action as the Surf scored twice in the first stanza and the home team added three more runs in the second for a 5-1 lead against Somerset, which had its season-high seven-game winning streak snapped.



Cranford drops P.A.L. contest

CRANFORD — It is just the summer, so you can't get too excited, but the Westfield High boys basketball team removed at least part of the monkey from its back July 18, defeating Cranford in convincing fashion 57-40 in Cranford P.A.L. Summer League action.

It was the first time the Blue Devils had beaten Cranford in Head Coach Kevin Dwyer's five-year tenure, winters and summers included. Westfield blew open a close game in the third quarter, when senior-to-be Dan Deserio scored nine straight points to start the half and help Westfield open up a 32-21 lead. Deserio finished with 12 of his game high 20 points in the quarter as Westfield took a 38-30. The Blue Devils kept Cranford at arm's length behind two timely three-pointers from Chris Freisen (10 points) and the penetration of Louis Mercer, who finished with 10 points.

"Cranford always gives us trouble, so it's always good to beat them," said Dwyer. "They had players out, we had players out, so it evened up. In the main season, it's going to be a whole different ball game."

"It's the summer, we're trying to give other kids looks and some time, so it's fine," said Cranford Head Coach Tom Johnston. "It's one game, it's the summer, it's not a big deal. This is a learning experience. Other than tonight, they've all picked a different night to play well. They've all stepped up and done the job for us at some point. Summer is a time to let them play a little bit."

Westfield was able to take advantage of an inexperienced Cranford lineup, swarming Cranford's top offensive threats, Jon Brown and Kamin Rajahn, and forcing others to create scoring opportunities. The Blue Devils were able to force turnovers and score some easy hoops in transition.

"One thing about these guys is most of them play hard, and when you play hard and know how to play, you are going to be able to create some turnovers," said Dwyer. "Hopefully we're at the point where they know how to play defense and are learning to play better and will be able to create more turnovers."

"We did not shoot the ball well," said Johnston. "We weren't getting good looks. They were jumping out at us and did a good job defensively. We've been scoring 30-70 points a game this summer and we're not going to win scoring 40 points. We have, maybe, 10 percent of our offense put in and 10 percent of our defense. We're just letting the kids play and seeing what they can do and how they react on their own, more or less. Some nights are real good, some nights are not so good."

The final regular season game was played Monday and the quarter-final round of the playoffs was yesterday. Westfield and Hillside were the top two teams heading into Monday, each with one loss. Cranford and Ridge were tied for third with a 6-2 mark. Dayton stood at 4-3, with Carteret, Governor Livingston, Johnson and Chatham all standing at 2-5. Roselle Park was 0-7. The semifinals will be played 6 and 7 p.m. Monday and the final will be 7 p.m. Wednesday.
