OYSTER SHELLS: BARE HISTORY ON WAR OF REVOLUTION

Collection of Letters by Im portant Men Just Found.

These letters tell the story, from the American standpoint, of the war and the Clinton papers deal with affairs in New York, Philadelphia, Charleston, Savannah and other centers of British war activity. In the collection is the letter of

General Cornwallis announcing his urrender at Yorktown; the corre spondence between General Clinton da). John Andre und Benedict Arnold which led up to the treason of Arnold. and an unpublished history of the revolution written by General Clinton some time after the war.

These documents are now on their way from the East to the Clements library. It is said that there are more than 14,000 separate items in the Clinton collection alone.

Boon to Historians. The historians have a systematic

urvey of the Clements Ilbrary collection, and they are agreed that no body will ever again be able to write on the American revolution with the support of documentary citations without visiting this collection.

Despite the fact that the mound are neither artistic nor utilitarian in hemselves, community pride of each hamlet appears to be in direct proportion to the size of its local moun tain since the size of the heap meas ares the town's prosperity. So close ly is the altitude of these mounds linked with good times that Long islanders have come to speak of their piles of oyster shells as "financial

Every pullet should always have all the nilk, sour or sweet, that she can turing. Cleaniness is a big factor in handling poultry successfully, and the college poultrymen suggest not only washing the milk dish every time before use but also identifies the milk dish every time before use but also identifies the milk dish. fore use, but also cleaning the roosts, the floors, and the self-feeders frequentla. 



Washington-An apparently officend uggestion on shellmaking, dropped ascally into an army ordnance ex perts' meeting, may serve to simplify Uncle Sam's whole problem of having t hand enough big gun projectiles to thost up an enemy who obtained or attempted to obtain a footing on American soil. Exteriments siready made indicate

s wholly practical way of turning the American peace-time production of 350,000 tons of seamless steel tubing every year into a war output of shell of thousands per day without additional machine

All shell casings used during the war or manufactured since were turned to size, pointed on one end and squared off on the other in lather manufacturing process. It took terrific drive in the war to build up th output of any single factory to 200 or 300 shells a day.




