SENATE ADOPTS INCOME TAX CUT

Delays Action on Surtaxes, Estate Levy and the Publicity Provision.

RADICALS MODIFY THREAT

Closure is Threatened to Force Passage Feb. 10—Treasury Department

Attacked by Glass in Spirited Clash Over Rebate Limit.

HOW REVENUE BILL AFFECTS NORMAL TAX

Comparison of taxes on incomes up to \$10,000—affected by the "normal" rates only under the present Revenue Act and the bill now before the Senate.

Present New Bill

Income Tax New Bill

Washington—With apparent unanimity the Senate approved tentatively the reductions in the normal income tax rates, the repeal of the capital stock tax and the so-called nuisance taxes eliminated in the House bill during consideration of the \$355,000,000 tax reduction bill.

The bill as it now stands provides for a reduction in the normal income tax rates from 3 to 14 per cent on the first \$4,000 of taxable income, from 4 to 3 per cent on the next \$4,000, and from 5 to 6 per cent on the remainder.

Exemptions are increased from \$1,000 to \$1,500 for single persons and from \$2,500 to \$3,500 for married persons.

While most of the controversial matters were passed over, Senate leaders were more gratified over the progress made in the consideration of the bill. They are confident it will be acted upon finally by the Senate by Feb. 10, the deadline set by Chairman Smoot, in order that the taxpayer may get the benefit in payment due March 15.

When the provision eliminating the estate tax from the House bill and the repeal of the publicity clause from the 1924 act were reached Senator Norris (R., Neb.) indicated he was ready to open up his fight for the restoration of these features. Seizing a prolonged debate, Chairman Smoot of the Finance Committee, in charge of the bill, suggested that those provisions be passed over for the time being.

The Senate also accepted the increase from \$10,000 to \$20,000 in the amount of income on which the 2 per cent reduction for earned income might be allowed.

When the proposal for the reduction of the surtaxes from 40 to 20 per cent as a maximum on incomes exceeding \$100,000 per annum was reached, Senator King (D., Utah) suggested postponing amendments to propose his wants to make the cuts more pronounced on incomes ranging between \$20,000 and \$100,000.

Backed by pronounced public opinion, advocates of early passage of the Tax Reduction bill, while disposed to give the few dissenters ample time to voice their opposition and discuss amendments, will not brook unnecessary delay, and if necessary they will invoke the closure rule to insure its passage within the limited time.

Drastic course is certain should any signs of a filibuster develop. A survey disclosed that enough votes are in sight to slay on a closure.

Senator Glass (D., Va.) enumerated several cases in which taxpayers were harassed, humiliated and unduly embarrassed by the Federal officials.

Senator Cappers (R., Mich.) fortified the charges made by Mr. Glass from testimony brought out by the Select Committee which investigated the Internal Revenue Bureau.

RAILROAD MEN ASK RAISE

Train Brotherhoods File Application

New York—American railroad men began a fight for pay increases that will total \$200,000,000 if granted. The first demand, served on eastern railroads in a joint letter from the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen and the Order of Railway Conductors, asks an extra one dollar a day for members of the two organizations and gives the railroads until March 2 to make their reply.

Your Garden and Lawn

This column is to be devoted to the timely discussion of popular garden topics. While endeavoring to give only accurate information and advice the writer is open to criticism, especially when it tends to throw more light on any question in dispute. All questions pertaining to plant life will be answered and if possible answered in this column.

Hardy Plants Continued.

Last week we discussed the Iris, Jonquils and Phlox. These three may be said to be the backbone of the "Perennial" border. However, there are dozens of others equally important so let us consider briefly those that are grown principally from divisions like the first three mentioned. The Achillea Millefolium, Ball of Snow, is a most reliable of the well known Yarrow. It differs, however, considerably in both foliage and flowers. The neat little white flowers are borne in great profusion from June to August and if kept cut will often keep up until the severe frost. It is a spreading plant and must be kept in control. The white thread-like roots reach out in every direction, supported on stakes placed inconspicuously the flowers are better for cutting.

The Anemone or Monkshood

also called Helmet flower is one of the indispensable fall blue flowers that thrive in the shade. It is rather difficult to raise from seed, as the tuberosity roots are not prolific and there is seldom a surplus of it. It seems to resent moving so established clumps are far from the best. In recent years several varieties have developed; a very dwarf variety named Fisher grows less than two feet, while Wilson often attains a height of six feet.

A Blue Spring Flower

that is very interesting and quite distinct is the Anemone. It is extremely hardy and will thrive in the shade. Its pale blue clusters of star shaped flowers are borne on stiff stems which make it good for cutting. It divides well and should be planted freely where other plants are difficult.

The Hellebore Scented Marguerite

or Artemisia lactiflora is an Oriental plant that has settled down for a permanent stay on our shores. Its tall majestic spikes of minute flowers are a lovely blue and a pleasant fragrance make a striking subject for the perennial border. It does equally well in Sun or Shade and may be multiplied by division as freely as a plant. It is a fine flower for mixing with Gladioli when cut.

Snow, however, admitted he had been in contact with Mrs. Snow and Mrs. B. A. Old, the boy's mother and grandmother, declaring they left for Waco, Texas, three days before the killing of his stepson.
