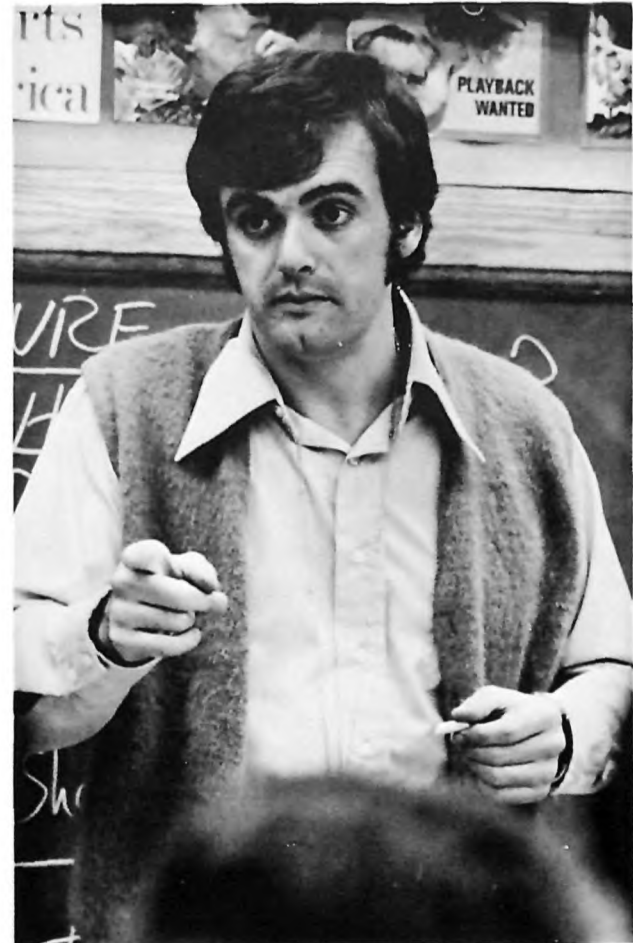
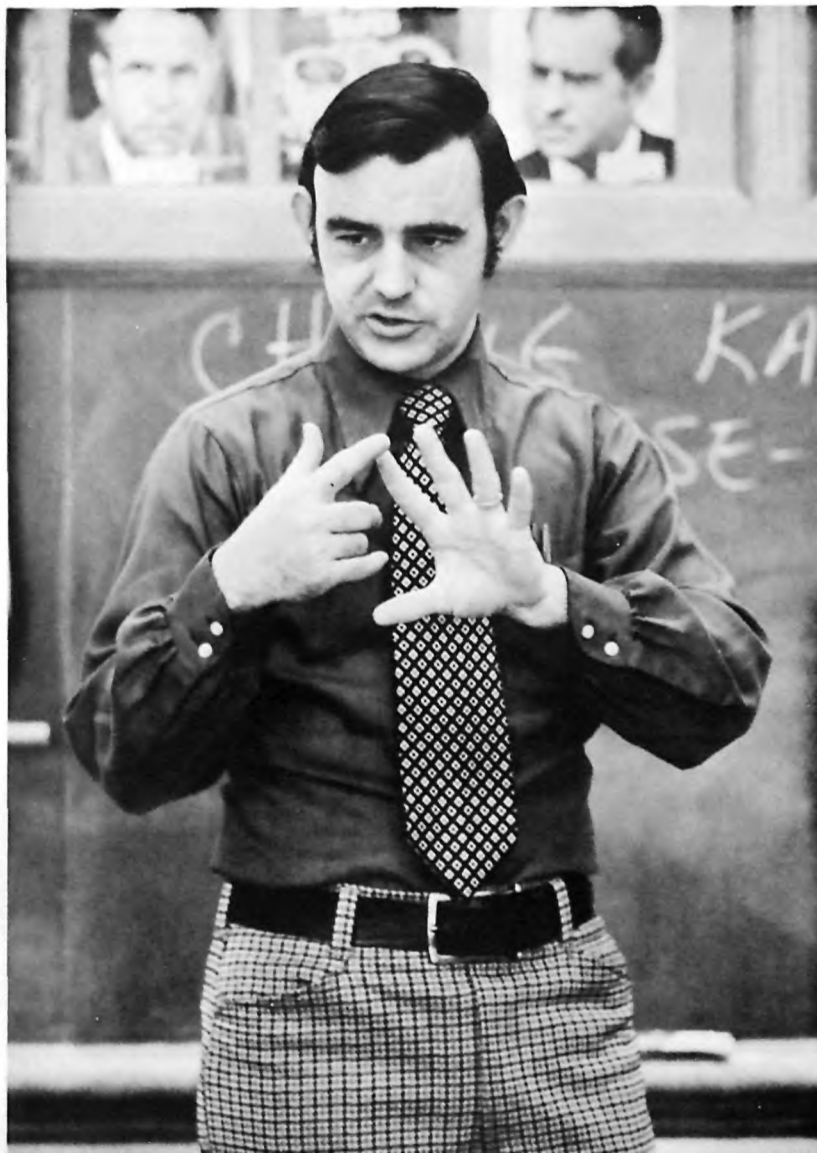
who can forget the nervous excitement of his first time behind the wheel in Driver's Ed.?

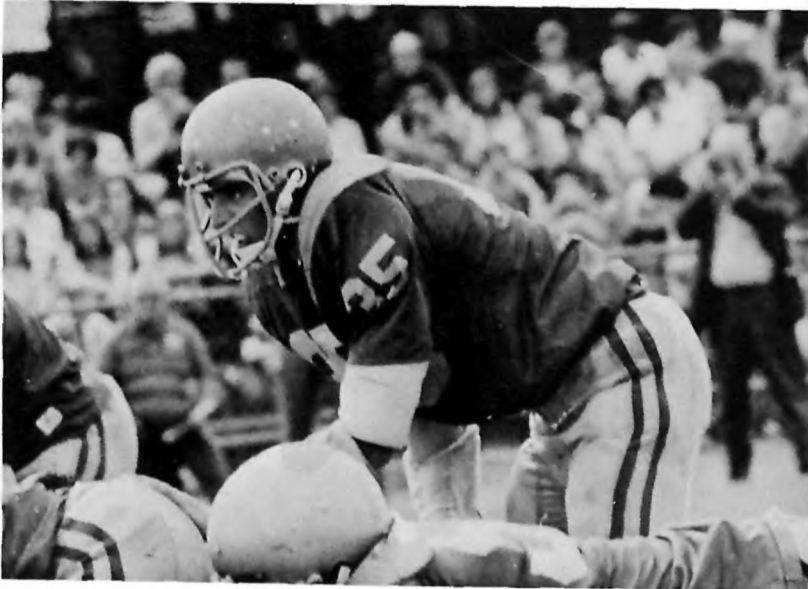

Wrestling at C.H.S. started off with a bang this year as the Cougars rolled to nine straight victories, including capturing the Christmas Tournament crown.

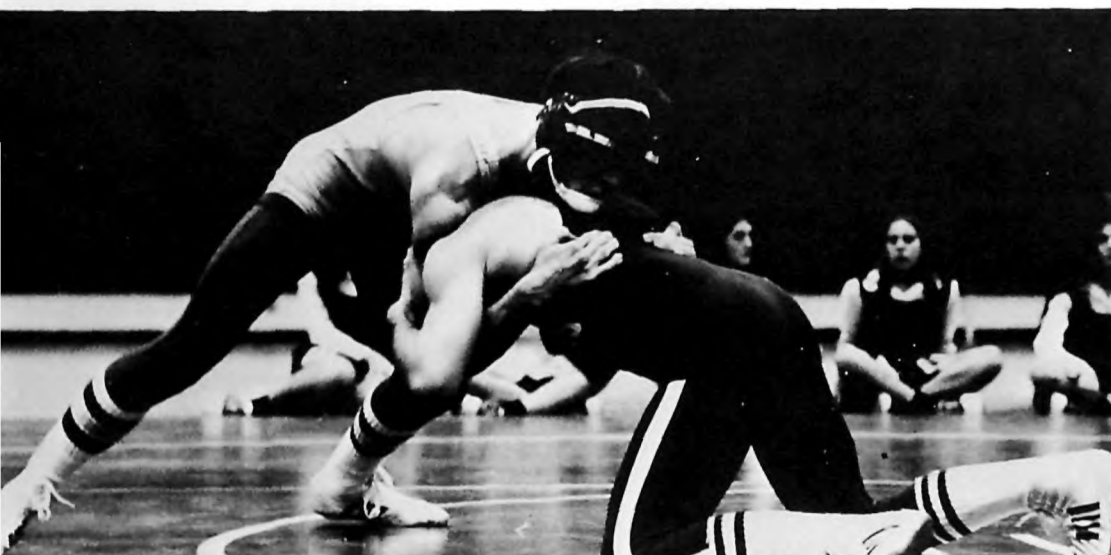

Unfortunately, their record is marred by two very close defeats by Roselle Park and Watchung Conference champs Westfield.

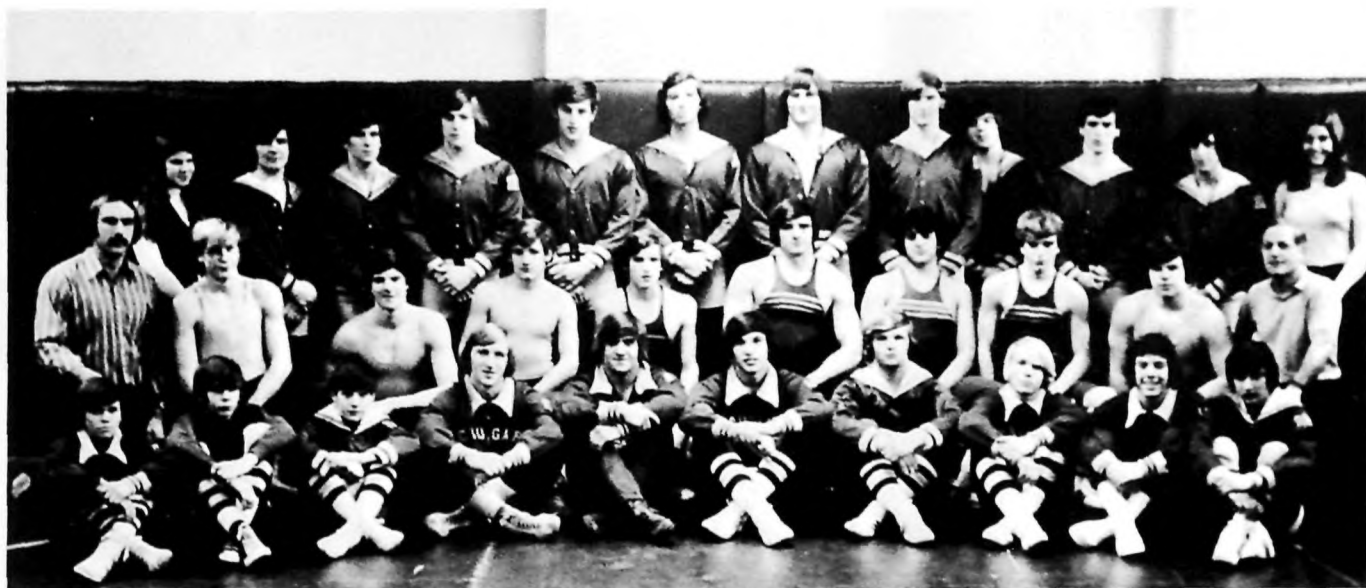

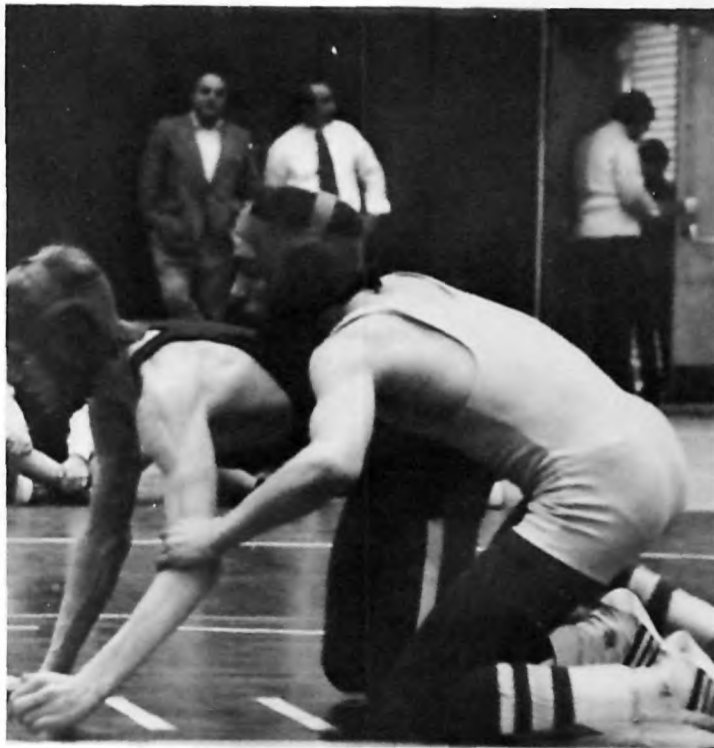

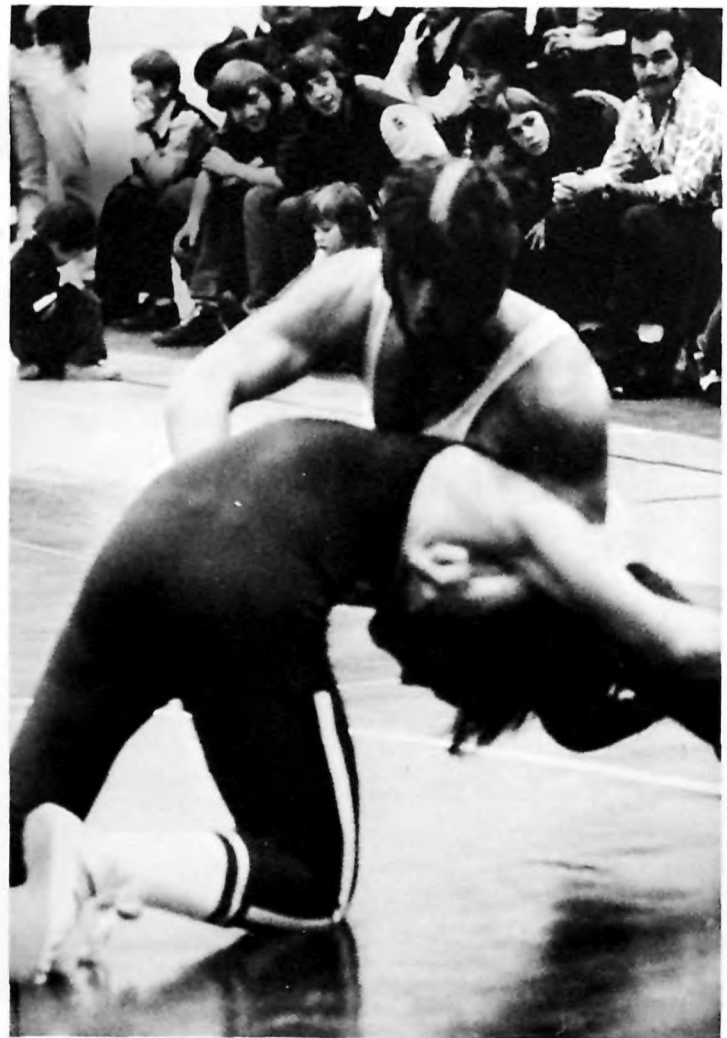

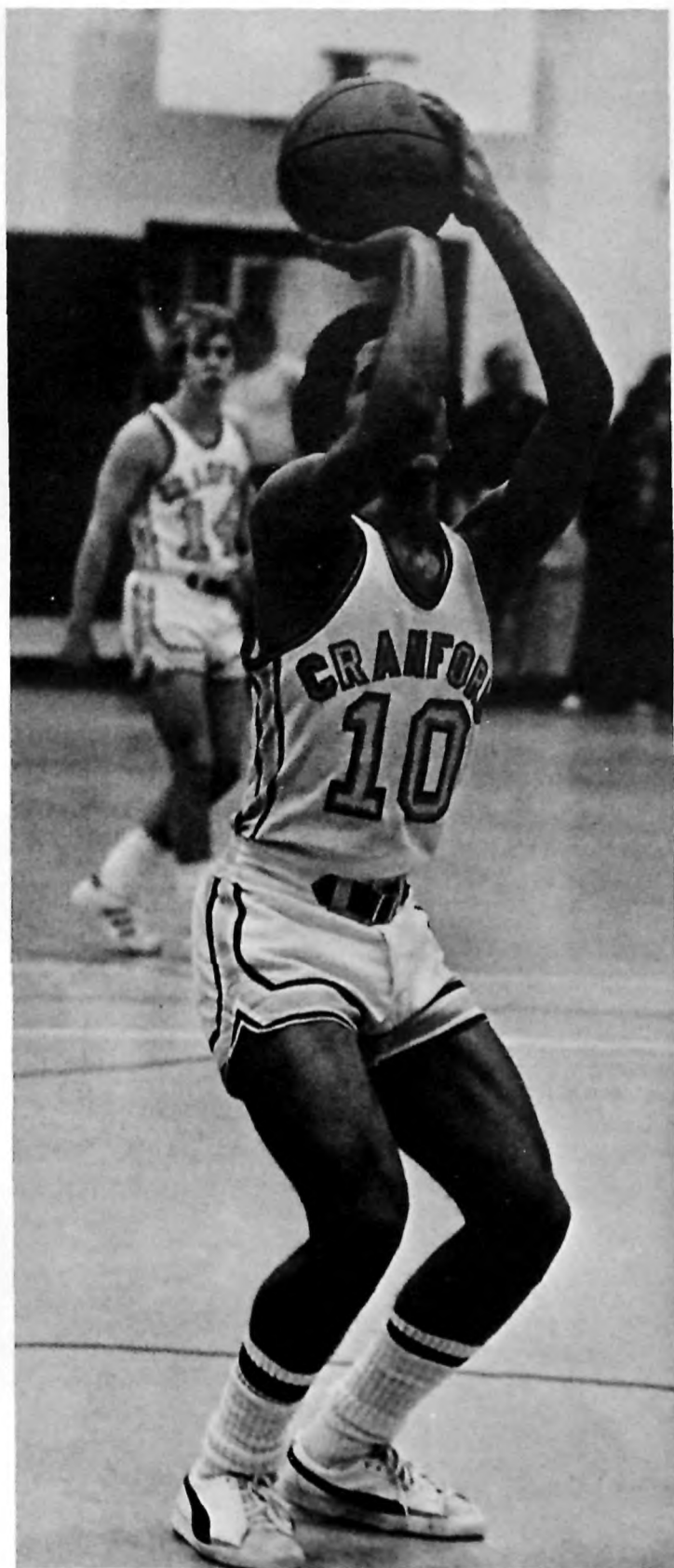

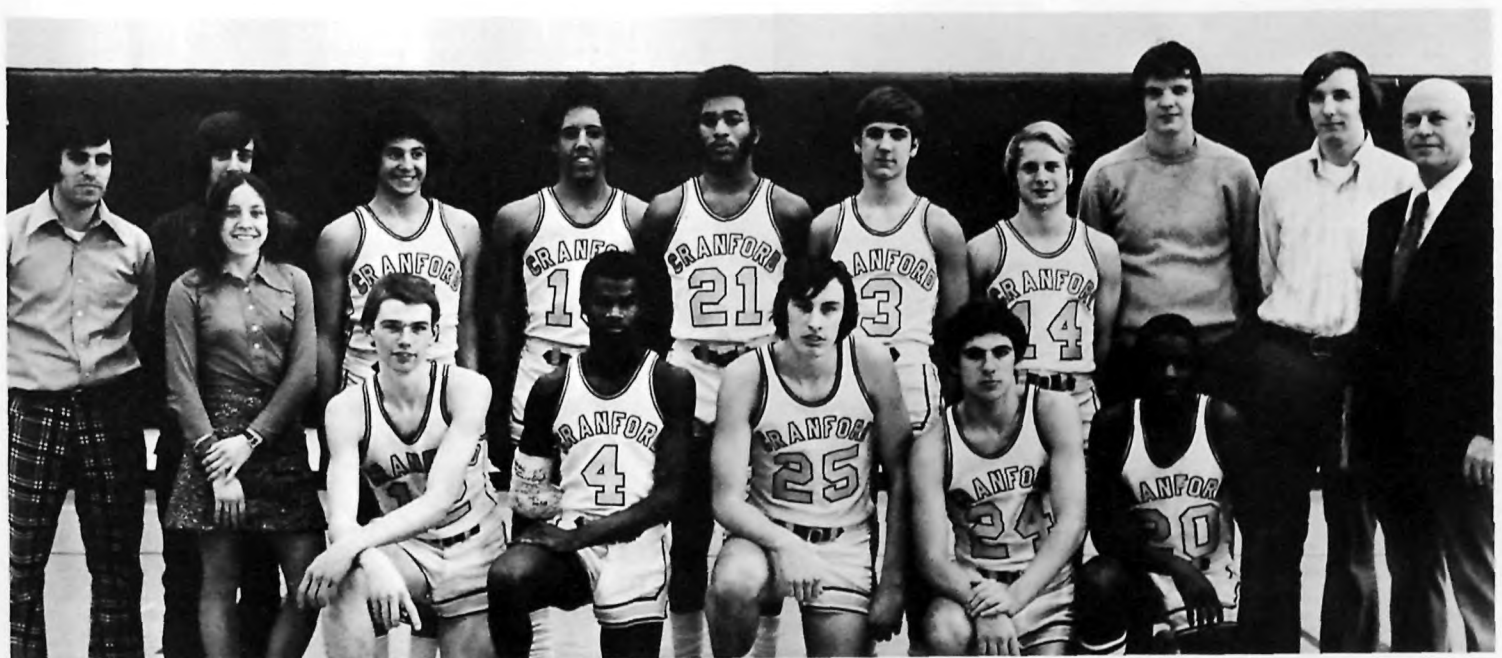

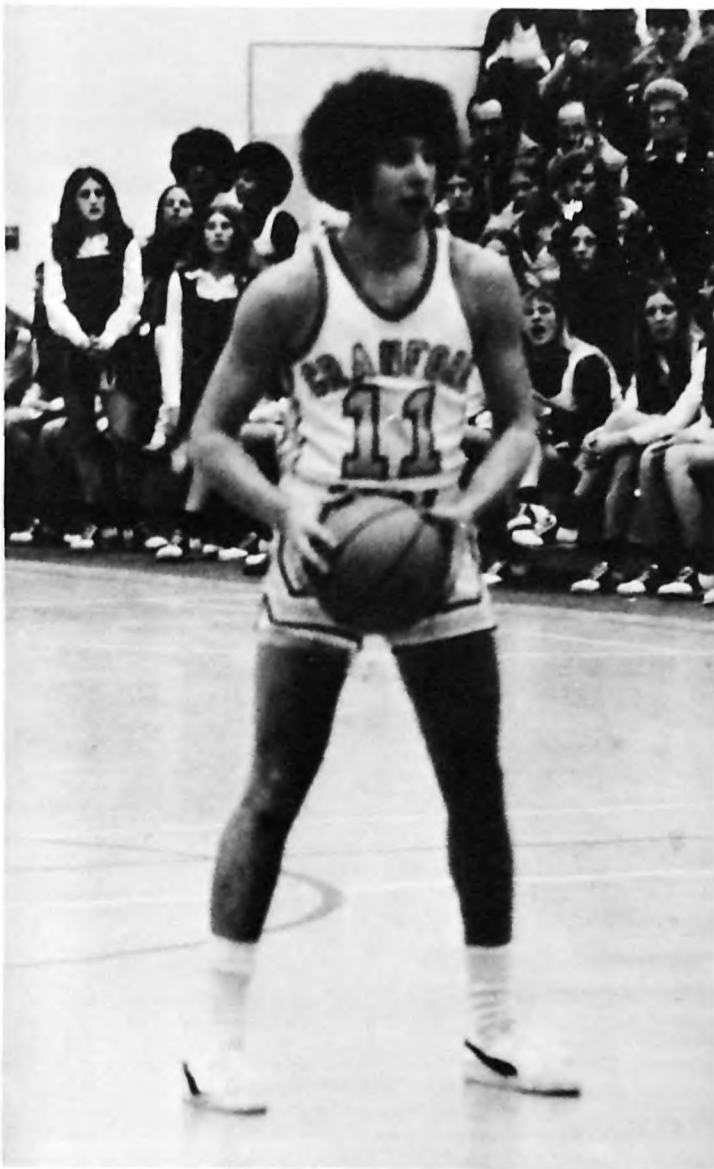
The remaining starter, junior Jim Hobbie, took up some of the scoring burden and should add experience to next year's team.

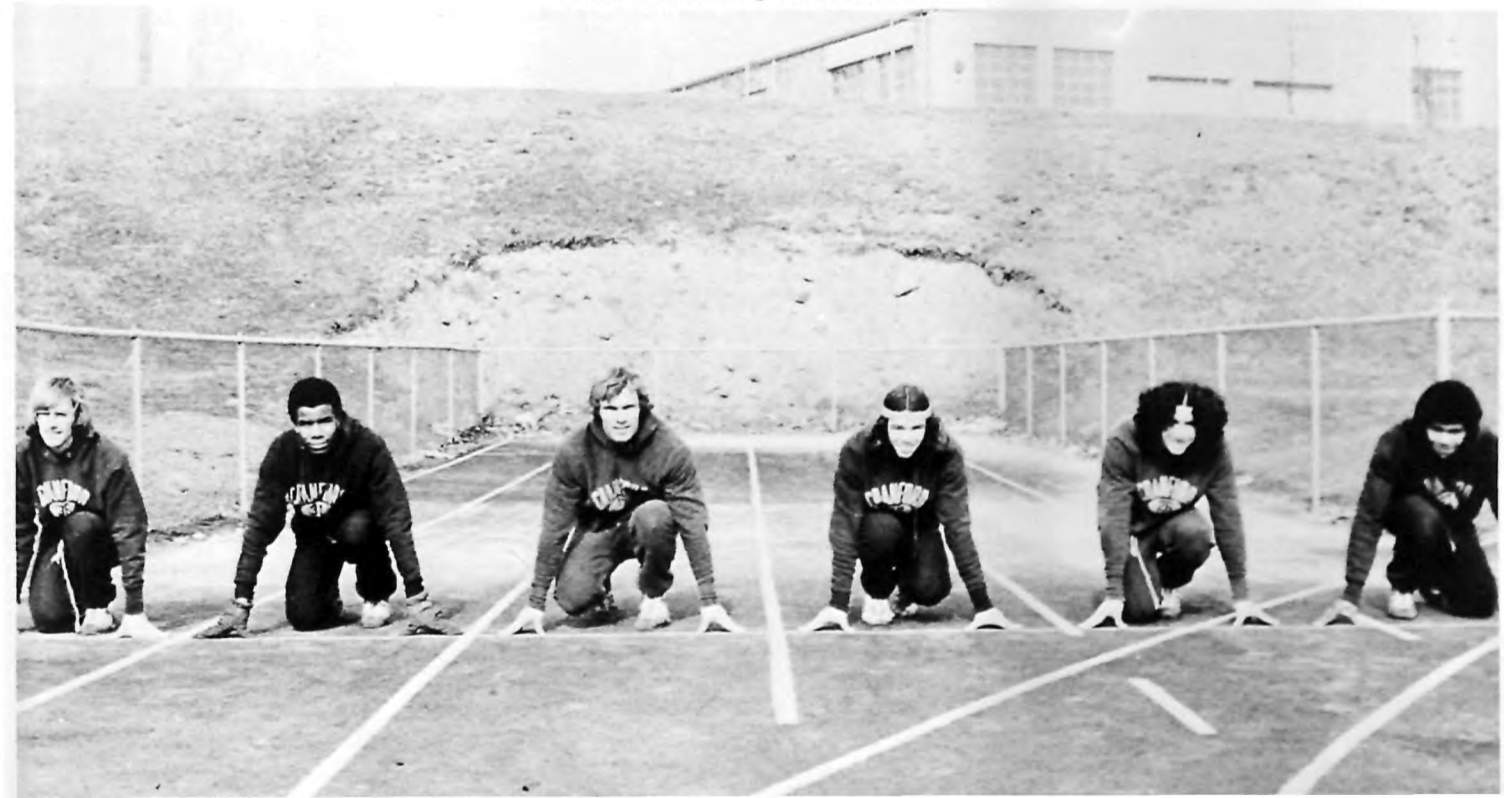
