SSPA elevator soaked again; cracked casing causes leaks

The saga of water seeping into the Social Science/Public Affairs Building continued Monday afternoon when an elevator repair crew from Nova Elevator vacuumed up oil and water that covered the floor of the building's elevator shaft.

In the past, the building has been plagued with water problems.

In 1995, water flooded the basement of the building. The diagnosis for this problem, according to Facilities Management Director, Rob Quirk, was an epoxy injection used to fill the voids and cracks around the perimeter of the building into which the water permeated.

Yesterday's water problem in the elevator shaft occurred due to a cracked casing in one of the elevators according to elevator

mechanic, Jason Thompson. The casing of the elevator runs into the ground nearly 40 feet and reaches the ground's natural water table.

"The water table is high under the SSPA building and in this area because of the proximity to the beach, this will probably happen again," Thompson said. The water subsequently corroded and cracked the casing rendering the elevator's hydraulic system defunct.

Thompson said most of the oil leaked from the cracked casing will be absorbed underground.

The water and oil that was vacuumed up will be disposed of by Nova Elevator following proper environmental hazardous material disposal guidelines and specifications.

"The problem with the elevator casing could have been avoided if the original casing had been drilled into the ground with PVC pipe around it," Thompson said.

Another elevator repair company will be coming to replace the hydraulic jack. "This is a long term repair solution," Quirk said. Quirk also specu-

lated that the water on the floor of the shaft had seeped in through the cracked casing.

Both elevators remained inoperable for approximately three hours on Monday during repairs. One elevator will be out

of service until all repairs are completed, which could be a couple of weeks according to Quirk.

The remaining operating elevator in SSPA is accessible from all floors.

RA sings smokin' in the boys' dorm

Fire alarm pulled in Los Cerritos

Seeing smoke while leaving his room prompted Residential Assistant Walter Hall to pull the fire alarm in the boys' wing of Los Cerritos hall on Sunday morning at 3 a.m.

"I walked out of my room and the smoke was so thick that I couldn't see the end of my hallway," Hall said.

A Long Beach Fire Depart-

ment Headquarters representative said that the report regarding the incident is still open indicating firefighters may be investigating or that they are taking a little longer to file the report. The report does not mention arson and the fire department cannot release further information now.

Anje Castro, the R.A. on the second floor said that the majority of the residents did a good job of evacuating the building. The remaining people did not wake up after the fire alarm went off.

She said the two main reasons given by the sleepers were that they thought it was a fire

drill or that it was in the middle of the night and they could not get out of bed or hear the alarm. Castro also said that everyone was evacuated in time and that no one was hurt.

Leslie Sayre, a resident at Los Cerritos, said she thought the fire alarm was her alarm so she did not get out of bed. She then said the R.A. came into her room to check if anyone was there but failed to see her. Two minutes later Sayre said she needed to use the bathroom, saw the panic and left the building.

"Hopefully mother nature will help me out again when it's a real fire," she said.

Jamie Arnold, a resident of the halls, said she thought it was either a false alarm pulled by someone or a drill.

"I was very irritated by the alarm and told my friend we should hide in the closet," Arnold said.

Traci Rapozo, an English major, said she found the whole incident rather comic and was not bothered by it.

"Thank God I was out partying because I would have been pissed if I had been woken up," Rapozo said.

No one at this point has speculated on the cause of the smoke.

Student injured in crash that kills 2

19-year-old loses siblings in fatal auto accident

A Cal State Long Beach student was driving his younger brother and sisters to school when he lost control of his vehicle and landed upside down, resulting in the death of two of his siblings Friday morning.

Saoroeun Srou, 19, clipped the front end of a Ford Explorer while attempting to change lanes.

The Explorer veered off and hit a tree. Srou's white Honda Accord spun out control, flipped into a utility pole, and was crushed when it turned over near the intersection of Clark and Carson in Long Beach.

Srou's 13-year-old brother, Saorin, and 11-year-old sister, Linda, were pronounced dead at the scene. Police said the victims were not wearing their seat belts.

The survivors, Srou and his 16-year-old sister, Sary, were wearing their seat belts.

The other driver and her son were not injured.

Srou was pried from the smashed car with a Jaws of Life device. Sary crawled from beneath the car. Both were rushed to Memorial Medical Hospital.

The unidentified driver of the Explorer and her 12-year-old son were not injured.

Hospital spokeswoman Terry Starkman said Srou suffered a minor neck fracture. Sary, sustained bleeding beneath the skin. The two were released from the hospital on Sunday.

Witnesses told police that Srou was driving at unsafe speeds and making sporadic lane changes.

He was not arrested Friday but the district attorney's office is reviewing the case for possible charges of manslaughter.

Prisons fuel growth

SACRAMENTO (AP) — Chowchilla was California's fastest growing city last year, nearly doubling its population from 6,575 to 12,700 by annexing two state prisons, state demographers reported Monday.

Chowchilla's 93.2 percent growth between Jan. 1, 1996, and Jan. 1, 1997, was followed by Soledad, up 28.5 percent to 20,050; Laguna Hills, up 19.3 percent to 29,950; Susanville, up 17.5 percent to 17,100; and Orange Cove in Fresno County, up 15.7 percent to 7,750.

The biggest numerical gains in population were in California's larger cities, but percentage growth was much smaller.

Los Angeles, California's largest city, added 41,800 residents, a 1.1 percent increase to 3,681,700.

San Jose increased by 19,600, or 2.3 percent, to 873,300; San Francisco by 18,300, or 2.4 percent, to 778,100; and

San Diego grew by 17,600 residents, or 1.5 percent, to 1,197,100.

Among counties, Los Angeles again had the biggest numerical gain, up 1.2 percent to 9,488,200, followed by San Diego, up 42,300, or 1.6 percent, to 2,724,400. Santa Clara County, up 32,700 residents, or 1.653,100. Orange County increased 27,000 residents, or 1.0 percent, to 2,659,300.

Riverside County, among the state's fastest growing during recent years, declined by 0.1 percent, or 1,800 residents, to 1.38 million, with 12 of Riverside's 24 cities reporting declines.

Neighboring San Bernardino County, another growth leader of recent years, was up just 200 residents, or 0.012 percent, to 1,587,400.

California's statewide population increased an estimated 1.2 percent to 32.6 million.

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3 strikes: no journalism accreditation

After initial review and two appeals, council refuses to renew status

Three strikes and the journalism department at Cal State Long Beach is out — out of chances of retaining its accreditation status.

After an initial review and two appeals, the Accrediting Council on Education in Journalism and Mass Communication announced Friday that the journalism department is no longer accredited and cannot reapply for two years.

"This is what we expected," said Dorothy Abrahamse, dean of the College of Liberal Arts. "After losing the first two steps, this was not a surprise."

Early in the semester, an evaluation team reviewed the department for four days. The team failed the journalism department in six out of 12 categories: governance/administration; faculty: full-time/part-time; faculty scholarship/research/professional activities; public service; budget; and minority and female representation.

"Our faculty is Caucasian," said William Mulligan, chairman of the journalism department. "We feel badly about that."

Mulligan noted that the department follows CSULB guidelines for hiring ethnic minorities but that the subject has been moot because the department has not been hiring anybody.

He also added that California is in a unique position regarding affirmative action.

"Everybody is watching Prop.

209 closely," he said. "The council needs to review schools on an individual basis."

Regardless of the law, Mulligan said the department is ethnically diverse. He said that more than 57 percent of graduating students are ethnic minorities and that advisers in the past year have included an African-American and a Native American.

"We've submitted a five-year plan to the university that includes hiring five tenure-track positions," Mulligan said. "We will emphasize ethnic diversity in our recruitment process."

The journalism department is taking other steps to be in compliance with the council's guidelines, including appealing to the university and the College of Liberal Arts for financial support, documenting outside activities by faculty and reorganizing the department by reducing

the number of options from six to two.

"The two options will be traditional journalism, or news/editorial and PR," Mulligan said. "We also want to change the name of the department from journalism to journalism/mass communication."

He said the department has approved the changes and now both the college and the university have to give their approval. Mulligan said he expects no changes until next semester.

Mulligan said that for the department to have any chance of winning back its accredited position, the college and the university have to financially support journalism.

"Repeatedly, the evaluation team pointed out that the staff was overworked and underfunded," Mulligan said. "The team said if resources are not immediately put in the program, the journalism department will die."

Abrahamse said her college is doing what it can.

"We do our best," she said. "We help journalism as much as we do any other department."

Of the five tenure-track positions requested by Mulligan, four have been denied. The approved position is for a chairperson who will replace Mulligan when his term ends in 1998.

"If we don't get approval for the other four positions," he said, "we can forget about applying for accreditation in two years."

Mulligan said losing accreditation is more of an educational loss than professional, he said that it would not hurt students seeking jobs.

He called accreditation "a benchmark for educational stan-

dards."

"If students can do the work, if they have the writing skills, they'll get the jobs," he said.

Broadcast journalism Professor Whitney Mandel echoed Mulligan's sentiments.

"Anyone who writes very well, who has a good liberal-arts background, who has a curious mind will get a job," she said.

Mandel said losing the accreditation is "no big loss." She called the council's rules "archaic."

"I think the council needs to review themselves," Mulligan said. "They are quite outdated."

Instructor Ivan Goldman said

the loss does mean something.

"We've been demoted to the ranks of Cal State Dominguez Hills," he said. "We're better than that. We belong with Cal State Fullerton, Northridge, USC."

He said those schools are accredited.

Of the approximately 400 journalism programs in the country, less than a quarter of them are accredited, Mulligan said. "The better schools are accredited."

"It feels like getting kicked out of the majors," Goldman said. "Now we're in the minors. We're on a bus — not on a jet."

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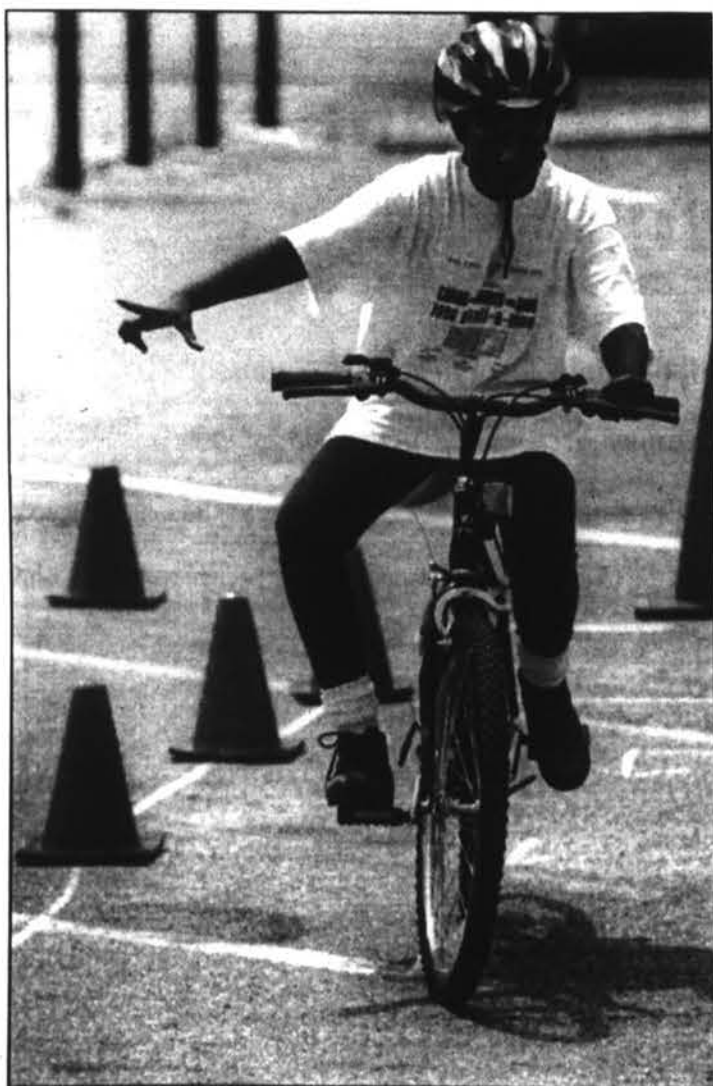

More than 1,000 bicyclists swarmed onto the Long Beach Promenade Sunday to kickoff National Bike Month with Bike Day '97.

The highlight of the event was the Urban Bike Tour, 40-, 100- and 150-kilometer bike rides taking participants as far as the San Gabriel River and back.

The bike rides were not the only attractions. Children could participate in a safety rodeo, where they were tested on their knowledge of bicycle safety rules, such as riding on the right side of the street and displaying hand signals.

Other attractions included an exhibition of extreme bike and skate techniques, with high flying jumps and tricks, and a police auction of stolen or impounded bicycles.

Vending booths, food and live music turned the street into a big party. The crowd included small children on the back of their parent's bikes and older people out for a leisurely Sunday ride.

The host of the event, the Long Beach Bikestation, offered the bicyclists safety checks, air pumps and other minor equipment adjustments. Bicycles lined up prior to the ride as Bikestation Manager Lee Wall inspected them for safety.

"We want everyone to have a safe ride," Wall said.

The theme of the event was to encourage alternative transportation for cleaner air. The Bikestation, the first public-transit facility of its kind in the nation, is a full-service bicycle center for commuter and recreational cyclists.

The event was designed to attract serious riders as well as intermediate and recreational riders.

"I enjoy the heck out of these things," bicyclist Dave Koenig said. Koenig enters about 20 similar rides a year.

AIDS scam targets grocers

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An unsanctioned charity is collecting donations at San Francisco groceries with a slogan that promises "Every Penny Helps The Fight Against AIDS," state and local authorities say.

Not a documented cent has gone to that fight and the Los Angeles-based group called Essential AIDS is under investigation by the state attorney general's office and the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department.

Despite a cease-and-desist order issued in March by the office, Essential AIDS continues to place canisters at corner groceries, Deputy Attorney General Belinda Johns said.

A fund-raising letter that accompanies some jars says the donations go to Stanford University and elsewhere. But the university said it has no record of any funds received from the group.

The slogan on the collection jars is similar to that of a legitimate San Francisco charity, the AIDS Emergency Fund. That group's jars urge "Every penny counts."

Sex offender hides in courthouse

Man eludes police for 2 hours after receiving sentence

A convicted sex offender tried to escape sheriff's deputies by barricading himself in the deputy's locker room at the Long Beach Courthouse Monday afternoon.

David Williams a 26-year-old Long Beach resident, who was sentenced to 87 years in prison, escaped from the lock-up area in the courthouse to a small locker room down the hall where he barricaded himself.

It is assumed that the lengthy sentence is what prompted him to try for an escape, said Sheriff's Deputy Anji Prewett.

Officials are still trying to uncover Williams' method of escape, Prewett said.

Williams, who was convicted of sex offenses including rape and sodomy, could have obtained access to weapons in the deputies' lockers, so the SWAT team was called in and arrived at the scene at 5 p.m. Williams' escape took place at 3:30 p.m.

It was not that tense of a situation because officials felt he could not escape the building, but officers had some concern because he could have obtained access to guns, Prewett said.

Williams was talked into surrendering, and at 5:40 p.m. he

was in custody. He did not obtain any weapons, no one was hurt, and no shots were fired.

A courthouse deputy kept in constant communication with Williams during the incident and eventually convinced him to give himself up, Prewett said.

"I'm not sure what he told him but probably that the room was surrounded and that there was no way for escape," Prewett said.

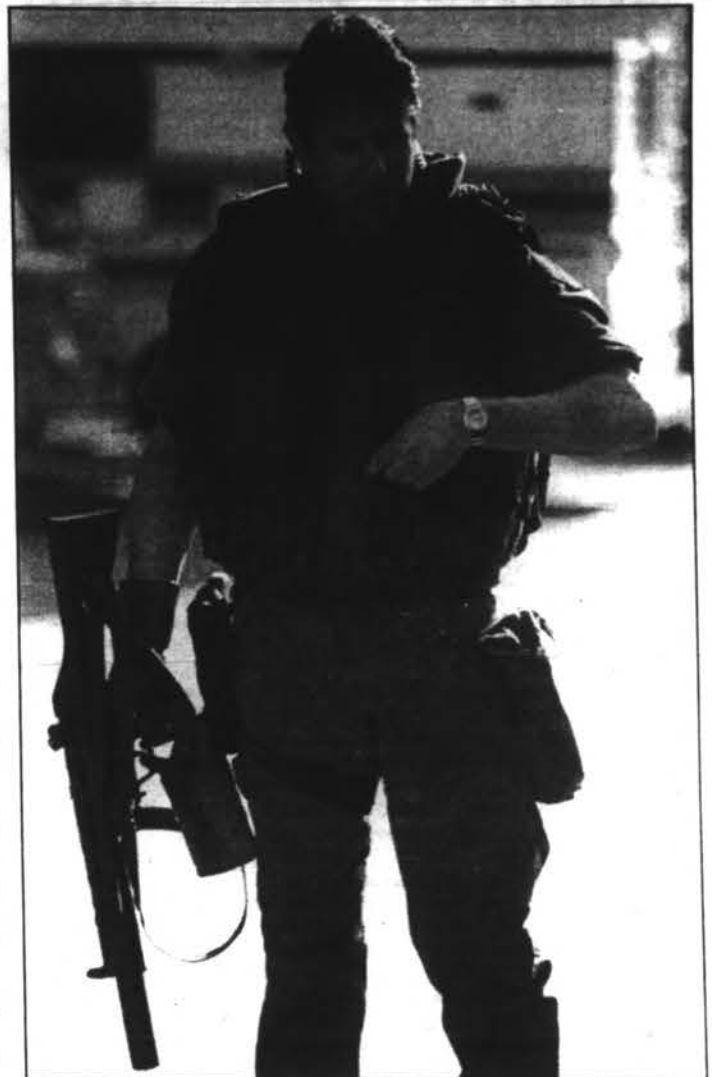
The SWAT team assisted the deputies and did not have to use any weapons. Sgt. William Marsh of the SWAT team said the courthouse deputy did a "wonderful" job in convincing Williams to surrender.

He said the SWAT team was willing to do whatever it took to get the convict out had he not given up.

"We were prepared to use any number of means to resolve the situation," Marsh said.

Marsh claims Williams was remorseful about the escape.

The escape will be added to the list of charges brought up against Williams, Prewett said.

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Softball clinches

Finding itself tied for first place in the Big West Conference with a week to go in the regular season, the Cal State Long Beach softball team decided not to take any chances.

The 49ers knew they could win the title if they won the rest of their games, no matter what Cal State Northridge did. So they closed out the conference schedule by winning four in a row at home last week to clinch their second straight Big West championship.

CSULB defeated UC Santa Barbara, 8-0 and 1-0, then defeated Cal Poly SLO, 1-0 and 3-1. The victories give the 49ers, who are ranked No. 12 in the nation, a 42-17-1 overall record and 23-9 in the Big West, the same conference record they had last season.

Cal State Northridge, which is 21-9, has two conference games left, but even if the Matadors win and tie CSULB, the 49ers still win the conference and get the automatic bid to the NCAA regional playoffs because of tie-breakers.

"I think the fact that we won it when people were picking us to win, that's quite an accomplishment," 49ers coach Pete Manarino said. "The fact we were favored was a little bit of added pressure, but this team held up very well."

"It's tough to repeat in any sport nowadays, and what this team has done makes it very special."

The 49ers, who will end the

regular season with a nonconference doubleheader today at Fresno State, won 10 of their last 11 conference games, hitting over .300 during that span and scoring 41 runs.

Senior pitcher Tammy Dietrich won both her games last week to improve her record to 21-10, becoming the first CSULB pitcher to win 20 games in a season since 1993. Amy Miner set a career high for wins after her two victories last week improved her record to 17-6, and she was named Big West pitcher of the week.

Like last season, catcher Jessie Martinez is on a hot streak at the end of the year. Last season, Martinez hit .420 in her last 20 games. This season, she has hit safely in 26 of her last 35 games, hitting .322 to raise her team-leading average to .321.

Martinez had three RBIs to lead the 49ers in the first game against UCSB, as CSULB won 8-0. In the second game, Miner came within two outs of pitching a perfect game, and the 49ers won 1-0 when Nicola Walsh doubled home Melissa Huls in the bottom of the eighth inning.

Against Cal Poly SLO, Dietrich pitched a one-hitter and Amanda Favorite's sacrifice fly scored Melanie Muniz in the bottom of the ninth for a 1-0 win. In the second game, Miner pitched a two-hitter and Tiffany Blood's two-run double in the fifth inning broke a 1-1 tie.

CSULB has put in a bid to host one of the regional playoffs, and will find out Sunday if it is successful.

Lakers running on empty

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — There were plenty of excuses for Los Angeles, playing its second game in less than 42 hours, to run out of gas in its Western Conference semifinal opener with Utah.

But they didn't come from the Lakers' lips. Words like "tired" and "energy level" to explain LA's 93-77 loss came from the Jazz locker room.

Karl Malone, who had 23 points and 13 rebounds, was the first to admit Utah's victory came over a weary Lakers' team. Los Angeles was coming off a come-from-behind 95-91 win Friday night that wrapped up its first-round series with Portland.

The Jazz hadn't played

since April 28, when they completed a first-round sweep of the Clippers, 104-92.

"They were tired. Give them another day to rest and they are going to shoot the ball better," said Malone, whose Jazz try for a 2-0 lead in the best-of-7 series Tuesday night. "It was a nice win for us, but it's going to be war (in Game 2)."

"Their energy level was probably lower than ours," Utah coach Jerry Sloan agreed. "Our energy level might have been a little bit higher than theirs because we had some time off."

Added John Stockton: "I'm just glad we caught them when we did."

The Jazz outshot LA 45.8 percent to 34.2 percent, and

outrebounded the bigger Lakers 51-40.

Meantime, Shaquille O'Neal shot just 6-of-16 for 17 points — his lowest production of the playoffs — and forward Elden Campbell was 4-for-13.

"I was a step slow today," was all O'Neal would admit. "We'll just have to make some adjustments when we come back (for Game 2). We're not going to make any excuses — they played well, they did what they're supposed to."

Nick Van Exel had 23 points to lead the Lakers, who had only nine field goals in the second half and 27 for the game.

"We just got outthustled," Van Exel said.

Capuano saddles for second

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Bob Baffert could offer only this little bit of advice to the man who replaced him as the Kentucky Derby runner-up.

"That he shouldn't be discouraged," said Baffert, who saddled Silver Charm to a head victory over the Gary Capuano-trained Captain Bodgit in the Derby.

While the second time was the charm for Baffert, Capuano found a silver lining in his defeat.

"I just hope I can do next year what he did this year," the 33-year-old Capuano said. "It would be nice to make a return trip that quick."

Baffert cruised into Churchill Downs the Sunday after the Derby, literally blowing his own horn. He pulled up to his barn, honked the horn on his wine-colored minivan three times, then was greeted by a throng of reporters as he emerged.

"Hold on," he said, "let me just check on the horse first — like I care."

Which, despite his joking, he did.

In only his second attempt, the 44-year-old Baffert had won the Kentucky Derby and erased the memory of what he called the most agonizing defeat of his training career, Cavonnier's loss

by a nose to Grindstone in the 1996 Derby.

"I went to the Derby Museum last night and they showed that replay of Cavonnier. I've always cringed when I saw it, but when I saw it last night, I didn't even care," Baffert said. "I didn't feel a thing. It finally went away."

Silver Charm is one of as many as six Derby horses who could wind up in the Preakness at Pimlico in two weeks. Also expected to go are Captain Bodgit, third-place Free House and fifth-place Crypto Star. Fourth-place Pulpit and seventh-place Jack Flash also might make the trip.

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Baseball blanked by Santa Barbara

Cal State Long Beach baseball head coach Dave Snow stood in disbelief in the 49er dugout Sunday at Blair Field.

Although his club had already clinched the Big West Conference southern division's top seed for its upcoming tournament, Snow could only watch as the 49ers were being taken apart by UC Santa Barbara, and starting pitcher Seth Bean.

"It was a good old tail-whipping," he said after the 8-0 thumping. It was the first time the 49ers had been shut out since Feb. 17, 1995 when they fell to Tennessee, 1-0. Since that night, CSULB had put up at least one run in 169 consecutive games.

"Today's lack of performance caught me off guard," said Snow, whose team had won six straight prior to Sunday's Big West match-up. The 49ers were plagued all afternoon by weak at-bats, bad decisions in the field and poor base running. "We weren't really smart today...It's unlike us."

The 49ers (33-19, 22-5) were stymied by Bean, who threw a four-hit, complete game gem. He gave up just one hit through the first six innings, striking out five. Bean would go on to strike out seven total, giving up four hits.

Bean, who came into the game with a less-than-stellar 4-

7 record, established his fastball early, then fooled the 49ers all day with his off-speed stuff.

"We were perplexed at the plate," Snow said. "He's going to beat a lot of teams pitching like that."

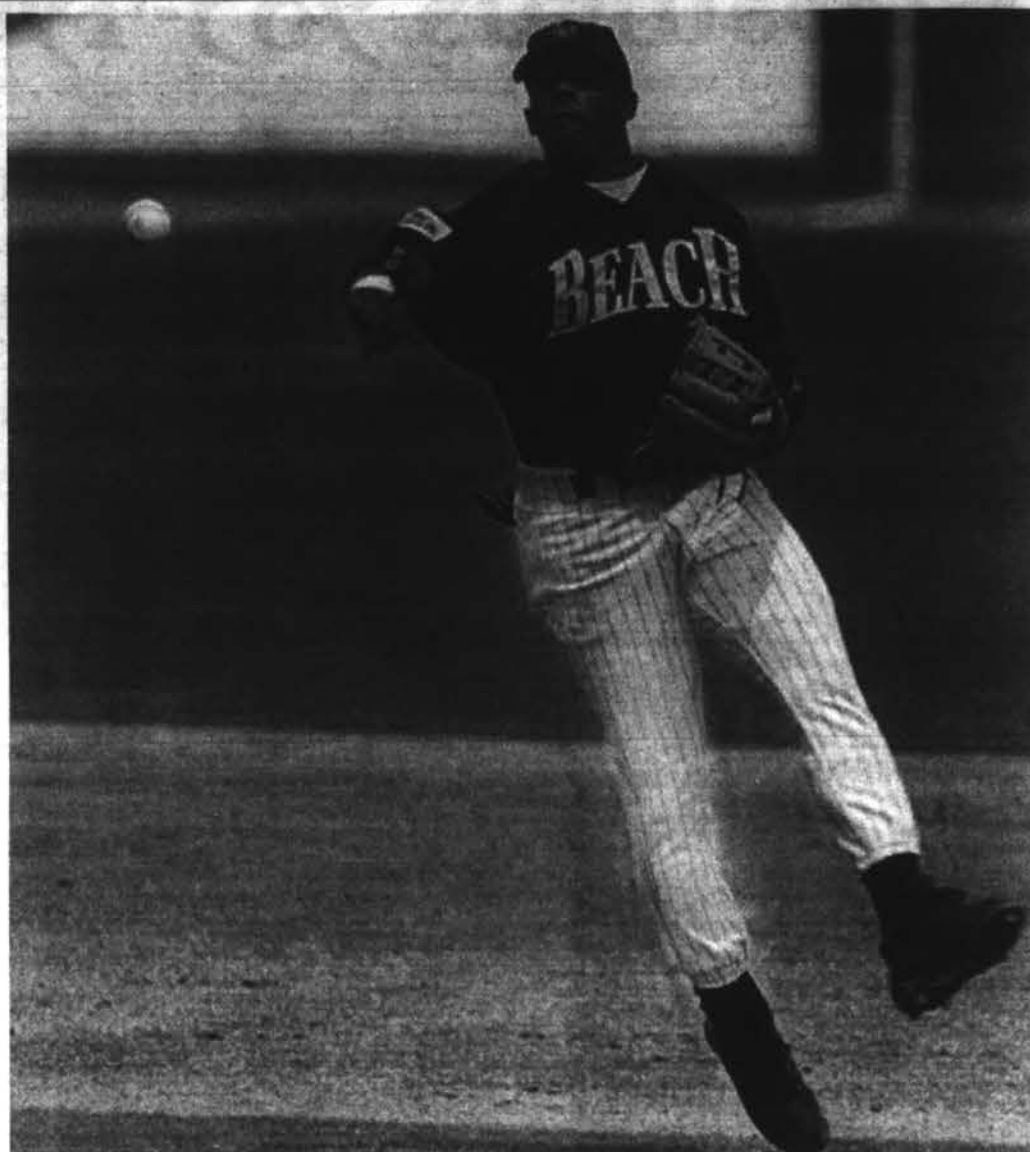
CSULB starter Iran Barerra (5-2) retired the first 10 Gauchos batters before giving up a single in the fourth inning. Barerra would get out of a jam in the fifth, before running into more trouble in the sixth.

After giving up a single and a double, Barerra yielded an RBI single to second baseman Bryan LaCour.

Following a walk, UCSB scored again on a sacrifice fly by right fielder Corey Burnell. Upon making the catch, 49er right fielder Chuck Lopez hesitated before throwing to the plate. When he did throw, it was way off target. The ball skimmed past catcher Casey Martin and Barerra, who was backing up the throw. Another run scored.

After Lopez's error, Barerra was replaced by Denny Gilich who promptly gave up a single to right, scoring another run. With a 4-0 lead, the Gauchos (24-26, 14-13) would never look back. They added one more run in the eighth inning, and three more in the ninth.

The 49ers will play a Tuesday game against UCLA next, before squaring off with Cal Poly San Luis Obispo for three games this weekend.
