THE EXPIRING STATESMEN.

At the last session of the Council ex-Mayor Besson presented the names of Mr. John McGrane, of the second ward, for Commissioner of Assessment, and Alexander Myddleton, of the first ward, for the position of Police Commissioner. Mr. Besson would, ere he retires, deprive, if possible, Mayor O'Neill of the opportunity of making a single appointment. As far as Mr. McGrane is concerned, he is a suitable person in every respect, and one as well fitted as he is entitled to the office. No objection whatever could be advanced against the gentleman other than that he was nominated by a man who has been the worst enemy the Democratic party ever had in this section. Mr. McGrane would have been confirmed, as the opposing councilmen explained, under any other circumstances, but coming as Besson's choice before a decidedly Democratic council, was enough to defeat a saint. The real intentions of the retiring Mayor, however, were not properly understood until the name of Alexander Myddleton was proposed for Police Commissioner, the most important office in the gift of Mr. Besson. Mr. Myddleton is a good, reliable man and a citizen of undoubted reputation, but being also a Bessonite of the most pronounced type, his confirmation would have been equivalent to retaining the ex-Mayor in the Police Board. Mr. Myddleton was a rather bitter pill for Dr. Besson to administer, and the McGrane sugar-coating was not sweet enough. The dose was too bitter, and was only swallowed by the three who were already expiring, and had little or no interest at stake. Councilman Miller made a few sensible remarks, and though a republican and to a certain extent justified in supporting Mayor Besson's nominations, his language was moderate. He was cruel, however, in referring to Mr. Besson as a dying dog, and we think unfaithful as the ex-Mayor has been to party principles, and everything manly, he deserves no such insult while in his present demoralized condition. It seems unfortunate for Mr. Besson that his friends are nearly all of that class whose support means detriment, if not total failure. The idea of Samuel Webb jumping up and down like a "jack in a box" and advocating Besson's nominations was a pitiable sight. Mr. Webb has already irreparably injured his Honor, and as the Councilman from the Third stated, he (Webb) should not kick a dying dog. Councilman Streng is also dying pretty hard, and has joined issues with the expiring gladiators (?) He considered Mr. Myddleton a first-class man, and that settled Mr. M. Several who were of the same opinion immediately changed their minds, and unfortunate Myddleton is not half as nice a fellow now as he was before he was championed

by Streng, Webb & Co. He might very appropriately exclaim in the language of the great Caesar, "Spare me from my friends."

MYSTERIOUS SUICIDE.

A Stranger Blows his Brains out in Busch's Hotel.

Last Tuesday morning, about half-past ten o'clock, a well-dressed, elderly stranger entered the office of Busch's Hotel and asked to be shown to a room. He was requested to register his name and address, but declined, saying to the clerk, "Just enter John Jones, St. Louis, Mo." The young man did as directed, and the new-comer was assigned to room 33 on the second floor. When asked for the checks for his baggage, he replied he would send them down immediately. Nothing more was thought of the new guest until about 1 o'clock, when Mr. Busch asked if the stranger had sent after his baggage. On receiving a negative reply, he instructed the clerk to go after the same, which he did. On reaching room 33, the young man was horrified to find the man lying dead on the floor; a small five-barrel revolver by his side only too plainly telling the sad story.

The remains were immediately removed to Crane's morgue, and every possible means to keep the matter quiet resorted to. An ADVERTISER reporter hearing rumors of a suicide, the same evening visited Police Headquarters, and was informed that no report had as yet been made there. The officials thought there must be some mistake; that the death of General Reviere at the hotel was probably what the scribe was mistaken about. Such, however, was not the case, a visit to Crane's morgue by Chief Donovan and two reporters settling the question beyond any doubt. A high silk hat worn by the deceased had a scrap of paper pasted in the inside which contained a name, but so obliterated as to be not readable. The manufacturer's name and address surrounding the coat-of-arms of the State of Missouri read "S. E. corner of Second and Market streets, Grey & Guerdin." The deceased was a large, well-built man, apparently over 65 years of age. He looked like a well-to-do farmer or retired contractor. No money, papers, or valuables were found on his person. Three white linen handkerchiefs in an inner pocket of his coat seemed to be his only property. He has since been identified by his son-in-law as William A. Dean, of Belleville Avenue, Newark. An inquest will be held. Captain Busch, the proprietor of the caravansery where the sad catastrophe was enacted, and who is recognized as the largest, if not the largest hearted, man in Hoboken, remarked to the reporter, "Well, he might have gone to the Elysian Fields and killed himself, and saved us this trouble." The expression is used in connection with the fact that the unfortunate man caused neither expense or trouble to Mr. Busch beyond the unpleasant notoriety his act may attach to the hotel.

Board of Education.

A special meeting of the above board took place on Monday night, all the members being present.

Trustee Reed hoped that action on the requisition for supplies be deferred until the condition of the finances were ascertained. The matter was referred to the Committee on Supplies, with power.

Quackenbos' series of U. S. Histories were put on the list of text books.

Trustee Taugemann moved that \$15 per month be added to the salary of Principal Campbell for extra services in the high school. An amendment by President Hoffman, fixing the increase at \$10 per month, was lost, and the original motion carried.

A motion was made and carried that the

salary of Miss E. A. Allen, at present \$1,000, be increased to its former figure, viz.: \$1,200.

Trustee Reed moved that the salaries of Misses Ketcham and Barkelew be increased to \$50 a month each. Trustee Kerr moved an amendment that the salaries be fixed at \$45 each. The amendment was voted down, and the original motion carried.

On motion of Trustee Reed, the resolution adopted at last meeting, requiring teachers to reside in Hoboken, was repealed.

William Wise was appointed census taker for the first ward, Morgan Ivory for the third ward, and George Michel for the second ward.

The Clerk acknowledged the receipt of four drafts, of \$10 each, from State Superintendent Apgar, for schools Nos. 1, 2, and 3, and one of \$20 for No. 4. On motion, the money was referred to Library Committee, and ordered to be expended on books. The Board then adjourned.

Councilmanic Notes.

At its last meeting, the Council disposed of the business before it in a quick, thorough business-like manner, resulting as follows: A recommendation of the Committee on Laws, that plans and specifications for the new City Hall be advertised for, the Mayor's veto to the contrary notwithstanding, was adopted without the least ado. The Mayor, without assigning any legal reason for his action, vetoed two bills for printing done by the *Evening Journal*, amounting to \$70 and \$30 respectively. Michael McHale, was confirmed in the position of park keeper over the Mayor's veto. The nomination by the Mayor of John McGrane for the office of Commissioner of Assessments was laid over for a week, as was also the case of Alexander Myddleton, nominated by his Honor for Police Commissioner, for two weeks, by which time Mayor elect O'Neill will relieve Mr. Besson of all care and anxiety on that little matter. After referring several communications and petitions to the appropriate committees and transacting some routine business the Council adjourned.
