# ASSASSINATIONS.

# A Long List of Noted Acts of Assass

ination or Attempted Murder of Rulers of Nations.

The life of the head of a nation is one that is frequently beset by perils, as the subjoined list will show, and the pages bella Queen of Spain. of history are soiled by many a crimson stain, representing the blood of a ruler. The following are the most noted acts of assassination or attempted murders of rulers of nations which have taken place

since the days of Edward the Martyr: 961-Edward the Martyr, King of England, while mounted and ready to go on a hunt, was stabbed from behind by an unknown assassin and killed.

1271-Henry D'Allmaine, King of the Romans and Earl of Cornwallis, was foully assassinated in Italy by his cousins.

1327, September 21-Edward II. of England was killed in Berkeley Castle by Montravers and Gournay. 1399, October-Richard II. of England.

1582, March 18-William of Nassau Prince of Orange, was shot but not killed by Juan Jaureguay, in the Palace of St. Michael 1583, March-One Pietro Dordogono walking in Unter den Linden, in Ber-

1584, April-Hans Hanzoon tried to kill William Prince of Orange by putting gunpowder under his house in the city and underneath his seat in the church. 1584, July 10-A last and successful attempt was made on the life of William of Orange. He was shot at Delft by Balthazar Gerard, a fanatical Catholic. 1589, August-Henry III. of France, after having his brother, the Duke of Guise, assassinated, was killed by Jacques Clement, a Dominican friar.



Where it might prove advantageous to some, the property would be redeemed; where not, the city would continue the burden. It is the city's policy to get all she can from these arrearages. No charitable impulse should actuate us in the matter. It is pure busi-ness. If we cannot get all we hold against these different parcels, let us get as much as we can. Property released, by improvements, will en-hance the value of that remaining to us and in that way insure better settlements for the city. We should act just the same as an individual would – for our own best interests. Let us make it known most publicly that we are willing to settle or compromise on most equitable

Let us make it known most publicly that we are willing to settle or compromise on most equitable terms all outstanding claims, by reason of arrear-ages of taxes, assessments and water rents, and most cordially invite propositions to that end. Let us receive such propositions as may be presented. Where they be fair, accept them. But let them be direct propositions, specifying lots, so that we can go see them and then determine intelligently what we will do. The general rule project would be too much on the principle of "heads you win and tails I lose;" it would be too much against the city. These differences can only be settled by mutual agreement of the city and the respective lot owners.
