The city standard as used by the Inspector of Weights and Measures is correct and stamped so by the County Clerk. and under the law of 1881, which repeals that of 1872, it is the legal standard. When he finds scales or weights that do not conform to this standard it is his duty to prosecute the owner. The use of such weights and measures is punishable by fine, and the Recorder is bound to entertain complaints made upon the affidavit of the Inspector.
