It is due to them to say that the claim was not made out or presented by any one of them. That these men have been employed by some one assuming authority for the city, I do not doubt. How the claim comes in for so much larger amount and includes the name of one who has no claim, is yet to be accounted for. Why it should be ordered paid in view of these facts, is a mystery to me. The great trouble we labor under in regard to our street help is that we have too many assumed hosses. If we permitted the Street Commissioner to attend to the hiring and superintendence of the men, which are included in his duties, as laid down by our ordinances, it would be much better for all concerned. We would know then where to place the responsibility. As now conducted, there is no system whatever, and it is impossible to know who have claims or what they amount to.
