Nearly every great figure of history is a kind of great monstrosity. We know nothing about Washington. He is a steel engraving. No dirt of humanity clings to his roots. We will hear about Lincoln, who lived where men were free and equal, and was acquainted with people, not much with books. Every man is in some sort of a book. He lived the poem of the year in the fields, the woods, the blessed country. Lincoln had the advantage of sociability.
