How Combinations are Managed and Travel from Place to Place—Matters to be Considered in the Choice of a Route.

THE AGENTS AND THE PASTE BRIGADE.

Once again the circus performer is on the road and the sharp crack of the ring-master's whip is heard in all parts of the land. The dead walls and fences of every city, town and village are aglow with flaming posters, and the average rustic is laying plans for a grand family excursion to see the "show."

While everybody who can do so, pays at least one visit to the circus each year, but few consider the amount of business to be performed, the many little details to be attended to and the real hard work to be done in a circus while on the road.

"How are the employees of a circus divided?"

"They are arranged in gangs, each one having a foreman. In some departments there are several gangs with a "boss" foreman over all. The employees include besides the performers who appear in the ring, musicians, canvas men, arrival men, train men, property men, stable men, groomers, cooks, waiters, sleeping car porters, tent men, harness makers, repairers and barbers.

"How are farmers and other country residents attracted from a distance to the circuses?"

"An advance agent, who travels through the country in which it is intended to exhibit several weeks in advance of the show, makes special arrangements with the managers of the different railway lines running into the town or village in which the tents are to be pitched, and connecting with other lines of travel and for the running of special trains and special tickets, good for a trip to and from the circus with admission to all the attractions are presented and issued from all places within a distance of fifty miles.

"How are the rates of transportation arranged?" was asked.

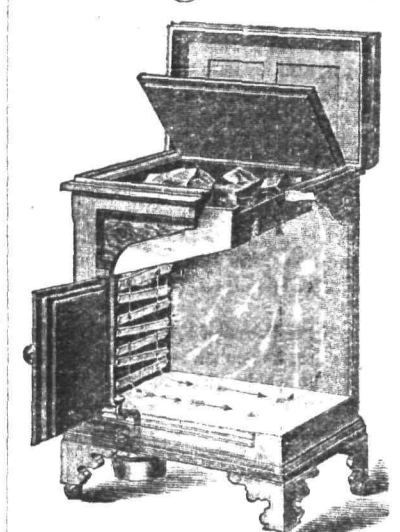

Special session of the Board of Education, held at School House No. 4 Monday evening, April 23, 1883. Present—Trustees Benson, Blackburn, Brown, Havens, Kerr, Reid, Ingleson, McCulloch and President Gritten.

Minutes of the session held April 18, 1883, were read and approved as printed. On motion of Trustee Benson the reading of the minutes of the session held March 26, 1883, was dispensed with and they were approved as printed.

A. Campbell, and his success as teacher of the high classes, before undertaking the additional duties of Principal of School No. 4, he shall be given the preference to choose his position, either as Teacher of the high classes, or Principal of School No. 4.
