## Unico To Hold Ceremony At Marconi Statue

Hoboken Chapter, Unico National, and City of Hoboken, will sponsor brief but impressive ceremonies to commemorate the 26th anniversary of the death of the great and immortal Senator Guglielmo Marconi, the father of the wireless who died in Rome Italy on July 20, 1937. He was born in Bologna on April 20, 1874.

The city of Hoboken, accepted and dedicated a Marconi statue two years ago which was placed in Church Square Park. John Minervini, an export and import merchant of Italian groceries and products donated the statue as a gift.

Hoboken Unico has resolved to keep the memory of this great man alive and has placed the assignment under former Magistrate Charles De Fazio, Jr. who has also represented Hoboken as Marconi coordinator. He will act as chairman at the ceremonies which are scheduled to be held at the statue on Monday, July 20 at 11 a.m.

Ceremonies will open with an invocation by Rev. Crispin Fuino, Pastor of St. Francis Church. Delegations and citizens will be welcomed by Mayor Grogan. John Carluccio, president of Unico, will place a wreath at the base of the statue and Judge Charles De Fazio will give an address on the life and works of Marconi.

This will be one of the Tercentenary events of the year long participation by the city and will also complement the arrival of the nuclear vessel, S. S. Savannah which will dock at American Export Landtsen Lines, Hoboken.

In making the announcement, chairman De Fazio said, "Hoboken Chapter, Unico National is proud of its project and program in perpetuating the name of the great Marconi. Without doubt, this man deserves a place in history as one of the most outstanding persons ever to walk on this earth.

## NO \$\$\$ FOR Teacher's Pay Hike; Pupils' Program

Hoboken schoolteachers' pay raise issued left two questions unresolved, the board of education revealed Tuesday night. First, whether the city council is legally or merely morally obligated to keep the commitment that the board made last year, and secondly, whether the existing situation in the school system may be called an emergency.

Little came of the closed session in the high school, spokesmen for both sides revealed. All refused comment. But the teachers, headed by John Ciriello, president of Hoboken Teachers' Assn., were hopeful of obtaining finally the \$50 increase in increments which was to have gone into effect July 1.

The board of education has maintained it cannot keep its commitment to the teachers because of a \$200,000 slash in the school budget ordered by the Edward J. Borrone majority bloc which took power in that city last councilmanic election.

Melvin W. Christie, vice president of the board of education, speaking on behalf of president John D. McAlevy, who was absent, was irate about certain summer projects for children which have been curtailed as a result of the budget slash.

Christie indicated, "Be here next week and you'll find some pretty angry parents publicly decry curtailment of these facilities." The board is scheduled to meet next Tuesday night.

Seen at the meeting, although they were unable to attend the

closed session, were Police Lt. and Mrs. Charles T. Smith, Mrs. Smith, a former employee of the city's recreation department, had instructed a girls' baton team. She was fired when the city council ordered sharp cuts in all

municipal departments. Lt. Smith is co-standard bearer of Smith and Weber Civic Assn., Hoboken. That unit is presently instructing both boys and girls in separate drum and bugle and bell and baton corps.

# EDITORIALS

## These Wars Are Over

At long last it looks as if something constructive may be done within the foreseeable future about those federal excise--or sales--taxes that are a hangover from World War II and the Korean War.

A House committee has been studying them with a view to ultimate revision. It is expected that reductions--if not total repeal--will come within two years or less.

If this turns out to be the case, the government will be just about 20 years late in getting around to this particular kind of tax reform. When the excise taxes were imposed, everyone expected that they would be ended with the wars that were responsible for them. But Congress took the easy road and kept them alive year after year.

The taxes are often called luxury levies. But that, to most minds, is a misnomer. The toilet articles used universally by women hardly fall into the luxury class in our kind of society. Nor do handbags, wallets or wedding rings, all of which are subject to the tax. Nor does a coat with a little fur trim which is another tax-soaked item.

This emphasizes an often overlooked fact--that we need to pay close attention to taxes other than the income tax. And we need to pay special attention to taxes which are imposed, supposedly, for the duration of a real emergency and then are continued long after that emergency has passed into history. This is the status of the federal retail excise taxes.

## Keep The Scythe Sharp

If one wants a reason to justify a vacation, some remarks by Paul J. Cupp, president, Acme Markets, Inc., more than fill the bill.

Mr. Cupp pictures vacationing such as too few persons remember. It wasn't just a matter of killing time but included useful and healthful work as well as recreation. He says:

"It is good to realize the value of re-creation and its meaning to our health, happiness and work satisfactions.

"As a schoolboy, I recall the summers spent on the farm of relatives, the cutting of hay and the harvesting of oats and wheat. While the work was not easy, it was a change, and for a city boy, quite an experience. There were no tractors--it was horsepower and manpower, literally. I learned to swing a scythe and to use a pitchfork, and while the body was tired at the end of the day, both body and mind were being re-created.

"The value of recreation is now universally recognized. It can sharpen the mind, just as whetting sharpens the scythe. We cannot spend too much time in recreation, else our work suffers. Likewise, too little recreation, and we do our work as with a dull scythe."

## How To Kill Growth

U. S. News & World Report recently listed the profits of a large number of industrial corporations for the first quarter of 1964 and the equivalent period last year. In all but a few cases they have increased.

But there is more to this than meets the passing eye. It is true that profits are on the rise and are higher than ever if number of dollars is used as the measure. But the fact is that profits as compared with the total economy--wages, total output, salaries, total personal income, national income--are lagging.

In 1929 profits amounted to 9.5 per cent of the national income--the figure now is around 6 per cent. And last year, the profits retained to pay for improvements and other business needs came to only 2 per cent of national income--a dangerously low level. For improvements are the means by which this country maintains its position in an intensely competitive world--to say nothing of their salutary influence on employment and living standards.

So--the mere dollar figures can be highly misleading. The profit situation, viewed purely from the point of view of the national welfare, is not as healthy as many believe. The head of one company, quoted by U. S. News, puts the problem this way: "Limit profit, and you limit growth. Kill it, and you kill growth."

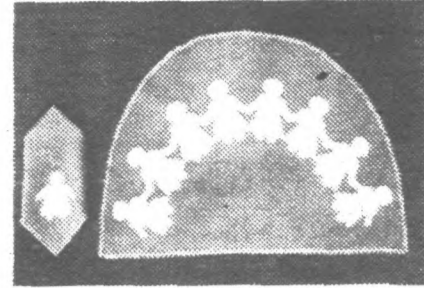

## JOURNEY TO THE STARS

The space age has created a great demand for young engineers, scientists, and technicians. Not just in the field of space flight, but in all the branches of science and technology. A young person interested in any of these fields can look forward to a well paying job, excellent conditions and security. The key to this good job is a good education.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration is well aware of this and has been giving great aid to our schools. Continuing this fine program, NASA will participate in about 200 one to three-week aero-space workshops and teacher institutes at colleges and universities in every state but Hawaii and Wyoming this summer.

The educational workshops are being held for the fourth summer in a row at the request of colleges, universities and state departments of education. In 1961, 125 schools took part in the program.

NASA participation is at no cost to the U. S. government, other than staff made up of NASA educational program personnel and spacemobile lecturers-demonstrators.

The workshops introduce elementary and secondary school teachers to aero-space science advances and relate the advances to education.

NASA Spacemobiles (panel trucks containing space technology models and demonstration equipment) films, exhibits and lectures are used to acquaint teachers with the latest space activities.

The courses are credit or non-credit depending on the institu-

tion involved.

NASA has more requests for participation than its staff can handle. However, NASA education officials believe the program has assisted materially in keeping teachers abreast of general advances in the space related sciences and has aided them to teach children who may become space scientists.

NASA has also extended its aid to industry by creating a Technology Utilization department. In this way, new developments and new products are made available to industry and to the public.

Another NASA activity is its assistance given to many science organizations such as reading materials, films and slides. All this activity though intended to build up our capability for the exploration of space will also help to make life much more comfortable right here on earth.

Among the local organizations which have received assistance from NASA is the Junior Astronautical Society. The JAS has received a wide variety of space literature. Much of this has been used at the JAS meetings where the latest developments in space flight are discussed.

The Junior Astronautical Society is also negotiating to have the NASA Spacemobile give a lecture-demonstration sometime in the Fall. The Spacemobile has a very heavy schedule so the date for the lecture has not been set.

When the time and place have been determined, announcements will be made. The public will be welcome to attend. I have seen the Spacemobile lecture and demonstration and I can recommend this as a great source of entertainment and knowledge. Don't miss it.



### FUND LACK HOLDS UP PROGRAM

New Jersey's work-and-learn program for girls who are high school dropouts is temporarily sidetracked for lack of money. Classes were scheduled to start Monday with 30 girls from the Trenton-Princeton area enrolled in a pilot 40-week program designed to combine education and work experience.

The funds were to be obtained under the federal Manpower Development Training Act. But there are several methods of making application. The course had not started on time due to a mixup in the application for funds.

# LABOR LOG . . .

By Bernard Lasky

On the question of proportionate representation for the people of New Jersey, Local 284, Laundry Workers' Union and Local 300 of the Boxmakers' Union started the legal action which, undoubtedly, will result in a major change in both houses of the New Jersey Legislature.

Winfield Chasmar Sr., capable leader and guiding genius for both unions, pointed out that "many will try to climb on the bandwagon to bask in the spotlight of the victory for equal representation and legislation designed by representatives of all the people rather than rule by open spaces of land."

According to Chasmar, "Local 284 and Local 300 are progressive unions and the lawsuit started by these groups for proportionate representation is but one of the many civic activities engaged in for the benefit of the membership."

More important than all this, though, is the fact that Winfield Chasmar, Sr., has the foresight to keep the unions active in community affairs. It is necessary for unions to have successful labor-management agreements to be alert to legislation which will affect their status as workers. Chasmar has the verve and intelligence to realize the value of such action for the good and welfare of the entire membership. His leadership is exemplary. Others would do well to engage in similar action to unite the forces of organized labor to insure against further infringement through legislation a-

gainst the rights of workers. Whether the unions like it or not, the time has come when they must enter politics completely and without reservations. They--the unions--have the strength of numbers. What the unions need is more and more political education.

Chasmar actually recommended the action to the unions involved in which Chris Jackman, secretary of local 300 and Winfield Chasmar, Jr., organizer for Local 284 petitioned the courts through counsellor David Friedland for the people of New Jersey to have equal representation.

However, Chasmar Sr. very modestly shadows his role in this most important case by giving credit to the rank and file membership for the germinal idea to bring equality to the voters of New Jersey.

Yet, it is a well known fact, especially in union circles, that Chasmar Sr. is an aggressive leader whose progressive ideas have sometimes resulted in criticism but, nonetheless, have been emulated by other unions not only throughout the state but also across the nation and in Canada as well.

Indeed, it takes courage--and at times it must be very discouraging--to take up the cudgels for the workers--all workers regardless whether they are affiliated with unions or not. Chasmar Sr. is this type of labor leader. He seeks the ultimate good for working men and women. He is alert to what is going

on not only in the community but in the state and nation as well.

Often maligned but never lacking in spirit, Chasmar Sr. objectively considers all the problems that confront organized labor without regard to personal aggrandizement. He seeks to better conditions in the field of labor for those who toil for a livelihood to bring the decent and respectable life to them and their families. He believes in the American Way of Life and has been engaged in the fight against poverty long before President Johnson thought it up as a good thing for the nation.

## New Center Begun For M.S. Group

The Multiple Sclerosis Service Organization of New Jersey held groundbreaking ceremonies on Sunday for the new rehabilitation center at the present 31-bed nursing home in Chester. This wing will be finished by November 30 at a cost of \$60,000. The therapeutic equipment will cost \$12,000. The architect is Carl Kemm Loven of Glen Rock and the contractor Melvin P. Winsor, Inc. of Springfield. The rehabilitation center comprises 3 rooms; physical therapy, occupational therapy and recreational therapy.

Paul F. Petruska, president of the organization announced that the nursing home will begin a rehabilitation program specifically designed for multiple sclerosis patients. Over 1300 square feet have been devoted to a fully equipped physical therapy department consisting of electrother-

apy, hydro therapy, therapeutic exercise and self care activities of daily living. The physical therapy department will be supervised by a registered physical therapist.

The people taking part in the groundbreaking were as follows: Mr. L.A. McDowell, past president along with his wife, Helen who has helped him for over twelve years in the organization. They are from Ridgewood, N.J. Mr. Thomas Blain, First Vice President of Boonton, The Honorable William Conover, Mayor of Chester, Paul F. Petruska, President of Clifton, Frank Giannattasio, Administrator of the Nursing Home, of Paterson, Mrs. Margaret Lewis, Pioneer of MS SO Fund Raisers, Card Party Chairman, of Arlington, and Mrs. Mary Dahl, Campaign Director, representing the charitable people of New Jersey, of Verona.

Commendation was given to the people of New Jersey for their generous contributions that made this beautiful MS Nursing Home possible. The money is solicited by local volunteers throughout the state in town campaigns and al-

so through the United Funds. All money given to MSSO of New Jersey stays in New Jersey to aid New Jersey residents.
