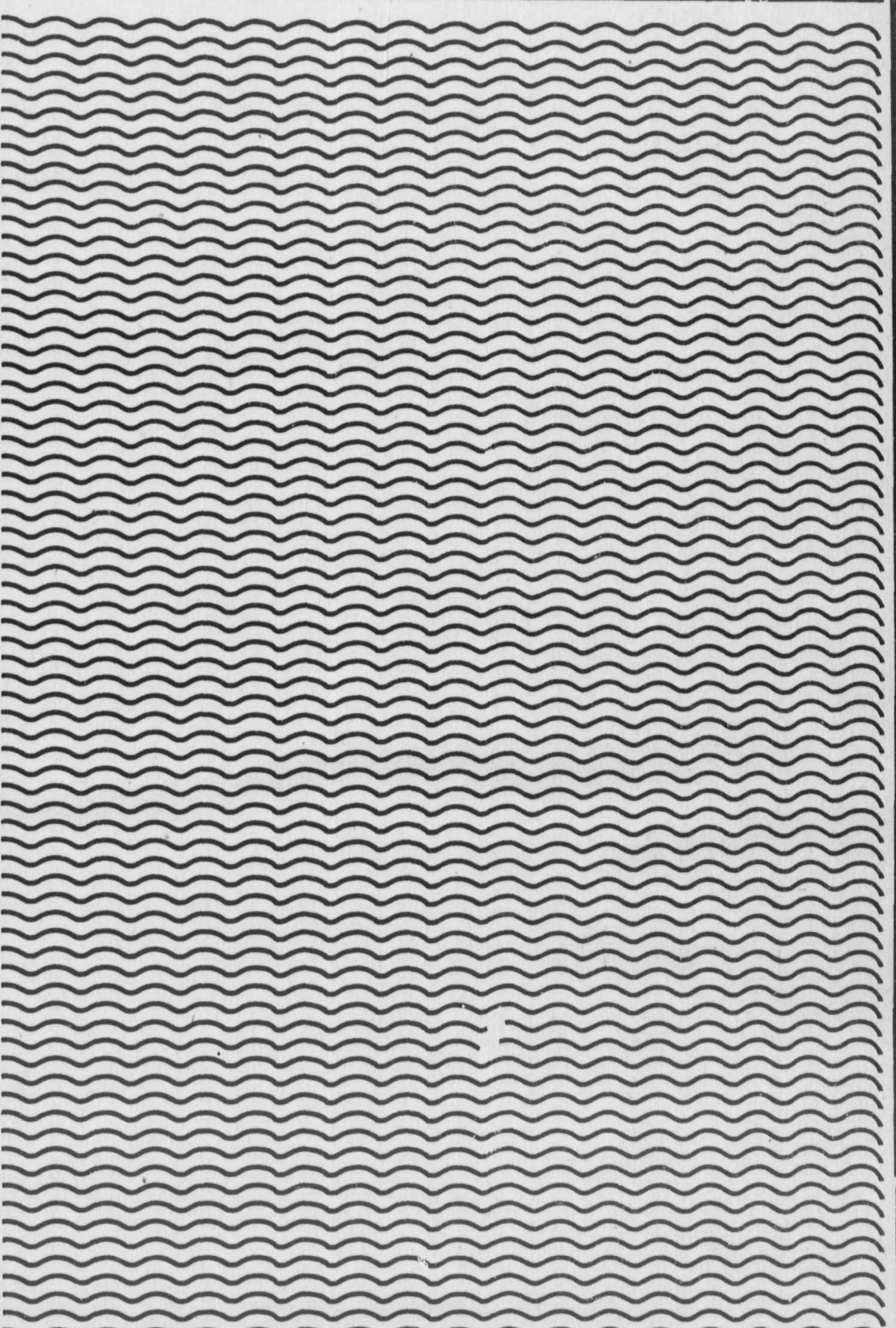

**WILLIAM P. VERDON.**

WILLIAM P. VERDON was born in Dublin, Ireland, September 12, 1869. He came to the United States when a young child with his parents and was educated in the public schools of New York. His elder brother, Frederick A. Verdon, operated a large machine shop in Hoboken, and there William learned the machinist's trade. He followed this until he was 26 years old, when he went into the liquor business at Fourteenth and Hudson streets. His conduct of this business was so unusual in those days it became almost a tradition. No woman and no dice or other gambling devices were ever permitted within its doors. In 1908 he became head of the Eastern Creamery Company, and is now president of the Verdon Trucking Company. He first became active in politics in 1901, when Frederick A. Verdon ran for Mayor of Hoboken. His untiring and hard-hitting fights in the interests of the public and against the Griffin machine are familiar to nearly every man and woman in the city. He has come up smiling after disappointments that would unnerve a man of ordinary mettle. There is no higher recommendation for him than the character of the enemies he has made. Mr. Verdon lives at 1244 Bloomfield street with his wife and their eight children. His oldest son, Fred, is a sailor on the U. S. S. Grant, now in European waters.



**WILLIAM O'NEILL.**

WILLIAM O'NEILL was born in Athlone, Ireland, September 14, 1879. His parents landed in Hoboken with him when he was two months old. He attended the public and parochial school of this city, but found himself, while still a mere boy, confronted with the necessity of making his own living. He set about it with a pluck and courage that have distinguished all his later life. He began by selling newspapers at the Lackawanna ferry. By industry and thrift young O'Neill made rapid strides and so equipped himself in knowledge of the business that he is now the head of a concern that handles the circulation of all the New York and some local newspapers throughout Hoboken, North Hudson and adjacent sections. He will always be "Billy" O'Neill to the newsboys of the city, everyone of whom eats a Christmas dinner provided by Mr. O'Neill each year. His business experience and acumen should prove invaluable in the position of Commissioner. Mr. O'Neill resides with his family at 1135 Bloomfield street.



**JOHN F. GARDNER.**

JOHN F. GARDNER was born in New York City January 26, 1872. He received his education in the public schools. His first employment was as an express helper and he later became a driver for the National Express Company. Ten years of this fitted him to take the position of foreman for the New Jersey Transfer Company, a place he held eleven years. With small capital, but with unbounded energy and a level brain, he embarked in a small way in business on his own account. The venture was a success and Mr. Gardner is now president of the Gardner Transfer Company and Hudson Stores, Inc., a thriving concern. He has long been admitted to be one of the most popular men in Hoboken, a fact attested by his remarkable run for mayor in 1913, when he was defeated by the slim margin of 130 votes, though all the strength of a powerful organization and of the then mayor, whom he opposed, was thrown against him. His candidacy, however, had a most salutary effect for the disclosures he made during his campaign of the moral conditions in the city compelled a thorough cleanup of the dives that then flourished. His denunciation of the laxity of milk inspection by the Board of Health served to end the practice of dealers in dumping refuse milk, barred from New York, into Hoboken to feed babies here. Mr. Gardner and his family live at 834 Hudson street.



**GEORGE H. STEIL.**

GEORGE H. STEIL, for two years a School Commissioner; ten years a Councilman, and four years Mayor of Hoboken, was born in this city March 29, 1861. His record as a consistent and fighting champion of the plain people constitutes a thrilling and edifying chapter in Hoboken's history. He would never bow to the machine that just began to rear its head when he was first elected Mayor. His fight against the disposal of private interests of Hoboken's last 100 feet of waterfront was one of his most notable efforts. The city's existing school system is largely the result of Mr. Steil's planning and farsighted vision when he was Mayor. The city firemen remember him with gratitude for having obtained for them added days of rest. It is also worthy of note at this particular time that Mayor Steil had plans formulated for a complete pumping and sewage system which was to have cost only \$300,000. The end of his term prevented its having been undertaken, unfortunately for the taxpayers and rentpayers, who are now footing the bill for the \$2,000,000 sewer. Mr. Steil inaugurated the playground system in Hoboken, appointing the city's first Playground Commission, and was responsible for the installation of the bath at the County Park. His experience and training should serve the city in good stead now. Mr. Steil and his family reside at 200 Eleventh street.



**MAX MILLER.**

MAX MILLER was born in Hoboken October 6, 1887. He attended the Hoboken public schools, New York University School of Accounts and New York University School of Law. His first ambition to become a lawyer was given up for a business career and he has proved himself a singularly apt and successful businessman, albeit one whose integrity and square dealing are universally conceded. Being heavily interested in real estate in Hoboken, Mr. Miller took a natural interest in the welfare of his city, and his interest did not extend far till he came to the conclusion that there was something radically wrong with the way Hoboken's affairs were administered. His election to the Council from the Fifth Ward some years ago afforded him the chance he sought to remedy conditions. Although he was in the minority in the board, his aggressiveness and the logic of his arguments against some of the more crying evils worked a number of genuine reforms. Council meetings were never without their thrill when Mr. Miller was in the body. He kept the Griffin majority "stepping sideways" with his attacks on their mismanagement. His experience as a business man and as a municipal official fit him particularly to fill the post of City Commissioner. Mr. Miller resides with his wife and children at 1226 Bloomfield street.

## THE DATE OF HOBOKEN'S COMMISSION ELECTION

Editor Hudson Observer:

Dear Sir—In a recent edition of your valuable paper there appeared a letter of considerable length, signed A. Olsen, in which he ably stated the law concerning Commission Government elections. From his interpretations and deductions, which to say the least are plausible, it would appear that the next Commission Government election in Hoboken should be held, not as Mr. Fallon maintains, in May, 1918, but rather, as Mr. Olsen insists, in May, 1919.

It was while discussing the question among a gathering of business men that, after much deliberation, pro and con, I was requested to solicit your assistance in arriving at a true interpretation of the law. Undoubtedly Mr. Fallon's interpretation demands attention, as he is generally considered an authority on municipal law, but since in his statement he not only neglected to cite the law, but also failed to advance any argument to substantiate his contention, it is difficult to give full credence to his decision.

That your paper is absolutely independent is evident from your many editorials which clearly indicate that mere political affiliation does not deter you from stating your unbiased opinion. This is a great praise-worthy when one considers that the Hudson Observer is and for some time past has been conceded the official organ in the city. In fact, to say that it is the only paper that bears such influence on public opinion would be to state the truth mildly. It would not then appear too presumptuous on our part to request that you publish the law in an official manner and append your interpretation accordingly.

By so doing you will oblige a number of citizens who await your decision with eagerness that bears no precedent.

By their acts to-day they are prostituting not only themselves but every citizen who voted for them.

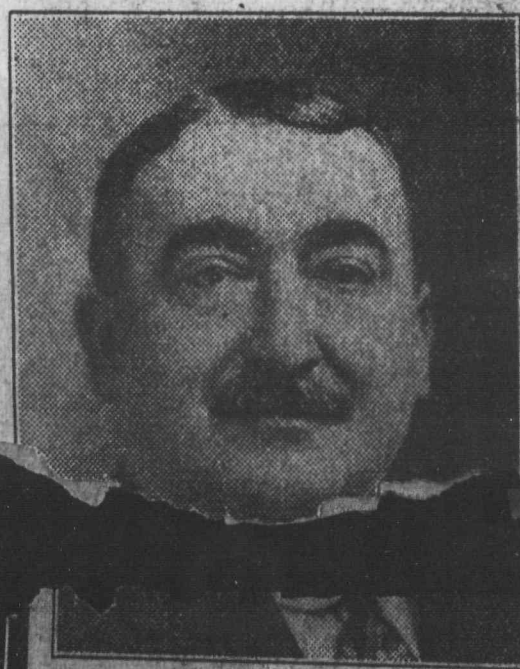

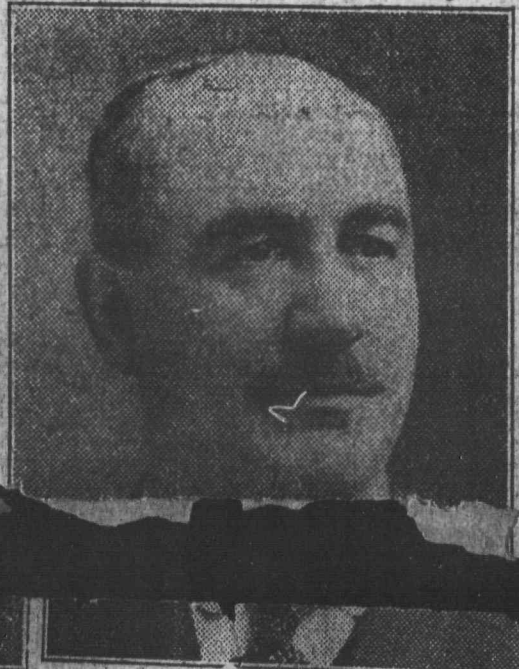

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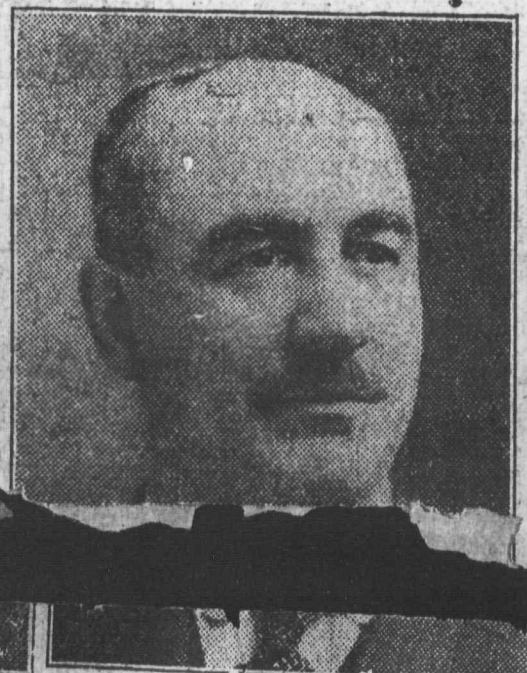
