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He was among a bunch of draftees who left the city last April for Camp Dix. He has been in America about seven years, coming from Italy, where his parents still live. He is 28 years old and lived with a married sister, Mrs. Rose Catrovillari. She received a letter from him a short time ago, in which he said he was still confined to a base hospital.

Sergeant Walter E. Rapp, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sherman Rapp, of 343 Bergen avenue, Jersey City, wounded about October 16, is a member of the old Jersey City Battalion of the Signal Corps. A later letter from the young soldier told his parents that he had been gassed, though the War Department's official notification said he received machine gun bullet wounds. He enlisted in the old Fourth Regiment in 1917, but was transferred to the Signal Corps while training at Camp McClellan. In France he saw service with Company C, of the 104th Field Signal Battalion. He was born in Jersey City 26 years ago; is unmarried, and at the time of entering service was an electrician with the Erie Railroad.

Sergeant Harry I. Sperling, gassed in action on November 2, arrived home to his young wife a few days ago before the receipt of the War Department's official notification of his being wounded. Since he entered the service as one of a batch of selectees, who left the city for Camp Dix in February last year, his family removed from 74 Jordon avenue to 67 Tuers avenue. Sergeant Sperling is now at Camp Merrit, anxiously waiting orders to move to Camp Dix for final discharge. He belonged to Company H, of the 310th Infantry; is a native of the city, having received his rudimentary education in Public School No. 32, in the Horseshoe section. Before he entered the army he was a shoe salesman. He is 24 years old.

Corporal Walter Van Wart, of 66 Astor Place, Jersey City, wounded in the foot by flying shrapnel on October 20, notified his parents of the fact before the War Department sent word. He enlisted with the old Jersey City Battalion of the Signal Corps when he was 18 years old. He served "over there" with Company C, of the 104th Field Signal Battalion, and had many narrow escapes from death at the hands of the Boche. He is now home and was mustered out of service over a week ago.

John Daley, of 62 Tuers avenue, Jersey City, reported wounded on today's list, may have also been wounded in September, said his sister, Mrs. Moore, with whom he lived. His name appeared on a casualty list about that time she said, though she has had no further information from the War Department, telling of a second wound. She has also heard from him lately, and he failed to mention anything of the reported second wounding. Mrs. Moore believes some mistake has taken place.

The relatives of Private Jacob Anuskiewicz, reported as wounded, have long since moved from 48 York street, Jersey City, and efforts to locate them were in vain.

Joseph Honegger, the West Hoboken soldier, of 312 Angelique street, reported wounded on today's list, has fully recovered from a slight gassing he received while in action on November 2. According to recent letters he is back with his regiment in the 78th Division, and is feeling no ill effects from his experience. Honegger is a veteran of the navy and saw service in the Vera

Cruz trouble and also in the Haiti insurrection. He was honorably discharged from the navy only a short time before he was drafted into the army. He is 28 years old, and is a lifelong resident of West Hoboken, where he attended the public schools.

The continued errors in the listing of soldiers on the casualty lists was again shown to-day when two of the five West Hoboken wounded men were listed incorrectly as to addresses. The two were Carlo J. Gerlati, listed as living at 146 Central avenue, and Michael Zelante, home address, 174 Summit avenue. There is no such number as 146 Central avenue, and inquiry in the neighborhood failed to locate the soldier's home. At 174 Summit avenue there was none of the tenants who ever heard of a party named Zelante living in the house. Inquiry failed to disclose any family in the neighborhood of that name.

At the home of Frank Vanore, 607 Paterson avenue, there was no answer to the reporter's efforts to interview the family. Neighbors stated that Vanore's lived at the address.

Nicholas Barcy, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Barcy, of 174 Summit

avenue, was slightly gassed early in October, but has since recovered and is now with the Third Division, "somewhere in Germany." He was among the first drafted men from West Hoboken, and when he went into the army was detailed to the 38th Regular Infantry. He has been overseas since March, 1918. He is 23 years old, and is well known in the downtown section where he lived since a boy. He is a graduate of P. S. No. 2.

Mrs. B. Oulton, of 1 East Nineteenth street, Weehawken, has not received any mail from her son, Private Leo M. Oulton, who is listed to-day as wounded (degree undetermined) in six months. The last letter Mrs. Oulton received from her boy was dated September 23, and according to an official notification from the War Department, young Oulton was wounded by shell fire October 14. However, Mrs. Oulton is consoled by the fact that none of the letters she has written since have been returned to her, leading her to believe that her son is with the Army of Occupation in Germany, and that his mail is being held up. Young Oulton, who is a member of Company L, 61st Infantry, was drafted in September, 1917, and went overseas in April, 1918. Another Weehawken boy, just back from the front, has told Mrs. Oulton how her boy miraculously escaped death. Private Oulton was in a dugout with five other soldiers, this man relates, when a bomb fell in the hole. The five boys were killed instantly, the boy tells, but Private Oulton escaped without a scratch. Oulton is 22 years of age. He is a member of the popular Gilt Edge Social Club, of the First Ward, Weehawken. Before he was drafted he was employed at the Tietjen & Lang dry-docks.

Corporal William G. Forster, of 171 Bergenline avenue, Union Hill, whose name appears on to-day's casualty list as severely wounded in action, is at home on a fifteen-day furlough. Upon the expiration of his furlough Corporal Forster will return to General Hospital No. 9, Lakewood, where he is invalided. Forster was wounded in the face and shoulder by shrapnel October 18. He was with Company B, 310th Infantry. He was a member of the old Germania Club, of Union Hill.

There is no complaint from Louis A. Smart, an enlisted man, in his letters to his sister, Mrs. Anna Wright, of 300 Twelfth street, West New York, nor to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Delbert Smart, of Troy, N. Y., because he must continue for an indefinite period "over there." Although wounded and gassed he has refrained from telling them much about his experiences and his sister could not even tell where he is, except that he is with the 82d Division, Company F, 327th Infantry. He is an only son and the family would like to see him back, but his letters all say that he is enjoying army life. He went across in September, 1917.

Corporal Fred R. Bruckman, Company L, 312th Infantry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Bruckman, of 618 Jefferson street, West New York, was among the early batch of boys from that town to join the colors in the draft. He is back with his outfit after seven weeks in the hospital from gas, and is patiently waiting for the word for the 78th Division to start for the States. His latest letter said that he is at Sedan.

Private Joseph Collo, of 530 Monroe street, Hoboken, reported in today's casualty list, was gassed and wounded in the Argonne, October 17, according to word received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Nicholas Collo. He is 22 years old and a member of the 113th Infantry, formerly the Fourth Regiment. Collo served for several years in Company K, of the Fourth. He re-enlisted at the outbreak of the war and went to Anniston with the local regiment, going overseas last June.

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AMATEUR ACTOR OF NOTE DIES ABROAD

After coming out of several big battles unscathed, Chester D. Cary, son of Mrs. Bertha Cary, of 9 Reed street, Jersey City, succumbed an attack of lobar pneumonia following influenza, on February 1, having died in Camp Hospital No. 59, at Issundun Indre, France, where he was quartered since October 15. Fighting in water filled trenches, he wrote home, weakened his condition so that he contracted a case of the "flu." He saw service in some of the big battles in the St. Mihiel sector, and later in the Argonne Forest, as a member of Company H, of the 311th Infantry.

He entered the service last April and reached France within the subsequent month. He was 27 years old and unmarried. He was well known in Jersey City for his amateur dramatic ability, having taken part and coached a number of church theatrical productions in various parts of the city. Even when he reached England after sailing from America, he sang at a big benefit in Liverpool and his bass voice netted something like sixty pounds for the wounded soldiers. After in France he coached several minstrel shows, and even while a patient at the camp hospital directed the production of other benefit shows.

William G. McKinley, 53 Lexington avenue, Jersey City, whose name appears among to-day's wounded, himself an Elk, is the son of William McKinley, treasurer of the Elks' building fund committee. According to the War Department's official notification, the young lad was gassed on November 4, just a week before hostilities ceased.

He is 25 years old to-day, and at the time he was gassed was a sergeant in Company C, of the 104th Field Signal Battalion, the old Jersey City Signal Corps. He joined that unit immediately after America's declaration of war on Germany in April, 1917. Since he was wounded he has been promoted to the rank of master signal electrician.

John Rossell, 251 Boyd avenue, is also listed as wounded. Nobody was at home at that address, and details concerning the soldier could not be obtained.

Harold Jonathan, 32 years old, of 221 Myrtle avenue, Jersey City, was drafted last May while residing in New York City. He was sent to Camp Upton and assigned to Com-

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pany A, 315th Infantry, leaving for overseas September 28. He was wounded in the right leg in the Argonne Forest in October, but has since recovered and has returned to his regiment. According to his relatives he is little the worse for his experiences and his only worry is how long it will be before he will see Miss Liberty in New York harbor.

Anthony Kiuch, of 146 Steuben street, reported missing some time ago, and recently returned to duty. was 23 years old, and was drafted last April. Later he went to Camp Dix and from there overseas in May. He was a member of the 311th Infantry.

William O'Connor, 22, of 293 Eighth street, Jersey City, was one of the Horseshoe boys who went overseas from Camp McClellan with the old Fourth. He was well known in the 'Shoe and was a member of St. Michael's Church. He was wounded in the Argonne drive.

Private Michael J. Ushan, of Company K, 319th Infantry (formerly of Company M, 309th Infantry), reported wounded, is well again and on duty with his company. He is 23 years old, a former pupil of School No. 8, Jersey City, and in civil life a railroad man. His home is at 124 Herman avenue, Jersey City Heights. A letter from him appeared in these columns about two weeks ago.

Private Nicholas Bambrick, of Company L, 113th Infantry, was wounded in the leg in October, but has since recovered. He joined the old Fourth Regiment nearly three years ago and saw service on the Mexican border. His parents are dead. The young soldier was living at 107 Bowers street, Jersey City Heights, and was employed in the Davey oakum factory when war was declared in April, 1917, and the fourth man called out. His stepbrother, Walter Jordan, lives at 43 Beacon avenue.

Private John J. Spearman, of Company E, 60th Infantry (formerly of Company C, 49th Infantry), was shot in the face last October, and at first was reported missing. He has recovered and is now with his regiment in Luxemburg. As related in these columns several weeks ago, Private Spearman lives at 33 Concord street, Jersey City Heights, when he entered the army.

Private Charles J. McDermott, of Company I, 309th Infantry, was wounded by shrapnel in the left arm and was still in hospital in France at last reports. He is 24; a native of Ireland, and was employed in a cafe when called in the draft last spring. He is the brother of Mrs. Mary Browne, of 115 Magnolia avenue, Jersey City Heights, and Thomas and Patrick McDermott, cafe proprietors, of Washintgon street, Jersey City. His mother is in Ireland.

On to-day's list of wounded are Horace C. W. Shaw, of 220 Bergenline avenue, Union Hill, and James A. Quinlan, of 502 Van Vorst Place. No relatives or acquaintances of either man could be found at the addresses given.

Harry Gombo, of 4976 Hudson Boulevard, West New York, who was wounded, was one of the boys from sunny Italy, was inspired with the American spirit and had 100 per cent. of it when America entered the war. He had been but two years in the country and was then only 19 years of age. His parents are still in Italy, but Mr. and Mrs. Al. Sica, of the above address, were as father

and mother to him while he was in this country. He has been fifteen months on the other side. The last heard of him he was with the 111th Machine Gun Battalion. His last letter, dated in October, stated that he was about to go into action again and that he had just finished up his payments on a \$100 Liberty Bond

and was going to send the receipt to Mr. and Mrs. Sica and wanted them to send it on to his mother. They have not received the receipt as yet, although they have tried to get in communication with him. They heard nothing until the other day when word came that he had been wounded in battle on Columbus Day, October 12.

The casualty list to-day contains the name of another old Fourth Regiment boy who was wounded during the Argonne Forest fighting in October. He is Private Louis Pompiliano, formerly a member of Company M, and now in the 113th Infantry, which absorbed the Hudson County unit when the Fourth was federalized in April, 1917. Pompiliano, who lives at 609 Monroe street, Hoboken, with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Pompiliano, is 23 years old and, prior to his enlistment in April, 1917, was a shipping clerk employed by the cravenette company. He was hit in the shoulder by shrapnel on October 11, but has written his parents that he is now all right. Pompiliano is a graduate of No. 8 School and of the Eagan Schools.

Listed in to-day's casualties is Cataldo Terminello, of 128 Willow avenue, Hoboken. Neighbors stated that the family had left that address some months ago. Cataldo went overseas early last year and letters to friends stated he had been wounded but not severely; that he was in hospital and expected soon to be back in action.

Also on to-day's list is Martin M. Donohue, of 324 Adams street, Hoboken. His sister stated that she was notified by the War Department that he had been wounded slightly but that she had not heard from him since last August. He went overseas last June after a period of training at Camp Dix.

Private Anthony Mele, reported as wounded on yesterday's list, lived with his parents at 25 Brunswick street, Jersey City. Later, the family moved to Warren street. The wounded soldier was drafted in April and went overseas in May. He was 23 years old and was a member of the 309th Infantry.

Private Joseph A. Stulb, also listed as wounded, lived at 248 York street, Jersey City. He also was a member of the 309th Infantry. He was wounded in the closing days of the war.

Private Michael O'Donnell, of 279 Twelfth street, Jersey City, was wounded in the Argonne Forest in October.

Private Walter A. Smith, of 64 Mercer street, Jersey City, reported as gassed, was the son of Mrs. Delia Smith, matron at the Hudson County Penitentiary. He was gassed in the Argonne Forest on October 16. He belonged to Company I of the 309th Infantry. He was drafted in April, was sent to Camp Dix, and in May went to France. He was 30 years old and was a member of St. Peter's parish.

HOBOKEN BOY DEAD AT CAMP IN FRANCE

The War Department yesterday notified Mrs. E. Satzger, of 82 Bloomfield street, Hoboken, that her son, Corporal Edward Satzger, a well-known Hoboken boy, died of bronchial-pneumonia in France on Feb-

ruary 17. Young Satzger was attached to the 303d Motor Supply Train, Company E. He was drafted last February and left for France in May with the 78th Division. In his last letter, written a few weeks ago, he declared that he had come safely out of many hot battles and was in the best of health.

Private Vincenzo Russo, reported in to-day's list of casualties, returned to his home, 604 Adams street, Hoboken, January 21, aboard the transport De Kalb. He is 25 years old, was a member of the 148th Infantry, and was wounded in the left foot on November 2 by shrapnel. Drafted in February, 1918, he was assigned at Camp Dix to the 309th Field Artillery, was later transferred to the 309th Ammunition Train, and then was sent to Camp Lee, Va., to join the 148th Infantry, going overseas last summer.

Private Walter J. Ihne, who returned from France several weeks ago is now at Camp Dix undergoing medical examinations to ascertain if he is sufficiently recovered from the effects of the gassing he received on October 31. Should he be pronounced in fit condition he will be honorably discharged from service. He belonged to Company D, of the 102d Machine Gun Battalion, and has been in service for over a year. He fought on the French front for six months and, besides the gassing, was wounded by flying shrapnel. His voice is still considerably affected and for four days after the gassing he was totally blind.

Private Ihne belongs to Jersey City Lodge No. 211, B. P. O. E., and Admiral Farragut Council No. 162, Jr. O. U. A. M. He played basketball with several prominent teams, such as the Palace Five, Palace Midgets and Diamond Five, and was a bowler, being a member of the Alley Owners' League. His brother, Robert, is still in service with a medical corps in Boston.

Corporal Patrick Joseph Kane, of 134 Thirtieth street, Bayonne, listed in to-day's casualty list as died of wounds, belonged to Company H of the 38th Infantry. February 1 his mother received a telegram from the War Department in Washington, stating that her son had been killed in action. Later, Mrs. Kane received a letter from the son, dated February 2, saying that he expected to sail for home within fifteen days. He was shot in the back in one of the battles and was in a hospital for three months. He was 24 years old. Mrs. Kane does not understand the situation and has wired to Washington to straighten out the tangle.

James Calzaretta, of 711 Newark avenue, Jersey City, and Joseph R. Kennedy, of 33 Spruce street are in to-day's list of wounded. Stories concerning both have already appeared in the Hudson Observer.

Joseph G. F. Mayer, of 200 Cambridge avenue, another wounded man from the Heights, is a brother of Henry Mayer, reported some time ago as gassed while a member of the Sixth Infantry. A third brother, Fred, has just been discharged from the Coast Artillery. Joseph, who is 23 years old and a graduate of Public School No. 28, was gassed and also suffered an attack of influenza. He enlisted in the old Fourth Regiment and was merged with it into the 113th U. S. Infantry.

Henry Urban, of 71 Western avenue, Jersey City, a member of Company M 309th Infantry is now convalescent in France from a shrapnel wound in the left shoulder. He is 25 years old and a machinist by trade.

James Cappicille, 4405 Hudson Boulevard, Union Hill, was putting his 19-year-old son, Lawrence, through a series of army drills in the parlor of their home one evening last June. "You'll never make a soldier," the father told his son, after many attempts to teach the youth the rudiments of the army manual. That evening was the last time Mr. Cappicille saw his son, who is now with the 313th Infantry at Hargeville, France, for the following day he enlisted with the United States Artillery at Fort Slocum. The father went to visit his boy there, but when he arrived he found that the youth had been sent to Camp Jackson, in South Carolina. Mr. Cappicille wrote several letters to his son, Lawrence, at that place, which he received and answered. Not since that time has the boy received any word from his parents or relatives and during that time his father and other relatives have sent letter after letter, but all they receive in return is a letter from young Cappicille, asking if they have entirely forgotten him, since he has not received any mail from them since he left America. The parents received word that he was gassed November 8, and the latest epistle from him informs them that he has fully recovered and is back again with his division. He was transferred to Company K, 313th Infantry, of which he is now a member. Before he enlisted he was employed by

the Lincoln Theatre, Union Hill, and is well known.

"Keep smiling and be brave, for I'm coming back to you," was the message sent from across the sea by Sergeant John J. Allen, blinded and rendered speechless from gas and wounds while leading his men of Company C, 10th Field Signal Corps, October 17, in the Argonne, to his mother, Mrs. Dora Allen.

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widow of the late John Allen, of 332 Madison street, West New York. His mother has heart trouble, and that he was hurt so badly was kept from her. His cheering words were characteristic of the boy, who is of the 100 per cent. American type. He volunteered for the expedition into Mexico and saw six months' service there. The day after this country declared war, Allen put his name down for enlistment with the Fourth Regiment and went to Anniston and later was put in the Signal Corps. He only saw home once, and on June 14 went across. He was promoted to sergeant. He was in the hospital till December 31, when he was able to leave. January 25, from Bour-bonne Les Bain, France, he wrote that there were twelve inches of snow on the ground, and that it was still coming down, and fuel was scarce. His mother believes she can expect him home in June.

John J. Cooney, of 250 Twenty-sixth street, Guttenberg, lived with his sister, Mrs. Hattie Gomer. He is a member of Company F, 105th Infantry, 27th Division, and was gassed September 28, and came out of the hospital October 9. These facts were learned from the War Department. His letters and postals say he is all right. Cooney was standing on Eighth avenue, New York, talking with his friends, when he and seven others decided to enlist for Mexican service with the 12th, New York. Coming back from the border, he was practically never out of his uniform and was soon down at Spartanburg, training, and then went across to France. He was last heard of at Brest, waiting to come back.

George B. Miller, of 627 Monroe Place, West New York, was gassed just before the armistice was signed, while fighting in the Argonne with the 318th Machine Gun Battalion, 61st Division. He was five weeks in a hospital. He was drafted and went across last August. He had tried to enlist in the Marines and in the navy, but was rejected. Of his experiences, he has written practically nothing to his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. James Miller. He is now at Etroy and his old position in New York is being held open for him.

Private William E. Rankin, who lived with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward J. Rankin, at 56 Garrison avenue, Jersey City, is listed for the second time on to-day's casualty list, apparently for the same wounds received on July 16, since he has written home regularly, although sent back into action, and has failed to make mention of being wounded a second time.

He is 24 years old and unmarried, and enlisted in the regular army in November, 1917. He was wounded while fighting with the 138th Infantry, by exploding shrapnel, affecting his right shoulder and arm. He recovered in a base hospital over there, and was subsequently transferred to Company H of the 119th Infantry.

He is a native of Jersey City and was educated in Public School No. 23 and Dickinson High School. At the time he enlisted he was employed as a telegrapher. His latest letters indicate that he will be home soon,

and his family are of the opinion that a mistake has been made in connection with the reappearance of his name on today's casualty list.

John Toole, of 162 Clerk street, Jersey City, who is listed today as slightly wounded, joined the service about a year ago and was sent to Camp Dix. In May he left for overseas with Company A, 310th Infantry, and was wounded in the leg by shrapnel and machine gun bullets and also slightly gassed. According to his letters his injuries were not serious and he returned to duty several weeks ago.

Charles J. Zeltner, of 145 Pearsall avenue, Jersey City, was also a member of the 310th Infantry and left Camp Dix, where he received his preliminary training during the early part of May. In the last drive on the Argonne Forest, where so many members of the 78th Division were killed and wounded, he received a bullet in the right shoulder and was gassed. According to his letters he has been released from the base hospital and is now back with his company.

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CASUALTY LISTS VIRTUALLY ENDED

Secretary Baker in Making Announcement Praises the Newspapers.

Washington, April 2.—Declaring that the "general efficiency and humanly cooperation of the American press" in the matter of prompt publication of soldier casualties "deserved public appreciation," Secretary of War Baker to-day declared that newspapers during the war have "thus undoubtedly established an unprecedented service." His statement follows:

"It is with profound gratitude that we approach the end of the American Expeditionary Force casualty list—grateful that the price of victory, in human life and limb, was not greater. The War Department has been conscious of the splendid public service the newspaper press has been rendering to the people by the prompt and accurate publication of the casualties list from day to day, that the supreme sacrifices made by officers and men of our forces abroad might be known to their friends and relatives at home.

"The policy of the War Department has been to immediately notify the next of kin by telegraph of any misfortune befalling a soldier, but the responsibility of notification extended also to the community, and this has been accomplished through the newspaper press. To meet the duty of rapid notification the casualty lists have been telegraphed each day by the War Department to the postmasters of Chicago and San Francisco, and those government officials, together with the Government Printing Office at Washington, have published the lists which the press associations have furnished to all daily newspapers with the least possible lapse of time. The newspapers have rigidly kept faith on release notices, thus insuring simultaneous publication. The United States Government and the newspapers have thus undoubtedly established an unprecedented service in rapid and complete publication of the names, addresses and classified misfortunes of soldiers at the front. The general efficiency and humanly kind cooperation of the American press in this matter deserves public appreciation."

By order of the Secretary of War the method of telegraphing casualty lists to Chicago and San Francisco and distributing them from these two cities and Washington as zone centres, has been discontinued. The casualty reports hereafter, beginning to-day, are distributed to the Press Association at Washington, which will carry on the wires daily the list of "killed in action," mailing out to all clients the complete list including "died of wounds," "wounded" and such "change of status" cases as may develop as posthumous investigations establish that misfortunes were other than originally reported. These mailed lists are subject to release on receipt, by order of the Secretary of War.

SAYS HIS ARTILLERY BRIGADE WAS LUCKY

Commander of the 153rd Tells of Escape From Harm.

[Special to Hudson Observer.]

Camp Dix, Wrightstown, May 17. —"Ours was the luckiest brigade in the entire A. E. F.," says Brigadier General Clint C. Hearn, commander of the 153d Artillery Brigade, when he reached Camp Dix yesterday. He praised the work of the West New York and the New Jersey troops which mainly made up his command. "We got into the fighting at the first St. Mihiel drive and kept at it until the armistice was signed, and we lost only one officer and twenty-five men during that time.

"We were 100 per cent efficiency in camouflage science. To that I attribute the failure of the enemy to locate our batteries. As an illustration of how well we were able to hide ourselves from the enemy, on the 29th of October the 307th and the 308th Field Artillery Regiments laid down a barrage of 40,000 rounds of ammunition, from sunrise until 9 o'clock that night. During this time we were under fire of the enemy and there were many German aeroplanes and scouts making every effort to locate our position. They were not able to spot a single battery and not one of our men was killed that day," said General Hearn.

Discharges were granted yesterday to 3,500 men, said to be the largest daily discharge from any camp in this country since demobilization began. Detachments from four divisions, the 28th, 29th, 78th and 52d, were sent away from the camp.

The boys of the 114th Infantry, 29th Division, formerly the New Jersey National Guard, were looked after by "welcome home" committees when they were discharged. Ninety per cent of them were placed aboard automobiles and started for home, most of them going to Paterson. Close to 150 automobiles were sent from that city to take the boys home.

He was over the top four times in the Argonne fighting and on October, his fifth venture, was severely shell shocked. He was two months in the hospital, but has since been discharged and is expected to return home within the next few days.

A relatively small number remains to be listed, of men previously reported missing, whose bodies are being discovered in the systematic search being made of burying grounds.

The number still missing changes from day to day. A few days ago it was 5,500, and it is certain a large proportion of them will ultimately be listed among the "killed in action."

Up to March 22, of the 4,686 soldiers taken prisoner, the status of all but 153 was settled. Of the total, 4,304 had been released and 229 died in Germany. In addition, 79 American marines and 281 civilians were taken prisoner. Four marines died in prison camps, 72 were released, the status of three remaining doubtful. Of the civilians, 116 had been released up to March 22; the status of 163 is doubtful.

CERTIFICATES TO GO TO RELATIVES OF THE HERO DEAD

Ministers, Priests and Rab- bis to Take Part in the Services.

Congressman John J. Eagan, Judge Francis H. McCauley, Rev. Henry Bacon Allen, chaplain of the Post, and Rabbi Silverman will be among the speakers at the presentation service of the French memorial war certificates for Weehawken Post No. 18, to be held on Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the Hamilton School. Similar services will be held simultaneously by most of the 8,000 posts throughout the country, Washington's Birthday having been selected as the most appropriate date for the presentation.

The United States Distinguished Service Cross will also be awarded posthumously to Sergt. William Kraft, Colonel Cachean of the General Staff of the U. S. A. at Washington making the presentation. Sergt. Kraft was killed in action in France, leading his regiment as acting lieutenant colonel, all the intermediate officers having been killed or disabled during the engagement.

Washington, Feb. 9.—Final revised figures of American Army casualties in the war were announced by the Adjutant General on Saturday afternoon. FRENCH MEMORIAL CERTIFICATES ARE GIVEN HEROES' KIN

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Impressive Ceremonies With Great Throng Present, Representing All Parts of the County, at Dickinson High School, Jersey City—Relatives of Boys Who Made the Supreme Sacrifice Receive Expression of Thanks From Sister Republic—Beautiful Vocal Music Brings Tears to the Eyes of All—Clergymen of Every Denomination Take Part in the Exercises—Those Not Present Will Receive Mementoes by Mail.

COMMISSIONER O'BRIEN'S ELOQUENT ADDRESS WAS A NOTABLE FEATURE

Services were held Sunday evening at the Dickinson High School, in Jersey City, to commemorate the sacrifice of the dead heroes of the late war to whose nearest of kin certificates of honor were presented. The certificates were the French government's expression of the thanks of France for the glorious sacrifice made by American heroes in their struggle for the perpetuation of American ideals and the rescue of France from threatened destruction. The services and the distribution were conducted by the Hudson County Federation of American Legion Posts.

Following the rendition of a medley of French war songs by the orchestra, Timothy M. Crowley, chairman of the County Federation of the American Legion, opened the ceremonies with a short but stirring eloquent address in which he said:

"We are gathered here this evening to honor the memory of those who made the supreme sacrifice that the world might be made safe for democracy and that democracy might be made safe for the world. If either falls then, though 'poppies grow on Flanders' fields,' they died in vain who shed their blood in the noblest cause that has yet pulsed in the breasts of men. But neither can fail them, for the inspiration of their lives and their deaths will forever fire the hearts of men, and the hearts of men fired by such an inspiration can never permit their sacrifice to have been in vain."

Hugh A. Kelly, the well known local tenor, sang effectively two hymns, "Thy Will Be Done" and "Face to Face." The solemn and beautiful words uttered with fervent feeling reached deep into the hearts of the auditors and the eyes of all were wet with tears when he had finished. Despite the nature of the occasion there was spontaneous applause as he retired from the stage.

Clergymen representing all denominations participated in the cere-

monies. Rabbi M. Thorner read from the Scriptures. Rev. August F. Bender offered a prayer which deeply affected every person present. Rev. Father Michael Corr pronounced the benediction.

Commissioner Charles F. X. O'Brien delivered the eulogy, which was a masterpiece, in which he carried the assemblage through a review of the history of America and recited in glowing terms the splendid deeds of valor which have made the American the greatest of soldiers. His oratory was superb and the depth of his feeling obvious as he recalled the days when the boys were struggling "over there" and dying for America's cause.

H. D. Schubert, a vocalist assigned by the War Camp Community Service, sang "The Americans Come." The poem, "France in Battle Flame," was to have been recited by Peter Cohen, but he failed to put in an appearance and Chairman Crowley read the poem.

A beautiful pageant in which Columbia welcomed France and received from the fair sister republic the certificate of honor, was effectively enacted under the direction of Mrs. L. Maynard Brown and Frank Roach. Misses Elizabeth McCabe, Anna Krywick and Anna Phelan were

the principals.

Following this feature the certificates were distributed. Chairman Crowley and Christian Heidt, chairman of the arrangements committee, with the assistance of Hugh A. Kelly, read off the names of those to whom the certificates were addressed. The persons in the audience indicated their presence by rising, and a soldier, sailor or marine, in uniform, carried the certificate to them.

Those who were not present at the services will receive the certificate by mail. This morning all not yet delivered were deposited at the post office, except those addressed to persons in the city of Hoboken. These will be distributed under the direction of Stephen Scaplon, adjutant of the City of Hoboken Post, No. 107, American Legion, in Hoboken. They may be had at any time during the day at the Public Library in Hoboken or by communicating with any officer of the post.

If there is any person who feels they were entitled to a certificate to commemorate the great sacrifice by one they considered themselves to be nearest of kin to, these persons are requested to communicate with Timothy M. 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MOTHER ARRIVES TOO LATE; SOLDIER DEAD

After going to France and being through the great war, Herman Borgstedt, 22 years old, of 207 Third street, Hoboken, returned to this country, was taken ill and died. Influenza, followed by pneumonia, was the cause of death on Thursday at the Newport News hospital.

His mother had been notified of his illness shortly before he passed away. She immediately made the trip to Newport News, but arrived three hours too late to see him in life. She is prostrated over the loss, and the father, Herman Borgstedt, Sr., is seriously affected. The body has not yet arrived here and funeral arrangements are held up pending its coming.

Herman Borgstedt, Jr., enlisted in the old First Company, Coast Artillery Corps, that was recruited in Hoboken. He was stationed at Fort Mott, Salem, until he went overseas with the Seventh Trench Mortar Battalion. This unit returned on board the Battleship Kansas and reached Newport News several days ago. Herman died two days after being stricken.

Borgstedt was one of the best liked men of the old First Company. He was officially known as mechanic of that outfit. He is the fourth member of the Coast Artillery Unit, as originally made up, to go into the Great Beyond. Harry Eckhardt, of West Hoboken, was the first. He passed away at Fort Mott after an illness. Joseph Foohey died in France. About fifteen others of the old outfit had come over on the Kansas with Borgstedt.

The pallbearers included Mayor Patrick R. Griffin, Director of Public Safety B. N. McFeely, County Clerk John J. McGovern, former Police Commissioner John J. Ryan, John Crosby and A. J. Keenan, of Long Island. A host of prominent men of the county attended the funeral.

Father Butler died at Montauk, Long Island, on Saturday, following a short illness of pneumonia, contracted while attending sick soldiers in the regiment of which he was chaplain. He is survived by his parents; by two sisters, Mrs. Tomford

and Miss Lillian Butler, and by three brothers, Harold, Joseph and Robert Butler, the latter in the Army also.

WRITES OF DEATH OF SERGEANT WALSH

Officer of Dead Soldier's Company Sends Letter to His Aunt.

The manner in which Sergeant Thomas J. Walsh, of 74 Jefferson street, Hoboken, where he resided with his aunt, Mrs. E. Kerrigan, met his death on the field of battle in

France is told in a letter. The latter has just been received by Mrs. Kerrigan from the lieutenant of the company to which Sergeant Walsh was attached. It reads as follows:

"Dear Madam:—It is with the deepest regret that it becomes necessary for us to advise you of the death of your nephew, Sergeant Thomas Walsh. He was killed in action on October 10, at the battle of Ormont Farms. Due to his splendid soldierly character, he was promoted from the grade of corporal to that of sergeant just before going into action. It was while leading his platoon into the fight that he made this sacrifice.

"Later he was carried from the field by his own men and tenderly laid away under the shadow of the hill overlooking the field of battle, his grave being plainly marked.

"Tommy, as he was known by the members of the company, was dearly beloved by officers and men and was always an example to them for his soldierly qualities and for the confidence placed in him by his officers. His early death was a loss to the company as it had been planned for him to get further instruction for promotion.

"We regret that it has not been possible for us to inform you of his loss at an earlier date, but due to War Department regulations it was impossible to do so.

"Please accept the deepest sympathy of all of his company and myself in your hour of loss.

Sergeant Walsh enlisted in April, 1917, in Company M, of the old Fourth Regiment of New Jersey, which was federalized and became known as the 113th U. S. Infantry. They went to Alabama, where Walsh was made a corporal and after nine months' training went overseas in June, 1918. He was twenty-five years old, and is survived by a sister, Miss Emma Walsh, and a brother, Joseph F. Walsh, who is employed by the Hudson Observer. Thomas, also, was formerly employed by the Hudson Observer. He was a member of the Cedar Club and the Uno Club, and had a host of friends in Hoboken.

CELEBRATE MASS FOR REV. FR. BUTLER

Formerly of St. Joseph's Parish, Died in Naval Service.

A month's mind mass will be celebrated at 10 o'clock to-morrow morning at St. Joseph's Church, Hoboken, to commemorate the memory of Rev. Fr. Justin Butler, O. M. C., who died while in the naval service at Montauk Point, Long Island, about a month ago. Representatives of the order and school children and the congregation will be present.

Father Butler, who was only 29 years old, died while a chaplain in the navy following an attack of influenza. He was born and raised in St. Joseph's parish, but after being ordained had been assigned to various seminaries of the order in which he taught.

DIED AS HE CARRIED A WOUNDED SOLDIER

News of the manner in which Private Michael F. O'Hara, well known Hoboken boy, met his death in France has come to his sister, Miss Margaret T. McElroy, of 821 Park avenue, Hoboken, in a letter written by Lieutenant Stephen M. Richardson, of Company G, Ninth United States Infantry, acting company commander, and Top Sergeant Frank A. Hoholhan, a friend of the young Hobokenite, and attached to the French Army.

Private O'Hara, after fourteen months service in France, was killed in action on October 3. He enlisted on June 6, 1917, and left for France just three months later with the Ninth Infantry, one of the first to enter the lines opposite the German trenches.

Lieutenant Richardson writes in part as follows:

"About the first of this month our division, which has been cited for its brave fighting in previous battles, was called upon to take an important hill on the Champagne front. We did not fail and our fierce attack drove the Germans back about six miles.

"In this battle Private O'Hara did gallant work. During the first day he did a great service by untiringly carrying wounded to the dressing station. He worked bravely and courageously, oftentimes passing through areas under heavy bombardment. On October 3, while carrying a wounded American on a stretcher, he was shot and instantly killed. He

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tell while heroically performing his duty.

"Private O'Hara was one of the best liked men in Company G. His ready smile, his jokes and his witty songs always kept the other men in good spirits. I have always found him a willing and brave soldier, ready to carry out any order given him.

"I extend to you my heartfelt sympathies and the sympathies of his comrades. May you feel proud that Private O'Hara died while fighting bravely and nobly."

Sergeant Holohan's letter is as follows:

"I take this opportunity of writing to you to inform you of the noble sacrifice made by Private Michael O'Hara in behalf of his country.

"As an ambulance driver attached to the French Army, I have had the honor of working with the Second Division of the American Army in the Champagne drive of last October, during which the Ninth Infantry contributed much to the great cause of democracy, suffering heavily in the battle of Mont Blanc. It was in this battle that Michael gave his life for his country. During the evacuation of the French wounded from the lines held by the French Division to which my section is attached, we found Michael's body and immediately the French buried him in a small French cemetery near Somme Py. I witnessed the burial, and know that the boy was buried with honors, a French chaplain officiating at the ceremonies.

"I shall always remember his name. Before his Maker and country he is a hero. May he rest in peace."

Private O'Rourke, before going into the army, was employed for many years with the Hoboken Paper Mill Company.

The following is taken from the last letter he wrote to his little nephew, Master Thomas Stack:

"The weather is pretty warm over here now, only the mornings are cold. Tell Nan that I got the papers and was thankful to her. How is mother, Nan and Ray, also yourself getting along.

"Well, Tommy, I suppose you know by the papers how we are getting along. Most of the boys who were wounded the night of the big attack, July 14, are coming back from the hospital.

"I see by the Hudson Observer that you had the news almost before us, about crossing the River Marne, but we were there and saw and know enough about it.

"It is good to see the farmers gathering in their crops around here now, the crops the Germans thought they would reap. I guess they would have done so, only for the American boys.

"Well, the Germans are so far away now that we cannot hear their guns. The title we have now is 'The Fighting 38th' or the 'Rock of the Marne.' We did such good fighting and we are going to keep it up, too, with God's help, until we get rid of all the Huns. Hope that won't be long."

FRANK LA POINTE MET DEATH AS HERO

That Sergeant Frank LaPointe, Jr., son of former Assemblyman Frank A. LaPointe, who recently moved from Hoboken to Jersey City Heights, met his death in France in a heroic manner is attested in letters

recently received by his parents from Frank's comrades in arms. News of his untimely demise was published last November in the Hudson Observer.

LaPointe was born on December 14, 1898, at Hoboken. He was educated in the local schools, graduating from Public School No. 2 and from the High School in 1916. He won by competition a free scholarship to Stevens Institute of Technology and was enrolled with the class of 1920.

At the High School LaPointe was a star at basketball, playing centre on a championship five for two seasons. He made the Stevens varsity team soon after his enrollment at the local college, and proved one of its strongest cogs.

Near the close of his second year at Stevens, while 19 years of age, LaPointe enlisted at Fort Slocum in Company C of the 102d Engineer Regiment. One month from the day of his enlistment he was in active service in France. His regiment was part of the famous 27th Division, brigaded with the British in Belgium and France. LaPointe participated in thirteen battles and was killed in action on October 19 by a high explosive shell at the battle of St. Souplet, France, with eleven others of his company. He lies buried in the French Military Cemetery at St. Souplet.

LaPointe was nineteen years and ten months of age at the time of his death. A tree to his memory has been planted by students of the Hoboken High School at Fourth and Garden streets, Hoboken.

FATHER BUTLER DIES; WAS K. C. CHAPLAIN

The Rev. Father Justin Butler, son of School Commissioner Richard Butler, of Hoboken, died this morning at the naval air station at Montauk, L. I. Pneumonia caused his death. He was a chaplain in the Knights of Columbus war work service.

It is expected that the body of the dead priest will arrive in Hoboken some time to-day. It will lie in state in St. Joseph's R. C. Church, on Monroe street, on Monday afternoon and evening and Tuesday morning. Arrangements for the funeral have not been completed, but will be announced on Monday.

The deceased, well known in Hoboken, was born on January 13, 1890, in the Mile Square City. He studied at St. Francis' College, Trenton, from 1904 to 1907. He was professed as a member of the Order of Minor Conventuals on August 30, 1908. He made his philosophy at St. Francis' College in the period between 1908 and 1910.

Then he left for Europe, where he studied theology at Innsbruck, Austria, from 1910 to 1913. He was ordained on July 27, 1913, and returned to the United States.

Following his return he was assigned as teacher in St. Francis' College, Trenton, where he continued until 1915. Then he was transferred to Mt. St. Francis' College, Indiana, where he held the position of prefect until last year.

Father Butler received his appointment as Knights of Columbus chaplain in December of last year.

Announcement of the funeral arrangements will be made later. Mohr Post will arrange for participation, as will the auxilliary, and Hoboken's Legion Post will also pay its tribute.

It was stated this morning that the funeral services for the late corporal will be held on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock at the Church of SS. Peter and Paul, Fourth and Hudson streets. The body will be removed from the piers on Monday and will be conveyed to the headquarters of the Chris. A. Mohr, Jr., Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Fifth and Bloomfield streets, where it will lie in state until Wednesday morning. The body will be guarded by two soldiers in full uniform, day and night during this time.

At the funeral services the Hoboken police band, by courtesy of Director of Public Safety B. N. McFeely, will lead the procession, and the escort will be furnished by a detail of the Thirteenth Infantry from the piers. Members of the Chris. A. Mohr, Jr., Post, and the War Mothers will attend.

FUNERAL HELD HERE OF HOBOKEN HERO

The funeral took place this morning of Private Thomas A. Dugan, one of the Hoboken boys who volunteered for service in the World War and who lost his life in action. The funeral took place at 9:30 from his late home at 406 Grand street.

Dugan was a member of Company D, 309th Machine Gun Battalion. He enlisted on April 4, 1918, going overseas immediately afterward. He was gassed and wounded in the battle of Gran Pre, and died in hospital on November 24 of the same year.

The body was brought back on board the U. S. transport Wheaton. The funeral took place this morning from the Grand street address. The Police Band attended and there was a military escort. For some reason that has not yet been explained the tablet has not yet been unveiled and is hidden by the folds of an American flag that is draped over it.

MEMORY OF WAR CROSS WINNER TO BE HONORED

Local Lawyers Will Present Tablet to City—Chaplain Coon to Speak.

Hoboken's lawyers will honor the memory tomorrow morning of the late Lieutenant Henry H. Blackham, a member of the local bar, who was killed in action in France in 1918. A tablet has been erected in the Hoboken District Court, where the lieutenant had appeared many times as counsel, and will be formally unveiled tomorrow at 10 o'clock.

Mayor Patrick R. Griffin will accept the tablet for the city of Hoboken. Captain Warren P. Coon, chap-

lain of the 113th Infantry, composed of members of New Jersey's "Fighting Fourth" Regiment during the World War, will make the address. He was near Blackham when the lieutenant fell.

Col. George T. Vickers, Assistant Prosecutor, will be present and perhaps will give a short talk. Others invited are members of the family of the hero and his comrades-in-arms who are now members of the Fourth New Jersey Infantry Post, American Legion, of Jersey City.

The tablet is of bronze, 24x17 1/2 inches, and is suitably inscribed.

The local bar committee in charge of the preparations for presentation of the tablet is composed of Captain Harlan Besson, Corporation Attorney John J. Fallon, Recorder A. C. Carsten, J. J. Fallon, Jr., F. H. Hopkins, Julius Lichtenstein, J. W. R. Besson, William S. Stuhr and Henry J. Camby.

The War Department, it has been announced, has made posthumous award of a Distinguished Service Cross for "meritorious service in the face of a withering fire" to the family of the lieutenant.

All members of the local bar and friends of the martyr are expected to be on hand at the ceremonies tomorrow morning. The City Commissioners will also attend. The tablet will be placed permanently in the District Court quarters.

TABLET IS UNVEILED IN LAWYER'S MEMORY

A bronze tablet was unveiled this morning in the Hoboken District Court in memory of Lieutenant Henry H. Blackham, a member of

PAY TRIBUTE TO THE MEMORY OF LOCAL LAWYER

Chaplain Is Among Speakers When Blackham Tablet Is Unveiled.

One of the greatest and most inspiring addresses delivered in Hoboken in many years was heard yesterday in the Hoboken District Court, when the bronze tablet in memory of Lieutenant Henry H. Blackham, a member of the Hoboken bar, was formally unveiled. Counselor Clement de R. Leonard, dean of the local bar, did the unveiling. The court was adjourned for a week in respect to the memory of the late lieutenant, and Judge Tiffany presided over the simple but impressive ceremonies.

There was a full gathering of the members of the bar present. In addition there were Mayor Griffin and Commissioners McFeely, Londrigan, Schmulling and Bach. Counselor de R. Leonard spoke of the esteem and respect in which the lieutenant had been held by his colleagues and

added that his example should at all times be an example to those who came after him.

Mayor Griffin, in a few words, accepted the tablet on behalf of the city and Judge Tiffany spoke briefly of the inspiration they all derived from the patriotism of their late colleague. Had he lived, said he, Lieutenant Blackham would have gone high in his profession as he had risen high in the esteem of his fellow members of the bar.

An address that was thrilling in its direct eloquence was delivered by Captain Warren Patten Coon, chaplain of the 113th Infantry of the Twenty-ninth Division, a comrade and fellow soldier of Lieutenant Blackham, and now Assemblyman-elect for Essex County. He told the story of the lieutenant's sacrifice and said that there were none of those who had gone through the war who would ever forget the ideals for which that war was fought and won.

"We have heard a great deal," he said, "about the League of Nations and about the enforcement of prohibition in these late days. There were 40,000 or 50,000 brave American boys who died in France and millions more who fought and suffered. What did they die for? Was it for these things? It was not. They made their sacrifice that they might secure justice for all. And, in securing that justice they died, as real patriots, that justice might first of all be done to those in our own land. They were not of the flag-waving, song-singing type.

"The boys who fought and died—and I was with them and I know—gave their all to secure justice for all. They did not die for the profiteer or for the exploiter. They died that justice might reign upon earth. They shall not die in vain. The Americanism for which these boys gave up their lives shall be our guiding light in the future. We have seen enough of the professional patriot and the professional flag-waver. We are going to have some real Americanism if only because these boys earned it with their blood."

The chaplain told of the sacrifice of Lieutenant Blackham, how, after being wounded at Merville Farm, north of Verdun, he still pressed on towards the lines of the enemy till riddled by machine gun bullets he fell dead upon the field of battle. The chaplain also spoke of the fact that the Twenty-ninth Division had received but scant notice in the official orders.

"Let me tell you," he said, "the Twenty-ninth Division was good for nothing but fighting. We went through hell within 23 kilometers of German soil, and at a point where the Germans had piled up their machine gun nests and their artillery. Those boys of the Twenty-ninth Division, those boys of the 113th, 114th, 115th and 116th regiments,

they fought and died as heroes with no thought of heroism; all they thought about was to get there, and they made their objective in three weeks in spite of all that the enemy could bring to bear against them."

Major Henry Lohman made a brief reply, after which the proceedings terminated.

Mr. and Mrs. Abram Goldstein, of 555 Bergenline avenue, West New York, received the body of their dead soldier son, who died two years ago in France, for the holiday.

Private Jacob Goldstein, 26 years old, of Company G, 312th Infantry, Seventy-eighth Division, was cheated of his enjoyment of the armistice when he died on November 3, 1918, in a hospital in France. His body was received last week from the Hoboken army piers and lay in state on Friday at the Necker mortuary, Main street and Bergenline avenue, Union Hill.

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at the synagogue at Seventh street and Tyler place, West New York, followed by interment at Mount Hebron Cemetery, Flushing, Long Island. A firing squad from the army piers at Hoboken accompanied the cortege and rendered honors at the graveside.

Hoboken Boy's Body Arrives On Somme

Remains of Private Charles Spence Anderson at Local Piers—He Was Killed in Action in the Battle of Chateau Thierry.

Among the bodies of the hero dead brought back on the Transport Somme, and now lying with those of many comrades at the Hoboken piers, is that of Private Spence Anderson. He was killed in action on July 18, 1918, in the battle of Chateau Thierry, while on scout duty.

The deceased soldier was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles W. Anderson of 815 Washington street, Hoboken, and a graduate of Our Lady of Grace School, in Hoboken. He also had two brothers who served in the war, Corporal Thomas X. Anderson of the Fifth Regiment, Marine Corps, A. E. F., and Private John J. Anderson, First Company, Battery B., C. A. C.

Young Anderson had spent all of his life in Hoboken and at the outbreak of the war he enlisted. He served with the famous Ninth Infantry, of the Second Division, being a member of Company E. Besides his parents and brothers, he is survived by one sister. Arrangements for the funeral will be announced later through Undertaker John F. O'Hara. It is probable that the burial will take place on next Thursday.

Members of Hoboken Post No. 107, American Legion, and of Chris. Mohr Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, will attend the funeral in a body. The deceased was well known to many members of these two organizations.

SERGT. WALSH IN LAST RESTING PLACE

One of the most impressive funerals seen in Hoboken was that held this morning of Sergeant Thomas J. Walsh, who was killed in action in France October 10, 1918. Walsh was a member of Company M, 113th Infantry, 29th Division, and was the son of the late Thomas and Mary Walsh.

The funeral was held under auspices of the Corporal Chris A. Mohr Jr. Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and was held from the residence of the aunt of the deceased, Mrs. Emma Kerrigan, of 74 Jefferson street. The cortege left the house at 9:30 this morning and proceeded to St. Joseph's Church, where a solemn mass of requiem was offered for the repose of the soul of the dead soldier.

The Hoboken Police Band led the funeral procession, and was followed by a full military escort. The coffin, draped in the American flag, was carried on a gun carriage drawn by four white horses, and preceded by the firing squad. After the coffin came a contingent of the War Mothers. There was also a contingent of the Corporal Chris A. Mohr Jr. Post, together with their standards. There was one coach filled with floral tributes, and then a long line of coaches occupied by the friends of the dead soldier.

After leaving the church the cortege passed up to Washington street.

BODY OF FRANCIS O'MARA IS HOME

The body of another of Hoboken's heroes who made the supreme sacrifice on the battlefields of France for the safety of the world returned last week on the U. S. S. Wheaton at the Government Piers, in Hoboken, and is now lying in state at the home of the dead soldier's parents, at 337 West Twelfth street, New York City.

The soldier is Francis X. O'Mara, who before the war was a resident of Hoboken, and who lived with his parents in the First Ward previous to their moving to New York City, after his enlistment. Young O'Mara who was born in the Mile-Square City and who lived here until his enlistment in that Grand Old Regiment, the 69th of New York, was a member of Co. E, 165th Infantry, which helped to make up part of the famous Rainbow division.

He left Camp Mills, Long Island, for France early in 1917 with his division and after seeing heavy service at the front for months was killed in action at Oueque, on July 28, 1918.

Mr. O'Mara, was well known and very popular among the younger element in the First Ward before his enlistment into Uncle Sams Army and his death at that time proved a severe shock to them. He was a pupil and received his early education at the School of Our Lady of Grace, Hoboken.

The funeral of the dead hero will take place on Saturday morning from the present home of his parents at 337 West Twelfth street, New York City, thence to St. Benedict's R. C. Church where a solemn high mass of requiem will be held for the repose of his soul.

CORP. DUFFY'S BODY IS LYING IN STATE

With all the marks of affection and respect that they can pay to their dead buddy the comrades of Corporal Arthur M. Duffy are on guard to-day over his body at the headquarters of the Chris A. Mohr, Jr. Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, at Fifth and Bloomfield streets, Hoboken.

The body was brought to the post headquarters last night and has been lying in state there since. It will remain there until to-morrow morning, when the funeral services will be held at the Church of SS. Peter and Paul, Fourth and Hudson streets. Ritual services will be held by the post at 9 o'clock this evening.

The clubhouse is draped in black and white streamers and a large American flag is at half-mast outside the building. Most of the houses in the vicinity are flying the flag at half-mast as a mark of honor and respect to the memory of the dead soldier.

There were many yesterday who went to the clubhouse to pass in review before the flag-covered casket. At the entrance to the club two soldiers in full uniform are on guard and others are on guard in the room above where the body is lying. The men remained on guard all night and will continue to do so until the funeral to-morrow.

ANOTHER HOBOKEN BOY IS RETURNED

The body of Patrick Butler, who died of pneumonia on February 16, 1919, at Montignej-Montfort, France, is among those that arrived on the transport Wheaton, which docked at Hoboken on Wednesday, according to information received by his mother, Mrs. Ellen Butler. She resides at 109 Monroe street, Hoboken.

The deceased was well known in the Fourth Ward, and was the son of the late Patrolman Edward Butler. Arrangements have been made with Undertaker Charles Hoffmann for the removal of the remains from the pier. However, it is not possible that the body can be removed before Sunday.

Private Butler served with Battery E, 309th Field Artillery, 78th Division. He contracted pneumonia after passing through the trying experiences of the Argonne, St. Mihiel and Meuse battles.

WHITLOCK, CIVIL WAR HERO, GOES TO LAST REWARD

Aged Former Member of Hoboken Police Force Had an Envable Record.

The fast-dwindling ranks of the Civil War veterans in Hoboken were further depleted last night with the demise of George Whitlock, for many years a member of the Hoboken Police Department. He died at St. Mary's Hospital, of old age and complications. The deceased was known to hundreds who came in contact with him when he served for many years as doorman at the First Precinct.

Born in New York in November, 1847, Mr. Whitlock was slightly over fourteen years of age when the Civil War broke out. He enlisted soon afterward and served with distinction in the various campaigns, being cited in general dispatches a number of times for his valor. He served a one-year enlistment, then re-enlisted and was in at "the killing" at Appomattox Court House. He served in the Fifty-fourth New York Volunteers, of whom there are now only three survivors.

For many years after the war, he was a carpenter in the shops of the Pennsylvania Railroad at the foot of Second street. He was appointed to the police force on September 28, 1889, and was retired on a pension in 1919, after thirty years of meritorious service. Those thirty years of service on the force were marked by the capture of numerous desperate criminals.

A Jackson Democrat of the most confirmed type, Whitlock was active in politics in Hudson County. He was for many years Democratic committeeman from the Second Ward. During and after the war he gained wide fame as a pistol shot.

"Genial George" was, with Captain John Flattery, Detective Michael Kivlon and others, an organizer of Brown Post, G. A. R., Hoboken's unit of Civil War veterans, of whom there are now only eight left. He had been ailing for the past few years, keeping to his feet until recently by sheer grit alone.

The funeral will take place on Friday morning, following services at his late home, 212 Eighth street, on Thursday evening. Interment will be in Flower Hill Cemetery. The deceased is survived by his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Whitlock, by two daughters, one of them the wife of William O'Connor of the local postal staff; by three granddaughters, and by one great granddaughter.

CORPORAL DUFFY LAID IN HIS LAST RESTING PLACE

His Former Comrades and Other Hobokenites Pay Last Respects.

With full military honors the body of the late Corporal Arthur Duffy, of Company R, 23rd U. S. Infantry, killed in action in France and which was brought home last Sunday, was buried in Holy Name Cemetery this morning. A detachment of infantrymen fired the last volley over the grave as taps were sounded. Since the body's arrival in Hoboken on Sunday it lay in state at headquarters of Chris Mohr Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, watched over by a military guard of honor.

Corporal Duffy enlisted when he was only seventeen years old and was among the second contingent to go to France. He was the first enlisted man in Hoboken to be killed and the ladies' auxiliary of Mohr Post has honored his memory by making him their standard bearer. The deceased was the son of former Councilman Patrick Duffy, of Hoboken, and grandson of the late "Nick" Heinsohn, an old-time Hobokenite.

At SS. Peter and Paul R. C. Church, where services were held this morning, there were very few dry eyes among the men and women. While the soldiers stood at attention with set lips and stern countenances.

In addition to the military guard and the contingent of former service men who accompanied the remains to the grave, the Hoboken Police Band also attended the funeral.

The ceremonies at the church were very impressive. The edifice was filled to capacity and a large number of people congregated outside during the services. The Rev. Father Lawless officiated.

After leaving the church the cortege proceeded down Hudson street to Newark street, west on Newark street to Washington street, and north on Washington street on the way to the cemetery. There was a long line of coaches following the hearse. The escort was headed by the Hoboken Police Band, and was formed of the uniformed members of the Chris. A. Mohr, Jr., Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars. After them came the members of the Corporal Arthur M. Duffy Post, Ladies' Auxiliary of the Mohr Post. Then came the flag draped casket, immediately

preceded by a coach filled to overflowing with floral tributes.

Corporal Duffy, who was one of the most popular young men in the city, enlisted in the service prior to the conscription law going into effect. He was only 17 years old at the time.

BODY OF FIRST MAN CALLED IS NOW HERE

The body of the late Sergeant George T. Suden, of 324 Jackson street, Hoboken, who was a member of Company K, 312th Infantry, was received by his relatives to-day. It arrived last Sunday on the Wheaton. The burial will take place Sunday next from Charles Hoffmann's funeral parlors, 111 Jackson street, at 2 p. m. Suden's number, 258, was the first one drawn in the draft lottery, making him the first man drafted from Hoboken.

Leaving Hoboken on September 4, 1917, for Camp Dix, he was retained there for nine months, when he went overseas as a bugler, and he was subsequently promoted to sergeant. His death occurred in the Argonne at a city called Grand Pre. It was caused by the explosion of a hand grenade in a shell hole he was occupying on October 24, 1918.

ANOTHER HOBOKEN BOY AMONG DEAD

The body of Corp. Edward Satzger, of Co. E, 303rd Supply Train, 27 years old, son of Mrs. Eugenie Satzger, and the late Otto Satzger, of 82 Bloomfield street, Hoboken, who died in Sumen Cote D'or, France, on February 17, 1919, was among those arriving on the U. S. S. Wheaton on Wednesday last.

Corp. Satzger was the only casualty of Co. E, 303rd Supply Train, throughout the war. Capt. A. J. Milbrandt, commanding officer of the Company, on his arrival in America after the war, visited the home of the late corporal to tell of his burial and the many floral offerings from company comrades.

Funeral arrangements are in charge of Chas. Hoffman and will probably be held at the latter's funeral parlors. Members of Chris. Mohr Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, will serve as honorary pallbearers. There will also be a squad of Regulars from the piers at the funeral. Interment will be in Flower Hill Cemetery. The date of the funeral has not been set.

Among the thousands of bodies at the Hoboken piers is that of Lieut. Charles A. Meyer, a former Hobokenite, whose family now resides in Sussex County. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. Meyer. His father was a member of the Legislature from Sussex for four years, subsequent to his departure from Hoboken.

Lieut. Meyer was killed in action in the Argonne on October 6, 1918. He was a member of Company K, 308th Infantry, Seventy-seventh Division, and was in his twenty-sixth year when he made the supreme sacrifice. He was an only son, and had been born in Hoboken and attended the local schools in his boyhood days. He had also spent two years at West Point, before going into service.

The funeral will be held at the Meyer home at Andover, N. J., on Sunday afternoon, conducted by the local American Legion Post. The latter is named after the deceased, Lieut. Charles A. Meyer Post, No. 86. Interment will follow in the cemetery at Andover. The ceremonies will be along military lines.

BODY OF SERGEANT MONTAGNE ARRIVES

The body of Sergeant Charles E. Montagne, son of Charles Montagne, Sr., and nephew of Misses Sarah and Anna Mantagne, of 619 Willow avenue, Hoboken, was returned from France this week and will lay in the chapel of the Holy Innocent Church, Sixth street and Willow avenue, Hoboken, until Monday morning at 10 a. m., when a requiem mass will be held for the happy repose of his soul.

The young soldier was born at 619 Willow avenue, Hoboken, and educated in Orange Public Schools. When the U. S. entered the war with Germany he enlisted and was assigned to Co. E, 7th U. S. Infantry, and sent to Texas. From there he was sent to Gettysburg, Pa., and sailed for France on the tenth of April, 1918, and was killed in action June 21, 1918, being only 19 years of age at time of death.

Final honors were paid this morning by his "buddies" and relatives to Private Charles Spence Anderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles W. Anderson, of 115 Washington street, Hoboken. Anderson was a member of Company E, Ninth Infantry, and was killed in action at the Battle of Chateau Thierry, July 18, 1918.

Members of Hoboken Post, No. 107, American Legion, and of Chris. Mohr Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, marched in the funeral procession. The Hoboken Police Band was also in line. A firing squad and a detachment from the Thirteenth Infantry at the local piers also marched. From O'Hara's funeral parlors at 309 Washington street, the cortege proceeded to Our Lady of Grace Church. Following solemn mass, the interment took place in Holy Name Cemetery.

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BODY OF SERGEANT WALSH IS TO BE BURIED TUESDAY

Hoboken Victim of War Recognized Through Picture Sent Red Cross.

The body of the late Sergeant Thomas J. Walsh, who met the supreme sacrifice overseas in battle, arrived in this country and will receive a military funeral next Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock in Hoboken, his home city.

Sergeant Walsh just previous to his last engagement posed for a French photographer, and the photographs being uncalled for were forwarded to the Red Cross in this

country, and were only recognized after having been published in numerous newspapers.

On Saturday the body will be taken to the residence of his aunt, Mrs. Emma Kerrigan, 74 Jefferson street, Hoboken, with whom he had lived before entering the army—his parents having died while he was quite young.

Members of Company M, 113th Infantry, of which the dead hero was a member, will gather at the rooms of the Chris Mohr Jr. Post, No. 153, V. F. W., in Hoboken, and join with the members of the Post and also the War Mothers of the Mile-Square City, and proceed to St. Joseph's R. C. Church, Monroe street, where a solemn high mass of requiem will be celebrated.

Following the services in St. Joseph's Church Tuesday, the remains will be conveyed to the Holy Name Cemetery on a gun caisson, furnished by Clinton E. Fisk Post, Jersey City. The pallbearers will be the sergeants

of Company M, 113th Infantry, which was part of the Twenty-ninth Division, known as the Blue and Gray Division.

The deceased in his early days attended St. Joseph's Parochial School, and many of the students of that school, who well remember the boy, will also attend the services. On leaving school, Walsh entered the service of the Hudson Observer, intending to learn the printing trade, like his brother, Joseph F. Walsh, one of the composing room force of the Hudson Observer.

Sergeant Walsh enlisted in the old Fourth Regiment of New Jersey on April 3, 1917, and a month later left with his company for Perth Amboy and Somerville to do guard duty. When the Old Fourth was Federalized, his company was sent to Camp McClellan, Anniston, Ala., and finally on June 15, 1918, he sailed with the others from Norfolk, Va., on the S. S. Mantooka, arriving in France the latter part of the month.

Walsh was made corporal while at Anniston, and promoted to sergeant while overseas, on October 1, 1918. He was killed October 10, 1918, while leading his platoon into action at Ormont Farms, in the Argonne Forest, while routing out a nest of German machine gunners. He was 24 years old at the time of his death.

Through the courtesy of Commissioner Bernard N. McFeely, the Hoboken Police Band will accompany the remains to their last resting place. Sergeant Walsh is survived by a brother, Joseph F.; a sister, Emma, and two aunts, Mrs. E. Kerrigan and Mrs. L. Ryan.

ARRANGE FUNERAL FOR LOCAL SOLDIER

Funeral services over the remains of Private Michael F. O'Hara, a well-known Hoboken boy who was killed in action in France and whose body was brought home on the Wheaton, which arrived in Hoboken recently, will be held on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock in the Church of Our Lady of Grace. Rev. Father Joseph McAffrey, of the Church of St. Rosa of Lima, New York, who was chaplain in the regiment to which Private O'Hara was attached will celebrate the solemn high mass of requiem.

Private O'Hara volunteered in the Regular Army, Company G, Ninth Regiment Infantry, June 6, 1917. He was stationed at Syracuse, from which place he left for France the following September. He was killed in action in the battle of Mont Blanc on the Champagne front, October 3, 1918. The dead soldier was well known in Hoboken, having been educated in Our Lady of Grace school and he was also a member of the Holy Name Society of that church.

Frank A. Holahan, formerly attached to the French Army as an ambulance driver, who picked up the body of Private O'Hara and arranged for its burial in a French cemetery, will also attend the funeral.

The deceased is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. A. McElroy, a brother, John J. O'Hara, and a sister, Marguarite T. McElroy.

All War Mothers in Hoboken are requested to attend services at the home of his mother, Mrs. M. McElroy, 821 Park avenue, tomorrow night, when members of Chris Mohr Post will also hold services.

A tribute will be paid Sunday afternoon to the memory of Arthur W. Duffy, son of School Commissioner and Mrs. Patrick H. Duffy, one of the first Hobokenites to fall in action in the World War. A tree in his honor will be planted in Hudson Square Park at 4 o'clock.

Members of the various war and post-war organizations in Hoboken and of their women's auxiliaries will attend in large numbers.

TREE IS PLANTED AS MEMORIAL TO CORPORAL DUFFY

Ceremony Is Impressive— Father of Dead Soldier Among Speakers.

The most impressive ceremony associated with Mothers' Day in Hoboken was the planting of a maple tree in Hudson Square Park to commemorate the sacrifice of Corporal Arthur Duffy, the first enlisted man in the city to give his life for his country in the Great War. The ceremony was carried out yesterday afternoon, and while of a simple character, was unusually impressive.

The principal speaker was County Clerk John J. McGovern, who spoke feelingly in reference to the sacrifice of young Duffy and of all of the American boys who had given their all for the Stars and Stripes. He said that it was occasions such as these at which they were assisting which brought back to mind the gallantry of the men of the nation, and it was fitting that this should be commemorated by the planting of a tree which would serve to keep forever green the memory of Duffy and his heroic comrades.

Present at the ceremony was the father of Corporal Duffy, School Commissioner Patrick Duffy, who spoke briefly but with great feeling of the boy he had lost and of the sacrifice he had made. The crowd assembled to witness the ceremony was deeply impressed by the words of the father who had given his son in the war, and among the women there were many who shed tears.

The tree was placed in the ground by the Rev. Father Bogner, pastor of SS. Peter and Paul Church, Fourth and Hudson streets, at which church Corporal Duffy was a communicant. The sister of the dead soldier, Miss Josephine Duffy, assisted in placing the earth around the newly planted maple. During the ceremony appropriate selections were rendered by the band of Corporal Chris A. Mohr Jr. Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

The ceremony, which was witnessed by a large crowd of people, was carried out under the auspices of the Corporal Arthur Duffy Ladies' Auxiliary of Mohr Post, V. F. W., of which Mrs. George Fowler is president, and Mrs. Nellie Hughes, vice-president. Among those who attended the ceremony were Commissioners Harry L. Schmulling and Gustav Bach.

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CORP'L MOHR'S BODY HERE; 456 NOW LYING IN STATE IN VETERANS' HEADQUARTERS

**"Buddies" of the Deceased
Guard Remains During
Day and Night—Plans An-
nounced for Funeral—
Casket to Be Borne to
Masonic Clubhouse.**

MANY ORGANIZATIONS TO BE IN PROCESSION

With simple ceremony and solemnity, with his "buddies" standing at attention and with many silent sightseers standing by, the body of Corporal Chris. A. Mohr, Jr., the first of the Hoboken boys to die in the great war, was brought home yesterday to Hoboken. The clubhouse of the post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars named in his honor at Fifth and Bloomfield streets was draped in long streamers of black and white, while the sentries stood guard at the entrance in full uniform.

Today the body is lying in state at the clubhouse and will remain there until Sunday next, when the funeral will take place with all the fitting ceremony in honor of the young man who gave up his life on June 9, 1918, following injuries received from bursting shrapnel during the Alsne-Marne fighting between June 1 and 5.

There was a large gathering present at the clubhouse yesterday when the body arrived and during the evening. It is expected that many more will pay their respects from now until noon on Sunday. The guard of honor consists of service men, members of the post, and they will be on duty day and night until the funeral.

Announcement of the final arrange-

ments for the funeral was made this morning. The funeral cortege will proceed from the clubhouse at Fifth and Bloomfield streets up Bloomfield street to the Masonic Clubhouse at Eleventh and Bloomfield streets, where services will be held. After the services the cortege will go down Eleventh street to Garden street, down Garden street to Fourth street, along Fourth street to Monroe street, down Monroe street to First street, along First street to Bloomfield street, thence to Newark street, from Newark street to Washington street, and north on Washington street to Fourteenth street and the viaduct, where the casket will be removed

from the gun car to a hearse, which will proceed to the cemetery. Walter Patterson, past commander of the post, is chairman of the funeral committee.

The funeral procession will be made up as follows: Police Department detail, national colors and standards of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, company of Marines under command of Captain Betts (secured through the courtesy of Major Barber in command of the detachment of Marines stationed in Hoboken), 104 Engineers, National Guard; Corporal Chris. A. Mohr, Jr., Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, George D. Frommel commanding; Rock of the Marne Post No. 133, Veterans of Foreign Wars; Grand Army of the Republic detachment in command of Captain Flattery, General Arthur MacArthur Post, Veterans of Spanish War; Hoboken Post, American Legion; Reliable Council, Jr. O. U. A. M.; Foresters of America, Masonic lodges led by the Zemzem Band and Drum and Drill Corps. The Masons will be headed by Nelson M. Nelson, master of Hoboken Lodge No. 35. Next in line will be the Pentalpha Chapter and the Knights Templar, and then will come the caisson, accompanied by the pallbearers and the firing squad, and followed by the father of the dead soldier and his two brothers, these in turn being followed by the Hoboken War Mothers and the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Mohr Post.

It was announced this morning that R. G. Woodside, commander-in-chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, cannot be present at the funeral, but will be represented by Reuel W. Elton, adjutant-general of the national organization, and Walter I. Joyce, national quartermaster-general, and John Mulligan, commander of the State Department of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. The Foresters will be headed by Warren J. Jobes, of Hoboken.

Following his death on June 9, 1918, Corporal Mohr was buried at Corboyn, France, to the rear of the battlefield of Chateau-Thierry, Chaplain Peters officiated at his burial. He was a member of Company D, Thirty-eighth Infantry, attached to the Third Division of Regulars. This regiment was given official recognition by General Pershing in his report to Congress. It was known as "The Rock of the Marne" Regiment.

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Services Held Over Body Of Chris. Mohr

**Remains of First Hoboken Boy to Fall Overseas Are
Brought to Brooklyn—Will Lie in State in
Veterans' Headquarters Here.**

The body of Christopher Alexander Mohr, Jr., the first Hoboken boy to make the supreme sacrifice in France, arrived yesterday on the United States Transport Cantigny at the foot of Fifty-eighth street, Brooklyn. Mohr's body was among 278 others, whose homes were formerly in every corner of the United States.

Corporal Mohr was killed in action in France on June 9, 1918. His company was tearing over the top when a German shell exploded in the center of the little contingent. The Hoboken boy was leading his squad when one of the fragments of shell penetrated his body and he expired in a short time.

Yesterday at Brooklyn the body of Mohr was singled out and short services were held. Among the organizations present from Hudson County were the Chris H. Mohr Post, V. F. W., which was named for the dead man; Jacob F. Cline Post of Union Hill; Mrs. Cline, State War Mother, and Duffy Auxiliary, connected with the Mohr Post. County Clerk J. J. McGovern, who knew the hero from childhood and the boy's parents, together with many friends, were also present.

The body will lie in state at the headquarters of the Chris H. Mohr Post on Thursday and will remain

there until Sunday at 12 o'clock noon, when it will be removed to the Masonic Club at Eleventh and Bloomfield streets. The military post will hold services over the body on Saturday evening and the Masonic Lodges will hold final services over the remains on Sunday. Interment will be made in Fairview Cemetery.

Corporal Mohr was a son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Mohr. He was born and raised in Hoboken and attended School No. 8. He was engaged in the coal and ice business and entered the service on September 23, 1917, being among the first of the Hoboken boys to enter the service. He was sent to Camp Dix, where he was made a member of Co. K, 312th Infantry. Later he was transferred to Camp Greene, where he was attached to the Thirty-eighth Infantry of the Third Division.

Assigned to this company, he sailed for France in the course of a few months and at Brest was promoted to the grade of corporal. His outfit then went to a training camp, where they were for a short time only, when orders came from Headquarters of the American Expeditionary Forces to move to the front.

He was a member of Hoboken Lodge, No. 35, F. & A. M., and several auxiliary chapters.

Plans will be made for the hat dance to be held in the City Hall Armory on St. Patrick's night. The proceeds are to be used for relief work among the ex-service men and their families.

CHRISTOPHER CAHILL'S REMAINS AT BROOKLYN

Word has reached Hoboken that the body of Christopher Cahill, who was a member of Company B, Sixty-ninth Regiment, and who was killed in action late in 1917 in Europe, had reached Bush Terminal, Brooklyn.

Cahill formerly resided on Willow Terrace, Hoboken, and his late father was custodian of Public School No. 9, Hoboken. Two sisters, residing in Jersey City, survive him. He was a member of Our Lady of Grace parish and of Hoboken Council, Knights of Columbus.

FATHER OF MOHR FAINTS AT SERVICES

Family Overcome After Hearing Taps—First Hoboken Man Killed in War

Foremost in the line of caskets at the funeral services yesterday of 178 American soldiers who lost their lives in France, was that of Corporal Chris J. Mohr, Co. D, 38th Infantry, who was the first man from Hudson county to give his life for the United States in the late war.

Half a dozen wreaths covered the casket. Near the casket stood Corporal Mohr's father, Christopher; his mother, and sisters, Christina and Lillian, of 123 Monroe street, Hoboken.

At the conclusion of the services, when taps was blown by a bugler from the 22nd Infantry, the family stepped to the casket, where the father of the young soldier fell in a faint, and it was some time before he was revived. His mother and sisters were also overcome and sobbed audibly.

The funeral services were held on Pier 2, Army Base, Brooklyn. Jewish, Catholic and Protestant chaplains conducted the services. About 500 attended.

First from Hudson County

Corporal Mohr was one of the first Hoboken men to enlist, in the beginning of the war. He was assigned to an infantry regiment, and after going to Camp Greene was sent to the 38th Infantry, with which he sailed overseas, taking part in their campaigns

until he was killed, on June 9, 1918. He was buried in Corboin, France.

In addition to the members of the Chris Mohr Post, other organizations that have been invited to attend the funeral are the Corporal Arthur Duffy Auxiliary, Rock of the Marne Post, Hoboken Lodge, F. & A. M., Simpson Grotto, Court Harmony, Foresters of America Jr. O. U. A. M. and the K. C.

Corporal Mohr was 23 years old when he was killed. He was the first Hudson county man to meet his death in action. Commander Robert Woodside, a former 38th Infantry officer, will head the Rock of the Marne post at the funeral.

Corporal Mohr's body will be brought to Hoboken on Thursday and will lie in state at the headquarters of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post, which bears his name, at Fifth and Bloomfield streets. Funeral arrangements, which are in charge of Ivins Applegate, have not yet been completed, but it is known that Rev. August F. Bender, pastor of the Hudson City Reformed church, will officiate.

The body of Corporal Christopher A. Mohr, Jr., the first Hoboken boy to fall in battle in France in the late war, will arrive in Hoboken this afternoon, and be taken to the headquarters of the Veterans of Foreign Wars post which bears his name, where it will lie in state until noon, Sunday.

Funeral services will take place at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon in the Masonic Club at Eleventh and Bloomfield streets, after which the boy will be carried on a gun caisson through the principal streets of the city. Rev. August F. Bender of Jersey City, will officiate at the services.

The funeral procession will be headed by the color bearers of the principal ex-service and patriotic organizations of the county, and will be impressive for its display of massed flags. The members of Chris A. Mohr Post, V. F. W., in full uniform will accompany the body Sunday noon directly from the post headquarters to the Masonic Club.

Following the services the funeral procession will form as follows: A police escort, color bearers with massed flags, Chris A. Mohr Post military band; a company of U. S. marines from Brooklyn; Company A and Company D, of 104th Engineers Regiment, State National Guard; members of Chris A. Mohr Post, Hoboken Post, American Legion, Arthur Duffy Ladies' Auxiliary V. TREE PLANTED IN PARK IN MEMORY OF BOY WHO FELL

Large Crowd at Ceremony
—Clerk McGovern
Speaks.

There was a big crowd present on Sunday afternoon in Church Square Park, Hoboken, when, amid impressive ceremonies a tree was planted in memory of Corporal Chris A. Mohr, Jr., the first Hoboken boy to give his life for his country in the great war. The ceremony was carried out under auspices of Corporal Chris A. Mohr, Jr., Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, of Hoboken, the organization named in honor of the dead soldier. There were present also deputations from the American Legion, City of Hoboken Post, Corporal Duffy Auxiliary, V. F. W., and the Hoboken War Mothers.

An impressive and eloquent plea for justice to the men who suffered in the cause of country was made by County Clerk John J. McGovern, the principal speaker at the ceremony. He pointed out that nothing could now be done for the men who had died, beyond paying eternal honor to their memory, but that there was a debt which the nation owed to the living and which was being neglected in a shameful manner.

The Soldiers' Rehabilitation Bureau in Washington, said the County Clerk, was deliberately turning down many cases on trivial technical points. How much better would it be, he asked, if the authorities were to err the other way, and give the benefit of the doubt to the men. As it was there were many deserving cases which were being ignored and dismissed.

The speaker said that the fact that the tree is planted in front of the High School would serve as a constant reminder to the young men and women who attended the school that this young soldier had died that the world might be made safe for democracy, and it would serve to them as a beacon light for the future.

The County Clerk concluded with an impressive and eloquent plea that those who have demanded to carry on the work for which these young men died would never forget the sacrifices they had made, would never forget that they had given their lives for the honor and glory of their country and that they had handed on to us a task to make sure, by our

own efforts and our own work, that they had not died in vain.

The War Mothers and the members of Corp. Duffy Auxiliary assembled at the Chris Mohr Post club house on Bloomfield street and marched with the members of the latter organization to the park.

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CAISSON USED FIRST TIME IN HOBOKEN

Full Military Honors Paid
to Sergeant Thomas J.

POLICE BAND HEADS ESCORT

The funeral of Sergeant Thomas J. Walsh, who was killed in the late war on October 10, 1918, while a member of Company M of the 113th Infantry of the Blue and Gray Division was held in Hoboken yesterday.

It was the first funeral held in Hoboken of those killed in the late war in which a caisson was used as a hearse and it made a most impressive sight as the cortege proceeded through the city.

The Chris A. Mohr Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, made the arrangements for the military part of the funeral, the caisson being secured through Clinton E. Fisk Post of Jersey City. It was held from the home of the deceased soldier's aunt, Mrs. Emma Kerrigan of 74 Jefferson street, Hoboken, to St. Joseph's church where a solemn high mass of requiem was celebrated.

Following the services in the church, the cortege passed through the streets in the lower section of the city, rounded the city hall on its way to Holy Name cemetery where interment was made.

The funeral procession was led by the Hoboken Police band. A military detail of infantry from the regular army acted as escort.

There was a delegation of the Chris A. Mohr Post and representatives from the Hoboken War Mothers in line and a long line of coaches containing the friends and relatives brought up in the rear.

ASKS PEOPLE TO PAY TRIBUTE TO CORPORAL MOHR

Mayor Griffin Requests That
Flags Be Placed at
Half-Mast.

In an official proclamation issued this morning Mayor Griffin requests that the people of Hoboken will fly their flags at half-mast tomorrow from noon until 2 o'clock in honor of Corporal Chris. A. Mohr, Jr., the first Hoboken soldier to give his life for his country in the World War, and that those who are able to do so will take part in the funeral ceremonies and parade tomorrow, beginning at noon. The body is lying in state in the headquarters of the veterans' post that bears his name.

The full program for the funeral ceremonies was published in yesterday's Hudson Observer. The assembly will be at noon at the clubhouse of the Corporal Chris. A. Mohr, Jr. Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, named in honor of the dead soldier. All those who are taking part are requested to be at the headquarters of the post, at Fifth and Bloomfield streets, not later than noon time.

Announcement was made this morning that former service men who still have their uniforms are requested to be present and to wear them. Hoboken Post, American Legion, has sent an official notice all all of its members to attend the funeral and to assemble at Fifth and Bloomfield street not later than 12 o'clock. Service men who have not their uniforms are also asked to attend and to wear their decorations.

This morning, in the vicinity of the clubhouse, there were many flags flying at half-mast. The clubhouse is draped in black and white streamers. All night long a guard of honor has been on duty and this will be maintained today and tonight and until the time of the funeral tomorrow.

Yesterday many visitors were at the clubhouse and every honor was shown to the memory of the dead soldier. Mayor Griffin and his fellow City Commissioners will attend the funeral tomorrow. There will be many other prominent citizen also present.

It will be shipped to Hoboken upon receipt of instructions as to where to send the body.

The body is to be brought to Hoboken following services at the army piers in Brooklyn on Sunday, and taken to the rooms of the Chris Mohr, Jr., Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, at Fifth and Bloomfield streets. There it will lie in state until the following Sunday, when a military funeral will be held in Hoboken. Undertaker Applegate will have charge of the arrangements.

Corporal Mohr was only 23 years old when he was killed on June 9, 1918, while fighting in the Belleau Woods on the banks of the Aisne. Only nine members of his original company returned home, the company having been reorganized three times. The nine, known as the survivors of "the Watch on the Rhine Company," will attend his funeral in Hoboken. In addition to the members of the Chris Mohr Jr. Post, the War Mothers and other military units, members of Hoboken Lodge No. 35, F. & A. M., Simpson Grotto, Court Harmony, Foresters of America, and other organizations will participate.

SEVEN THOUSAND CASUALTIES ARE RECORDED SO FAR

Over One Thousand Killed in Action, Which Includes Those Lost at Sea—Three Hundred and Forty-two Missing.

THIRTY-THREE NAMES ON THE SUNDAY LIST

Washington, June 9.—The first official summary of American casualties, issued to-day, places the total, including 198 reported overnight, at 7,315. Those killed in action, including 291 lost at sea, total 1,033; died from wounds, 310; died from disease, 1,192; died from causes due to action, etc., 393.

The men wounded in action total 4,406; missing in action, including prisoners, 342.

Thirty-three men were killed in action in the overnight list and twelve marine casualties were reported.

This list does not include the marines or the navy, the men lost at sea being aboard the transports.

The largest number were lost from the Tuscania, when 209 men went down.

Washington, June 9—Five officers and twenty-eight enlisted men are named as killed in action in the General Pershing list of army casualties issued today, the longest casualty list given out since the American forces reached France. The list contains 198 names.

The United States Marine Corps today announced the death of two enlisted men wounded in action and the severe wounding of ten others.

The army casualties follow: Killed in action, 33; died of wounds, 9; died of disease, 11; died of aeroplane accident, 1; died of accident and other causes, 4; wounded severely, 46; wounded, 74; missing in action, 20; total, 198.

MITCHELL TELLS OF THE GRIND OF MARINE CORPS TRAINING, BUT "GAME" AND HAPPY IN HIS WORK

Dispatch Man, Now at Paris
Island, Says Place Is Nothing
Like the "Gay Paree" the
Name Might Suggest—Finds
His Bunkie's Name Is Also
Mitchell.

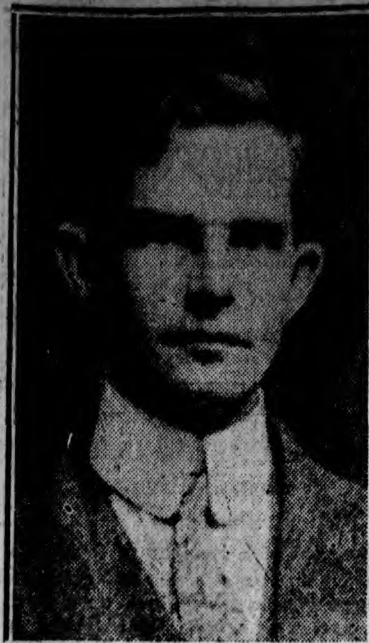
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BEST BOYS OF NATION ANXIOUS TO GET "OVER"

(By "MITCH.")

Marine Barracks, Paris Island, S. C.,
 June 20.—The "guy" who named this
 place after gay Paree must have been
 an ironic kind of a fellow. I don't
 believe any branch of the service puts
 its recruits through a more strenuous
 course than the marines.

I shall certainly be glad when we
 "shove" off this island. With blistered
 hands and sore feet I can readily ap-
 preciate what "S. O. S." said he went
 through during his training course.
 But, we luckily, will leave the island
 from all present indications, quicker
 than any bunch up to a few weeks ago.
 I "hit" the island Friday, June 7; put in
 two days at quarantine, and since then
 it has been one thing after
 another, as one recruit expressed him-
 self recently. From 5:30 a. m. until
 taps at 10 o'clock p. m. we have had
 but a few leisure moments, except to-
 day, which is Sunday. But it is making
 men of us, both mentally and physically.
 Our battalion is expected to leave
 maneuver grounds, the second stage of a
 marine's training, Monday or Tuesday.
 It has been customary for recruits to
 stay here three weeks, so it will be seen
 how rapidly we are being rushed to
 take our place "over there." We ex-

pect to be grappling with the Hun long before winter sets in.

Thursday our company, with others of our battalion, were assigned to do police work. Some dug post holes; others assisted the carpenters, while others hauled wood. I worked most of the day, with a number of others, grading a field for tents. Two keeled over. They were not used to the work. But I only suffered about seven blisters on my hands and an unutterably tired feeling that made me sleep soundly.

There are very few back home who realize the strenuousness of a marine's training. I did not, despite the reading of letters from S. O. S.

But if two weeks ago I had known what I know now, I should have done the same thing I did—enlist in the marines. A private during time of war is different from one in time of peace. Men who have been used to luxurious living are here always willing to undergo anything that they might be fit to fight their country's battles. Their general spirit of the men here is sublime. No sacrifice is too great for them. When the commander of our battalion asked us the other day if we wanted to go to France, all I heard responded in the affirmative, and with an emphasis that left no doubt that they were ready to make the sublime sacrifice.

Of course drilling is the main part of a marine's training, but it is mixed with hard, physical work, mental work and Swedish exercises. The last named are great for developing the muscles.

As far as I have learned, a marine is an amphibious fighter, and as near all-knowing as any mortal can be. He knows everything worth knowing, from washing clothes to going "over the top."

We expect to reach the main barracks, the third stage of a marine's training, this week, and two weeks or so later to get on the range, the fourth and final stage of a marine's training here. Then we are to "shove" off for Quantico, Va., the overseas training camp.

At the quarantine camp and here the Y. M. C. A. conducts its great work. The K. of C. have no building here, but looks after us just the same, as is attested by this paper furnished by that organization. At the main barracks where we go some time this week both organizations are well established. There are three or four Y. M. C. A. and K. of C. buildings at that camp.

We were "shot" in the right arm yesterday and are to be "shot" twice again. Last Sunday we were vaccinated. There were a bunch of sore arms in our company last night and today.

There are practical jokers in the marines as well as everywhere else. The Recruits at quarantine are given a lecture soon after they arrive. A notice was posted on a blackboard at the "Y." building, "Closed; Go to Lecture." Somebody rubbed out the word word "lecture" and substituted "hell." That made an odd looking notice for a "Y" building.

I knew there were many John Mitchells in the world, but I never knew that any were born in Bedford but the writer. However, my "bunkie," or tentmate, is John Mitchell of Bedford, but Bedford, Ind. I was dumbfounded when I learned he had my name and was in a town by the same name as I.

Though most everyone in our battalion wants to go to France, it is hard to predict where each will finally land. You are liable to be ordered to any place on the face of the earth. And there is no appeal from such order.

MANY MEN LISTED AS AMONG MISSING

Washington, July 16.—One hundred and eighty-nine names are on three lists of casualties given out today. One of these is the usual daily list of the Army given out by the War Department. ERSEYME D IN LIST CASUALTY

Army Names Fourteen As Killed in Action and Ten as Dead From Wounds Received in Action.

THREE MARINES DIED IN ACTION IS REPORT

Washington, July 18.—Sixty-four casualties are reported among American soldiers abroad in lists issued by the War Department and marine corps today. The army announce fifty-seven casualties, including the names of three men from New Jersey, and the marine corps reported seven.

The army list is divided as follows: Killed in action, fourteen; died from wounds, ten; died from disease, six; died from accident and other causes, two; severely wounded, twenty; slightly wounded, one; missing, four.

NATION'S HONOR ROLL G LONGER DAILY; MANY ADDED BY THE RECE

Army and Navy Lists Given Out Yesterday, Longest Yet Furnished by General Pershing—Many New Jersey and New York Names Included Among the Dead and Wounded—Indications Are Some Local Units Have Been in the Fighting.

NOT LIKELY THAT ANY OF THOSE NAMED WERE
IN RECENT ENGAGEMENTS AS LISTS ARE DAYS OLD.

Washington, July 21.—Reports reaching Washington today from General Pershing, commanding general of the American Expeditionary Force in France, show 199 casualties in the United States army and twenty-six in the Marine Corps.

Of the army casualties forty-three were killed in action, twenty-three died of wounds, twenty-three died of disease, one died of airplane accident, eight died of other accidents, seventy-one were wounded severely and thirty are missing in action.

In the Marine Corps forces twelve were killed, two died of wounds, and twelve were severely wounded in action.

DEATH TAKES HEAVY TOLL OF OUR MEN FIGHTING TO MAKE WORLD SAFE FOR DEMOCRACY BY DESTROYING AUTOCRACY

Washington, July 27.—One hundred and eighty casualties among American forces abroad are announced in lists issued today by the War Department and the Marine Corps. The army reports 168 casualties, including the name of one Jerseyman, and the marines announce twelve.

The name of the Jerseyman listed is Private Cornelius M. Lefante, 13 West Nineteenth street, Bayonne, killed in action.

The army list is divided as follows: Killed in action, sixty-four; died from wounds, twenty; died from disease, five; died from aeroplane accident, one; wounded severely, sixty; wounded slightly, two; wounded, degree undetermined, fourteen; missing, two.

The marines' list includes one dead in action, seven wounded severely and four missing.

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LONG LIST, GIVEN OUT BY ARMY, OF OUR CASUALTIES

**Four Hundred and Seven Names
on Longest List Yet Given Out
Shows the Start of the Heavy
Fighting.**

JERSEYMEN AND OTHERS FROM NEARBY ON LIST

Washington, Aug. 5.—The Army list of casualties given out today is the longest single one yet announced. It reflects the severe fighting that began on July 15 with the stopping of the German drive and the beginning of the counter-drive.

PRIVATE ROBERT BRASS DIES OF WOUNDS OVERSEAS

Was Wounded in Early Fighting
of Marne and Spent Six
Weeks in Hospital.

WROTE HIS MOTHER FIVE
DAYS BEFORE HE DIED

Word has been received from the War Department by Mrs. Ida Brass of 367 Newark street, Hoboken, that her son, Private Robert Brass of the Forty-ninth Infantry, who had twice been wounded in action, had died from wounds in an hospital in France.

He was only 19 years of age and enlisted in the army shortly after the outbreak of war. Assigned to an infantry regiment he went overseas in 1917 with one of the first contingents of the expeditionary forces.

In the early fighting at the Marne he was wounded and spent six weeks in a base hospital, but was sufficiently recovered to return to the line, but September 12 last he was the victim of Hun shell in Lorraine, which brought about his death.

Removed to a hospital he seemed to be getting along very nicely, though his wounds were very serious, but five days before his death he wrote to his mother saying that he was again wounded and in hospital, but getting along very well.

In the letter he said that he would write again and say how he was getting along, but suffering a relapse he died before the second letter could be penned. He died on September 29 according to the telegram received from the War Department by Mrs. Brass. She is bearing up very well under the bereavement.

AUSTRIAN LOSES SON, READY TO FIGHT HIMSELF

Joseph Smith Makes Supreme
Sacrifice; Father, 41 Years
Old, Ready to Go.

SON ENLISTED WHEN
HE WAS 18 YEARS OLD

Son of an Austrian father, born himself on the soil of Austria, but a resident of Hoboken since he came to this country twelve years ago, Joseph Smith, 20, of 817 Park avenue, Hoboken, has given his life fighting the Germans. The official casualty list today cites Private Smith of Company I. of the 113th Infantry as having been killed in action.

Mr. and Mrs. John Smith, his father and mother, and his sisters, Lucy and Anna Smith, live at 817 Park avenue, Hoboken. Mr. Smith, a native of Austria, still a subject of Austria, but a declarant in this country, said last night that he was proud his boy had been able to make the supreme sacrifice in the fight for humanity and liberty.

"I am proud of my boy," he said. "His loss is a great sorrow to us, but a glorious memory. I am 41 years of age and registered in the last draft. If the United States government will take me I will willingly go to fight the Germans."

Private Smith was but eighteen years of age when he joined the old Fourth of New Jersey and was in the Mexican border campaign. He went into training in Alabama when the Fourth were federalized and last June left for France.

In a letter to his mother dated August 13, he said that he was well, and that his folks should not worry about him, as he would come out all right.

He made several efforts to enlist in the Army before he was finally accepted and attached to Company M of the Forty-ninth Infantry he sailed overseas on July 9. In France, according to letters received by his parents he was transferred to the 109th Infantry and this regiment was in a division operating in the Verdun sector.

The last letter received from the dead soldier was written on September 21 and received by his mother on October 9. In it he said he was well and seeing hard fighting. He was killed on October 3.

His father had taken part in the parade in Hoboken on Thursday night and was in a moving picture theatre later when he was summoned and informed that a telegram had been received for him notifying him of his son's death on the battlefield.

"I am proud of my boy, and I am only sorry I was not with him fighting when he died on the battlefield," said Mr. Toomy.

Mr. Toomy, Sr. has been one of the leading spirits in the fight to have the postal employees recognized by the Department and has been instrumental in securing some of the harsh regulations eliminated.

The dead soldier is survived by his father and mother, three brothers, Edward Jr., who is also in the Army, Stephen and James, and three sisters Margaret, Anna and Mary.

James F. Beasty, a prominent member of the Madison A. C. of Hoboken and brother of John Beasty of 818 Willow avenue, with whom he lived before he was drafted into the army, has been killed in action in France, according to a telegram received by John Beasty from the War Department.

The War Department telegram gives September 30 as the date on which the soldier was killed, and this, together with the fact that John Beasty received two souvenir cards from his brother, the post mark of which was October 10, has raised some doubt as to whether there has been some mistake.

While the cards were written upon they were not in the handwriting of Private James Beasty, but his name was signed to them. The cards themselves bore no date, but the post mark on the envelope is "10-10."

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JAMES CAHILL MISSING IN ACTION, IS MESSAGE

James J. Cahill, who lived with his sister, Mrs. Patrick Penachio, of 114 Monroe street, Hoboken, is listed as missing in action since September 26, according to a telegram received by Mrs. Penachio.

Private Cahill, was of Co. B, 311th Infantry. He was drafted in April, 1918, and before being sent over seas, trained at Camp Dix.

The young man had been employed by the Lackawanna Railroad before his enlistment. His mother and father died within eleven days of each other after he had joined Uncle Sam's forces. Cahill is a member of the Madison A. C.

Patrick Penachio, Cahill's cousin, has recently joined the army and is now stationed at Camp Dix.

Private Cahill has one other sister, Mrs. Marie Farber.

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WAR CROSS FOR LESLIE JOBES, HOBOKEN HERO

Son of Warren Jobes, Noted Forester, Led His Men in Face of Gun Fire.

WAS KILLED IN ACTION
AT VERDUN OCTOBER 8

To Lieutenant Leslie M. Jobes, Company A of the 115th Infantry, killed in action on Oct. 8, last, in the forest fighting in the Verdun sector, has been awarded the distinguished Service Cross, the coveted American decoration for bravery in action.

The citation sent out for publication is as follows:

"The commander-in-chief, in the name of the President, has awarded the distinguished service cross to the following named officers and soldiers for the acts of extraordinary heroism described after their names:

"First Lieut. LESLIE J. JOBES, deceased, 115th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Verdun, France, Oct. 8, 1918. Lieut Jobes, while in command of his platoon during an engagement of the 29th Division, disregarding his own safety and encouraging his men, both by words and action. While leading his platoon in an attack on a machine gun nest he was instantly killed, but the attack begun by him continued and resulted in the machine gun nest being captured. Next of kin, Mrs. M. C. Jobes, 1309 Bloomfield street, Hoboken, N. J."

Son of Warren Jobes

Lieut. Jobes was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Jobes, of 1309 Bloomfield street, Hoboken. Mr. Jobes is a state officer in the Foresters of America, and is a well known man. The heroic soldier displayed the utmost gallantry in the face of heavy machine gun fire, and a reckless regard for his own life. He was but 24 years of age and one of the most popular young men in Hoboken.

Enlisted Early in War.

Born in New York, City he was educated in the public schools in Hoboken, and was a graduate of the Hoboken High School. He took up architecture for a profession and was making long strides in his profession when he heeded the call to arms and enlisted and went through the third officers' training school at Camp McClellan, where he graduated with rank of second lieutenant.

He went overseas with the 104th Infantry and was later assigned to the 115th Infantry. On Oct. 3 he was promoted to a first lieutenantcy, and five

days later was killed in action. The regiment had been in continuous battle for 22 days in the difficult Argonne Forest sector.

According to a letter which Warren Jobes received from Captain E. H. Munshower, the command of Company A, of which the Hoboken boy was a lieutenant, the fighting was over very difficult and rough ground.

Commended by Captain.

"Part of the ground was thickly wooded and almost impassible," writes Captain Munshower. "Your son was directed to take his platoon and carry an objective. He accomplished this through a heavy fire and under wicked machine gun fire."

"When he had accomplished his mission he found it was necessary to capture a machine gun nest which had his new objective under fire and unless this was done, his position was untenable. It was while bravely leading his platoon through the machine gun barrage in this second task that he met his death. He was an efficient officer, kind to his men and thoughtful of their welfare."

It was this matchless courage and disregard for his personal welfare that resulted in the machine gun nest being wiped out, as after the lieutenant fell, his men carried on, completed the task which he had started and avenged his death in no uncertain manner.

Mr. and Mrs. Jobes are proud of their dead hero, and are gratified that a fitting award has been accorded to him by the Government.

CAPTAIN KEELEY, MARINE VETERAN, KILLED FIGHTING

Was Hoboken Man With Record
of Eighteen Years In Famous
Corps of Sea Soldiers.

PRIVATE LEWIS OF
ARMY ALSO KILLED

Two Hoboken boys have fallen in
France. Captain James Keeley, com-
mander of Company A, Fifth Regiment,
U. S. Marines has been killed at the
Meuse on October 3, while leading his
company over the top.
Patrick Keeley, his uncle living at

to that effect. Captain Keeley was 36

His brother Emmanuel Lewis of 108
Seventh street has received word of

death in a letter from the dead hero's company commander, Captain Otto P. Mayr.

Lewis fell on October 3 at Blanc Mount Ridge. "His conduct as a man and his valor as a soldier will be an inspiration to his comrades who are left to carry on the fight" wrote Captain Mayr in apprizing Emmanuel Lewis of his brother's end.

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THEO. HILDEBRAND ESCAPES BATTLES, PNEUMONIA KILLS

Hoboken Enlisted Man Twice
Wounded, But Was On
Way to Recovery.

NELSON ROSS ON LIST
AS SLIGHTLY WOUNDED

In four battles in France and wounded twice Theodore J. Hildebrand succumbed while recovering in a Hospital from the second wound, a victim of pneumonia. He was 27 years of age and lived with his people at 124 Bloomfield street, Hoboken.

A pathetic circumstances in connection with this hero's death is the fact that only a few days before he passed away he had written a letter to his mother stating that he was in a hospital from a second wound, but that he was recovering.

His injuries were such, however, he stated, that he would be unable to go into the trenches again and he was on the list for being sent back home.

An Unfulfilled Re-union.

He pictured in his letter the glorious reunion they would have as they all sat around the table at Christmas time. The family bore up well under the news of his death, notification of which they received a week ago, but when the letter arrived from him yesterday, with peace having since the time of his death, his relatives felt the blow very hard.

Hildebrand enlisted in Philadelphia over a year ago with the 109th Infantry and had been in France three months. He took part in four of the stiffest battles in which the Americans were engaged and in two of those he was wounded, but though he would have recovered from his wounds he fell a victim to pneumonia.

Private Ross Wounded.

Another Hoboken boy on yesterday's casualty list is Private Nelson Ross, of 310 Bloomfield street. His father Alexander Ross has received a telegram from the War Department to the effect that his son was slightly wounded. He is 26 years of age and was one of the first drafted men to leave Hoboken. He sailed overseas last April and has been in a number of engagements.

FORBES FAMILY IS DOUBLY BEREAVED

Son-in-Law Killed in France;
Daughter-in-Law Dies in
New Orleans.

The family of William D. Forbes, formerly a well known resident of Hoboken, but now of New London, Conn., has been doubly bereaved in the death of Mr. Forbes' son-in-law while in service in France, and in the death of his daughter-in-law in New Orleans.

On September 29 Lieutenant Murray Cramer was killed in action. He was with the 107th Regiment, formerly the Seventh New York Regiment. Lieutenant Cramer married Miss Ruth Forbes on November 2, 1917, while he was in the service.

On September 27 Mrs. Reginald Forbes died in New Orleans. Reginald Forbes is chief of the forestry system of the state of Louisiana.

Mr. and Mrs. Forbes and their daughter, Mrs. Cramer, are now in New Orleans, having gone there when the first bereavement came. It was while there that they got the news of Lieutenant Cramer's death in France.

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JAMES VERBIST MEETS DEATH IN ACTION OCT. 13

**Son of Hoboken Park Keeper
Had Been Optimistic Over
Return by Christmas**

HAS ANOTHER BROTHER IN ARMY IN FRANCE

Another Hoboken boy, a member of the "Old Fourth" has made the supreme sacrifice in France, James Verbist, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Verbist, of 228 Madison street, having been killed in action.

A telegram to that effect was received yesterday afternoon by the lad's mother. The War Department telegram stated that Private Verbist had been killed in action on October 13.

Private James Verbist was a well set up young man and was 21 years of age. Well known and a most popular boy in the mile square city, he was a member of the Stevens Battalion, and when war was declared he enlisted in Company M of the Fourth Regiment at the armory in Hoboken.

Enlisted When 19 Years.

He was then only 19 years of age. With the Fourth Regiment he went to Anniston for training and went overseas with that regiment and had been in France for nine months.

During that time he had been in a number of battles. His letters to his father and mother were of the cheeriest nature. As far back as July he maintained that the Huns would not get him and that he would be home for Christmas.

The last letter received from him by his parents had in it the same note of optimism and the reiterated declaration that the war would be over in time to get him home by Christmas.

He was born in Hoboken and was a graduate of No. 9 school. In addition to being in Stevens Battalion of Cadets he was a member of the Madison A. C.

A Brother in France.

A brother, Frank Verbist, is also in service in France, but the lads did not meet on foreign soil. Frank made four attempts to enlist in the Army and Navy at the same time as his brother, but was turned down, and was taken in the draft. He was assigned to office work but registered such a healthy kick about being kept in this country that he was transferred to overseas duty.

Frank Verbist, Sr., the dead hero's father, is of French stock. He was a park officer in Hoboken until recently, when he was appointed janitor at the vocational training school at the Library building. He is a member of the American Defense Society and has been bitter in his denunciation of the pro-German element in the city.
