In compliance with the direc-
tion of the Aerie, a holding com-
pany within the membership of
the Aerie for the purpose of own-
ing and maintaining a clubhouse
for the use of the Aerie, has
been organized and incorporated
under the laws of the State of
New Jersey.

This Association has by direc-
tion of the membership respond-
ing to a call for a meeting held
on Sunday, December 12, 1920,
purchased the five story and
cellar brick apartment house,
situated and known as No. 126
Hudson Street, this city, for
the sum of \$30,000.00.

The building is situated on a
plot of ground 25'0" front by
100'0" in depth ; the cellar and
first or store floor extending the
full depth of lot and the four
upper floors extending about
65'0" in depth.

The cellar contains two bowl-
ing alleys, toilets and heating
plant to heat the store floor and
floor above same ; the store floor

contains the present store, large room at rear of store and a meeting hall extending to rear of lot. The second floor contains a living apartment containing seven rooms and the three upper floors each contain two living apartments of five rooms. Halls, cellar and store are equipped for electric lighting.

It is the intention of your Committee to alter the store floor for club purposes as follows: Front portion of the present store to be equipped and decorated for a library or lounging room; at rear of this room, pool and billiard room, Secretary's office and buffet and the hall at rear of this floor to be equipped for a lodge room.

This course will permit the retention of the tenants in the upper part of the building which will at the present rentals mean an income of nearly \$2,600.00 per year, this together with the receipts from the bowling alleys, pool tables and card rooms will net a large income for the Association.

This venture is probably out of the ordinary in the manner of purchasing a clubhouse, but under present conditions it is an investment which can only meet with success as the income from the tenants in the upper part of the building will more than carry the overhead charges, such as interest, taxes, water rent, insurance, etc., and the surplus from this source together with the surplus from the club feature will establish a fund from which will first take up the mortgage on the property and then take up the script or stock held by the members; thus within the next few years the building will be held free and clear of all incumbrances.

In order to successfully promote this investment it will be necessary for the membership of the Aerie to subscribe for script in the incorporated body; this script is being sold at the rate of \$10.00 per share, and is non-assessable and will be taken up at par value from time to time in such amounts as may be authorized by the Association.

As the Association will take title to the aforesaid premises on April 1st, next, it is important that each and every member subscribe for as many shares as he may desire to purchase, at the earliest possible date; in order that the balance of the purchase price is in the hands of the Association before the above date. If you cannot pay all now, pay in installments to April 1, 1921.

If you have not been solicited relative to the purchase of stock in this venture, or if you desire any additional information relative to the proposition, would request that you call at the clubhouse, No. 126 Hudson Street, Wednesday evening of any week, between the hours of 8 and 10 o'clock.

In conclusion, we appeal to each and every member of Hokoken Aerie to purchase at least one share of stock in order that we may take our place in the fraternal circle of this city, and as your Committee in charge of this project is composed of level-headed businessmen, it means, that with your help, this venture is bound to be a success.

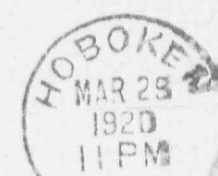

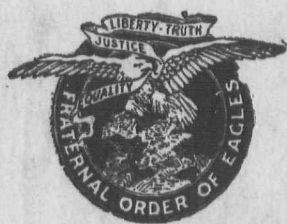
