

New TCH Head Coach Is Named By Trigg Board

Integration Of 9th Grade Classes Set For September

Gordon Perry, a native of Dyersburg, Tenn., has been elected by the Trigg County Board of Education to fill the head football coach job at Trigg County High School in September.

County school superintendent, Roy McDonald made the announcement this week, that also included the announcement of several other decisions made by the Board of Education in its May meeting.

Perry is now serving as a Lieutenant in the U. S. Air Force, stationed at Fort Bragg, N. C. He holds the B. S. and M. A. degrees from Murray State College and majored in general business, mathematics and physical education.

He holds four football letters from Murray, as well as letters in baseball and track. He made an outstanding record while playing college football (1958-1962) as an end and punter.

He is married and has a 15-month-old son. Mr. and Mrs. Perry expect to arrive in Cadiz on August 1 and Mr. Perry will take up pre-school work with the local football team.

Perry replaces former coach Raymond Heffington who has been head Wildcat coach for the past 11 years. Mr. McDonald said Mr. Heffington would be retained on the faculty at TCHS with full class loads.

An assistant football coach will also be named by the Board within a few days to replace David Shore who has notified the Board that he plans to go into another line of work.

The Board also elected two other teachers for the coming fall term. They are Mrs. Connie Hoskins, Graded School teacher; and Raymond Hendricks, who will teach Science in the Junior and Senior High School.

Mrs. Hoskins is a graduate of Murray State College and a native of Beaver Dam, Ky. Mr. Hendricks is still a student in College. Mr. and Mrs. Hoskins expect to move to Cadiz around the first of August.

Mr. Hendricks is a Trigg County High School graduate. He will graduate in June with a major in biological sciences from Austin Peay. He is the son of Mrs. Mae Hendricks who resides on Cunningham Avenue in Cadiz.

The Board will set up a special education class to care for grade school children who have handicaps that prevent them from getting the best educational opportunities out of the regular classroom situations. Mrs. Lucille Nunn, now serving on the High School faculty, will be in charge of the class. She will attend the University of Louisville this summer where she will make a special study of exceptional children.

The Board approved a floor plan submitted by Lee Potter Smith and Associates for remodeling the Baldwin building and making it into offices for the administrative staff of the school system. An order was entered for the preparation of specifications on furniture to be used in the building.

Permission was granted to the City and State to black-top Lafayette Street and the parking area in front of the High School along U. S. 68. School property is directly affected by both of these paving projects.

As a result of a vote by the Board members the 9th Grade from the McUpton School will be transferred to Trigg County High School for the fall term.

Commencement exercises for all eighth grade graduates in the county including McUpton School will be held Monday, May 27 at the Trigg County High School auditorium.

Gov. Combs Appoints Mrs. King Judge

First Woman In County History To Serve In This High Office

Mrs. Myrtle Upton King, widow of the late Marlon King of Canton, has been appointed Judge of Trigg County. The appointment was made this week by Governor Bert T. Combs.

Mrs. King is probably the first woman ever to serve Trigg County as its highest official. She will serve the remainder of this year or until her successor is chosen.

According to Kentucky law it will become the responsibility of the County Democratic Executive Committee to select the Democratic nominee, whose name will appear on the ballot at the general election in November. By the same token the County Republican Executive Committee could also select a nominee.

Mrs. King has had considerable experience in the affairs of the office to which she has just been appointed since she acted as the assistant to her father, the late Judge R. H. Upton, Sr., who was serving his second term as Judge of Trigg County at the time of his death last week.

She is the mother of two children, Mrs. Jimmy A. Calhoun of Cadiz and Lt. Bud King who is serving with the Armed Forces in Newfoundland.

In accepting the appointment, Mrs. King said that she was grateful to be selected and added that she would solicit the help and cooperation of all Trigg Countians in carrying out her new responsibilities. She further stated that it would be her great desire to carry on the affairs of the office in the same manner as did her father.

Record Voter Turnout Seen For Primary

Senate And Representative Races Drawing Local Interest

Only five days remain before Kentucky voters go to the polls May 28 to select party nominees for state offices. As the campaigning goes into the final hours veteran political observers in the state are wording their predictions as to the outcome of the primary elections in a careful manner. Though it is generally agreed that Kentuckians will turn out in record numbers to cast their ballots.

The gubernatorial campaign between former Gov. A. B. Chandler, seeking an unprecedented third term; and his leading opponent Edward T. "Ned" Breathitt of Hopkinsville who is backed by the Combs administration, has been one of the most bitterly fought campaigns in recent Kentucky history.

Other Democratic candidates for Governor are Mrs. Mary Louise Foust of Lexington, and Wilton Benge Cupp.

On the Republican ticket Jesse Nicholas Ryan Cecil is opposed by Louie B. Nunn.

The Democratic slate for Lt. Governor includes John B. Breckinridge, now serving as attorney general of Kentucky, who is opposed by former Lt. Gov. Harry Lee Waterfield. Waterfield is running as Chandler's mate. Breckinridge has not publicly allied with any candidate. There are no candidates for this post on the Republican ticket.

Grand Jury Returns Four Indictments

Five Civil Suits Settled Before Going To Court

The Grand Jury for the May term of Trigg Circuit Court completed its work and was dismissed at noon Wednesday after returning four indictments.

An indictment was returned against Mrs. Henry Wilkinson for uttering a check with forged endorsement. Howard Thomas was indicted for storehouse breaking. James Skinner was indicted for dwelling house breaking; and Glenn Farris was indicted for obstructing justice.

The report of the Grand Jury to Judge Ira D. Smith is as follows:

"The Grand Jury visited the Trigg County Jail and Courthouse and we wish to compliment the Jailor and his wife on the condition of the inside of the jail. We found it to be well kept, clean and in good order. We recommend repair of chimney on the south side of the jail and gutters for all the building; a hole on the west side of the jail needs repairing.

The inside of the courthouse seems to be in good condition with the exception of the Petit Jury room which needs painting. The grounds outside of the Courthouse are well kept.

"We have returned four indictments which we hand to you. This jury considered a charge of assault and battery against Lenora [redacted] but in our opinion the evidence was not sufficient to warrant an indictment in that case. We also considered a charge of hit and run driving against John Radford, Jr., and in that case we also felt the evidence was insufficient to warrant an indictment. We also did not indict in the case against Carl Williams for shooting into a motor vehicle."

Five civil suits appealed from the Trigg County Court to Trigg Circuit Court against Pennyryle Rural Electric Co-op, set for May 22, 23, and 24, were settled before going to trial Wednesday morning.

The petit jury was dismissed by the Court until Monday, May 27.

Set for trial Monday is a suit brought by Bernice Witty, administrator of the estate of Lucien Witty, deceased, against Pollard White and others.

A Commonwealth case against Amill Smith, alias Roy Nuss, who was indicted May 23, 1962, for stealing cattle, has been set for trial on Wednesday, May 29. Smith is presently serving a sentence at Eddyville and will be brought to Cadiz for trial by Warden Luther Thomas.

Low Bids Of \$614,115 Made On City Sewage Project

Five bids on a sewage treatment plant and three bids on the sewerage-lines for a Sewage system for the city were opened here Tuesday afternoon by city officials.

The apparent low bid on the sewerage lines was entered by the Preston Carrol Construction Co., of Clifton, Tenn., at \$483,615.

Tharp Construction Co., of Campbellsville Ky., entered a low bid of \$160,500 for the sewage treatment plant.

The total cost of the sewage system and treatment plant entered by the low bidders was \$644,115 or about \$8,000 higher than engineering estimates.

Mayor Tom Magraw stated that contracts are expected to be awarded to the low bidders within the next few days. Delay of awarding the contracts was made to give the engineers more time to study the bids, as well as for confirmation from the Housing and Home Financing Office in Atlanta, an agency of the Federal government which will help the city in the financing of the project.

Wheat Program Voted Down In Nation, Carries In Trigg

Trigg County farmers voted their approval of marketing quotas in the wheat referendum held throughout the nation May 21. The local vote was 230 for (including 2 ballots received by mail), while 25 farmers voted against the quotas. Two ballots were disallowed. The program carried in Trigg by 90 percent.

On the nationwide scale early returns from 34 states gave 161,035 votes for the program and 232,734 against. Later tabulations showed that 51.2 percent of the nation's farmers rejected the program while 47.8 percent were in favor of it, far short of the 67 percent needed for passage of the program.

Approximately 30 states voted against while only 18 including Kentucky and Tennessee voted favorably. Kentucky's vote was 22,143 for and 3,669 against.

100 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK

The Civil War in Kentucky

One hundred years ago this week, Col. Thomas E. Bramlette, who had raised and commanded the Third Kentucky (Union) In-

fantry Regiment, was nominated for governor by the central committee of the "Union Democratic" party. The committee selected

him as a replacement for Joshua F. Bell, who had been nominated at the party's convention in Louisville in March but, after taking more than a month to consider the matter, had announced on April 24 that he declined the nomination.

Col. Bramlette, then engaged in raising a division for the Union Army and already assured of a general's commission upon completion of the organization, promptly gave up his military career and accepted the nomination. That put two Union Army colonels at the head of the Union Democratic ticket, for Col. Richard T. Jacob, commander of the Ninth Kentucky (Union) Cavalry Regiment, had been nominated for lieutenant governor at the Louisville convention, and had accepted.

Bramlette, who was destined to be elected governor and to serve a full four-year term, during which he would stand up boldly against what he considered oppressive measures taken against citizens of the Commonwealth by his one-time brother officers of the Union Army, was a resident of Columbia, Adair County, and at the outbreak of the war had for five years been circuit judge. He resigned his office to organize and lead the Third Kentucky. In 1862 he accepted President Lincoln's appointment as U. S. District Attorney for Kentucky, and prosecuted Thomas C. Shacklett of Meade County on a treason charge, for aiding Confederates. Shacklett was convicted and sentenced to ten years in prison, but was pardoned in 1864.

Bramlette had been considered at the convention as a possible nominee for governor, but he had received only 77 votes, to 627 for Bell, 171 for Gov. James F. Robinson, the incumbent; 79 for Mortimer M. Benton, 49 for Union Brig. Gen. Jerry T. Boyle and 19 for Brutus J. Clay.

During the same week, Union Brig. Gen. Samuel Powhatan Carter, commanding two cavalry regiments, the First Kentucky and the Seventh Ohio, drove a Confederate force out of Monticello, Wayne County, killing eight, wounding eighteen and

taking thirty-odd prisoners. Carter, a native of Tennessee and a graduate of the U. S. Naval Academy, is described by the Dictionary of American Biography as the only American officer to have been both a major general and a rear admiral. When the Civil War began, he was a Navy lieutenant. He was detached and assigned to organize and drill Tennessee volunteers for the Union Army, as Lt. William Nelson of Kentucky, also a naval officer, was in his native state. Both transferred to the Army and both eventually became major generals. Nelson was killed in 1862, but Carter survived the war and returned to the Navy, being promoted successively to commodore and rear admiral.

United States Fights To Save Bald Eagle

The United States is trying to save the national emblem—the bald eagle—by protecting its golden cousin.

As part of a three-way effort by government agencies, Congress has passed a law protecting all eagles. The bald eagle has been sacred since 1940, but it was often shot mistakenly because it looks like the more populous golden eagle. Both have large, dark brown bodies and a wingspread of about six feet.

To spur public interest in the magnificent bird's welfare, the Post Office recently put a bald eagle design on airmail cards.

To learn why the eagle population is dwindling, the National Audubon Society and the Fish and Wildlife Service are conducting a five year study.

More People, Less Eagles

Once a king of the skies and common over the entire United States, the bald eagle now numbers less than 5,000, says the National Geographic Society.

The guns of hunters, spreading civilization, and the widespread use of insecticides have taken the life and liberty of many bald eagles.

Eagles have a vicious reputation, largely undeserved. Hunters mistake them for hawks. Farmers blame old "Baldy" for missing chickens and chop down his nesting tree. Egg collectors rob eyries.

The burgeoning population has built roads, factories, and housing developments in places where

the eagles formerly nested. Unfortunately, both people and eagles, being fish eaters, prefer shore-front property.

Audubon studies in Alaska and Florida, the last two strongholds of the bald eagle, indicate that DDT poisons fish which, in turn, can poison or produce sterility in fish-eating eagles.

Revered in image and persecuted in life: This is the paradox of the American bald eagle.

The bald eagle wasn't even popular with all the country's founding fathers. It took the Continental Congress three committees and a dozen years to decide on an appropriate national symbol. Ben Franklin led the dissidents, calling the bald eagle a "coward, robber, and of bad moral character." He preferred the wild turkey.

The United States Government from 1917 to 1932 paid hunters in Alaska a bounty to kill the bald eagle as a pernicious predator. More than 100,000 were slaughtered.

It was not until 1940, 153 years after it had been honored by the Congress, that the bald eagle received legal protection in all the existing states.

All-American Bird

Eagle fanciers maintain that the bald eagle is a most appropriate American emblem. It is native to North America, rarely ventures outside the United States except to friendly Canada.

Strong and swift, the eagle is as majestic as any bird aloft.

Though a bird of prey, "Baldy" is scarcely more rapacious than a sparrow. It lives mainly on fish

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and has such good eyes that from in a heavy frame.

three miles up it can spot a dead one floating on a lake.

The bald eagle mates for life and returns annually to its huge nest. A nest in Ohio was used for 35 years, weighed two tons. One house proud eagle furnished its eyrie with scavenged light bulbs, spark plugs, candles, sheets, magazines, and a family photograph

Studies made during World War II by the armed services showed that moving a soldier suddenly from a hot climate to a colder one slowed him down noticeably. He was subnormal in efficiency until his body adjusted to the change.

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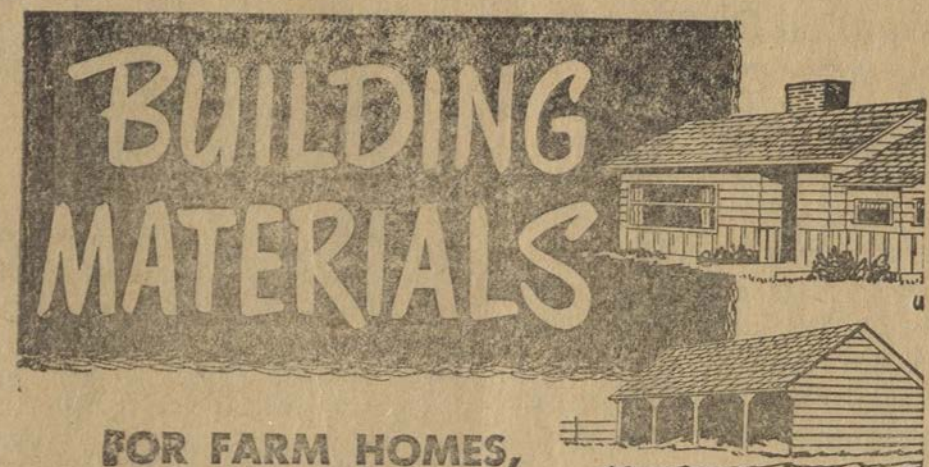
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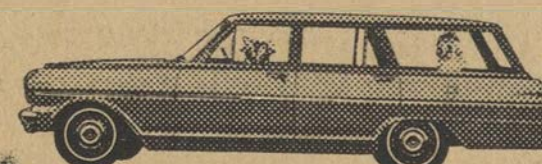
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Tips For The Home

To Make Batter Stick Better

Does your fried chicken have a nice crispy crust or does the coating come off during frying?

There is a trick to making the batter stick. Instead of rolling the uncooked chicken in the batter, cook it first. Then dip the fried pieces in batter and fry them in deep fat just long enough to brown and cook the coating.

In case you wondered, here's why the batter tends to come off when it's applied before the chicken is cooked: Chicken parts lose about one-fourth of their weight during frying, from evaporation of moisture. When raw pieces dipped in batter are

cooked, the batter coagulates before the meat shrinks. Then the shrinkage and pressure from steam cause a loose fitting coating that peels readily.

Dredging the meat in flour or some other thickener before dipping it in batter does not reduce this peeling. The thicker the coatings are, the more readily they peel.

Starchy thickening ingredients have only a slight effect on the color of the coating, and they make little difference in how well the coating sticks to the meat. Egg content also had little effect on adhesion, but it did add color to the batters.

Plan Your Kitchen Wiring

You can't leave all the kitchen wiring planning to the electrician. You'll need to make some electrical wiring plans yourself when you remodel your kitchen or build a new home.

Plenty of outlets are important for convenience in the kitchen. You'll want to consider both the outlets for large appliances and those for the smaller equipment. Of course, where you decide to put the larger pieces of equipment will determine where special purpose outlets for these appliances should be placed.

The requirement for small appliance circuit outlets, as given in the National Wiring Bureau Handbooks: One outlet is needed for each four linear feet of work surface frontage, with at least one outlet to serve each work surface. Work surface outlets should be located 44 inches above the floor line. If a planning desk is to be installed, one outlet shall be located to serve this area. Table space should have one outlet, preferably just above table level.

Split wired type outlets increase convenience and outlet capacity. These have "plug in spaces" on separate circuits, which allow connection of two heavy use appliances, such as deep fat fryers or electric irons, at the outlet without blowing a fuse.

Don't forget to include an outlet for the kitchen clock. This should be near the ceiling, about 84 inches above the floor line, at a point on the wall that can be seen from the entire room.

The outlet for the refrigerator should be about 44 inches from the floor and slightly to the side of the refrigerator location. This gives easy access without moving the refrigerator.

Special purpose outlets are needed for the range, ventilating fan, dishwasher, washer, dryer

and food waste disposal. Separate circuits should be provided for the food freezer and the room air conditioner.

You'll probably want to draw a plan of your kitchen arrangement, showing where special outlets for large appliances and outlets for other equipment should be located.

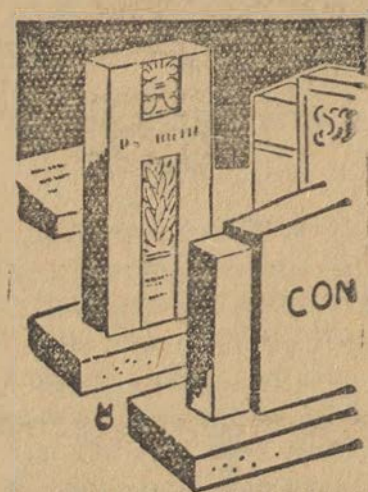

Efficient Corn Production

It's a startling economic fact that when growers get yields of 38 bushels an acre of corn—only about 8 of these bushels may be "profit" bushels.

That's because many farmers pay "from 45 to 50 bushels an acre in production costs. Production costs for most crops are rising steadily each year and probably will continue so, says County Agent Keith S. Venable.

Yet, efficient corn producers in many cases produce from 100 to 150 bushels an acre. Their costs run about the same but efficient management has upped the profit margin.

Certain steps must be followed for efficient production, says S. H. Phillips, U.K. Ag Extension Service grains specialist. They are:

1. Select well-adapted hybrids and use two or more which have different maturity dates. Full season hybrids usually yield better.

2. Plant early; April 25 to May 10 is the best planting bracket on the calendar. Late planted corn (late May or June) can reduce yields from one half to one and one half bushels per acre for each day the crop is planted after the recommended dates (April 25-May 10.)

3. Get a good even stand and plant at from 12,000 to 16,000 plants an acre.

4. Fertilize according to soil production capabilities and from soil test results.

5. Control weeds, using cultivation or chemicals, or combinations of both.

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HEALTH FOR ALL

Facts vs. Non-Facts

Despite one of folklore's hoariest bits of wisdom, what you don't know can hurt you. And that usually goes double in matters affecting your health.

There's the ancient question of tuberculosis, for example, it's been vastly reduced in the last few decades, though getting it down to absolute zero will still take a lot of doing. A couple of generations ago, the common belief was that TB "runs in families." Most people thought it hereditary. Medical science finally succeeded in convincing just about everybody that it's

transmitted by a germ and in no other way.

No sooner was this bit of mythology laid to rest than another took its place. TB victims living at home are most apt to communicate the disease to members of their families—that's true. But observation of this fact led to a common idea that you are more liable to the disease if a member of your family has had it—another version of the "runs in families" fallacy, and almost as untrue! Anybody who has the active disease can transmit the TB germ—the tubercle bacillus—to anybody with whom he comes in contact, although not everyone infected becomes sick.

Still another popular health delusion is that TB infection promptly causes loss of weight and other symptoms of illness.

As a result of this notion, people have been known to ignore a common cough, shortness of breath, or even so obvious a sign as expectorated blood. They're husky and plump, they feel fine, so how could they possibly be in danger of anything like TB? Unfortunately, anybody can be, because the disease often doesn't betray itself through symptoms until it's well advanced.

TB plays no favorites. The only way to be sure you're not infected with the active or inactive germ is the way recommended by all physicians and tuberculosis associations, a periodic tuberculin test or chest X-ray.

Grazing Deadline For Wheat, Feed Grains

Farmers were reminded this week that payments for diversion payments depend on not grazing and the special price-support acreage diverted under either the 1963 wheat or feed grain program from May 1 to November 1, 1963.

Kenneth Bush, Chairman, ASC County Committee, said that the acreage so affected is the acreage designated for diversion by the program participant at the time a check is made of compliance. In this county, this check should be substantially completed by September 1.

Under the wheat and feed grain programs, farmers seek to bring production into line with needs through diverting to a conserving use acreage formerly planted to either wheat or corn, grain sorghum, or barley. Program payments are made to offset the loss of income which otherwise might have been returned from such crop production.

Farmers in Trigg County have signed up 75 farms for participation in the 1963 wheat stabilization program, and 358 farms in the 1963 feed grain program. Acreage signed up for diversion

under the programs included 1,021 acres from wheat production and 6,562 acres from production of the three feed grains, barley, corn and grain sorghum.

Soil Conservation Notes

By Boyd Champion & Ernest S. Johnston

Homer Taff, State Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service will be on the program of the Conservation and Livestock tour this summer. The tour date has been set for July 17 in the Wallonia and Cerulean area. Mark this date on the calendar as we believe that it will be a profitable day to see what the people in this section are doing with conservation and livestock.

A modernizing Long Range Program is nearly completed for the Trigg County Soil Conservation District. C. T. Vinson, Kelsie Calhoun, Lewis McCormick and Frank Wolfe, District Supervisors met last Thursday and went over some of the things that will be included in the plan. Bill Summerhill, Ferrel Miller, Stanford Tillman and SCS personnel have been assisting the district prepare the plan. Some of the things in the plan may be "far fetched" now but it is interesting to review a plan prepared several years ago that was "far fetched" then but is out of date now.

William McAtee tells us that the plow planted corn on the Atwood farm stood the dry weather as good or better than corn planted on a smooth seedbed. One disking was all that the rest of his corn land received. "Plow Planting" requires a skilled operator but it saves several trips over the field and holds the soil and moisture better while producing as much corn per acre.

The recent drowning on lakes and farm ponds makes us more conscious of the danger of a farm pond. Some safety precautions may save a life around a farm pond. A long rope and a life ring should be provided near the pond. An inner tube properly inflated makes a good substitute for a life ring. The SCS office has a good bulletin on "farm pond

safety that is free for the asking.

Our deepest sympathy to the Upton family. Judge "Rob" was a friend and supporter of the conservation program as well as innumerable other worthwhile projects in the county. His counsel, advice and help was sought by many and will be missed.

Wilson Barrow has wild land cleared and bog disked to seed a pasture mixture later this summer. He will follow the land until the last of August and seed to grass and legumes. This has proved to be one of the best methods we have observed. Most of the wild vegetation is killed by the summer disking and enough moisture is saved to get a good stand and growth for winter.

Alfalfa is gaining in popularity as more of the "Queen hay" is grown. With new knowledge of fertilizers and management it is possible to grow alfalfa on land that was once not suitable for it. Alfalfa still requires a deep, well drained soil and plenty of lime and fertilizer. The soil capability map can be very useful when selecting the land to grow alfalfa. It is too expensive to guess about the soil when it costs nothing to find out for sure how it will produce alfalfa.

One new 4-H member, as the smoke cleared away from the cigars Bill Summerhill passed out in the basement of the Post office he remarked to Mrs. Stallons, "enroll my new boy in the 4-H Club, I believe that will help us get our quota of new members." The story was that Mrs. Summerhill and William R. III were doing fine, but it took two doctors to bring Bill around.

Farm Notes

A shortage of tobacco plants occurs every year on some farms, and every year some farmers have good beds, why the difference? Well, here are some things

for the good beds;

1. Burn or steam or use methyl bromide gas.
2. Fertilize not over 50 pounds per 100 yards.
3. Sow not over 1 level table-spoon and better not over 2 tea-spoons per 100 yards.
4. Mulch lightly with straw or second cutting alfalfa hay and put canvas directly on straw.

5. Water early before seed sprout and as needed. Farmers with an irrigation system are ahead.
 6. Soaking bed just before pulling plants gives more roots and less stem injury.
- Some day we may have specialists in plant growing who grow plans for sale.
- The past winter was too dry

for cyanamid beds to be very good. The chemical did not react until this spring after the tobacco seed was sown. The result almost complete failure of tobacco beds.
