



## Pauline Crump indicted for embezzlement, bank fraud



Pauline Crump, former senior vice-president of Business Development and Trust Officer of Trigg County Farmers Bank, has been charged with 18 counts of embezzlement and one count of bank fraud by the federal Grand Jury in Louisville.

The charges comes after nearly seven months of investigation by the United States Department of Justice and the Federal Bureau of investigation.

In a press release issued late Monday by the United States Department of Justice, Joseph M. Whittle, United States Attorney for the Western District of Kentucky and Terry O'Connor, special agent in charge, FBI, announced that the indictment alleges that, between October 1985 and July 1990, Crump engaged in a scheme to defraud the bank and its depositors.

The indictment identifies various methods allegedly used. For example, that she deposited into her own bank accounts, or her relative's bank accounts, proceeds from the tax returns of elderly bank trust customers.

The indictment also alleges that Crump wrote checks on these customers' accounts and used the proceeds to pay her credit card bills. The indictment alleges 18 specific instances of embezzlement.

In a statement released by

Trigg County Farmers Bank early Tuesday morning, President Ben Cundiff stated that the bank turned the matter over to the FBI when the problem first arose and that the bank has had no ongoing involvement in the criminal investigation except in furnishing information requested by the FBI.

Cundiff said, "The funds in question have been fully reimbursed, and neither the Bank nor any customer of the bank has sustained any financial loss as a result of this matter. We have not felt, and do not feel, that is appropriate for the Bank to comment further on a matter under criminal investigation.

Stephen G. Frye, Assistant United States Attorney, presented the case to the Grand Jury.

The indictment of a person by a Grand Jury or the charge of a person by information or otherwise is an accusation only. That person is presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty.

## Cunningham takes oath

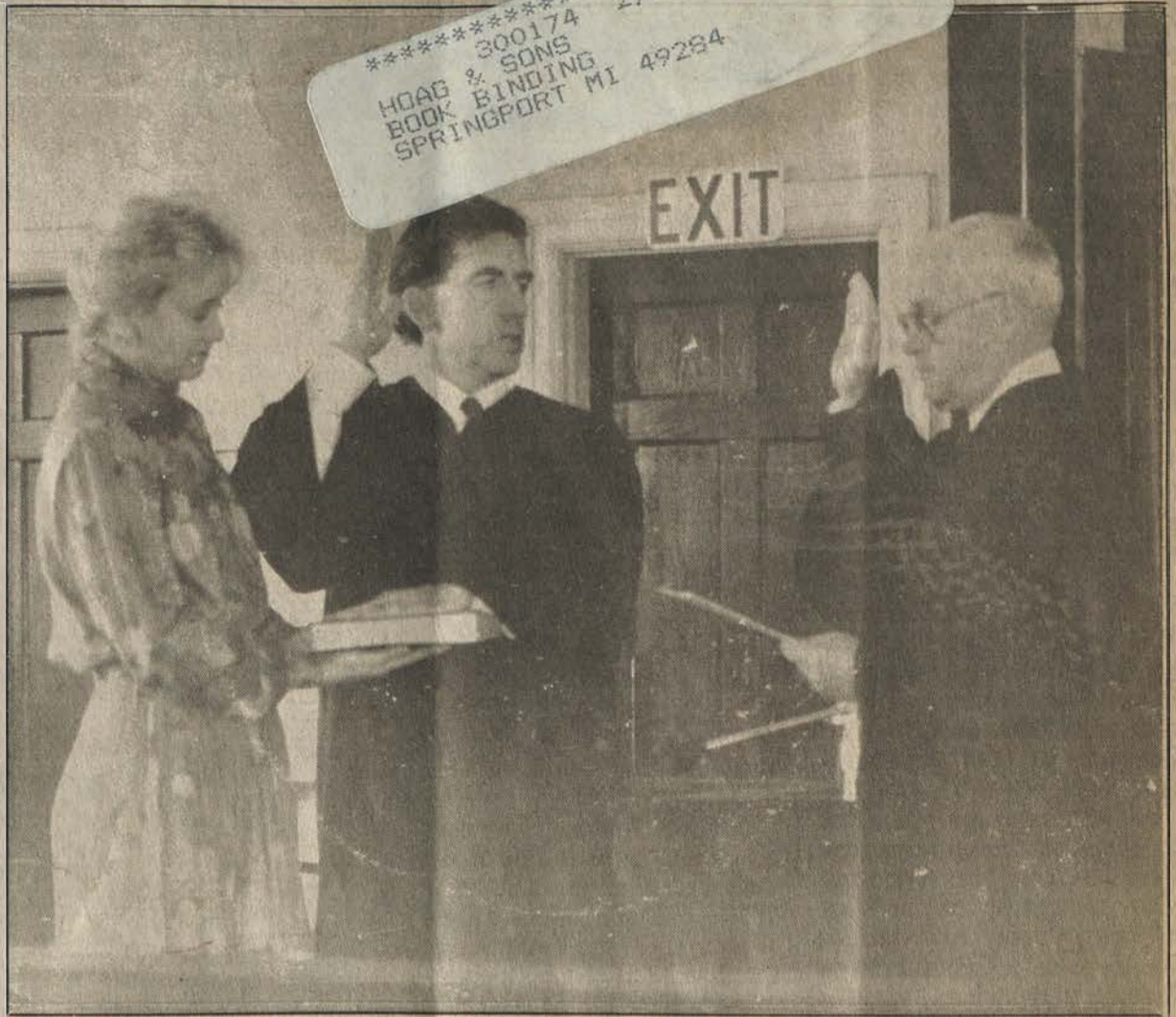
Bill Cunningham, newly elected circuit court judge for the 56th Judicial District, was charged to "assert his allegiance to the state, avow his honor to the office, and state his trust to the people who have elected him" by District Judge Chappel Wilson in swearing-in ceremonies last Monday at the Trigg County Courthouse.

Wilson also said that "the office doesn't belong to Bill Cunningham, but to all citizens."

Cunningham won the position for this district, which includes Lyon, Livingston, Caldwell and Trigg Counties, in last November's election, beating incumbent Willard Paxton, who had held the office for 12 years.

Accompanied by his wife Paula, Cunningham said in a speech to a large crowd of on-lookers and well-wishers, "My roots run very deep in this county which is the home of my father.

"I feel very close to this community and I'm very grateful for my supporters here."

ABC's *Good Morning America* does their morning show from the front porch of Peggy Say's house on August 7, in antipation of Terry Anderson's release.

Enrollment is up at Trigg County Schools, with an enrollment of about 1,800 students.

### September

Bells rang in Cadiz as we joined the nation in celebrating

the 204th anniversary of the signing of the Constitution.

The Board of Directors of Trigg County Farmers Bank names Ben L. Cundiff as chief executive officer and president.

Activities for the 15th Annual Trigg County Country Ham Festival gets underway with a motor cross race, horseshoe pitching contest, baby contest and Super Mudder Hogg Bogg.

### October

Terry Anderson's 44th birthday was celebrated here at special services held at Cadiz Baptist Church on Sunday morning.

Marie Cunningham is named Woman of the Year.

Mid-Continent Spring Company announces the opening of a plant here. Gov. Wallace Wilkinson was on hand to make the official announcement. The firm is targeted to open by the first of 1992.

### November

Cadiz was one of 78 communities named "certified cities" and was honored for its economic development efforts at an annual luncheon on October 31 in Louisville.

Justin Minnehan, Trigg County superintendent, gave his official letter of resignation during a special called meeting of the Trigg County School Board, citing his desire to return to school to earn his doctorate's degree.

## 52 years has brought growth for Farm Bureau

March 8, 1937, the Circuit Court Room of the Trigg County Court House was the scene of an event which was the beginning of the Trigg County Farm Bureau. There were 47 charter members.

Smith Broadbent, Jr., was elected the first president; C.T. Vinson, vice president; and Henry Thomas, secretary-treasurer.

Membership growth was slow. There were 257 members in 1943, and 673 in 1947, but only 473 in 1961. Membership has increased most years since 1967: 755 in 1970; 1,350 in 1976; 1,581 in 1986.

"Our present membership is 1,973," Linda Henderson, Farm Bureau Secretary, told me. If the present rate of growth continues, membership should pass 2,000.

At first the Farm Bureau and Extension Offices were together. This was true all across Kentucky. When I started with extension services in Christian County in 1935, our office was known as the Farm Bureau office.

In 1961, the Farm Bureau and Extension offices were separated. Farm Bureau has supported many good causes: the building of Trigg County Hospital, the tax increase to rebuild Trigg County High School, when it burned in 1960.

In 1974, Trigg County Farm

Bureau, in cooperation with retired County Agent Keith Venable, started the drive which got the new office building for the UK Research and Education Center at Princeton, to replace a building built in 1927.

Sometimes work was done on problems which just went away. In 1974, there were millions of black birds roosting at Fort Campbell. There was a great deal of talk about what to do about them. In time, they just went away.

It was the setting for the Civil War epic "None Shall Look Back."

Another old home visited was Idlewood, just south of Trenton on US 41. It also was built in 1830. It has been recently renovated by Dr. Robert Haley of Nashville.

After the original 13 states, Kentucky is the first state to join the Union in 1792. We Kentuckians must get ready to celebrate our 200th birthday.

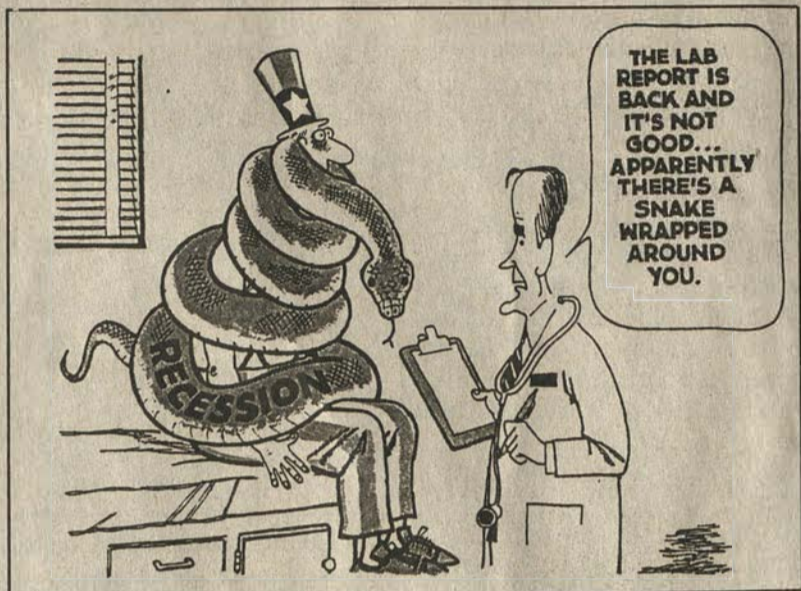

## Just the Other Day by Billy Rawls



Last week's *Cadiz Record* contained a letter from Mrs. Evelyn Feltner of Henderson, Kentucky. Mrs. Feltner requested that 'The Record's staff should try to use more news that pertained to the people of Cadiz and Trigg County. Her suggestion has merit when we (the staff) consider the large portion of subscribers who have lived a considerable distance from here for several years.

Mrs. Feltner's letter reminded me of the many times that others have mentioned to 'me'an' my wife, Charline Everette Jones Rawls, that "the paper is not what it used to be." As past co-editors and co-owners of *The Cadiz Record*, we took these remarks to be meant as compliments of our previous efforts in said capacity. Of course, they could have implied otherwise.

When Charline and I lived in Maryland, we read every "slap-dab-bit" of *The Cadiz Record* to keep up with what was going on at home. Even though we were young adults who had known the young and old of Trigg County, more and more new names of people who were unknown to us gradually appeared in the news. They ranged from newborn to adults. If we kept up with the newcomers, our weekly news grew. If we ignored them, our news shrank.

There used to be columns in the paper that contained bits and pieces of news about the people of local communities. Some of the things they consisted of were births, illnesses, deaths, visits, parties, etc. (sometimes gossip). Some of the notoriety was appreciated, and some was not. To some, it was new, and to others, it was old.

I remember long Wednesday nights when our newspaper crew desperately wracked our brains to come up with something to fill our "Personals" column. Often we resorted to telephoning various people (who were considered to be "in the know") to fill us in on social items that no one had reported to us. Our community columnists probably had done likewise.

I inserted in my column of December 11, 1991 a copy of the "Kentucky Telephone," dated April, 1895, that was edited by Mr. Henry Lawrence. One of Mr. Lawrence's writers reported that "Mr. Sam Bush got a big girl at his house." A few weeks later, I was questioned by Mrs. Sam "Johnnie" Bush and her daughter, Mrs. Howard "Geneva Bush" Anderson as to who the "big girl" was. I, being as ignorant of the facts as these ladies (who were Christmas shopping), could not give them an answer. But I could have put them in the next week's paper as being on a shopping tour ---- similar to a report in some antique *Cadiz Record* that "Granville Mitchell is sick with the flu."

As it happened a short time later, Mrs. Lewis "Estalene Cameron" Morris called me to thank me for the Kentucky Telephone reprint. She read it to her mother, Mrs. Charlie "Grace Bush" Cameron who is ninety-six years old and in poor health. 'Miz Grace' perked up right sharply when her daughter read her one-line birth announcement.

On the day after the past Christmas, another reference to the Kentucky Telephone came up as I talked with Hugh Porter at the celebration of the 50th wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Randolph. Hugh spoke of a quote from "The Telephone" which referred to a visit to Florida by a "Mr. Burnett Porter." That Burnett Porter turned out to be the father of the Burnett Porter that I knew, as well as the father of Hugh.

Last week's *Cadiz Record* had lots of news about Trigg County folks. Some of them I know, and some of them I will come to know from reading about them or by some other means. I know James Robert Lawrence, whose picture is on the front page. He is an "Auld Acquaintance." I also know Walter Holbrook who is pictured on page B-3. Walter, although imported, has been a Trigg Countian for some time. He is a part of my church and we see each other fairly often.

Tabitha Sue Stagner (page B-2) is the newborn child of Kelly Delawson Stagner. I used to work with Kelly. Although I do not know Tabitha (or maybe even her father), I will probably get to know them.

Robert Stinson, who is pictured on page A-10, is yet a question mark to me, except for the this latest revelation. I once could recognize who a leg belonged to when it was sticking up from a pile of Trigg County High School football players. I wonder if Robert will turn out to be kin to the Elmer Stinson that I once knew.

No one knows better than I the warmth of recognition of past associations. I remember the thrill of hearing the voice of Ruth Cunningham Piercy Humphries when she was on a radio broadcast from New York City on the "Queen For A Day" program. My little family and I were far from home, and Ruth fulfilled a longing for some of the things that were missing in our lives.

Howard Anderson was once new to Cadiz, but he became a part of my life, and even connected me, by strange circumstances and a newspaper, with a Sam Bush that I never knew.

Perhaps another criteria could be added to that of our writers for this periodical, for the advantage of our long distance readers. Maybe we should add to the "WHO, WHAT, WHERE, WHEN, and WHY" a definition of who (by kinship) when it is practical to do so.

Incidentally: I am not, presently, real positive as to who Mrs. Evelyn Feltner is.

Mr. McCraw wrote that an Army officer was killed in Lebanon, the man killed was Marine Lt. Col. William Higgins who was attached to the United Nations Peacekeeping

In 1985, I was with the 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit off the coast of Beirut when Terry Anderson was taken hostage. Marines and sailors were prepared to go back into Beirut to rescue the hostages, but the president determined that it was not worth the risk of losing more American lives to evacuate them *again*. Many marines and sailors endangered their lives to evacuate, even after our government warned them not to return because we could not protect them. I don't believe Terry Anderson is worth the hero's welcome he is now receiving.

When discussing Terry Anderson, look at the facts before throwing him a parade.

## Radiation helpline set up for exposed veterans

A national toll-free telephone number has been established by the Department of Veteran Affairs (VA) to assist veterans and their families in dealing with radiation disability claims as a result of military service.

By dialing 1-800-827-0365, callers can speak with specially trained veterans benefits counselors who will provide current information on VA benefits and services available to veterans exposed to radiation sources

while on military duty.

Assistance is offered in filing claims for disability compensation, reopening old claims, sharing general information on current medical research on radiation exposure or legislative activity involving the subject. In some instances, arrangements will be made for a counselor from the nearest VA regional office to provide follow-up actions.

Since World War II, more than

After normal office hours and on weekends and holidays, an answering machine will receive messages and the calls will be returned the following business day.

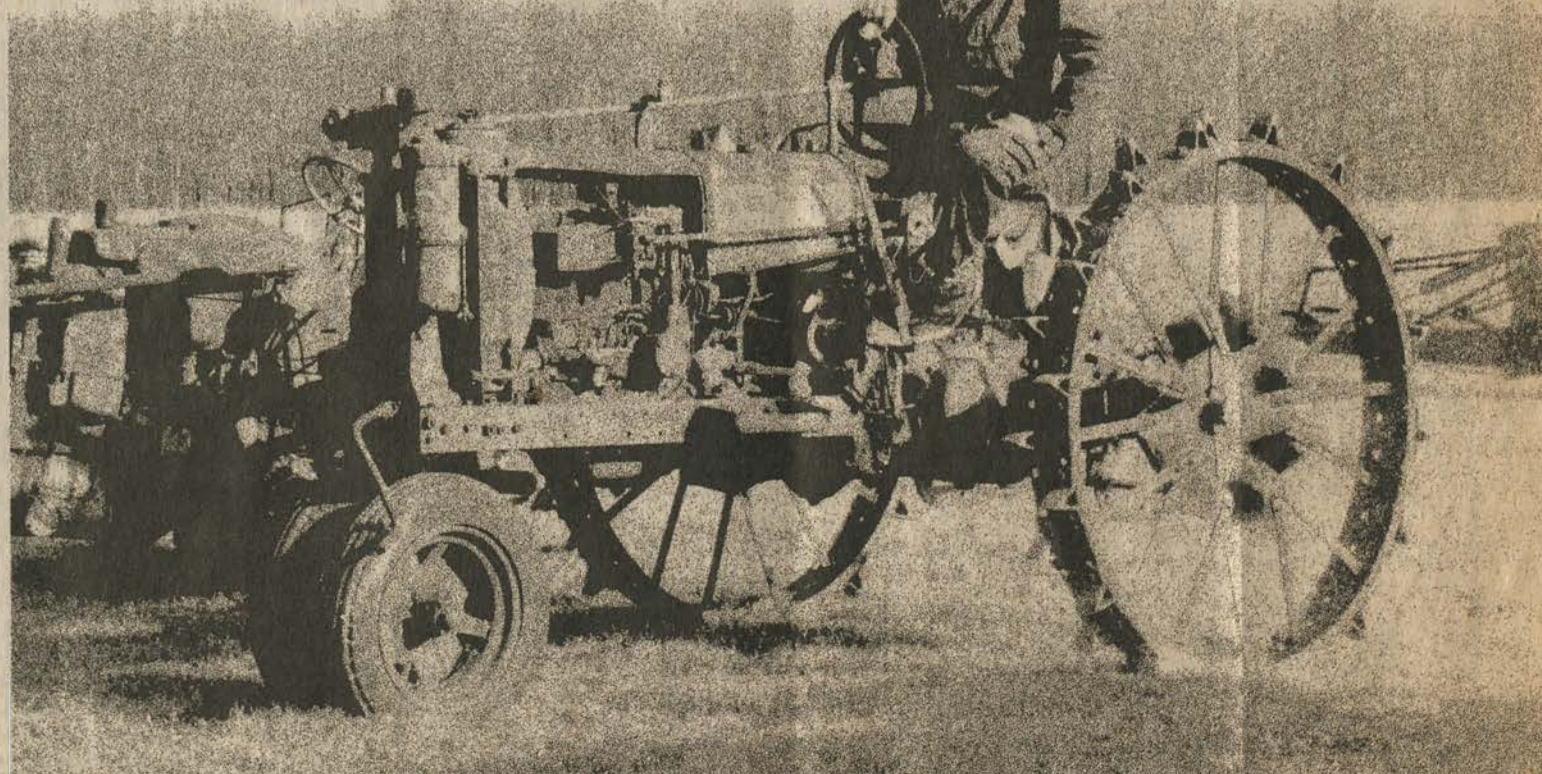

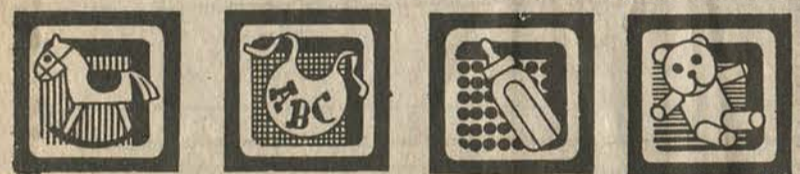

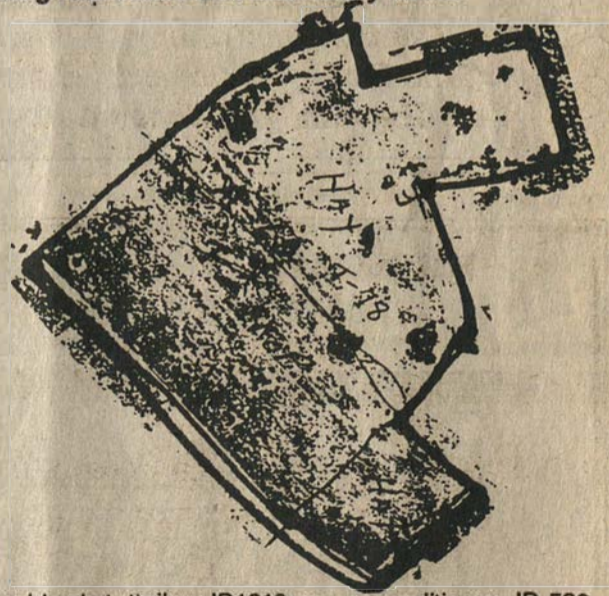

# Dept. of Veteran Affairs announces 1992 insurance dividends

For the fourth time in the 75-year history of the veteran's life insurance program, more than \$1 billion in dividends will be paid in 1992 to veterans holding active policies, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has announced.

VA Secretary Edward J. Derwinski said, "These dividends are made possible because veterans are living longer than predicted, and the insurance trust funds are earning high yields from investment in long-term government securities."

In addition to the immediate benefit for veterans, the economy will also get a boost according to Derwinski: "Putting one billion dollars into the

economy should have a positive and stimulating effect."

Affected are some 2.6 million veterans of World Wars I and II, and the Korean Conflict whose accounts will be automatically credited on the anniversary of their policies. Policyholders may choose to receive a dividend check or select one of five alternate payment options. No application from individual policyholders is necessary.

The dividend amount will vary according to age, type of insurance and duration of the policy. Only those policies that have been kept in force will receive an annual dividend distribution.

The largest group to receive a payment will be the 2.2 million

World War II veterans holding National Service Life Insurance "V" policies who will receive an average payment of \$389. Total payments are expected to reach \$861.2 million.

Dividends totaling \$9.2 million will be paid to 32,986 World War I veterans with U.S. Government Life Insurance "K" policies for an average payment of \$279.

Some 27-,589 Korean Conflict veterans who have maintained Veterans Special Life Insurance designated "RS" and "W" can expect to receive dividends averaging \$394 for a total of \$106.7 million.

Veterans who hold Veterans Reopened Insurance policies will share a \$32.4 million dividend. Average payments to "J" policyholders are \$290; for

"JR," \$521; and "JS," \$531.

Although VA also administers to special life insurance program for disabled veterans and programs offering mortgage life insurance coverage, neither pays dividends. For active-duty service members and reservists, VA supervises and contracts with a

private carrier to underwrite Servicemen's Group Life Insurance.

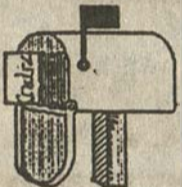

## Financial Focus

Our nation is fast becoming one of spenders rather than savers. In fact, the U.S. savings rate, which dropped below 4 percent in 1991, is much lower than that of many other industrialized countries. Before 1985, the U.S. personal savings rate never fell below 5 percent, with two brief exceptions shortly after World War II.

Low savings, or "dissavings"—spending more than one earns—could become a vicious national economic cycle. William Dudley, a senior economist at Goldman, Sachs and Co., says that low personal savings rates keep production growth low, which keeps real wages from increasing, further depressing savings rates.

One proposal for breaking this cycle comes from the book *The Vanishing Nest Egg: Reflections on Savings in America* (Twentieth Century Fund, \$9.95) by B. Douglas Bernheim, who holds an endowed chair in economics at Princeton University.

In the book, Bernheim suggest increasing the personal savings rate by creating an account that would put a floor under savings incentives rather than a cap above them.

These accounts would be similar to today's IRAs. Instead of the \$2,000 cap and other restrictions, however, savings above a specified percentage of a taxpayer's adjusted gross income (AGI) would be tax sheltered and would qualify as a tax deduction. Lower income families might be allowed to deduct everything they put into such a savings plan. Higher income families, on the other hand, would have to achieve a certain level of savings before qualifying for the tax advantages.

For example, a family with a \$100,000 AGI might have to save 15 percent, or \$15,000 to qualify. All savings or investments above that would receive the tax break.

Another feature of Bernheim's proposal is to create accounts for special, designated purposes—retirement, college education or the purchase of a first home. Money withdrawn from these accounts and used for the designated purpose would not be subject to tax penalties or other restrictions. The accounts could be funded with savings, stocks, bonds or contributions to a pension plan. All would count toward the savings floor. Finally, existing tax shelters would not lose their status.

Of course, some economists believe the savings rate is primed to rise because the baby boomers are becoming more attuned to financial objectives other than spending. High on their list is preparing for retirement and for the costs of educating their offspring.

Regardless, it's important to remember that to keep our economy vibrant, taxpayers must have an incentive to invest and save. Here's hoping the message gets out before it's too late.

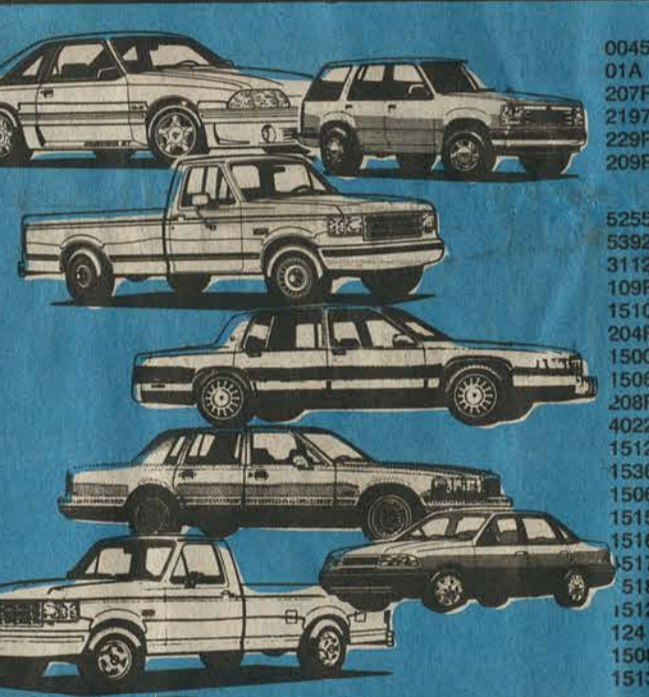

**Lorrie Hargrove**

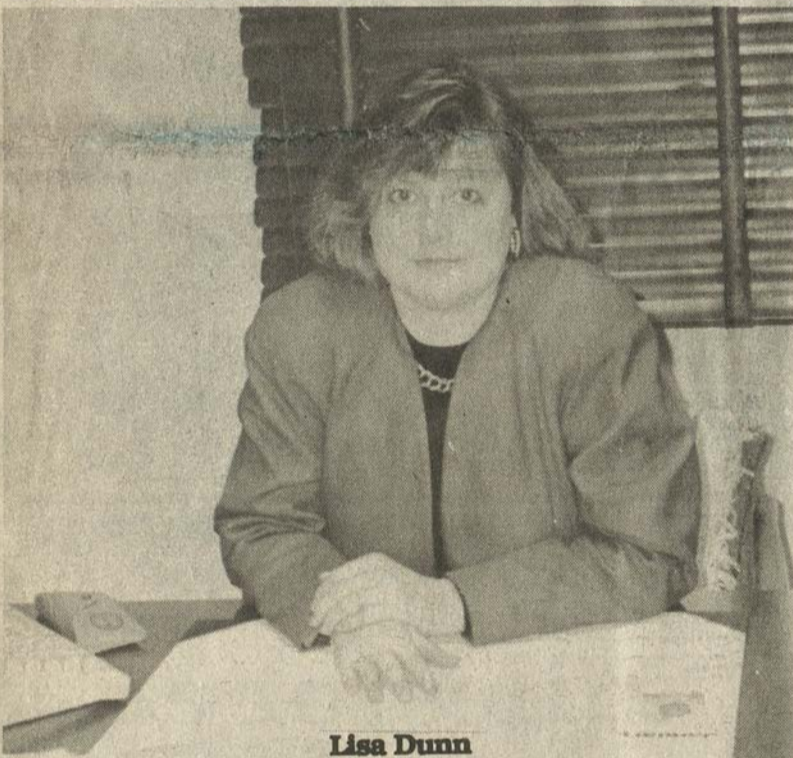
Lorrie Allen Hargrove doubles as a Graphic Designer and Columnist for the Record.

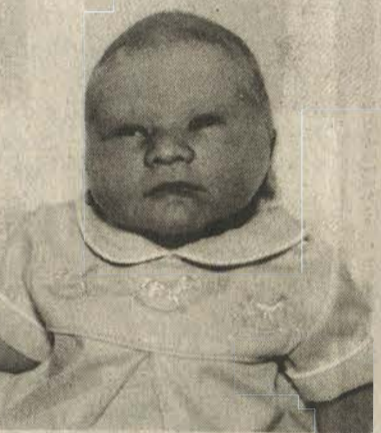

Tempt your family's taste buds with the Sutley's favorites

## Home Cooking

Faye Sutley is carrying out a family tradition. She's a wonderful cook!

"My mother was a good cook and so was my grandmother," she says. "Besides, when you grow up in a big family, you learn to cook."

And learn to cook she has. After 33 years of marriage, she has perfected some recipes that have become her family's favorites, mainly the Garlic Pepper Steak, which she says both daughter Tammye and son Eric, now grown, each request on their birthdays.

Husband Jim, a retired air traffic controller, calls dibs on the Blueberry Pie, which Faye says can be used with any kind of topping, although the blueberries seem to complement it best. (This recipe makes two pies.)

Another favorite are the Saltine Supremes, which Faye says are "easy, quick to make, and delicious." (I got a sample of these and she's right!)

The Sutleys moved to Trigg County in July 1987, which was Faye's return home. She left here in 1956, moving to Atlanta to work with an airlines. There she met Jim, whom she married in 1958. They then moved to Houston but moved to Nashville in 1962, splitting up the difference between her home state and his Alabama birthplace.

While in Nashville, Faye worked with the county extension service, concentrating on 4-H, which both her children were active in.

She also gained recognition in the city as a top-notch cook. A

November 12, 1970, article in *The Tennessean* featured Faye and her talents.

Because she was born and raised in here, she knows what country cooking (Jim's favorite) is all about.

However, she says they are trying to eat healthier lately because in order to bring cholesterol levels down. Broiled and grilled meats are replacing fried, and healthy salads instead of vegetables with the traditional salts and seasonings.

Faye keeps busy as a teacher's aide at Trigg County High School and is actively involved with her church, Linton United Methodist. In her free time, she enjoys cake decorating and piddling with crafts.

She also still enjoys working with 4-H and is currently tutoring niece Tatum McNichols in the art of bread making for her 4-H project.

After all these years of marriage, how does Jim rate his wife's cooking? "She's almost as good as her mother," he says with a smile.

### Candied Apples

- 6 apples, peeled and cubed
- 1 c. sugar
- 1 c. water
- 1 package cinnamon drops
- 1 stick cinnamon
- 1 3 oz. package cream cheese
- 1/4 c. pecans
- 6 marshmallows

Cook apples until tender in water with sugar, cinnamon drops and stick cinnamon. Remove apples and cool. Cook mixture until it thickens. Cream the

cheese and stir in pecans. Stuff the center of apples with mixture and place marshmallow on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes.

### Apricot Salad

- 2 c. apricot nectar (add enough water for 2 c.)

Add 1/2 c. sugar and bring to a boil. Remove from heat and add 1 box of orange jello. Stir until dissolved. Pour into mold. Let set. Mix 1 8 oz. package of cream cheese with 1 small can of crushed pineapple, mixing well. When jello is set, spread this over top and sprinkle with crushed pecans.

### Veg-All Casserole

- 2 cans Veg-All, drained
- 1/2 c. chopped onions
- 1 c. grated American or sharp cheese
- 1/2 c. chopped celery
- 1 c. water chestnuts, sliced or chopped
- 1 c. mayonnaise

Mix all ingredients and put in well-greased dish. Cover with crushed Ritz crackers mixed with 1/2 stick of melted margarine. Bake 25 minutes at 350 degrees.

### Marinated Beef

- 1 c. catsup
- 1/2 t. Worcestershire sauce
- 2 t. prepared mustard

- 1 1/2 c. water
- 2 envelopes Italian salad dressing mix
- 1 Eye of Round Roast

Combine first 5 ingredients; mix well. Spear meat in several places and place in a zip-top, heavy duty plastic bag. Pour marinade over meat and seal bag tightly. Place bag in a shallow pan and refrigerate 8 hours, turning occasionally. Drain off and reserve marinade. Place roast on a rack in a baking pan; insert meat thermometer. Bake at 425 degrees for 30 to 45 minutes or until thermometer registers (140-rare, 159-medium rare, 160-medium). Baste occasionally with marinade while baking. Remove to serving platter. Serve remaining marinade with meat.

### Garlic Pepper Steak

- 1 (1 1/2 to 2 lb.) lean flank steak
- Marinade:
  - 1/4 c. salad oil
  - 2 T. lemon juice
  - 2 T. soy sauce
  - 2 T. chopped green onions or 1 T. chives
  - 1 clove garlic, crushed, or 1/2 t. garlic powder
  - 1 t. coarsely ground pepper
  - 1 t. celery salt

Remove any small pieces of surface fat from steak. In a shallow baking dish, make marinade by combining ingredients. Place flank steak in marinade for at least 2 hours. Turn frequently. Let stand at room temperature or marinade covered in refrigerator 6 hours. Drain marinade. Broil or grill.

- Spaghetti Casserole
- 1 box Kraft's Italian style spaghetti dinner

Cook spaghetti and put in bottom of casserole dish. Over this, put the following by layers: 8 oz. cottage cheese, 1/4 c. sour cream, 8 oz. cream cheese, 1/2 c. chopped green onions or chives, 2 or 3 T. chopped green pepper. Meat sauce: Brown 1 1/2-2 lbs. ground chuck. Salt and pepper. Add some garlic salt. Prepare sauce in package according to directions on envelope. Add meat to sauce and pour on top of cooked spaghetti. Put 2 or 3 T. melted butter over this and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake in oven at 350 degrees until bubbling and hot.

### Cheddar Casserole

- 2 c. instant rice
- 4 T. onion
- 1 can green peas
- 4 c. turkey or chicken
- 2 cans condensed cheese soup
- 2 c. milk
- 2 c. cheddar crackers
- 6 T. butter

Prepare rice as directed on package. Add onion to water. Fluff rice and spread in greased casserole. Spread peas and poultry. Blend soup and milk and pour over mixture. Put butter crumbs on top. Bake for 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

Line cookie sheet with foil. Lay saltine crackers on sheet. Melt 1

## Large tobacco crops lower prices

A larger than expected crop has put a damper on earlier enthusiasm that tobacco prices would pick up during the mid to later stages of the marketing season.

"Prices averaged \$1.82 during the first week of marketing, but have fallen one to two cents per pound since then. We had anticipated that tobacco prices would be somewhat better than they are now," Will Snell, Extension agriculturalist economist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

It is still possible, he said, that prices could pick up somewhat after the holidays as buyers assess how much more crop there is to be marketed.

"If the companies find that there is less tobacco out there than officials are thinking there is now, prices could increase a few cents after the holiday," Snell said. However, lower quality marketings are expected after the holidays may buffer somewhat any price increase.

Already, more than two million pounds of burley have been sent to the pool, with most of it being of better grades, Snell said, and some industry observers are speculating that a total of 15 to 20 million pounds will go into the pool, compared to less than 300,000 pounds during the past two years.

Also dampening the market is increased purchases of South American tobacco—primarily from Brazil and Argentina—and tobacco from Malawi in Africa, Snell said.

"Foreign countries are poised to increase production substan-

tially next year, but the quality of their tobacco is inferior to U.S. grown tobacco, so there still will be a strong market for domestic barley," the agricultural economist said.

Snell said that farmers can increase their tobacco checks by separating their tobacco into at least two grades, rather than lumping all of it together.

"In the past few years, there was little, if any, difference in prices among grades. This year there was a greater variation that warrants stripping into at least two grades," he said.



## Enterococcus durans found to be cause of problems found in livestock

Cattle farmers especially, and other livestock producers as well, might like to know that several midwestern diagnostic laboratories have lately come up with a new cause for diarrhea in calves, foals, puppies and baby pigs.

*Enterococcus durans* (*E. durans*) is a type of streptococcus that is normally found in the intestinal tract, in sewage and in decaying matter. For years it was thought to be a harmless bacterium necessary for the digestive process.

Now, recently it has been im-

plicated as the sole cause of diarrhea in calves, as well as in combination with cryptosporidia, rotavirus and other pathogens.

Though the exact manner in which it causes diarrhea is not yet known, it appears to attach to the intestinal villi (hairlike structure on intestinal walls which absorb nutrients).

Factors which predispose the animal to this infection are unknown, though there is some speculation that treating sick calves with antibiotics may disrupt the normal intestinal microflora, which aid in digestion.

Symptoms of this particular type of diarrhea are the same as for diarrhea caused by other agents and include dehydration and weakness with rapid death unless treated.

Treatment includes replacement of electrolytes and fluids, antimicrobial and immunoglobulin therapy and possibly use of antidiarrheal drugs and intestinal protectants.

Oral fluids should be provided as soon as possible.

Distinguishing between diarrhea caused by *E. durans* and other agents is not something the layman can do. And because

of the differential diagnosis cannot be made without the professional assistance, early treatment, other than supplying fluids, must be recommended by your veterinarian.

The significance is that modern veterinary diagnostic laboratories are coming up with new research information almost daily. Much of it has specific value in making treatment more efficient, therefore less costly, and in making understanding of

a disease process more specific, therefore more treatable.

The United States enjoys the most efficient farming techniques in the world, both livestock and agriculture.

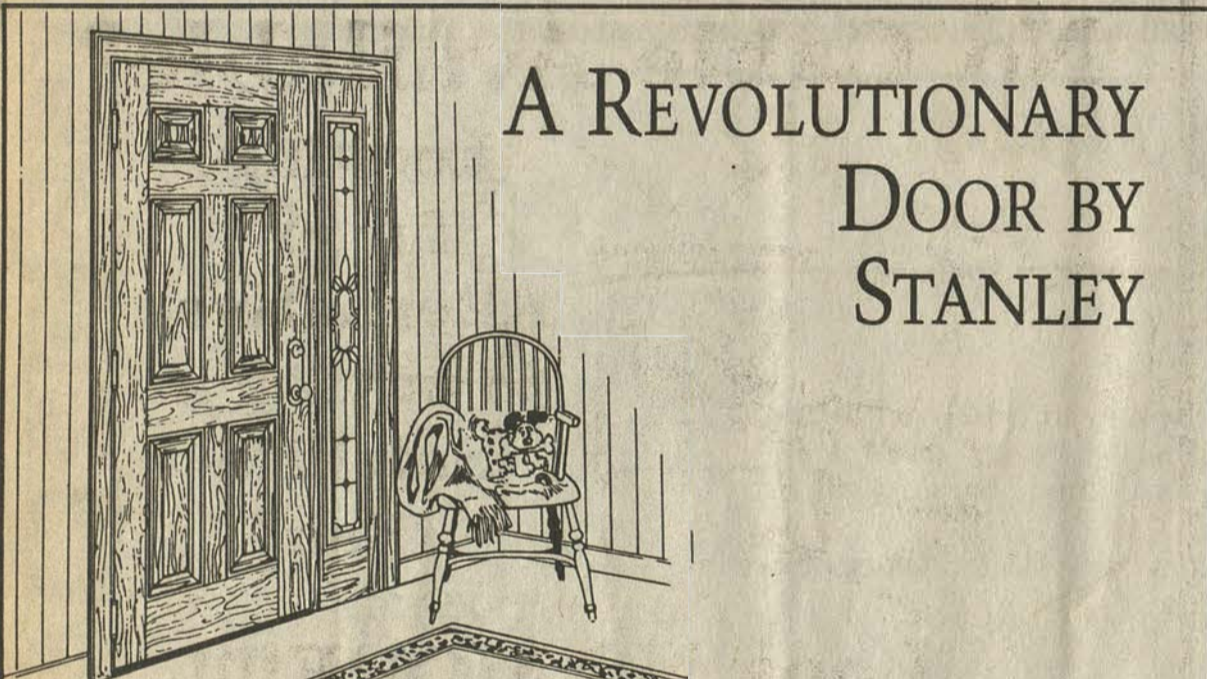

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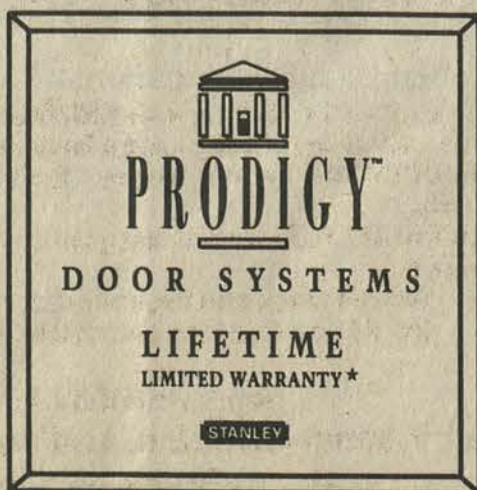

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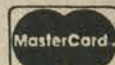

## 4-H'ers to celebrate Bicentennial

4-H members in Trigg County are helping in the local celebration of Kentucky's 1992 bicentennial by giving the county government a reproduction of a 1792-era flag that will fly above the courthouse on significant dates during the celebration.

The project, cosponsored by the Kentucky Society, Sons of the American Revolution, will see the 15-star, 15-stripe fly over the courthouse on the anniversary of the First Court in Trigg County (May 15), Statehood Day (June 1), Flag Day (June 14) and Independence Day (July 4). After the bicentennial, the historic banner will be retired to a place of honor in the courthouse.

Our country's founders originally envisioned adding a separate star and stripe for each state that joined the union. With Kentucky's statehood in 1792, a 15th star and stripe was added, reflecting the original 13 states, plus Vermont and Kentucky.

The rapid addition of states at the beginning of the 19th cen-

tury meant that the flag's design and balance would be spoiled if additional stripes were added. Consequently, a policy was adopted that would revert the number of stripes to 13, honoring the original states, and that only additional stars would be added for new states.

Because of this, the 15-stripe flag uniquely represents Kentucky's place in American history.

This is just one of our many bicentennial activities. We also plan to plant several Kentucky Coffeetrees at various locations in the county on Arbor Day (April 3). The Trigg County 4-H

will also be helping coordinate a tour of historical sites in the county for the fourth grade. All of the county's 4-H'ers' bicentennial activities are a part of the 4-H community pride program.

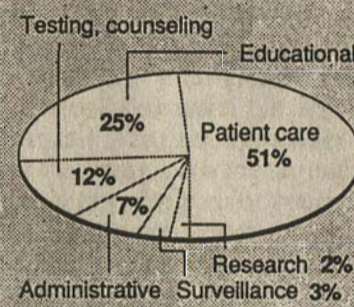

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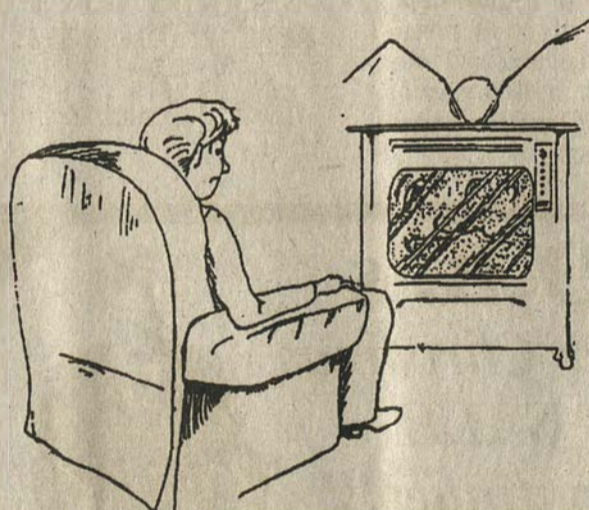
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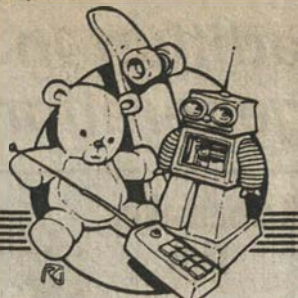

## Children's sleep problems could be solved with book

A. How does this grab you—a new publication titled *The Sleep Book for Tired Parents* by Rebecca Huntley (The Parenting Press). It may be right on target for you.

Because all children differ from one another, this book logically provides a variety of possible approaches. Among the questions it often answers are:

•Why should parents work to change the sleep problem? Almost immediate improvement, more parental sleep and self-confidence and less frustration are the usual results when parents stop trying to change a child's sleep pattern.

•What is the first step toward a solution? Chart the child's present sleep pattern, watch for subtle signs of a child getting sleepy, note what does and doesn't work.

•How does a parent choose among the possible solution? Narrow the choices down to two and choose the one that you feel most confident you'll be able to carry out.

•If I finally solve the problem, will it no longer be an issue? Expecting your child to sleep all night every night isn't realistic.

•What about blankets, stuffed animals and pacifiers? They can be helpful and an important part of a successful bedtime ritual.

These and many other issues are handled in a practical detailed manner. How the book's suggestions are used depend, of course, on the specific child's and parent's temperaments and needs.

You and many other parents of young children obviously need help with this problem. Good luck to all of you.

Q. Are kids these days really in the sad physical shape that I sometimes read about in the papers? Because I don't think my own are (or the ones with whom

they pal around), I'm curious whether all the scare stuff is overdone.

How about the facts, if you have some of them? Maybe we're just too tough on the kids, on this issue anyway.

A. You'll have to admit that your "survey," which is limited to your children and their friends, may be less accurate than one conducted on a larger group.

This statement appeared in a source that I've found to be quite accurate: "American children don't get enough exercise. Recent studies indicate that today's children have 20 percent more body fat than children did 20 years ago." That, of course, doesn't apply to all children, like, perhaps, yours.

The statement went on to say that "experts predict health-care costs will rise to \$1.5 trillion by the year 2000 due in large part to medical problems caused by a lack of proper exercise."

Three people quoted in this material were Arnold Schwarzenegger, Mary Lou Retton (gymnastic gold medalist in the 1984 Olympics) and George Allen (past chairman of the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports).

Schwarzenegger, current chairman of the council, stressed the importance of regular exercise because it may keep kids away from drinking, drugs and smoking, as well as teach lessons "crucial for life—discipline, self-esteem, camaraderie, and being proud of yourself."

Retton related physical fitness to feeling good about yourself and suggested a heavier emphasis on physical education in schools.

Allen emphasized exercise in the full scenario of self-discipline, growth of one's confidence, battling laziness and procrastination and a discovery of the "hidden force" that is "hidden within each of us."

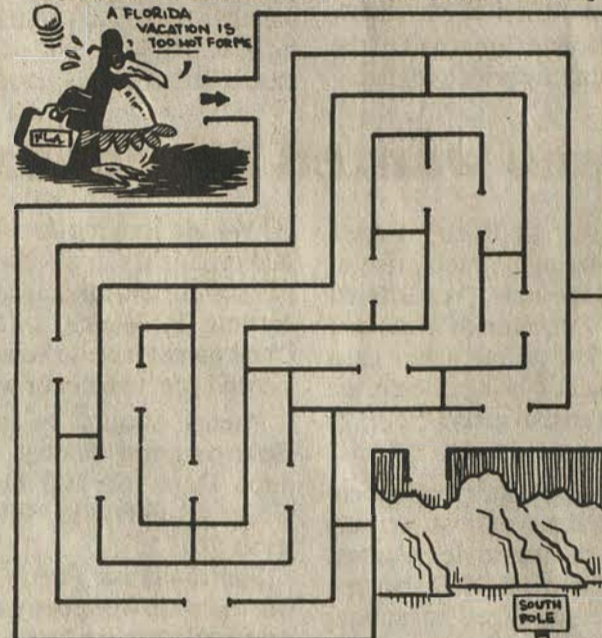

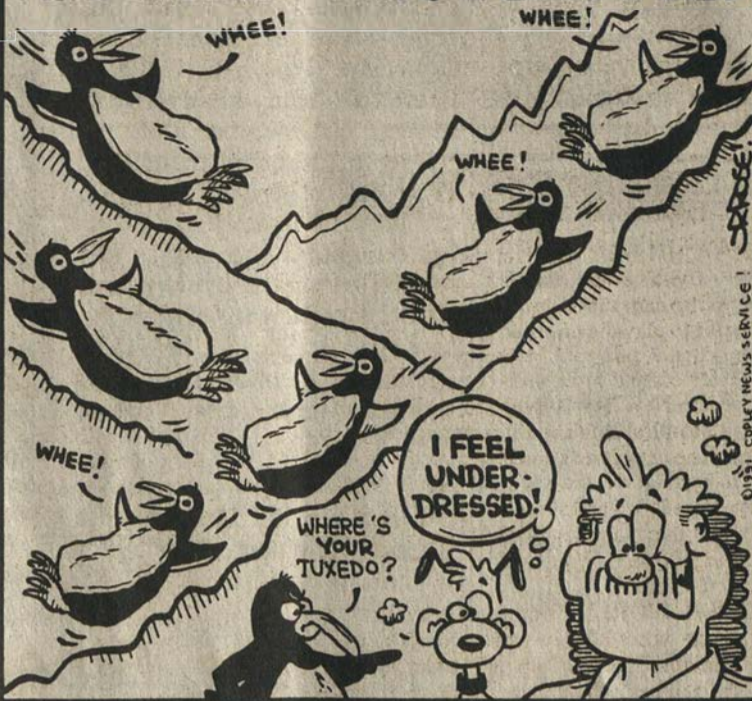

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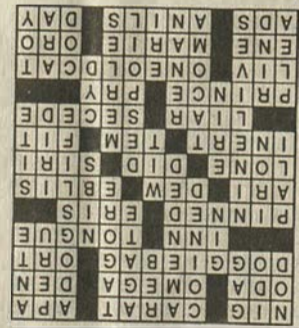

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# Mainly For Seniors

## Lack of vitamin B-12 could cause disorders in senior citizens

The lack of Vitamin B-12 in the diet may cause senility and neurological disorders in senior citizens, according to new studies announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Human Nutrition Research Center on Aging at Tufts University in Boston.

At least one in five mature adults may be the subject to the disorders and may need to take extra Vitamin B-12, said Dr. Robert M. Russell, director of gastrointestinal and micronutrient studies at the center.

"Our findings apply to men and women who no longer secrete enough stomach acid to absorb some nutrients as well as they used to, affecting 20 percent of people over age 60 and increasing to 40 percent of people over 80," Russell said.

The condition, atrophic gastritis, is also known as hypochlorhydria or achlorhydria.

"People with atrophic gastritis may need oral B-12 supplementation," said the physician. "Vitamin B-12 is probably the single most important nutrient affected by aging. Poor absorption of the vitamin may be responsible for age-related declines in balance

and pressure sensation, in muscle coordination and in mental ability.

Other studies done by researchers at Columbia-Presbyterian and Harlem Hospital Centers in New York City also support the Tufts findings and report that even a mild B-12 deficiency--where there is no sign of anemia--can result in neurological disorders.

Mature adults who evidence senility and other neurological disorders may find new and effective treatment through the vitamin supplementation process. Information may be secured through family practitioners and medical nutrition specialists.

### COMPENSATION INCREASED

Compensation benefits for disabled veterans increased by 3.7 percent as part of a cost-of-living allowance authorized by Congress and signed into law by President Bush on Nov. 12, 1991. The increase became effective December 1, and should be reflected in veteran's benefit checks starting in January.

The increase benefits some 2 million veterans, whose monthly payments will now range from \$83 for a single veteran with a

10 percent disability rating to \$1,680 for a single veteran with a 100 percent disability rating.

Also receiving the 3.7 percent benefit increase are 341,000 survivors of service members or veterans who died from service-connected causes. Additional benefits available to veterans with a 30 percent or higher disability rating.

Veterans receiving disability benefits need not apply for the cost-of-living increase, as the Department of Veteran Affairs has programmed its computers for automatic processing.

Veterans and dependents at the 30 percent or higher disability rating may contact the nearest Veteran's Administration office for information on the possible added benefits or allowances.

Recipients of Social Security benefits also will receive a 3.7 percent increase in benefits, effective in January.

### HOUSING OPTIONS

needs and desires of the mature adult.

### PREVENT OSTEOPOROSIS

Estraderm, a skin-patch medication system prescribed since 1986 to

treat menopausal symptoms, has now been approved by the federal Food and Drug Administration for preventing postmenopausal osteoporosis.

Affecting 25 million Americans, mostly women, osteoporosis is characterized by loss of bone mass, leading to reduced bone strength, poor bone quality and an increased risk of fractures.

Research conducted at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., demonstrated Estraderm's long-term benefits in preventing postmenopausal bone loss that can lead to fractures.

Estraderm, defined as an estradiol transdermal system, is marketed by CIBA-GEIGY Corp. through its pharmaceuticals division.

## Report extra 1991 earnings to Social Security

If you work and receive Social Security benefits, take a look now at your final 1991 pay slips or your W-2 forms. If your 1991 earnings are over Social Security annual limits, you will need to report them to Social Security.

The 1991 earnings limits are \$9,720 for beneficiaries who are age 65 through 69 and \$7,080 for beneficiaries who are under 65. The earnings limits do not apply to people who are 70 and over the entire year.

We used your estimate of 1991 earnings submitted when you applied for benefits (or when you filed last year's earnings report)

to figure out the Social Security benefits you would be paid in 1991. The purpose of this year's annual report is to enable us to compare your actual earnings to your estimate to see if you have been underpaid or overpaid. If you are underpaid, you will get a check out for the additional benefits. If you were overpaid, we usually deduct the overpayment amount from your future benefits, unless you prefer to make a refund.

In addition, the report must also include an estimate of the earnings you expect to make in 1991.

Again, your benefit check will be adjusted to reflect any excess earnings anticipated.

If our records show that you expected to have earnings over the 1991 limits, we will send you an annual report of earnings form in the mail automatically. If you do not receive a report form by the end of February, you can call our toll-free number of have one sent to you. Instead of filling out the form, you can give us your earnings report over the phone if you choose.

You must return the earnings report to us by April 15. There is a sub-

stantial penalty for not filing an annual report of earnings on time. You can be penalized up to one full month's benefits for nonfiling, and also be required to repay any overpayment.

Filing a Federal income tax return does not take the place of filing an annual report with Social Security. Note that the 1992 earnings limits are \$7,440 for beneficiaries under 65 and \$10,200 for beneficiaries who are 65-69.

**Chewy Pecan Pie Squares**

1 package yellow cake mix  
5 large eggs  
1 c. dark corn syrup  
1 c. sugar  
1/4 c. margarine, melted  
1/2 c. oil  
2 c. chopped pecans

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease 9x13' pan. In large bowl, mix cake mix, 1 egg and oil until crumbly. Press into bottom of prepared pan and bake 15 minutes.
