City agrees to deed two acres to group

Parade ordinance introduced at council meeting

An ordinance regulating parades and other uses of public places was introduced to the Cadiz City Council on Feb. 2.

The parade ordinance, similar to one enacted by the city council in Central City, must be approved by councilmen on two separate readings before it becomes law. The first reading is scheduled during the March 2 council meeting.

Cadiz Mayor Scott Sivills said the city needs such a law to control the environment around parades.

The ordinance states no person or organization may participate in a parade without a permit obtained through the city clerk's office. The document also includes procedures on how to apply for a permit, duties of the permittee, notice of rejection, appeal procedures, and public conduct during parades.

The ordinance does not apply to funeral processions, governmental agencies acting within the scope of its functions, and students going to and from school classes or participating in educational activities.

In other business, the council approved salary increases for councilmen and the mayor, beginning with the new term in January 1994. Councilman Billy Burke abstained from the vote.

The mayor's salary will increase from \$1,500 annually to \$3,600. The mayor's yearly expenditures also will rise from \$1,500 to \$2,000.

Sivills, who announced in January that he would not seek a third term as mayor, urged councilmen to increase the mayor's expense budget due to frequent business trips to Frankfort.

The salary of councilmen will increase from \$75 to \$100 a month.

Prior to voting for the raises, councilmen compared various salaries from several 5th Class cities (with populations between 1,000 and 2,500). Annual salary ranges included, for the mayor, \$300 in Jeffersonville (population 1,854) to \$8,400 in Pineland (population 2,198), and, for councilmen, \$120 in Liberty (population 1,937) to \$1,200 in both Crecent Springs (population 2,179) and Falmouth (population 2,378).

Genesis Express proposes enrichment center

The proposed Trigg County Enrichment Center took one step closer to becoming a reality when the Cadiz City Council unanimously agreed to deed a two acre tract of land to Genesis Express, Inc. for the project.

Councilmen voted to deed the property, part of an old dump site on Line Street across from Bailey Lumber Company, to the local organization for \$1 when Genesis Express secures the funding for the proposed center.

Members of Genesis Express made a formal request at the Feb. 2 council meeting.

"We know Trigg County is rich in a lot of areas," said George Radford, a spokesman for Genesis Express. "We just want to make the community richer."

Genesis Express, with the help of the city of Cadiz, will apply for funding through the Pennyrite Area Development District, said Cadiz Mayor Scott Sivills.

The group also is examining other

grants as sources of funding the project.

Radford said until formal plans for the building are developed, he would not know how much the project would cost. The group is expected to meet with an architect in the next few weeks.

Genesis Express has proposed constructing a 50-foot-by-40-foot building to serve as the multi-purpose meeting facility, open to the entire community. The building would be constructed on the front part of the site, away from the dump area. The proposed center would have a meeting room, office, kitchen, garage, lobby, and storage area.

Some councilmen expressed concern that the dump site might not be a suitable location for the building and may limit future expansion. Radford said the location was suitable, adding that the center may lead to other community improvement efforts in the area.

"There is nothing going on in the north end of the community," said Radford.

"This is one more way we can improve that part of our community."

Activities that may be held in the enrichment center include:

- Tutoring programs for youth and supplemental adult education programs.
- Speakers from various organizations discussing life skills topics.
- Chaperoned parties for youth and other youth activities.
- Meetings of social clubs and self-help groups.

Prior to the council's vote, Sivills voiced his support to the project.

"I'm impressed with the way the project will benefit all of the community," said Sivills. "Genesis Express has certainly demonstrated leadership with this and other projects."

Genesis Express, Inc. was formed six years ago by a group of men who were concerned about aiding the youth, elderly, and needy of Trigg County.

Local woman dies; clothes ignite in fire

A 72-year-old Trigg County woman burned to death in her yard on Feb. 4 after her clothes ignited from a trash fire.

Mary Hampton died from burns and smoke inhalation, according to Trigg County Coroner John Vinson, at her home approximately two miles south of Cadiz. She died at the scene.

Firefighters from East Golden Pond and South Road Fire Departments responded to put out a yard shed that caught fire. Hampton's body was about 50 feet from the shed.

A neighbor discovered the blaze. Hampton's husband was home at the time and did not realize what happened because he is bedridden.

Trigg school board expels student for code violation

In a special called meeting on Feb. 8, the Trigg County School Board voted to expel one high school student for the remainder of the semester for violation of the student code.

Superintendent Jim Wallace

declined to comment on the reasons for the expulsion because the student is a minor.

The school board met in closed session for approximately one hour before taking the vote.

Members of the Cadiz Water Commission on Feb. 8 learned that bids for the water treatment plant renovation project could be advertised within the next week.

City Clerk Jim Lancaster told the board that the bidding process could be completed by next month with the renovation

Cerulean Post Office vandalized during weekend

The Cerulean Post Office was vandalized sometime during the day Sunday. Postal workers arrived at work Monday morning and found that two mailboxes had been opened and circulars were taken from the wall and put on the floor. No items were reported missing.

One of the mailboxes had been broken into through the glass pane, while the other was entered through a failure of the locking mechanism.

According to the Trigg County Sheriff Dept. report, the door of the post office

remains open, and that was how the perpetrator gained access to the mailbox area.

Virginia Parrish, the officer in charge at the Cerulean Post Office, said that the vandalism will not stop the post office's practice of keeping its doors open "unless I hear otherwise."

Three other complaints were filed at the sheriff's department this week.

Richard R. Sables of Hopkinsville reported that someone had taken his Jon boat from the yard of Arthur Heltzel of

Hog Ford Bridge Road between Jan. 17 and Jan. 31.

The boat is described as a green 14-foot boat that has one handle missing from the rear and has a registration sticker. The boat is valued at \$400.

Two cases of criminal mischief were reported last week.

Norris D. Boyd of West End Street reported that after he parked his mobile home on Hilltop Drive on Feb. 3, he returned the next day and found the windows facing Hilltop Drive broken out. The damage cost was estimated to be \$150.

James J. Casey of Old Tannard Road reported that someone threw eggs at his car between Jan. 30 and Feb. 1, damaging his car.

Three arrests were reported by the sheriff's department this week.

Robert R. Hayes, 43, of Lebanon, Tenn., was arrested on Feb. 2 two miles north of Cadiz for theft by failure to make required disposition of over \$100. He was held in Trigg County Jail on \$25,000 cash bond.

A bit of Yellow Creek

Just short of twelve noon on Wednesday, Jan. 20, I stood a few feet away as Bill Clinton was sworn in as our 42nd president. It was an amazing thing to be part of this day.

After nearly a month of rain and clouds in the Capitol, the sun was out. The memorials and museums along the mall were in plain view, including the dome atop the National Archives building, which houses the constitution the president had just pledged to uphold. Below the platform, 300,000 people witnessed the peaceful transfer of power that has marked the genius of our government for 200 years.

It was my privilege to introduce the new president to the nation, and let me tell you, at that moment, surrounded by the current and former presidents, members of Congress, and supreme court justices, I felt a long way from Yellow Creek.

But that feeling didn't last for long.

Walking the halls of the Capitol immediately after the ceremony, and watching the parade later that day, I was reminded that the inauguration is made up of much more than that handful of people on the platform.

In the crowds that came to participate in the event, I truly saw the "faces of America. There were farmers and Wall Street lawyers, small business owners and corporate CEOs, children and people old enough to have seen 10 presidents take the oath of office.

They had backgrounds as different from one another as possible, but they all came to Washington with a common purpose: to be part of something historic, and to demonstrate their confidence in, and hopes for, their new president. And their personal stories and experiences were as much a part of the inauguration as Bill Clinton's pledge to defend the constitution.

In his speech, President Clinton said, "When our Founders boldly declared America's independence to the world and our purposes to the Almighty, they knew that America, to endure, would have to change. Not change for change's sake, but change to preserve America's ideals -- life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness."

The faces in the crowd reminded me that these principles -- life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness -- remain a vital part of each individual life here in America. And I had the sense that all those Americans were there to assure the new president they were willing to adapt to changing times in order to continue the pursuit of these unchanging goals.

During the week, I read about a Kentucky woman who came to the inauguration and told a reporter she had not been to Washington in 30 years. The last time, she had stood with half a million others on the mall and listened to Dr. Martin Luther King's "I Have a Dream" speech. Considering the importance of Dr. King's life and that speech in particular, it means something that this woman returned to participate in this inauguration. I also heard Barbara Hendricks, the African American opera singer from Arkansas who performed at the inaugural gala, tell the story of her son asking if she has been allowed at that time to attend the same school. It means something that Ms. Hendricks persevered, witnessed the end of segregation, became a star in her own right, and came to share her talents at the inaugural celebration.

There are more stories about the people who came from everywhere to watch a new president take power. In their stories, and in their faces, the real power of the inauguration shines through.

It isn't about powerful people on a platform, it's about regular Americans who came to witness it in person or on television, and who take to heart the president's promise to uphold our constitution.

It's regular Americans in small towns, big cities and the countryside who must make sure the new president and the government hold onto their promises. And it is regular Americans who will take it out of our hides if we fail.

So you see, Yellow Creek isn't that far away at all.

Keeping economic promises

Throughout the recent presidential race, much of the rhetoric from both campaigns focused on the economy, and what each candidate could do to fix it. So intense was the focus in Bill Clinton's campaign, that his headquarters displayed a sign reading, "It's the economy, stupid." But even before he was sworn in as president, Bill Clinton began to backpedal on his economic promises -- from his commitment to a middle-class tax cut to his pledge to cut the federal deficit in half.

Recently, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) revised its deficit forecast, releasing figures showing the federal deficit to be considerably higher than originally projected. While these figures were made available to both presidential candidates, neither utilized them in formulating their economic proposals. Now, President Clinton claims the new figures caught him off-guard and will prevent him from fully implementing his economic plan. But even Clinton's OMB chief, Leon Panetta, acknowledged that the higher deficit estimates were publicized last August by the Congressional Budget Office.

Throughout his campaign, President Clinton promised to ease the tax burden on the middle class with a tax cut of as much as 10 percent, and to cut the deficit in half. However, Clinton now claims he may not be able to fulfill either of those promises, citing the newly released deficit projections as the reason. In his confirmation hearing, Panetta implied that the tax cut would be placed on the back burner, claiming that deficit reduction is a higher priority.

I was recently appointed to a task force on economic issues which will formulate an alternative economic strategy to Clinton's anticipated plan. The Task Force on Economics will develop and recommend job-creation proposals for the first 100 days, such as investment and savings incentives, capital gains tax fairness, and small business assistance.

American schools: three R's and V -- for violence

WASHINGTON -- Back when I was growing up, the most serious disciplinary problems in schools were chewing gum, running in the halls, talking in class -- or the rare utterance of the single word, "sex."

Today, the list is headed by drinking and drug use, assaults, rapes -- even murder.

There are no reliable national figures on school violence. But a lot of individual school districts report a rise in weapons-related incidents. And stories from around the country leave little doubt that violence is a growing threat:

• The number of students suspended for disciplinary problems increased dramatically in Washington, D.C., area schools in 1991-92, according to the *Washington Post*. While most of the suspensions resulted from fights, rudeness to teachers and refusal to follow directions, there was a significant rise in incidents involving weapons.

• Last February, two students were shot to death by another student in Brooklyn's Thomas Jefferson High School. In the previous four years, 70 students had been killed, shot, stabbed or permanently injured on that school's grounds.

• In Baldwin Park, Calif., during the last school year, two boys about 8 and 10 robbed a teacher at gunpoint.

• According to federal studies, one student in five carries a weapon and one in 20 carries a gun.

But it's just another problem for big cities."

The violence is definitely worse there, but *Congressional Quarterly* notes that it is also on the rise in suburbs and small towns. In Parkland, a middle-class suburb of Tacoma, Wash., the vice principal and security guards were issued bulletproof vests out of concern over violence. Surveys have found that 23 percent of students carry a weapon to school in Iowa and that boys in small Texas towns carry handguns to school at twice the national rate.

Two of the wealthiest suburbs of our nation's capital, Fairfax County in Virginia and Montgomery County in Maryland, had 24 percent increases in student suspensions in the last school year.

Authorities believe that one of the major causes of the growing violence is the drug and gang culture, which makes the gun-toting dealers heroes and role models. Once a few dealers start carrying

weapons to school, their friends and associates go out and get their own -- something that's all too easy to do. Overall, arrests for homicides among juveniles have been increasing five times

faster than among adults.

Other factors that have been cited for school violence are child abuse (often found in the families of children who kill) and the failure of parents and schools to take strong disciplinary action against serious offenders.

Schools have begun to fight back. One-fourth of urban school districts are using metal detectors to screen students. In addition to fire drills, many schools now hold regular drills in which students learn to duck at the sound of gunfire. Schools across the country have started requiring student identification cards, and are hiring security officers.

These precautions, however necessary, create a grim atmosphere in what should be a pleasant place. They cannot help but interfere with the process of learning.

What we need is to get at the roots of the problem. Tougher gun-control legislation would help. So would education and counseling for both children and parents, along with other family-, community- and school-based violence-prevention programs.

And, of course, we must create environments that nurture hope and safety. It is not a coincidence that Thomas Jefferson High School is in the heart of a ghetto and that one of every two students drops out.

Only through bold, new efforts can we remake our schools into places of learning, not violence, where the teachers' greatest disciplinary worry once again will be gum chewing, not gun toting.

Just the Other Day

I received a lengthy letter from John Garrett Ladd the other day. John was reminiscing about the days of his childhood when he resided at various sites within the vicinity of Cerulean, Kentucky. He mentioned that he and his family moved hither and yon often.



John wrote that a couple of dollars less in rental fees had a bearing on just where his family would call home next. Such was one effect of "the great depression" in those days.

John's epistle was 'munchy', to the point that he inserted a note to the effect that I might be wondering "Is this guy going to ever shut up?" Contrary to his thinking, I enjoyed every word of his rambling and intend to use some of the ideas that he kindled in my mind--with apologies to those of you may have roots elsewhere in Trigg County. Here is my version of a wheat threshing thing, in older times, that he requested.

WHEAT-THRESHING was a community affair as I remember it, when the grain got ripe on the Buffalo Road farms of the Turners, the Elliots, and others who lived within hoofing distance of where I happened to be visiting in Cerulean. My memory of threshing related to things that may be hazy, but here goes:

A throaty whistle sounded at the foot of Horse Creek hill or the "Tom Baker" hill, and I knew that it came not from the railroad tracks on the other side of Cerulean. My question of "What's That?" was answered by "The thresher is coming."

Not even knowing that it was that time of the year, I shuffled my feet in anxiety with other kids as we waited for the puffing monster to appear. With more urgent whistles, the great steam engine finally hove into sight pulling its burdensome threshing partner. We all ran to greet it and walked slowly with it as we marveled at the way it crushed rocks beneath its sturdy steel wheels and sent sparks flying amid its commanding hissing and rattling noises.

Grown-ups were busy further up the road at the first stand of wheat. A horse drawn mower was making laps around the field as stalks of golden grain fell gracefully victim and were scooped up and tied into sheaves to be hauled to the spot where the thresher would be located. When the steam engine found its spot, it halted with its governor still whirling, and a grea-a-a-t long belt was placed on its flywheel to connect it to the thresher. All were warned to stay clear of the belt, since belts had been known to fly off of their drive wheels. But (in case anything went wrong) Roy Witty, a chief blacksmith, could fix anything except injured people.

A lot of the whistle signaled when it was time to get the show on the road, and that is when the start of a straw stack began, and husked wheat spouted into waiting cloth bags to be loaded on to wagons.

In the meantime--boys followed the mower to chase rabbits that scurried out of their holes to head for new cover. Sometimes, rabbit burrows were found to contain baby hares that might be taken for pets or left-be until the ruckus was over. Few boys were agile enough to capture darting cottontails, and well-worn tennis shoes or bare feet made the race more favorable to bucks and does in the stubble field.

In the meantime--again--lots of farm women gathered in the kitchen to prepare a sumptuous meal that was worthy and sufficient enough to feed all of the sweaty and chaff covered workers as they came and went in tolerable shifts. The fare was likely to sport everything from fresh garden vegetables to luscious desserts and cold liquids to quench the greatest thirst. I was never invited to one of those tables, but I expect I would be homemade and good.

Dining with politically correct dishes

My hero and professional role model, Chicago Tribune columnist Mike Royko, had an astounding piece recently.

The executive, also black, ordered the Southern dishes be stricken from the Friday menu. Meat loaf and egg rolls were served instead.

What is astounding to me is, in our search to become more politically correct and sensitive, in this one instance at least, food became an issue.

Southern food. What has come to be known as soul food.

And my food, too.

I think it is important to point out that

barbecue ribs, black-eyed peas, grits and collards may, in fact, be a choice dish to many black Americans. But it also sounds pretty darn good to me, a white man.

I grew up on soul food. We just called it country cooking. My grandmother cooked it. My mother cooked it.

Friends cooked it. Still do. I might not have made it through my second heart operation if it hadn't been for the country cooking of one of the world's kindest ladies, Jackie Walburn, who delivered such food to me in the hospital.

And my friend Carol Dunn in Orlando has served me many an enchanting spread featuring her wonderful pork roast.

My aunt Una cooked me fried chicken, speckled-heart butterbeans, turnip greens, mashed potatoes and creamed corn as recently as Thanksgiving eve.

The creamed corn, the best I ever ate, was provided by my Aunt Jessie.

I scour the world for this kind of food. Hap Towns will serve you the best pan-

fried cornbread you ever tasted in Nashville, and I've driven miles out of the way to taste country cooking at the New Perry Hotel in Perry, Ga., hometown of Sen. Sam Nunn.

Don't tell me serving food like that is an affront to the memory of Dr. King. What it would have been in Normal is a celebration of the sort of cooking that has been prevalent in the South, both for blacks and whites, for 200 years.

Royko asked, "Next Columbus Day, would it be an insult to serve spaghetti and meatballs?"

What a plate of hogwash, and I can get by with that. I have a pig valve in my own heart, and I can eat my share of barbecue ribs with anybody, black or white or whatever.

To charge stereotyping over food trivializes the King holiday. The man didn't give his life for something stupid like that.

It's silly and it's stupid and it makes me want to throw up. Had I eaten meat loaf and egg rolls for lunch, I might





pump shaft. The new pumps would increase pumping capabilities from 450 gallons to 600 gallons a minute. Replacement of the pumps will complete the second phase of the Water Line Replacement Project at an estimated cost of \$30,500, about \$21,000 less than the engineer's estimate.

Law changes filing requirements

FRANKFORT - Changes in property tax law enacted by the 1992 General Assembly have a major effect on filing requirements for tangible and intangible personal property tax returns beginning in 1993.

Personal property is now deemed omitted if a return is not filed by April 15, the cur-

rent statutory due date for property tax returns. The change requires a 10 percent penalty on personal property tax returns postmarked after April 15, 1993. Previously, personal property was not deemed omitted until the county where the property was located had been certified, usually in August or September.

Tangible and intangible personal property tax returns may be filed either with the county property valuation administrator (PVA) or with the Division of State Valuation, Revenue Cabinet, Brighton Park, Suite 6, 330 Versailles Road, Frankfort, Kentucky 40620 (502) 564-8180.

damage to the front of Joyce's vehicle. Wilson's vehicle sustained minor damage to the front and rear, and West's vehicle sustained minor damage to the rear. Joyce's vehicle was brought to Standard Service Center, while the other two vehicles remained in service.

Both Joyce and a passenger in his car, Pauline Joyce, were wearing their seatbelts. Neither Wilson nor West was wearing a seatbelt.

Family medical leave to be discussed

U.S. Representative Ron Mazzoli, D-Ky., and two leaders from state government will brief a group of Kentucky leaders on family medical leave at a session in Frankfort on Thursday, Feb. 11.

Mazzoli, Kentucky Labor Secretary Carol Palmore and state Representative Tom Burch, chair of the House Health and Welfare Committee, will speak at an issue

briefing sponsored by the Kentucky Commission on Women and the Kentucky Labor Cabinet.

This recently enacted legislation requires businesses that employ 50 or more workers to allow 12 weeks unpaid leave for the care of a new-born or sick family member. According to a study of 200 local manufacturers recently completed by the Kentucky Labor Cabinet, nearly

all of the employers offered informal leave policies. However, since few companies have written procedures, the employees request is left to the supervisor's discretion.

The seminar, funded by the Women's Bureau, U.S. Dept. of Labor will bring together key policy makers, as well as representatives of citizen, women's and labor groups from across the state.

Senate approves reform package

FRANKFORT -- A comprehensive ethics reform package cleared its first hurdle to being law on Feb. 4 as members of the Senate of the state General Assembly voted unanimously for the bill's approval.

Parts of the bill calling for changes in ethics reform for public officials from

state legislators to city government officials were hotly debated in the legislature's higher chamber before lawmakers approved it.

"Corruption in Kentucky is not as bad as in some places," Sen. Tim Philpot, R-Lexington, said before the Senate voted on the bill. "We're fortunate to live in a country where honesty and integrity mean something."

The bill would impose the nation's strongest limit on money legislative candidates can receive from Political Action Committees at 35 percent. Candidates would also have to report all PAC contributions regardless of their amount, and would have to report any amount of money lobbyist groups spend on them.

Philpot read from postcards he said some of his constituents had mailed to him during the first special session of 1993 of the General Assembly. The postcards accused legislators of being corrupt and easily influenced by lobbyists.

The special session on ethics reform convened Monday, with members of both the House and the Senate meeting privately

and in public committee meetings to iron out details of proposed ethics legislation. Public outcry for ethics reform for state lawmakers became louder after a federal corruption investigation led to the indictments of several key legislators, including Rep. Don Blandford, D-Philpot, former Speaker of the House.

"It's not the fault of any newspaper that we're down here this week," Philpot said. "It was the FBI that gave us a wake-up call. Nevertheless, some members of the legislature think this was just some newspaper stirring up trouble."

"The people are angry. I'm sure you know that," Philpot continued. "They think this is a travesty."

Debate became hot in the chamber when Senate members discussed an amendment to the proposed ethics legislation that would deny future state pension benefits to lawmakers convicted of felonies. The amendment, which passed 32-4, calls for legislators who are convicted of felonies to lose all pension funds from "state-administered retirement systems."

Reduced purchase intentions for 1993 cause maximum decrease in basic burley quota

A decline in burley manufacturers' purchase intentions for the 1993-94 buying season will result in the maximum quota decrease allowed under law.

"The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced that burley manufacturer's purchase intentions will be 361 million pounds for the 1993-94 buying season," said Will Snell, extension agricultural policy specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. "This is a 19-percent decrease from last year and will cause a 10-percent decline in basic quota for 1993."

Snell said manufacturers are required to deliver purchase intentions to the USDA on Jan. 15; however the 1993 burley quota will not be officially announced until Feb. 1.

The basic burley quota is set using a three-component formula - manufacturers' purchase intentions, a three-year average of exports, and an adjustment in reserve stocks to maintain adequate supplies, according to Snell. "The manufacturer purchase intentions component plays the greatest role in determining the quota change because it is the largest component in the formula," he said.

"The large decline in purchase intentions is reason for major concern throughout the industry," Snell added. "Without the provision to es-

ablish a 10 percent maximum cut, the formula would have called for a basic quota reduction exceeding 20 percent for 1993. This is the last year for a maximum reduction. Hereafter, the basic quota will decline by as much as the formula dictates; there will be no maximum limit to future quota reductions."

Snell said the reduced purchase intentions will generate much debate among U.S. tobacco companies, congressmen from tobacco-producing states, and farm leadership on such issues as price support, policy modifications and imports.

Manufacturers' purchase intentions for 1993 are nearly 150 million pounds lower than those submitted in 1991, according to Snell. He said the following situations could have contributed to decreased purchase intentions for the 1993 marketing year:

- * As a result of a sustained period of underproduction from 1986-90, purchase intentions were inflated in 1991 to boost production to an adequate level.
- * Continued strong sales of U.S. tobacco products in new markets (the former Soviet Union and eastern Europe) did not materialize.
- * Changing manufacturers' blending strategies call for more imported tobacco to

lower production costs to compete with increasing sales of generic cigarettes, which constitute about 30 percent of total sales.

Burley tobacco imports have increased significantly in response to foreign market price and tobacco company production incentives. Beginning foreign burley stocks were 230 million pounds in 1992, a 28-percent increase from 1991 and a 55-percent increase over 1990.

Because manufacturers are substituting lower-priced imports for U.S. tobacco in their blending strategies, more domestic tobacco is going into grower-owned cooperatives in the eight burley-producing states. Six percent of the 1991 crop, just over 15 percent of the 1992 crop has gone into the pool, compared to nearly four percent of the 1991 crop for the same number of sale days, and none for the 1990 crop.

Adjustments to pool stocks necessary to maintain adequate supplies are one component of the quota-setting formula.

"Reduced purchase intentions, in addition to the continuing social and political ramifications of the anti-tobacco environment will make 1993 a challenging and volatile year for Kentucky tobacco growers," Snell said.

Crop rotation: Old-fashioned, but it works

Rotating crops so that the same crop isn't produced year after year on the same land is a practice advocated for generations. And even though it is an old method, it is still recommended because it works.

"We have many new varieties of tobacco that are genetically resistant to important diseases, but no one variety is resistant to all diseases. The combination of crop rotation and the use of resistant varieties helps sustain yields," said Bill Nesmith, plant pathologist with the Univer-

sity of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Why does crop rotation work?

"Basically, when you grow the same crop year after year in the same soil, some disease organisms are favored and they increase in numbers. They adapt to the local environment and the number of pathogens surviving from one crop year to the next increases. And since the crop is vital to their continued survival in the soil, switching crops robs the disease organism of something neces-

sary for its survival," Nesmith said.

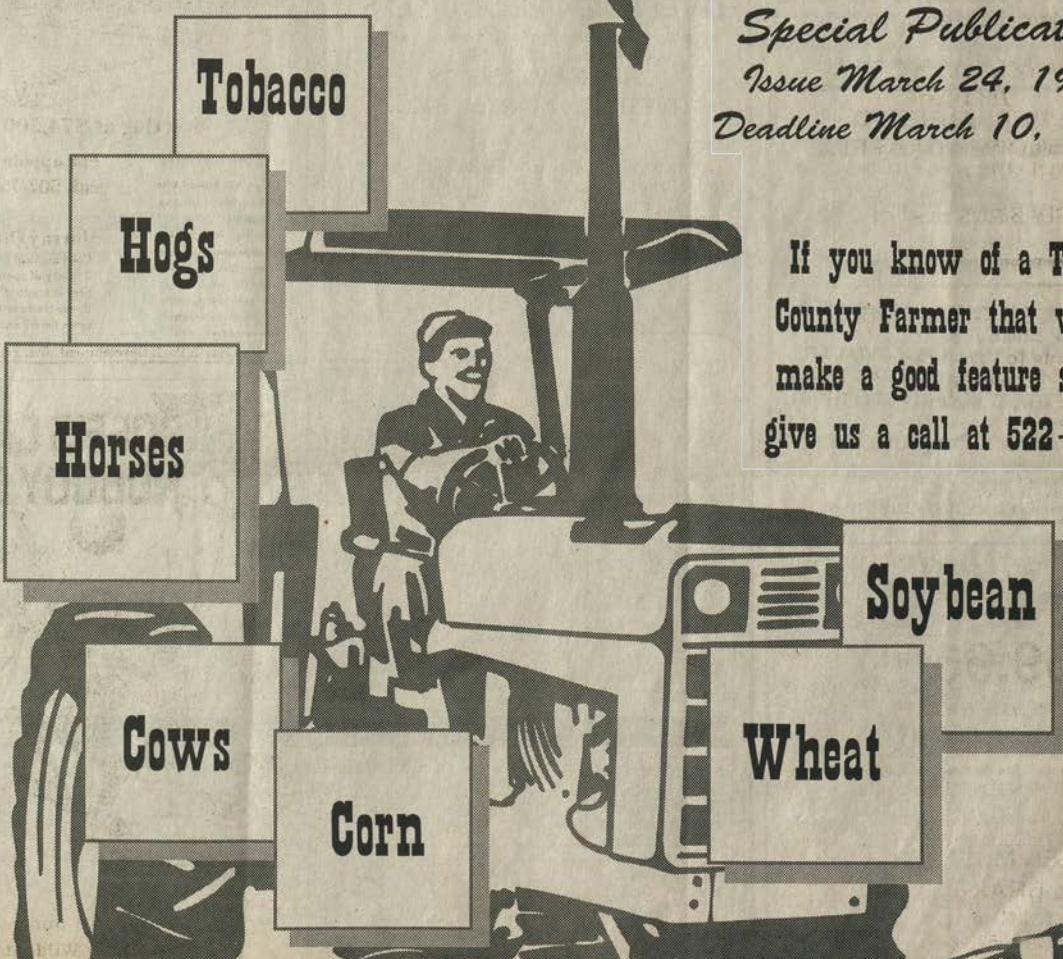
In addition, he said, some diseases such as black shank increase their virulence as they become more and more adapted to the local environment.

"We continue to recommend crop rotation to help avoid building up of disease organisms in the soil. Preventing diseases through crop rotation rather than depending on the plant's resistance alone or the use of chemical controls to do the job promotes sustainability," he said.

One industry's waste, another industry's gold

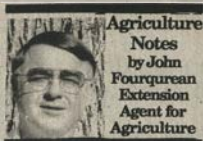
Kentucky's expanding poultry industry has created increased interest in using poultry litter as fertilizer.

The primary component of litter is bedding material, according to Monroe Rasnake, Extension Agronomist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture's Research & Education Center in Princeton.

"Wood shavings or sawdust and manure are what make up poultry litter," Rasnake said.

The cost of collection and disposal of litter is part of the cost of raising poultry. Therefore, most of the cost associated with using it as fertilizer is transportation and labor.

Average nutrient values for

one ton of poultry litter are 55 pounds of nitrogen, 50 pounds of phosphorous and 40 pounds of potassium. Compared with commercial fertilizer, one ton of poultry litter is worth roughly \$30 if it were to replace commercial fertilizer.

Another benefit of using poultry litter is the additional value of organic matter and trace nutrients being incorpo-

rated into the soil. Using poultry litter in combination with commercial fertilizer is a fine way to achieve proper nutrient supply and balance.

Research has shown that fescue grass, among other crops, responds very well to poultry litter. By using two tons of poultry litter, the same results were obtained on fescue as if 100 pounds of nitrogen were applied.

Does Certified Seed Cost? Is it cost effective to seed better varieties of red clover. research from the Agronomy

Dept. of the University of Kentucky has compared the performance of common or unimproved red clovers to certified varieties at the Spindletop Research Farm in Fayette Co. Their results found that the certified improved varieties yielded an average of 1000 pounds more forage per acre in the first year of production of a spring seeding.

In the second year, seeding a better variety was worth 2000 lb. more forage per acre.

Even if the improved seed cost \$2 more per pound and you seeded 10 lb. of seed per acre, that extra \$20 was worth over 3000 lb. of forage over the first two years.

Stands of improved varieties were thick and vigorous going into their second winter, while the commons were clearly thinning.

Don't settle for anything less than an improved, certified variety of red clover. You can tell if the variety is certified by the presence of a blue tag on the bag. The blue tag is the only guarantee that the genetics in the bag match the name on the bag.

The bottom line is that seeding an improved, certified variety of red clover pays, period.

Complete data on trials are available at your local County Extension Office.

Several new uses for soybeans being explored

Kentucky soybean farmers attending Soybean Conference 93 at Lake Barkley Convention were told new markets for their products could put millions of dollars in their pockets.

Studies suggest a potential market for pet food and soy diesel could create a major new demand for soybeans if current research proves successful, said James Herbek, extension grains specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"One of the issues facing the soybean industry is to create new markets," Herbek said. "That means expanding existing markets and establishing new international markets. It also means finding new ways to use soybeans in non-traditional ways."

David Thomas, chief executive officer for the United Soybean Board, told those attending the conference of research underway to create new uses for soybeans. In his talk, designed to tell Kentucky soybean growers where their check-off dollars were going, he said soy ink for printing presses is one non-traditional use which already has been getting some publicity.

"We have about 1,800 printers using soy ink now," he said. "Our research indicates a potential new market for some 16

million bushels for that."

Studies suggest that even that might be dwarfed by the potential for soy use in pet foods, he added. That potential could reach as much as 100 million bushels of new demand for soybeans.

"Growing more soybeans isn't the answer to money in the back pocket," he said. "If we are going to increase the supply, we must also increase the demand."

Another area of future potential demand is for soy diesel fuel.

Thomas said a test program is about to get underway in California to test a soy diesel in 70-30 combination with a mass transit bus system. While he doesn't expect motorists to see Soy diesel at the gasoline stations in the immediate future, it could have a significant impact on mass transit systems to help them meet future emissions requirements.

Still another product using soybean by-products is a new composite building material, called New Stone, which has the look of polished granite. This material is made of soybean proteins and waste paper, including newspapers, and can be as easily worked in construction as wood, yet has the elegant appearance of stone.

Increase profits

Renovate those pastures soon for bigger profits

Smart farmers are already thinking about renovating those fescue pastures to maximize profits in the coming year. Why?

Renovation can increase hay yields, improve quality of the pasture, improve summer production and benefit the soil through nitrogen fixation, said Garry Laceyfield, extension agronomist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Mid-February to early March is the ideal time to begin renovation of those pastures, Laceyfield said.

"Pasture renovation by definition means to establish legumes such as red or ladino clovers in those fescue fields," Laceyfield said.

Farmers who start new pastures may want to establish new endophyte-free varieties, but for most farmers the older "dirty" fescue fields, which contain the endophyte that

brings on the "summer slump" for cattle grazing in late July and August, should be dealt with through renovation, he said.

"We have five and one-half million acres in fescue in Kentucky and the endophyte is in most of them," Laceyfield said. "We know it's a problem, but we also know that to get legumes into that pasture is one of the answers."

Laceyfield added that legumes do more than just get cattle through the summer slump period. They improve production throughout the year.

"A UK study compared renovating a fescue pasture using red clover with another field renovated by fertilizing the grass with nitrogen," he said.

"That study showed that red clover growing with fescue produced higher yields than fescue fertilized with up to 180 pounds of nitrogen."

The first step for renovation should always be to get a soil test, he added. Getting legumes established requires a little more lime, phosphorous and potassium, so the soil test is essential. Farmers should fertilize according to that soil test, but should not use extra nitrogen.

"Nitrogen stimulates the grass in the field to grow quicker and compete with the newly planted clover," he said.

Farmers should use high quality seed of an adapted variety and if those seeds are not pre-inoculated, they should make sure they use an inoculant with the proper strain of bacteria.

Farmers use a variety of methods to get the seeds into the ground, including using an airplane to over seed the pastures. Some farmers put the seeds on the surface, and others

use various drills to put them into the soil.

"Pasture renovators to put the seed at the proper space and depth work well," Laceyfield said, "but they are more expensive. UK research shows that all these methods can work well in Kentucky although each has its advantages and disadvantages."

The main reason for failure of some renovation attempts is that the fescue grows too quickly and crowds out the young clover. This problem can be corrected by allowing cattle to graze the field to keep fescue short until the clover is established.

"Once the clover is about two inches tall and the cattle begin to eat the clover rather than the fescue, the farmer should remove the cattle for four to six weeks," Laceyfield said. "The clover will be able to compete with the fescue then."

Broccoli Cornbread

- 1 pkg. 10 oz. chopped frozen broccoli (cooked & well drained)
- 1 pkg. Jiffy corn meal mix
- 4 eggs
- 1/2 cup small curd cottage cheese
- 1 medium onion finely chopped
- 1 stick margarine melted

Beat eggs and add other ingredients. Mix well and pour into greased 9x13 pan or 2 - 8 inch square pans. Bake 375 degrees for 25-30 minutes. This freezes well.

Holy Cow Cake

- 1 german chocolate cake mix
- 1 can eagle brand milk
- 3 heath bars (crushed)
- 1 jar caramel ice cream sauce
- 1 large carton cool whip

Mix and bake according to directions on package. In a 9x13 inch pan. Take cake out of oven and poke holes in and pour eagle brand milk over cake. Spread caramel sauce over cake. Refrigerate overnight. Top with cool whip and sprinkle with crushed heath bars on top.

USDA announces 1993 burley tobacco program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced the following provisions of the 1993 burley tobacco program.

* A national marketing quota of 603 million pounds, down 10 percent from the 1992 quota of 670 million pounds.

* A basic quota decrease for each farm of 10 percent from 1992.

* An effective quota of 730 million pounds, 106 million below 1992.

The support level, marketing assessment and no-set-cost

program assessment will be announced later.

Three factors used by USDA in calculating the national quota, which must be announced by Feb. 1, resulted in a total of 520.8 million pounds, 22.3 percent below the 1992 quota. However, law stipulates that the burley national quota for 1993 shall be not less than 90 percent of the quota for the preceding year.

In February 1992, a referendum was held in which producers approved poundage quotas for the 1992-94 crops.

Weather causes ventilation problems in livestock buildings

Fluctuating temperatures and moist weather often cause inadequate ventilation in livestock buildings, according to extension specialists with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"The combination of moderate temperatures and wet weather make it difficult to remove moisture from barns and poultry and swine houses, especially those that don't have fans," said Doug Overhults, extension agriculture engineer at the UK Research and Education Center in Princeton.

Inadequate ventilation contributes to respiratory disease problems because the excess moisture can foster bacterial growth, according to Gary Parker, extension swine specialist. The diseases are expensive both in terms of reduced animal performance and treatment costs.

The extension specialists said there are a few solutions to the ventilation problem except to

increase air flow and add heat as needed to control moisture and temperature conditions in the buildings.

"Don't allow humidity to go above 70 percent for an extended period of time," Parker said. "You can monitor humidity with a sling psychrometer. Also, maintain a temperature level appropriate for the type and age of animals housed in the building. To monitor temperatures, use a minimum/maximum thermometer. Moderate temperatures and moist weather conditions can lead to decisions that are false economy, the extension specialists said."

"Under moderate temperatures, there is enough animal heat to keep the building warm; but you need ventilation to remove the moist air," Parker said. "Ventilating the barn, especially in damp weather, means heat has to be

Opening lead — nine of diamonds.
The cuebid of an opponent's suit theoretically shows either a void or the ace of that suit, but there are times when the cuebid is used to show a big hand even when the suit is not under control. Here is an example of such a case.
North had too good a hand for a simple raise to game after South had freely bid three hearts. The outlook was certainly slammish — North had 22 high-card points — but he had no

idea whether his partner had the diamonds under control. He therefore cuebid diamonds to alert South to the possibility of a slam.

However, South had no values beyond those he had already shown, so he signed off with four hearts. Still not satisfied, North made a further cuebid, this time in spades. South could now no longer ignore his partner's persistently strong bidding and he showed second-round diamond control by bidding five diamonds. North needed no further encouragement and jumped to six hearts.

All this fine bidding came to naught, however, when South bungled the play. West led the nine

of diamonds and South ducked in dummy. This proved to be fatal when East played the deuce on the nine, an obvious request for West to shift to another suit.

Looking at seven spades in his own hand and three in dummy, West had no problem finding a spade shift, and East refused to put the slam down one. Had declarer covered the diamond nine with the jack, he would have made the slam.

Actually, East should have invoked the Lightner slam-doubling convention to ask for an unusual opening lead, in which case West's virtually automatic spade lead would have sealed South's fate beyond recall.

Duncan to participate in Academic Showcase regional competition

Commemorating the faith, bravery of four extraordinary men

Fifty years ago this month (February 2, 1943) four brave Chaplains lost their lives when the U.S.A.T. Dorchester was torpedoed by a German submarine and slipped beneath the icy waters of the Atlantic Ocean in less than 27 minutes. Army Chaplains Lt. George Fox, Lt. Alexander D. Goode, Lt. John P. Washington and Lt. Clark V. Poling spread out among the soldiers, calming and comforting the wounded and the frightened and guiding the disoriented to safety. When there were no more life jackets in the storage room, these four chaplains removed theirs and gave them to four frightened young men. As the ship went down, survivors in nearby rafts could see the four chaplains, arms linked and braced against the slanting deck, offering prayers. Even though their words could not be distinguished, it is not too far fetched to think they might have recited the Twenty-third Psalm. That night these four brave Chaplains passed life's ultimate test, becoming an enduring example of extraordinary faith, courage and selflessness.

In February 1951, the Chapel of the Four Chaplains, an inter-faith memorial chapel, was dedicated in Philadelphia. Rev. Daniel A. Poling, Chaplain Clark Poling's father, presided over the ceremony, which was attended by President Harry S. Truman. A new chapel is currently being built in Valley Forge,

"If you're having problems, check the system to be sure you're getting ventilation when you need it," he said. "You might need to make some adjustments; thermostats could be calibrated incorrectly, or the settings might need to be changed to increase fan or heater operation. The variable speed control or fan timer setting also might need to be increased."

Social Security: A worldwide phenomenon

What do Bolivia, Congo, Japan, Morocco, Switzerland, Venezuela, and about 140 other countries around the world have in common with the United States? They all have Social Security programs. My guess is many people are surprised to learn this. Perhaps some assume that Social Security is a uniquely American concept while others might think that only the western industrialized nations have Social Security programs. Quite the opposite is true. As a mechanism for meeting basic human needs, Social Security programs have achieved near universal acceptance. Almost every country in the world (in

fact, 146 of them from Afghanistan to Zimbabwe) offer some form of social insurance for their citizens.

Of course, the kinds of benefits offered vary widely from one country to another, but there are many similarities. Almost all countries offer some form of old age, survivors, and disability coverage. Many also provide worker's compensation and unemployment benefits, and some Social Security programs include sickness and maternity care. As in the United States, almost all Social Security programs are financed by a tax on earnings.

Some of the countries have interesting qualification factors for benefits. For example, if you were a citizen of Burkina Faso, a landlocked republic in Northern Africa, you could receive an

old-age pension at age 55, or as early as 50 if "prematurely aged." Residents of Iceland must wait until age 67 to collect their retirement pensions. (By the way, beginning in the year 2000, the age at which U.S. citizens can collect full retirement benefits begins to climb from 65 to 67. People born in 1938 will have to be 65 and 2 months, people born in 1939 have to be 65 and 4 months, etc., until the full retirement age reaches 67 for people born in 1960 and later.) In Czechoslovakia, men can retire at age 60 but women can start collecting retirement benefits between the ages of 53 and 57 depending on the number of children raised.

Another interesting aspect to the universality of Social Security programs is a set of agreements the United

States have established with 13 countries (so far) that help coordinate taxes and benefits for people who work in two different countries. These agreements, called "totalization agreements," generally eliminate double coverage so that employees and employers pay taxes to only one country's Social Security system. They also help employees who have worked in the U.S. and another country, but not long enough in the U.S. to qualify for Social Security benefits. In many cases, credits from both countries can be combined to pay a "totalization" benefit from the U.S. We currently have totalization agreements with Austria, Belgium, Canada, France, Germany, Italy, the Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, and the United Kingdom.

The Conversion of Saul

There are three chapters in the book of Acts that tell us about Saul's conversion. Read the conversion accounts for yourself in Acts 9:1-18; 22:1-16; 26:12-20. What can we know about Saul's conversion from these accounts? First, we can know that Saul was not saved because he fasted (see Acts 9:9). Second, he was not saved because he saw the Lord in a vision (Acts 9:11). A great miracle was performed upon Saul, but not even that saved him (Acts 9:17-18). In finding Saul, he told him how God had chosen him to be a witness "unto all men of what thou hast seen and heard" (Acts 22:15). As the text continues, Ananias tells Saul, "And now why tarriest thou? arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord" (Acts 22:16). Even Saul was not saved without baptism. The message is clear in Acts. Those who are saved believed, repented and obeyed the gospel by being baptized. Have you obeyed the gospel? How long will you fight against God? Think about it!
