Good turnout expected on **Election Day**

The Nov. 7 general election has generated greater public interest than the May primary. It would have been difficult to generate less.

Barely 21 percent of all registered voters went to the polls in May, one of the poorest turnouts in recent county history.

Even though there are no local races on the ballot, County Clerk Wanda Thomas expects a good turnout on election day.

"The governor's race traditionally brings out a large crowd of people," said Thomas. "Many just don't bother with the primaries."

Greater numbers of Trigg Countians have been talking about this election than previous ones and more yard signs can be seen through local neigh-

"It's a good indicator that there is an upswing in popularity, said Thomas.

Absentee voting has begun and takes place in the County Clerk's Office from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays through Monday, Nov. 6.

Special paper ballots, which must be mailed to the clerk's office, are designated for voters who are disabled or residing out of county due to military service or college. Medical emergency ballots, for those who are in the hospital on election day, also are available.

Candidates also have made campaign stops in Cadiz during the last month, to generate more interest in the election.

In addition to the gubernatori-

Competing in the semi-finals stage at the Class A competition, the Trigg County marching band finished in 16th place. That failed to put them in the state

Band director Alan Baker said



Jon tanker truck led to the ex-pansion and renovation of the Trigg-Lyon Volunteer Fire De-partment Firehouse.

Members of the fire depart-ment recently unveiled their 50-by-70 square foot firehouses two pumper trucks and two brush trucks, in addition to the tanker. An informal ceremony and reception were held at the firehouse.

Based in the Rockcastle com-munity of Trigg County, Trigg-Lyon firefighters cover all ter-citory south to The John Woodruff Bridge and north to Hwy, 93 in Lyon County. The population in that area is growing, necessitating addi-tional fire-fighting equipment.

When firefighters had the option to buy the tanker from amilitary surplus, they were faced with one problem -- where to park the truck, said Jerry Harper, Trigg-Lyon secretary.

A portion of the firehouse, erected in 1979, was torn down to make way for the addition. A construction company was hired to erect the walls, but the

hired to erect the walls, but the remainder of the work was completed by volunteers, which drew a great deal of praise. "Volunteers are what makes this country great. This is a great day to celebrate the great effort that has been put forth," said Circuit Judge Bill Cun-ningham, whose district in-cludes both Trigg and Lyon counties.

Kentucky's infant mortality drops to record low number

FRANKFORT — Kentucky's infant mortality rate dropped from 8.0 deaths per 1,000 births in 1993. to a record low 7.4 deaths per 1,000 births in 1994. The infant mortality rate is the number of babies per 1,000 live births who die before their first birthday. It is considered a major indicator of a society's overall health status.

Governor Brereton C. Jones said he was especially pleased with the report because one of the factors that has positively impacted the rate has been the increase in Medicaid eligibility of pregnant women so that pregnant Kentucky woman can have access to medical care. As a result, only 1.8 percent of the Kentucky women who gave birth in 1994 did not get prenatal care, ranking it the best in the eight-state southeast region.

"We have increased the

increased the Medicaid eligibility for preg-nant women even beyond the federal government's require-ment so that all Kentucky women can have access to early prenatal care and that is one of the most important factors in getting a baby here healthy," Jones said.

Jones said.

"As a result, we've eliminated the financial barriers to medical care for low-income pregnant women through the Medicaid program. We've also made prenatal care for low-income women more accessible through local health departments."

fant deaths. These figures com-pare to 52,895 live births with 422 infant deaths in 1993. Ken-

422 infant deaths in 1993. Ken-tucky's infant mortality rate has fallen steadily since 1960 when the rate was 27.8. In addition to the increases in Medicaid eligibility, another major reason for the drop in the infant mortality rate is the co-operative effort between local health departments and doc-tors, said Kentucky Health

Commissioner Rice Leach, M.D.

"The steady decline in Kentucky's infant mortality rate did not happen by accident. It is the result of years of prenatal and well-child clinical care and health education provided by mirses and doctors in the public health departments and private practice," Leach said.

"We also have seen a phenomenal improvement in the medical care of critically ill newborns in the last few years

in our regional hospitals. Babies are being born now who are under two pounds and surviving when just a few years ago they probably would not have lived through the newborn period."

Leach said the results are encouraging because Kentucky is making excellent progress to ward meeting a federal goal of a 2.0 infant mortality rate by the year 2000, but there is always more work that can be done.

The leading cause of death for infants in 1994 were birth defects (27.2 percent) and pre-maturely (19.8 percent). Leach said low birth-weight

continues to be one of the main problems leading to infant deaths. In 1994, 55 percent of the infants who died were low birth-weight (less than five-and-a-half pounds).

"Last year 82.1 percent of pregnant Kentucky women en-

tered prenatal care in their first trimester of pregnancy. That's an improvement from 80.6 percent in 1993 and 62,3 percent in 1990. We're encouraged that women are seeking timely prenatal care," Leach



Autumn excellent topwater time

As autumn begins to arrive in different areas of the country, bass tournament pro Denny Brauer makes certain he has at least one topwater lure tied.

"Many fishermen think of topwater fishing only in the spring, but the autumn months can provide exciting action, too," says the Evinrude Outboards Pro Staff angler. "It's a good time of year to catch a lot of bass, and a big fish is always a possibility because the bass are feeding heavily."

Brauer's two favorite topwater lures are the Pop R, a small chugger-type lure, and the Zara Spook, a larger stick bait famous for bringing strikes from big bass.

"Normally, the Pop R is good for numbers of bass while the Spook is better for larger fish,"

he says, "but my largest bass ever on a topwater lure weighed nine pounds, four ounces and I caught it on a Pop

Brauer's favorite retrieve with either lure is a fairly slow stop-and-go around shallow cover. He usually works the lure up to the cover fairly quickly, then stops it and twitches the bait a time or two, before continuing the retrieve. Strikes generally come very close to the cover and right after the lure stops.

"Your retrieve has to be worked out on the water according to the mood of the bass," Brauer cautions. "Sometimes the fish may prefer a faster retrieve, and other times they want it moving extra slow. With a topwater lure, your re- noise it makes, a Spook will

determine what works."

The Evinrude pro prefers to use the smaller Pop R in clear. generally calm water, and he really likes to use it over or around the edges of vegetation.

"Bass will use the vegetation as both a hiding zone as well as a feeding zone," he explains, "and with a slow, noisy retrieve, a Pop R can bring bass out of that vegetation. "A Zara Spook, on the other hand, is a good lure to try in dingy water, especially if you use the frogcolored paint scheme. Overall, any topwater lure works better in clear water, but the noise and commotion a Spook creates attracts bass in dingy water, as

"Because of its size and the trieve speed is really critical, also bring bass up from deeper

so keep experimenting until you depths. I especially like to work the lure around boat houses and docks where the water depth changes quickly from shallow to deep because I believe it actually draws bass away from the cover of the

> This time of year, Brauer recommends fishing topwater lures around stumps and other visible cover near the mouths of tributary creeks, beside riprap, and over long points.

When your favorite bass fishing lake gets crowded with skiers and pleasure boaters, don't give up in dismay. Just keep fishing.

That's the advice of Evinrude Outboards Pro Staff angler Mickey Bruce, who believes heavy pleasure boat traffic can actually make bass easier to locate on some lakes.

"I believe bass become accustomed to the traffic, the noise, and the boat wakes," says Bruce, who learned his fishing skills on Georgia's Lake Lanier, one of the most heavily visited lakes in the United States.

"One of the things I've learned is that bass in those lakes often take up residence around boat docks and piers.

you, but a solitary pier or dock is always worth fishing."

When he isn't fishing boat docks on crowded lakes, the Georgia pro looks for ditches and channels near the mouths of tributary creeks, but away from the shoreline. "On lakes that receive a lot of Fishing in Traffic Price the shallow water

fishing will determine this for tends to get muddy very quickly," he explains, "so I look for structure away from the shoreline. The depth I work depends a lot on water clarity, but basically, I'll start fishing a channel break with a Carolina rig lizard or plastic worm, or possibly a crankbait until I locate bass."

Beef Stew

1-1/2 lbs. stew meat (cut into smaller pieces)

6 carrots (cut into thick chunks)

4 med. potatoes (diced into med. chunks)

1 large onion (chopped)

1,'2 can green peas

1 pkg. beef stew mix (stir 'N's)

Lightly flour the meat and slightly brown in skillet of oil. Add 1 quart of water, stew mix plus 2 T. flour and cook approximately 1-1/2 hours. Then add vegetables except green peas and cook until tender. Add peas, salt and pepper to taste, turn off stove and let set 30 minutes before serving hot.

Crackling Cornbread

4 C cracklings

2-1/2 C self-rising cornmeal 1/2 t. baking powder

1 C milk (or more)

Brown cracklings in 400 degrees oven. Remove the skins. Cook skins and meat in enough water to cover until liquid is all gone. Mix other ingredients well, add the cracklings and cook in large hot skillet with 2 T. crackling grease at 375 degrees until done.

Easy Cookies

1 box Duncan Hines cake mix (any flavor, I use yellow butter or lemon).

2 eggs (beaten)

Mix well and drop by spoonful onto cookie sheets. Cookin 350 degrees oven for approximately 15 minutes (don't over cook).

For yellow butter mix, I divide into three portions and to one add crunchy peanut butter one pecan chips and one chocolate

chips. To the lemon mix I cross the tops with a fork and sprinkle on granulated sugar. One box makes at least 40 cookies.

Whole Cranberry Salad

1-20 oz. pineapple chunks (drained)

1-can whole cranberry sauce

1-can Eagle Brand sweetened condensed milk

8 oz. cool whip

1 C crushed English walnuts

Mix well and freeze. Cut into squares and serve frozen. Really good!

Cherry Crunch

1 box Duncan Hines yellow cake mix 1 stick margarine (melted)

1 can cherry pie filling

Empty pie filling into clear oblong baking dish. Crumble cake mix and margarine and crumble over the pie filling. Bake in 350 degrees oven until top is light golden.

Ham and Cheese Rolls

(finger sandwiches)

2 pkgs. rolls (in aluminum pan)

2-6 oz. pkgs. Swiss cheese slices

Mix together:

1/2 C margarine (melted) 1-1/2 T. poppy seed 1-1/2 t. Worcestershire sauce

1-1/2 mustard (prepared)

1 t. onion flakes

Take rolls out of pans and cut lengthwise in half. Put bottom half back into pans. Cover with ham and cheese slices. Place top of rolls back on bottom ones.

Pour margarine mixture over pan of rolls. Cover with foil and refrigerate overnight.

Bake in 400 degrees oven for 20 minutes. Separate apart with knife and serve warm or cool.

Diet Punch

1-2 liter diet 7-up or sprite

1-46 oz. can pineapple juice (unsweetened)

Mix together and pour over ice and serve (may freeze some of the punch into cubes and add to punch. Very good!

Cornbread Salad

1 med. skillet cooked cornbread (cooled)

1/2 lb. (or more) bacon fried crisp and crumbled

1 green pepper (chopped)

2 med. tomatoes (chopped)

1 large onion (chopped) salt and pepper to taste Combine together and add enough salad dressing to mix well.

Potato Salad

7 or 8 potatoes (diced)and cooked firm

3 hard boiled eggs

1-1/2 T. salt

1/4 C. each green and red peppers 1 small cucumber (diced) opt.

Let set over night in refrigerator.

1/4 C. sugar

2 T. prepared mustard (heaping)


Mix together with enough salad dressing to mix well. Sprinkle on top with paprika and refrigerate over night.







*Union County zaps Wildcats

MORGANFIELD -- A long journey home was Trigg County's punishment for the Wildcats' final season 28-14 loss to Union County.

The Wildcats' first two possessions of the game turned into losses -- a fumble and an interception. It was an uphill battle for the Wildcats and they never reached solid ground.

Despite the loss, Head Coach Dixie Jones had a positive spin on the contest's outcome.

Remembering Trigg County's date with a first-round playoff game, which will be against Fulton City at home Friday, Jones said "at least Monday we don't have to turn in our gear."

It's probably better to forget about the Union County game since nothing came out pretty for Trigg County.

The third quarter was really the Stephen King monster as the Wildcats didn't get off a regular play during the entire

Behind 14-0 at halftime, Wildcat fans were hoping for a strong defensive stand to begin the third quarter. That didn't develop as the upstart Braves marched 70 yards in seven plays to the end zone.

Union County scored on a 17yard pass to Chris Hughes with 8:37 left on the clock. A conversion pass to John Farley gave the host school a tidy 22-0

advantage. Trigg County, and particularly Kelvin Grubbs, added a spark of excitement for the small group of Wildcat fans present, with a blistering 75yard kickoff return for a touch-

It really didn't take long for the Wildcats to add more points as Maurice Bacon blocked a punt attempt by Union County two minutes later on its next possession.

Bacon's play produced the ball for Glenn Pelegrino in the end zone and, bang, the 'Cats were only down 22-14 after Brent Price's second extra point

However, the Wildcats' defense couldn't halt Union County in the second half. The Braves totaled 188 yards of offense in the last two periods, compared to only 48 from Trigg

Union's second score of the

third quarter secured the victory for the 3-7 Braves. It took 12 plays to score this six points and they converted a fourthand-four play into a first drown along the way.

The Braves lowered the boom as John Farley took the ball in from the five-yard line. The Braves' conversion pass failed, but Union County was ahead

Fulton City was defeated by Fulton County, 27-14, on Friday night.





Wheat seeding questions in


Precision planting key to success

WHEAT SEEDING RATES

Even though much of the fall seeding of wheat has already been accomplished, several questions on seeding rates are still coming in.

Precision planting is the key for success. Proper planting includes time of planting, depth of planting and seeding rate. Perhaps the most important of these is the seeding rate. Timing is also important and we're right in that window.

Ideally, winter wheat should be planted between October 10 and October 30. Depth of planting should be between one and one-half inch. But the main



objective is to establish a crop is to have 30 to 35 plants per foot that are well-developed (that average 1.5 tillers per plant) by winter dormancy.

Sounds simple, right? Just plant 30 to 35 seeds per foot. Not exactly, according to Dr. Morris Blitzer, UK Extension Grains Specialist.

Some seeds are larger than others. Some varieties may contain 10,000 seeds per pound. held throughout Kentucky in

pound. You need to know the size of the seeds. You also need to know the germination rates for seeds in your fields.

If the germination rate is below 90 percent, then wheat seeding rates should be adjusted. If planting time is delayed, increase seeding rates by two or three seeds per square foot or one to two seeds per row foot for every two week delay beyond the optimum planting

What are some things I can do to reduce the risk of high blood pressure? Here is a list of 5 factors that affect blood pressure (helps to lower blood pressure).

1. Exercise - Most experts suggest aerobic exercise for 20 to 30 minutes at least three times a week to lower mildly elevated blood pressure. Begin with a gradual program: if necessary, substitute

2. Potassium - High intake appears to lower high blood pressure slightly. Eat three or four servings of grain products, fresh fruits and vegetables daily to maintain potassium intake.

3. Calcium - Extra calcium may lower high blood pressure. The best source is green vegetables, Calcium Citrate tablets are also good. We don't recommend too much milk products, as the type of calcium is not the best, there's not much fat and the extra mucus creates some sinus

4. Vegetarian Diet - Lowers high blood pressure, perhaps because it is low in sodium and high in potassium, polyunsaturated fat, and fiber. 5. Polyunsaturated Fat -(corn, soy, safflower oil) lowers high blood pressure in some cases. Despite potential benefits, daily intake should be more than 10 to 12% of total calories.


move here." Mandy yawned, "Where are the good-looking boys?"

In a previous article we have talked about no fault divorce. Although the law has taken some acrimony out- of the proceedings as far as the dissolution of the marriage itself, divorce cases still provide a great deal of litigation over other issues.

Undoubtedly the most important is that dealing with child custody.

First of all, under the current law both parties start out even in seeking custody of their children. At one time there was a preference for the mother with children of tender ages. That has been eliminated, and now there is no such preference. Therefore, whenever the custody is disputed, the Judge must listen to evidence to decide the case based upon one overriding criteria -- the best interest of the child. This understandably can be a very tough call.

While the morals of a parent are relevant as to child custody, specific acts are generally considered not to be relevant unless they have directly affected the child. This too, of course, immediately jumps into a large gray area because spe-



cific acts make up a person's character which in turn affects a child.

Bonding is a critical consideration for a Judge in deciding child custody. Most times when dealing with an infant or a child of tender years, the primary caregiver is the person who has psychological and emotional bonding with the child. Take that caregiver away and the child sustains emotional trauma that can have an influence upon what type of person he or she becomes. At the same time, the primary caretaker can also be the primary abuser, and therefore, the Court must consider which one outweighs the other.

We have in Kentucky what is called joint custody. This simply means that both parents are given joint participation in major decisions which will affect the welfare of the child. Normally one or the other is given primary physical custody. Inevitably how well this works depends on the human beings involved, that is, if they can put aside their own differences and look to the best interest of the child.

Along with a child custody decision determination comes the matter of child support. The non-custodial parent has the obligation to assist in the upkeep of the child. A statu-

tory formula is now in place making this process fairly simple. The income of both parents is factored into this computation and an established rate is computed. The Court must find extraordinary circumstances to deviate from this statutory guideline. This has been tremendous help in resolving these questions as it has established both consistency and predictability as far as child support is concerned.

If there are extraordinary circumstances -- like special physical or emotional needs of the child -- then the Court can deviate from the guidelines and award either more or less depending upon the situation. In some instances income can be imputed to an unemployed parent. This type of method discourages those which might avoid employment so as not to pay child support. Because of the statutory guidance, the amount of child support to be paid by the non-custodial parent does not generate the controversy that exists around

child custody.

Lastly, the parent who does not have custody of the child is nevertheless entitled to visitation privileges. These times and places are normally left to the parties as long as they can agree.

If they cannot agree, then the Court must intervene to settle the dispute. In the 56th Judicial District of Caldwell, Livingston, Lyon, and Trigg Counties, there are standard visitation guidelines which have been adopted by the Court and will normally be imposed if the parties cannot agree. Each disagreement, however, must be taken on a case to case basis, and in some instances if the Court has reason to believe the welfare of the child may be endangered, visitation can be severely restricted, supervised, or even terminated.

So while we have no fault divorce in Kentucky, there is still a great deal of litigation surrounding the issues of child custody and visitation.
