Gov. Paul Patton will be in Cadiz this afternoon for two special presentations.

Patton is scheduled to be at the Trigg County Courthouse at 3:30 p.m. Wednesday (May 20) to deliver a check for \$220,000 for the health department.

The governor also will present members of the Cadiz Fire Department with the keys to an 85-foot ladder truck. The department recently received the truck through a program operated by the state Division of Forestry.

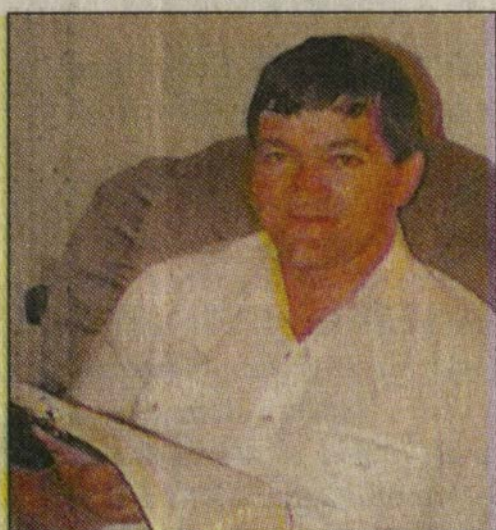

Races should draw strong turnout

Democratic races for judge-executive and sheriff top the ballot in Tuesday's primary election.

County Clerk Wanda Thomas expects a good turnout among the 8,340 registered voters.

If the last two county election primaries are an indication, she'll be right. In May 1987, turnout was 61 percent. In May 1993, turnout was 58 percent.

Thomas reminds voters that all registered voters can cast ballots in one race on Tuesday's ballot: the nonpartisan election for district judge. Only registered Democrats can vote in the Democratic primaries, while only registered Republicans can vote in the GOP race for U.S. Senate.

Another change for voters this year is that everyone who is in line to vote at 6 p.m. when polls close

will be allowed to vote.

Here's a look at the Democratic races on Tuesday's ballot:

Judge-Executive: Incumbent Berlin Moore Jr. faces James S. Ladd. Moore defeated Ladd by 300 votes in the 1993 election.

Moore said he's seeking re-election to complete the projects he's started. "I desire to see water available throughout the county, new industry with higher paying jobs, some type of subdivision regulations, expanded recreational and social activities for all age groups, new tourist attractions and planning completed for the increased demands on our infrastructure brought by our booming economy," Moore said in response to a Cadiz Record questionnaire.

Ladd, meanwhile, said it's time for a change in Trigg County. "It is my desire to make Trigg County

May 26 Primary Election

When to vote: Polls are open from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.

What's on the ballot: Democratic races for county judge-executive, sheriff, jailer, magistrates in six districts, U.S. Senate and state representative. A Republican race for U.S. Senate. A nonpartisan judicial race for district judge.

Who can vote: Only registered Democrats can vote in the Democratic races; only registered Republicans vote in the Republican race for U.S. Senate; all voters can vote in the nonpartisan race for district judge.

Voter registration: Trigg County has 8,340 registered voters, up from 6,722 in the 1993 primary. The breakdown by party is Democrats 6,642; Republicans 1,288; and other 410.

Where to vote: South Cadiz 1 and West Cadiz, Cadiz Fire Department; Canton 2, Berkley Body Shop; North Cadiz 1 and North West Cadiz, Senior Citizens Center; Cerulean-Wallonia, Cerulean Fire Department; North Cadiz 2, Courthouse basement; Roaring Springs, Roaring Springs Fire Department; Montgomery, lobby of high school gym; South Cadiz 2, South Road Fire Department; Linton Maggie, Linton Fire Department; Canton 1, Golden Pond Fire Department; Bethesda, Trigg-Lyon Fire Department

Trigg raises \$82,000 for cancer research

They walked. They hugged. They laughed. They cried. And when the American Cancer Society Relay for Life was over, they raised more than \$82,000 for cancer research.

Trigg County's first 24-hour Relay for Life was more successful than organizers ever dreamed.

"It really surprised me," said Zelner Cossey, honorary chairman for the event. But Cossey said the event shows the spirit and generosity of Trigg County residents.

"It was the greatest birthday party all of us ever had," said Cossey, one of nearly 200 cancer survivors who took the first lap during Friday's opening ceremony.

"I'm not surprised in the people," chairperson Karen Clement said after Saturday evening's closing ceremony. "I'm pleased ... It didn't surprise me they chose to take this event in their hearts."

And take it in their hearts they did.

More than 600 walkers on 41 teams participated in the event. About 1,500 or more were on hand for Friday's opening ceremony and a luminary service later that night.

The message of hope was spelled out on the bleachers on the visitors side of Perdue Field. Hope also was the message in remarks from Dr. Tom Martin.

Soldier charged with fatally shooting friend

One Fort Campbell soldier is dead and another charged with murder after a shooting Sunday afternoon in southeastern Trigg County.

Bryan Edward Byers, 33, of Fort Campbell died Sunday afternoon

at Jennie Stuart Hospital in Hopkinsville, Sheriff Randy Clark said.

Charged in the shooting is Anthony Tate Caudle, 27, of Compton Road in Trigg County. Both Byers and Caudle are members of the 187th Infantry at Fort Campbell and have been friends since 1995, deputy Dane Hughes said.

Caudle, who is lodged in the Trigg County Jail, was arraigned

Tuesday morning in Trigg District Court.

District Judge Chappell Wilson said a preliminary hearing will be set before May 28, but Caudle must have an attorney present at that hearing. Caudle is scheduled to appear in court again at 2 p.m. Thursday to determine whether he has an attorney, Wilson said.

Bond was set at \$100,000 pending a bond hearing and preliminary hearing.

The homicide was the second in Trigg County in a month. On April 17, a Linton man died of multiple gunshot wounds after a domestic dispute. The shooting deaths are the first in Trigg County since 1987.

Ready or not, here comes summertime

The calendar says summer is still one month away. But for students and vacationers, the season begins this weekend.

Trigg County schools will dismiss at 1 p.m. Thursday, the last day of school for 1997-98. Graduation ceremonies begin at 8 p.m. Friday at the high school gym.

For tourists and travelers, the Memorial Day holiday weekend begins Friday evening.

And if you're traveling this weekend, state police urge you to obey the speed limit, don't drink and drive, wear seat belts and put small children in child safety seats. Last year, seven people died on Kentucky highways during the Memorial Day weekend.

Capt. John C. Vance, commander of the Mayfield post, said he's instructed troopers to issue more citations in an effort to stop an increasing rate of fatalities in the region. In the first 13 days of May, six people were killed in the 11-county area, bringing the 1998 total to 18, he said.

As people travel toward Lake Barkley and Kentucky Lake, highways in Trigg County should be busy. "We're looking forward to a lot of people being here," tourism director Harry Todd said.

The recent warm weather should signal the start of a good summer season, he said. "Everything is primed and ready," Todd said.

Like 1997, this year has started with a cool, wet spring and that should mean that tourists are ready for recreation, Todd said.

Motels, marinas, restaurants and other businesses should see a jump in visitors, he said. Even though 1997 started slowly, tourism spending in Trigg County increased 7.5 percent.

The battle against cancer isn't easy. Talk to any of the survivors or the families of those who've lost the fight and you'll learn that defeating cancer is no pushover.

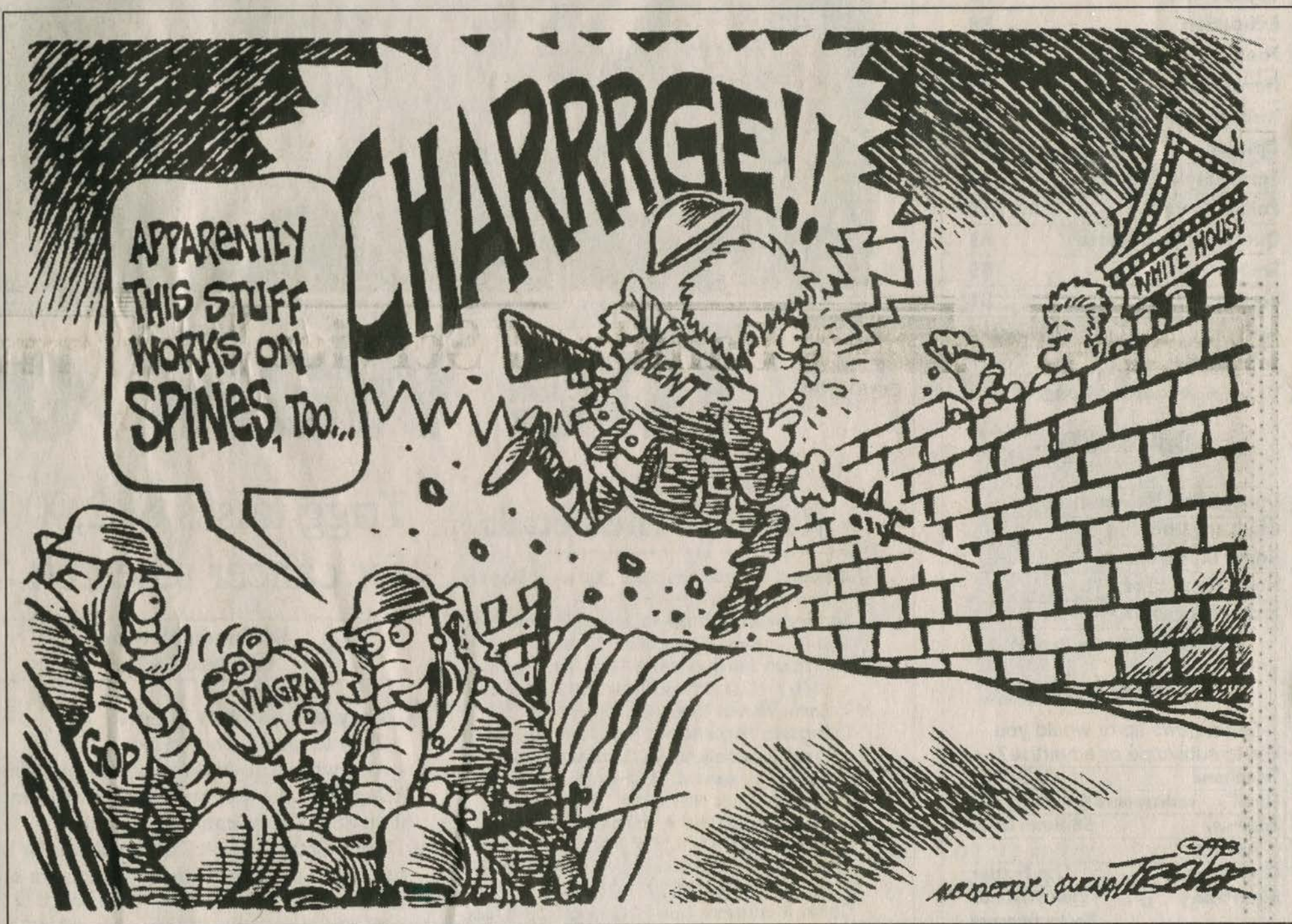

She had hope. The doctors had hope. And in turn the family had hope.

She lives every day knowing that cancer could return, but she didn't let it stop her.

I thought of her Friday night as survivors made their way around the track. For some of them, the quarter-mile trip was a struggle. For all of them, it was a victory lap.

The Relay for Life isn't over. For Trigg County, it's only just begun. And what a beginning it was. Let's hope it only gets bigger and better.

billion receipts and what are believed to be George Washington's original teeth. When the auditors were finally finished, they released a report that contained a number of alarming findings, including these:

a better place for all to live," he said. "I believe Trigg County is in need of a change and I believe I am the person that can make that change. I will make decisions based on facts presented and not let politics rule the matter."

Sheriff: Incumbent Randy Clark is seeking a fourth term, but challenger Hugh E. Dunn has made a strong bid to unseat him. The winner will face Republican Max Higgins in November.

"I feel it is time for a change in Trigg County," Dunn said in his candidate questionnaire. "I feel a new assertive person in this office would be in the best interest for all Trigg Countians."

Clark said that as Trigg County grows the sheriff must be an efficient administrator and be capable of handling all types of calls. "Each day brings new challenges to the office requiring new solutions," Clark said.

Jailer: Tony Holland, who has served as jailer since his election in 1985, is being challenged by Henry Franklin Hargrove.

Magistrate District 1: In the South Cadiz 1 precinct, Kevin Stroud is challenging incumbent Howard B. Ford.

Magistrate District 2: In the West Cadiz and Canton 2 precincts, incumbent Tony Mitchell has two challengers, Albert W. Stinson and Larry Kemp. The winner will face Republican Al Clinard in November.

Magistrate District 4: In the Cerulean and North Cadiz 2 precincts, incumbent Lacy Bush faces Stoney Mitchell.

Magistrate District 5: In the Roaring Springs, Montgomery and South Cadiz precincts, Billy E. Bryant is challenging incumbent Kelly P'Pool. The winner will

face Republican Kent Major in November.

Magistrate District 6: In the Linton Maggie and Canton 1 precincts, incumbent Dale T. Calhoun has four challengers, Jeff Futrell, Larry Lawrence, L.J. Holley and Jerry McCraw.

Magistrate District 7: In the Bethesda and North West Cadiz precincts, incumbent Donnie Tyler faces Dennis Reddick. The winner will face Republican Earl Carr.

State representative: Democrats Robert "Buddy" Buckingham and Amos M. McCarty, both of Murray, are seeking the Fifth District seat to replace the retiring Freed Curd. Republican candidates are Jim Bunning of Southgate and Barry Metcalf of Richmond.

District judge: In the nonpartisan race for 56th District Judge, Division 2, incumbent Chappell R. Wilson of Cadiz has two challengers, Jill Clark of Cadiz and Richard H. Peek of Tiline. The 56th judicial district covers Trigg, Caldwell, Livingston and Lyon counties. The top two vote-getters will meet in the November general election.

Industry: Tenant eyeing industrial park

He expects the park will have 14 industrial lots. The board acquired the 60 acres and took an option on an additional 40 acres. Cundiff also told the chamber that U.S. Tobacco expects to begin work this year on a second warehouse at its location off U.S. 68.



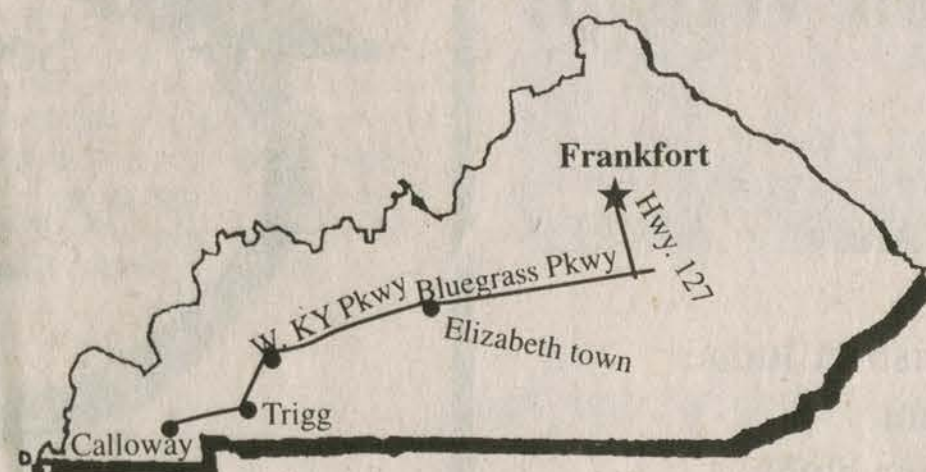

Council accepts rules for prom, other events

The Trigg County High School site-based council has accepted a list of regulations for student election to the prom and other extracurricular activities.

The council approved the guidelines during its monthly meeting Monday afternoon.

A seven-member committee made some changes and additions to its recommendations that were first presented last month. Chairwoman Brenda Southwick said the need to establish guidelines

was based on values of the community, providing positive role models for students and providing a positive school climate.

"I really feel like we have a much better policy," Principal Clayton Burgess said.

The rules were divided into three recommendations. The first says that each year the junior class will vote to decide whether to have a junior/senior prom court and queen. Other groups that select queen/courts will have the same option.

The second eliminates the selection of king/attendant candi-

dates for prom, homecoming or other events.

The third recommendation establishes the guidelines for selection of queen/attendant candidates, including prohibiting those who are pregnant, have been pregnant or have had a child. The rules are similar to ones proposed last month but the committee added a rule prohibiting male escorts from being married or being the father of a child (A more detailed list of the guidelines will appear in next week's Cadiz Record.)

In his prayer to open the event, Martin urged participants "to hold forth the light of hope that one day this disease might be cured."

And during the luminary service to remember cancer victims and honor cancer survivors, Martin said hope is growing that "one day this disease we call cancer will be only a memory. ... We are tired of losing those we love to this disease."

The luminary service and the large turnout helped give people even more hope, Martin said. "We will defeat this enemy," he said.

The names of memorials and survivors, who were honored with candles glowing around the quarter-mile track, were then read. The emotional ceremony ended with the playing of "Amazing Grace" and songs by David Banister.

Margaret Martin, a student at Trigg County High School, expressed the feelings of many when she said how amazing it was to see how many people care about this event.

All segments of the community were involved from volunteers to

participants, from employees to corporate leaders, from children to senior citizens.

Community officials and leaders agreed that everyone had done a terrific job organizing the event.

"We'll have to give Karen credit," Cossey said. "She's the best."

School superintendent Jim Wallace, who videotaped several hours of the relay, said it was a great community event. His remarks were echoed by Kenneth Guinn, Rick Chapman and many others.

"I've never had to do so little to prepare for a Relay event," said Kelly Morse, the cancer society's regional income development director. "Karen and her committee have done a wonderful job."

Clement said she couldn't take all the credit for the event's success. She praised members of her committee, members of participating teams and members of the community.

The energy and creativity shown by teams "was really some-

thing," Clement said.

Campsite themes ranged from bankers wearing masks to women wearing hula skirts and from workers wearing hard hats to team members wearing holiday decorations.

When team members weren't walking, they had plenty of other activities and games to keep them busy. A 2 a.m. volleyball game drew a crowd of more than 20 players.

"It's just such a different kind of fund-raiser," Clement said, looking for a way to explain the community's interest. "This is so much fun."

And she said it was fun with a common goal: to defeat cancer.

That's why Clement got a little choked up Saturday evening when she read the then total of \$77,544 that had been raised.

"Trigg County can be proud," she said.





Middle school project 'progressing forward,' architect says

Bid date: The board on Monday night voted 3-1 to set a bid date of 1 p.m. June 23 on a demolition and disassembly package to remove two buildings for the middle school project.

The bids will be contingent upon approval of the middle school plans, Superintendent Jim Wallace said. But Gumm asked the board to have the demolition project ready if and when the board makes a final decision on the construction work.

The board will seek bids on taking down the metal building that houses the middle school gym and the building that houses the football locker room. The board also wants to know if it would be more cost effective to reassemble the metal structures or sell them, Wallace said.

Board member Mike Davis voted against the bid date because of his opposition to the construction project.

Concerns raised: At the May 12 meeting, Savage also responded to a letter from board attorney C.A. Woodall III about concerns over delays in getting

the project under way. Savage said WMB has spent many hours checking surveys and doing site work to determine the location of utilities and drainage lines.

In their work, he said, architects and engineers have discovered problems that would have delayed construction and cost the board \$500,000 in change orders. "This is an extremely touchy situation right here," Savage said.

Architects want to provide accurate information to contractors before work begins, he said.

If the main electrical service junction to the campus hadn't been found during the planning process, lines could have been cut during excavation, he said. "You people can't be out of school," Savage said.

Chairman Howell Hopson assured Savage that the board wants to continue to have good working relationship with WMB. Hopson said the board was concerned that several issues still weren't resolved as a projected bid date nears.

"We don't mean any offense by the letter," Hopson said.

Board looks at other school costs, list of priorities

With a \$9 million middle school inching closer to reality, members of the Trigg County school board want to know if the system can afford other projects.

Construction manager Tommy Gumm of Alliance Corp. provided the board with the latest estimate of \$9.635 million at a meeting May 12. "We feel very comfortable with these numbers," Gumm said.

But he added, "we won't know the exact bottom line ... until we bid the project."

Before that happens, board member Mike Davis said the school system needs to know oth-

er costs of the project, including furnishings and equipment not included in the bid package and yearly operational expenses.

The board compiled a list of projects that will need money in coming years. Those are furniture for middle school classrooms and a new cafeteria, wiring for computers, renovation of existing cafeterias into classrooms and a library and major renovations (roof, heating/air conditioning system) at the high school.

Superintendent Jim Wallace plans to have more on those projects and their costs at the June 1 meeting.

"There will always be a need for setting priorities," he said.

Davis has said the board may

be extending its finances and bonding potential by building the middle school.

"I know I'm not going to change anybody's mind here," Davis said.

Wallace gave the board a report that showed growth from \$5.7 million in 1992-93 to \$7.36 million this year.

"Our new growth the last few years has been more than anybody would have ever anticipated," Wallace said.

Wallace expects that growth to continue.

And that's another reason, Davis said, that the board should have considered building a school away from the main campus where expansion would have been easier.

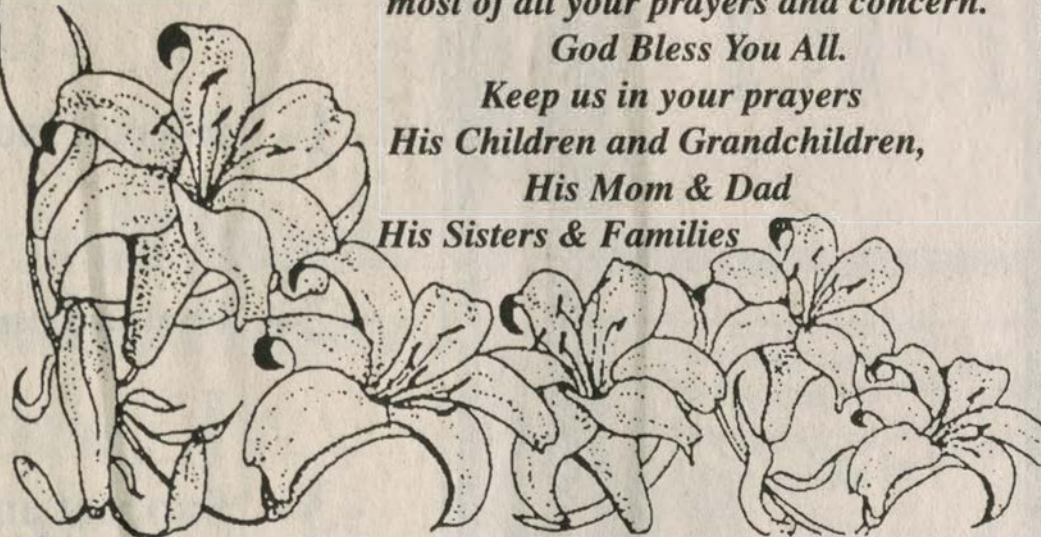

Attempted murder: Hoptown man charged in May 1 incident

A Hopkinsville man has been charged with attempted murder in connection with a May 1 shooting and robbery in Cadiz.

Edgar R. Lucas, 23, was arrested Thursday afternoon by Lt. Duncan Wiggins at Trigg District Court. Lucas also is charged with first-degree robbery and first-degree wanton endangerment.

Lucas was in the courtroom at the arraignment of Jason J. Polley, 25, of Lafayette. Polley had been arrested May 10 and charged with first-degree robbery.

Lucas was arrested after the robbery victim identified him to a police officer in the courtroom. Both Lucas and Polley are lodged in the Trigg County Jail.

The arrests stem from the May 1 shooting at a home on Jefferson Street. Police said Polley and Lucas were talking with Kraig Wilson, 18, of Cadiz in the front yard when they attempted to rob him at gunpoint. Wilson ran into the house and a shot was fired through the front door. The bullet lodged in an entertainment center and just missed another person in the house, police said. No one was injured.

Police said Lucas and Polley then fled the scene in Polley's vehicle.

The case was investigated by Wiggins and Officer Scott Brown.

Escapee: Cadiz Police's K-9 unit helps catch Alabama man

The Cadiz Police Department's K-9 unit did its job Saturday morning in helping capture an escapee from the Trigg County Jail.

"Ara did her job," Chief Hollis Alexander said. "We are pleased with her actions."

Ara and Sgt. Richard Martin captured Timothy L. Thomas at 8:03 a.m. Saturday in a back yard near Lafayette Street, police said.

Thomas, 35, of Grand Bay, Ala., was charged with second-degree escape and returned to the jail. He was not injured.

Jail officers said Thomas escaped through the front door at 6:52 a.m. Officers from the Cadiz police and Trigg County Sheriff's Department assisted in the search.

Thomas had been arrested at 5:04 a.m. after

Officer Tom Moore found him passed out and partially hanging out of his car in the parking lot of Max Fuel Express on U.S. 68. Moore had seen the vehicle pull into the lot at 4:15 a.m.

Thomas failed six field sobriety tests and refused to take a chemical test, police said. He was charged with driving under the influence, first offense; failure to transfer motor vehicle; and operating on a suspended license.

Meanwhile, two friends of Thomas that he was to meet at the gas station also were taken into custody. Mitzi G. Mayes, 32, and Sarah L. Thomas, 34, both of Hardin, were charged with operating on a suspended driver's license. Both were lodged in the Christian County Jail.

FUTURE OF LAND BETWEEN THE LAKES

Whitfield seeking money for TVA, pushing safety net plan

The future of Land Between the Lakes was the subject of a congressional hearing last week.

The House Transportation Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment heard from several people, including U.S. Rep. Ed Whitfield and Ann Wright, LBL's general manager.

The subcommittee didn't hear from representatives of the U.S. Forest Service or the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Department, who were excluded from the hearing by the Clinton administration, Whitfield said.

And that didn't set well with the Hopkinsville Republican or with Rep. Sherwood Boehlert, chairman of the subcommittee.

"This is not a good example of cooperation or a desire to have an honest and open debate on how best to protect Land Between the Lakes," Boehlert said.

The subcommittee, which met last year in Murray, heard testimony May 12 on Whitfield's Land Between the Lakes Protection Act. A key part of that bill would transfer management of LBL to the Forest Service and Fish and Wildlife Department if the Tennessee Valley Authority didn't receive at least \$6 million to operate LBL.

Whitfield said he's actively seeking federal funds for TVA to manage LBL, but that his bill is a safety net for management of the 170,000-acre recreation area.

"I would like to see continued funding for TVA to manage LBL," he said. "However, Chairman (Craven) Crowell has been so inconsistent in his policy regard-

ing LBL, that he has seriously jeopardized continued funding."

Crowell announced last year that TVA no longer wanted to manage nonpower programs, including LBL. Congress reducing funding for those programs last year and said that funds would not be appropriated in fiscal year 1999.

"I hope the Congress does appropriate funds for TVA's nonpower programs in fiscal year 1999," Whitfield said. "But I don't believe there is anyone in this room who believes they will, despite what might be said publicly."

"I do not intend to sit idle and not be prepared for the possibility that TVA will not receive funds."

Whitfield said his bill reaffirms LBL's original mission in support of public recreation, fish and wildlife conservation, and environmental education, guarantees the continuation of in lieu of tax payments to Trigg and Lyon counties in Kentucky and Stewart County in Tennessee and retains all activities allowed at LBL today.

Costly idea?: Wright, however, told the subcommittee that transferring LBL to another agency would cost between \$20

million and \$25 million and that in the lieu of tax payments would be reduced significantly.

"Certainly the transfer legislation ... provides a safety net in the event TVA does not receive funding, and the U.S. Forest Service is an outstanding land management agency and recreation provider," Wright said. "However, transfer of LBL is not without costs."

Wright said LBL's success can be attributed to its dedicated staff of employees who care about the land and the 2 million people who visit the area each year.

Decision time: Whitfield said he didn't know when Congress would make a decision on funding TVA's nonpower programs.

If Congress waits until late September to make a decision that would change the management of LBL, Whitfield said his bill "sets out quite clearly the responsibilities of each agency" in making the transition.

Even though Whitfield is seeking money for TVA, he said he's working to get about \$6 million for the Forest Service to manage LBL.

"There is a federal responsibility to take care of LBL," he said.

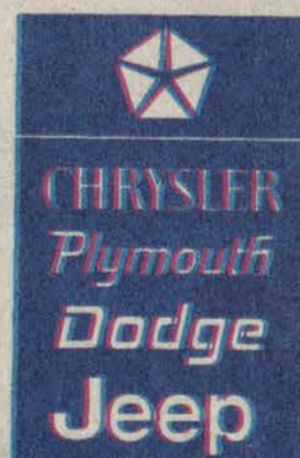

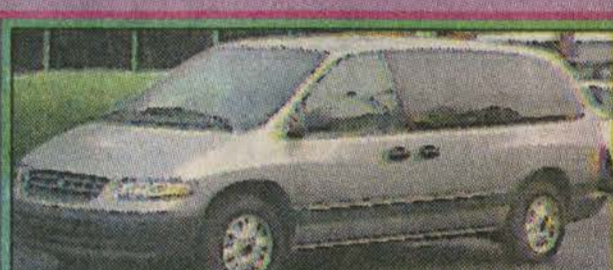

Making a 13-year visit

Singing cicadas making their presence known in Trigg County

A noisy neighbor is back after 13 years in hiding. And if you live near Lake Barkley and other sections of Trigg County, you've already heard from them.

No, they're not locusts. They're the 13-year cicada. Just be patient and in a few weeks they'll be gone for another 13 years.

The cicadas began digging out the ground early last week and crawling up trees, flowers, shrubs, buildings and porches.

"They're a real curiosity," said Doug Johnson, an entomologist with the UK Research and Education Center in Princeton.

Jason P'Pool, Trigg County extension agent for agriculture, said his office had received several calls about the insects. Residents near the lake were among the first to report seeing the cicadas. Even the lodge at Lake Barkley State Resort Park wasn't immune to the bugs.

After emerging, the cicadas begin their mating rituals, Johnson said. The most noticeable aspect of that is the singing by male cicadas.

"They'll make a great racket" by scraping their wings on their

Facts about the Cicada

What are they?: The cicada is often referred to as the locust because of biblical accounts of the hordes of grasshoppers that descended on Egypt. There are two forms of periodical cicada — the 13-year and the 17-year cicada. Each of the forms has a number of broods that emerge at a particular location on a regular basis. The cicadas emerging in Trigg County are part of a 13-year brood (Brood XIX) that appears in western Kentucky. A brood appears somewhere in the United States each year.

Their look: The periodical cicada and the annual cicada are confused because of their superficial similarities. When seen together, however, they look very different. They also appear at different times of the year. The annual cicada, which usually appears in late summer, is larger than the periodical cicada and has green eyes instead of red.

More on the way: Other broods of periodical cicadas will emerge in Trigg County in the coming years. Brood X, a 17-year brood, 2004; Brood XXIII, a 13-year brood, 2002.

bodies, he said.

After that, the females begin laying eggs.

And that's where the real trouble for homeowners can begin, Johnson said.

Damage from cicadas should be relatively minor, he said. But the insects can damage small trees and some fruit trees, Johnson said.

When the females lay their eggs, they slice open the bark on a twig. If the twig is small, that could slow a tree's growth or reduce its output of fruit, he

said.

More damage occurs when the cicada eggs hatch and the nymphs fall to the ground, he said. The nymphs burrow in and feed on the root systems of trees for the 13-year period, Johnson said. Most trees won't be harmed by the cicadas, but some smaller trees could be hurt, he said.

Homeowners can take some precautions, like spraying or bagging small trees, but "neither one are particularly satisfactory," Johnson said.

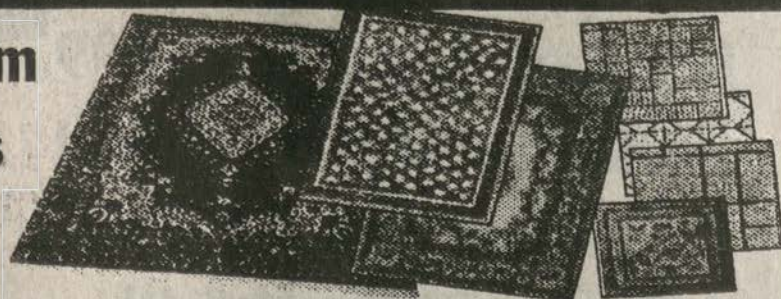

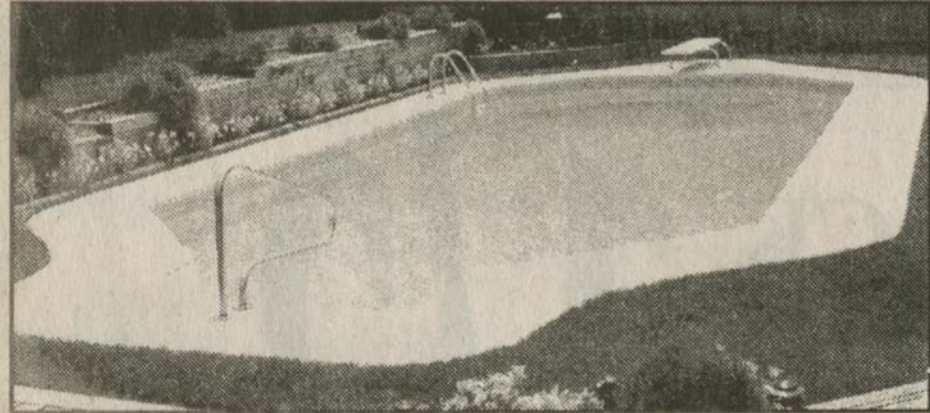

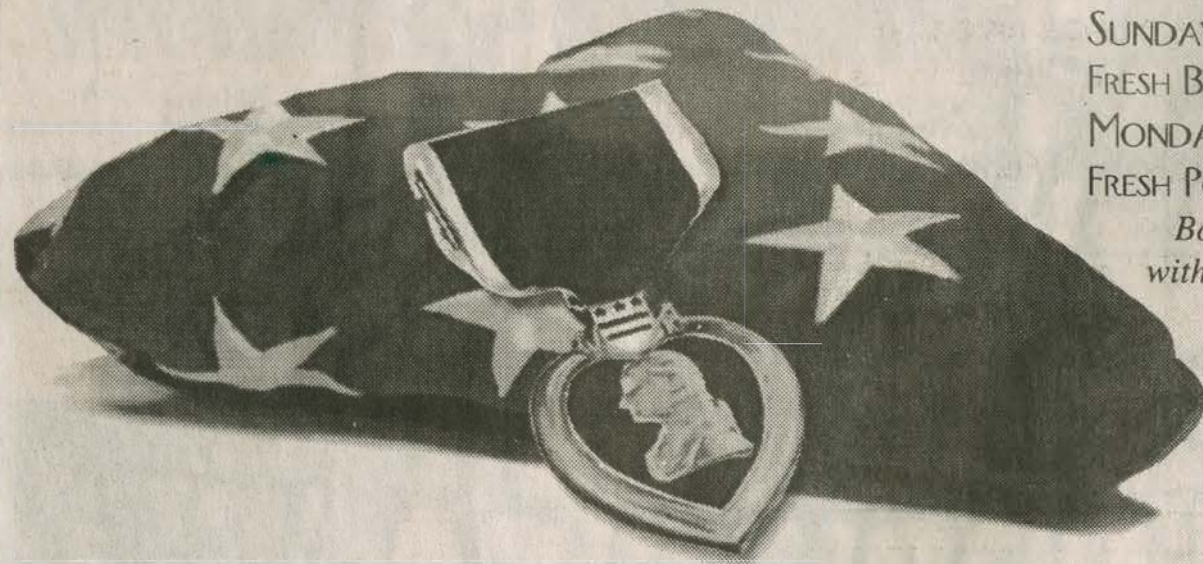

Make sure and keep bones nourished

Each human body contains 206 bones. And most of them are begging for more calcium. Most people don't think about their bones unless they have a problem. But bones are made up of living tissue, and they need nutrition just like the rest of the body.

Calcium is what gives bones durability, helping them grow strong and healthy. But most Americans, at every age, don't get enough calcium. In fact, nearly two out of three American adults do not meet the daily recommendations for calcium intake, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

One of the biggest long-term threats of low calcium intake is osteoporosis, a brittle bone disease characterized by low bone mass and bone loss. The disease often leads to fragile bones and an increased susceptibility to fractures of the hip, spine and wrist.

According to the National Osteoporosis Foundation, the disease affects more than 10 million Americans, 80 percent of them women. Osteoporosis is responsible for 1.5 million fractures annually, with national direct costs for hospitals and nursing homes to treat the disease and associated fractures reaching \$13.8 billion.

"Osteoporosis is often called the 'silent disease' because bone loss occurs without symptoms," says a registered dietitian with the Southeast Dairy Association. "Victims may not know they have the disease until their bones become so weak that a sudden strain, bump or fall causes a bone to fracture or a vertebra to collapse."

While women are most likely to be affected by osteoporosis, other

factors can also increase the likelihood of developing the disease. A small bone structure or family history of the disease increases the risks, as can an inactive lifestyle, cigarette smoking, or excessive alcohol use.

Bones smarts need to get started early. Studies have shown that while most younger children meet their daily calcium needs, calcium intake begins to drop off sharply as children approach the teen years.

Unfortunately, this decline comes at a time when children need the most calcium. The recommended calcium intake rises to 1,300 milligrams daily for ages 9-18.

At age 9, calcium requirements increase from 800 milligrams a day to 1,300 a day. This additional intake builds and strengthens bones, helping to prevent broken bones and avoid osteoporosis later in life.

Calcium is important during adolescence because 75 to 85 percent of the skeleton is built during this period. Adequate calcium intake is even more important for females, who tend to reach peak bone mass at age 25 to 30.

The problem is, few teenagers get enough calcium. The deficiency is worst among girls ages 12-19, with just 14 percent meeting daily requirements. But only 35 percent of boys in the same age range have adequate calcium intakes.

Part of the problem is the high

consumption of snack foods, soft drinks and desserts. These "empty calorie" foods often take the place of more nutritional choices, such as fruits, vegetables, and milk.

Women are at greatest risk for bone loss due to osteoporosis, in part because females of all ages take in less calcium than males.

But osteoporosis is not limited to women. The National Osteoporosis Foundation reports that one in eight men will suffer a fracture related to the disease, with one-third of all men affected by osteoporosis by age 75.

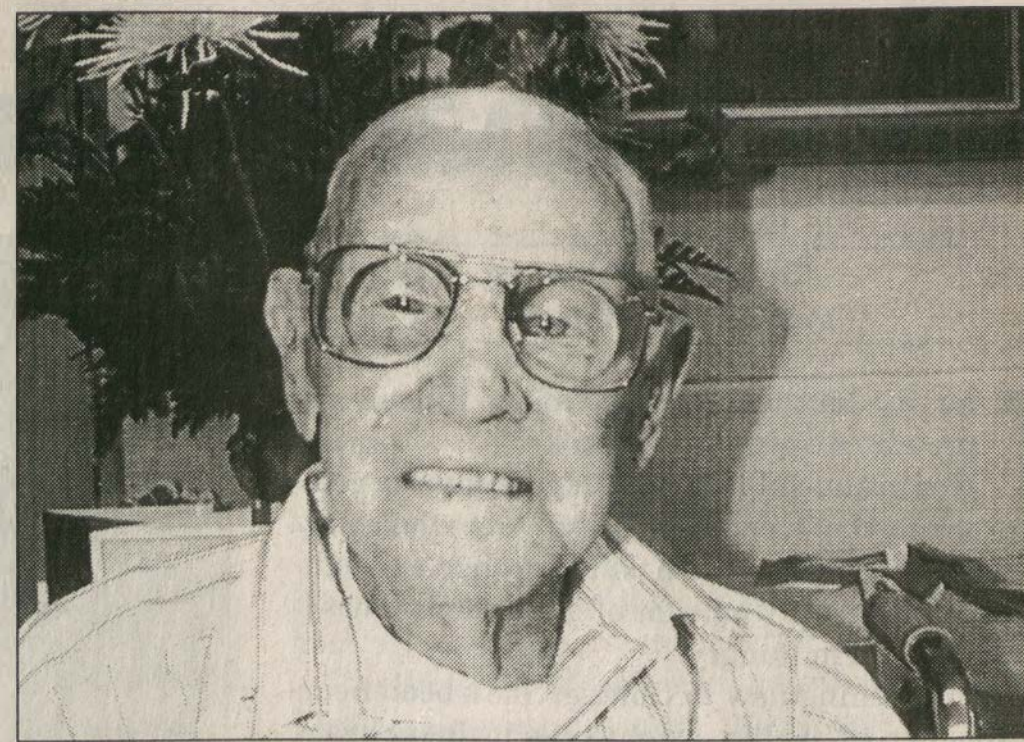
Prevention for both men and women is for the most part the same, starting with adequate calcium intake. Adults 19-50 need at least 1,000 milligrams of calcium a day, the equivalent of about three glasses of milk. Those over age 50 should consume 1,200 mil-

ligrams a day or four glasses of milk.

The best source of calcium in the American diet is milk and milk products. Some people have shied away from dairy products, fueled by the misconception that these foods are high in fat and calories. But the truth is quite the opposite. Milk and milk products contribute just 9 percent of the calories and 12 percent of the fat in the United States food supply, while providing 76 percent of the calcium as well as protein, potassium, and other nutrients. In addition, milk and milk products are available in a wide variety of milk-fat levels, from whole fat to fat free. Any or all these products can fit into a healthful diet.

National Dairy Month is almost here. Try to include dairy products in your diet to get the needed calcium.

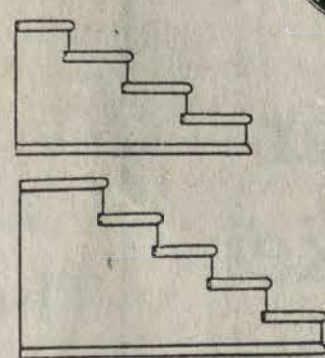
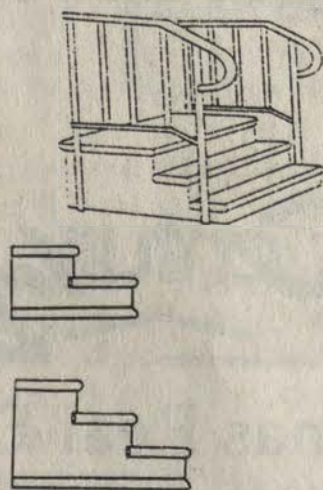

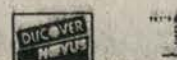

HOME COOKIN'

Futrell shares some senior citizens kitchen favorites

The title on the name tag Golene Futrell proudly displays says "cook." Her grandchildren say "My mamow is the best cook in the whole Kentucky." And when they sit down to the table the first thing they ask is if 'mamow has got a whole lot of mashed potatoes today, 'cause I'm hungry!

This is nothing new to Golene. She's been hearing this her whole life. As she tells it, there are a lot of hungry mouths to feed and a lot of meals to cook when you raise six children and love 15 grandchildren. This is to say nothing of the very important role she plays at the Trigg County Senior Citizens Center as "chief cook and bottle washer," preparing more than 70 lunches daily for "Meals on Wheels" and 60 to 70 sit-down lunches daily for the center. On special days like Christmas and Thanksgiving, she may serve as many as 90 or more for lunch at the center.

To Golene it's all a labor of love. "Mama taught me to love everyone. It's so wonderful to wake up and come here each morning and prepare meals for everyone here. You can see how much they appreciate it. Some of these folks have outlived their families and don't have anyone. We're all they've got."

"I give thanks daily that God gives me the strength I need to help here at the center and to do what I can at church."

When Golene gave me her recipes to share with you she said that without a doubt the cobbler and meat loaf were the dishes most asked for by family, friends and the senior citizens center. The only difference is that when she makes meat loaf for the center the amount of ingredients changes drastically. For example, the meat loaf would use 40 pounds of hamburger, eight onions, two dozen eggs, a pound box of crackers and a box of oatmeal. A bit much for a family of four!

One thing I noticed as I looked over her offerings closely. Each has just a little different twist to it. For example, the cornbread is done with hamburger and in layers. The addition of potato wedges around the meat loaf is a great idea for a tasty one-dish meal and that caramel pie recipe would surely bring the words "blue ribbon" to anyone's lips.

Go ahead, don't be shy as they say. Try one or try them all. Whatever you do though, let Golene know how much you enjoyed her version of some very special dishes.



Peach Cobbler

(This is the most requested and an all-time favorite at the senior citizen center kitchen).

Pie Crust: Combine 2 cups flour, 1/2 cup shortening and just enough water to make dough. Roll out as for pie crust.

Filling

- 2 large cans peach slices
- 3 T. flour
- 1 t. vanilla
- 1 1/2 c. sugar
- 2/3 c. melted butter

Mix together sugar and flour. Pour into peaches. Add melted butter and vanilla. Pour into baking dish and put crust on top. Spread 1/2 cup butter and sugar on top of crust. Bake at 400 degrees until golden brown.

Meat Loaf

(This is another of her most requested dishes)

- 3 lbs. hamburger meat
- pinch of salt
- 2 c. cracker crumbs
- 1 c. tomato ketchup
- 1/2 c. milk
- large onion

- 1 t. black pepper
- 1 c. oatmeal
- 4 eggs

Mix all ingredients well and pour into baking dish. Bake at 400 degrees until it starts to cook then lower to 300 degrees for 1 1/2 hours or until done. The following can be added for flavor: Cut 3

cups of potato wedges and place around sides of meatloaf. Mix one small can diced tomatoes, 1/2 cup green peppers and 1/2 cup onions. Pour over top of meatloaf and bake at 400 degrees turning down to 300 degrees for 1 1/2 hours or until done.

Caramel Pie

(Golene wishes she had a dollar for every caramel pie she's made)

- 6 egg yolks
- 4 c. milk
- 2 c. sugar
- 2 baked pie shells
- 1 c. brown sugar
- 1 c. flour
- 1 t. vanilla

Carefully brown two cups of sugar in a heavy pan (be very careful it burns easily). Mix milk, beaten egg yolks, vanilla, flour and brown sugar. Combine ingredients with browned sugar and cook on low stirring until it thickens. Pour into pie shells. Add meringue.

Meringue:

- 6 egg whites
- 1 t. vanilla
- 6 T. sugar (granulated)
- 4 "pinches" baking powder

Beat egg whites stiff, add vanilla and baking powder beating until very stiff. Sprinkle sugar into whites as you continue beating. Beating until well blended. Spread on top of caramel mixture. Place pie in very hot oven until meringue is nicely browned.

Golene Futrell serves up hundreds of meals each month at the Trigg County Senior Citizens Center kitchen. "It's so wonderful to wake up and come here each morning and prepare meals for everyone here," she said. "You can see how much they appreciate it."





Go easy on sun

Avoid sunburn, avoid skin cancer

One of every seven people in the United States will develop some form of skin cancer. In fact, someone dies of skin cancer every hour. But you do not need to be one of them. Skin cancers are relatively easy to detect, and most can be cured if detected early. Better yet, there are many simple ways of protecting yourself and your family.

May is national Skin Cancer Awareness Month — a perfect opportunity to learn about this important topic just as summer takes us into the path of the most common cause of skin cancer.

What Causes Skin Cancer?

Unlike many forms of cancer, there is a known culprit for skin cancer. It is the sun. Medical experts agree that overexposure to sunlight is the main cause of skin cancer. This is especially true when being in the sun results in a sunburn or blistering. Just one serious sunburn can increase your risk of skin cancer by 50 percent.

Other factors include a family history, scarring from diseases or burns and repeated exposure to compounds such as coal and arsenic.



How It Happens

Overexposure to ultraviolet (UVA and UVB) rays ravages your skin's cells, according to surgeon Hiram C. Polk Jr., MD., and Ben A. Reid senior professor and chairman of the Department of Surgery at the University of Louisville School of Medicine. Over time, this damage can ultimately lead to skin cancer.

This is a bigger problem today than 50 years ago because of a reduction in the ozone in the earth's atmosphere. The ozone filters UV light, and with less ozone, a higher level of UV light reaches us.

It is a particular problem for people with red or fair hair, blue eyes, fair skin and freckles and for those who have trouble tanning and often burn in the sun. These people are most at risk. Those with a high number of

moles or with a history of the disease in two or more family members are also at a higher risk.

Your Best Defense

"Prevention is a matter of guarding your skin against the known causes of skin cancer," says Polk. "Since the sun is the main cause, the most effective prevention is to avoid the sun. Limit your exposure to the sun by covering your skin and by using sunscreens with at least a 15 SPF (sun protection factor)."

Polk also recommends inspecting your body periodically for any skin changes.

"Get familiar with your skin and your own pattern of moles, freckles and 'beauty marks' and be alert to changes in the number, size, shape and the color of pigmented areas. If you notice any changes, call your physician."

Women should pay particular attention to their legs. Although melanomas can develop anywhere on the body, the legs are the most common place for women to get them.

Avoiding Skin Cancer

A few tips to reduce skin cancer's risk:

- Minimize exposure to sun between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.
- Apply sunscreen of SPF 15 or higher to skin exposed to the sun. Reapply every two hours as well as after swimming and perspiring.
- Wear clothing that covers your body and shades your face.
- Avoid sunlamps or tanning parlors.

The Sleep Apnea Center treats a wide variety of sleep disorders, ranging from narcolepsy to sleep apnea to restless leg syndrome. Some common side effects of sleep disorders are irritability, memory and energy loss, excessive daytime sleepiness and job-related accidents. Approximately one in three Americans have a sleep disorder.

Celebrate: May is National Older Americans Month

Every year since 1963, the month of May has been declared National Older Americans Month, a time to honor the country's older citizens and Gov. Paul Patton has also proclaimed May to be Older Americans Month in Kentucky.

Of the 34 million Americans who are age 60 or older, more than 620,000 are Kentuckians. The quality of life for Kentucky's older citizens is enhanced by services of the Cabinet for Families and Children

and its Division of Aging Services. The cabinet's services are provided through a statewide network of local, private and public agencies and include programs available in over 300 senior citizens' centers and nutrition sites throughout the state.

Most of the state's senior citizens' centers have scheduled events during May, using this year's theme "Living Longer, Growing Stronger in America," as a tribute to older Kentuckians for the contributions they have made and continue to make, said Jerry Whitley, director of Aging Services. Staff of the center will wear and display gold ribbons all month as a symbol of the "golden years."

The theme of Older Americans Month, "Living Longer, Growing Stronger," recognizes the continuing advances in medicine, science and technology that allow more older Americans to live longer and become or stay healthy. National census figures illustrate the theme. There were 17 million older Americans when May was first set aside to honor them in 1963. Today there are nearly 34 million older Americans, and the population in Kentucky as well as the nation continues to age rapidly. It is estimated one of every four Americans in the year 2030 will be over age 60.

In 1996, more than 14,000 Kentuckians over age 60 were served by an Aging Services program designed to allow them to live independently in their own homes by providing such support services as minor home repairs and cooked meals.

Kentucky's 15-Area Agencies on Aging connect older citizens to the network of services available to them in every county. 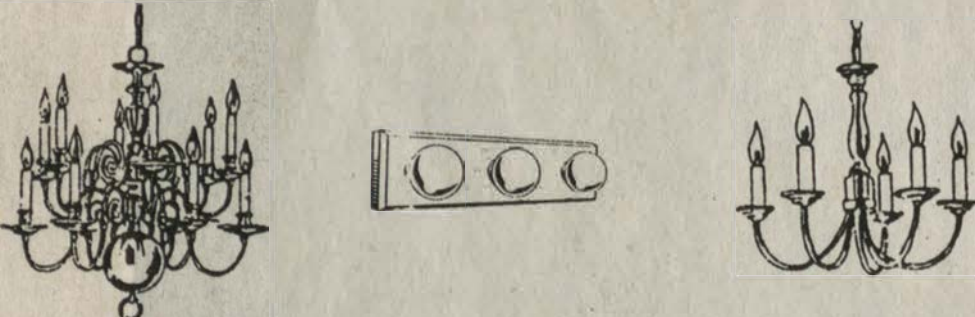

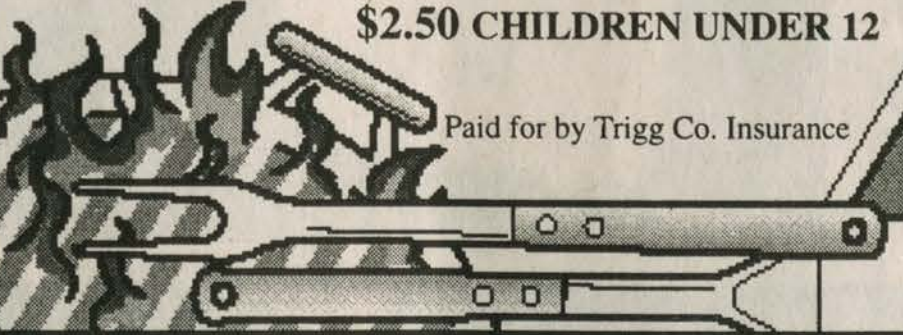

Premillennial Problems (III)

These days it is commonly believed that Israel has a God given right to the land of Palestine. This view is especially held among those who believe in Premillennialism. According to this doctrine, the Lord will return one day to reign on the throne of David, in Jerusalem, for 1000 years. This of course necessitates there being a throne of David in Jerusalem, and thus the restoration of Israel. In fact, because of this view, the land was returned to Israel shortly after World War II, even though it had been home to the Arabs for nearly 2000 years. Israel has a right to this land, it is argued, because God promised Abraham that he and his descendants would own the land forever. But is this true? God did indeed promise Abraham the land of Canaan or Palestine (Gen. 13:14, 15; 17:7, 8). This promise, however, would have its fulfillment in his "descendants," after they had been in Egypt for 400 years (Gen. 15:13-18). Moses led them out of Egypt, and Joshua led them in their conquest of Canaan. At the end of his life, Joshua wrote, "So the Lord gave to Israel all the land of which He had sworn to give to their fathers, and they took possession of it and dwelt in it. . . . Not a word failed of any good thing which the Lord had spoken to the house of Israel. All came to pass" (Josh. 21:43-45). Clearly, Joshua thought that God had fulfilled His promises. In Solomon's day, Israel's borders spread "from the River to the land of the Philistines, as far as the border of Egypt" (2 Chron. 9:26).

Someone might object that God promised Israel the land "for ever." Yet, it is important to realize that God's promises are often conditional. Both Moses (Lev. 26:14-45; Deut. 28:15-68), and Joshua (Josh. 23:15, 16) warned the people that the Lord's promise depended upon their faithfulness. In fact, God's original covenant was, "If you will indeed obey My voice and keep My covenant, then you shall be a special treasure to Me above all people" (Exo. 19:5, 6). The Israelites eventually lost their right to the land and were carried into captivity "because they did not obey the voice of the Lord their God" (2 Kings 18:11, 12).

God's promises are still conditional. He also promises us a land of Canaan, but only IF we faithfully serve Him.

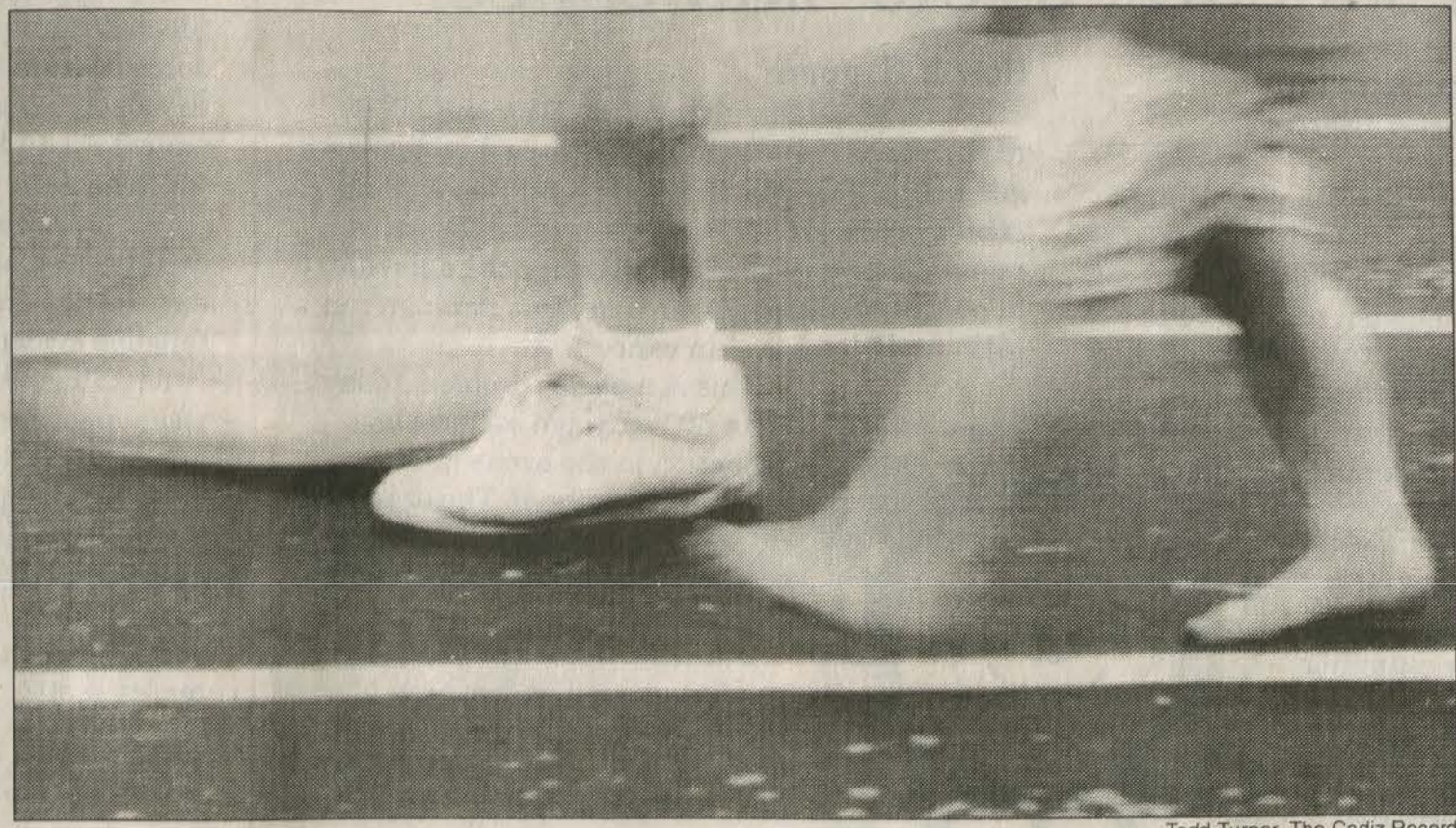

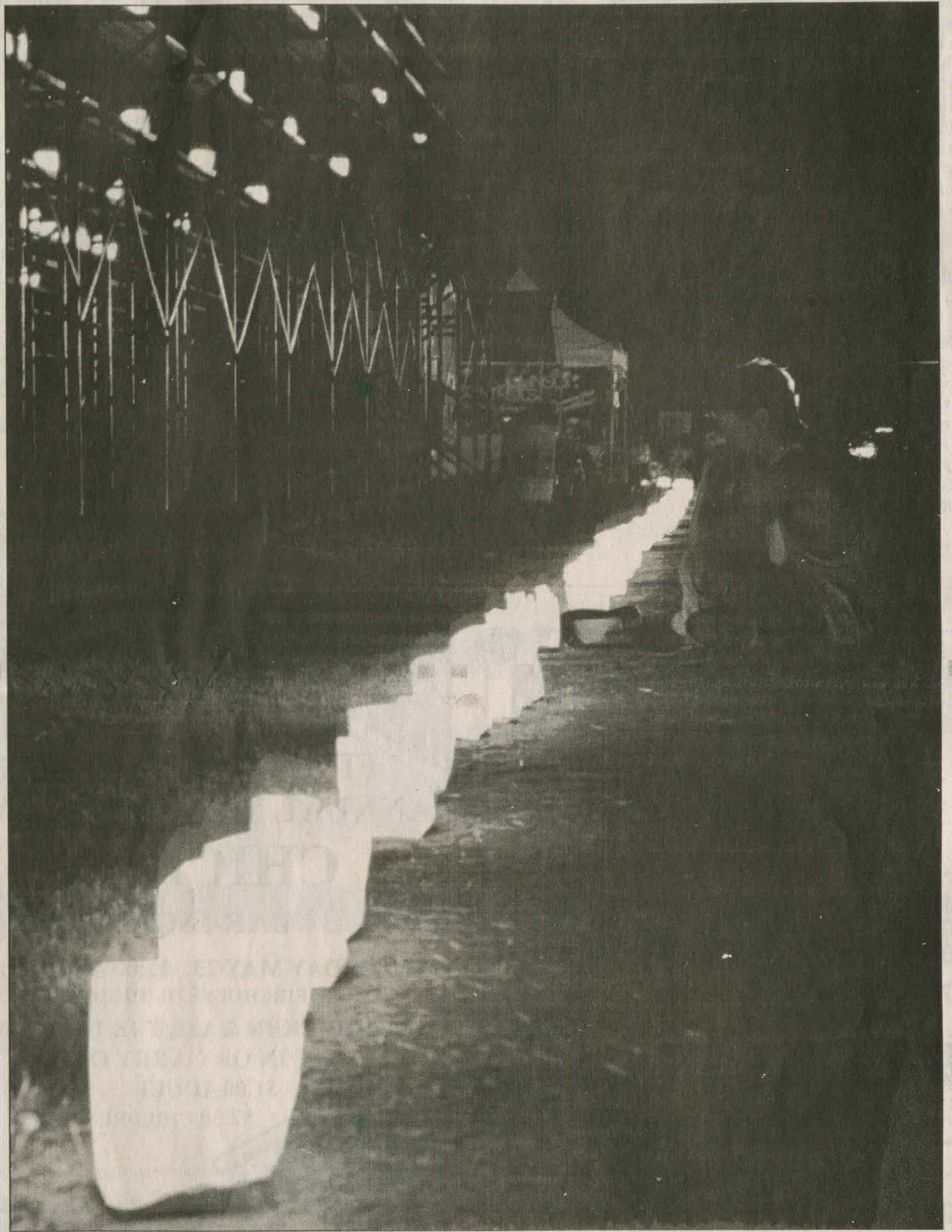

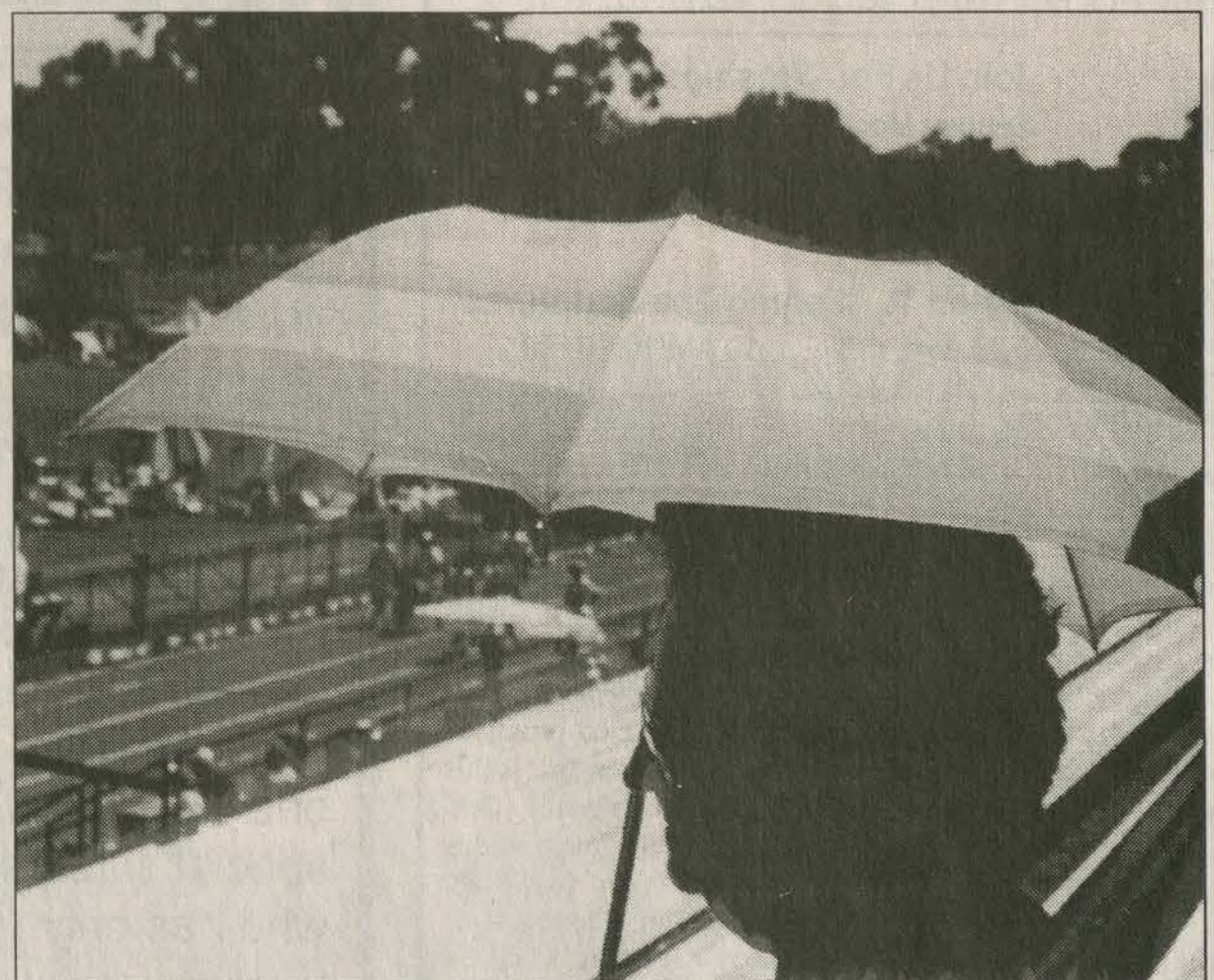

With critters on the move, be on lookout for rabies

It's springtime and the critters are on the move again. I have seen lots of opossum, raccoon, skunks and groundhog on the highway already. I don't know if it is due to our mild winter, but there sure seems to be an overabundance of them.

Since skunk and raccoon are the primary carriers of rabies in this area, it gives me cause for concern. Rabies is a fatal disease and it is transferable to humans. It occurs in nearly all warm-blooded animals.

Any bite or scratch from a wild carnivore (skunk, raccoon, fox, feral cat, feral dog) or a bat

is considered to be an exposure to rabies. Cleanse quickly with soap and hot water and transport to the nearest medical facility.

If the animal can be killed, you should do so. However, DO NOT SHOOT IT IN THE HEAD. The brain tissue is needed to diagnose if the animal has rabies. Only an autopsy can

determine if an animal is affected by rabies. You cannot tell just by looking.

The signs and symptoms of rabies are caused by the swelling of brain tissue. This causes personality changes in the affected animal. Docile animals become aggressive and shy animals become overly affectionate.

The Trigg County Health Department and Trigg County Veterinary Clinic are again sponsoring a Rabies Clinic this year. It will be held at Trigg County Veterinary Clinic on Highway 68 East on Friday, June 19, from 8:30 a.m. until 5:50 p.m. Plan to be there.

If you have an animal over 4 months of age it should be vaccinated. While some people vaccinate their own animals, the only legally recognized rabies vaccine is that administered by a licensed veterinarian.

State dog licenses will also be available. Remember, it is a Kentucky State law that your animal be licensed and that your animal wear a collar with its rabies tag and state tag attached at all times.

Cats should also receive rabies vaccines, even though they do not have to wear their tags.

If you have any questions

regarding the clinic, please contact the Trigg County Health Department, Trigg County Veterinary Clinic or the Humane Society.

On May 14, another Trigg County resident was found guilty of animal cruelty. This adult male Doberman was found dead at 60 Wildwood Drive. Autopsy revealed a mildly autolyzed, intact male, young adult, black and tan Doberman retriever in exceedingly thin body condition. No grossly remarkable abnormalities were noted in the heart liver, spleen, kidneys or lungs. Body fat stores

were scant, but were not totally depleted. The stomach contained a large amount of ingesta composed primarily of tree leaves, dead grass and very small numbers of green peas. The small intestines were largely devoid of ingesta, containing only mucoid material. Large numbers of juvenile and adult round worms and adult and hook worms were present within the intestinal lumen. The cecum and colon contained large amounts of fecal material which appeared to be composed of undigested grass and tree leaves. Diagnosis: malnutrition, intestinal parasitism.

LOCAL CLUB NEWS

Trigg County Chapter of National Association of Retired Federal Employees (NARFE)

The Trigg County Chapter of the National Association of Retired Federal Employees (NARFE) met on May 13 at 10:30 a.m. at Hamtown Restaurant. President **William Peters** presided. **Ernest Johnston** gave the invocation which was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance by all present.

Connie Vinson introduced guest speaker registered nurse Layton Harper who spoke on home care, a new service of Trigg County Hospital. A group of healthcare professionals will provide the following variety of in-home service to persons in Trigg County, skilled nursing care, home-care aides, physical therapy, speech therapy, nutrition counseling and medical social services. Your insurance representative can tell you whether you qualify for coverage for home care services. Following her presentation, Harper answered a number of questions from the members and stated that more information is available by calling 522-3215 at the hospital.

The next monthly meeting will be held Wednesday, June 10, at the Hamtown Restaurant at 10:30 a.m. All members and other retired federal employees are encouraged to attend.

The Gateway Garden Club held their regular meeting in the home of **Maybel Payne**. President **Delilah Dawson** called the meeting to order. The regular order of business was dispensed with so more time could be given to the program on orchids given by Payne and time to visit the Paynes' greenhouses of orchids, cactus and other plants.

There are 25,000 kinds of orchids all over the world, six are the favorites with cattleya orchids at the top because they bloom all year. Specie orchids are hard to grow in Kentucky and we should purchase orchids for our homes from Louisville, Nashville, Tenn., or locally since they have become adapted to our weather. Cymbidiums like cool weather and need to have a frost on them in the fall to encourage winter blooms. All orchids have the same characteristics. Once blooming is over, cut blooms off to 2 inches from plant.

There is an insect for each of the 25,000 orchids for fertilization. Once the flower has been fertilized it dies. Problems come from pests, snails and scales. Pots can be clay or special orchid pots, but be sure to water in the morning and allow the plant to dry out before night. Temperature should range near 60 degrees with high humidity except for cattleya that like it warmer. Payne showed the members several orchids that were in bloom and then members toured the greenhouses and yard where many of the orchids had been moved to the outside.

Tips for May: Best planting dates for above ground May 1-10 and 26-31, below ground crops May 12-24.

Continue to move house plants to the outdoors. Don't be in too big of a hurry to set out hot weather plants. Peppers need 70 degree days to grow and pick off the first sets to encourage more production.

Gateway Garden Club

Water seedlings and their garden spot just before transplanting. Keep lettuce watered for sweet flavor. Cut leaf lettuce after first leaves are 6 to 8 inches long. Do not pull up the plant but snip leaves for continued production over several weeks. Azalea leaves that are yellow and other acid lovers means it time for a spring tonic of two tablespoons of cider vinegar in a quart of water. Sow corn, okra, blackeyes, squash, watermelons and everything else you want in this year's garden by mid-month. Many newly set plants enjoy the blooms removed to encourage root growth and include strawberries and peonies. Keep weeds out of iris beds to discourage disease. Pinch back mums and asters to encourage bushiness. Keep an eye out for aphids and mildew. Start a fungus spraying program. All this rain has encouraged it to grow. Continue to keep fresh nectar in your hummingbird

feeders. Plant dill, fennel, parsley and butterfly weed for caterpillars and sweet smelling plants for butterflies. Do not spray with insecticides or you will kill the butterflies too. Plant lots of flowers in large pots to move around your patio or garden as they put on a display of color. When purchasing plants, buy a few extras if possible so should one or more die you already have their replacement. If you have good luck with your plants and do not need replacements, you can always share with a friend. Remember, the best garden, flower or vegetable, is the one shared.

The meeting was highlighted with several floral designers, music from local artists and the South Atlantic Regional director's reception and speech to the convention.

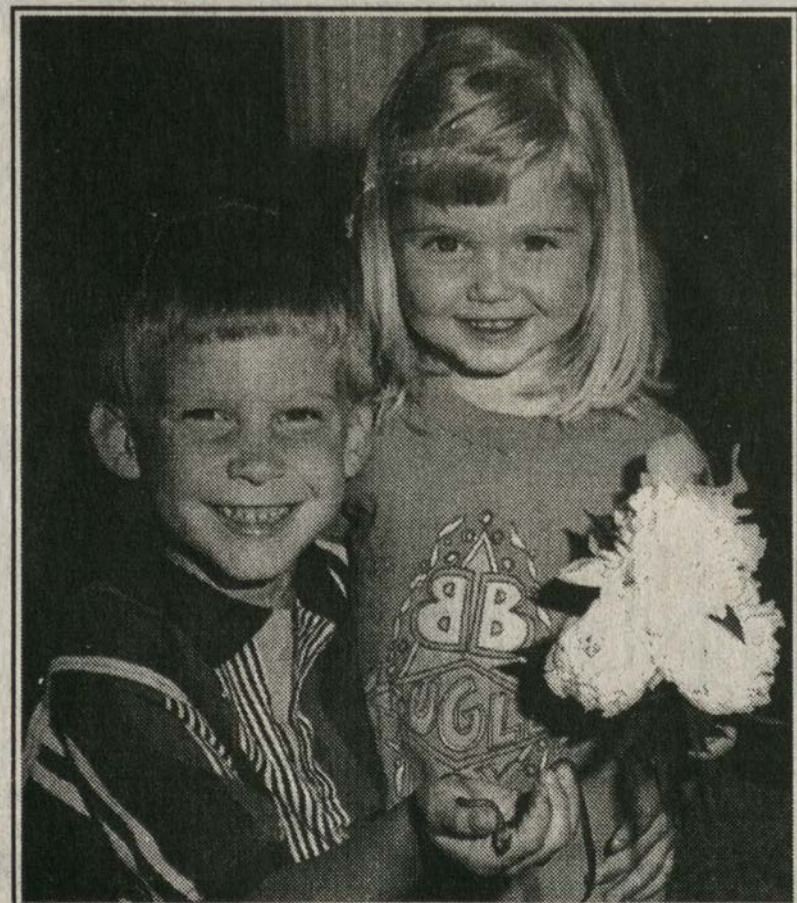

Hailstones and flood . . .

How about hailstones the size of houses weighing 20 tons or even more? Not only that but what if they were hitting the earth's atmosphere every day? According to Dr. Louis A. Frank, University of Iowa physicist, that's not just theory but a statement of fact.

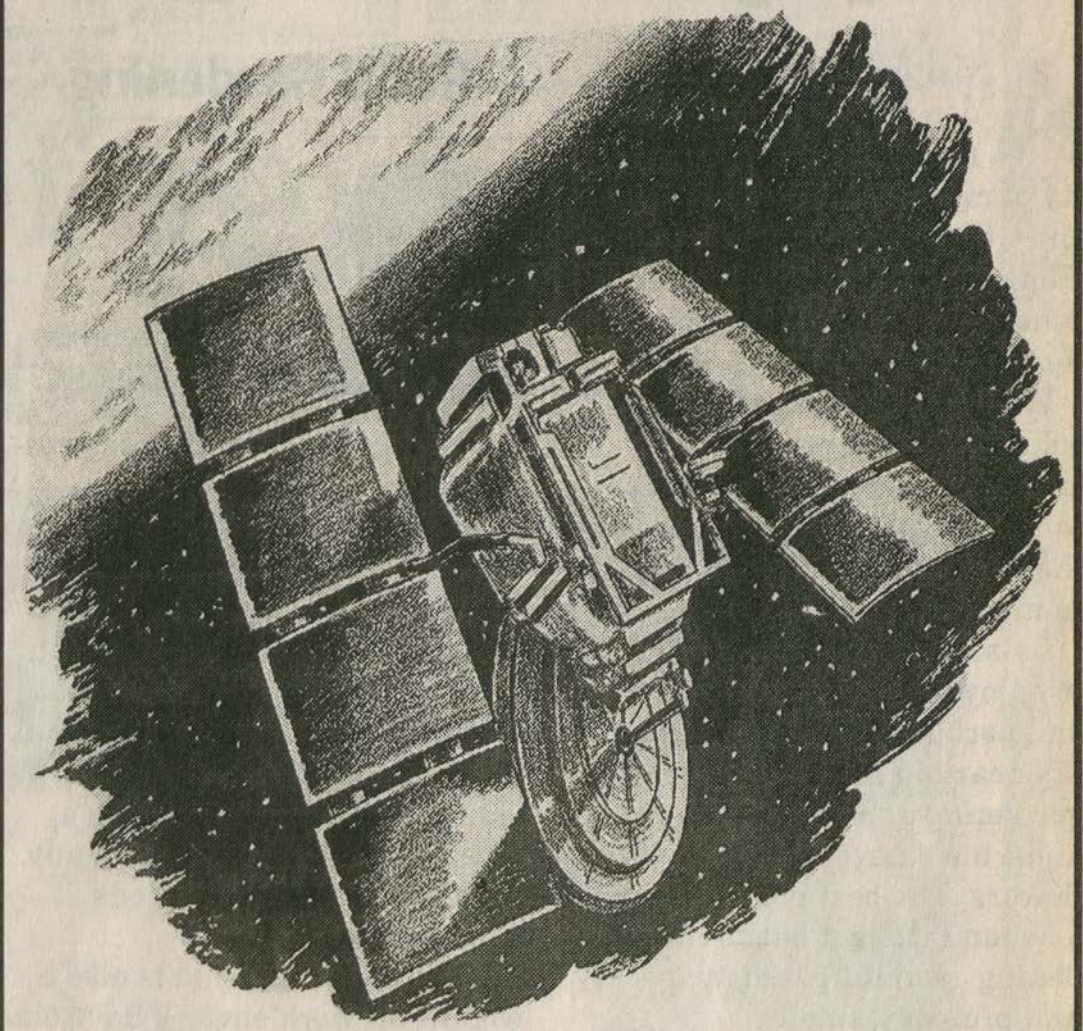

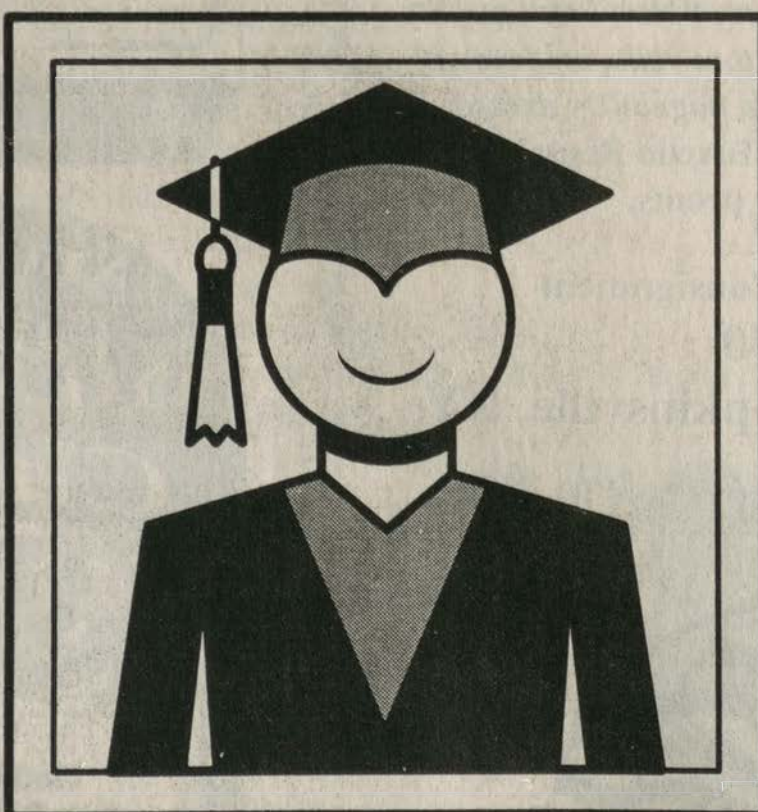

Work-saving tools can help keep you (and garden) fresh

A visitor to my flower garden expressed amazement at the size and variety of my garden and she said, "I know that's a lot of work!" Then, "How do you ever get all that done?" and I think she probably thought, "Why?"

Well, as I have mentioned before, this is my gift to any lover of flowers who chances to come into my back yard. I enjoy the work itself but I wouldn't do so much if it wasn't appreciated.

I also want my grandchildren to enjoy the beauty of nature and perhaps enjoy gardening. My dear Ma introduced me to gardening at a very young age and I have never ceased to love flowers. The best part of my day is when I can get out to the gardening even if I get dirty, sweaty and probably, smelly.

Now, the "how" of the above is a whole other story. I am no young thing able to do what young muscles and bones can do. And I can't spend the long hours I once could. So I compensate!

I think of every work-saving device I can and I have learned to use many shortcuts. I also have learned to pace myself.

When I'm tired, I rest. My grandfather once told me that you know you are old when it takes longer to rest than it did to work.

All my tools are good tools and I keep them clean, oiled and sharp. I like a long handle on my little "onion" hoe which is similar to a perennial hoe. With that long handle, I can reach without treading on the soil. I like a lightweight shovel and a fairly small one. I have never gotten used to the perennial shovel which my kind husband found for me but they work well for most gardeners. I use heavy shears and good pruners and I want them sharp.

I like to have my sprayer all

ready to go if I have to spray roses, etc.

Those are the obvious things all gardeners should do. But I also have many shortcuts. The best work saver is a good mulch. I buy a ton of saw mill waste at a time and I have a young friend who picks out the best and delivers it in a dump truck. I use a wheel barrow of that mulch any time I see a spot that needs more mulch.

A willing grandchild is also a wonderful work saver. I have one who is very sweet and willing and another possible.

Then there are the tips I read or hear from another gardener.

If you like to garden with large pots and don't like to lug those big clay pots around, buy the plastic ones which look like clay. Fill the bottom with Styrofoam and then add dirt.

But if you like the old look of clay pots, you know, the mossy ones, brush the new clay pots with yogurt and they will look aged.

Try planting a few marigolds among your roses. Though not really scientifically proven, it's worth trying and it is supposed to ward off several pests including nematodes.

One of the best I have heard lately is to put chopped banana skins at the bottom of the hole when you're planting roses. It adds potassium just as the peels on top of the soil. Pretty good idea, huh?

If you have a "burn pile" as I do, collect those wood ashes and use as a fertilizer. They contain

useful nutrients, particularly potassium sulfate. Asters and roses especially like wood ashes.

Use your hands to deadhead soft-stemmed plants. Using pruners is time consuming and inefficient. Of course, you will have green thumbs - AND fingers!

Always remove faded flowers as soon as possible to prevent disease.

Use a board to stand on when in vegetable or flower beds to reduce soil compaction.

Don't chase away that great bunch of starlings on your lawn. They will eat grubs, especially after a rain.

If you move irises after blooming, cut them back about 6 inches and that's the only time you should ever cut irises back. Cutting them back will reduce the shock of moving them.

One of the best tips ever is to make a list of the plants in your garden which like dry soil and another list of the ones which like shade. When you buy a new plant, add to your lists. Keep that list where you keep your garden tools and chemicals. You can kill a lot of plants with too much or too little water.

My neighbor gardener was poking long nails down into the soil around tomato plants. Now I am very interested in his tomato plants because he lets me pick tomatoes and I, in return, share my water with him. (I added a second water spigot at the end of my garden). So I went over to inquire about the nails around the tomato plants. He says that the cut worms will attach themselves to the nails and try to eat them instead of the tomato. Maybe you already knew that.

If you have any good tips, I'd appreciate your sharing them with me and I'll pass them on to our readers.

Chess Pie

(A good Southern cook like Golene always has a favorite chess pie recipe.)

- 3 whole eggs
 - 1 1/2 c. sugar
 - 1 stick butter
 - 1 T. vanilla
 - 1 T. vinegar
 - 1 T. cornmeal
 - 1 T. flour
 - 9 inch pie shell (uncooked)
- Beat eggs, sugar, melted butter and other ingredients. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes.

Chicken Rice

- 4 each chicken legs and thighs
 - 2 cans of cream of chicken or cream of mushroom soup
 - 1 1/2 - 2 c. uncooked rice
- Wash chicken legs and thighs. Spread uncooked rice into baking dish. Put chicken on top of rice. Pour cream of chicken or cream of mushroom soup over chicken. Bake in oven at 400 degrees for 1 1/2 hours or until done.

Broccoli Casserole

- large box frozen chopped broccoli
 - medium onion, chopped and sauteed
 - can cream of mushroom soup
 - 2 c. cooked rice
 - 1 jar Cheese Whiz
- Mix and cook in baking dish at 350 degrees for 30 - 40 minutes or until done.

Mexican cornbread

(Golene boils a head of cabbage to serve with the bread, it's all you need to eat all day long.)

- 1 1/2 c. cornmeal
- 2 T. cooking oil
- 1 lb. browned hamburger meat
- 1 T. red hot pepper (optional)
- 1/4 - 1/2 lb American cheese
- 1 egg

- 1 c. milk
 - can cream style corn
 - 1 onion chopped
- Mix cornmeal, egg, oil and milk together and pour 1/2 into bottom of skillet. Add the other ingredients one at a time starting with the browned hamburger, onion, corn and cheese and sprinkle of hot pepper in layers on top of the cornmeal. Pour remaining bread mix on top. Bake in over at 400 degrees for 30 - 40 minutes or until done.

Sausage Pinwheels

(Wonderful for parties, weddings, etc.)

- 1 lb. sausage (room temperature)
 - 2 c. self rising flour
 - 1/4 c. Crisco
 - 3/4 c. sweet milk
 - 2 T. cornmeal
 - 2 T. sugar
- Mix dry ingredients together, cut in Crisco, knead about 4 times. Roll out and spread with sausage. Roll as for jelly roll. Chill 2 hours or overnight. Slice 1/4 inch thick and bake at 450 degrees about 20 minutes or until done.

No Bake Chocolate Oatmeal Cookies

(Make these, and I guarantee you'll be asked to make them again and again and again!)

- 2 c. sugar
 - 1/4 cocoa
 - 1/2 milk
 - 1/4 lb. margarine
 - 1 t. vanilla
 - pinch of salt
 - 1/2 c. peanut butter
 - 3 c. quick cooking oats
- Cook sugar, cocoa, milk and margarine until mixture starts to boil (about 1 minute). Remove from heat and cool 1 minute. Add vanilla, salt, peanut butter and oats. Stir well and drop on wax paper or cookie sheet.

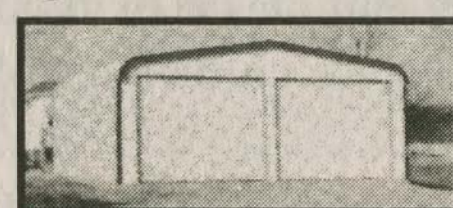

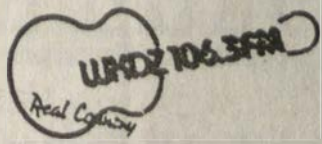

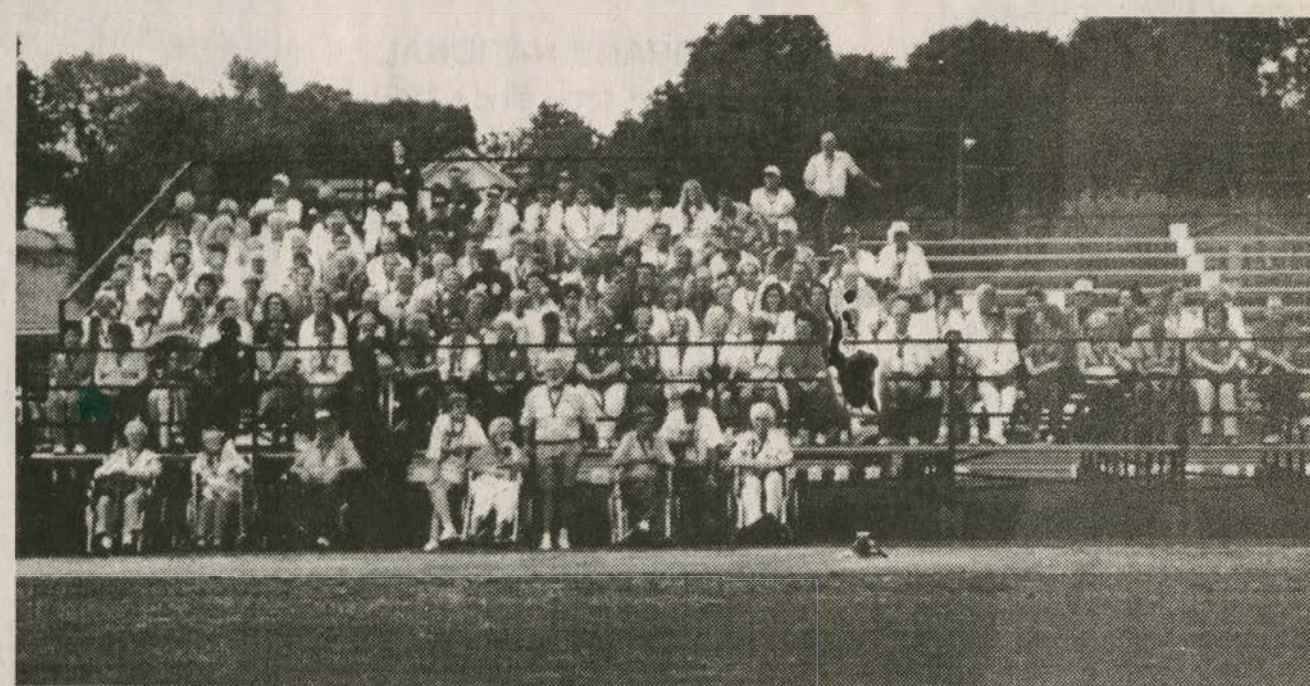

Martin assumed the lead after defending champion Jeff Gordon ran out of gas at the white flag. Fuel mileage should not have been an issue in such a short (105-mile) race.

The Ford driver also won the race's second segment, giving him earnings of \$257,500 for a race watched by more than 150,000 fans.

"It's pretty embarrassing," admitted a dejected Gordon. "I don't know all the specifics of what happened, but I do know this: We had an awesome car."

Jeremy Mayfield won the

evening's primary undercard, earning a transfer into The Winston with a victory in the 50-lap Winston Open.

BUSCH GRAND NATIONAL

For the first time since 1995, Tim Fedewa captured the annual BGN race at Nazareth (Pa.) Speedway. The victories are notable since they make up the Holt, Mich., driver's two career victories in the division.

Dale Earnhardt Jr., the pole winner, dominated the early going but crashed after being penalized by NASCAR for illegally entering the pits.

In 11 events, the Busch Grand National division has had 10 different race winners this year. Only Joe Nemechek has scored twice.

When the first World 600 was run in 1960, the track was barely completed in time and the cars started tearing up the fresh pavement almost immediately. Joe Lee Johnson won that race in a Chevrolet owned by Frank Strickland.

Rumor has track owners petitioning for bias-ply tires

CONCORD, N.C. — A persistent rumor at Charlotte Motor Speedway had a group of track owners petitioning NASCAR to bring back bias-ply tires.

Winston Cup cars have been shod with radial tires since the late 1980s, but those who prefer the old bias-ply tires cite two weaknesses of the radials. The newer tires are so adhesive that they are hard on racing surfaces, requiring frequent repavings, and from a driver's viewpoint, they are not "forgiving." It is easier with bias-ply rubber for a driver to

regain control of a car that has lost adhesion.

In all other respects, radial tires are clearly superior. Goodyear officials said the company had no plans to produce bias-ply racing tires.

NASCAR spokesman Jeff Motley said, "For tires, we rely on the expertise and advice of Goodyear, and if Goodyear says there are no plans to produce bias-ply tires, then they will not be used."

LIFE'S A GAS, MAN: Danny "Chocolate" Myers could participate on a winning pit crew in two races next Sunday. In addition to his normal duties as

"gasman" for Dale Earnhardt, Myers will work in the Indianapolis 500 crew of Billy Boat, who drives for four-time Indy winner A.J. Foyt.

In fact, since Boat won the pole Saturday at the Brickyard, Myers' best chance for victory lane might be with the G-Force/Aurora driven by Boat.

Fueling at Indy is practically a different job than in NASCAR, where 11-gallon tanks are hoisted into the air and the gasoline transferred by gravity and brawn. At Indy, the fuel is methanol, not gasoline, and it is transferred via a locking hose mechanism.

Myers, the son of one-time NASCAR driver Bobby Myers, worked on the IRL team of Chitwood Racing in the Visionaire 500 at CMS last year.

A corporate jet will fly him from Indianapolis to Charlotte, and a helicopter will then transport him from Douglas International Airport to the track.

THE WINSTON DEANS: Ricky Rudd, Dale Earnhardt and Darrell Waltrip are the only drivers to have competed in all 13 Winstons. Rudd has driven for four different car owners: Bud Moore, Kenny Bernstein, Rick Hendrick and himself.

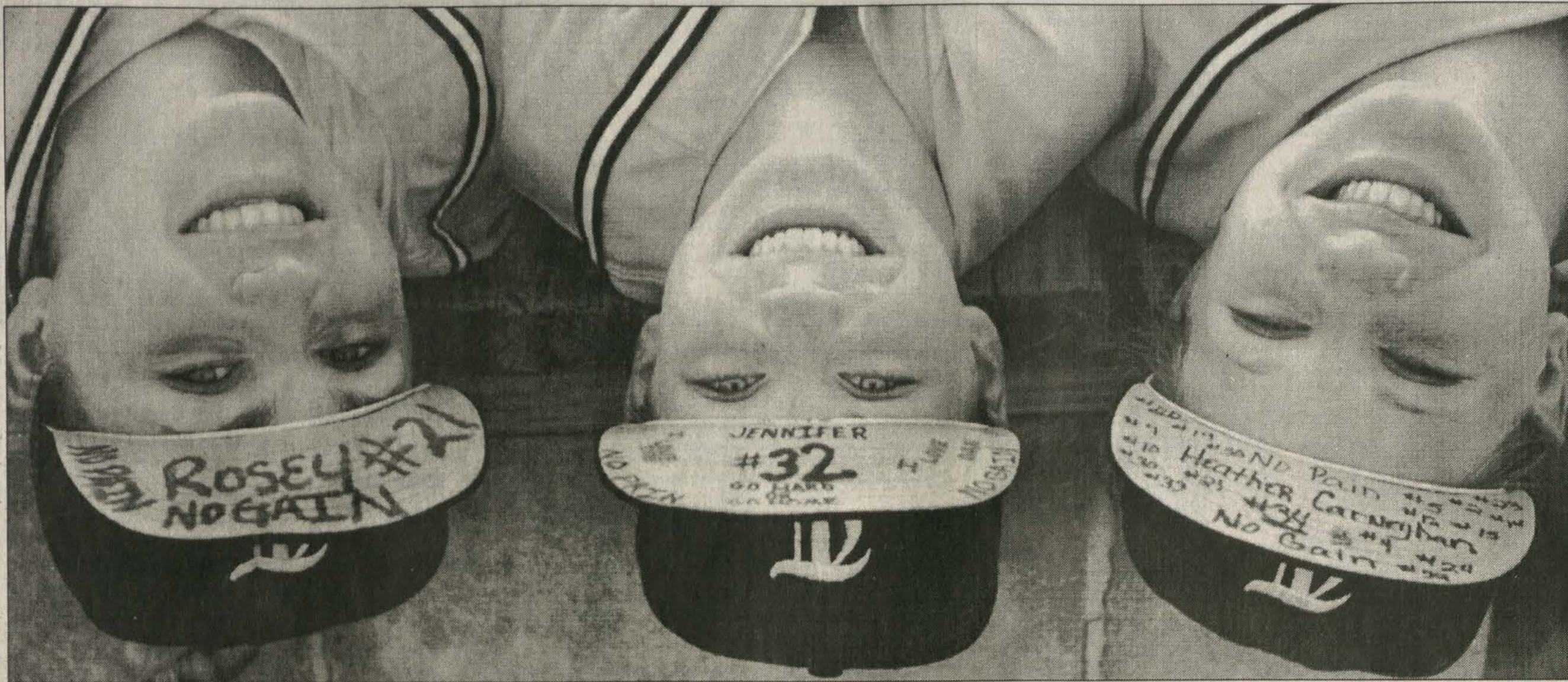

Qualifying standards nice, but most run to win

For the first time, athletes will be racing the clock as well as their opponents in regional track and field meets.

Will the new State Meet qualifying standards change the racing tactics for Trigg County's runners, who line up Thursday and Saturday in the Class 2A regional meet at Fort Campbell?

Probably not too much, according to Wildcat athletes. Runners know if they finish first or second they'll earn a ticket to Lexington, and that's what most of them will be shooting for. If they eclipse the qualifying standard that gives them a state berth, they'll take that, too.

"I'm the type of runner, I go out every time expecting to win," said Trigg County 800-meter specialist Patrick Johnson. "I'm not going to hold back and run for a time. I'm just going to try and win the race."

Teammate Ed Marchal, among the favorites in the 400, said he's "not too concerned about he qualifying standard too much."

"I really want to walk away from region being the region champ," Marchal said. "I believe when I step up in the blocks, I'll be thinking about winning."

Still, the qualifying standards could play a big role in this week's regional at Fryar Field.

Larson figures when Marchal is pushed by strong competition — such as in the regional — his time will come down, and he'll have a shot at cracking the 50-second barrier. Marchal was slowed two weeks ago by a strained hamstring, but Larson hopes he'll be back at full strength this week.

Cattle drawing favorable prices

Lower feeding cost, demand for beef are factors

There is reason for cattle producers to celebrate. The current market for feeder cattle is up \$10 per cwt. higher than 1997 levels for light calves and about \$5 per cwt. higher for yearlings.
 Several different factors are having an influence on the current cattle market. One of which is lower feeding cost in 1998 compared to 1997. This would probably explain why the light

weight calves were selling higher now than a year ago. Feed yards are able to buy feed grains cheaper now than they could last year.

The second factor that has pushed cattle prices higher is the recent drop in cattle slaughter. Feed yards have been "holding" cattle to wait for a more favorable price. Even though

slaughter numbers have declined, the market weights of cattle are up about 45 pounds. The increased weight of cattle going to slaughter has offset the lower numbers of cattle. Total beef production will be nearly equal to last year's numbers.

The final factor that has helped strengthen cattle prices is demand for beef. As we go in to the spring and summer grilling season, cattle prices usually rise. The increased demand has increased fed cattle prices into the upper \$60s and may even reach into the \$70s. This in turn has helped strengthen feeder calf prices.

The outlook for fall prices is

still uncertain. Probably the biggest factor in the fall price equation is this year's crop market, which is still yet to be determined. (Information for this article came from Dr. Lee Meyer, UK Extension Ag Economist).

AGRICULTURE BRIEFS

Wheat: Cold snap not as bad as first thought

Winter wheat production by Kentucky farmers in 1998 is forecast at 26.5 million bushels. The expected crop for 1998 is down 7 percent from last year's record crop of 28.6 million bushels.

Based on current conditions as of May 1, Kentucky farmers expect a yield of 53 bushels per acre, down 1 bushel from last year but much better than originally thought after the extreme cold experienced in mid-March.

Farmers seeded 750,000 acres of winter wheat in the fall of 1997 and intend to harvest 500,000 acres for grain this year, down 30,000 acres from a year ago. This will leave 250,000 acres for other use such as cover crop for tobacco as well as hay and silage harvest. Acreage for other uses is also up due to wheat acreage being unfit to harvest as grain.

The winter wheat crop was showing good growth and development during the winter thanks to relatively mild temperatures. Then in mid-March, an arctic blast of cold air moved across the State and temperatures dropped below 20 degrees. Damage at first was thought to be significant and severe in several areas of the state. Since then damage has been found to be less than originally thought for most.

USDA: Empowerment Zone applications

United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) conducted a one-day Regional Workshop in Lexington on April 30 to provide guidance to rural community members interested in applying for Empowerment Zone designation.

This was the second round of the Clinton/Gore Administration's initiative for revitalizing impoverished rural communities. Five rural communities will be selected an Empowerment Zone by Jan. 1, 1999. Applications for designation are due Oct. 9.

In 1995, three rural communities were designated as Empowerment Zones and 30 were chosen as Enterprise Communities. In Round Two, no new Enterprise Community designations will be made. However, existing Enterprise Communities can apply for Empowerment Zone designation. During the first round of competition, Kentucky Highlands Empowerment Zone in Kentucky was designated as an Empowerment Zone with Jackson, Clinton and two census tracts of Wayne counties. McCreary County and Scott County, Tenn., were designated as an Enterprise Community.

STATE CROP REPORT

Agriculture news: Rain-fall for the week was slightly above normal. Previously wet soils and continued rains caused fieldwork to be minimal with less than 2 days suitable for the third straight week. Farmers maintained barns, machinery, and fences, prepared for planting, worked cattle and clipped pastures. Corn planting, tobacco setting, and seedbed preparation were near a standstill for the week. Topsoil moisture, as of Friday, May 8 was rated 19 percent adequate, and 81 percent surplus. Subsoil moisture was rated 27 percent adequate and 73 percent surplus.

Tobacco: As of May 10, 4 percent of the intended burley acreage had been set. This compares to 4 percent last year, and 4 percent for the five-year average. Dark tobacco setting was just beginning. This compares to 3 percent last year. As of May 8, height of tobacco plants in beds (conventional, float, and greenhouse) was 41 percent less than 2 inches, 36 percent 2 to 4 inches, and 23 percent larger than 4 inches. Ninety nine percent reported there will be an adequate tobacco plant supply while 1 percent estimate a short supply. Active blue mold has been confirmed in greenhouse plants in some southwestern areas of the state. Many report tobacco plants are too large for this early in the season. Tobacco disease problems were reported in some greenhouses and plant beds across the State.

Corn: Corn planting was at a near standstill and was 37 percent complete as of May 10. This compares to 54 percent last year and 50 percent for the five year average. About 23 percent of the intended corn acreage has emerged. This compares to 32 percent last year and 33 percent for the five-year average. As of May 8, the emerged corn was rated 5 percent very poor, 13 percent poor, 47 percent fair, 31 percent good and 4 percent excellent. Cornstands are generally good except in drowned out areas. Generally the State doesn't see any yield losses if corn can be planted by May 15th. Soybean planting was 1 percent complete.

Small grains and legumes: As of May 10, 84 percent of the winter wheat crop was headed or heading. This compares to 56 percent last year and 58 percent for the five year average. As of May 8, wheat condition was rated as 5 percent very poor, 11 percent poor, 33 percent fair, 42 percent good, and 9 percent excellent. Some areas reported increased disease problems in their wheat crop.

Other crops: Pasture condition was rated 2 percent poor, 20 percent fair, 57 percent good, and 21 percent excellent. Hay condition was rated 3 percent poor, 24 percent fair, 54 percent good, and 19 percent excellent.

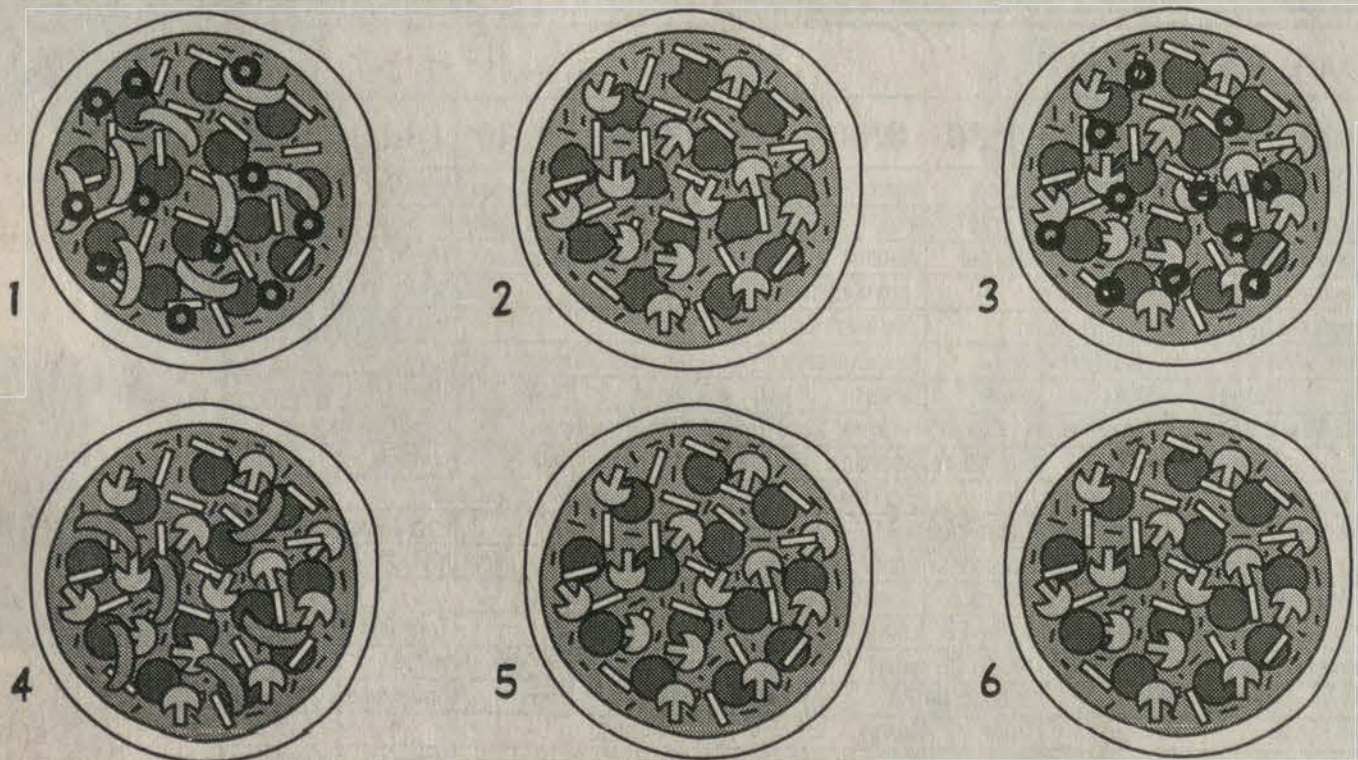
- A. I stand 151 feet above New York Harbor and was a gift from the French to the American people. You can take a ferry and be near my feet on Liberty Island. I have a poem written on my base that says "Give me your tired, your poor..."
- B. I am a famous skyscraper 102 stories tall. I was built in 1931 and was the tallest building in the world until 1971. I stand 1,454 feet high and have two observation areas.
- C. More than 69 million people used me in 1996 to fly somewhere in the world, and almost 190,000 people travel through me each day. I have four terminals and cover 7,700 acres of land.
- D. I am a 19-foot marble memorial to a president. I overlook the Reflecting Pool, the Washington Monument and the U.S. Capitol from where I sit in Washington, D.C.
- E. More than 1.4 billion people have crossed me since I opened in 1937. I am 4,200 feet long.
- F. I am the tallest building in the world. I stand more than 1,400 feet above Chicago and take up two city blocks. I have 110 floors and about 4.5 million square feet of office and commercial space.
- G. I am a stone memorial to four presidents of the United States—George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt—whose heads are about 60 feet high. It took more than six years for a sculptor to carve me.
- H. About 6,000 people visit me each day. I am the official home to the Commander In Chief of the United States. I have 132 rooms, 32 bathrooms and seven staircases. It takes 570 gallons of white paint to cover my outside.
- I. I was originally established so early settlers could display their harvests. Each year, my outside is covered with a new mural made with thousands of bushels of corn, grain, grasses, oats, straw and wheat.
- J. The third president of the United States started designing and building me when he was 26. I am perched on a mountain and overlook the city of Charlottesville, Virginia, and I am featured on the back of the nickel.
- K. The Colorado River carved me out of rock and runs through my base. It would take you two days on foot to travel from my top to the base. Five million people visit me each year to see my overwhelming size and colorful landscape.
- L. I have 38,765 seats and was the last major league ballpark to add lights. I opened in 1914 at 1060 W. Addison. Natural grass makes up my playing field and ivy grows on my walls.
- M. It took 467 cement trucks a month to fill my foundation, which is 30 feet deep and 120 feet wide. I was built for the 1962 Seattle World's Fair and hosted more than 2.3 million people during the fair. I was originally named "The Space Cage."
- N. Founded in 1718, I was a Spanish mission during the settlement of San Antonio. About 185 to 190 defenders used me to try to hold off a Mexican army of 5,000 to 6,000 soldiers.
- O. I am a 14-acre estate that was the home to the King of Rock & Roll for 20 years. I am one of the most toured homes in America with more than 700,000 visitors each year. I even have a trophy building that includes gold records, awards and stage costumes.

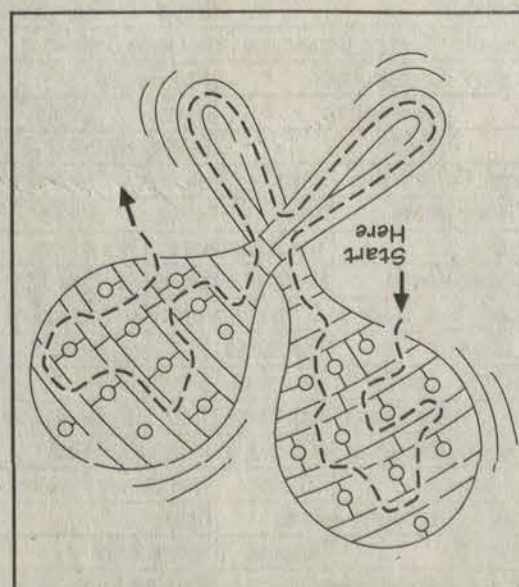

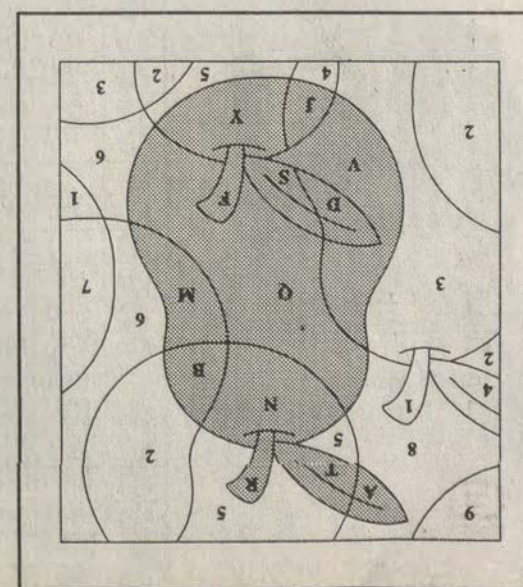

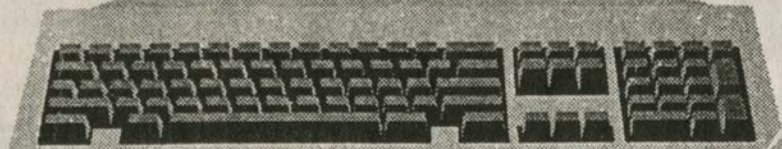

Myron Anthony does not know yet, but Tubby Smith does. How a young man could flee an accident scene and cower in the shadows for months while a teammate was left to twist in the wind. The coach knows how to turn the episode into a lesson. Americans by nature — dare I say — especially Kentuckians, embrace a young person who takes his/her medicine without excuse, with head up and uses the misstep to grow. For every Vernon Maxwell, J.R. Rider, and Roy Tarpley, there is a longer list of sports figures who turned mistakes into prosperity and stardom.

For now focus should fall on Anthony's 11th-hour confession to his coach about bad judgment. The implication is there is gold enough in Anthony for Tubby Smith to mine a young man's character as much as his jump shot accuracy.

Anthony's future aside, there is a broader opportunity here. In an era when media rail about athletes being accorded special treatment from an early age, Tubby's pleasure in meting out discipline and the good it can produce, should be made public for those watching. As the level of competition improves from three-team meets to the 12-team regional, runners who've been close to the qualifying standard might run under the standard against faster foes, Trigg County coach Rick Larson said.

Although Larson believes Marchal can win the 400, he thinks Marchal didn't break the qualifying standard during the regular season because "he really hasn't been in a race he's been pushed."

Such a scenario could be key for Johnson, who'll line up against a pair of Union County standouts who've run as fast as 1 minute, 55 seconds in the 800. Johnson was close to, but didn't break, the 2:03 qualifying standard during the regular season.

"He's in a position to let them pull them under the standard," Larson said. "He knows the tactics of the race well enough ... he feels confident."

"I think as long as I run my hardest, I'll be up there," Johnson said.

Johnson and Marchal would dearly like to go to state as individuals. Both were members of last year's 3,200-meter relay team that advanced to Lexington.

"In practice, whenever we run, and one of us gets tired, Patrick and I try to pick each other up," Marchal said.

"... We both talked about how much we wanted to go (to state) as individuals," Marchal said. "It's just something that's great about that."

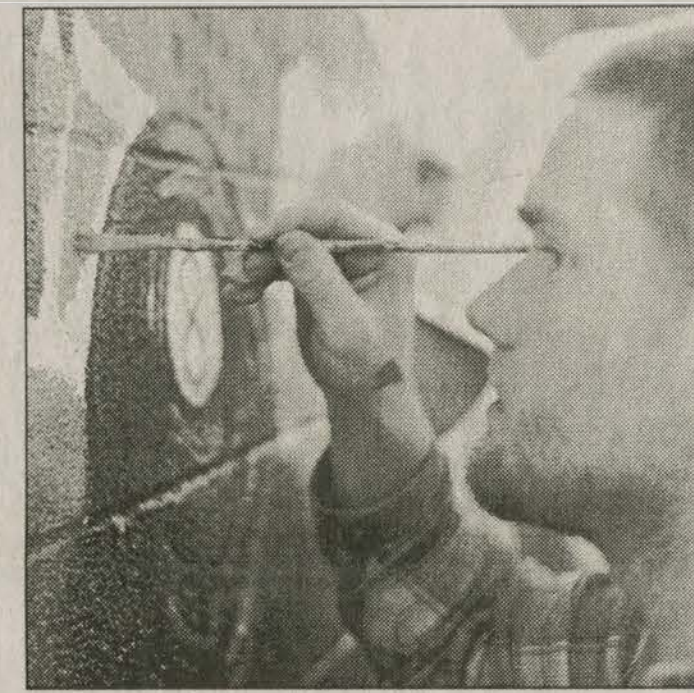

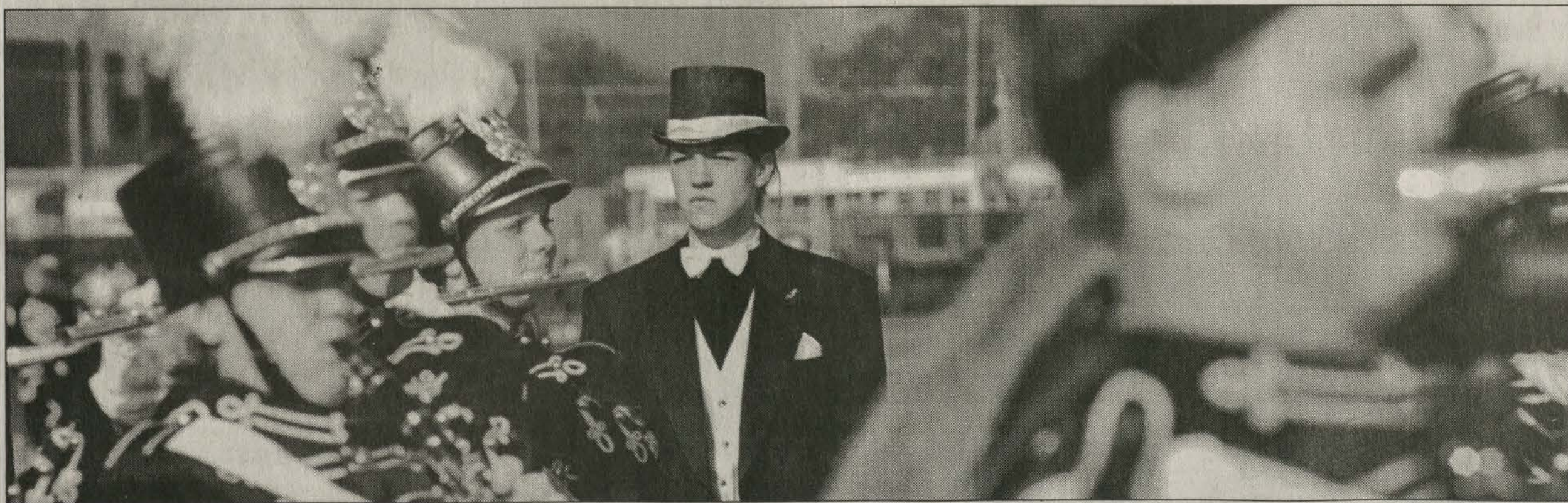
