Work on subdivision regulations continues

Trigg Fiscal Court is continuing to work on subdivision regulations for the county.

"We probably won't get it passed as quick as I hoped," Judge-Executive Berlin Moore Jr. said after a working session March 23.

Last fall, the Cadiz-Trigg County Planning Commission approved the proposed subdivision regulations and sent them to fiscal court.

More than a year ago, Moore asked Craig Morris, regional planning coordinator for the Pennyryle Area Development District, to draft regulations that would help the county improve roads and drainage.

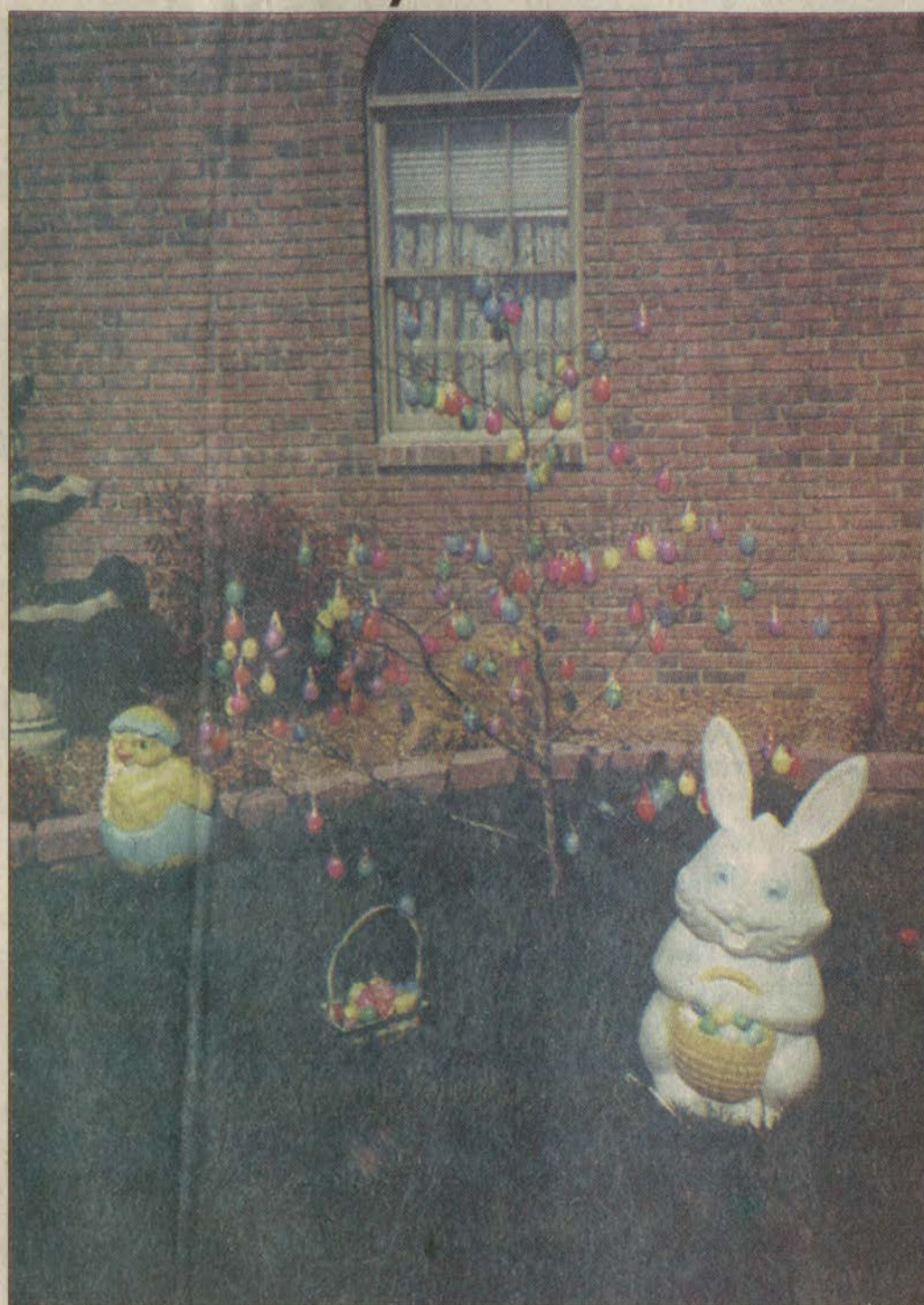
Some magistrates and county surveyor Randle Cruse have questioned the length of the document and the extent of the regulations. They are concerned that regulations will increase costs for developers and may prompt some smaller developers to quit building.

During the nearly three-hour working session, Moore asked magistrates whether they wanted to throw out the entire document, make revisions or consider it for approval at an upcoming meeting.

All magistrates agreed that some regulations are needed because the county is spending too much money to improve roads that weren't built to any standards. But three magistrates said

Middle school bids lower than expected

After months of delays, the Trigg County Middle School construction project is poised for takeoff.

The school board and the district finance corporation were scheduled to meet Tuesday night to hear a recommendation on bid awards and to discuss selling bonds to finance the project.

Bids for the project came in lower than Alliance Corp., the construction manager, or Superintendent Jim Wallace had expected.

After an hourlong bid opening last Thursday, the total for the lowest bids on all the construction packages added up to \$8.92 million. The project includes a new middle school, cafeteria and athletic field house. The low bids on the school itself were \$8.4 million.

"We're pleased with what we see so far," Wallace said.

JILL HOLLAND CASE

Holland pleads guilty to federal charges

Jill Holland faces a July 26 sentencing in federal court after pleading guilty Monday to charges of embezzlement and bank fraud.

Holland, a former loan officer at Trigg County Farmers Bank, entered the plea to a 12-count indictment in U.S. District Court at Paducah.

U.S. District Judge Thomas Russell accepted the guilty plea and set formal sentencing for 10:30 a.m. July 26.

Holland, who fled Cadiz in September 1997, agreed to pay more

than \$17,000 toward restitution that may total \$108,000.

Holland, who was arrested in January in a Dallas restaurant where she was working as a waitress, remains free on \$10,000 unsecured bond.

In Trigg County, meanwhile, a forgery case against Holland is awaiting action by a grand jury. She is charged with 19 counts of second-degree forgery. Police say she filled out credit card applications using another person's name.

The next session of the Trigg Circuit Court grand jury is scheduled for April 12.

LAKE BARKLEY STATE RESORT PARK

Indoor pool a wise investment, commissioner says

An indoor pool makes the state's flagship resort park even more attractive, State Park Commissioner Kenny Rapier says.

"We share your view that an investment in Lake Barkley State Resort Park is an investment in this area," Rapier said March 24 during the dedication of the park's pool and renovated fitness center.

The wellness pool is the centerpiece of a \$1.5 million renovation of the fitness center. The Patton administration has made an investment of \$8.7 million in improvements at the park, including a \$3.8 million renovation of the lodge, Rapier said.

"We're very confident that these expenditures will pay dividends," he said.

Rapier and park superintendent John Ruffi expect the indoor pool to increase the park's business in the winter months.

"It's turned out to be everything we hoped it would be," Ruffi said.

Since reopening in late 1998, the fitness center

has seen its business grow, Ruffi said. Memberships have more than doubled and participation is up, he said.

Fitness center director Pat Board said aerobics classes, the pool and new cardiovascular equipment are adding up to increased usage.

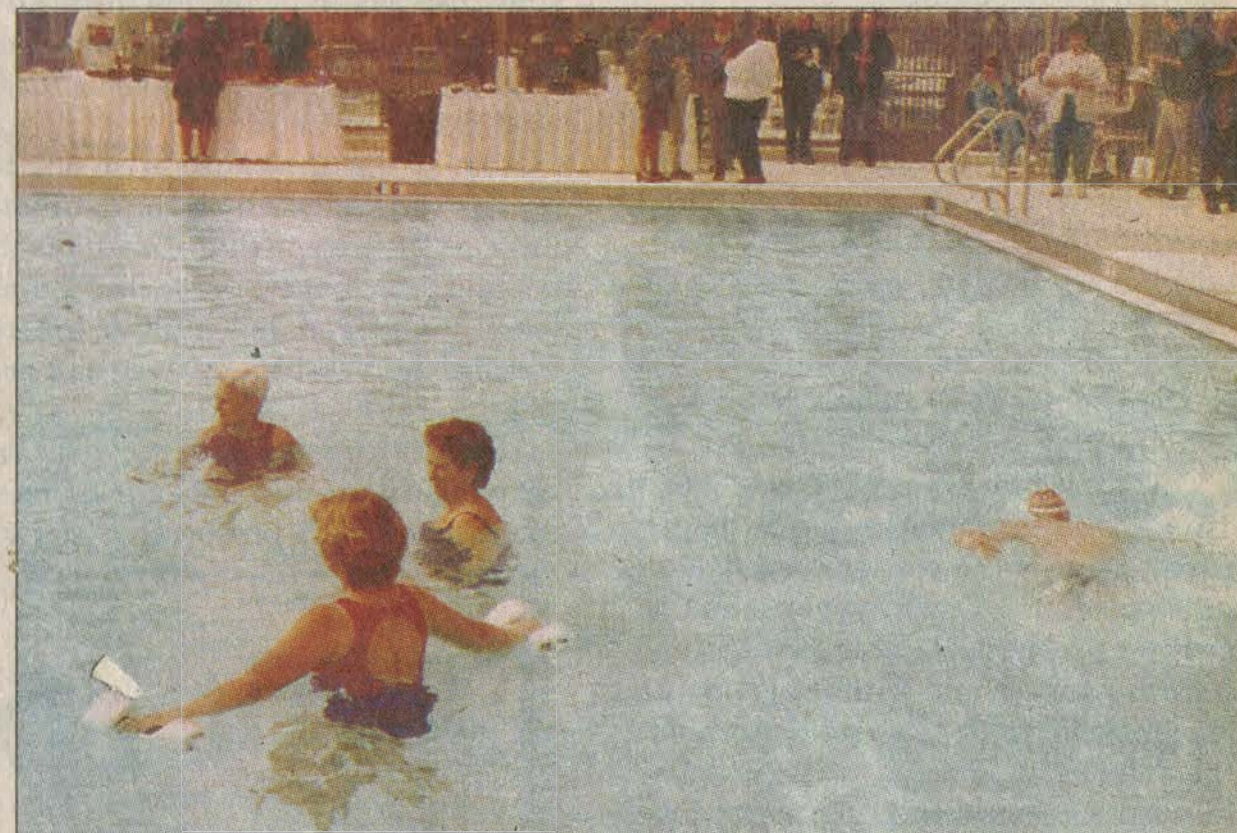
"Once they join, they are taking advantage of it," Ruffi said.

Rapier noted that even though the renovated center will attract tourists and conventions to the park, the facility remains a prime recreation source for Trigg County residents.

Ruffi and Board said residents keep the facility busy.

Several dozen residents and community leaders were on hand for the dedication service and open house. "We're always impressed with the kind of support we get from the local community," Ruffi said.

Sen. Bob Jackson said the fitness center will be an economic development tool for this region. Kentucky's parks, which are celebrating their 75th anniversary next month, are the finest in the nation, Jackson said. "We're blessed in this region with the finest park in the state."

Couple know value of regular checkups

James and Sue Mathis are proof that regular medical checkups can help detect and prevent cancer.

A little more than two years ago, James visited his doctor for a yearly physical examination. PSA tests indicated he might have prostate cancer. A subsequent biopsy revealed cancer and James had surgery in February 1997.

The cancer was detected early enough that James didn't require any extensive treatment. "Thank the Lord I'm clear," he said last week.

"We both just give the praise to the Lord," Sue said.

Last April, just weeks before Trigg County's first American Cancer Society Relay for Life, a routine mammogram revealed a

lump on one of her breasts.

"I didn't realize I had a lump," Sue said.

The lump was a slow-growing cancer that was removed with a partial mastectomy.

"Both of ours were caught early enough" that they didn't need other treatments, Sue said.

"We've really been blessed," she said.

The Cadiz couple still undergo regular checkups to make sure cancer hasn't returned.

"I don't feel like I qualify as a survivor, but I am," Sue said. "I guess mine was just starting."

That's why they encourage everyone to follow the American Cancer Society's recommendations and have yearly exams.

According to the cancer society, the survival rate for early stage

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Examination of prospective jurors important part of trial for defense, prosecution

Question: What is the purpose of voir dire in a criminal trial?**Answer:** Voir dire is a French term meaning "to speak truth."

The voir dire stage in a criminal trial is at the very beginning when lawyers have the opportunity to ask prospective jurors questions in order to determine if the candidate for jury service can sit on a case and render a fair and impartial verdict.

The purpose of the voir dire is to discover whether any of the prospective jurors harbor any preconceived notions or information about the pending case to cause them to be biased to one side or the other. It also gives both the prosecutor and the defense lawyer an opportunity to question prospective jurors about the law. In other words, if jurors have some philosophical problem with accepting the law which will be applied to that case, the lawyers need to know about it in order to have those candidates disqualified.

Actually the voir dire examination for prospective jurors can be handled in various ways. First of all, the lawyers can do all the questioning themselves, or the judge may choose to do all the questioning. In some instances, the judge may ask some questions and have them supplemented by the lawyers. By far the method most used in state courts is to allow the lawyers to do most of the questioning.

There are two types of strikes which the lawyers can make against the jury panel. First is the peremptory strike. A prosecutor or defense lawyer may strike a prospective juror for any reason whatsoever and without giving an explanation. Both the prosecutor and the defense have eight in felony cases; in misdemeanor cases each party has three peremptory strikes. In the event that one or two additional jurors are called for extra long trials, the number of peremptory challenges allowed by each side is increased by one. If more than one defendant is being tried, the court may, in its discretion, allow addi-

tional peremptory challenges to each defendant.

There are restrictions upon the exercise of the peremptory strikes by the prosecutor. For instance, a U.S. Supreme Court case has said that a black person cannot be struck from jury duty with a peremptory strike if the purpose of the strike is to deny a black defendant racial representation on the jury.

Each attorney in a criminal trial has an unlimited number of strikes for cause. If prospective jurors relate certain information which clearly shows that they would be unable to sit and be a fair and impartial juror, "cause" has been shown for that juror to be disqualified from jury service.

Most strikes for cause arise out of pretrial publicity which contaminates a juror to the extent that they have an unchangeable and irreconcilable opinion of the defendant's guilt or innocence based upon what they have read or heard.

The voir dire procedure at trial is very important, but depends more on the candor of the prospective jury than the questions of the lawyers.

Road to subdivision rules may wind way to completion

It's time for Trigg County to put up or shut up on subdivision regulations.

The proposed regulations have been on the table for nearly a year, but Trigg County is no closer to approving the regulations now than it was last year.

That has frustrated Judge-Executive Berlin Moore Jr. And rightfully so.

Members of Trigg Fiscal Court met in a working session March 23 to discuss the subdivision regulations. After nearly three hours of talk, magistrates were at the same place they were several months ago: They agree something must be done, but they can't agree on what that is.

That was the same problem members of the Cadiz-Trigg County Planning Commission had last year when they discussed the proposed regulations.

The document, which was prepared by Craig Morris of the Pennyryle Area Development District, is complex and includes pages of technical language. But it wasn't written for John Q. Public to understand. It was written to give developers a guideline to follow when building subdivision roads and drainage systems.

Roads and drainage were the key issues Moore wanted addressed when he asked Morris to draft subdivision regulations.

Court members agree that the county needs rules governing those issues, but some magistrates and county surveyor

Randle Cruse have expressed concerns that the regulations go too far and would put a costly burden on developers.

In the past year, many questions have been raised first by the planning commission and then by fiscal court:

- Will subdivision regulations hurt development?
- Will costs rise and how much?
- Will Trigg County's staggering growth stop?

Time and again, Moore has stressed that regulations will have an impact on small developers, but he's also stressed that the county needs to look at the bigger picture.

As I've sat through hours and hours of meetings on the regulations, the big picture has come into focus for me. If Trigg County doesn't do something soon, the costly burden is going to be passed along to you and me — the taxpayers of Trigg County.

If you don't think so, just look around.

It's great that Trigg County is growing and more people are moving in. Many of those people are moving here

from larger cities for expensive homes on Lake Barkley.

But growth comes at a price. Even though new homes and new construction are added to the county tax rolls, the people living in those new homes require additional services.

They didn't move to Trigg County to "rough" it. They like our low crime rate and low tax rates, but they want good roads, good schools and good police and fire protection. Money to pay for those services has to come from somewhere.

It doesn't take a genius to look down the financial road and see problems ahead for Trigg Fiscal Court. As Moore has said repeatedly in the past year, the days of lowering the tax rate a tenth of a cent or so each year are coming back to haunt the county.

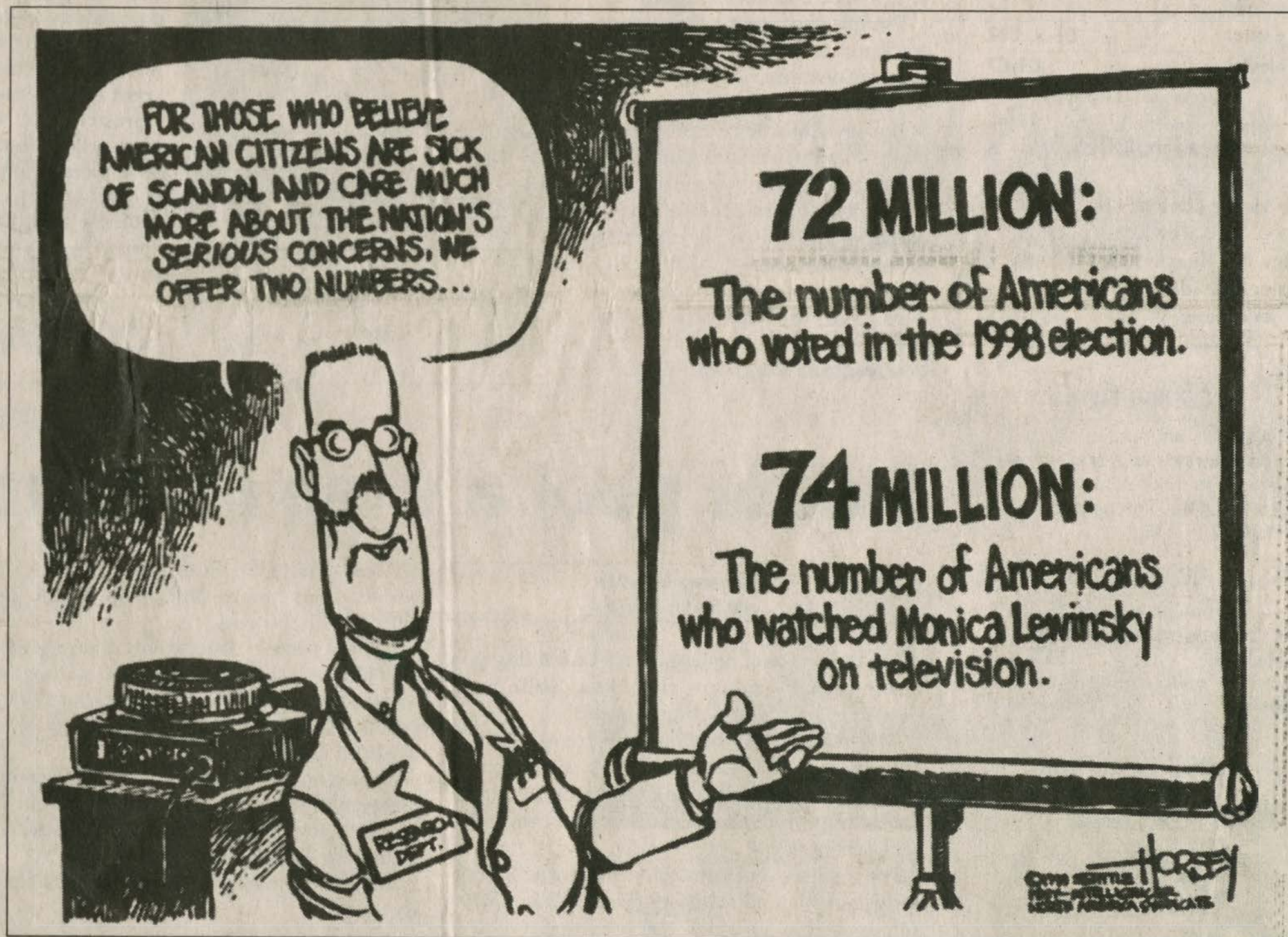
What looks politically right today will be fiscally wrong tomorrow. We're going to wake up one day to the reality of a major tax increase unless something is done.

Who pays for the roads and drainage is the main question the county is trying to address with subdivision regulations.

Either the developers pay on the front end and pass those costs along to homebuyers, or the county pays on the back end and passes those costs along to the taxpayers.

What's it going to be?

Either we'll get an answer soon or the next generation of Trigg County residents will get it later.

Events in Balkans show how Russia has fallen

Former superpower becoming more aware of weakness

The real reason the Russians are stirred up like a hornet's nest by the events in the Balkans is that they realize how low they've fallen. The NATO airstrikes serve as a pointedly graphic demonstration to the Russians that they no longer carry very much more weight than any other European country. Last month three former Warsaw Pact countries joined NATO, and now the last wisps of delusions of Russian superpower status were blown away with Slobodan Milosevic's air defenses.

The situation is exacerbated by the fact that the Russians consider themselves ethnically, culturally and spiritually identical to the Serbs, fellow Slavs. Slavs, as Orthodox Christians,

have long considered themselves Europe's bulwark against Muslim ingression. The Kosovar Albanians are Muslim, the result of over 500 years of Ottoman Turkish occupation (a longer span of years than the period of time since Christopher Columbus first bumped into the Western Hemisphere on his way to the East in 1492).

From the Russian point of view, it is as if Scottish separatists took up arms to drive the English out, and the English reacted with violence, as they well might, to suppress the rebellion. If the Russians wished to halt the conflict militarily, would they proceed without the agreement of the United States? Especially contrary to our vocal opposition?

Hardly. Yet that's what you see when you look out from under that big furry hat with Russian eyes.

Therefore, when Primakov turned his plane around, when Yeltsin pleaded with Clinton on the phone and then in a nationwide address, when they placed themselves on a military footing

as the NATO planes fired up their afterburners, the Russians were showing us just how much this sudden awareness of their loss of status has shaken them.

What's worse, all their saber-rattling will only appear more pathetic when it, too, is ignored. Because Russia will not go to war over this. Not now, when they know they're weak and we're strong. It's that simple, thankfully.

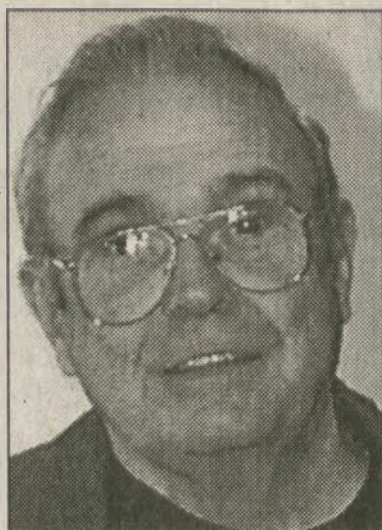
Certainly, some Russians might want to fight, but not the ones in power. Vladimir Zhirnovsky can always find someone to listen to him, but he'll forever be on the outside of the Kremlin, looking in.

If you think about it, we're fallible, too. For instance, some U.S. citizens still believe the Warren Commission's report on the assassination of JFK. But neither country lets the lunatics run the show.

Yet.

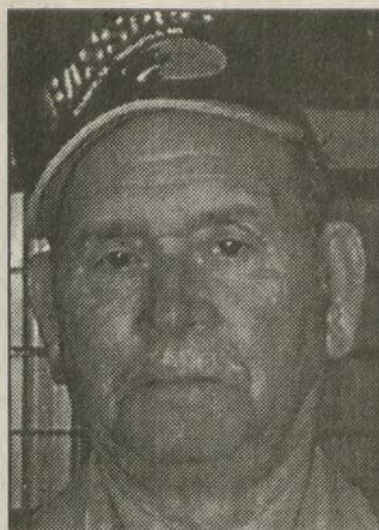

"I don't like it. I feel like we can't police the world. I hate to see the suffering, though. We should arm the Kosovars, I think."



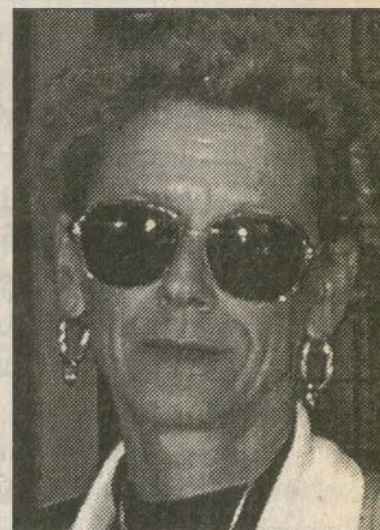

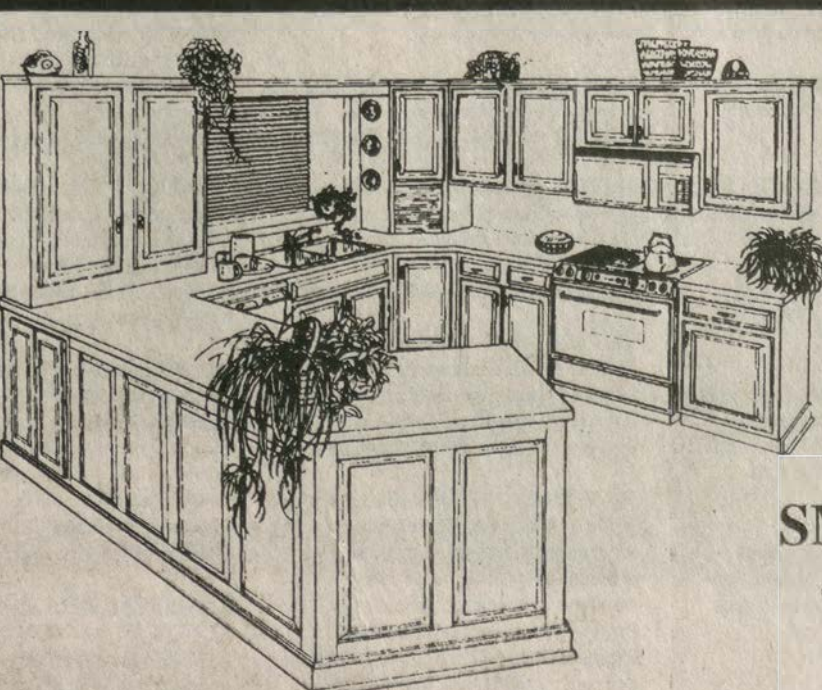

The Bank of Cadiz has decided to close the doors on its community center.

According to bank president Bill Fuller, "we're closing it for community use because it simply wasn't utilized much."

"With most churches having their own community centers now, and with the other new community buildings here in Cadiz, I don't think anybody's going to go lacking for a place to meet."

The facility will close after the

bank shareholders meeting in the middle of April.

"We're having growing pains, and the building will be converted to an archive for record-keeping," said Fuller.

According to Fuller, the only group to use the facility on a regular basis was Alcoholics Anonymous, and the bank suffered financial losses keeping the center open.

"It's just not feasible for us to provide it," he said.

Whitfield continues push for lock project

"While the president's budget proposal shows the Administration has finally recognized this project to some degree, his request is inadequate and comes nowhere near achieving the critical mission of keeping construction on schedule," Whitfield said. "The \$15 million I am requesting will allow the Corps of Engineers to meet their construction needs for the year."

Whitfield said keeping the project on schedule would save a billion dollars in job losses, higher transportation costs, and cost

overruns of the project itself. Last year, he secured \$8.5 million after the president "zero-funded" the project.

In 1997, Whitfield obtained \$4 million, more than double what the president and the Senate had requested.

Whitfield also pointed out an array of economic benefits the new lock would provide.

"For every dollar spent on the new Kentucky Lock, we get back \$2.50 in benefits in the form of new jobs, lower transportation costs and lower costs to con-

sumers," he said.

"More than 34 million tons of goods, valued at \$6.6 billion pass through Kentucky Lock each year and more than \$1.2 billion of that came from the First District," Whitfield said.

"That is why I continue the work to keep the Kentucky Lock project on schedule, to improve the flow of our goods to other markets and to protect the thousands of Kentucky jobs this river traffic makes possible."

The Barkley Lake Water District hereby gives notice of a di(2-ethylhexyl) phthalate maximum contaminant level violation during the reporting period of August 98. A di(2-ethylhexyl) phthalate violation occurs when a public water system reports a sample above the maximum contaminant level of 0.006 mg/l. The Barkley Lake Water supply has a result of 0.01. This notice is being published in accordance with Kentucky Public and Semipublic Water Supplies Regulation 401 KAR 8:070).

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that di(2-ethylhexyl) phthalate is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. Di(2-ethylhexyl)phthalate is a widely used plasticizer, which is primarily used in the production of polyvinyl chloride (PVC) resins. It may get into drinking water after improper waste disposal. This chemical has been shown to cause cancer in laboratory animals such as rats and mice exposed to high levels over their lifetimes. EPA has set the drinking water standard for di(2-ethylhexyl)phthalate at 0.006 parts per million (ppm) to reduce the risk of cancer or other adverse health effects which have observed in laboratory animals. Drinking water which meets the EPA standard is associated with little to none of this risk and should be considered safe with respect to di(2-ethylhexyl)phthalate.

Historic Moments

Visit by Civil War re-enactors lifts spirits of ailing Trigg man

*I met some men the other day
Giants wearing Rebel gray
They came in answer to a call
Southern Gentlemen one and all*

While cannon blasts shook West Cadiz Park, the most moving part of the recent Trigg County Civil War Days occurred on Donaldson Creek Road.

That's where about 15 re-enactors put on a Civil War display for Clay Jones, who is suffering from lung cancer.

Jones, 71, is a Civil War historian and has an extensive library on the subject, according to his son, Robert. But he was not physically able to attend Civil War Days on March 19-21.

Robert and a sister, Beverly Penland, decided to ask a couple of the re-enactors if they'd visit the family home. They were surprised when a whole convoy of re-enactors joined the trip.

When the vehicles began pulling into the driveway, Clay Jones told his wife, Nancy, that he wasn't feeling well enough to see that many visitors. But Robert said his father's eyes lighted up and a huge smile crossed his face when he saw the Confederate unit approaching the house.

As Clay Jones sat in a wheelchair on the porch, the Confederate unit fired three volleys before marching in formation.

The drum roll echo'd cross the hill

*It was as if time stood still
And gravel crunched under
boot shod heel*

Sunlight gleamed off Springfield steel

"You could close your eyes and go back 150 years," Robert said. "It was really dramatic."

The display was moving for both the Jones family and the re-enactors. "The boost it gave my dad was miraculous," Robert said.

In the hours and days after the visit, Clay Jones' spirits were lifted to the point he was calling friends and writing letters.

To show their gratitude, the Jones family made two special presentations to re-enactors.

During the memorial service held on March 21 as part of Civil War Days, Robert Jones presented the unit with a Confederate flag from South Carolina. His father is a member of the Sons of Confederate Veterans in Aiken, S.C.

Jones also presented a Masonic pin to Miles Ryon Ward, son of Robert Ward, the captain of the Confederate unit. When the re-enactors visited the Jones home,

Clay Jones noticed that Ward was a Mason. In the course of the conversation, Ward said that his son was preparing to become a Master Mason. That's when Clay Jones decided to honor him with the pin.

"Those guys were wonderful for what they did for him," Robert said.

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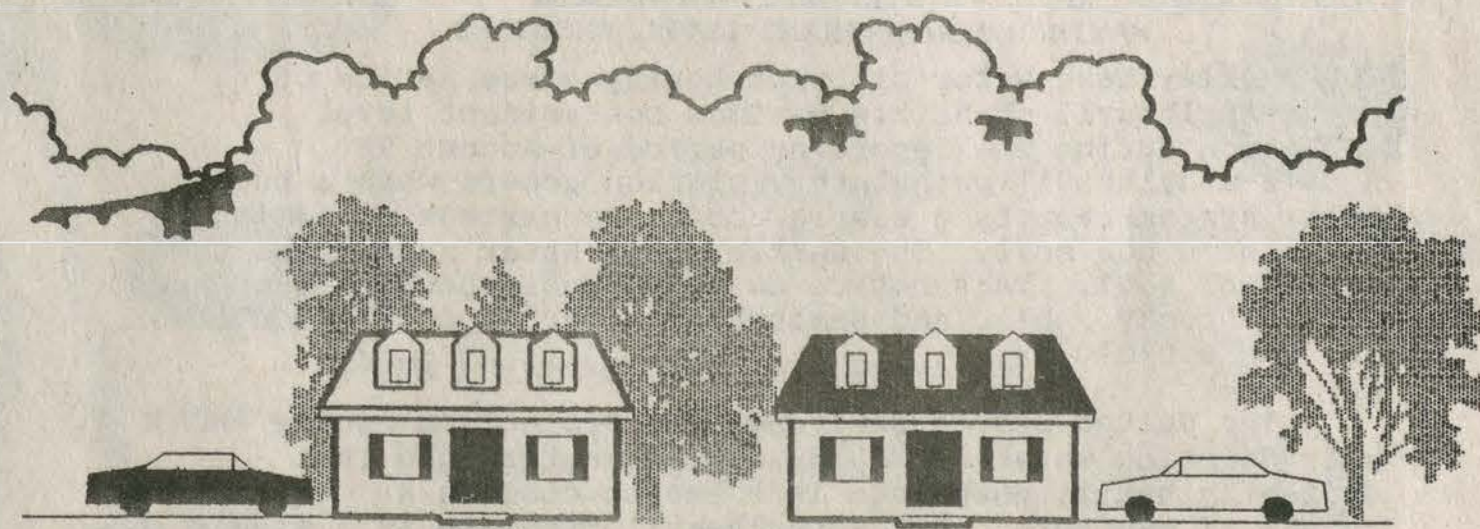
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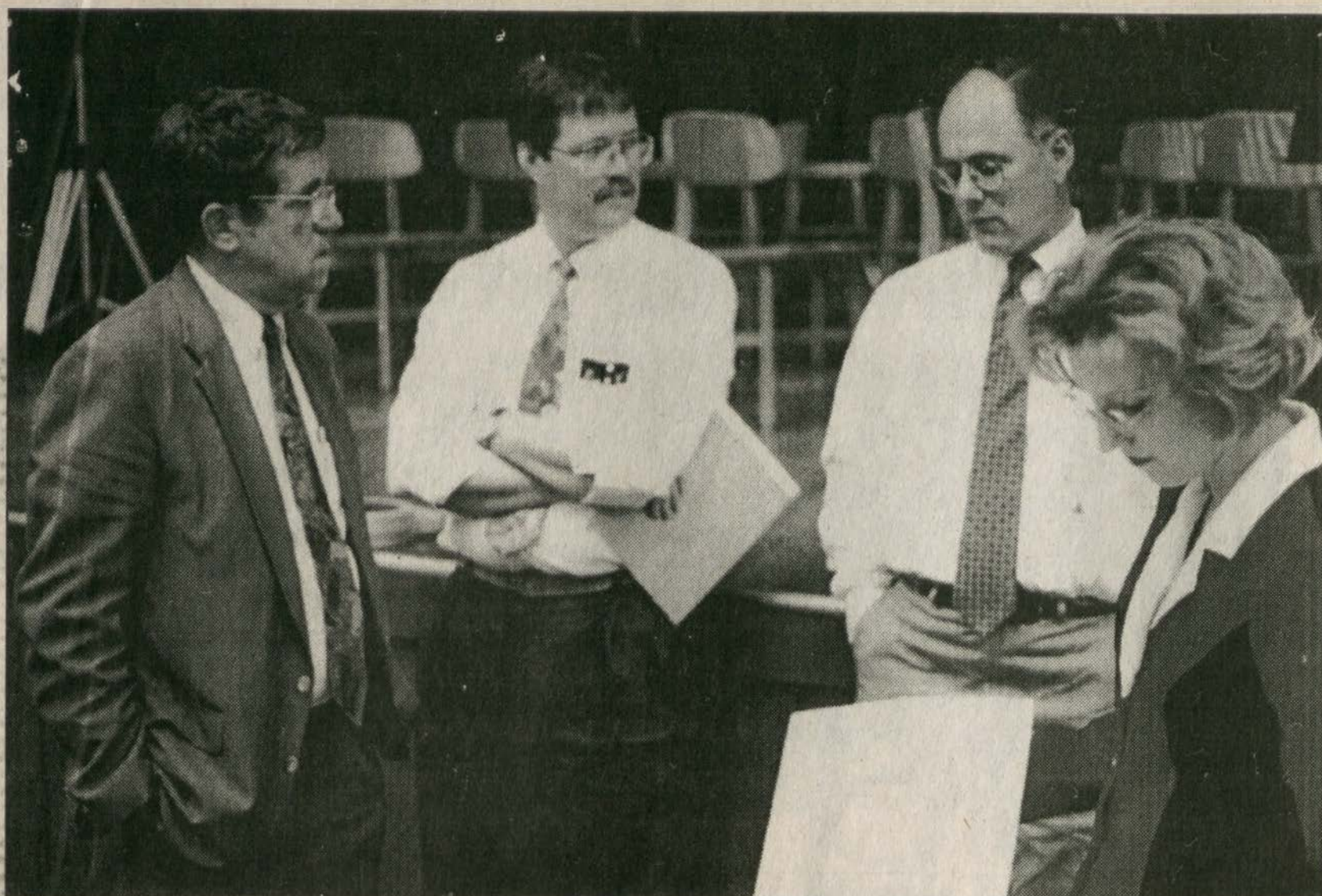

Bids: Trigg school project attracts 'good participation'

The last pre-bid estimate from Alliance projected the construction costs at more than \$10.1 million.

"I really think we hit a good window with the bidding climate," said Alliance's Tommy Gumm.

The project was bid in 26 packages from plumbing, masonry, steel work and electrical to bleachers, doors, flooring and lockers.

The project attracted "good participation" from contractors in the area, Gumm said.

For example, seven contractors bid on the plumbing/HVAC package, eight on electrical work, seven on demolition, six on excavation, five on masonry, four on steel, seven on roofing and six on doors/hardware.

"We had a lot of participation ... and got some excellent competitive bids," Wallace said.

After the bid opening, Alliance and Community Tectonics, the project architect, planned to review the bids and make a recommendation to the school board Tuesday night.

If the board approves the bids,

the next step will be to sell about \$9 million in bonds to finance the project. The bond sale should be complete in 30 days.

Full construction should begin by June 1, Gumm said. Alliance will work with school officials to schedule some work around the school calendar, he said.

Most of the utility relocation, demolition and excavation should be completed during the summer months, Gumm said.

"Things could start moving pretty fast," Wallace said.

breast cancer is more than 90 percent. And the group says all women 40 and older should have an annual mammogram.

Early detection of prostate cancer also is important and the risk increases rapidly after age 50, the cancer society says. Prostate cancer is the second leading cause of

cancer death in men. More than 80 percent of all prostate cancers are diagnosed in men over 65.

"We feel fortunate and blessed," Sue said.

She also realizes that prayer and support of others are important. "I think prayer has a whole lot to do with the outcome, too," she said. "Prayer does change things."

They are looking forward to participating in the survivor lap at this year's Relay for Life, which is scheduled for May 14-15 at Trigg County High School's Perdue Field.

Last year's event "was great," James said, commending Chairwoman Karen Clement and the relay committee for their efforts.

Register online

Millions of young men between 18 and 25 have an easier way to fulfill a civic and legal responsibility. They can register with the Selective Service System using the Internet.

"This is real, interactive, online registration," noted Gil Coronado, director of Selective Service. "For nearly two decades men have gone to post offices, completed and mailed a registration form and waited 60 to 90 days to receive an acknowledgment card from us. A man can still register by mail, but now there is a better way. If he has a valid Social Security number, he simply connects to the Selective service Web Site at <<http://www.ss.gov>>, which links him to the agency's computers. He clicks on the 'Register Now' icon, types in his registration information, clicks on the 'Submit' button which appears on the screen and instantly receives his Selective Service number. Additionally, he receives a formal acknowledgment postcard in the mail within two weeks." The agency hopes that registration via the Internet becomes the primary way of registering, Coronado notes. The system will accept online registrations between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. weekdays.

Federal law requires virtually all men to register with Selective Service within 30 days of turning 18. About 1.8 million men are required to register each year. Failure to register is a felony. Registration is linked to many federal and state benefits.

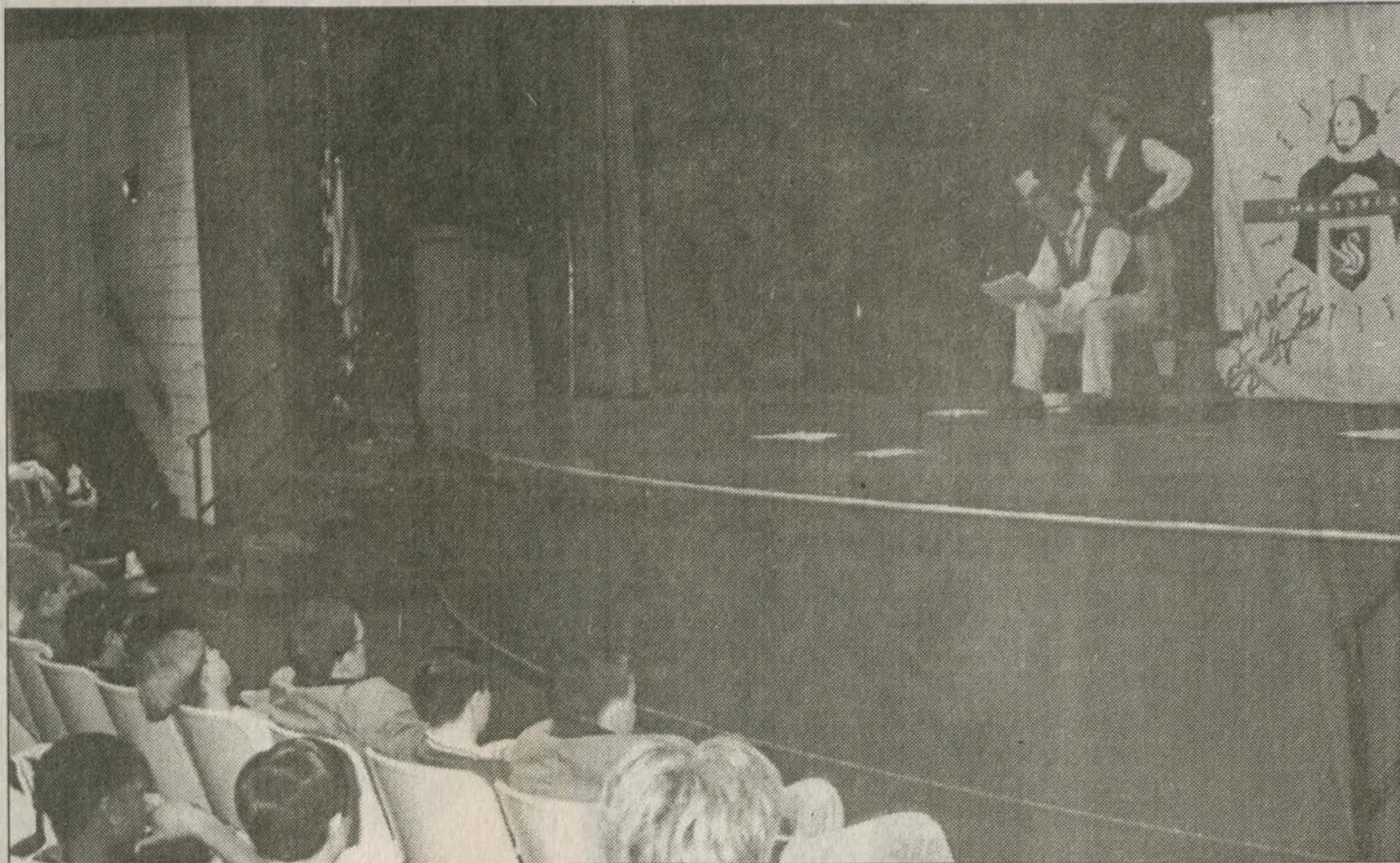

Child-support collections in state top \$198 million, report says

Child-support collections in Kentucky exceeded \$198 million in federal fiscal year 1998, according to a report from the state Cabinet for Families and Children.

Total collections rose 12.8 percent during the year ending Sept.

30, \$22 million more than the previous year, according to the report from the Cabinet's division of Child Support. Money collected by the division goes directly to the custodial parent in nonwelfare cases; in cases in which the custodial parent receives welfare, the money is used to reimburse the

federal and state governments for the welfare payments they made.

Nonwelfare collections have increased by 41.8 percent over the last three years, more than \$60 million. Welfare collections over the same period have remained constant despite a 29.2 percent drop in the welfare caseload. The division

recovered 27.8 percent of the regular welfare benefits paid to families through child-support collections during federal fiscal year 1998.

Improvements in Kentucky's New-Hire Reporting Program resulted in a 24.3 percent increase in the number of new hires reported in 1998.

Some dogs at greater risk of Blastomycosis

female dogs may have a better survival rate with therapy, they are more likely to suffer relapses than males.

Dogs usually acquire blastomycosis by inhaling the spores from the soil into the lungs, where it induces a self-limiting pulmonary infection. Direct inoculation of the spores into the skin through puncture wounds may cause local cutaneous (of or on the skin) infection. By far the most common form of blastomycosis seen by veterinarians is the generalized or disseminated (scattered) form, which spreads via the bloodstream or lymphatic (gland) system from the lungs to involve the eyes, brain, bone, lymph nodes, urogenital system,

skin and subskin tissues.

The clinical signs of blastomycosis may vary with the target organs affected and may include one or all of the following: anorexia, depression, weight loss, fever of 103 degrees or higher that doesn't respond to antibiotics, coughing, shortness of breath, exercise intolerance, enlarged lymph nodes, eye disease or skin lesions that drain bloody or purulent (pus-like) material.

About 65 percent of dogs diagnosed with blastomycosis do survive. Because the treatment is long, complicated and expensive, with potentially serious side effects, some owners elect to euthanize affected pets. In treated dogs, survival rates are approximately 85 percent, with up to 25 percent suffering relapses. Dogs with brain or eye involvement have a worse prognosis, and dogs with poor liver or kidney function may not be able to tolerate the necessary medications that must be metabolized by these organs. If an eye is involved,

it usually must be removed since eyes do not respond well to therapy and serve as a source of infection. Blastomycosis is not generally considered a zoonotic disease, which means one that is potentially contagious to people.

If you have a pet with this infection, it indicates that you may be at risk for contracting the disease through a common environmental source such as contaminated soil near a waterway. Since it is the mold form that releases infective spores through the air, you cannot get blastomycosis from the air around you pet, who is infected with the yeast form of the fungus.

Recent studies indicate some risk of exposure through penetrating wounds with sharp, contaminated objects such as sharp sticks or a dog bite. Good safety and hygiene precautions are indicated. Needless to say, persons with deficient immune systems should not be handling infected pets.

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Hyacinths are like little jewels blooming alone

More than half a century has passed, and yet each spring, when I wander into the primrose wood and see the pale yellow blooms, and smell their sweetest of scents,....for a moment I am 7-years-old again and wandering in the fragrant wood.

— Gertrude Jekyll

The thing I love most about spring is the surprises. This week my little dwarf irises have started blooming. In front of the foundation shrubs are the tiniest irises with large blooms of yellow and dark purple. There are other colors which will bloom soon, but these are the first. Then there are the hyacinths, white and pink so far. They are like little jewels blooming all alone.

The dwarf irises were a gift from Alice Propst who lives in Grays Acres, down near Rockcastle. In fact, she lives across the

bay from old Rockcastle. She would be directly across from Doc Gray's old general store if it were still standing. Not too many of us remember old Rockcastle and Doc Gray's store. Alice has a whole hillside made into a rock garden. She has all dwarf irises in every color. They should be in full bloom soon and are a rare sight. She brought me three different varieties of the dwarf irises and they are different heights. It seems so strange to see that tiny plant have the large blooms. She also brought me some wild iris, and they are just beautiful, like little orchids.

I suggest that you drive down Solomon Drive and look for Alice's house with all the beautiful plants.

The hyacinths that are so nice this year are the result of a little extra care. If you just plant hyacinth bulbs and leave them in the soil, after a few years they end up spindly ugly blooms. To have those large fluffy blooms, you need only to follow some simple steps.

First, when planting hyacinths, remember that they prefer very light sandy soil which drains easily. They root deeply and so the bed should be cultivated deeply. You can't expect them to thrive in clay. Break up the soil where you plan to plant them and add well-rotted cow manure, some sand and some wood ashes if possible. Apply bone meal and other fertilizers and some compost, if

available. Plant at least 4 to 6 inches deep (three times their diameter) and in a sunny location. Plant them in September or early October. Now here is the secret of beautiful hyacinths. Lift them each year after the foliage ripens and store them in a cool, dry place until ready to plant them again. That may sound like a lot of trouble but it is well worth it. I usually put the dry bulbs in a paper sack and set them on a dry shelf in the basement.

I had some moles two or three years ago that about put me out of the hyacinth business. The little voles just seem to relish them. And they're gone before you notice a mole run, it seems.

Now is your last chance to safely and easily plant dormant roses, grapes, hedges and evergreens. Whether you're moving old plants or planting new ones,

be sure not to let the roots dry out in this March wind. I have a friend who temporarily covers any plants she is moving with old leaves piled high.

This is a good time to check your garden mulch for mildew. Pull some away from plants in a few locations. If you find mold or mildew, promptly (right now!) get rid of that mulch. Burning it is preferable. It might or might not live in compost. It surely will kill some plants. I lost a beautiful, expensive tall garden phlox last year from deep mulching and mold that was underneath the mulch.

I have a hint for those brave souls who get rid of the weeds in the flower beds by giving them a spritz of Roundup. I am very careful to do this on a very still, sunny day and just barely hit the center of the weed. Well, a friend goes one better. She holds

the cardboard from a roll of toilet paper to the end of the sprayer and thus avoids spraying nearby plants. So simple. I find that no matter how deeply I hoe up the roots they come back, but with weed killer, they are gone for good.

One thing the successful amateur gardener must learn is when to be in a hurry and when to restrain himself. With the first warm days of March and early April, it is such a temptation to remove all the old mulch. Someone has said that when you think it's time to uncover all your plants, it's the time to take a short vacation and do it when you come back.

Then, too, you have to mix all suggestions in this column with brains. Some springs are dry and early and some not. A good rule is to suit the work to the weather. Have a good gardening week!

Follow these tips when using products with toxic chemicals

Recognizing that most individuals will continue to use some home and garden products containing toxic chemicals, the following suggestions are provided to limit exposure and reduce the potential for accidents.

Keep products in their original containers: Over the years, some manufacturers have altered the ingredients. In the event of a poisoning, the product label can give a clue to the product's age and contents. Never place toxics in containers associated with food and drink. Kerosene and other petroleum products stored in soda bottles and tin cans have resulted in many accidental poisonings.

Avoid use of aerosols when possible: Breathing the fine mist can cause it to settle deep in the lungs and be quickly absorbed in the bloodstream. Aerosol cans have an explosive quality and should never be placed in sunlight, near a stove, in a glove compartment, or in a fire.

Keep products out of reach of children or pets: Most accidents occur when a

product is left unattended. Keep all toxics in locked cabinets or on high shelves. Don't store near food.

"Clean up" after using toxics: Carefully seal products when you are through using them. Some open products evaporate quickly and can pollute the air. Rags containing flammables (e.g. furniture stripper, paint remover etc.) are fire hazards.

Dispose of them in covered metal containers. This prevents oxygen from reaching the rags and igniting.

Wear protective clothing: This prevents chemicals from entering the bloodstream through skin absorption. It is best not to wear contact lenses when working around solvents as the fumes can become trapped between the lens and the eye, causing irritation or damage.

Never mix products: Some products contain toxic

chemicals that create intense heat and/or toxic fumes when mixed with other products. A common example involves the mixing of chlorine bleach with ammonia. Together they emit toxic chloramine fumes. Never mix different brands of the same product. Each brand may have different ingredients.

Choose products with child resistant caps: Following the introduction of child resistant caps in 1972, the number of children's deaths involving aspirin products alone declined

43.5 percent the first year.

Use only recommended amount: Twice as much does not mean twice as effective and can cause more harm than good.

If pregnant, avoid toxic chemical exposure as much as possible: Many chemicals in household products have not been tested for their effect on unborn children.

Buy only what you need: Some products require using only small amounts to

achieve effectiveness. Buying the "economy size" may leave you with unwanted portions and a disposal problem.

Beware of product antidotes: Some products (especially older ones) may give first aid advice that is potentially harmful. Always call a medical professional or the Poison Control Center for advice.

Easter: Post-church brunch may be perfect recipe

An entertaining idea for Easter may include a post-church brunch. It would be a unique opportunity to celebrate the beginning of spring and the Easter season, while sharing the championship of family neighbors and friends.

A potted Easter lily is a perfect centerpiece for the table. Its beauty is simple and understated. Crisp spring colors, such as yellows, peaches, pale greens or pastels for placemats or tablecloths provide a refreshing lift after the cold, rainy weather.

Flavored coffees have been a big hit with many people and are so easy to prepare. For those that can't indulge in caffeine, fruit drinks are a tasty substitute.

Several of the recipes may be made the night before to help alleviate the last-minute rush.

Bacon and Double Cheese Quiche Crust

1 1/3 c. all-purpose flour
1/8 t. salt
1/2 c. (1 stick) chilled butter, cut into small pieces
2-3 T. cold water

Filling

10 strips lean bacon
4 lg. eggs
1 1/2 c. light cream
1/4 t. dried thyme
1/8 t. white pepper
1/2 c. (2 oz.) shredded Gruyere cheese
1/2 c. shredded cheddar cheese

To prepare the crust, in a large bowl, mix together the flour and salt. Using a pastry blender or two knives, cut in the butter until coarse crumbs form. Add water, 1 tablespoon at a time, tossing with a fork until a dough forms. Shape into a disk, wrap in plastic wrap, and chill in refrigerator for 30 minutes. Preheat oven to 375 degrees. On a lightly floured surface, using a lightly floured rolling pin, roll the dough into an 11-inch circle. Fit into a 9-inch pie pan. Trim edge, leaving 1/4-inch overhang. Fold under to form standup edge. Prick dough with a fork. Line with foil and fill with pie weights or dried beans. Bake 10 minutes. Remove the foil and weights. Bake until lightly golden, about 5 minutes. Transfer to wire rack to cool. In a medium skillet, cook the bacon over medium heat until crisp, 8 to 10 minutes. Transfer to a paper towel to drain. In a small bowl, whisk together the eggs, cream, thyme and pepper. Pour into crust. Crumble bacon. Sprinkle the egg mixture with the bacon and cheeses. Bake until golden and custard is set, about 30 minutes. Serve warm. To freeze, cook baked quiche completely, wrap airtight and freeze for up to one month.

Oven Denver Omelet

8 eggs
1/2 c. Half-and-Half cream
1 c. (4 ounces) shredded cheddar cheese
1 c. finely chopped, fully cooked ham
1/4 c. finely chopped green pepper
1/4 c. finely chopped onion.
In a bowl, beat the eggs and cream until light and fluffy. Stir in the cheese, ham, green pepper and onion. Pour into a 9-inch, square baking dish. Bake at 400 degrees for 25 minutes or until golden brown. Yield 4-6 servings.

Baked Cinnamon French Toast

12 slices cinnamon bread, divided
1/4 c. butter or margarine, softened
9 eggs
1 qt. milk
2 c. whipping cream
1 c. sugar
4 1/2 t. vanilla extract
Warmed blackberry preserves, optional
Whipped cream, optional

Line the bottom of a greased 13x9x2-inch baking dish with six slices of bread. Butter remaining bread; place with butter side up over bread in pan. In a mixing bowl, beat eggs. Add milk, cream, sugar and vanilla; mix well. Pour over bread; let stand for 15 minutes. Place the dish in a larger baking pan. Pour boiling water into larger pan to depth of 1 inch. Bake, uncovered at 375 degrees for 40 minutes or until a knife inserted near the center comes out clean. Let stand for 10 minutes before serving. Top with preserves and whipped cream if desired. Yield 6 servings.

Country Brunch Skillet

6 bacon strips
6 c. frozen cubed hash brown potatoes
3/4 c. chopped green pepper
1/2 c. chopped onion
1 t. salt
1/4 t. pepper
6 eggs
1/2 c. shredded cheddar cheese
In a large skillet over medium heat; cook bacon until crisp. Remove bacon; crumble and set aside. Drain, reserving 2 tablespoons of drippings. Add potatoes, green pepper, onion, salt and pepper to drippings; cook and stir for 2 minutes. Cover and cook, stirring occasionally, until potatoes are browned and tender, about 15 minutes. Make six wells in the potato mixture; break one egg into each well. Cover and cook on low heat for 8-10 minutes or until eggs are completely set. Sprinkle with cheese and bacon. Serves 8.

Almond Streusel Cake

Streusel
1 c. firmly packed light brown sugar
1 c. sliced almonds
1/4 c. all-purpose flour
3 T. melted margarine
1 t. grated orange zest
Cake
1/2 c. (1 stick) softened margarine
1/2 c. granulated sugar
3 lg. eggs
1 t. grated orange zest
1/2 t. vanilla extract
2 c. all-purpose flour
1 t. baking powder
1 t. baking soda

2/3 c. orange juice
Glaze
1/2 c. confectioners' sugar
2 1/2 t. orange juice

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a 9-10-inch tube pan. To prepare the streusel, mix together brown sugar, nuts and flour in a medium bowl. Stir in butter and zest. To prepare cake, in a large bowl, using an electric mixer set on medium speed, beat together butter and sugar until fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat in zest and vanilla. In a large bowl, mix together the flour, baking powder and baking soda. Reduce mixer speed to low. Alternately beat flour mixture and orange juice into egg mixture, beginning and ending with flour. Spoon half of the batter into prepared pan. Sprinkle with half of the streusel. Top with the remaining batter and streusel. Bake until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean, 30 to 35 minutes. Transfer pan to a wire rack to cool completely. To prepare the glaze, in a cup, stir together confectioners' sugar and orange juice until smooth. Turn the cake out onto a serving plate, placing it right-side up. Drizzle with the glaze. Serves 16.

Blueberry Fruit Salad

20 oz. can pineapple chunks
15 1/4 oz. can sliced peaches
4 c. fresh or frozen blueberries
3 medium firm bananas, sliced
1 c. halved green grapes
1 c. sliced fresh strawberries
3.4 oz. pkg. instant vanilla pudding mix
3 T. powdered orange drink

Drain pineapple and peaches, reserving juices; set aside. Combine the fruit in a large bowl. In another bowl, combine fruit juices with pudding and drink mix; mix well. Pour over fruit and toss to coat. Yield 20-24 servings.

Golden Smoothies

1 1/2 c. orange juice
8 oz. carton peach yogurt
5 1/2 oz.. can of apricot nectar
1 t. honey
orange slices and maraschino cherries, optional
Place the first four ingredients in a blender; cover and process until smooth. Pour into glasses. Garnish with oranges and cherries if desired. Yield: 3 cups.

The hospital's Health Express will be offering blood pressure checks, pulse, cholesterol and triglyceride screenings at its stops during the month of April.

Under most circumstances, cholesterol and triglyceride levels should be checked every five years. Only patrons who present a written prescription from their physician will be screened more often.

The cholesterol (HDL/LDL) and triglyceride screening requires a food fast (water only) for 14 hours. There is no charge for this screening.

A stool for Occult Blood Screening Kit is also available for \$4. This screening detects blood in the stool.

These screenings are offered to detect disease in its earliest stages when there are no symptoms of disease. If you are experiencing symptoms, you should see your physician.

Interest rates influence stock market

Interest rates have a direct and long-term effect on the stock market. An extended period of lower or flattening rates is a positive sign for stock prices.

We have seen this principal at work in stock prices over the past several years; the Dow has gone up and up and up.

Lower rates have been achieved in part by the work of the Federal Reserve. Achieving and maintaining lower interest rates has been a major goal of the Federal Reserve for several years.

Interest rates and the markets:

The Fed has a number of mechanisms to influence short-term interest rates. But long-term interest rates have a life of their own, and the Fed have no direct power to adjust them.

Of course, there is not just one interest rate, but many rates, short-term, intermediate and long term. In general, interest rates move as a flock, either up or down. In a free market, these rates are affected by supply

and demand.

One key factor affecting long-term interest rates is inflation. A projected inflation rate is built into calculations for long-term interest rates. Fear of inflation has kept long-term rates from falling further.

The decline of both long and short-term interest rates has been a major factor in driving the stock market over the past 36 months. Falling interest rates have driven down the return on fixed income investments. Retirees who depend on long-term bonds, fixed income from annuity investments or set incomes from pension funds have been particularly affected.

The yield on short-term investments is now at the lowest point in two decades. The result is that income-oriented investors may decide that when you compare the return of stocks to bonds, the most suitable alternative may be stocks.

But, more conservative investors have been weighing down their portfolios with bonds.

The current market of low interest rates and low inflation provides an intriguing environment, but some analysts think that stocks will continue to do well despite the

recent correction.

Additionally, the securities and bond markets have been bolstered by consumers' continuing tendency to open or add to mutual fund accounts as well as their core savings plans, including Individual Retirement Accounts and employer-sponsored contributory plans such as 401(k)s.

The near term look: Recent figures for the producer price index suggest that inflation is under control. So, we believe that it's possible that interest rates may remain at current levels for the foreseeable future.

Most economists predict a modest, though steady, period of economic growth. However, low interest rates will not be enough to sustain an economic boom. Corporate and personal debt remain high. This, plus the continued downsizing of corporate America, may make consumers nervous over the next few years. We believe both of these factors will tend to dampen the recovery and sustain a longer-term growth picture, replete with steady interest rates and low to no inflation.

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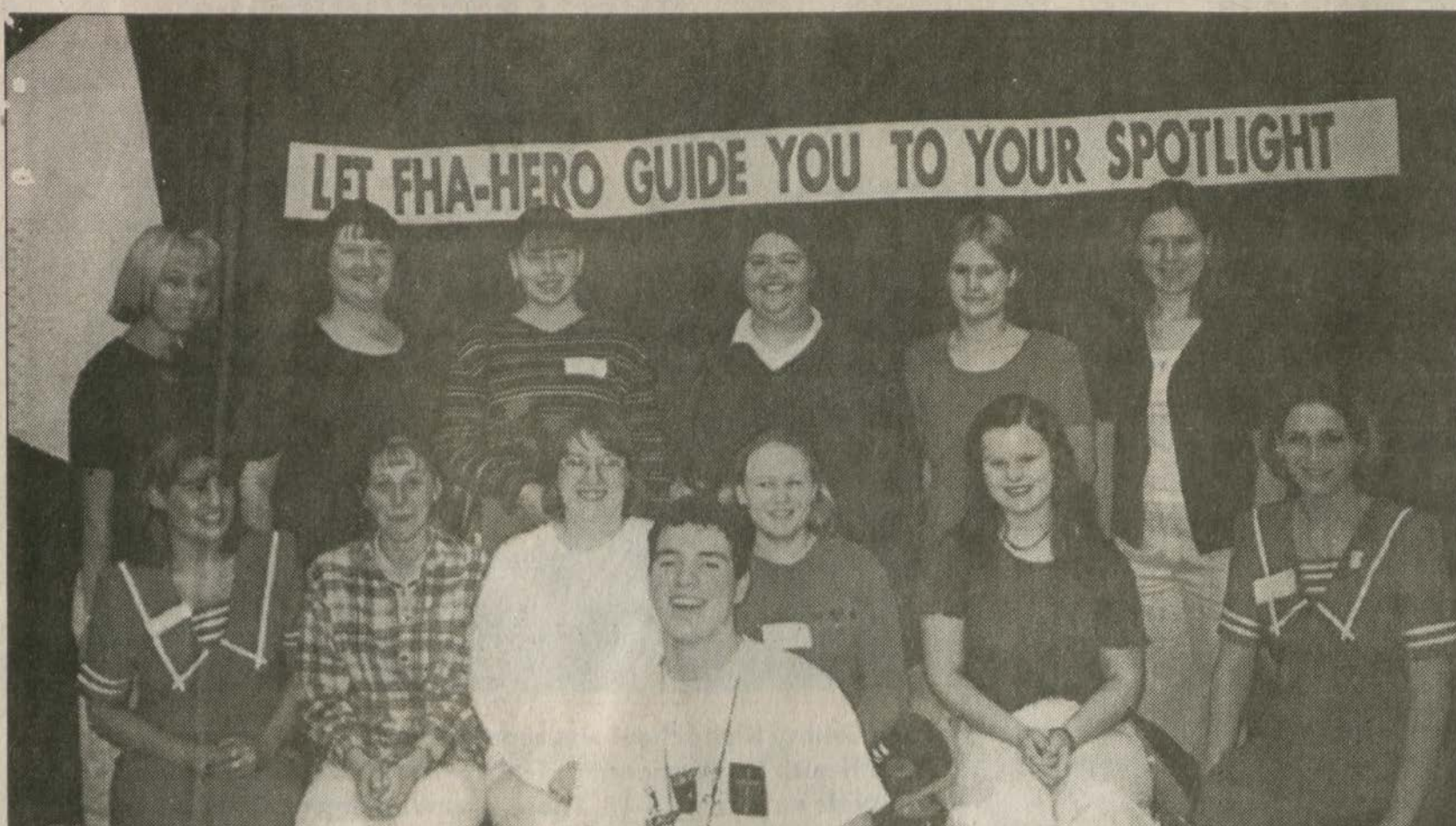

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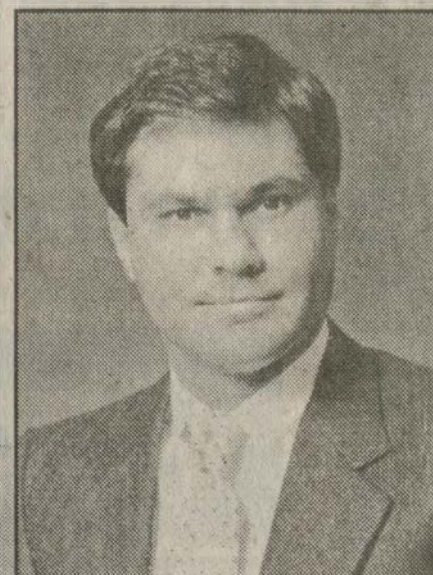

"We hit the ball fine. We just gave up too many easy runs.

Jerry Ethridge, Josh Humphries and Blane Ford all had two hits for the Wildcats.

"We climbed back in it in the fifth inning, and I'm real happy with that. But we gave up two unearned runs in the first and continued to make error after effort. I probably used 17 or 18 kids in that first game."

"I do want to mention the freshmen, however. The rally we enjoyed late in the game was due to their effort. When I put them in, they really played hard to pull us back into it," Smith added.

The coach described the second game against the Suns as "more of the same."

"Hitting wise, we were pretty decent through the lineup. It was 10 to 10 going into the seventh inning,"

Outdoors: All-terrain vehicles not permitted on KDFWR public lands

Officials with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR) remind the public that all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) are not permitted on public lands owned or managed by the agency.

State law defines an "all-terrain vehicle" as "any motor vehicle used for recreational off-road use."

Kentucky Revised Statute 189.515 further specifies:

- No person shall operate an all-terrain vehicle upon any public highway or upon the right-of-way of any public highway or roadway.
- No person shall operate an all-terrain vehicle on any public or private property without the consent of the landowner.

Roads on public lands owned or managed by the KDFWR are public roads. Therefore, ATVs are not permitted on these roads.

In addition, KDFWR regulations do not permit vehicles to be used off-roads on public wildlife management areas.

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Hunting: Notch and Call introduced to provided quick, easy reporting to KDFWR

"Notch and Call" is a catch phrase that means when a hunter kills a deer or turkey this fall they must notch or cut out the appropriate information on their permit and then call 1-877-CHK GAME to report their harvest to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

The Fish and Wildlife Commission approved the notch-and-call procedure with two actions at the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources Commission meeting in February.

Beginning this year, hunters are required to notch or cut out the information on their deer tags, instead of marking it with pen or pencil, before moving their deer.

The new procedure will keep dishonest hunters from attempting to reuse a tag by erasing the information.

The commission also voted to change to the telecheck phone system as the only way to check in deer during the 1999 deer hunting seasons.

The system will also be used to check in turkeys beginning with the 1999 fall season.

The telecheck phone system was introduced to deer hunters last year as an option to walk-in check stations.

With electronic check-in hunters can call a toll free number from anywhere and check in deer over the phone.

Wildlife Division director Roy Grimes says the electronic system, called telecheck, increases efficiency and accuracy of hunter data.

"The telecheck system is more convenient for the hunter, cuts down on human errors found in the old system and, due to a special security feature, gives law enforcement officers a better way to catch poachers," says Grimes.

telecheck is an over-the-phone system for recording deer and turkey harvest.

The service is toll-free and is available 24 hours a day with infinite phone lines.

When a hunter calls, they are asked a series of questions. After each question, the hunter is asked to verify their answer.

This keeps errors out of the system.

After answering all the questions the hunter is given a unique validation number for their harvested deer.

When a law enforcement officer checks a hunter the number can be used to determine if the deer or turkey in front of them is actually the one that was checked in over the phone.

A hunter has until 9 a.m. the morning after taking a deer or turkey to check it in.

This makes it very easy for law enforcement officers to follow up on a check.

"The purpose of our deer harvest reporting requirement is to gather accurate and timely information to manage the states deer resource," says Grimes.

"When you compare the old walk-in check system with telecheck, the telecheck system is obviously the better of the two.

"Last year, both systems were used. The walk-in system reported thousands of errors. Of 25,000 deer checked in through telecheck there was not one error."

Of course, people have expressed concerns over going to the electronic system exclusively. Some fear telecheck promotes deer poaching.

Actually, the telecheck system makes the officer more effective. In the old system an officer had to do lots of digging to find out if someone had actually checked their deer.

Then, it was difficult to prove guilt.

It is easy for law enforcement to check if a hunter has telechecked

a deer: They only have to use a social security or driver's license number to call in and find out.

In fact, several poaching cases were made using the law enforcement call back feature last year.

Some people also fear that the telecheck system will take away business and camaraderie produced by physically checking in deer.

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources will be replacing the old yellow check station signs with new yellow "Touch Tone Check Station" signs.

A list of participating check stations will be listed in the Kentucky hunting Guide

Many stores will continue weighing deer and posting photos.

Finally, the telecheck system is convenient.

A hunter will no longer have to drive out of their way and find a walk-in check station to report their deer harvest.

This was very inconvenient for hunters harvesting a deer late in the day after check-in stations were closed.

Hunters won't have to miss work or hunting the next morning to visit a check station.

"Last season, I harvested a deer and used my cell phone to check it in before I even left the field," reports Grimes.

No one who used the telecheck system last year reported a complaint.

The Fish and Wildlife Commission approved the notch-and-call system beginning with the 1999-2000 deer hunting seasons.

The system will also be used for reporting turkeys beginning with the 1999 fall season.

"Kentucky Afield 1999 Spring Fishing Call-In" is produced by KET and the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

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March Madness means the digging up of Rupp

Ben Breeding's letter arrived on schedule, it's theme as seasonably correct as a white dogwood bloom in Dan Boone's woods, or first rumblings of a political campaign on the town square.

Springtime ... March Madness ... dig up Adolph Rupp.

College basketball's Big Dance is a prime time stage on which sanctimonious big city sports writers bask in spring's glow and rehash anew the purity of their social consciences.

The Houston Chronicle, in its millennium money-maker pull-out section in March, gave sports writer Rick Telander platform to trumpet the gloried journeys of Jackie Robinson, Billy Jean King, Muhammad Ali, Curt Flood and others.

In his breathy eloquence, Telander dragged out an old prop, a dead man, to make his case for Texas Western.

"Sometimes you can see time's tectonics shift," he wrote "... lily-white Kentucky, whose legendary cracker coach, Adolph Rupp, said things like, 'you'll never see me let a black player wear Kentucky Blue.'"

Said things like? Like?

Telander's broadbrush condemnation typifies a national-level mentality about Kentucky basketball.

Exalt one's own views over the flames of social progress using the voiceless as kindling. "...a cracker coach who said things like."

Telander appeals to his audience without so much as a "hey, wait a minute!" dispute.

He extends a hateful myth that has to be a myth because it is a safe bet Telander never met Rupp, never saw his teams play, but became an instant authority on Rupp "...saying things like..." because he read about it, added his own spin, and because his press badge says Sports Illus-

trated or Houston Chronicle.

Breeding, who incidentally is a U of L graduate and fan, had questions:

"Is there a documented source for the racist quotation which Telander and many others have attributed to Mr. Rupp?"

"And second, is Mr. Telander knowledgeable enough about the Rupp era to provide a qualified opinion?"

Answer: Yes, no, and it matters only who is doing the writing and from what ivory tower.

Yes. If one counts as reliable a source who took his information from the last writer who penned some variation of Adolph Rupp as Jim Crowe.

In this case, it could be Gerry Storch.

Gerry who? Storch has been a night editor for Gannett News Service in Arlington, Va. the last 10 years.

Two months ago Storch penned a highly subjective item called All-time greatest college basketball coaches which was distributed to affiliate newspapers across the land.

Rupp, with the second most victories of all time and four NCAA titles, was listed ninth behind such icons as Don Haskins (8th), Jerry Tarkanian (7th) and John Thompson (5th).

Storch said "...the grumpy Rupp achieved his feats over four decades, "... but in a less demanding era than today's game."

By way of email exchanges, I asked Storch about criteria for his list.

And how could Rupp rank behind a man who has his own

racist labels, Thompson, and a NCAA convicted cheater, Tarkanian, and Haskins who has not been within a sniff of the Final Four since Bobby Joe Hill picked Louie Dampier's pocket.

I asked if he had met Rupp and how was the old Baron "grumpy?"

Of course Storch did not respond, leaving me to assume his night job at Gannett must be keeping him too busy to dawdle with such silliness.

Breeding's second inquiry "Telander's qualified opinion?"

Probably not. To get an authentic and reasonable answer, meet Robert Campbell, a UK fan in Hazard who has made a study of the Rupp era.

Like Breeding, Campbell is also a man who chafes each time a member of the national media herd digs up Rupp's bones.

"... there is considerable question as to whether Adolph Rupp was a racist," Campbell writes.

"Fact: Before he was hired by UK, (Rupp) coached an Illinois high school team (Freeport) that had an African-American player.

"To paraphrase Rupp: 'He could play the game, the school and the community were behind it, so of course we played him.'"

"Fact: There is a story that Rupp issued a memo to the SEC league office - perhaps as early as 1961, informing them he was going to begin recruiting African-Americans," Campbell writes.

"The league shot back a reply that said most of the other members would rather forfeit games than play against blacks."

Unfortunately, this story is unsubstantiated by evidence.

"Fact: In 1956 (for Alabama), 1959 (for Mississippi State), 1960 (Auburn), and perhaps at least one other year, Rupp's teams represented the SEC in the NCAA tournament.

"The conference champions in those years refused the NCAA

bids, because of the possibility of playing against blacks.

"Rupp, obviously, held no such ridiculous qualms.

"Rupp's team had already played St. John's with an African-American (Solly Walker) on its team - in Lexington - as early as 1951.

"The University of Louisville integrated its scholarship athletics in 1962 and Western Kentucky integrated its men's basketball program by signing Clem Haskins in 1963.

"A thought: Why did it take so long for those colleges to integrate their athletic programs?"

"Again, it was obvious to UK and Rupp that the scholarship athletic programs must be integrated.

"Rupp recruited (unsuccessfully and briefly) Wes Unseld in 1964."

NOTE: In 1965 Butch Beard of Breckinridge County was all but signed by UK to become the break-through African-American student-athlete in the SEC.

At the eleventh hour Beard signed with Louisville.

In a conversation with this columnist several years ago, Beard said he changed his mind, "...simply because I didn't want to be a pioneer. The SEC's first black player. I didn't want to go through that."

In the final analysis, maybe passage into a new century will make less urgent and popular March insanity to dig up Adolph Rupp.

Maybe it will become less fash-

ionable to retell stories as mythical and exaggerated as Oliver Stone's "JFK" is to outraged political historians.

Meanwhile, just as winning basketball is part of the UK legend, native Kentuckians like Dan Breeding must enjoy the present, seethe quietly when the digging starts and Adolph Rupp's bones are laid bare under dogwood blossoms.

Kentucky Wesleyan: As

UK was eliminated from the NCAAAs, it seemed quite fitting that the Commonwealth had a standard-bearer not only at the pinnacle of college basketball in 1999, but for all time.

Coach Ray Harper's Kentucky Wesleyan Panthers won the Div. II national championship.

It was the school's seventh NCAA basketball title matching UK's seven championship banners.

Also, Panther guards Patrick Critchlow and Adam Mattingly completed every student-athlete's dream, a double.

The Breckinridge County natives starred on Breck County High's 1995 state title team.

Only Quinn Buckner has the distinction of a triple — playing on a high school, college and NBA title teams.

Clem Haskins: Say it isn't

so, Clem. Taylor County native and coach at Minnesota, Clem Haskins is apparently the only one who is denying everything.

Ironically, less than two weeks

ago a Gopher fan told a UK counterpart, "In Minnesota Clem is like a god."

With evidence piling up to support allegations that Haskins at least knew improprieties were going on, may force him back to the farm in Taylor County sooner rather than later.

All of which may put on hold wannabe job jumpers like Rick Majerus, Tommy Amaker since the Minnesota job could open.

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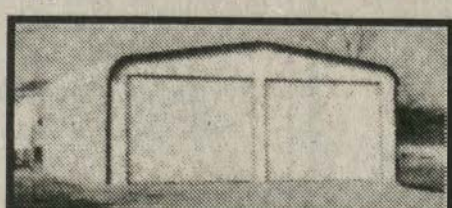
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Farm records can made be less tedious

If you bought your computerized farm record keeping program to reduce your workload, you probably feel let down. Let's face it, record keeping is always going to take time, patience, and commitment to doing it right. "Some producers have a real problem keeping records because it's not something they enjoy, it's not why they got into farming," said Dick Trimble, Extension farm management specialist in the UK College of Agriculture.

"But it doesn't have to be a drudgery for them." According to Trimble, producers can begin to reduce the negative aspects of record keeping by viewing it as a way of discovering things about their farm business, a management tool that helps them make better decisions.

"It's no cure-all or magic bullet, but it does give you a better handle on your overall operation. As soon as you view it this way, record keeping starts to look differently to you, whether you do

it with a ledger book or a computer," Trimble said. "Software programs like Quicken, FINPAK 99, and others help make data more meaningful."

"Record keeping is not an end in itself, but a means to an end," said Jack McAllister, UK Extension dairy management specialist.

According to McAllister, a good example of making records meaningful is the dairy farmer who has scheduled a veterinarian to check the herd. The vet will likely charge by the head, so data that helps the farmer develop a list of animals and their health histories that need attention is valuable information.

Although computer software

may not necessarily make record keeping more "fun," it can make it more real-world. For example, some programs track purchase of inputs, use of inputs on a particular enterprise or field, or repair and maintenance records generated for certain pieces of farm equipment. Financial software helps farmers produce balance sheets, income statements and cash flow budgets, as well as analysis for different farm enterprises such as corn, beef, or tobacco.

Isaacs said one way to make record keeping less tedious is to make it a team effort for the farm family. While one spouse reads information from a checkbook ledger or credit card bill, the other keys it into the computer. Another way to make record keeping easier is to do a little bit every day. "I know a 70-year old farmer who goes in every night right before supper and enters the two or three receipts he collected that day," said Isaacs. "It only takes him a

couple of minutes and it saves him from facing a pile of work later on."

For farmers using computers, Isaacs said the real power and satisfaction of record keeping happens at year's end when various reports can be generated with only a few keyboard strokes instead of sorting through stacks of bills laying all around the office.

The Pony Express

Back in the 1800s, the railroad and telegraph only went as far west as Missouri. From there, it could take at least three weeks for a letter to get to California. But that was about to change.

In 1860, the Pony Express began operating between St. Joseph, Missouri, and Sacramento, California. The Pony Express carried mail by horseback, which cut the mail delivery time to 10 days. The Pony Express riders went as far west as Sacramento, then mail was sent to San Francisco by boat.

On March 31, 1860, the first Pony Express mail from Washington and New York headed to St. Joseph by train. Bands were playing when the letters, telegrams and newspapers arrived in St. Joseph. Then on the evening of April 3, the first Pony Express rider headed out.

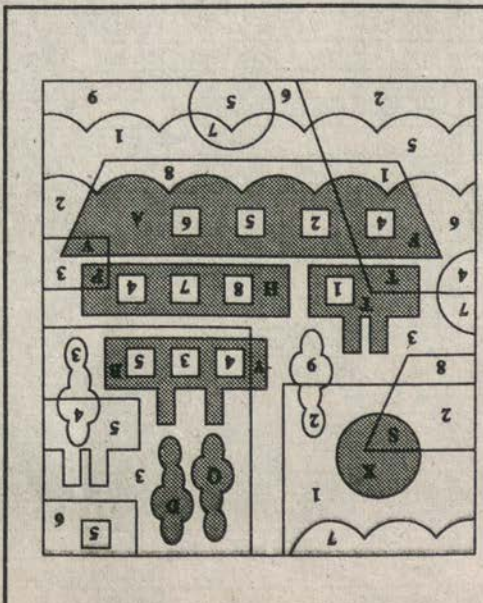
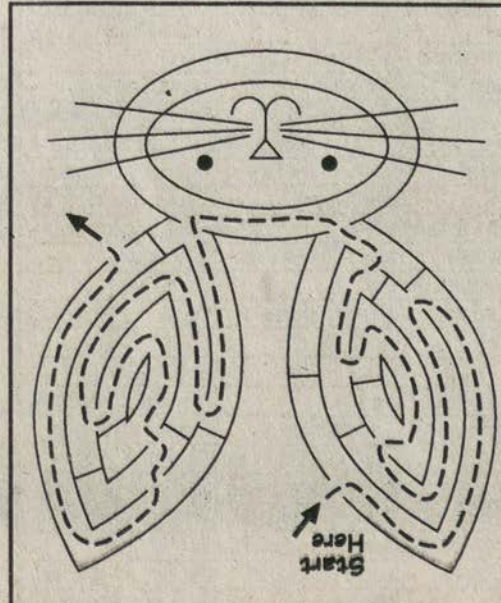
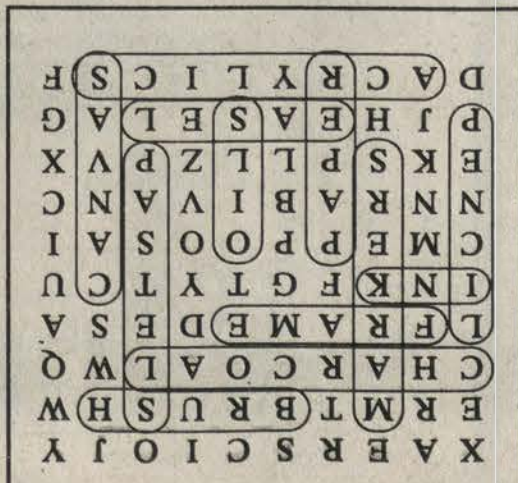
The mail route was about 2,000 miles long, and each Pony Express rider was expected to go about 75 miles a day. Lightweight young men were hired as Pony Express riders. The best horses money could buy were used for the rides. Tough horses were used in California for the mountains and deserts, while fast horses were used to cover the prairies quickly.

More than 100 stations were set up along the route in California, Nevada, Utah, Wyoming, Colorado, Nebraska, Kansas and Missouri. They were 5 to 20 miles apart. At "swing stations," riders could pick up a new horse that wasn't tired from the long ride. And riders stayed at the "home stations" between their runs.

About 80 riders were used at a time and were paid \$100 to \$125 a month. Along with the riders, there were about 400 people who worked at the stations, took care of the horses and supervised the riders.

The Pony Express service was stopped in 1861 after a telegraph line to San Francisco was completed. Even though it lost money, the Pony Express has become part of the legend of the Old West.

Constantine in the fourth century, when Christianity became the official state religion of the ancient Roman Empire. Located inside the church is a hill, considered to be the place of crucifixion and downstairs is a tomb, which may be the tomb of Jesus. The problem with this is its location, not in a garden but in an ancient stone quarry.

In the first century the emperor Hadrian ordered soldiers to destroy it with sledgehammers. The burial slab was later replaced with a marble one and the tomb preserved.

Now then, according to the Bible, Jesus was not buried in a stone quarry but in a garden. The first century Christians must have faked out the Romans and caused them to do violence to the wrong place.

General Gordon, in the early 1800s noticed a hill that looked like a skull and found a tomb nearby. There is abundant evidence that it was located in a garden. There is a huge ancient cistern nearby. Water could be collected during the rainy season and used for irrigation.

So the Romans missed it twice. They tried to kill him on a cross and couldn't keep him dead. They later tried to destroy his tomb and took their sledgehammers to the wrong one. They demolished a tomb in a stone quarry and totally ignored the tomb in a garden.

The Moslems captured the Holy Land 500 years later and dominated the area. Christians were killed and exiled and the location was lost for over a thousand years.

It was full of dirt and trash when General Gordon found it. He packed it into crates and shipped it to England for sifting and analysis. There was found to be no evidence of human remains at all.

You can visit the Garden Tomb in Jerusalem. There's a sign over the door guaranteed to make your heart beat faster. "HE IS NOT HERE, HE IS RISEN."

"It sounds crazy, but our pitchers did a pretty good job. The key to defense is to make routine plays look routine. We were making routine plays look like a three-ring circus.

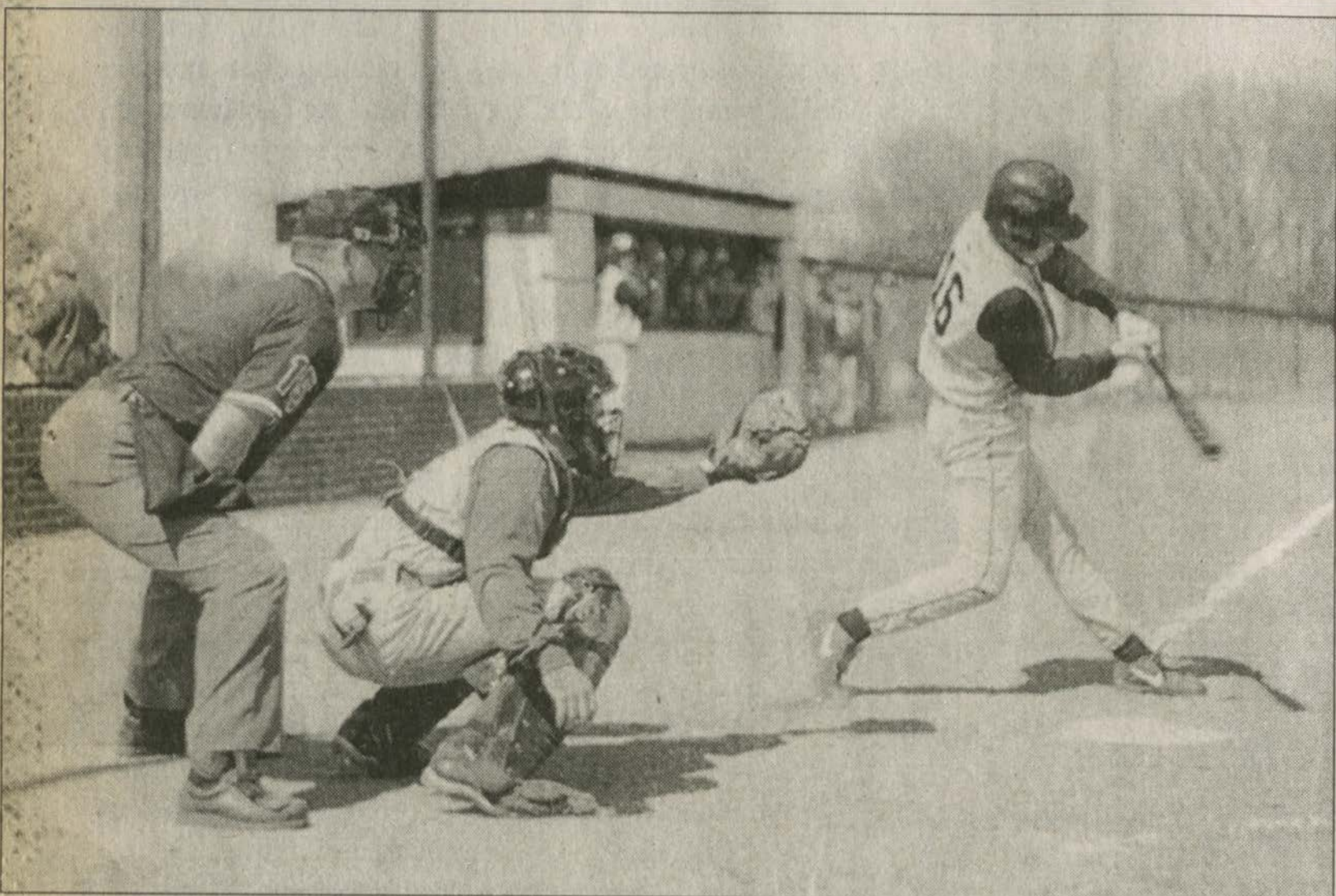
"We showed some inexperience in pressure situations," he added. "But our younger kids rallied."

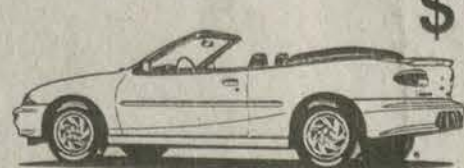
