Editorial

Secondary education in America began in 1635 with the Boston Latin School, the forerunner of the modern high school. Designed to prepare the young men for college by teaching Latin and Greek, it was attended by those who later were to become ministers and lawyers. It was for this reason that men of intellectual ability were students there. This type of education was the leader for over a hundred years, and then some of its popularity was taken away by the academies.

The desire of the people to have an opportunity to receive a more diversified education led to the founding of the academies. The American Academy, established in 1751 by Benjamin Franklin, was the first. These academies introduced new subjects, such as English, science, geography, and others which, owing to the influence of tradition, were soon neglected. However, although a few academies were founded during the latter half of the eighteenth century, it was not until the beginning of the nineteenth that they gained a real foothold. The most numerous as well as the best were found in New York and Massachusetts.

The academies of this period prepared the boys and the girls for the "real business of living" by teaching them more than just the three R's or the dead languages. Modern languages, advanced mathematics, history, sciences, and commercial subjects, to name a few, were offered to the students. At first glance one might say that we are teaching the same things that were taught to our great-grandfathers, which does not befit a progressive nation. Fundamentally that is true. These same subjects still make up the major part of the Technical, Classical, and Commercial courses. The emphasis now, however, is at least partly on the less tangible items such as character building and good citizenship, not solely on knowing exact facts. The manner in which the facts may be applied is receiving more attention every year. History, for example, is being taught in a totally different manner, stressing the economic, social, and international problems that are of such importance today. There is hardly a subject taught in high school which doesn't in some way apply to every day living. Students are given more and more responsibilities which develop character. For instance, some pupils are secretaries to teachers; others are class chairmen or club officers or serve on committees. These character building results are brought about not merely by a different emphasis on the same subjects, but by the addition of a wide variety of electives and extra-curricular work.

Through these extra-curricular activities and electives, there is also a development of more worth-while tastes for the new leisure time. The clubs promote interest in various hobbies, sports, and things of a cultural nature. So valuable have some of them proved to be that they are classed as electives with a credit of one point for the students taking them.

Changes in school methods have been brought about by the changes in our economic and social life. With the present demand for longer training, with a greater amount of leisure time available, and with an increasing need of thinking, responsive citizens, the intangibles of education are sure to demand and receive constantly increasing attention.

Curriculum

It has been three hundred years since secondary education was inaugurated in America. What a far cry the modern, well-equipped high school of 1935 is from the small building known in 1635 as the Boston Latin School. Our emphasis, however, should not be placed on the equipment of the old and the new but rather on the type of instruction offered to the pupils.

The Boston Latin School took care of only those pupils who were planning to enter college, and even in that respect it was very inadequate, according to our ideas, as the main subject taught was Latin. Today, although the schools have courses of instruction which prepare one for college, they also provide for the much larger group who do not intend to go to higher schools. For these there are the Commercial and General curricula.

The Linden High School has two college preparatory curricula, each of which specializes along different lines. The Technical curriculum, as its name implies, stresses those subjects which will serve as a background for continued study in a technical college which leads to a B. S. degree. Science and Mathematics are emphasized, including Algebra I and II, Plane and Solid Geometry, Trigonometry, General Science, Biology, Chemistry, and Physics. In colleges where a B. A. degree is given, the Classical curriculum is required as the necessary background material. This course includes three years of Latin, Early European History, Algebra I and II, and Plane Geometry. For the Classical students there is a choice in the Senior year of Latin IV, Physics, or Chemistry. English, United States History and Problems of American Democracy, and a modern language are required for students in both curricula.

A greater number of our students, however, are planning to enter the field of business, in which bookkeeping, typewriting, shorthand and related subjects are requisites. The Commercial work offered by the Linden High School well fits pupils for such employment. Business Practice, one of the Senior subjects, teaches the students qualities of resourcefulness and how to present a more pleasing personal appearance. The many students who are secretaries for the teachers learn to take orders from one person, to keep these orders to themselves, and to develop initiative. Two other Commercial subjects of importance are shorthand and typewriting. In the latter a speed of 50 to 60 words a minute is attained. Shorthand dictation is taken at a rate

of 100 words a minute and these notes are transcribed at approximately 30 words a minute. The office practice and the speed in typewriting and shorthand well fit a graduate from this curriculum to take his place in the world of business.

The General curriculum is becoming more and more popular as it is designed for those students who, upon entering high school, have not made up their minds as to what vocation they would like to follow. Next year this group of courses will be still further expanded so that the students taking it will receive a more rounded education. At the present time, many people must take as many as four periods of shop in order to have enough points to graduate. The new subjects will decrease the number of periods of shop, making it an elective. This change will enable other students to take shop who were formerly barred from it because it was overcrowded. The Commercial subjects taught at the present time will continue to be taught, as will General Mathematics, General Science, Early European History, Economics, and Commercial Law. The new subjects will include Economic Citizenship or the Business of Living in the ninth year, a second year of General Mathematics, World History, General Biology, and French or German I in the tenth year, General Chemistry and a second year of modern language in the eleventh year, and General Physics and General Algebra in the twelfth year. This very practical education also includes English and United States History. Current events play an important part in the English work during the Sophomore and Junior years and the study and appreciation of motion pictures and of a wide variety of magazines in the Senior year.

Other subjects, known as electives, play an important part in the school program. They are taken two periods a week and give the pupil one point. There is a wide variety open to the boys, including woodwork, mechanical drawing, printing, and metal work. The girls may take either cooking or sewing. Art, glee club, orchestra, and band are open to all students. The three latter subjects were until this year extra-curricular activities for which one did not receive any credit. A very extensive health program is in effect this year to meet the state requirements. One period of classroom health work and three periods of participation in games or floor work are taken by every student.

As conditions change, the school program changes also. The curricula of Linden High School are being expanded in order that the particular needs of the students may be met.

Linden High Chronicle

The year 1935 marked the attainment of one of Linden High's long sought goals — the establishing of a school newspaper. For many years, all Lindenites had hoped for, and eagerly awaited, the time when our school would have its own paper. Through the unceasing efforts of Peter Bosco, the present editor, and Horace Singer, the present associate editor, this dream is now a reality.

Early last fall, with the co-operation of Mr. Morris Winetsky, the publisher of the "Linden Observer," a paper was started, in conjunction with the "Linden Observer." "The Linden High Weekly," as it was called, soon became extremely popular. Its staff consisted mainly of Juniors, with Mrs. Rosa as faculty adviser of the reporters, Miss Casement as faculty adviser of the secretarial committee, and Miss Page as faculty adviser of the circulation committee.

The desire to expand soon became overpowering, and with the loyal support of a large percentage of the student body, who promptly subscribed, an independent paper was launched. "Linden High makes history, the Chronicle records it," is the slogan of the paper. With the desire of the other classes for representation, reporters were chosen from the Freshman, Sophomore and Senior classes, and an advertising staff, under the direction of Miss Marshall, was added.

While it was still known as "The Linden High Weekly," the paper sponsored four contests. Two medals were given by Mr. Winetsky to the winners in each of the contests, one to the best entry of the Freshman and Sophomore classes, and the other to the winner of the Junior and Senior group. The first contest was an essay and feature article contest, which was won by Ophelia Bass, a Junior, and Olive Thomson, a Sophomore. In the short story contest, Joseph Phillips won for the Juniors and Inger Anderson for the Freshmen. The two outstanding poets proved to be Eleanor Feazey, a Junior, and Ruth Siegel, a Sophomore. The fourth contest was on the writing of editorials.

What of the future? Great oaks from little acorns grow, and the "Chronicle," starting as a little acorn, will soon expand to the fabled oak. Most of the staff will be available next year, and they surely will not fail us.

It is eight P.M. People are rapidly filling the auditorium. "This way, please," and the usher distributes programs and shows the patrons to their seats. The other members of the Bennet family were Jane, played by Theresa Peters, Honoria, played by Mary Doklia, Ernie, an awkward but likeable chap, played by Joseph Egles. Roger Turner, as George Newte, the former business manager of Lady Bantock, furnished the necessary humorous touch. Dr. Freemantle, a very gay and comforting gentleman, was played by Albert Schlossberg. Assemblies

Originality and ingenuity — these points have been stressed and exemplified by the assemblies of the past year. The weekly period is eagerly anticipated by the student body as an hour of light, carefree entertainment or, in contrast, as one of intellectual stimulation. The programs have consisted of musicals, short plays, lectures, and an interclass debate.

This year the musicals have been exceptionally fine. The Glee Club and Orchestra combined to give us our first successful musical, which included popular classics and representative music of different periods. The program ended with several jazz numbers played by the High School Serenaders. The traditional Christmas program gave opportunity to hear the Glee Club sing carols. The first program of the new year was given by the band. At this concert Ray Dass played a saxophone solo, and he and Harvey Scheckler rendered an original composition written by the latter. On January 15th the student body was very fortunate in being able to hear, in the school auditorium, a concert given by the Beacon Hill Ensemble. The Ensemble is a part of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, and it was through the efforts of Miss Ebbert in connection with the National Music League that the school was able to attend the concert.

The dramatics, which have always been good, seemed to be even better this year. When the principals of the high schools of Northern New Jersey attended their annual conference at our school, the Dramatic Club presented, for their enjoyment and for that of the students, "In Dixon's Kitchen," a play portraying some of the characteristics of southern mountain folks. "Why the Chimes Rang," a Christmas play, which interpreted in an impressive manner the giving of a perfect gift, was dramatized by the Tennis and Commercial Clubs. To celebrate Lincoln's birthday, several scenes from his life were presented. The Literature Club did its bit when it presented "Bargains in Cathay," a light, amusing comedy. Throughout the year the lower classmen as well as the upper classmen have employed their talents in offering worth-while entertainment. Foremost among their presentations was "Washington at Valley Forge." A play of an entirely different type, entitled "A High School Girl Sees Through Advertising," was also very commendable. "Lantern Light," another sketch, was successfully produced by Sophomore and Freshman sections.

This year one of our lecturers was the ever popular Thomas Q. Harrison, who has been recalled time and again to our school. Mr. Kelley of Pace Institute gave a stirring talk on getting ahead. Another notable program was Miss Chanal's illustrated lecture on Corot and his art. One of the programs that every one enjoys is the annual interclass debate. This year the Sophomores and Seniors were the contestants with the Seniors the victors. "Black and White," the most unique program of the year, was given by Mr. Reaser and Miss Galyiel. Mr. Reaser sketched pictures to interpret the mood and story of the music that Miss Galyiel was playing.

In early March the Cynosure Staff presented a highly entertaining program whose underlying purpose was to sell the "Cynosure" to the student body. Other assembly programs of varied nature entertained the student body and visitors. The success of these performances has been the direct result of the untiring efforts of the faculty. The last program of the year, Gift day, when the school receives gifts and the students letters or numerals, always combines two totally different emotions. There is joy for those who receive letters or numerals and sadness for the Seniors who realize that this is the last program they will witness on the high school stage. Their feeling is fully expressed in their farewell song to the school.

Afternoon Dances

The first dance of the year, sponsored by the band, set the pace for all other dances in the school this term. The orchestra made clear to the student body not only that their music would be excellent, but also that they would participate in many novelties that had never before been seen in Lindin High School. The short skit that they presented was very amusing, and their songs were the newest available. Having a good idea of what to expect, the student body crowded the gym on Wednesday, November 21, when the orchestra gave the second dance of the year. This dance was a huge success, and the two crooners, Ray Dass and Margaret Murray, were greatly appreciated.

Wednesday, December 12, was given over to the Christmas dance, a gala affair sponsored by the German and Latin Clubs. A surprise was in store for all the participants when they were greeted by none other than Santa Claus himself, giving out Christmas gifts to one and all. The New Year's dance, sponsored by the Tennis and Rifle Clubs, was the peak in entertainment. After the students had enjoyed the pleasing lyrics sung by Jennie Tunkel and Vincent Collins, a surprise was sprung, a floor show. Before the applause had died down for this novelty, three members of the orchestra played several Hill-Billy songs. To top all this, a waltz contest followed. Everyone agreed that it had been well worth the time to attend this dance.

St. Valentine's Day was the occasion for the next dance, sponsored by the Home Economics Club. 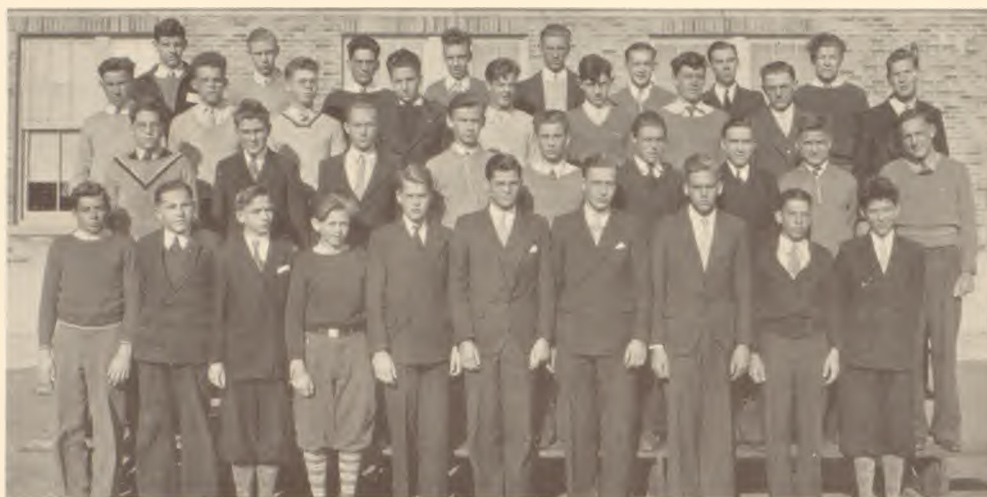

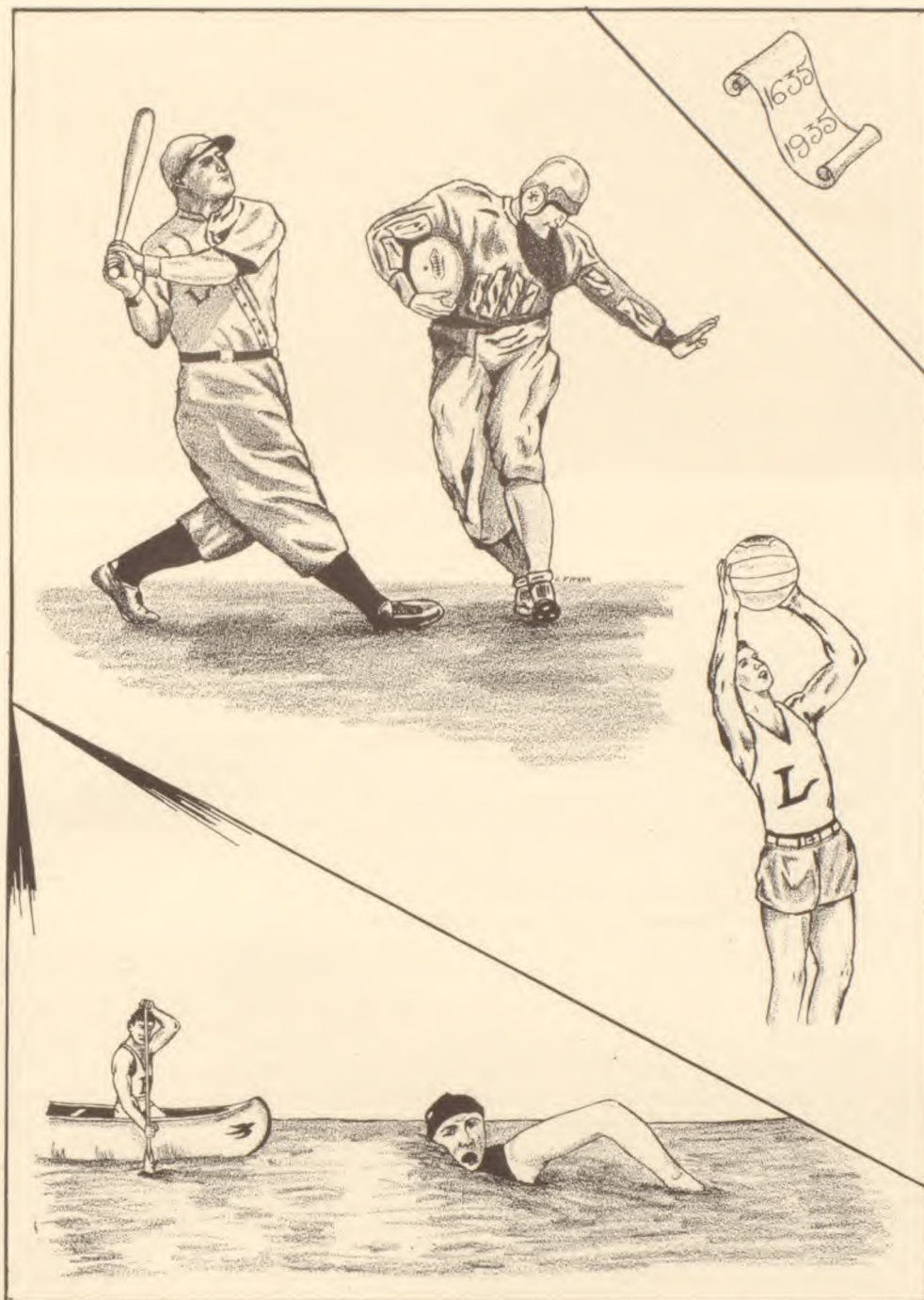

Football

Little did anyone realize that the squad which presented itself to Coach Cooper at the initial football practice of the new season would achieve the heights it was destined for. Although there was a sizeable array of lettermen on hand, only five regular varsity men had returned from the previous year, and around these veterans a team was moulded that will go down in the annals of Linden High School's competitive sport history as the first undefeated, untied, and unscored-upon football team.

The first game on the schedule found the Orange and Black gridders playing host to a team of unknown ability, that of Manasquan. They provided little in the way of opposition and succumbed by an 18-0 score. Nothing could be ascertained as to the potentialities of the Lindenites by this score, but in the following game they proved their worth by winning a close 6-0 victory over South River, last year's Group III champions.

Rahway was the next victim, but proved to be a formidable foe, and it was not until after a spirited contest had been waged that Linden emerged on the right side of a 13-0 score. This brought us up to the Jefferson game still unscored-upon, and Linden fans now began to entertain hopes of a perfect record. Their aspirations were further vindicated by the manner in which Jefferson was disposed of by a 12-0 count. Continuing their superb playing, the Orange and Black outfit defeated Roselle, last year's county champs, 9-0, a victory which witnessed the first field-goal made in years by a Linden man to put the game on "ice" in the last quarter of play.

Roselle Park, our nemesis of two years back, when they held an otherwise unbeaten Linden team to a scoreless tie, did not even threaten to score and were easily subdued 14-0. Dover, likewise, offered little in the way of a good defense or offense and were overwhelmed 32-0 in a game which saw the Linden backfield romping over the gridiron for large gains. The next team to be met was a determined Hillside eleven who were out to avenge their 1933 setback. This game proved to be as thrilling

as its predecessor, because of the excellent defensive tactics employed by both teams. All loyal Lindenites sat with bated breath as the timekeeper's watch ticked off the closing minutes of the contest with the score still remaining tied 0-0. Suddenly a long pass from Elmer Ruth to Bob Smith, who had somehow eluded the Hillside safetyman, was completed for the only touchdown of the game, which ended a few minutes later. Pandemonium reigned in the home stands as rabid partisans literally cheered themselves hoarse at the 7-0 victory.

Finally, as a grand climax to a splendid season, Linden and Union met to decide the county supremacy at the latter's field. This Thanksgiving Day classic duplicated that of two years ago, when these two teams, both undefeated, battled for victory, with the Orange and Black the ultimate winners.

Such was the case now, for both schools were unbeaten, although Union had been tied on several previous occasions. After fifty minutes of actual playing time, Union was beaten by a margin of two touchdowns, 12-0.

Never before had any Linden High School football team compiled such an enviable record as having gone through an entire season, unscored upon. Without the aid of a staunch line that held opponents scoreless, the backfield could never have been as effective as it was. The line, though one of the lightest in the county, gave a good account of itself in every game and was almost impregnable to enemy backs.

The records show that the team accumulated a total of 123 points in nine games against none for the opposition. The finale was reached when Linden received the much-coveted award of Group III North Jersey Champions which they had to share with two other schools, Englewood and West Orange, because of the intricacies of the Dickinson system by which the winner is judged.

A successful season is anticipated for the Orange and Black next year as a large number of regulars are returning to renew the football wars.

The following week they were again defeated by Roselle Park, but by a 35—29 tally the team upset a highly-rated Cranford five in a game which few will forget. They lost their two remaining games to Hillside and Roselle. Although they won only three of their games, the team showed the fighting spirit which is found in all of the Linden High School's teams.

Baseball — 1934

They met and defeated the representatives of Thomas Jefferson, 13—2. This game increased the expectation of a successful season. However, the team next encountered a strong Hillside nine which defeated them, 11—7. The team rallied and the outlook presently became brighter, for they defeated Carteret and South Side. The latter game provided many thrills and chills, but the Linden combine came up on the right side of the score, 12—11. Gaining momentum as the season progressed, they kept on their winning ways by defeating New Brunswick and Rahway in quick order. This winning streak was broken by Hillside, who defeated them again. Track

Summit was then met in preparation for the County meet, and after all the events had been concluded, the score was found to be tied at $47\frac{1}{2}$ points apiece.

In the Union County meet, the best that the track team could accomplish was to secure fourth position, as had been expected because of the limited size of the squad. This was followed by two defeats at the hands of Roselle Park and Bound Brook by the scores of 67-37 and 70-34 respectively. During the course of the season, a new record was established by Oliver Stuckey, who attained the height of five feet ten inches in the high jump. Another outstanding performer was "Bob" Pietrowski, who captured individual scoring honors for the team.
