



General Curriculum

Freshmen entering Linden High School and not wishing to take college preparatory or business work are able to take a general curriculum of courses fitted to their needs. During their Freshman year the General students are required to take General Science and Citizenship, English, General Mathematics, and Physical Education. One of the interesting subjects in the second year is General Mathematics II. One section in General Mathematics under the supervision of Mr. Ramage has this year studied such problems as "How much cheaper is it to buy items for cash than for credit?" "How many feet do people walk in school in one day?" and "How much does it cost to operate a car for a year? In the second year pupils select subjects in one of three definite lines of work: academic. including foreign languages, mathematics, and science; commercial, including typing and bookkeeping; or shop courses in conjunction with required academic work. This definite line of work is continued through the remaining years of high school. Among the newest of the courses in the general curriculum for the second year are General Biology and World History. Since Linden has several industrial plants which have a great need for chemistry, the study of General Chemistry in the third year is of great help to students who wish to understand the work done in their home town industries. Seniors taking the General course will be able to take General Physics in addition to their other subjects.





The cast included Joseph Leib as Arlequin, Virginia Molony as Colombine, George Shevelove as Pierrot, Charles Addalia as Cassandre, and Florence Sullivan, Jennette Oyer, Lena Granelli, Betty Tuthill, Ruth Wadell, Violet Ludvinaitis, Matilda Chernotsky, Eileen Engelman, and Jane Beckman.

But this was only one of the many interesting things accomplished by the club this year. As a club trip, some of the members saw a performance of "Cyrano de Bergerac" starring Walter Hampden, when it played in Newark. Since the entire club was not able to go, those attending told during one meeting what they had seen. They described the artistic scenery, and the superb

acting of the play, and related the story of Walter Hampden's life and work.

In accord with the spirit of the season, the French and Latin Clubs united to sing Christmas carols. As one of their numbers they rendered "Gloria In Excelsis Deo," which is composed partly in French and partly in Latin. "Le Petit Journal," a French newspaper prepared for students, provided information for speeches concerning various holidays, including a contrast between the American manner of celebration and the French.

Records of songs sung by Lucienne Boyer, the noted French singer, constituted another program.

Magic Club

A new club, the Magic Club, was founded at the end of the 1955 school year, with Mr. Kendall as adviser. This club did not actually begin its work, however, until the beginning of the present school year. At the regular weekly meetings, a short business discussion took place, and during the remainder of the meeting the members practised and perfected their skill in magic. The purpose of this club is to entertain. At a Christmas party, attended by the faculty of the high school, these magicians successfully performed some of their tricks. Robert Amon, a member of the club, ran a column called "Hocus Pocus" in the "Chronicle." Each week one simple parlor trick was explained. The charter members of the club are Charles Addalia, Joseph Leib, Jack Roseman, Emanuel Gordon, George Gordon, Sam Drapkin, Robert Amon, and Walter Drozdowski.

Jazz Orchestra

The Linden High School Serenaders' main task this year was furnishing the music for the monthly dances which were sponsored by the various clubs in school. The dance dates were redletter days to those with "dancing-feet," and many groups rushing around after classes in order to take advantage of all the peppy tunes that were offered were not an uncommon sight on such days. Musical talent ran high this year, because the orchestra increased in number from nine to sixteen pieces, and two more vocalists were engaged. The members of the orchestra included George Shevelove, leader; George Hurst, first trumpet; John Isky, second trumpet; Alfred Pawloski, third trumpet; John Pentz, first sax; Leo Brzozowski, tenor sax; John Milkosky, third sax; Edward Joffe and Walter Drozdowski, violins; Victor Baylock and Robert Smith, guitars; Richard Daniels and Warren Buckholz, trombones; Lokady Karalis and William Van Eerde, piano; Alfred Martis, accordion; and Stanley Tomko and Walter Czurczak, drums. The vocalists who gave novelty interpretations of numbers at the dances were Dorothy Christoff, William Copley, William Loxley, and George Shevelove.

The orchestra played the snappy collegiate tunes that accompanied the musical comedy "Forward Pass." The Juniors and Seniors appreciated the music which the orchestra rendered at the dance practices held in preparation for the prom. The late hours that the members spent in rehearsing were considered a pleasure rather than drudgery, and they enjoyed working with Mr. Malpas, the faculty adviser, who was a newcomer to the teaching staff in the fall.

Metalwork Model Club

A new club which was established in our high school was the Metalwork Model Club. So much interest was shown by the boys when Mr. Marx exhibited a model gasoline engine that it was necessary to have cooperation among all the boys starting the engine. This work was very interesting, educational, and practical. The boys were taught to use various complicated machines, such as the metal lathe and drill press. In the process of making the different parts of the motor the boys also learned how a gasoline motor worked. In addition to the gasoline motor, there were many other interesting projects. For instance, Howard Andrews worked on a motorboat made entirely of metal obtained from the school shop. The boys also aided in building a punch press, which would save time and labor. Bought from a factory, this press would be very expensive, but in the school shop it was made for a trifling sum.

Aviation Club

Only in its third year of existence and it holds the position of the largest club in school! That is the record of the Aviation Club. It is little wonder that the various types of interesting programs and field trips have attracted more than a hundred members. First the club went to Newark Airport, where they saw the people necessary to keep an airliner going: the "grease monkeys" in the hangars; the weather men cooped up in the observation tower; the executives in the Administration Building. Interest rose to a new high at the initiation party with a program in step with the times. An amateur hour was staged with the initiates putting forth their best efforts to keep that insolent judge, the gong, silent.

At the invitation of the club, Colonel George A. Vaughn, second ranking living American war ace, came to Linden High School and spoke of his first flying experiences. The club graciously invited the student body to listen to him in the auditorium. A high light of one of the meetings was the demonstration of his seven-foot flying model airplane by Frank Yuhasz, one of the founders of the club; it was powered with a baby gasoline engine.

The Aviation Club united with the Debating Club to make their dance, the last of the year, one of the most enjoyable. It must have been, for no one was heard to complain of a dull moment. Enthusiasm and interest accompanied the students into the air when the club made its annual airplane flight. What a fitting climax to a well-rounded program that furthered the interest of aviation in Linden High School!

Tennis Club

If you are of the ambitious type and fond of outdoor sports, you will be interested in the activities of the Tennis Club of 1936. In the fall of the year the club sponsored its annual tennis meet in which Robert Brandt captured the honors. During the cold winter months (just to keep in practice) an exciting ping-pong tournament was held. Paul Bieler, the president, was the winner. The club was active in other fields as well as in sports. A successful Christmas play, "The Boy on the Meadow," was given by the combined members of the Tennis and Commercial Clubs. The Tennis Club sponsored its annual dance April 1, and at the close of the year enjoyed a trip to Bear Mountain,

As instructions were given to students, eager to learn to play tennis, a court was needed. The club members worked for the completion of the court at the athletic field, started by the members of the club several years ago, but the lack of funds for construction materials hindered their progress. The club's outstanding project of the year was the organization of a varsity Tennis Club team. Only members of the club are eligible to participate and there are no restrictions for those wishing to join the club. Coach Cooper stated that if the new team showed promise, he would arrange contracts for interscholastic meets.

Literature Club

This year the Literature Club opened its schedule of social events with an initiation party, providing fun for everyone. At the December meeting soon following, the program committee presented a highly entertaining and most appropriate Christmas play, "Boy On The Meadow," with a cast chosen from the members of the club. Later in the month the Literature Club joined with the Library Squad and the Science Club in having a Christmas party. Dancing and refreshments supplied everyone with a good time.

On April 2 the members presented their annual assembly program, a play entitled "Three's a Crowd," which proved to be most interesting to the whole High School because it so well depicted the high school student. In addition to this the calendar provided another big event, a program of social entertainment, consisting chiefly of dancing to the rhythm of the Linden High School Serenaders. To complete the activities for the year, the club went to New York to see

Helen Hayes in "Victoria Regina."

Girls' Glee Club

The ever-increasing popularity of the Girls' Glee Club this year seemed to lie largely in the fact that a large number of girls felt that they had been gifted with certain powers of song. And so when tryouts were called at the beginning of the school year, it was not at all surprising to find in the music room a large number of girls, ranging from freshmen to seniors, each eagerly awaiting her turn to show off her vocal talent. With great care the girls who were best qualified were picked to become members of the Girls' Glee Club. Under the direction of Mr. Malpas, their new director, this club splendidly carried on the fine work of previous years.

Girls dressed in white surplices, red scarves and sleeves, and carrying red lighted candles slowly came down the aisles of the assembly, their voices blending in perfect harmony as they sang such well known Christmas Carols as "Silent Night," "It Came Upon the Midnight Clear," "Hark the Herald Angels Sing," "We Three Kings," and others. On the day of the closing of school for the Christmas vacation, the Glee Club very appropriately walked through the halls screnading the students with Christmas Carols. They also sang at a program given by the

Teachers' Association in School I.

At the Atlantic Music Convention in the fall Linden High School was ably represented by Margaret Murray, Edith Maggs, and Sophie Lotoska. It is interesting to note what songs the girls sang there: "Lo! What a Branch of Beauty," "In Silent Night," "Under the Silver Star," "Let Every Heart Be Merry." Later in the season these girls sang with the State Chorus at the Metropolitan Opera House in New York City. The Spring Festival presented in the high school auditorium, in which the Glee Club participated, provided funds to send pupils to next fall's convention.

Der deutsche Verein

Der deutsche Verein, during this year, definitely proved itself to be one of the leading social organizations of the school. Meetings were carefully planned so that they might be both educational and entertaining. The life history of some of the famous German musicians—Beethoven, Schubert and Haydn—were among the topics presented in many of the interesting reports. Accompanying these discussions, Schubert's "Ave Maria" was played on the radio-victrola to acquaint the club members with one of his many beautiful compositions.

At the December meeting the entire program was devoted to singing German Christmas Carols. Two of the familiar songs were: "Stille Nacht" and "O Tannenbaum". The radio provided entertainment for most of the other monthly meetings. On February 19, der deutsche Verein united with the Home Economics Club in sponsoring a belated St. Valentine's dance. The club's activities during the latter half of the school year consisted of two events, the club's annual assembly program

and the spring trip.

The Dramatic Club

When any high school group plans to put on a play, where does it usually go for help of any kind? To the Dramatic Club, of course. This club, which considers drama in all its phases, has been helpful to many organizations. Over a period of years, this club has gathered a wide variety

of theatrical knowledge, equipment, properties, and costumes ranging from rags to satins.

The first production of the group this year was "Rose of Plymouth Town," a Thanksgiving play with a cast composed of Sylvia Entenberg, Virginia Molony, Anna Christoffers, Gail Davidson, Charles Addalia, Gail Clark, Manuel Contreras, and Joseph Leib. "Hyacinth Halvey", an Irish comedy, and "Turtle Dove", a Chinese comedy, were the two plays produced by the club in the spring. In the cast of "Hyacinth Halvey" were George Shevelove, George Senyshyn, William Young, Theodore Chernotsky, Alice Muller, and Clara Gelb. The "Turtle Dove" was played by an all-girl cast: Ida Fishkin, Dorothy Christoff, Harriet Karmel, Helen Cicila, Frieda Wishna, Gail Davidson and Sophie Lotoska.

The Home Economics Club

Upholding its reputation of being one of the largest and most active girls' clubs in the school, the Home Economics Club, under the direction of Miss Ware, started its season by first holding a tea for the reunion of old members. There, instead of drinking tea, they chatted gayly to the clink of cider glasses. In order to belong to this club, which furthers one's interest in home economics, a student must have A in cooking or sewing for two successive six weeks' periods. To welcome the new members into the club, another social was held.

Each meeting was made most interesting by members participating in different programs. Talks were given concerning hints to the girls in household matters and in the wise buying of all commodities, as to both the quality and the price. At another meeting a fashion play was given, discriminating between the right and wrong clothes for a girl. The performers gave examples of inappropriate attire for business, the type of dress for work, the type for an afternoon tea, the

gaudy girl, the slovenly girl, and the neatly dressed girl.

One of the main events of the year was a Valentine's dance given in conjunction with the German Club. At this the spirit of the day was emphasized by having a novelty valentine dance. Following this event the annual fashion show was given for the benefit of all girls of the school. Here spring fashions and summer garb were displayed by different members. Some modeled clothes of their own creation. The club ended its season with its annual trip and closed its book of minutes upon a year filled with numerous activities.

Civic Forum Club

The Civic Forum Club was formed in 1935 under the appellation of the Current Topics Club with Miss Lang as the adviser. The club was formed by the ever-progressive freshmen and sophomores, but a membership drive for upper classmen was opened this year. Not only was the club

one of the newest in the school, but also one of the most interesting.

The aim of the members was to become familiar with present-day problems and to stimulate interest in world affairs. The arrangement of the programs for each meeting was in the hands of a special committee, headed by Ida Fishkin. The members were fortunate enough to have Mr. Ruether, a distinguished speaker on current affairs, talk to them on the topic "Every Day Problems and How To Distinguish Truth From Untruth." Morris Schaffer, a freshman, gave a report on "Trouble in Ethiopia," and during one of the other meetings, several students staged a debate on the topic "Resolved: That Public Schools Are More Beneficial Than Private Schools." At the majority of the meetings the students discussed news in the "American Observer" and the "Weekly News Review," two newspapers which were subscribed to by the members. To add to the interest of the club, the members enjoyed a trip to New York.

Orchestra

To the tunes of those old favorites, "March Militaire," "Campus Memoirs," "Bugler's Overture," and "Les Adieux," the regular Thursday assembly programs were opened by the Linden High School Orchestra. However, beginning many of the weekly programs was only part of the orchestra's duties; lending its musical abilities to other school presentations, namely, The Parent-Teacher Association meeting, Senior Play, Spring Festival, and Commencement, completed its well done job. Since a large group of students were interested in group playing, it was necessary to have two orchestras, one consisting of the more advanced students, the other, of the newcomers. An added honor was bestowed upon our school when three outstanding members of the Orchestra, Anne Christoffers, Philip Gushin, and Alexander Luba, played with the All-State Orchestra. All members received one point for their untiring work in having given Linden High School an orchestra to be proud of.

The Debating Club

The Debating Club has tried during this year to give its members as much actual debating experience and instruction as possible. In order to do this, meetings were devoted either to debates or instructive talks given by members on the principles of debating. The interclass debates, on the topic "Resolved that the several states enact legislation providing for a complete system of medical care at public expense," were especially diversified. The senior team, composed of James Archibald, Seymour Bieler and Nathaniel Goldenstein, captain, won six out of six contests. The junior team, on the other hand, lost all its debates. Gustav Shoenlank, captain, Lloyd McCormack and Seymour Freiman made up this team.

The freshman and sophomore teams both won three and lost three debates. Each team was divided into both affirmative and negative sections. The sophomore affirmative was composed of Frieda Wishna, captain, Gordon Agnew and Inger Anderson; and the negative included Gerhard Spieler, Anna Christoffers and Rhoda Dubrowski. In the freshman teams Florence Bushinsky, Molly Sherling and Roderic Schoenlank composed the affirmative, and Mary Harvan, captain, Florence Bushinsky and Morris Schaefer made up the negative.

The varsity affirmative debating team was very successful in its two debates with Hillside and Scotch Plains. The latter was beaten for the first time in several years. Seymour Bieler, captain, James Archibald and Nathaniel Goldenstein were the members of this team. The varsity negative team, Gerhard Spieler, Rhoda Dubrowski and Frieda Wishna met the first defeat of the season, losing to Somerville in a hard-fought struggle.

The Stamp Club

The Stamp Club, originally a boys' club, learned about the increased popularity of stamp collecting among the girls in our school, and so membership was also opened to them this year. The time allotted to the club for its monthly meetings was hardly enough to carry on the study of portraits and scenes among its collection of stamps. This hobby had its practical returns as an investment and in its educational value. Stamps from all parts of the world find their way into the club's collection. As a result the members profited by gaining an intelligent and complete diary of renowned personalities and beauty spots of the world.

By attending several lectures Mr. Piper was able to contribute a great deal of information about the old and rare stamps. The club further added to its knowledge of stamps when it attended a stamp show at Newark, where new stamps were posted. The club's annual trip was a visit to the National Stamp Show at the Grand Central Palace in New York City. Here all the stamp collectors had an opportunity to exhibit their collections. The St. Patrick's Dance was given by the club in collaboration with the Science Club.

The Home Workshop Club

The Home Workshop, one of the metal work clubs, was formed this year. It was the belief of the members that every student of metal work should have as many tools at as low a cost as possible, and consequently, each member assiduously worked to complete a lathe for himself. Each lathe when finished was owned and used by the builder himself. The officers of the club were president, Irwin Barr; vice-president, Ray Wilson; secretary, Melvin Paton; and treasurer, Clifford Johnson.

The Knitting Club

Everybody's doing it. No matter what large group you joined you were greeted by the clicking of ivory needles as skillful fingers reeled off the "purl, knit, purl, knit, purl," and a large ball of brightly colored yarn gradually diminished while a sweater, scarf, or hat grew in the hands of the knitter.

It was started quite informally—the Knitting Club. At the request of one girl, Miss Waterman showed her and another girl the first steps in knitting. These girls brought their friends and soon an informal club was started. Finally there were about twenty girls in the club, most of them Seniors. They gathered in the conference room every Friday after school. However, no formal meeting was held, as there were no officers and no dues. The only business discussed and carried out was knitting under the supervision of Miss Waterman.

Science Club

One of the most practical clubs in the school is the Science Club, which offers its members lectures, experiments, and trips. This year the club sponsored a lecture by Dr. George Roemmert, the famous Chicago World's Fair biologist, a trip to the Hayden Planetarium in New York, a trip to the Gordon Distillery in Linden, and a dance in conjunction with Stamp Club.

At the regular monthly meetings the entertainment committee gave lectures, performed experiments, or showed moving pictures. After seeing Dr. Roemmert's micro-vivarium, several club members successfully made a micro-projector of their own. This projector was exhibited at one of the club meetings with a slide showing the head of a bee. One of the most interesting experiments presented during the year was one on laughing gas. This experiment, like all others, was explained in detail by the performer. Every lecture, every moving picture, every experiment was in some way valuable to the members of the club.

Library Squad

Every day students flock to the high school library seeking information, or perhaps just to sit down and enjoy the books, papers, and magazines which are to be found there. The members of the Library Squad who come in contact with these students have a chance to study them, and very often find out some interesting things about them.

If an ad were put in the "Chronicle" for a student to work in the library this is how it would probably read. 'Wanted: A student of the Linden High School, Must have good marks. Must be cheerful, honest, accurate, and efficient. Must be willing to devote at least two periods a week in the library. If interested see Miss Waterman."

These qualifications would be required in any position and the Library Squad is one activity which has vocational possibilities. The work is extremely interesting and different from what the average high school student has attempted before. Members are required to perform certain duties such as shelving books, arranging date boxes, mending books, checking magazines, changing dates in pencils, and a list of other duties too numerous to mention. Here, too, accuracy is absolutely essential. Errors caused by carelessness are unnecessary and cause much trouble. As is natural to expect, Library Squad members become well acquainted with the good books and magazines which will prove to be a great asset to them in later years.

Band

This year was the first to witness the band in uniform. Forty students dressed in black pants or skirts with orange stripes, black sweaters, black capes with orange satin lining, and black hats orange trimmed, made an impressive sight when they went through their paces during the intermission between the halves of the football games. The Rotary Club and the Linden Merchants' Association presented the band with a sousaphone and two flags, a school banner and an American flag.

The progress of the band during the last few years has been marked. It has given many concerts during P.T.A. meetings and assembly programs besides furnishing music at the football games. A second band was organized last year for those not well acquainted with their instruments. Students desiring to learn how to play have been able to purchase their instruments through the school at a discount and have received free instruction as well.

Rifle Club

In its main purpose of furthering the interest in firearms in Linden High School the Rifle Club has progressed remarkably this year. Its most notable achievement was the enrollment of the entire club with the National Rifle Association. A few of the members brought further honor to the school by chalking up rifle scores which entitled them to the Pro Marksman buttons of that organization. The "crack shots" were Frank Polito, George Daneke, Eugene Gudek, Alfred Wendel and Edward

Wright.

The members gave their afternoon dance with the Commercial Club. The riflemen did their part to insure a good turnout by sponsoring a dance-ticket-selling contest between the members of the club. The winners, Frank Polito and Edward Wright, received prizes of two and one cartons of shells apiece. During their club meetings the rules and regulations of the National Rifle Association were discussed, and talks were given on the nomenclature of the gun, the method of correct gunfire, sighting and marksmanship. The boys considered the idea of inviting the girls into the club because of the interest expressed by some of them. On different afternoons the members of the Rifle Club practised at the American Legion rifle range or in the Elizabeth Armory. They have been attempting to arrange meets with the National Guardsmen of the Elizabeth Armory, the Roselle and Thomas Jefferson High Schools and Pingry Academy.

Commercial Club

The Commercial Club for the first time decided to hold monthly contests in Stenography penmanship and dictation. Since the beginners and advanced students could not be given the same material, it was necessary to hold four contests each month. Only club members were permitted to enter these, and the contestants had to enter at least three in order to take part in the final one. A competitive spirit was aroused by awarding the winners pins which were worn until the next month's winners were announced. At the end of the year the winners of the most contests became the possessors of the pins. Miss Marshall, Miss McBride, Miss Casement, and Mr. Brooks acted

as the judges.

At the club meetings the members had the opportunity to tell about a personal experience in holding a job or to report on the operations of any local industry. Mr. Strong, a member of our teaching staff, spoke at one of the meetings about his book entitled "An Analysis of Office Occupations," published with the purpose of offering a guide to students in their choice of office positions. The club united with the Tennis Club to present the Christmas play, "A Boy on the Meadow," as an assembly program. The theme was based on an old German legend requiring medieval costumes and settings. Anna Noel, Mae Bilarczyk, Audrey Jolly, Helen Zavoda, and Elizabeth Dudash were the members of the cast. A New Year's Dance was given by the Rifle and Commercial Clubs.



"Forward Pass"

Amid an atmosphere of gaiety, music, laughter, romance, "Forward Pass," a musical comedy, was presented in the Linden High School Auditorium last October. Both nights the cast sang, danced, and acted before a full house.

The show's colorfulness was one of the foremost reasons for its huge success. The variety of costumes worn by the different dance choruses portrayed the exact feeling of the group. The pale blue gowns worn by the Campus Moon chorus created an atmosphere of romance, soft and subdued, as silvery cardboard moons added a delicate touch. Where the charm of that chorus was found in its quietness, that of the Football Fans was found in its liveliness, its cheerfulness, abetted by the bright school colors, red and white. Who, remembering the days spent at Coney Island in the gay nineties, or having heard stories of the good times there just before the turn of the century, would not have enjoyed the Bathing Belles of the Gay Nineties? Their bathing costumes were reproductions of those in style at that time. Their simplicity and liveliness of manner, their joy in living were shown as they really were forty years ago.

Then, there was the humor in dialogue, in dress, and in actions. Who will ever forget Francis Cannon as Hector Tiddles, whose rich widowed mother bought her corpulent son an otherwise unattainable place on the football team? Those who witnessed the production will long remember Shady's attempt to play a trick on Hector after having been fooled by the same trick himself. After betting Hector one dollar that he could show him a sock that was an exact reproduction of the one on his right foot and telling him to regard his left, he was not agreeably surprised to discover that his fat friend wore only one sock. And then there was Hector's devotion to his mother, and his peculiar liking for chocolates, which always made him so very ill indeed. Many a laugh greeted the Silly Songsters, a group of boys dressed in girls' clothing of very bright colors. Their thick make-up and their rather awkward dancing added to their ludicrous appearance.

A cloud of mystery surrounding the play also helped in maintaining interest in it. The uncertainty as to the true identity of the Monrovian heir and the plot concerning him created a feeling of suspense that was not relieved until the close of the play. The excellent acting ability of the cast was especially noted during the production. Francis Cannon earned the reputation of a first-rate comedian; while James Archibald and Harry Ericsson made themselves known as excellent portrayers of young men's parts.

Any of these features taken separately would have made excellent entertainment, but taken together, they created one of the best amateur shows ever produced on the Linden High School stage. Despite minor slips that were covered by the quick thinking of the cast and passed unnoticed by the audience, "Forward Pass" ran smoothly and all too swiftly to a close. When the curtain closed on the final scene, the audience left the auditorium proclaiming the show one of the most delightful musical comedies they had ever witnessed.

"The Road To Yesterday," with its novel and humorous plot, its beautiful costumes and scenery, and its fine cast, proved to be a huge success for the class of '56. Miss Gilkeson, the director, strove diligently to fit each member of the cast to his individual part. The timid tapster Tompkin, in the person of Francis Cannon, and his domineering mistress, Goody Phelps, portrayed by Evelyn Mrozek, will be remembered with amusement by all those who saw the play. The performance of Robert True as the villain will be remembered with feelings of sympathy for the heroine, June Walker, whom he treated so shamelessly, and who, with James Archibald, furnished the romantic interest in the play. Excellent performances were also given by Robert Bauer as Will Leveson, Frances Caroff as his wife Malena, and Isabelle Sullivan as Eleanor Leveson, his sister. The remainder of the cast gave their best efforts and were an excellent support to the principals.

There were many close calls during the performances. The cast backstage had one breathless moment Saturday night when, during the fight scenes, the scenery threatened to collapse. Nor did the audience suspect that Dolly was not supposed to trip and almost lose her balance while serving her ladyship. Friday night, a moment of suspense occurred for Tompkin, Eleanor and Elspeth when a fit of laughter backstage kept Goody Phelps from appearing for her cue, but this slip passed unnoticed by the audience. The incidents which occurred backstage were comedies in themselves. For instance, who in the audience knew how near the cast often came to having no salad for the performances? The reason? Our comedian, Francis Cannon, insisted in having his share (or more) before the performance.

Some of the comments heard backstage between acts were, "Now don't forget to step back far enough to give me room to reach the window." "I would call him, 'My Child,' instead of 'My Lord!' Football


When the first call for football practice for the 1935 season was issued by Coach Cooper, the prospects for a successful season were bright; in fact they might even have been called dazzling. Returning lettermen from last year's State Championship team were Captain Bob Smith, Quarterback John Beriont, and Halfback Ray Tevlin. In the line Al Binetti, George Chase, George Pittius, Frank Polito, and Sid Beshunsky once more answered the opening call for practice.

The first game of the season, with Manasquan, saw the Linden fans all agog at the prospect of continuing the fine record of the 1934 team. Getting off to a slow start and playing a ragged game because of insufficient practice, the team nevertheless showed their mettle in a final quarter touchdown march and defeated Manasquan 7-0. The vacant places on the team were ably filled by "Slow" Paradowski, "Jiggs" De Surney, and "Mike" Spader. As a result of this victory the team had a record of being undefeated, untied, and unscored upon through ten straight games.

Then on October 12, came the game that will long be remembered, though not happily, by those who witnessed it. It was in this game that South River, a team that we had beaten 6-0 the previous year, came up from the south to lambast, massacre and otherwise put an end to our ten game winning streak. The score at the end of an hour of touchdown making was South River 43—Linden 0. The inability of the Linden team to stop the hard-charging and fast-stepping Moroz and Shinn was perhaps the biggest reason for this defeat.

The following week against Rahway, however, the team finally struck its stride, and once more looked like a team of championship caliber. The score was Linden 25—Rahway o, which hardly tells the real story of the game. So superior was the Linden eleven to that of Rahway that on the fifth play of the game fleet-footed Captain Smith raced 50 yards for a touchdown; the other two scores were accounted for by Johnny Beriont. In this game Chase made his first point in high school football on a perfect place-kick.

The following Saturday for the fifth successive time Linden triumphed over a Thomas Jefferson team. The score was 19-0, and Jefferson has yet to score against a Cooper-coached eleven. The main weapon of offense in this game was an aerial attack with Beriont on the passing end. His passes resulted directly in two of the three touchdowns and indirectly in the other. De Surney and



Smith caught passes over the goal-line for scores, and a pass to Tevlin brought the ball to the Jefferson 4 yard line, from which point Tevlin bucked through the line for the final score.

The next team to taste the pangs of defeat at Linden's hands was Roselle. The team emerged victorious from this fray by the closest score of the year, 12-6. For the first time this year, discounting the South River game, Linden was losing at the end of the first half; Roselle led 6-0 by virtue of an 80 yard run by "Babe" Lee, Roselle's fleet quarterback. However, this situation was changed soon after the start of the third quarter, when Beriont culminated a 55 yard drive with a plunge through center for a touchdown. He also scored the winning touchdown in the fourth quarter on an off-tackle smash.

The following Saturday an Orange and Black squad once more took delight in vanquishing Roselle Park. The 26-0 victory over Linden's arch-rivals helped all loyal Lindenites to forget the defeats suffered at their hands in the days when Tom Conrad ran berserk through Park's opponents. It was in this game that quarterback "Johnny" Beriont rose to great heights. His running, kicking, and passing were all notable. On the fourth play of the game he broke loose for a 57 yard jaunt for the first touchdown of the game, and in the second quarter he passed to Binetti for another touchdown. Equally skilful in this game were the jack-rabbit running of Ray Tevlin, the elusiveness of Bob Smith and the plunging of "Rudy" Spader. The two other touchdowns were made by Smith and Spader on line plunges. The following week Bob Smith not only scored Linden's first touchdown but, near the close of the encounter, raced 95 yards through the entire Dover team for the touchdown that put the game "on ice" for Linden. The fine interference he received on this play was, perhaps, mainly responsible for its success. Beshunsky's place kick was no good, making the final score 15-7.

The next team to be encountered was Hillside, and again Linden's fast-charging, hard-fighting aggregation won out. The score was 20-0. In three short bursts in which they completely outclassed their opponents the Linden team scored three touchdowns and were content to play defensive football for the remainder of the game. The first of these scores came in the opening period, when Gutkin blocked a punt and Pittius recovered it in the end zone. Beshunsky made good the place-kick following the touchdown. The second score followed soon after the start of the second half. Hillside punted after receiving the kick-off, and Linden started a 50 yard march, ending in a touchdown by Beriont. The final score came a few moments later on Spader's plunge through center.

The last game of the year, the annual Turkey Day classic with Union, resulted in Linden's eighth victory of the year. The score, 24-0, indeed tells the tale of Linden's superiority over Union. There was no doubt as to the outcome of the game from the opening whistle. The only question was as to the extent of the score. The initial touchdown followed Tevlin's interception of a pass and runs by Beriont and Smith. Spader carried it over the goal from the three-yard line and Beshunsky kicked the extra point. The second came when Chase blocked a kick and Binetti recovered and ran for a touchdown. Beshunsky again made good on the kick. Binetti also made Linden's next score on a 20 yard field goal. After the next kick-off the final touchdown was made on Beriont's interception of a Union pass and his 35 yard dash over the goal. The extra point was scored on a pass, Beriont to Kerry.

All in all the season was a very successful one. The team emerged victorious in eight of the nine games. In the past two years only one team has defeated the Orange and Black eleven and only three have succeeded in crossing Linden's goal-line. Of these three only one was a county eleven. That record will certainly enable the 1935 football campaign to be labeled a very successful one.

With the hoodoo of two unsuccessful basketball seasons still staring him in the face, Coach Cooper called court practice soon after the conclusion of the football season. Returning to the courts were only three lettermen: Captain Johnny Beriont, Al Binetti, and Vincent Wright. In the first game of the season against Cranford on December 20, with Al Jakuc and diminutive Don Lawson filling in the vacant spots, the team showed not a little promise, although losing 21-17.

The following week, after battling gamely against a strong Alumni five, Linden finally succumbed 59-26 before a final quarter rally. The promise that had been shown in these two games failed to express itself, and the Linden quintet lost their next three games to Rahway, North Plainfield, and South Side. The team seemed to have struck its stride in the next game, when they took a 29-27 verdict from Hillside. The next two games, however, with Union and Roselle Park, were lost, the former by two points and the latter by one point.

Hopes for a successful season were again revived as the team won their next two games. They deleated Roselle 30-28 and again triumphed over Hillside, 23-16. The hopes were short-lived, however, as the next seven games against North Plainfield, Morristown, Roselle Park, Cranford, Thomas Jefferson, Rahway, and Roselle resulted in defeats for the Linden squad.

The team wound up a rather dismal season on February 28 with a thrilling 55-17 victory over Union. Although winning only four games, the Orange and Black netsters gave their opponents many a thrill in close games. Of the fourteen losses two were by one point, two were by two points, one was by three, and three were by four points. Nevertheless through all their setbacks the sons of Linden have come up smiling, and you can't keep down a person that smiles in defeat.

Baseball -- 1935

With only a few veterans answering the call for candidates for the national pastime Coach Cooper had a man-sized job in store for him when he announced the initial baseball practise, "Jiggs" DeSurney, Ray Tevlin, "Vinnie" Wright, "Willie" Kroebel, George Pittius, and "Henny" Murawski being the only returning players. The first game was scheduled for April 23 against Hillside. Perhaps it was this game that was indirectly responsible for the defeats to come. For in this game Anderson of Hillside pitched a no-hit, no-run game and Linden lost 5-0. Having a no-hit, no-run game scored against you in the first encounter of the season is enough to lower any team's morale. By the next game the team had apparently not revived from their initial setback, for they lost to Roselle Park 7-2. They recovered themselves, however, and handily defeated their next two opponents, South Side by the lop-sided score of 14-4 and Plainfield 5-1. These two victories appeared to be only a "flash-in-the-pan," though, for the next three games were lost to New Brunswick, Cranford, and Westfield.

The team continued on its losing way, dropping the next five decisions to Carteret, Hillside, Thomas Jefferson, New Brunswick, and Cranford. The dismal season was wound up in a blaze of glory when Roselle Park was trounced 9-1 in the closing game of the campaign. Of the thirteen games played only three were won as against 10 defeats.

Track -- 1935

The return of warm weather again brought out the adherents of the winged-foot sport. Graduation had not affected the track team to a great extent and a successful season was anticipated.

The opening meet on May 8 found Linden going to North Plainfield, where they defeated the latter 64-59. Outstanding in this meet was the performance of "Bob" Smith, who captured both the dashes, placed in the high-jump and pole vault, and ran the anchor leg on Linden's winning relay team. In the next encounter Linden suffered its only defeat of the season, going down before Roselle Park 64-35. The remaining two meets resulted in victory for Mr. Cook's runners, Summit and Milburn being defeated 61-37 and 38-25 respectively. The latter meet was cut short because of a sudden downpour of rain.

The 1936 season is expected to be even more successful. With only a few of the men from the field events graduating, the team should outdo last year's record. In the 1936 Union County Indoor Track Meet, with only a handful of men entered, Linden tied for fourth place. Particularly notable was diminutive "Bob" Smith, who set a new meet record in winning the 220 yard dash. Smith, the team's high scorer in 1935, is expected to continue his sterling performances in the current season.

Eighty-eight of Linden High's girls participated this year in interclass sports with a vision of winning an "L," for which three hundred points were required. The first event of the season, foul shooting, was won by Pauline Komoroski. Sadie Dicker placed second and Jean Putnam third. The winner was determined by the greatest number of baskets made out of the allotted seventy-five.

Basketball, one of the most exciting activities, followed with the Seniors again capturing first place. One hundred points were awarded to the following members of the winning team: Pauline Komoroski, captain, T. Krasucki, M. Putnam, A. Gregory, H. Fomenko, L. Bunin, B. Goldberg, V. Whitely, O. Yonkowski, M. Klutkowski, K. Andrejcio, A. Masnick and H. Zukowski. With the exception of one tilt, the victors established an all-around record by maintaining a score of over fifty points per game. Close at their heels the Junior team, of which Betty Tuthill was captain, took second place and each member received seventy-five points. Captain Millie Zukowsky, conducted the struggling Sophomores to third place, for which they each received fifty points. Finally, under the guidance of Florence Bushinsky, twenty-five points were awarded to the members of the Freshman team, who automatically were ceded fourth place.

Because of the change in program due to the presentation of "Forward Pass," in which many of our students took part, spring found paddle and deck tennis accompanied by volley ball, usually the first sport of the year. During this first year of its existence the team did not participate in any matches, but spent its time learning the three main points of wrestling: skill, speed, and leverage. Next year, however, Coach Osmun expects to have a full schedule of matches and formally declare Linden ready to meet any of the foremost wrestling teams of the state.

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
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
