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



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

These students have also conducted entertaining and also beneficial home room periods. The underclassmen as a whole have been very active and energetic in their undertakings.









"Step This Way"

Once again the Linden High School presented, for the enjoyment of everyone, a sure-fire musical comedy success entitled, "Step This Way." The cast, consisting of a large group of the students, were put through their paces under the able direction of Robert S. Bancroft.

The action of the story occurs on the Long Island estate of Mitchell Boniface, a millionaire, portrayed by Philip Gushin. It is a summer day and Kay, Mr. Boniface's secretary (Alice Mikesh), is making arrangements for a charity show which is to be given that evening on the palatial estate. Lottie (Jean True), a wealthy widow whose husband had been in the apple butter business with "Mitchy" Boniface, believes that it would be a good idea for her to marry "Mitchy" and keep the business in the family. Another one of her little schemes is to have Eddie, her son (Theodore Chernotsky), marry Jean, Mitchy's daughter (Eva Shevitz). Jean and Eddie, however, have different ideas on the subject. Eddie is in love with Connie, an actress (Margy Kalish), and Jean, likewise, is in love with Bill (Francis Powell), a lifeguard whom she and Dot, her girl friend (Polly Diamond), have met while on their vacation. Jean and Dot want very much to have Bill and Don, Bill's pal (Harry Ericsson), visit them, but Jean, knowing her father's attitude concerning her future, dares not carry out such a plan.

On the afternoon of the charity show a valuable necklace belonging to Lottie is missing. Lottie insists that detectives be called in on the case immediately. Jean and Dot, sensing the situation, manage to get Don and Bill, disguised, hired as detectives, Herlock Sholmes and Gotsom, on the case. Then the trouble begins! The phantom (William Young), who is an escaped lunatic from a nearby asylum, comes to the estate hoping to find a keg of diamonds which he believes is hidden there and belongs to him. He accidentally stumbles upon Lottie's necklace, which was on the ground. Hearing voices he quickly drops the pearls into a flower pot where Eddie, previous to this time, had dropped a necklace which he had gotten as one of the props for the show that evening. The phantom then scurries off.

Jean and Dot enter and Jean, spying the necklace, picks it up and puts in into a secret panel in the garden wall. She intends to give it to Bill later so that he can be the hero of the hour. Unknown to her, however, she has taken Eddie's fake necklace.

That afternoon Connie and Eddie go for a walk and take with them the supposedly fake necklace which they throw into the river to show that they have pledged their love for each other. While they are blissfully strolling home through the pastures, a bull rushes at Eddie and rips his pants. Eddie and Connie get home the best way they can. After leaving Connie, Eddie meets Agony, the colored laundress (Connie Simmons). The scene which follows is one that evokes many peals of laughter from the audience as Agony tries to hide Eddie in the wash basket so that no one will see him. Agony, frightened away by a weird shriek of laughter, leaves Eddie with just a sheet to cover his ripped pants. Noel, the charity show producer (Anthony Spadora), happens along and promises Eddie that he will get him a pair of pants if Eddie will get him a keg to use in the show.

The second act takes place the evening of the same day. The guests are arriving and the show is being presented. Art, a crystal gazer (Gail Clark), who is really Kay's husband, puts on his crystal gazing prompter's book from Rhoda's firm grasp and say, "Oh, what page is that line on, that I forgot?" act. Gazing into the crystal ball, he tells the guests to watch the wall and from a hidden panel in it a figure will appear. Naturally he believes one of the people in his act as plannaed will appear. Slowly the door opens and a figure wrapped in a sheet appears. 
Linden High Chronicle

Following this Linden vowed revenge and took it out on Roselle Park and Roselle for the second time and took over Carteret and Westfield. Union added the last defeat of our regular season, but only because Coach Cooper would not allow the first five to diess, because of a tournament game the following night.

In the county tournament, Linden proved a continual threat throughout, and in the first game defeated Cranford for the third time in the current season. St. Patrick's was the next victim, and Linden drew Regional in the semi-finals. Regional, in their first year of court plays, defeated the Orange and Black courtsters, and then proceeded to take the championship from the Spanktowners of Rahway. Rutherford defeated the Coopermen in the only state tournament game they played.

Linden finished the season with sixteen wins and five losses, a record that is envied by many teams in the neighboring towns. This year, however, should prove but a warm-up for the seasons of 1938-1939 and 1939-1940.

Meeting Roselle at home on a sea of mud, Coach Cooper's charges defeated the Ricemen on a brilliant bit of running by fleet-footed "Jack" Givens. Roselle Park, a heavy favorite, followed in the footsteps of its twin-borough and bowed 14-7. Playing at Dover, Linden took them to town with a 13-0 margin. In this game, Warren Lamont, a tackle, proved his keenness by scooping up a fumble before it touched terra firma and raced twenty-five yards for the initial touchdown. This winning streak, however, was broken by Hillside, and Union added salt to our wounds in the annual Turkey Day Game. We ended the season with a total of four games won, four lost, and one tied.

Track

Each year, track is gaining more and more in popularity in Linden High. This year, early in the spring, vigorous training for the Newark Sunday Call and Union County Interscholastic Indoor Meets was begun.

In the 1938 Newark Sunday Call meet, Frank Barnacki placed second in the mile, "Al" Martis placed fourth in the 70 yard dash and John Lataweic placed third in the 220 yard run. In the Union County Interscholastic Indoor meet, "Shi" Beshunsky won the shot put, with a throw of 43 feet 8 inches, Frank Barnacki placed third in the one mile run, and Seymour Lieberman placed third in the high jump.

The 1937 interscholastic season started April 21, when we chalked-up our first victory against Milburn. Next we met Hillside and defeated our opponents by a score of 52-46. Linden then van-quished Rahway, 651/2-381/2, but was defeated by Roselle Park, with a score of 56-48, and Cranford with a score of 701/2-331/2. The track team then cleaned its slate by defeating the Roselle squad by a score of 491/2-24. The last meet was held with North Plainfield, who shaded Linden by the close score of 50-54.

Louis Budil and Frank Barnacki ended their season without a single defeat. The "fleet-footed" Louis will be missed by the 1938 Outdoor Track squad, but Coach Diehl expects much of Barnacki, Martis and the new and old members of the squad.

North Plainfield again took the game, 1-0, and Linden defeated Roselle a second time by 9-6, before dropping one apiece to Carteret, and the Alumni.

The team of 1937, although scoring 83 runs to their opponents' 86, only won five games while losing nine. The season of 1938 should be the best since 1930, when the team won 15, lost 4, and tied 1, giving it an average of .750. Many familiar faces will be seen on the diamond this year, and many new ones, which will prove helpful, will also appear.


