


# THE CYNOSURE

#### "SEVEN SISTERS"

The class of '39 presented as its annual senior play this year a farce comedy, "Seven Sisters," by Edith Ellis. It was presented at a matinee performance on February 2 and at two evening performances February 3 and 4. Coached by Miss Gilkeson, the play was a great success.

The scene of the play was Hungary, and the result was very colorful because of the bright costumes of the girls, the red uniforms of the Hungarian soldiers, and the masquerade costumes.

The plot is very gay and humorous, concerning Mrs. Gyurkovics, a widow (Mary Harvan) with seven daughters, four of marriageable age, whom she wishes to marry off. So far, she has had little luck with them, and her present worry is Katinka, the eldest (Jean True), as the girls must marry according to age. Upon this scene enters Mitzi (Lorraine Du Tot), the fourth oldest, a mischievous girl who has always caused her mother trouble. This time she has been expelled from a convent because of attending a ball without permission and being aided by an unknown young man. Mrs. Gyurkovics is so angry at Mitzi's arrival that she orders Mitzi to dress as a child again. Ferenz Horkoy (Walter Hoerrner), the gay adventurer who helped Mitzi, accidentally meets her again and hearing of her predicament offers to marry off her three oldest sisters in a year and thus leave her free. As a reward, he demands three kisses, which Mitzi promises to give him upon fulfilling his agreement. He begins with Katinka and tricks bluff Colonel Radviany (Fred Fonda) into marrying her. In the next act Horkoy gets Sari, the next oldest sister (Angelica Zanetti), married to Michael Sandorffy (Thomas Doe), a Hungarian officer noted for his flirtations. In the final act Ella (Kathryn Murphy), the last obstacle, is married off to Gida Radviany (Morris Schaefer), the Colonel's nephew. and Mitzi is free to do as she pleases. But suddenly her family steps in, and she is ordered to marry Horkoy, as by this time they have fallen in love, they are happy to do so. The curtain comes down on the joyous scene of seven happy sisters, the three youngest ones, Terka (Cecelia Muldoon), Liza (Irene Kolich), and Klara (Polly Diamond), having happily romped through the play in pinafores and hair ribbons. The family servant, Janko (Robert Midgley), and Toni Teleki (Albert Regenbrecht), Mrs. Gyurkovics's godson, played their humorous roles in the play also.

An important part of the work done on the senior play was that of the committees who made possible the setting, costumes, and generally smooth running performance. 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## **Debating Club**

In the state tournament, Morris Schaefer and Florence Tunkel represented Linden, and won first place in this section with nineteen out of a possible twenty points. In the finals at Princeton, they emerged third in the State, and Morris Schaefer achieved a position on the All-State Debating Team, which is composed of four men.



## Photography Club





## 1938 Baseball

Linden began its 1938 baseball season with many familiar faces and many new ones, and finished, winning nine games and losing five. Losing their opening game to West Side of Newark, 4-6, Linden won the next two: one from Plainfield, 15-2, and the other from Thomas Jefferson, 13-9. After bowing to Cranford, 2-6, Linden beat Plainfield a second time, 6-4. Then the nine went into a slump and lost a close game to Roselle, 7-8, and another to Carteret, 5-8. After blanking out Westfield by a lop-sided score of 13-0, Linden was turned back a second time by Cranford, by the same score, 2-6. Ending the season in a blaze of glory, Linden won five games in a row. They beat Roselle Park twice, 16-3 and 13-4. Revenging themselves for a defeat suffered earlier at the hands of Roselle, Linden beat them, 6-1. The team won from North Plainfield by 8-7, but needed an extra inning to emerge victorious over Carteret, 8-7.

In hitting power Linden was good, since most of the players had batting near .300 or over it. "Johnny" Latawiec led the team in the number of hits, and his batting average of .388 was highest. Oscar Givens gave him a fight for top honors, but lacked one hit to tie Johnny. "Doc" Dougherty was next with an average of .354, and was instrumental in beating Thomas Jefferson, North Plainfield and Roselle Park by getting two or three hits in each game. "Butch" Woytowicz came next with .326. Many of his hits were long doubles or triples that came in handy when Linden needed some runs. "Butch" and Oscar Givens were the longest and hardest hitters of the team. "Ed" Kasmin hit .315 and "Art" Osmun, who was switched from third base to shortstop, hit .296. "Jake" Welling scored .250 and "Al" Martis reached .245. Among the other members of the team, "Mike" Gurgo showed most promise with 7 hits from 18 trips to the plate. Bill Davis, the pitcher who allowed Westfield two hits in a 13-0 shut out, had .321. Jack Mulhall, who pitched a "two-hitter" against Plainfield, scored .352.





## Track — 1938

In the Union County Track meet Linden gathered in nine points, including a first, second and third, and although they finished fifth they gave a good showing considering the small number of entrants from our school. In the finals "Shi" Beshunsky placed first in the 12 pound shot put with a lengthy heave of 43 feet 3½ inches. Frank Barnacki placed third in the mile run, and Seymour Lieberman placed third in the running high jump. John Latawiec finished fifth in the sprint finals, and Harold Belcher finished sixth in the half mile. In beating Hillside, their first meet on the schedule, 50-49, Shi Beshunsky scored a grand slam by taking firsts in the shot put, discus and javelin.

Linden beat Cranford a week later and then Summit and Regional in a triangular track meet that finished with Linden leading in the scoring, 51-27-43. Beshunsky scored fifteen points to receive top honors. Lieberman took a first in the high jump, and Captain "Al" Martis and James Chapman captured most of the points in the sprints. Frank Barnacki won second in the mile and first in the half mile run. After winning three more meets in a row Linden was tripped by Roselle Park by a slender margin for a loss.

Rahway and Plainfield were both beaten in a triangular meet by Linden, who also beat Westfield and Roselle by a comfortable margin in another triangular meet. Chapman and Beshunsky took two firsts apiece for the highest honors, and "Lolly" Beriont surprised everybody by hurling the javelin 144 feet for a first in that event. Harold Belcher, with nothing to show for the beginning of the season, took a first in the half mile. Linden had a good year in track, and even though the number was small they made a good showing in all their meets, won all their triangular track meets, and only lost one meet to Roselle Park, by only three points.



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
