SECRETARIAL STAFF

Every commercial student looks forward to her final year for one reason—Secretarial Practice. What is Secretarial Practice? Well, it is a general composition of typing, stenography, bookkeeping, geography and English applied to everyday business activities. It gives the student a chance to learn the use of machines—such as the ditto, mimeograph, calculator, and the noiseless typewriter,—to have experience as a real secretary, and to get some important pointers on the personality of a prospective secretary.

The classroom procedure is usually divided into three distinct sections: first, an explanation by the teacher, next, a demonstration of the point by the girls (sometimes by an original skit), and then actual practice. Needless to say, the second step is the most interesting and enjoyable. It is pre-arranged that every girl have at least four days' practice on the duplicating and calculating machines. In this way she acquires a minimum of familiarity with each one. A representative of a dictaphone company expertly demonstrated the necessary operating technique. He left a dictaphone for the students to use for practice.

Probably the most beneficial experience for the commercial student is her appointment as secretary to a "Teacher-employer". She is able to show her own individual traits and to practice her fundamental book knowledge. However, the success of her job depends more on her ability to adapt herself than on her book knowledge. Every half year the secretaries are interchanged, thus forcing them to again become accustomed to new surroundings. This year's class distinguished itself in a contest sponsored by the "Gregg Writer Magazine" by winning many awards. Each girl received a certificate ,and the class as a whole was presented with a gold certificate. Over half the girls received gold pins for their individual papers.

AVIATION CLUB

Every year a large number of students apply for admission to the Aviation Club and this year was no exception. Not only air-minded boys wished to join, but also a large number of girls. The girls are not usually interested in aviation as a profession, but most of them would like to take a trip in a plane or fly one themselves. It has been the custom of the club to take a trip out to Westfield Airport and give many students the thrill of their first airplane ride. This ride, which is under the supervision of Mr. Walker, the faculty adviser, is looked forward to with great anticipation by every student.

They had gone there in previous years to learn more about airplanes and to investigate the method in which weather reports are made. There are only a few flag stops at Newark, but otherwise there are now very few new things for the members to see. The most accomplished singers of each group are chosen for the mixed chorus. The Boys' Glee Club also has a novelty quartet, consisting of Jack Troiano, Jack Van Brunt, Harry Seaman, and Charles Hazelwood. They entertain at assembly programs and P.T.A. meetings.

The May Festival is the only program given by these fine organizations for which an admission is charged. The proceeds are used to send representatives from Linden High to Atlantic City, to become members of the All-State Orchestra and Chorus. The opening scene found five Indians girls seated in a circle weaving baskets, mats, etc. More Indian girls entered from all sides until the entire Girls' Glee Club was on the stage. The sopranos were dressed in pale yellow costumes, second sopranos in violet, and the altos in pale green. The opperetta was given in three scenes, each having the same Indian camp setting. The first scene took place in the late afternoon, and the following scenes in the evening. Many of the songs were well-known to all the audience, including "By the Waters of the Minnetonka" and the "Indian Love Call". The rendition of the latter by Frances Twibill and Jack Van Brunt will long be remembered by those who heard it. The Indian Dance was a novelty that seldom is seen in the Linden High Auditorium. To help in making that evening of May tenth a success, the Linden High Orchestra and Band gave a concert, under the baton of Mr. Malpas. Members from both these organizations are sent to the All-State Orchestra.

MIXED CHORUS

When students join either the girls' or boys' glee club, Miss Kantner tests their voices. Those whose voices meet the necessary requirements are chosen to make up what is known as the Mixed Chorus. This is a comparatively new organization, being in existence only two years, and having about fifty members. The meetings are held at 7:55 A.M., usually on Tuesday, but when programs are being prepared, special rehearsals are called by Miss Kantner. The Mixed Chorus is a great favorite with the students at assembly programs, and with adults at the various P.T.A. programs at which they entertained. From this organization are chosen the students to represent Linden High School at the All-State Chorus.

It is not all work for the members of the chorus Very often they themselves choose the songs they want to sing. The most popular request is "Listen To the Lambs". This seems to be the favorite of almost all the students in the organization. In the Christmas program, and in the May Festival, the mixed chorus played an important part. It had its own place in the program, just as the orchestra or either glee club had. The experience that those who participate in this organization gain in choral and solo work goes a long way towards making them better singers.
LITERATURE CLUB

One of the most interesting and cultural organizations in the school is the Literature Club. Its purpose is to encourage a better appreciation of literature among the students. To promote this, the club sponsors each year a poetry and essay contest. To the winner of each division a prize of \$2.50 is awarded. In its meetings the group also endeavors to maintain the spirit of creation as well as that of appreciation.

Every other month the Literature Club holds its meetings in conjunction with the Library Squad. At these meetings the members of both groups are privileged to hear men and women connected with various phases of literary activity. Among these was Miss Viola Maihl, head of the local public library, who brought with her numerous current books. Other speakers were Miss Ida Pruitt, who spoke on Chinese co-operatives, and Mrs. Janes-Earles, a former resident of New Zealand.

In spite of its intellectual industry, the club also finds time for other activities. One of the most important of these is the annual dramatic production presented in assembly. The play selected this year was "Where But in America?" The play was preceded by a reading of the poem "I Am an American." Because of the topic concerned, this program was one of the most timely presented in our assembly during the year.

The Linden High Chronicle, published bi-weekly by the students, has for the sixth consecutive year been faithful to its policy of serving the school body. The paper is a member of the Columbia Scholastic Press Association, which holds its annual convention at Columbia University each spring This year as in the past it was represented by its Editor-in-Chief, Adviser and five other members of the staff. The convention, which lasts for three days, consists of various lectures and exhibitions. At the end of the third day a formal banquet is held in one of New York's largest hotels. Various speakers of national importance are always present.

The Chronicle has always proved itself popular with the students, because of the wide field it covers. It not only writes the past news, but attempts to predict coming events throughout the school. The paper is one of the finest school publications in this section of the state, and was awarded a third class honor rating at the Columbia Press Convention. It is a self-supporting newspaper, soliciting advertisements and charging low subscription rates to the students. The Chronicle also maintains a mailing list for those people out of school who wish to receive their copies. It has definitely become a part of the school activities, and the "power of the press" is fully realized.

The first or "front page" of the newspaper usually contains the latest school news, after having been covered in detail, by capable reporters. A forecast or perhaps a summary of the latest assembly program or play usually is found on the first page also. Additional articles that are usually found along with the aforementioned are an interesting feature story, the coming social events dances, and any club news or activities that demand special attention. Occasionally articles about the graduates of Linden High School appear on the page also. The editor tries to make the layout appear attractive, and it is executed in professional style. The second page, which is called the "editorial page", is perhaps the most widely read page in the entire newspaper. In addition to "Four Years," the Chronicle's traditional column, are "Query", "Passed by the Non-Sensor", "Chits and Chats", "Student Celebrities", and "In Our Mailbox." Four Years covers the entire school in the way of gossip and human interest stories. In the "Query" column the students are asked various questions of interest. "Passed by the Non-Sensor" is a column designated purely for humor and is written as such. "Student Celebrities" is very interesting, inasmuch as a brief biography of well-known students is cited. "In Our Mailbox" publishes letters received from students. The paper is fully aware that it cannot succeed without the co-operation of the students, so "it aims to please," and it can do this only by following constructive criticism.

The third page of the Chronicle is in its entirety designated for sports. At the beginning of each season for a particular sport the prospects are written up after an interview with the coach. At the end of each season a review is written. Each game played by the varsity teams is accurately written up by a reporter who witnesses the games. Some of the interscholastic sports that the newspaper covers are football, basketball, baseball, track, golf and tennis. Interclass sports also receive much attention on the sports page, along with girls' sports, which are growing in popularity. This year another one of the odd features in the paper was that most of the important interscholastic activities were covered by a writer of the "fairer-sex", proving how progressive and liberal-minded the Chronicle is. The sports page is always one of the last pages to be made up in order that the latest news may reach the student. This year the scholastic teams achieved much honor throughout the state in their respective sports, but nowhere did they receive more attention or credit than in their own publication. The sports page is definitely one of the greatest attractions. Turning to the last page, the reader finds "We 'Uns," "Club Clippings," and "Off The Aisle." "Club Clippings" covers the club meetings throughout the school. "We 'Uns" is a column that has been, in the past year, written by a freshman, and very capably done. It is the answer to the underclassmen's query of "how to get in the news?" The column "Off The Aisle" covers the assembly programs, giving a brief review and usually a list of the cast of the program.

In addition to the Reporter and Editorial Staff the newspaper is composed of the Business Staff, which is divided into the business, advertising, circulation, typing, and collecting departments. In all there are about sixty members working on the paper. In addition to the enjoyment received in publishing the school newspaper, the students learn many useful things which they may be able to use in later life. The Chronicle fosters many friends, it is very popular, and it truly "covers" Linden High School.

PHOTOGRAPHY CLUB

The Photography Club is made up of members of the school who are interested in taking, developing, and enlarging pictures. It is not a club for people starting out in photography but for advanced amateurs. The members meet to discuss new processes, films, and other developments and innovations. They also work out formulas among themselves for different types of film and paper development. In the latter part of the year, they turned towards direct color photography.

Since this is a small club, which can do very little photographic work in school, most of the work is done at home in private darkrooms and then brought to school, where it is criticized by other members. At one of the meetings William Hartman gave a talk on flashlight pictures and demonstrated a flash gun. Ernest Segesser presented a talk on portrait lighting and composition, while Edward Hempel discussed miniature cameras and their use in present day commercial work. Gunter Gammisch talked on color photography, its commercial advantage, and the processing of pictures in full color. Throughout the entire year, pictures were brought to the club meetings, where members gave their opinions on what kind of finishing they should have in regard to papers and tones.

FISH AND GAME CLUB

One of the most distinctive groups in Linden High School is the Fish and Game Club. Composed of students attracted to outdoor activities, especially hunting and fishing, the membership of this club is small, but exclusive. About the only requirement for joining the club is an interest in the various phases of hunting and fishing. At its monthly meetings, various topics of interest to the members are presented and discussed. Often various procedures are demonstrated by the members of the club especially proficient in them. Because of the laws of the state of New Jersey, most of the club's activities are confined to the indoors, although the individual members often try out the suggestions presented. As its annual trip, the Fish and Game Club visited a sports show in New York. Under the guidance of Mr. Walker, the club adviser, the members hope to stimulate the interest of outdoor sports among the student body and to encourage these activities.

STAMP CLUB

The Stamp Club is one of the many school clubs pertaining to hobbies, for all those who are members of this organization have as their hobby stamp collecting. During the club meetings the members exchange stamps, and discussions are held on philatelic topics. Mr. Piper, the club adviser, has been a stamp collector for many years, and has a large collection. The club has, through Mr. Piper, been able to obtain the first issues of many special stamps, and in many cases had letters mailed on the first flights of the newer air lines. In this manner many stamps are obtained that may, at some future date, be of considerable value.

The organization is one that stamp collectors find very useful, both in increasing their collections and in obtaining information on the newer issues.

FOOTBALL

When several capable lettermen from the North Jersey Group III Championship team of 1938 appeared in answer to Coach Cooper's call for football candidates, a successful season appeared in the offing for Linden High School. These returning veterans were joined by a large group of boys who sought to win a permanent place on the squad. After weeks of hard practice, Linden's newest gridiron machine was ready for its initial test. From this opening encounter, which saw the varsity opposed by a strong alumni eleven composed of former stars, the "Little Tigers" emerged victorious when Stanley Olearcyzk dashed across the goal-line as the clock ticked off the final seconds.

The following Saturday Red Bank High's strong aggregation journeyed from South Jersey to destroy the hopes for a second undefeated season. The locals were unable to cope with the clever aerial attack launched by the visitors, who, aided by several fumbles by the high school, scored three touchdowns to triumph 19-0. The next team to face the Orange and Black was Linden's traditional rival, Rahway, which was undefeated at that time. Led by "Gibby" Givens and "Ed" Kasmin, the high school scored its second victory of the season, 14-0.

Continuing their winning ways, the "Bengal Eleven" journeyed to Dover to win 18-0. "Ed" Kasmin provided a thrill when he dashed nearly ninety yards to tally a touchdown. Roselle and Woodbridge were the next to suffer defeats at the hands of the locals. The former was defeated 13-0, while the latter lost 14-0. The Woodbridge game saw Linden play its best game of the season, as the hard-charging line and shifty backfield, led by "Gibby" Givens, worked with precision to register the triumph.

Next on Linden's victory parade were the hapless contingent from Carteret, which succumbed 26-6, and Hillside, which wound up on the short end of a 14-6 score. Finally, on Thanksgiving Day, Linden met a determined Union eleven on the local field, losing 8-0. Although Linden High School was unable to retain its championship, the season was none the less successful with seven games won and two lost.

BASKETBALL

When Boris Woytowicz and Oscar Givens, outstanding stars of Linden's Union County Championship team of 1939, returned to action once again, a successful season was anxiously hoped for. This year Linden was a member of the Union County Big Five Conference, a league composed of five Union County high schools. Linden in addition to Rahway, Cranford, Plainfield, and Regional was to battle for the coveted title of Union County Big Five Champion. In the season's opener, Linden met its initial test against a Big Five opponent when they traveled to Springfield to battle a strong team representing Regional High. Fighting off a desperate last quarter rally, the Orange and Black emerged triumphant, 25-23. The next team to face the "Little Tigers" was Cranford High, another member of the newly organized league, who succumbed to Linden, 26-12. Meeting an imposing Alumni quintette composed of former stars, Linden triumphed when Jack Mulhall sank a basket in the "sudden death" over-time period. Linden next entertained North Plainfield, defeating the visitors 43-22. Next on the schedule was Linden's rival for the Big Five Crown, Rahway, who in a furiously played game defeated the Orange and Black by the slender margin of one point, 27-26. Following this defeat, Linden met Plainfield High once again in a return engagement. Scoring almost at will throughout the contest, Linden repeated its previous defeat of this Big Five Conference opponent by trouncing them 49-20.

BASKETBALL

The Maroon Marauders of Hillside were the next to test the mettle of the "Little Tigers" quintette. Leading all the way, Linden accounted for the sixth win of the season by finishing on the heavy end of a 42-30 score. Invading Linden's home court, the "Farmers" of Union High School were defeated by a 28-20 score in a game featured by the work of John Andrejcio and Linden's able reserves. Before a capacity crowd Rahway High once again defeated Linden, this time 42-36. Trailing 24-10 at the half, Linden, led by "Butch" Woytowicz, surged back to tie the score at 34-34, before finally succumbing to the "Spanktowners". Bounding back from their second defeat of the season, Linden next downed Regional High for the second time, 49-29. This game saw "Butch" Woytowicz and "Os" Givens once again lead the Orange and Black to victory as they tallied nearly half of the total number of points amassed by the local quintette. Travelling to the spacious gymnasium of Cranford High, Linden ran wild in the second quarter of the game to account for twenty-one points, as they defeated the Blue and Gold, 43-22. Playing Plainfield at home, Linden fired shot after shot through the lacing to account for the amazing total of sixty-three points as against their opponents' twenty-seven. Largely responsible for this high score was "Butch" Woytowicz, who shattered the all-time high scoring record for one game established by Al Nogi in 1931 in a game against Elizabeth Vocational School. Woytowicz scored twenty-seven points to equal the number of points made by the entire Plainfield squad.

Traveling to Carteret, the Linden team once again emerged victorious when they defeated the "Boilermakers" in a hotly contested game, 35-22. Thomas Jefferson High of Elizabeth was the next to feel defeat at the hands of Linden when their rally faltered in the final minutes. The hapless contingent from Newark Central High was overwhelmed by Linden, 60-17. Equaling the previous all-time high for a Linden five, the Orange and Black decisively trounced Westfield High, 68-37. In this overwhelming victory Linden was paced by Givens with seventeen points and by Woytowicz with twenty-one points. Union High was then defeated by Linden, 44-17, as they tried desperately to penetrate the impregnable zone defense set up by Linden. Unleashing a high speed scoring drive, Linden disposed of a gallant Roselle Park team, 53-33. The first half was a nip and tuck battle with neither side able to gain a commanding advantage. Following the half time intermission, however, Linden scored at will to win. Winding up the regular season, Linden swept North Plainfield High off the floor to win, 45-29.

When the results in the Big Five race were tabulated, it was found that Rahway and Linden were deadlocked for the lead, making a play-off game necessary to decide the championship. Playing in the Cranford gymnasium, Linden earned its first victory of the season over the Rahway five when, led by Andrejcio, Reagan, Givens, and Kasmin, Linden won 30-26. This triumph gave the Union County Big Five Trophy to Linden. Playing in defense of the County Championship, won last year in the county tournament, Linden was defeated in the first round by an inspired Plainfield team, 34-31. Trailing 21-26 at the beginning of the fourth quarter, Plainfield found the range to outscore Linden and win. In the opening round of the State tourney, Linden met and defeated Summit. Following this, Linden again defated Rahway, this time by a 26-24 score, when "Lolly" Beriont sank a goal in the overtime period after Givens had tied the score with two foul shots, second before the close of the game. This victory gave Linden the North Jersey, Division 2 Group III title. Meeting Bound Brook in the semi-finals of the State tournament, Linden lost after a gallant fight to place its season's total at twenty games won against four lost. Boris Woytowicz's feat of scoring two hundred fifty-one points established a new record for Linden High, while "Os" Givens, star center, was close behind with two hundred forty-one points to his credit.

GIRLS' SPORTS

It is with great pleasure and anticipation that the girls look forward to the announcement of the beginning of the sports' season. The girls' sports start in October and usually attract a great number of girls, both as participants and as spectators. Much is usually written and said about boys' sports, but how many know anything about what the girls do? Probably only a very few of you.

Beside the fun and excitement to be had, the girls are rewarded with a major "L" on Gift Day. To get the "L", for which every girl strives and which produces keen competition, each girl must have earned 300 points. The girls who are not fortunate enough to earn 300 points but who manage to reach the 200 mark are awarded a numeral indicating the year that the girl will be graduated. Probably some of you are wondering how a girl will ever get so many points. It does sound like a lot, but this is how it is done. First, however, you must remember that all girls do not get "L's" or numerals, but are rewarded through their enjoyment of the sport.

In order to receive any credits, a girl must be an A. A. member. Then she may "join in" and win her points. The girls have quite a full season. As they enter the large gym at the beginning of the year, they hear such sounds as "your serve"—and immediately know that volley ball has started. Volley ball has been quite popular among the girls of Linden High School. On each team there are eleven girls. A captain is chosen by each team. The four teams are the Seniors, Juniors, Sophomores, and the Freshmen. This year the Seniors were lucky to have as co-captains Sophie Popiel and Geraldine Alber. The Juniors placed their hopes in Catherine Scizak, while the Sophomores elected Alberta Davis. The Freshmen put their fate in the hands of Helen Mahar, their captain. This season the Juniors proved their ability by taking the lead, winning five games and losing one. The Sophomores surprised the school and took second place, winning four games and losing two. The Seniors were rather disappointed that they won only three games and lost three. The Freshmen came in fourth place; however, they gave the other teams quite a bit of competition. Much of the strife was between the Juniors and the Seniors, each class trying to outdo the other.

GIRLS' SPORTS

The spectators do a lot toward the winning and enjoyment of the games. It doesn't take a spectator long to choose her favorite team and start cheering for the players. At all games there is always sure to be a keen competitive spirit and much excitement.

Before going on to the other sports, perhaps it would be better to explain the value of taking first place, second place, and third place. For first place, the winning regular team receives 100 points; for second place, 75 points; for third place, 50 points; and for fourth place, 35 points. There is a proportional amount for substitutes. These points are good for volley ball and basketball.

For foul shooting the girl winning first place takes 100 points; second place, 85 points; third place, 75 points; fourth place, 65 points; fifth place, 55 points; and so on down.

The members of the track team are also rewarded. The points are apportioned as follows: 100 points for first place; 75 points for second place; 50 points for third place. The members of the team winning the relay receive 75 points each, and the members of the second team get 50 points. In this sport, the members of the winning team for all the events each receive a ten-point bonus.

Beside the points to be gained by participating in the school sports, a girl may make a few extra points by doing outside activities, such as ice skating, bicycling, archery, swimming, horse-back riding, roller skating, golfing, and playing tennis, badminton, and handball. In foul shooting one tries to get as many baskets as possible out of the allotted 75 shots. This year Margaret Danchisko, "41", proved herself quite skillful by making 53 baskets out of the 75 shots. This score is believed to be the highest score ever made at Linden High. In second place was Helen Raba with 49 baskets.

Basketball is the most interesting sport and usually has the highest attendance. Before the actual games start, the coach, Miss Siegman, usually conducts drills which help the girls who go out for sports. These drills include foul shooting, dribbling, passing and angle shots. This year the Seniors, who had to play three games against the Juniors, won the the title of "Champs". The Seniors had co-captains, Sophie Popiel and Geraldine Alber. The Juniors took second place with Carmella Lombardo leading the girls. The Sophomores had Lillian Woytowicz as captain, and the Freshmen with Helen Mahar as captain took fourth place. This year the girls have been more active in basketball. They have had the opportunity of playing the Union girls and the Hillside girls both at home and in Union and Hillside. Linden proved itself quite able by winning most of the games. The girls won more games at home than they did when they played away. At home for the Hillside game the scores were as follows: Seniors-Linden-16, Hillside-10; Juniors-Linden-15, Hillside-11; Sophomores-Linden-19, Hillside-16. For the Union home games-Seniors-Linden-11, Union-10; Juniors-Linden-28, Union-4; and for the Sophomores-Linden-3, Union-12. It was the only loss at home. After the games, the Freshmen girls served cake and ice cream to the visitors. The games were very interesting and attracted much attention. Another game that was looked forward to was the one that the Junior girls played against the faculty. The teachers played quite an interesting game and "put up a good fight". Although they were winning in the first quarter, they soon gave way to the Juniors. The teachers must have enjoyed the game, for a return game with the Seniors was scheduled. This time the faculty won.

The fourth sport is paddle tennis. Each girl chooses some one to be her partner. There are three weeks practice, and then the tournament. Much competition arises as each set of girls tries to be the winner. As one passes the gym, the rhythm of paddles hitting the balls can be heard.

The season of girls' sports ends in the late spring with track, which includes the 75-yard dash, broad jump, basketball throw, high jump, and the 300-yard relay. Again, for track, the girls begin training in classes, and as the weather gets warmer, they go down to the athletic field, where they finish whatever practice they need. The final track meet, which is held in May, is the last day of sports for the girls.

The last contact with sports takes place on Gift Day. When the girls receive their "L's" and numerals, beside the medals which they have won for track, and when they hear the round of applause from the audience, they are glad they worked as hard as they did for their awards.

TENNIS

Linden opened the 1939 season of its comparatively new sport, tennis, by meeting North Plainfield on the courts in Woodrow Wilson Memorial Park. From a bitterly fought match the powerful team from Somerset County emerged victorious, 3-2. The second match of the season saw Linden again nosed out by the smallest margins when the "Little Tigers" lost to Hillside, 3-2. Playing in Warinanco Park, the local raquet squad met Roselle Park and was shut out, 7-0. Continuing the season, the high school was again blanked when the Roselle team which had held the State Championship the previous year stroked its way to victory, 5-0.

The next opponents to be faced by Linden were Regional High, which defeated the locals 4-1, and Roselle, which duplicated its previous triumph over Linden. Playing Linden in a return encounter, the Regional netsters just managed to eke out a 3-2 win. Travelling to North Plainfield, Linden was again beaten, 6-3. Following this defeat, Linden was blanked by Hillside. Closing the season, Linden High's tennis squad was defeated for the second time by Roselle Park 3-2.

TRACK

In the early Spring of 1939, under the direction of Coach Goodwin, tryouts were held and the largest track and field team ever to represent Linden on the cinder path was selected. Following weeks of extensive preliminary practice, Linden's track team was ready for its first test of interscholastic track, opposing Hillside and Cranford in a triangular meet. After a bitter fight the Orange and Black succumbed to Hillside, which had fifty points, and to Cranford, which had forty-seven points, as compared with the locals' score of forty-six points. In the first dual meet of the new season, Linden defeated the Roselle Park Team, $52\frac{1}{2}$ -46 $\frac{1}{2}$. Continuing their winning ways, the Linden squad triumphed over Regional 53-46 and swamped North Plainfield $67\frac{1}{2}$ -36 $\frac{1}{2}$. Closing the curtain on the regular season, Linden was defeated in a thrilling meet by a strong Westfield team 50-49. The outcome of this event was in doubt until the completion of the final event.

Entering the County meet, Linden earned third place by compiling a total of twenty-two points. Competing next in the State meet, Linden amassed twelve points, largely through the efforts of fleetfooted "Jimmy" Chapman, who triumphed in both the one hundred yard and the two hundred and twenty yard dashes. In the same meet "Al" Kazary earned two points for Linden by placing fourth in the quarter-mile. The successful 1939 team was captained by Harold Belcher, capable half-miler, and Frank Barnacki, consistent winner in the one mile run. James Chapman and Richard Fusick, powerful shot-putter and discus thrower, were named co-captains to lead the Orange and Black through the 1940 schedule. For the first time in its history, Linden was able to compete in the hurdle events this year. With the return of many veterans, led by the versatile Chapman, who has gained recognition as one of the outstanding track athletes in the state, Linden seemed assured of a successful season.

GOLF

Under the direction of the coach, Mr. Piper, and the manager, David Rafelson, the golf team of 1939 played a series of twelve matches, winning four while losing eight. The squad was captained by Thaddeus Hubert, a veteran of several years of competition. The 1940 team held several practice sessions in the gymnasium before actually playing on the golf course. In the first rounds played, several new-comers to the squad proved themselves able golfers. Although the only veteran returning to the team is its captain, Frank Newell, a successful season is nevertheless anticipated.

BASEBALL

As the first signs of Spring became visible in 1939, Linden students began to think once again of the great national sport, baseball. The first few weeks of the spring training were spent in the gymnasium, where the boys worked out under the watchful eye of Coach Cooper. With the coming of more moderate weather the squad moved out of doors and began to prepare for its opening tests against Thomas Jefferson High of Elizabeth. Playing on the local diamond, the Orange and Black defeated the "Betsytowners" 9-4. Taking to the road for the next two engagements, Linden defeated Plainfield 6-5 and Roselle 6-4. Entertaining North Plainfield at home, the "Little Tigers" found themselves on the heavy end of an 8-4 score. The next game was a free-hitting game which saw the local contingent out-slug a determined Cranford nine 12-10. Hitting hard throughout the game, Linden runners crossed the plate eighteen times to trounce the hapless Roselle tossers 18-9.

Continuing its victory parade, Linden's fine team outscored Weequahic 14-10 and nosed out Cranford. The next diamond squad to feel the power of Linden's bats was Central High of Newark, which succumbed to the locals, 14-4. Following this, Linden's bombers met the strong team from Carteret and for the only time in the regular season found themselves on the short end of the score. Rebounding back from this setback, the locals crushed Roselle, Hillside and North Plainfield in order, by scores of 5-4, 7-3 and 12-5, respectively. Bringing the season of scheduled games to a close, Linden entertained Carteret in a return engagement from which the Orange and Black emerged victorious, 3-1. At the close of the regular season Linden entered the Greater Newark Tournament, meeting powerful Irvington in the opening round. After a hard fight Linden went down to defeat 10-8, to bring the season's total to two games lost and thirteen games won. Following the tournament, outfielder Boris Woytowicz was voted the outstanding interscholastic player in the State of New Jersey.



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
