







# THE CYNOSURE

When he married he and his young bride loaded all of their belongings into a covered wagon and joined a wagon train which was going west.

cult task of the costume and property committees and the stage crew. The final job of the play reading committee is to select the cast for the play. Try-outs are held in the afternoon, and after much consideration the cast is finally picked and the members of the various committees are appointed.

The stage crew has charge of the scenic and lighting effects. Very often a whole new set must be made or else one of those on hand is repainted. The property committee obtains the furnishings and individual props. The costume committee assembles the various garments needed. All make-up is done by the make-up committee with the assistance of Miss Gilkeson. This committee also does work for other plays aside from Dramatic Club productions. It has proved itself very valuable to the school. The publicity committee for the fall performance makes posters advertising the coming play. Everyone in the school is proud of the Linden High School library. The students realize and appreciate its high standing among the libraries of the state. Not a little of the credit is due to the student library squad, supervised by our librarian, Miss Waterman. This squad consists of a group of thirty-five fellows and girls who have offered their service because of their interest in the work and also for the practical experience it affords them. The squad is an activity which has vocational possibilities. #### SECRETARIAL STAFF

From the time she enters High School, the commercial girl in the secretarial group looks forward to her senior year, when she may receive a secretarial appointment. Perhaps you are wondering what these appointments are. Well, they constitute actual practice for jobs that the girls hope to get when they graduate. The practice is made possible through the cooperation of the teachers in the school who employ the girls for a period of one-half year at a time. At the end of that time the girls receive new jobs with teachers in other departments. This is done to enable them to become proficient in a variety of duties. The girls who are chosen for secretarial positions receive them because they are capable of doing both their classwork and the required work of their teacher-employer. Their duties are individual tasks which must be done by the secretary alone. In this way the girls develop self-reliance. Other valuable qualities which are strengthened are initiative, sense of responsibility, and a habit of accuracy. When they have completed their secretarial work they realize that they have at last passed the first milestone toward success in the business world because of the skill they have acquired. This knowledge is not merely from books but is composed of actual practice in performing duties which they may later encounter.

At the end of each marking period, the girls, after keeping a careful record of their time, submit this to Miss McBride. The teacher employer likewise rates the girls on the quality of their work and the manner in which they do it. These two reports are combined and each girl has a private conference with Miss McBride, who indicates faults that may be improved and praises especially meritorious work. There is also maintained a secretarial staff in charge of a head stenographer. This staff goes out "on call" to teachers who have no regular secretary or whose secretary may be absent. On the whole the work is invaluable in teaching the girls how to adapt themselves to office routine and assume responsibility. Incidentally, the assistance they give is of great help to the teachers.

The purpose of the Commercial Club is to help students have a better understanding of the subjects we list under the heading of commercial; it does not confine discussions merely to the fundamentals typewriting and stenography. All personality, vocational, and character traits that are of as much, if not more, importance in a secretarial position are taken into consideration. Among these are loyalty, personal appearance, accuracy, initiative, courtesy, business likeness. Each point may seem small and insignificant to the student just now, but these very factors are those which an employer looks for and expects of his secretary, stenographer, or clerk.

Part of each meeting is devoted to talks and discussions. Some of the topics that have found their way into these interesting discussions are how to apply for a job, various colleges and business schools which commercial students may attend to further their education, how to act in the business world, and how the defense program has affected business. One meeting was devoted to a typewriting quiz; another to a spelling bee. The questions covered the following points: the different parts and types of business letters, how each is treated, various rules governing the set-up of letters, where to place special titles and subjects, how to fold a letter, styles of letters, how to address envelopes. Insead of the usual initiation party, which is so painful to the new club members, a welcoming party was held.

The requirements for membership in the Commercial Club this year are not so strict as in former years. The only qualifications are that a pupil must take at least two commercial subjects and have passing grades in all of his subjects. Boys as well as girls belong to the club. 

# VARSITY FOOTBALL

Coach Cooper and his assistants, Coaches Goodwin and Nogi, sounding the call for football, were confronted with green material, which was to be built around the co-captains, "Lolly" Beriont and "Dee" Dalziel. By the time for its initial test against the Alumni, the team showed great strength that was to prove the downfall of a hard-fighting Alumni team. In their first real encounter, the "Little Tigers" proved their power by subduing the "Grads" 13-6, thus inaugurating in fine manner the first night football game in the history of Linden High School.

Linden's hopes of an undefeated team were shattered when Perth Amboy's powerful eleven came from behind in the last quarter to win the game 13-7. The following Saturday Linden, ably led by "Lolly" Beriont and "Joe" Cassino, traveled to Red Bank to down a rugged, aggressive team 25-0. Linden's next opponent was its traditional rival Rahway, and for the first time in ten years Linden lost, 19-0. Linden also lost two capable backfield men, "Stan" Olearczyk and "Ernie" Nerges, injured during the game. The following Saturday Dover came to town, but succumbed 13-6, after a hard battle.

Roselle, next in line, was beaten 20-0. "Joe" Cassino passed brilliantly and "Willie" Fecho and "Jack" Van Brunt showed hard line play. Election Day brought Woodbridge to Linden, and when the final gun sounded, Linden was on the short end of a 6-0 score. "Johnny" Gaydos, another Varsity man and a valuable guard, was injured. Undefeated Carteret remained undefeated the following Saturday, coming through in the last quarter to topple Linden 20-0. Linden's quarterback, "Lolly" Beriont, did some of his best running. The "Little Tigers," minus Beriont, Dalziel, and Cassino, bowed to Hillside the next Saturday 28-0. Linden fought hard and played clean, and was not unbeaten until the final gun. Finally, Linden traveled to Union on Thanksgiving Day to overpower the Unionites 14-0. Playing their last game for Linden High School, Beriont, Cassino, Van Brunt, Fusick, and Fecho stood out above all the others, although the returning men put everything into the game for the graduating members of their team. In spite of injuries to three of Linden's valuable players, the "Little Tigers" ended their season with five games won and five lost.

# JUNIOR VARSITY FOOTBALL

The Junior Varsity football team is tremendously important to the Varsity because it builds up inexperienced but game youngsters into hard-fighting, hard-playing sportsmen. The "Jayvee" games are always closely followed by fans and coaches alike, because the next year's Varsity will more than likely be built of the most promising players on the team. Reporting to Coach Goodwin on the first day of practice were a group of boys new and untried in high school football. From this material sent to him by Linden Junior High School, he had to build an entire new team, since there were no players left from last year.

After many weeks of long and strenuous practice, the "Bone-crushers" were well-prepared for a hardfighting Cranford team. They proved their superiority by defeating Cranford 13-6, thus opening, in fine manner, a new season. Next to be taken on were the "fighting men of Jefferson". Linden had the short end of the score for more than two-thirds of the game, but finally came from behind, with only two minutes left to play, to tie Jefferson 6-6. The following week an unbeaten and unscored upon New Brunswick team visited Linden. They had a tough tussle with our boys, lost their unscored upon record, but came through to win 7-6, and keep their unbeaten record. Then came the undefeated Roselle Park second team. When the final whistle sounded, the Park team had lost to the "scrappy" Linden eleven, 13-0. Cranford returned for a second try, but lost again, this time by a score of 18-6.

The long-awaited final game with Carteret promised to be a thriller. The Carteret team was the biggest and one of the best-trained teams the "Bone-crushers" had had to face all season. Linden took the situation well in hand, however, and when the game was over was ahead 26-0. The Junior Varsity team ended their season with two losses, one tie, and four wins—a far better than average record. But this is nothing new to them, for they have always managed to obtain a percentage greater than .500.

### BASKETBALL

Led by Captain Walter (Lolly) Beriont, the Linden High School basketball aggregation of 1940-41 ended a very fast season with a total of ten wins and twelve defeats. Opening against a strong Regional outfit, Linden was beaten in their first start 44-32. Undaunted, however, the Orange and Black traveled to North Plainfield and promptly turned back the locals, winning by seven points. Cranford came next on the schedule, but the results were not the same as those with North Plainfield. Usually Cranford is a sure win for Linden. This time, however, led by Joe Duff, the Cranford quintet handed Linden its second defeat.

It seemed the Goodwin Charges had regained their winning stride when, after their defeat by Cranford, they took the next five games in a row. Among these wins was a strong Rahway team, which after stubbornly resisting Linden in a nip-and-tuck battle for three quarters, succumbed in the last minute of play by 2 points. The Alumni, Faculty, Plainfield and Union were also beaten by the "Tigers" in their winning streak. After Union, Linden traveled to Rahway and met a very determined quintet with blood in their eyes. Again a deadly neck-and-neck battle ensued, and at the final whistle, Rahway had evened their defeat by downing Linden 31-28. Central High followed in their second meeting of the season by the score of 31-29.

Hillside, Carteret and Jefferson followed in order and three defeats for Linden came with them. In the Jefferson game Linden showed some resemblance to a winning combination, but this quickly vanished when they relinquished a commanding lead in the second half and were finally beaten 28-24. Helman and Beriont ran wild, scoring seventeen points between them. The Hillside and Carteret games were runaways despite the efforts of Reagan, Vargo and Helman. Linden journeyed to Plainfield, and for a second time defeated the team, thus breaking their losing streak. Regional cut Linden's one game streak by decisively trouncing the Orange and Black 39-22.

North Plainfield came to Linden with the hopes of avenging their previous defeat at the hands of the "Tigers" and went away with their hopes fulfilled. Linden traveled to the armory again and met Hillside in the second round of the tournament. At the end of the game Linden was eliminated from the tournament. Following their defeat at the hands of Hillside, Portman, Reagan, Vargo, Beriont and Helman by now had gotten used to the taste of defeat and were not surprised when they again were defeated, this time by Roselle Park. The spunky Linden machine, tired of being the under-dog, turned fiercely on their next opponent, Union, and turned them back with a nine point margin.

How Linden received a bid to the State tournament is still a mystery, but the main thing is they did. Coach "Les" Goodwin feverishly worked with "his boys" to get them into winning shape. He took twelve men with him to the armory to do battle for the third time with their ancient foe, Regional. Larry Reagan was the big gun in the Linden attack, scoring more than half of Linden's fourteen points. Regional, however, as they had shown twice in the past, was too strong for Linden and again proved it by running rough-shod over Linden by a 24-14 score.

Throughout the season "Lolly" Beriont was the bulwark of the Linden defense as well as the main cog in the offense. Although slack at times Beriont ended with a total of 148 points and an average of 7 points a game. In the second Union game Lolly fell two points short of breaking "Butch" Woytowicz's all-time scoring record. Without a doubt Lolly Beriont is one of the greatest courtmen to wear the uniform of the Orange and Black. Horace Portman, although a disappointment from time to time, finished the season with a total of 131 points. Lenny Helman followed with 111 and Larry Reagan with 89.

However, at the end of the football season, Olive Clark was forced to drop out because of illness.

At each game, the cheerleaders elect a captain from their number. This is the first year that there have been no boys on the squad, and Miss Demarest likes it so well that boys in the future will be forced to pass rigid standards in order to retrieve their former position. Ten of the girls are graduating this year, leaving a vacancy which won't be too hard to fill, since many students are eager to join this exclusive group. To become a cheerleader students come out voluntarily in March, and practice with the old cheerleaders. Then Miss Demarest asks members of the faculty to pick the best ten on the basis of appearance, rhythm, knowledge of cheers, grace of movement, and willingness. Those picked must have passing grades in all subjects.

Cheerleaders are allowed only a certain number of excused absences from games. This year, there have been at least six cheerleaders at every football and basketball game. Our cheerleaders have shown their enthusiasm by originating special cheers, and buying the material for and making their own costumes. In the opinion of Miss Demarest and the entire school, this year's cheerleading squad was the best in Linden's sports history.

# GIRLS' SPORTS

The season of 1940-41 brought out a large group of enthusiastic girls, eager for the chance of earning enough points to rate the coveted "L" at the end of the year. If a girl is neither fortunate nor skillful enough to make 300 points, but does manage the 200 mark, she is awarded a numeral. After foul shooting came basketball where the Seniors again proved their ability by taking the basketball laurels—undefeated. The girls who played so well for their team were Captain Betty Jack, Claire Jolly, Katherine Ochocki, Marie Glowa, Catherine Scizak, "Pee Wee" Lombardo, Marion Neyen and Aline Potyk. This team will receive special emblems on Gift Day. The other captains for basketball were: Juniors, Catherine Mahar; Sophomores, Ruth Schreck; and Freshmen, Evelyn Walsh. Another jump in the progress of girls' sports is Play Day. The first Play Day to be held in Linden was in 1937, and it has been continued ever since. At this time the Seniors, Juniors and Sophomores of another high school come to Linden, or the Linden girls go to a school in a neighboring town for a series of basketball games. This year the Linden girls went to Hillside once and both Hillside and Union came to Linden. The results of these games were: at Hillside the Linden Seniors and Sophomores won, but the Juniors came home

The activities consist of running, broad and high jumping, basketball and softball throw. The results of last season showed that the Sopohomores came in first, closely followed by the Freshmen, Juniors, and Seniors respectively. The individual winners were: dash, Helen Chapman; broad jump, Catherine Scizak; high jump, Helen Chapman; basketball throw, Claire Jolly. The Freshmen team won the relay.

Last, but not least, is badminton, in which the competition is especially keen. Last season's winners were Grace Garbus and Helen Raba, Catherine Scizak and Marie Glowa, and Irene Sara and "Sheba" Mahar respectively. Although a Senior win appears imminent, it is hard to tell who will steal the sports spotlight at the close of the season. The final reward for the girls' efforts is the memorable Gift Day in June. On this day, the girls receive their "L's" or numerals to the tune of a cheering assembly, and realize that their efforts have not been in vain.

# TRACK

Finishing in a blaze of glory after a poor start, the Linden High Tracksters closed the 1940 season. After a defeat at the hands of Cranford and Hillside in a triangular meet, the silksters went on to a brilliant season, overthrowing the team rated to be the best in the state, Westfield, by one point. At the title meets, Linden placed sixth in the Union County Indoor Meet; sixth in a field of twenty in the Newark Board of Education Meet; fourth in the Union County Track Meet; and for the first time in the team's history, Linden placed in the upper brackets of the State Meet. Led by co-captain James Chapman, who won the 100 and 220 yard dash and placed third in the broad jump, and "Lolly" Beriont, who became state javelin champion, Linden placed a victorious second.

The Linden High Track Squad, hitting its stride, captured the first trophy in about a decade when they won the Ridgewood Individual Relays by eight points. With Jim and Leon Chapman and George Fusick cracking the records, and Hollosy, Sulsky, Swanson, runners-up, the squad found winning easy. With the introduction of hurdles to the school, Linden High did fairly well for its first try. Led by George Zavoda, whom Coach Goodwin rates as one of the future hurdlers of the state, the tracksters placed in all of the hurdle events in the school meets. Zavoda amassed over forty points to be one of the leading point-getters of the squad.

In the weight division laurels must go to "Lolly" Beriont and co-captain Dick Fusick. With Fusick placing third in both the Union County Indoor and Outdoor Meets and fourth in the Newark Board of Education Meet, Linden had potentially one of the best shot-putters in the state. Beriont, through grooming by Coach Goodwin, won the state championship, and lost the Newark Board of Education Meet by one inch. Placing also in both shot and discus at the school meets, Beriont placed second in the most points scored. Laurels to Coach Goodwin for turning out one of the best track squads in Linden High's history.

### BASEBALL

Finishing up with a season that is considered only fair in Linden, and excellent elsewhere, the 1940 Baseball Team won eleven games and lost three. In the Greater Newark Tournament, the Linden High School baseball squad beat Carteret in the first game. The second game was against a powerful Trenton team, and Linden was vanquished by the score of five to one. Linden's two other defeats were at the hands of Carteret and Hillside. Losing to Carteret and Hillside by one-sided scores of 18-2 and 16-5, respectively, the Linden High boys showed what they were made of by winning the rest of their games.

Paced by the slugging of Messrs. Walck, Malsam, Jeffries, Givens, and Woytowitz who finished above .350 in that order, it is no wonder that the team did so well. Richard Malsam alone batted over .400 making a cool .404. Pitching honors must go to Walck, who when not pitching played the field, finishing up with six wins and two defeats. Strike-out honors also go to Walck, who fanned 55. His earned run average was an enviable 2.73, one of the best in the state. Andy Babinec, sophomore sensation, won two and lost one, but was outstanding in relief roles. "Al" Yurick was expected to ease the burden off Walck's shoulders but made a poor showing. Behind the plate, Leili held down the chores. A weakstick-handler, Leili made it up by becoming a good handler of pitchers. "Ritchie" Malsam, who did little in the 1939 season, improved so rapidly that in 1940 he finished first in batting ability.

Walck and Woytowitz by their sterling performances at bat and afield were given tryouts by major league teams. Woytowitz graduated in 1940, and signed up with a Brooklyn Farm team. Walck, with one more season ahead of him is expected to sign up as a short stop, a position he can very deftly handle.

With the return of Reagan, Cassino, Olearczyk and Portman the prospects of the 1941 season have been strengthened.

### TENNIS

The Tennis Team of 1940 had the most successful season since the sport was first originated about four years ago. The team consisted of all seniors with the exception of one. This practically all-senior team offers quite a job for the coach in obtaining enough material for its 1941 season. The tennis team began its season by losing the Roselle Park Game by a score of 3-0. Their disappointment, however, was relieved the week later when they won the first game in the Linden High history of the sport. The tennis team won this match by defeating Roselle by the narrow margin of 3-2. The team had its ups and downs, for Linden dropped the next match to Regional by a score of 3-2. Later they evened the scores with Roselle Park by defeating them by the same score.

Probably the most exciting match of the season was played with North Plainfield at home. Every set was close, and North Plainfield managed to defeat Linden only by the narrow score of 3-2. Linden played the return match at North Plainfield and again lost 3-2 in another very thrilling contest. The season ended with Linden having won two and lost four matches. Still the margins of defeat were so slight that Linden might well have rung up a perfect season.

Tennis has grown to be a very popular sport, particularly with those participating in it. The players have had much enjoyment out of developing the sport into one of interest in the inter-city competition. Practically unknown to the majority of the high school students before, it is now becoming more and more important in the public eye and future years will probably see its rapid development. If this year's progress is any indication it may well become one of the more popular activities in the high school curriculum.

# **GOLF TEAM**

The 1940 Golf Team, under the direction of Mr. Piper, played ten matches, won three, tied one, and lost six. The team was led by its captain, Frank Newell, who was the only veteran to return after the 1939 season.

The season began April 30, with Linden winning the opening match from Rutgers Preparatory School  $8\frac{1}{2}$  to  $6\frac{1}{2}$ . Next Linden was defeated by a strong Regional team  $1\frac{1}{2}$  to  $16\frac{1}{2}$ . A day later the squad played a tie with Metuchen, the score being 9 to 9. During the next week Linden lost two matches by topheavy scores. The first was a defeat by Rahway  $\frac{1}{2}$  to  $17\frac{1}{2}$ . The second was by Roselle to the tune of 0 to 18. On May 18 the team played a return match with Roselle. They avenged themselves for their previous defeat by winning 10 to 8. After this win the Linden team had a slump in which they lost three consecutive games. They lost to Metuchen 1 to 17 and then dropped a close one to Westfield 8 to 10. During a return match with Rahway High they lost 0 to 18. On June 4 the squad played their last game of the year, finishing with a victory over Westfield. The score was Linden  $10\frac{1}{2}$ , Westfield  $7\frac{1}{2}$ .

The scoring leaders for Linden were Captain Frank Newell, who scored 11<sup>1/2</sup> points, and Walt Fryztak with a total of 10<sup>1/2</sup> points. The other members of the team were George Hirst, "Red" Alber, Warren Eichhorn, John Murphy, George Uhl, and Edward Spader. Mr. Piper had high hopes for his 1941 team. Besides the high scoring combination of Newell and Fryztak, he had several newcomers from which to make up the rest of a successful squad.

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
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
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# THE CYNOSURE
