This fine club does almost the same kind of work as the Math Club, and on some occasions the same instruments are used. The transit is widely used. Actual pencil and paper work is also done. In the winter the club stays indoors, where each student makes a report upon instruments used. Discussions are held and questions asked of the student upon his or her topic. The discussions involve the use of the actual instrument itself. Problems are worked out to help the students with their mathematics. In the fall the club goes outdoors, where their knowledge is put into practice in practical applications, such as measuring the height of the school flagpole by instruments. They work upon the school lawn, calculating, computing, measuring, and recording their results. The Field Work in Mapping and Surveying Club certainly sets a fine example for the school.

On April 29 the relay team succeeded in rating 3rd at the Penn Relays. Then on the 14th of May the team moved to the Newark Board of Education meet, where Harasty scored ¹/₄ point.
