1946 FOOTBALL

Had they not been awarded the North Jersey Group III, Section 2, championship, Linden High School's gridiron warriors of 1946 would have proved a great disappointment to their following. This year's Orange and Black eleven, touted as one of the finest in local history at the start of the season, compiled a record of six triumphs, two ties, and one defeat. This record would be considered excellent at most schools, but, for the current Linden club, it was almost mediocre. However, when the State Inter-scholastic Athletic Association gave Coach "Ted" Cooper's team the sectional title in preference to undefeated Morristown, much of the stigma of Linden's lone loss to Rahway was removed.

The Coopermen initiated the campaign with a smashing 38-12 conquest of Cranford in the first night game played at Linden since pre-war days. Sparked by Paul Casino's two touchdowns, they settled the decision with a 20 point second period drive. Roselle Park was the next to feel the power of the local T-formation, succumbing by a 25-7 count. Some 7,800 fans saw Tom Chapman take the opening kick-off 76 yards for a score for the game's highlight.

Everything went wrong the following Saturday as an over-confident Linden team was the victim of the most stunning upset in the past ten years. Rahway scored through the air just before the end of the first half, and the Spanktowners made this slim 6-0 margin stand up for the remainder of the fray to ruin local hopes of a perfect season.

The "Tigers" rebounded to crush Dover under a' 32-0 score, but Carteret held them to a scoreless stalemate on a soggy field. Linden had six cracks at the line from inside the three-yard stripe during the last quarter and failed to tally. Woodbridge went down to a 25-0 pasting the following week, as Pete Bartus and Ernie Harasty stood out.

The Lindenites ground out a 7-0 verdict over a strong Hillside outfit by virtue of Chet Naiman's recovery of a Comet fumble in the end zone. Unbeaten Clifford Scott battled to another 0-0 draw with Linden in a fine defensive struggle on the home field. The Coopermen saw their best threat fizzle out on the Scott 15 with five minutes to play. However, they closed the year with a 19-6 Thanksgiving Day win over Union, as Greg Beriont and Larry Kinsella led the offense. Seventeen lettermen performed for the last time in their scholastic careers against Union.

Three locals were named to places on the various All-State teams chosen at the close of each year. Seymour Kaplowitz, right guard, Kinsella, right end, and Beriont, quarterback, were those honored.

BASKETBALL

With Coach Al Nogi back at the helm after a four-year absence, Linden High School's 1946-47 basketball team ranked with the best in the district. This year's quintet compiled the best regular season record for a Linden five since 1940, racking up 13 victories in 18 contests, and also had the distinction of reaching the final round of the county tournament for the second time in succession. However, the "Tigers," after taking Pingry, Union, and St. Patrick's without too much difficulty, dropped a heartbreaking two point decision to Regional in the championship game.

The Orange and Black lost its first two games to North Plainfield and Cranford. The locals won their first from Carteret and followed with a memorable overtime victory over Rahway. After having an "off" night against Regional, they really hit their stride, fashioning a nine game winning skein. They dumped the Alumni and proceeded to breeze past Plainfield, Union, twice, Rahway, North Plainfield, Cranford, and Hillside.

Edison became the ninth and most notable victim, succumbing to a sensational Linden drive in an extra period. However, the overconfident Nogimen were taken by surprise at Plainfield and handed a disappointing defeat. They withered before a torrid second-half rally by Jefferson in their next fray but bounced back to give their best performance of the season at Springfield, gaining a sparkling 45-29 triumph over Regional. Linden closed its schedule by edging out Roselle Park in a spine-tingling battle.

Larry Kinsella led the squad with 206 points during the season, while captain Paul Casino garnered 136. Although they didn't rate quite so high in the scoring column, the other members of the starting team, Dick Newell, Jack Callander, and George Martis, contributed much to a successful campaign through their fine floor play and timely accuracy.

Coach Herman Mopsick's Junior Varsity basketball team, composed of one junior and four sophomores, compiled a season's record of 10 wins and seven losses. Led by Ed Burke, who was high scorer for the year with 130 points, the Tiger cubs gave an excellent account of themselves and promised to provide good material for next year's Varsity. Stan Cutler tallied 95 markers to rank second in the scoring department.



Despite the fact that they lost two of their first three Union County Conference games, the 1946 edition of the Linden High School baseball team succeeded in winning both the county championship and the North Jersey Group III, Section 2, title. The Coopermen, missing five regulars from the 1945 nine, compiled the enviable record of 14 triumphs in 19 starts, including a string of eight consecutive victories. Highlights of the season were the 9-1 pasting administered to Roselle Park's Herm Hering; Billy Emrich's 15-game hitting streak; Murray Figlin's one-hitter against Edison; and the sweep of the double-header with New Brunswick. "Hard-Luck" Tommy Sara was the leading pitcher with a 5-3 record, although Figlin and Steve Wolf had perfect slates of four and two wins, respectively, without defeat. Larry Kinsella won 3 and dropped 2, and contributed some valuable help at third base. Emrich was the leading hitter with a mark of .348, while John Konchak slugged .333 and Rudy Sarro hit .328.
