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PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Mental education is not the only aim of America's high schools. Physical education is also a necessity. Nowhere else does the teenager learn team-work, sportsmanship, and self-discipline as he does in his physical education program. Every man, whether participating in practice, intramural, or a varsity game, must carry out the job assigned to him. Upon one person may depend the entire outcome of the play. As he learns to accept triumph gracefully, so he learns to accept defeat with equal

grace. Habits formed here last a lifetime.

Every pupil must complete 150 minutes of gym a week. This is usually broken into three forty-minute gym periods and one health period. The program is extensive and varied. During the warmer parts of fall and spring gym classes are held in Woodrow Wilson Park. Here pupils participate in basketball, baseball, touch football, and many other games. When it becomes colder pupils march, climb ropes, do calisthenics, exercise on bars, and learn basketball fundamentals. Heavy apparatus is also used. This is ideal for the tumblers in the class. Using heavy ap-

paratus includes exercises on the parallel bars, horse, bucks, springboard, and horizontal bars. The manly art of self-defense is also included in the physical education program, as boys are taught the fundamentals of boxing.

With all the muscle-developing activity, there is another important phase of physical education. Co-educational activities include barn and social dancing. Barn dancing is taught right before the Junior-Senior Barn Dance. This insures everyone a good time, because the basic steps are learned. Social dancing is held before the Senior Prom. All the popular steps are taught or smoothed out, depending on the pupil.

Along with inter-school and inter-class sports, there are some activities that are played in competition with other schools and are little known. One of these is bowling. This year Linden High won the Bowling Tournament sponsored by the Union County Interscholastic Athletic Conference

> Bowling Association. Also two Lindenites, Jerry Kuznitz and Leonard Birenbaum, placed first and second respectively in individual places. Next year we hope to have golf and soccer teams.

> The program for girls includes training in a variety of activities—exercises, games, and dancing.

This extensive program could not be possible without the aid of competent coaches. Heading the department of physical education is Mr. Edward Cooper, who has been connected with the High School for thirty years, first as coach and since 1939 as director of athletics and supervisor of physical education.

Others include Alfred Jakucs, baseball; Robert Smith, football; George St. Andrassy, basketball; Burton Arnold, track; Joseph Gaines, assistant basketball. Alfred Jakucs and Joseph Gaines are the regular teachers of physical education for the boys; Miss Florence Jakiel and Mrs. Julia Creitz for the girls. Several of the instructors are graduates of Linden High—Alfred Jakucs, Robert Smith, George St. Andrassy, Burton Arnold, and Mrs. Creitz. Robert Smith was a member of the glorious 1934 football champions, who were undefeated, untied and unscored on.

FOOTBALL 1953

The Linden High Tigers, behind the excellent coaching of Bob Smith, rolled on to their first winning season in seven years by clipping the Union Farmers, 14-12, on Thanksgiving Day before the year's biggest crowd of 6,000 fans. The Tiger forces hadn't defeated the Farmers since 1947, but this time the great Tiger aerial combination of quarterback Bob Hoffer, to sparkplug and team captain Sammy Pilot



quarterback Bob Hoffer, to sparkplug and team captain Sammy Pilot found triumph on an 81 yard touchdown pass late in the fourth quarter. For the year Hoffer, a six foot, 200 pound senior, gained distinction by tossing 89 pass completions in 156 attempts, eleven good for TD's. It is the county's record unofficially. Tackle Bob Jones' two extra point conversions ultimately proved the difference in the see-saw battle with the Farmers.

Bob Smith, former Linden High gridiron star, was one of the county's six new coaches and certainly one of the most pleased at the final outcome of five wins, three losses, and one tie.

After nipping the defending Group II champs, the Cranford Blues, 13-12, and blanking Newark's Weequahic Indians, 19-0, the Bengals suffered their first and only decisive setback at the hands of the Rahway Spanktowners. The Tigers haven't beaten the Scarlet dynasty since 1945. After tripping Long Branch, 12-6, Linden dropped two close affairs to Carteret and Woodbridge on last period defense col-

lapses. A one-sided trouncing of Regional, a deadlock with Hillside, and the crucial victory over Union provided the Tigers with the late season sweep that pulled them over the .500 mark. Linden's 30-13 romp against the Bulldogs from Regional was the largest scoring effort since the 32-0 landslide against Union in 1947.

Coach Joe Gaines' "Little Tigers" distinguished themselves as the class of the junior varsity ranks throughout the county both during the regular campaign and in post-season play. The Bengals, headed by the rebounding strength of Bob Fitzik, the consistent scoring of Jack Tirch and Red Sojka, the playmaking of Charlie Sayer, the hustle of John Crilly and the capable bench led by Pete Matz were able to win 13 contests in 17 regular season starts. Their overall record was 17 wins and 4 losses. The additional 4 victories were achieved in the J. V. tourney, when the fourth-seeded locals captured the title by whipping Roselle and Edison 54-32 and 65-31, by edging Jeff in a triple sudden-death overtime 49-47 and by clipping Roselle Park in the finals 40-38.

The campaign opened with Linden dropping a 39-38 decision to North Plainfield in one of their rare defeats. This loss was followed up with their longest winning streak of the year of ten games. The victims on the list were Rahway and Cranford twice, Union, Plainfield, Westfield, Regional, Hillside and Edison. Plainfield on a hot-shooting night put an end to the skein, and started the Tigers on a three-game losing binge. Jeff handed the hometeam a 69-43 trouncing, but they were avenged later in the semi-final thriller. Their final loss was handed out by Regional, 34-30. After that Linden was off once again on the winning trail with three wins in the regular season and four in the tourney to end a great year.

Coach George St. Andrassy's 1954 quintet distinguished themselves much more in post-season play than during their regular schedule, despite the fact that the Tigers enjoyed another successful campaign, winning 11 of 17 games. The reason for that is simple, since the Bengals were able to retain two of the three championships they were defending. For the second successive year the locals captured the Group 3, Section 2 Crown, and for the second time in as many seasons they led the Big Five with a conference high mark of 8-1, including the playoff. The "Little Tigers" achieved both feats in a similar fashion to the way it was done last year. A year ago Union and Linden battled for the Union County Title and the Big Five on the same evening. This time the opponent was Regional and the event took place in the state festival, with Linden once again emerging victorious in the double or nothing struggle.

Linden opened their regular slate by whipping North Plainfield, 75-64. They soon tasted defeat as a tough Cranford five headed by Ron Doyle pinned a 63-54 decision on them in their next outing. The home club regained their winning ways as they took care of their next three foes, Rahway, Union, and Plainfield, all conference opponents. The Victory with a game-deciding set shot in the last five seconds of play, breaking up a 53-53 tie. Westfield interrupted the string as they stopped Linden in overtime, 60-54. The Orange and Black then split their next two contests, as they defeated Rahway and lost again to Cranford in the year's greatest uphill battle. The Blues were down as much as 13 points with less than two minutes in the game, but they fought to a tie at the buzzer, eventually winning in overtime, 71-62.

The Lindenites woke up after that disastrous defeat, and played their best brand of ball, winning their next five. Victims in the streak were Regional, Hillside, Edison, Plainfield, and Jefferson. It was the first time since 1941 that the Tee Jays had dropped one to Linden. In the remaining four affairs we won two and lost two, as Regional stopped the skein, creating a dead lock in the Big Five.

In post-season play Linden was eliminated by Jeff in the second round, 68-58, failing to defend its county title. Previous to that game the team broke a school county scoring record and tied the tourney mark by walloping Sacred Heart, 88-56. The Tigers fared much better in state competition, beating Caldwell, Summit, and Regional in quest of their second successive sectional crown. In the state semi-finals we met Hamilton Township and after trailing at half-time, 34-32, we unleashed a potent attack of 49 points in the second half to climax an 81-65 rout. Snell led all scorers with 29 points, while Pilot, Winn, Riesner and Hoffer aided with top-flight performances. Cliffside Park shattered Linden's hopes for a first state crown by beating them, 57-37, in the final round.

The campaign opened with Riesener hurling a 5-0 shutout over Rahway. This was the first of four shutout victories over the county foes, for the young hurler good enough to tie a record. TRACK 1953

Coach Burt Arnold's track contingent of 1953 enjoyed a mediocre season, winning four out of seven dual meets. However, the squad was fairly successful in the special meets, compared to the teams of the few preceding years, and there were some very fine individual accomplishments.

Elias Gilbert, a versatile junior, was the most productive fellow on the squad. The co-captain gained the modern school scoring record for one season by notching 138 points, 102 in six dual meets for an average of 17 points per meet. He competed in both the high and low hurdles, plus the high and broad jumps. On various occasions he made a try at the 440 yd. run. He won the state title for the high hurdles in group 3 and was runner-up in the lows.

Three seniors, Mike Barrett, co-captain Alex Marshall, and Ron Treche, also shone in their own field. Al Nachtigall, along with Marshall, was the backbone of the weight squad. Barrett was a crack dashman, while Marshall gained honors throwing the javelin. He finished first in the County Meet and was runner-up in the State event. Treche specialized in the pole vault and picked up seven points in special meets. Marshall's best throw, of over 180 ft., was achieved at the Newark Board of Education Meet, where he captured first place. Gilbert broke the hurdles record at that meet, breaking the tape in 14.7 seconds.

The Tigers, minus Gilbert, opened the season against Regional with a 73-44 loss, due to a lack of points in the running events. This was followed by a heartbreaker to Rahway, which was decided on the final event. Linden then got going and picked up four straight victories over Roselle, Edison, Westfield and Hillside. They closed the regular schedule by losing to a great Cranford club 901/2 to 261/2.
