
Football


The end of the football season brought about the resignation of Coach Anthony Muccia. Hopefully, though, his replacement will return the gridders to winning form.









Attaining the highest level of quality soccer in over three years, the Linden High soccer team compiled the best record of any fall sport this year. Sporting a 7-8-1 mark, the booters, coached by Paul Garrett, had their largest

improvement in their much-needed, newly acquired scoring power. Leading the way in this department were sophomore Luis Garcia and junior Wieslaw Kwiecien. Garcia was named to the second All-Union-County soccer team, while Kwiecien, along with co-captain Ed Wolf and junior goalie Mike Battaglia, received honorable mention.

Also accounting for the successful change in the team's status, was the defense. Led by co-captains Ed Wolf and Chuck Sigmund, along with senior Ed Diamond and junior Dennis Mason, the defensive squad added depth to the '73 team. A strong bench further supported the expanded crew.

Experience and uniformity, lacking last year, completed the necessary requirements for a well-rounded squad. These additions enabled the soccer team to keep close with powerful Westfield and Union kickers and score heavily against Plainfield and Hillside.

Next year should bring LHS its most successful soccer season ever. With evergaining popularity, better administrative policies, a possible new playing field, hopeful recruits and experienced returnees, Linden High could be the area's new soccer power.



Linden's Varsity Cagers put together a fantastic season this year and came up with an outstanding 22-3 log. After being ranked number one in the county all season long, with their position in the state fluctuating between number two and seven, Linden just could not manage to secure any championship titles. All three Tiger losses came in tournament play: bowing to Bayonne (Hillside Holiday event), to Union by two points (Union County Conference festival) and to East Orange in the finals of the State sectionals. Missing these major titles, the Tigers did capture the American Conference as a new member of the Watchung Conference.

Student's enthusiasm swelled as the team played during the season. Never seeming to lose a game, the Cagers overcame such area powerhouses as Ewing, Plainfield, and Weequahic. The team's success can be attributed heavily to the large number of veterans of the '73 County Championship Team returning to give Linden not only great power in all aspects of the game, but also experience in tourney play.

Among those outstanding players on the team, Al Bakunas and Larry McGhee proved especially consistant. Often receiving headline praise in local newspapers, Bakunas received a position on the *New York Daily News* All-Star Team, along with the *Daily Journal's* placing him on the All-Metropolitan team, the All-Union County Team, The All-Group 4 team, and The American Division of the All-Watchung Conference team and the All-State second team. Also receiving newspaper recognition, Larry McGhee earned a position on the *Daily Journal's* All-Group 4 first team, the All-Union County second team, the All-Metropolitan third team, and the American Division of the All-Watchung Conference team. Veon Lassiter also attained a position on the All-Group 4 second team.















Wrestling is one of the few sports which is an accurate measure of individual strength. Success is determined by each wrestler's stamina, co-ordination, endurance and mental attitude. Led by cocaptains Rich Sauerwein and Gary Talbert, the L.H.S. grapplers wrestled their way to a record of 6-6. The new coach, Mr. Ted Thompson, advised the squad on additional leg movements which proved to be instrumental in their victories. The wrestlers practiced a grueling six days a week and dieted constantly to stay in top form.



The Political Science Club, in an attempt to interest club members in na-tional, state, and local politics, hosted numerous guest speakers for afternoon meetings. Among them, Union County Prosecuter, Karl Asch discussed the Judicial System and touched upon such topics as drug and law inforcement and legalized gambling at a November 7th appearance. John T. Gregorio, Mayor of Linden and Assemblyman of Union County on December 19th fielded questions from the audience, concerning such issues as traffic control and the effects of the energy crisis on the citizens of Linden. The Middlesex County legislator stated his opposition to the construction of an oil port off the New Jersey coastline, and announced that he also favored the impeachment of President Nixon.








In Tenebris





Although subscription fees for the eight issues were lowered a nickel to \$1.25, the *Chronicle's* profits decreased. The circulation staff spent many late hours after school folding papers. Also selling and distributing *Chronicles* during homeroom periods and at the junior high schools, the staff proved indispensable, but still much of the work and problems were left in the hands of the editors.

In Review

President Nixon now more than ever

Don't blame me I voted for McGovern

Support the President In the few months that comprise a school year, so many events, happenings and innovations take place. Yet, this short period is only a link in the continual and ever-changing chain of time. Inevitably, we look back and attempt to gain a perspective of the occurances which have transpired. And, always, those events take on a clearer and more definite shape as time goes on. We are close to all these happenings now, but, as the years pass, we shall realize more and more their effects on our lives and on the shaping of history.

WATERGATE

The year of 1973-74 has been perhaps the most crucial in all our political history. Our 37th President, Richard Nixon, has been faced with the scandal which threatens him with impeachment or resignation.

Beginning with what has been called an "unimportant," thirdrate burglary, Watergate has evolved into a cycle of corruption and deception. We, as Americans, cannot help but feel-disillusionment and a new wariness for governmental powers and the guardians of public trust. We have seen honor and law disregarded and immoral atrocities committed under the guises of "executive priviledge" and "national security." Illegal breakins, the Plumber group, enemies lists, indictments of President Nixon's top advisors, and political vindictiveness through such federal agencies as the IRS and FBI are only a few examples of the misused power of which we have been made aware.

Ferreted out by our country's still dependable legislative and judicial processes, these crimes led to further discoveries of dishonest and questionable activities. Through the Senate Watergate Committee, headed by the colorful Sam Ervin, and Judge J. Sirica's Grand Jury and with the aid of special prosecutor Archibald Cox, Elliot Richardson and capable journalists, the complex story of Watergate has unfolded.

Following the discovery of the famed Watergate tapes, and subsequent resignations of Cox and Richardson, President Nixon again found a crisis facing him. The tapes, have been secured after numerous court battles, proved to be fewer in number than expected and contained mysterious gaps. Said by one governmental advisor to be caused by "influences of an evil nature," the gaps served to further test the public's confidence in the President. When electronics experts' opinions indicated that the tape in question had been erased intentionally at least five times, the story of "Rosemary's boo-boo" unfolded.

This is as far as we are able to report on the Watergate saga, with the question of our President's fate yet to be decided.

THE AGNEW AFFAIR

More weeks of shock proved to be in store for the American public with the criminal conviction and world-embarassing resignation of Vice-President Spiro T. Agnew. Feelings of disillusionment again ran high as the man thought to be sincere in his doctrines of law and order, and potentially the next president, resigned in disgrace.

Faced with a situation unique in our history, a means for choosing a succeeding vice-president was found in the 25th amendment. The situation was resolved by the Presiden't nomination of a vice-presidential candidate, subject to Congressional approval. Thus, Gerald Ford, House minority-leader, became vice-president.

Once again there was war in the Middle East. But, this time, it was the Arabs who took the Israelis by suprise, beginning the three weeks of heavy fighting of the "Yom Kippur War". Through the diplomacy of Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and the cooperation of Israeli and Arab leaders, a settlement of troop and land withdrawals was brought about. Situations in Israel remained troubled, though, with Golda Meir's ponderance of resignation and the threat of the country's return to pre-1967 borders.

ENERGY CRISIS

In an attempt to force world opinion in their favor, Arab leaders united to control World oil supplies. Demands that Israel return territories seized in the 1967 war suddenly seemed reasonable to Japan and West European countries starving for fuel and facing a bleak winter. Although the United States, the Arab's main target, gets most of its oil elsewhere, we still felt the pinch of a 10% reduction in our oil supply. In answer to President Nixon's request for co-operation by the public in meeting the energy crisis, 55 mph speed limits became mandatory. Use of public and private electricity was cut, resulting especially in a darker Christmas season, thermostats across the nation were turned down, and gas stations were closed on Sundays in an attempt to conserve all forms of fuel.

NEW JERSEY

On the local scene, New Jersey adopted the odd-even day system of purchasing gasoline in an attempt to shorten the lines of panic buyers. This ruling was perhaps the first evidence of the ability of newly-elected Governor Brendan Byrne to cope with the problems of the state. Having received the largest victory of any gubernatorial election in state history, overtones of Watergate crept up. Some felt Byrne's victory to be a reaction to Watergate, while others maintained that individual votes of confidence won him the election. Nevertheless, Democratic landslides in upcoming elections remained a threat to the Republican party.

With oil supplies increasing as the Arab oil embargo lifted, the energy scare ended with the coming of spring. Governor Byrne revoked the odd-even day rationing system and more and more gas stations remained open on Sundays. Unfortunately, gas prices remained at their inflated levels.

SHORTAGES

In addition to the shortage of gasoline, we on the East Coast faced rising prices on bread, paper and lumber, milk and meat as a result of shortages in these products. A toiletpaper scare made many Americans realize just how much we have come to rely on certain "luxuries". Inflation and the devaluation of the dollar abroad, coupled with shortages and mass employee cutbacks by industries relying on petroleum products, presented a gloomy outlook for the American economy. Time has yet to prove the ultimate effect of these problems.

KIDNAPPINGS

Political terrorism, borrowed from Arab tactics, took the form of widespread political kidnappings this year. Patricia Hearst, daughter of millionaire Randolf Hearst, was held by the Symbionese Liberation Army for six million dollars worth of food for California welfare recipients.

South American groups were also paid ransom sums (which were usually demanded for welfare reasons, such as the construction of a hospital) for the safe return of American corporate heads.

In the recurring saga of the space age, successive teams of U.S. astronauts posted themselves above the earth in the orbiting space station Skylab. This phase of NASA exploration, although less thrilling than previous expeditions, proved man capable of living in space and laid the groundwork for future, more extensive, explorations.

SPORTS

This year, although filled with crises and traumas, also contained events of a happier nature.

In the field of sports, the entire world awaited the tying of Babe Ruth's all-time home-run record by Atlanta Brave Hank Aaron.

At the climax of the battle of the sexes at the Houston Astrodome in September, Billie Jean King proved the aging Bobbie Riggs to be the loud mouth he is.

Willie Mays retired from the game he loved and Mohammed Ali returned triumphant in his bout with heralded Joe Frazier.

ENTERTAINMENT

In the limelight of entertainment, films reached their highest popularity in the past ten years. Hits such as the moralistic and relevant *Serpico* and the sensational *The Exorcist* — which set off cravings for the occult and an exorcism frenzy — helped make the year successful. Nostalgia reigned king as was evident by such movies as Academy award-winner *The Sting, Paper Moon, American Graffiti*, and the re-making of *The Great Gatsby*.


The music world saw the rise of many new stars this year. Veteran vocalists such as Maria Muldaur, Melissa Manchester, Jackson Browne and Bonnie Rait finally reached substantial, though perhaps only fleeting, popularity. Another performer of many years, Stevie Wonder, received recognition for his considerable talent by winning both the critical and popular Grammy awards. Perhaps the most outstanding music happening of the year, though, was Bob Dylan's cross-country tour. Fans thronged his concerts and set off a wave of a Dylan revival despite critics remarks that Dylan performed almost perfunctory, lacking the strength of feeling that he once had. But the Dylan revival was only part of the huge nostalgia craze which swept American culture this year. Performers such as Bette Midler and the Pointer Sisters attracted many a follower with their campy clothes, and modified renditions of songs from the 30's and 40's.

Fans of all types of music felt shock and loss at the tragic, untimely death of Jim Croce. His sincerity and spontaneity, evident in all his recordings, attracted the admiration of countless people.

FASHION

As is to be expected of every year, the style and dress of students were unique to this school term, Jeans and short sweaters, jeans and tailored shirts, jeans and danskins were standard. Baggies retained their popularity, along with skinny belts. Handdryers, for many students, became indespensible to keep their shorter haircuts properly styled. Perhaps the most outstanding feature of this year's clothes, besides the outrageous costs, was the incredible popularity of platform and heeled shoes. Students stumbled around school in shoes built up over six inches, ranging in color from lemon yellow to passionate purple. Shoes up to seven tones, with socks to match, were common.

The LHS population always presents an interesting and complete spectrum of new and old styles, allowing a freedom and flexibility of dress that is both comfortable and economical.



Mathematics




Science



Vocational Technical School

To fulfill expanding needs in education, the Linden Area Vocational and Technical School opened its doors to four hundred students this September. The school, completed after three years, was built in answer to the growing demand for highly skilled technical workers.

Thirteen self - sufficient, modern shops have been designed to give students full knowledge of the machines, tools and operations of each trade. Generally, each course consists of a three year program based on three hours of study per day. Each course begins with an orientation into the shop in which students are introduced to all equipment. Safety is strongly emphasized for its vital importance to everyday shop work. Students learn in an informal atmosphere through actual participation, text book instruction, and practice of skills. Business aspects of each trade and methods of evaluating completed work are also taught. Lessons in related subjects, such as science and mathematics, help to furnish students with a complete understanding of trade operations. Teachers, in addition to their instructional duties, supply guidance and help to counsel students in career opportunities. Encouraging students to strive for quality, teachers try to impart professional attitudes and a sense of the importance of the professions. It is expected that, upon completion of a course, students will be able either to enter satisfactory employment or begin an apprenticeship.

Employment Orientation Program

Combining special education with employment preparation, this program utilizes the areas offered in the trade school to prepare handicapped students for positions in industry. Vocationally oriented training enables the students to better prepare themselves to be self-sustaining members of society.

Students perform various jobs for the Board of Eudcation. One such assignment is the production of meter sticks for the grammar schools, in preparation for the upcoming conversion from our present system to the metric.

This totally individual program enables the students to achieve their potential when it might otherwise have been stiffled.

Heating, Ventilation, and Air-Conditioning

The ability to service and repair industrial, residential and domestic heating, ventilation and air-conditioning equipment are the aims of this course. Students learn by dismantling and repairing various units, such as refrigerators, air-conditioners and furnaces. Electrical wiring, sheet metal work, principles of ventilation and installation, and trouble-shooting are among the areas covered. Positions in industry and servicing fields are numerous and varied.

Auto Shop

Servicing and repair of autos are the key objectives of this course. Students are introduced to the various components of the auto and learn about its many systems. Knowledge of material and equipment used by auto mechanics, interpretation of sketches and diagrams, and use of shop manuals are areas of basic importance stressed in the course.

categories with a foreman overseeing all work. Students are given a chance to work in each of these positions, which rotate on a weekly basis. A policy restricting cars that the students may service includes cars owned by the students and their families, Board of Education employees and various public and non-profit organizations.

After completing two years of the course, students may enter a co-op program or continue instruction in advanced technical skills.

Pies, cakes, cookies, breads, rolls, sweet yeast dough, and decorating are the units of study which the baking course covers. This course represents a true activity program with skill and learning expected to result from actual production. Initial instruction deals primarily with measurements, ingredients and basic procedures of baking.

Nearly the entire shop has combined to form the Junior Achievement corporation, Lindough. Production of pound cakes and fruit cakes, by order, help provide money to purchase supplies. Aside from J. A. products, the shop also sells baked goods on a daily basis. Career opportunities include bakers' positions in restaurants, hotels, hospitals and bakeries.



Carpentry and Cabinet making

Manipulative skills, use of hand tools, operation of wood-working machines, and knowledge of materials are fundamental areas covered in the carpentry and cabinetmaking course. Students are concentrated on all aspects of house building: foundation work, framing, roofing, staircase building, interior and exterior finish, cabinet making, and mill work. Students put into practice what they have learned by erecting scale model houses. Blueprint reading and related mathematics and science are also taught. Job opportunities exist in all facets of carpenty.

Commercial arts encompasses all art in the commercial field areas including advertisement, illustration, design and layout. Students in this course learn the basic skills and techniques, such as color, composition, drawing, painting, lettering, and photography, used in these areas. Students sketch from still life models, photographs, and landscapes. Relief and silk screen printing skills and the use of the photo typositor are also taught. Students learn to employ these various techniques to produce desired visual effects. At the conclusion of the course, students are expected to have completed a portfolio in preparation for entering employment.

In preparation for their state examinations, cosmetology students receive one thousand hours of instruction in both theoretical and practical phases of cosmetology. Bacteriology, hygiene, anatomy and physiology are among the theoretical phases of study. Practical aspects include all manipulative techniques such as shampooing, hair curling, coloring and setting, manicuring, and wig work. Girls practice on manikins and fellow students. After six hundred hours of practice, girls are given the chance to work with actual customers. Through this, students gain experience in dealing with both people and business transactions.

Career opportunities in cosmetology include beauticians, cosmetic consultants, cosmetic merchandisers, hair stylists, and manicurists.

Electrical Trade

This course emphasizes the basic skills needed in the use of all common electrical tools, stressing understanding of electrial instruments and their accessories. Students gain a thorough knowledge of materials and devices installed by electricians. In addition to learning installation of wiring and equipment in accordance with electrical codes, students learn maintenance methods and circuit analysis. Students gain practical knowledge through working with AC/ DC motor generators, setting up various experiments and running through numerous exercises. Both residential and commercial wiring are taught, leaving students employment options in electrical contracting jobs, the building industry and electrical repair and maintenance.

Radio and Television

Students in this course are instructed in the fundamentals of electronics. Development of abilities needed to repair radio and television eqiupment is the main aim. Students learn to construct, analyze and trouble-shoot electronic units, beginning with simple tubes and transistor circuits. Use of specialized electronics equipment and measuring devices is stressed and principles of computers taught. Skills in mathematics and science are essential for success in this field.

Welding

Application of the basic skills needed to make and read technical sketches and drawings are the goals of this course. Students learn the principles of orthographic projection and operation and maintenance of such sophisticated drafting equipment as the amonia and dry-developing copy machines.

Related mathematics and science are necessary for a complete knowledge of technical design. Through discipline of hand and eye and the use of precision instruments, students learn to translate ideas into working drawings. Tool, die, machine and architecture designing, electrical drafting, and production engineering are among career fields open to the students.





Electric, oxygen-acetylene, and inert gas welding are the three basic types of welding taught in this course. Techniques taught include manual and automatic oxygen-acetylene methods and tungsten and mechanical inert gas methods. Students learn to weld all types of commercial metals commonly used today. Related science, mathematics and blueprint reading are essential for successful understanding of the material presented.

Employment opportunities are endless for a competent welder and include such areas as construction and the automobile and sheet metal industries.



Graphic Arts

Teaching the basic skills of printing, this course emphasizes studies in composition, layout, platemaking, photo offset printing and photography. The shop is equipped with a complete darkroom and such machines as the tape photo-typesetter. Students gain proficiency through completing actual jobs. They are responsible for all Board of Education printing needs and often find themselves with assignments from city agencies and civic organizations. Although not seriously affected by the paper shortage, the shop did experience price increases and some difficulty in attaining supplies.





Machine Shop

This course is designed to teach students the use of all machines in the tool and die making industry. Tools and dies, which are instruments and devices used in mass producing machine parts, are used in numerous industries. Ability to repair these machines and to operate numerical tape control and electrical discharge machines are the basic goals of the course.

Job opportunities in this field are numerous and many exist in the surrounding area. One third of the junior-senior boys already are employed regularly. Careers include all-round machinist, repair machinist, mill wright, and tool and die maker.
