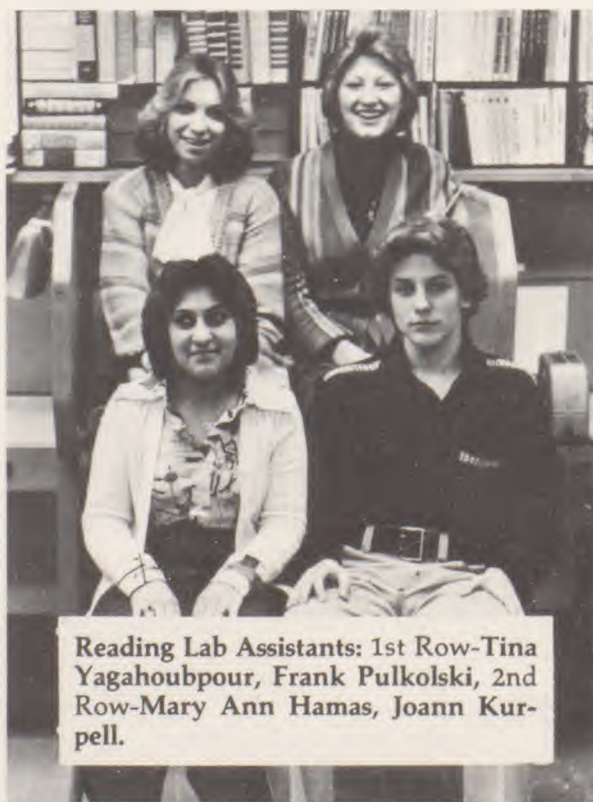

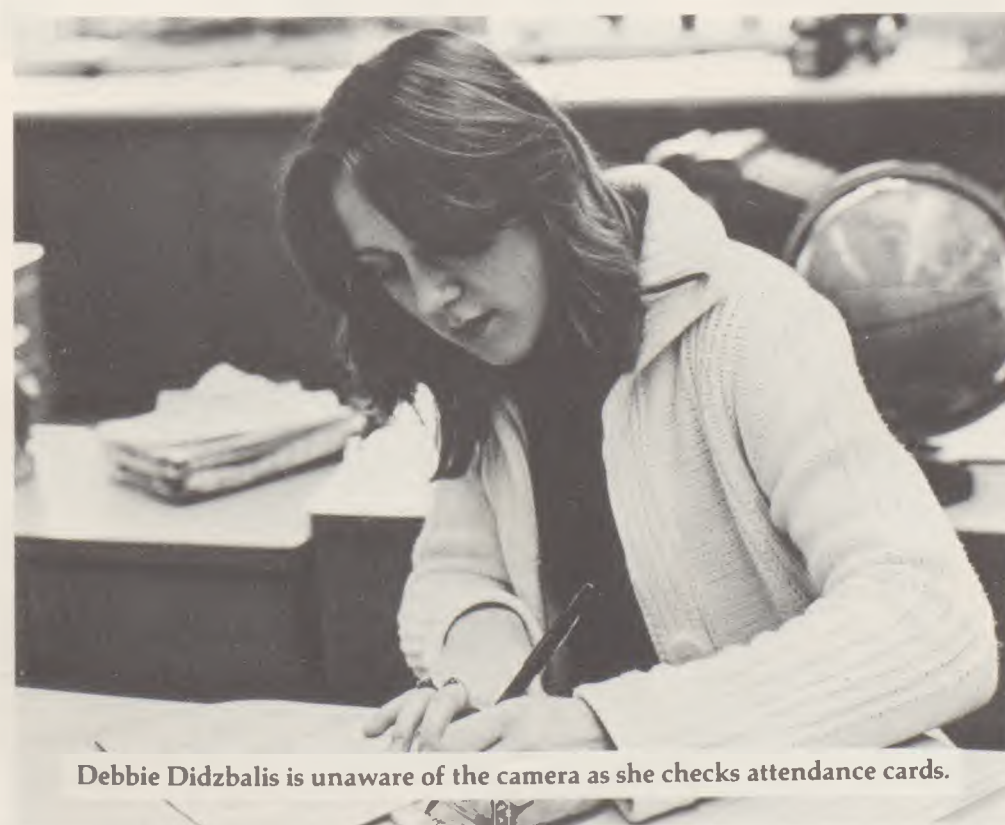

NEEDS A CONCERN

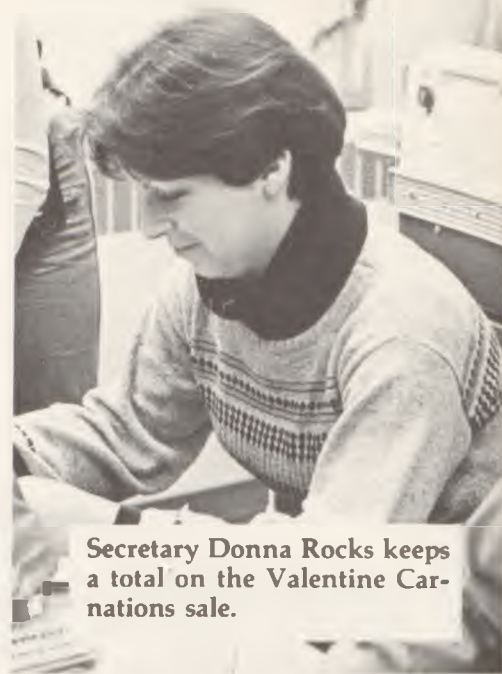

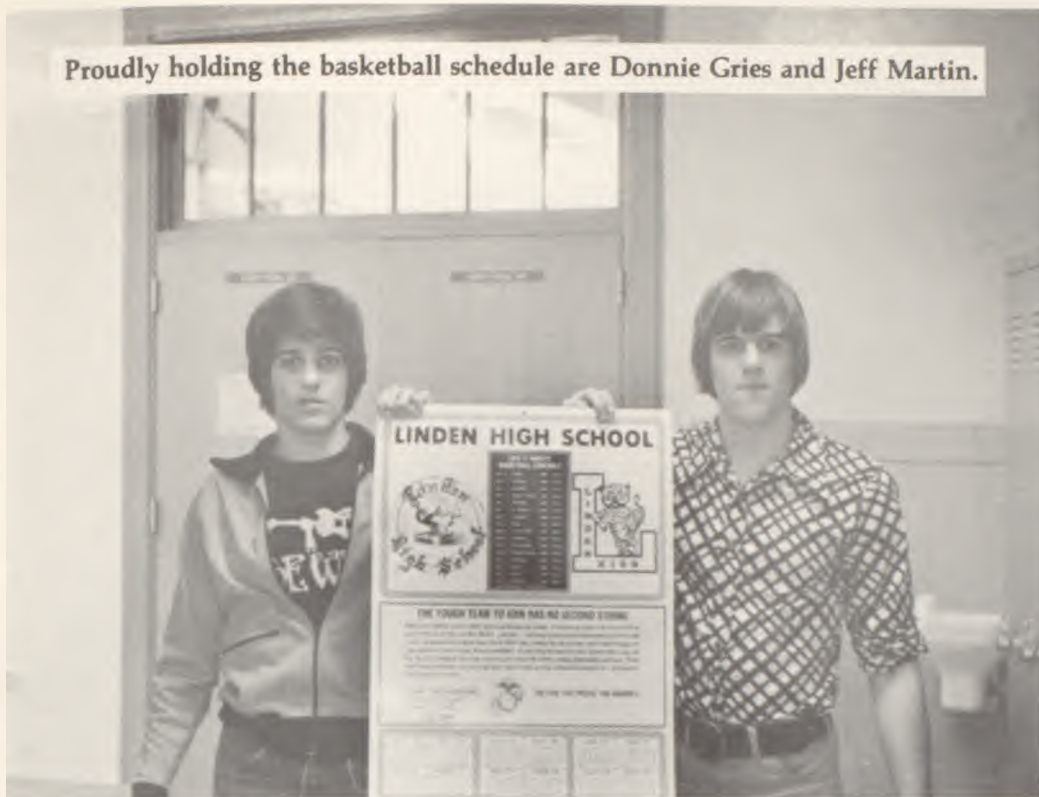

Each of this year's forty-eight members received a card from the New Jersey Historical Society that provided free admission to many historical places throughout the state.



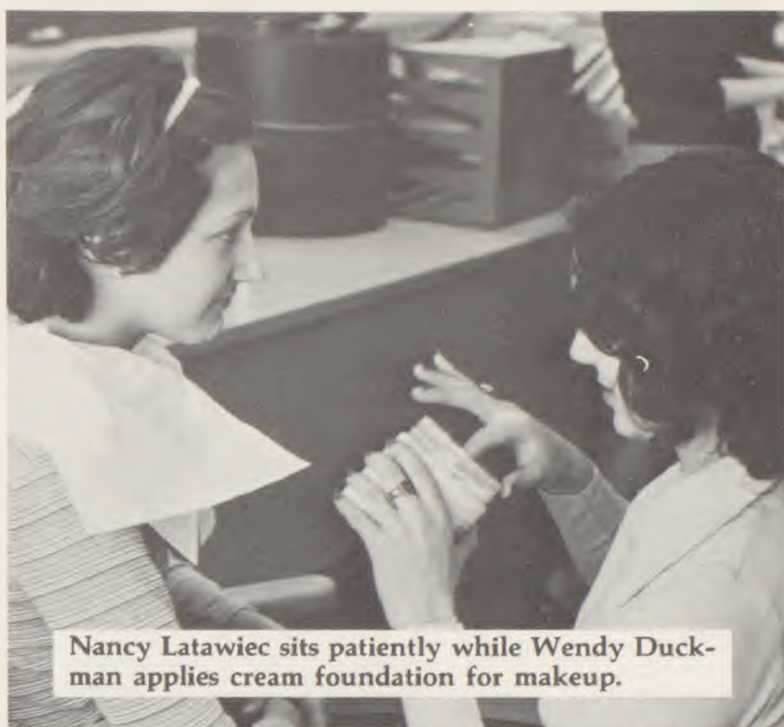

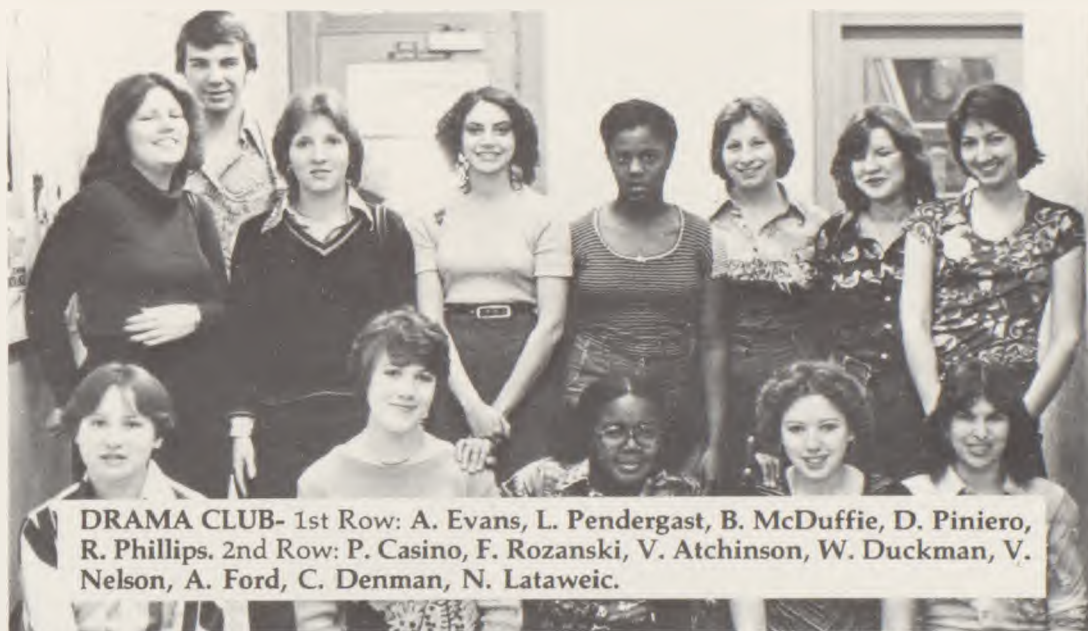

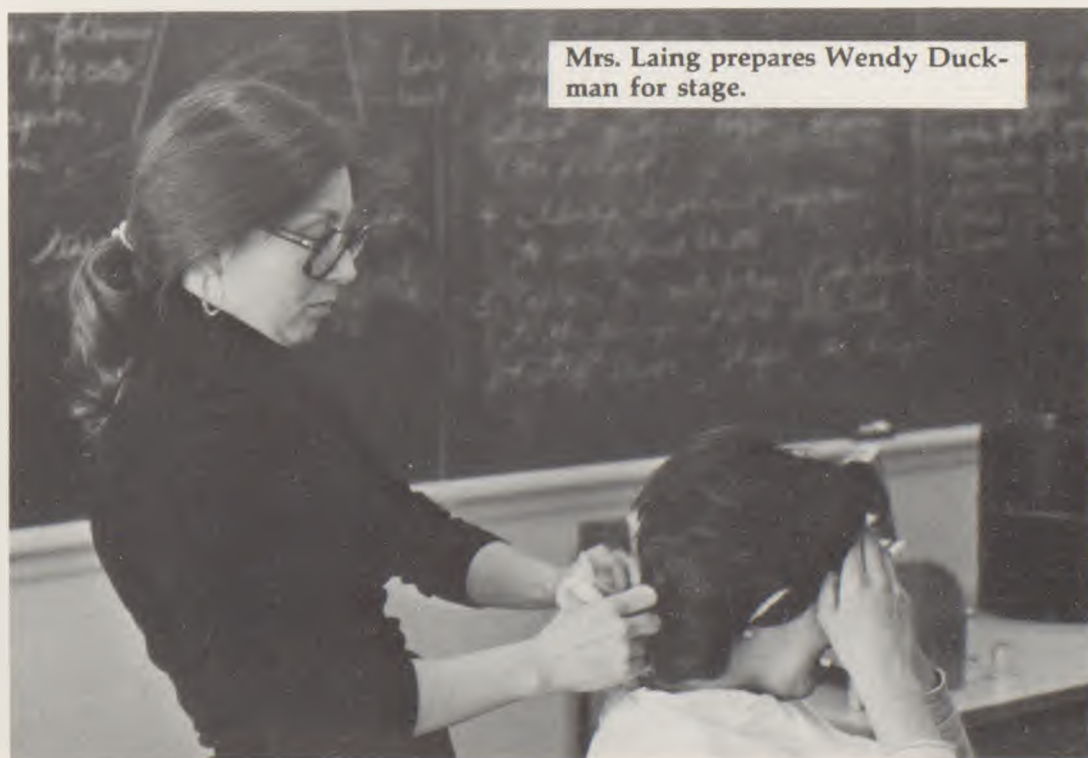

The National Honor Society has been very active this past year.

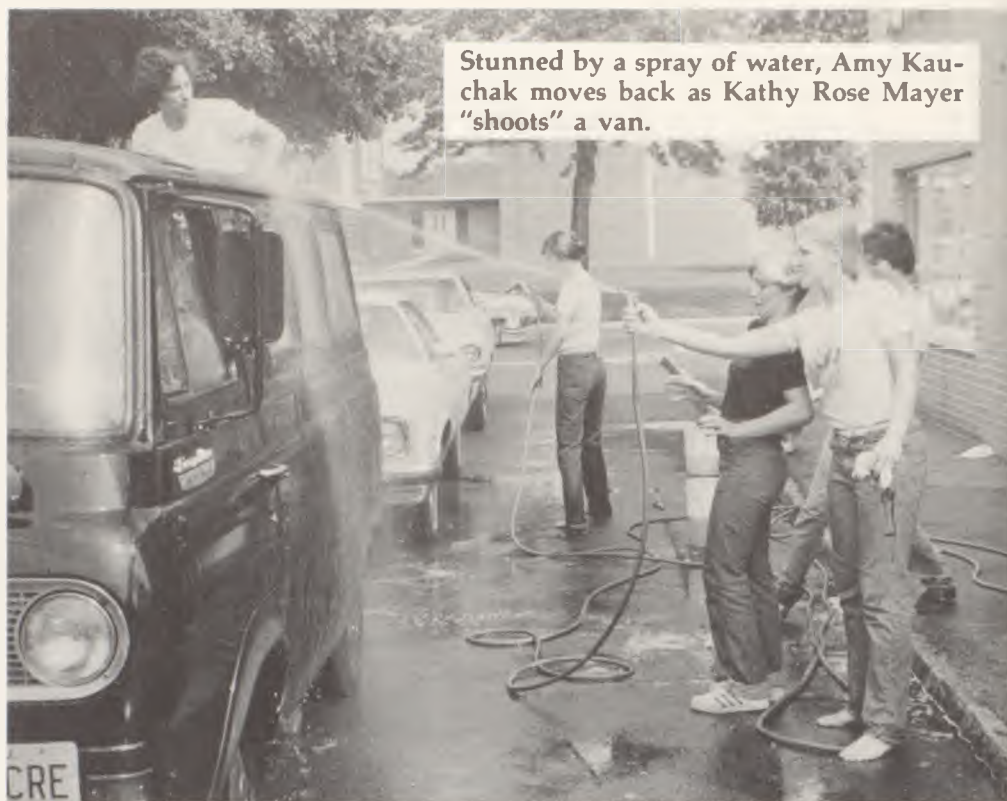

Cakes were also sold during the P.T. A. meeting held in October. This money was also used for the purchase of medals.

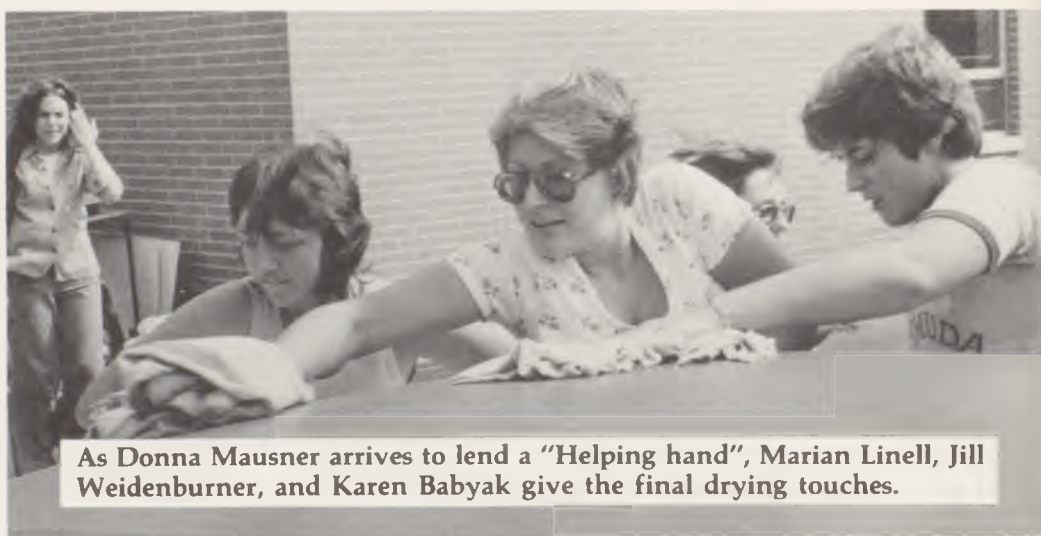
Throughout the school year members gave free tutoring during study halls to many classmates who had signed up for help. Other school services included ushering of the All-School Play.

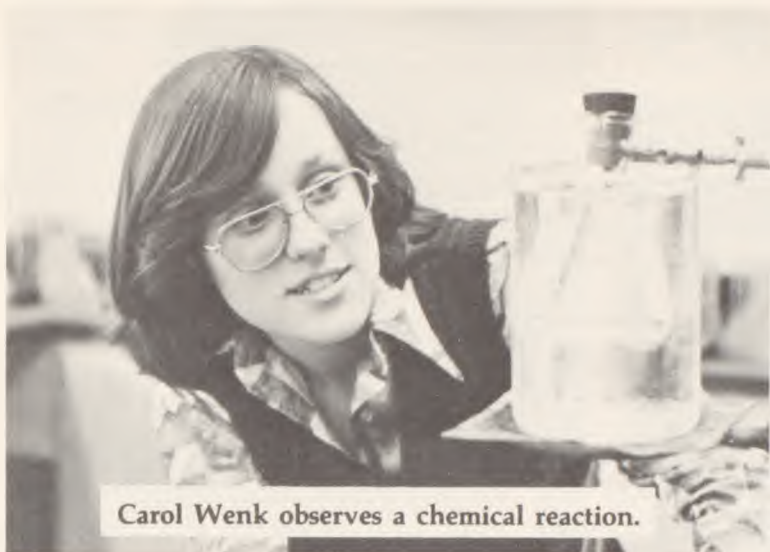

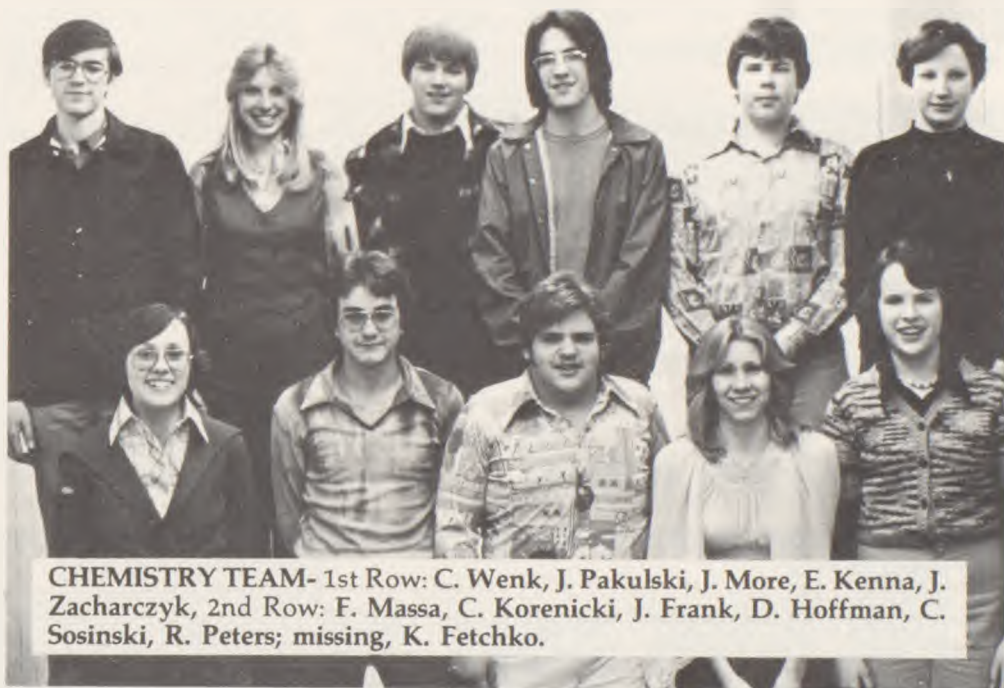

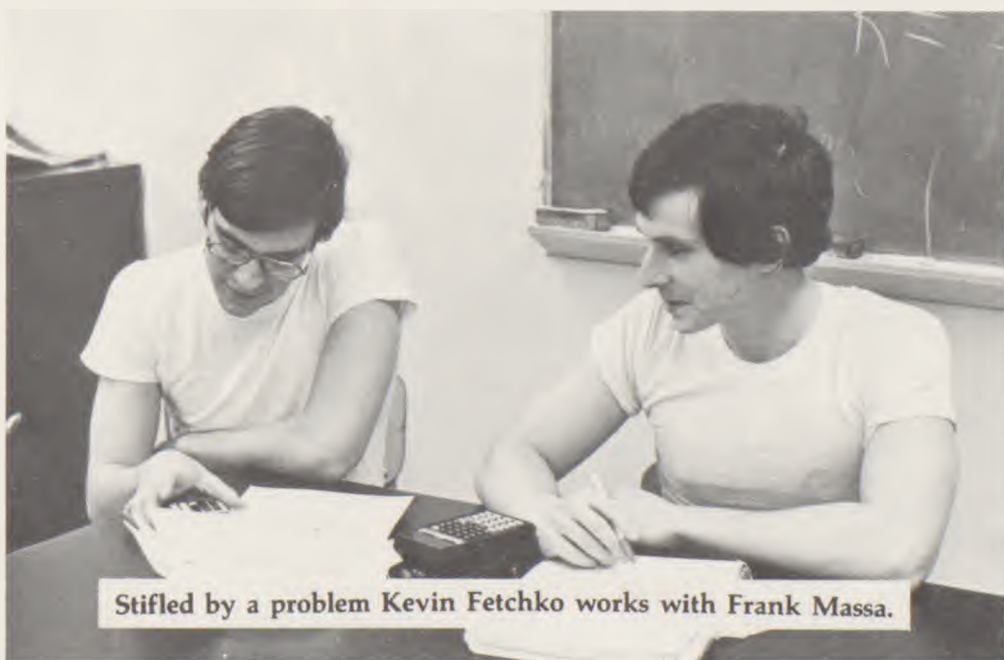

The purpose of the New Jersey Chemistry League is not only to provide competition, but to encourage science students to pursue their interest in chemistry.

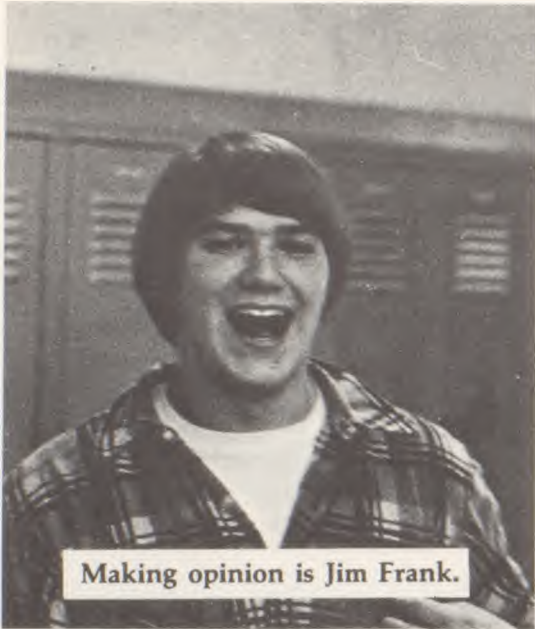

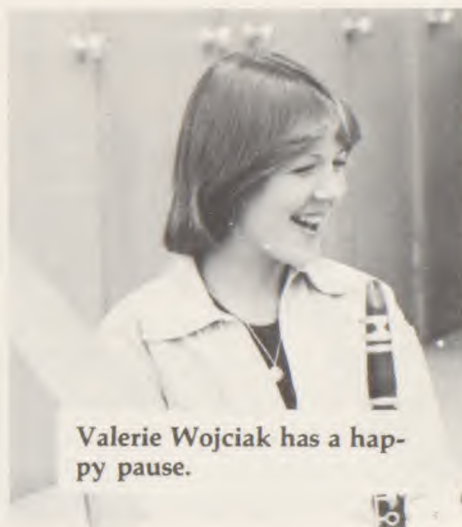

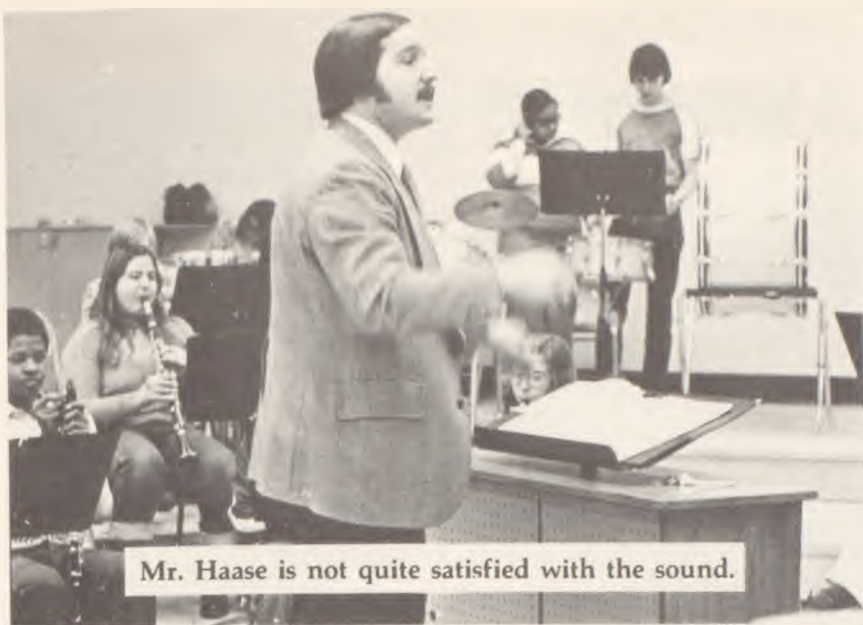

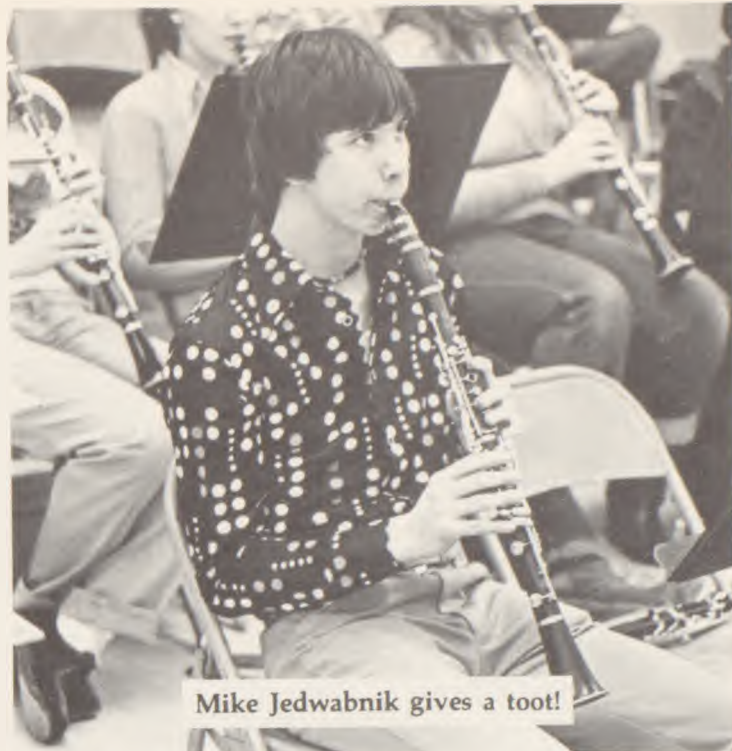

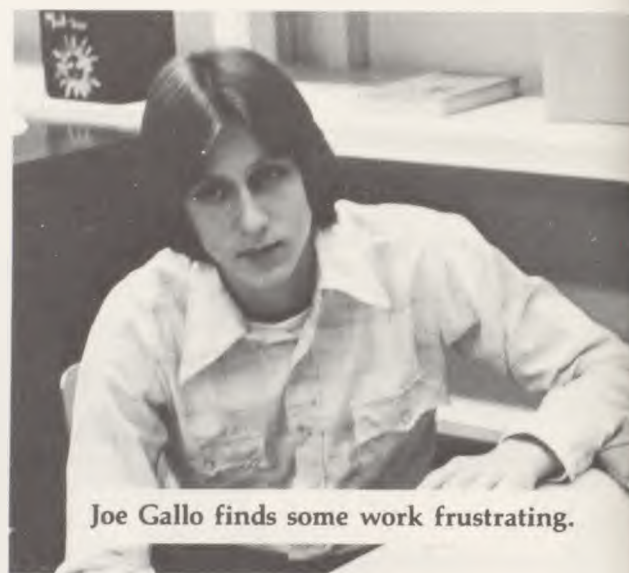

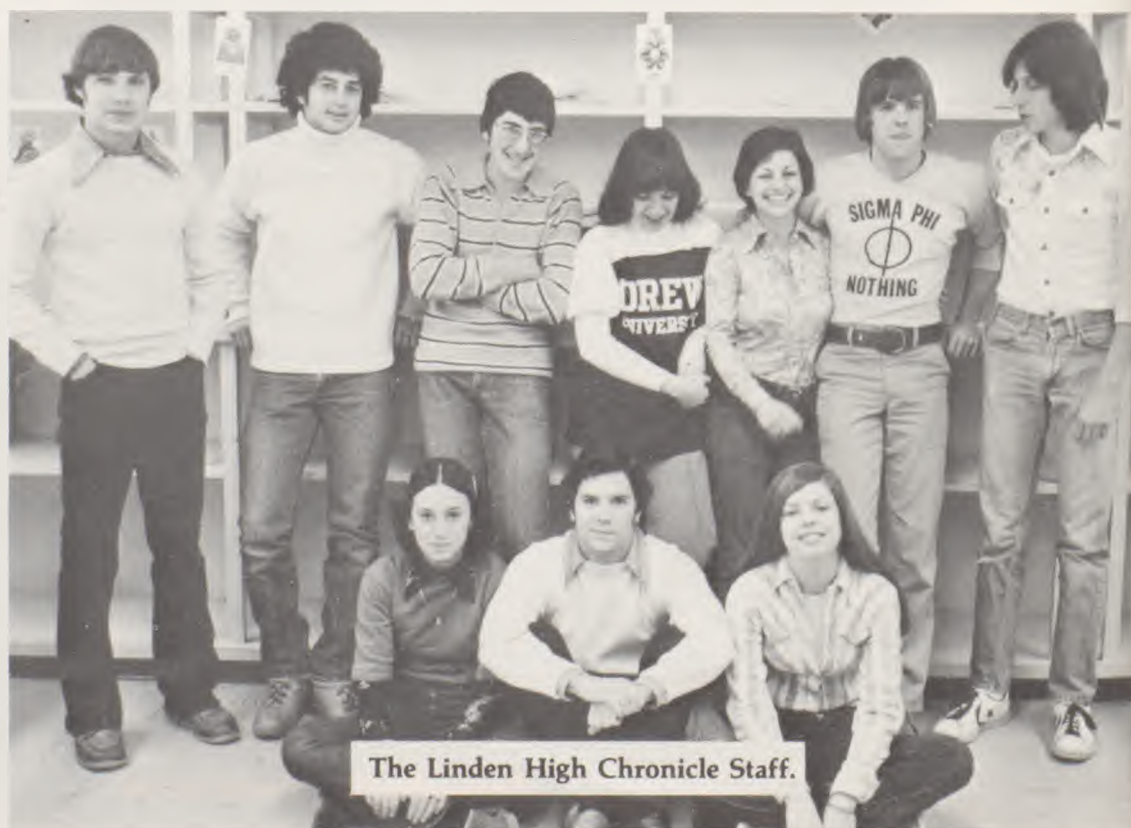

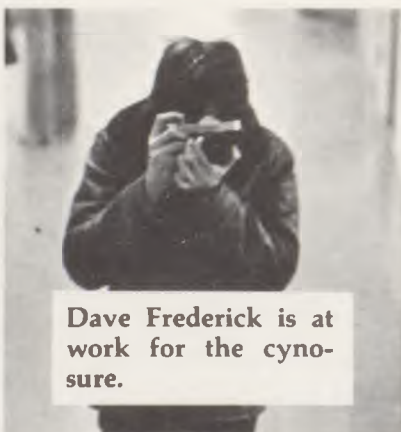

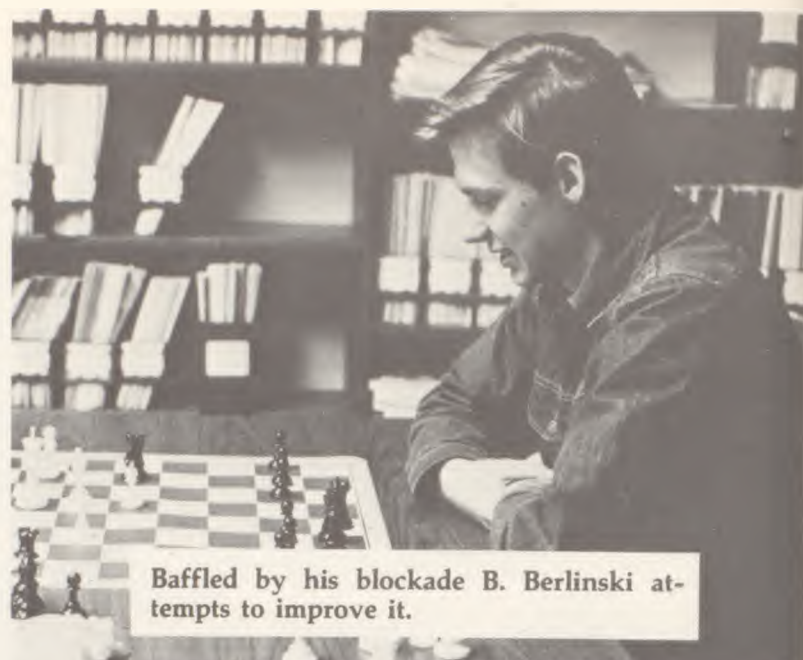

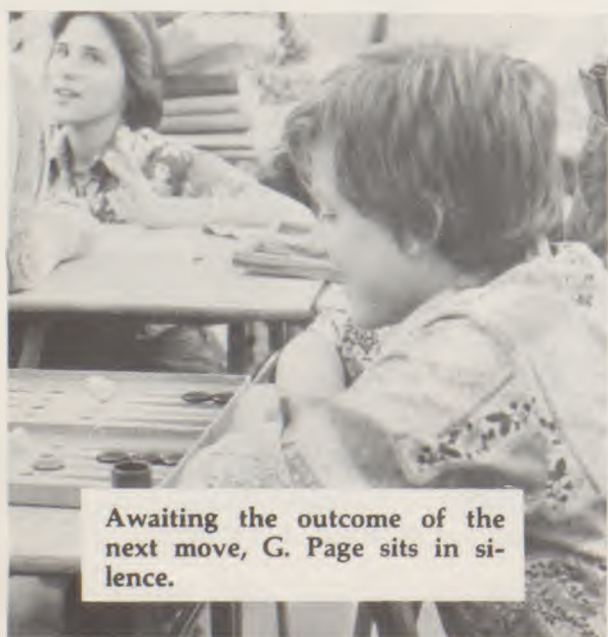

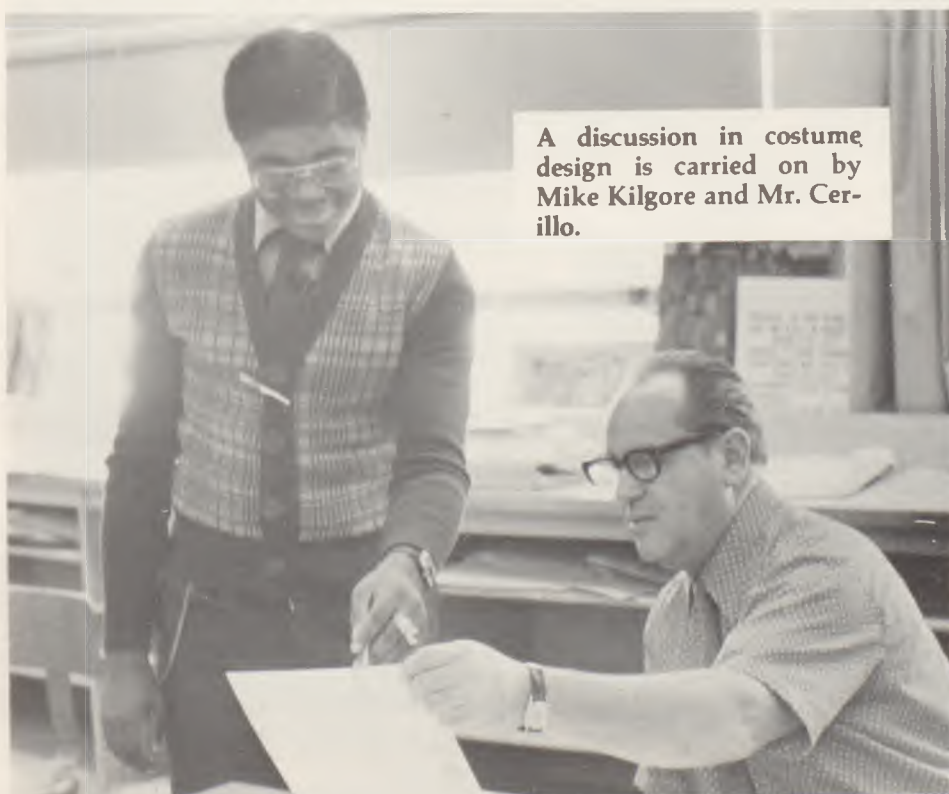

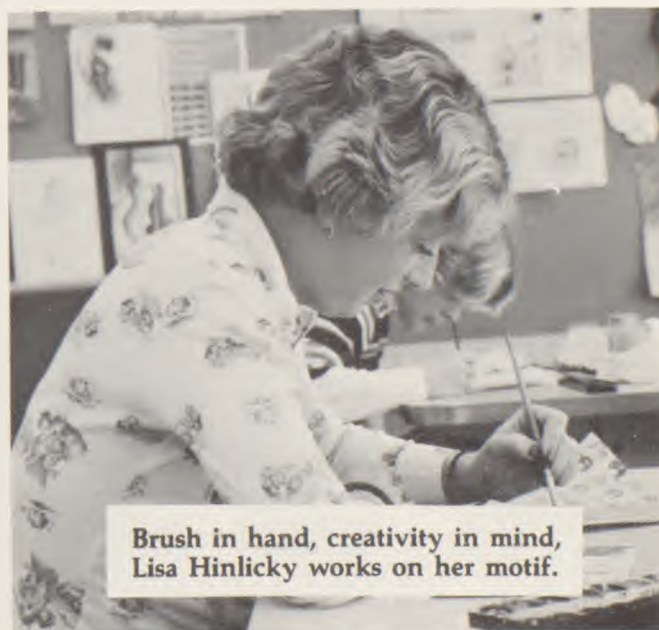

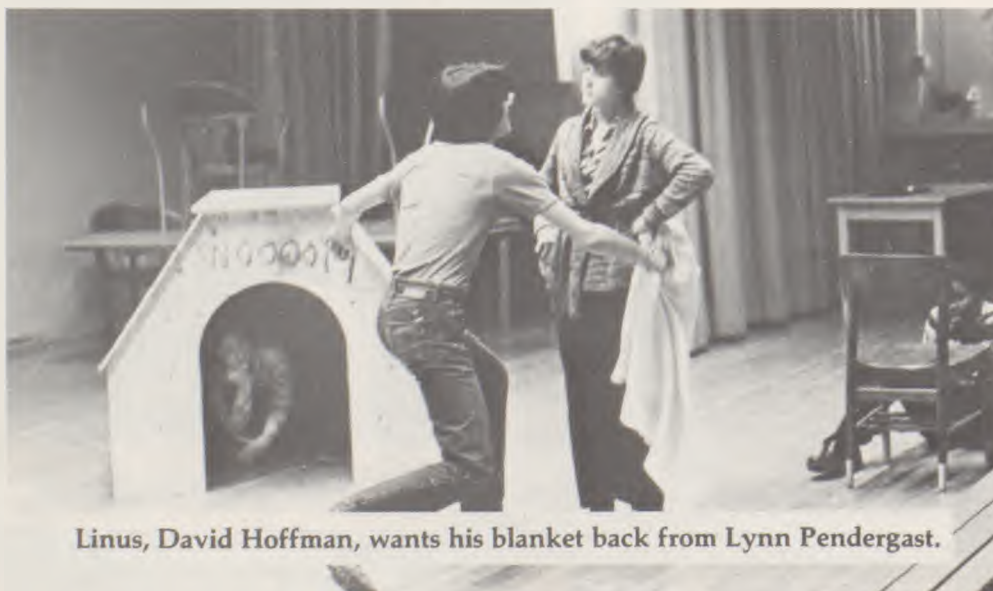

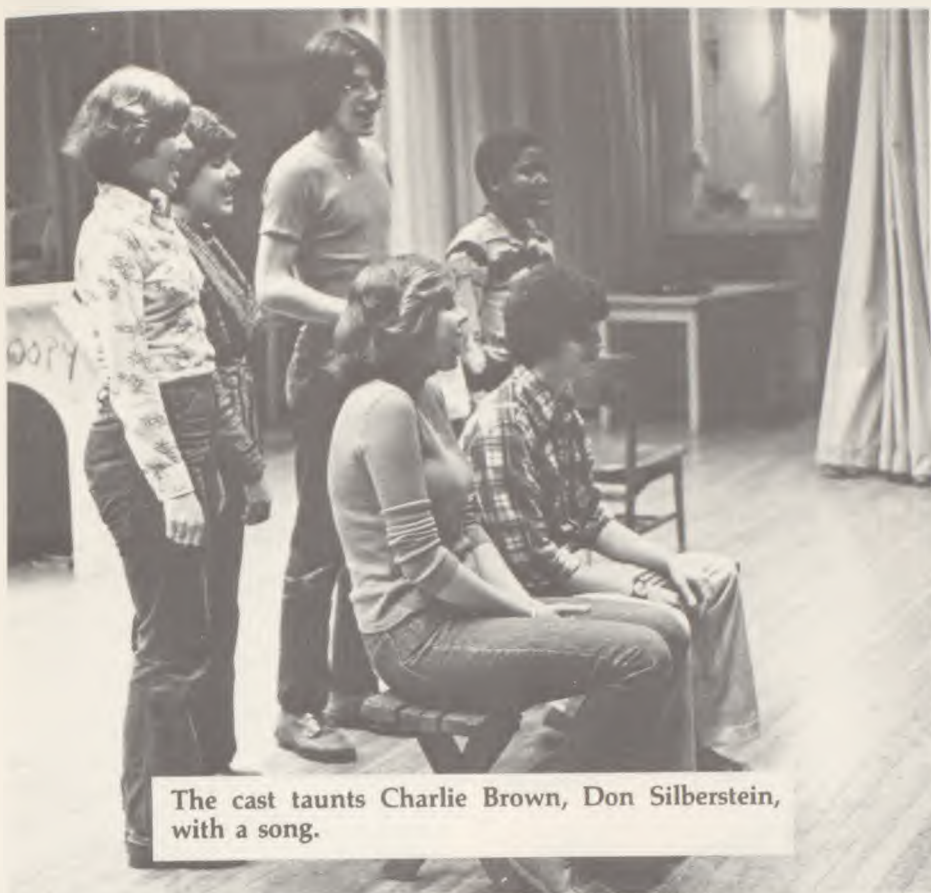

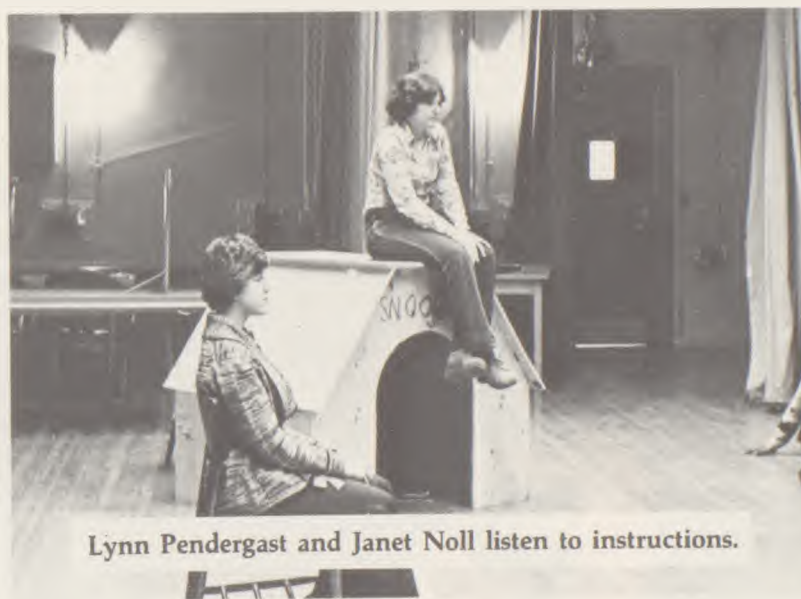

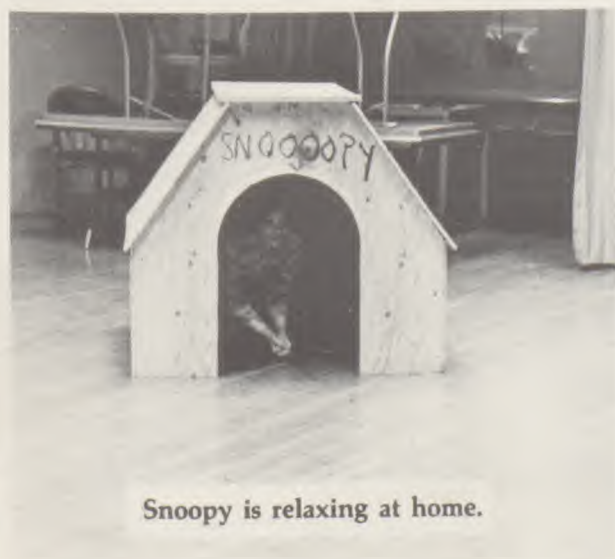

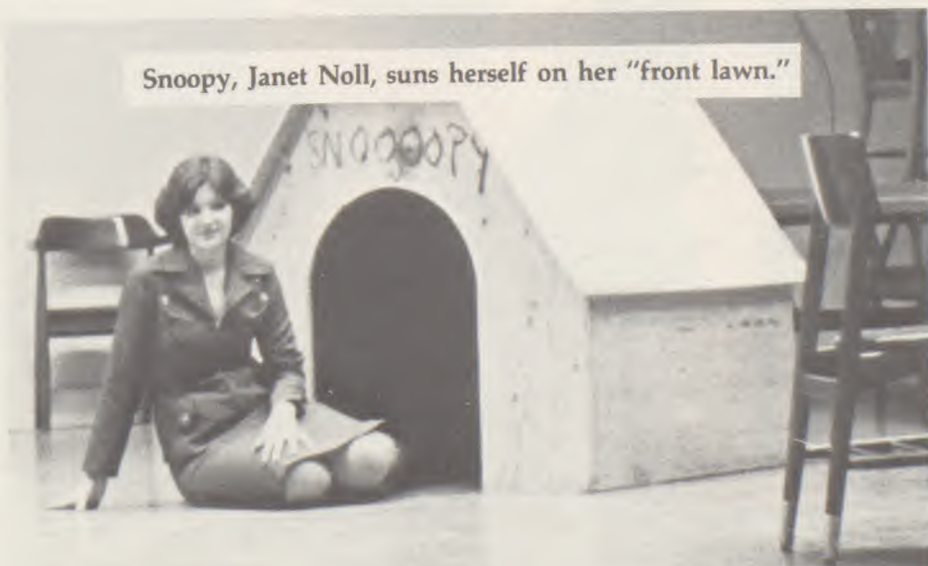

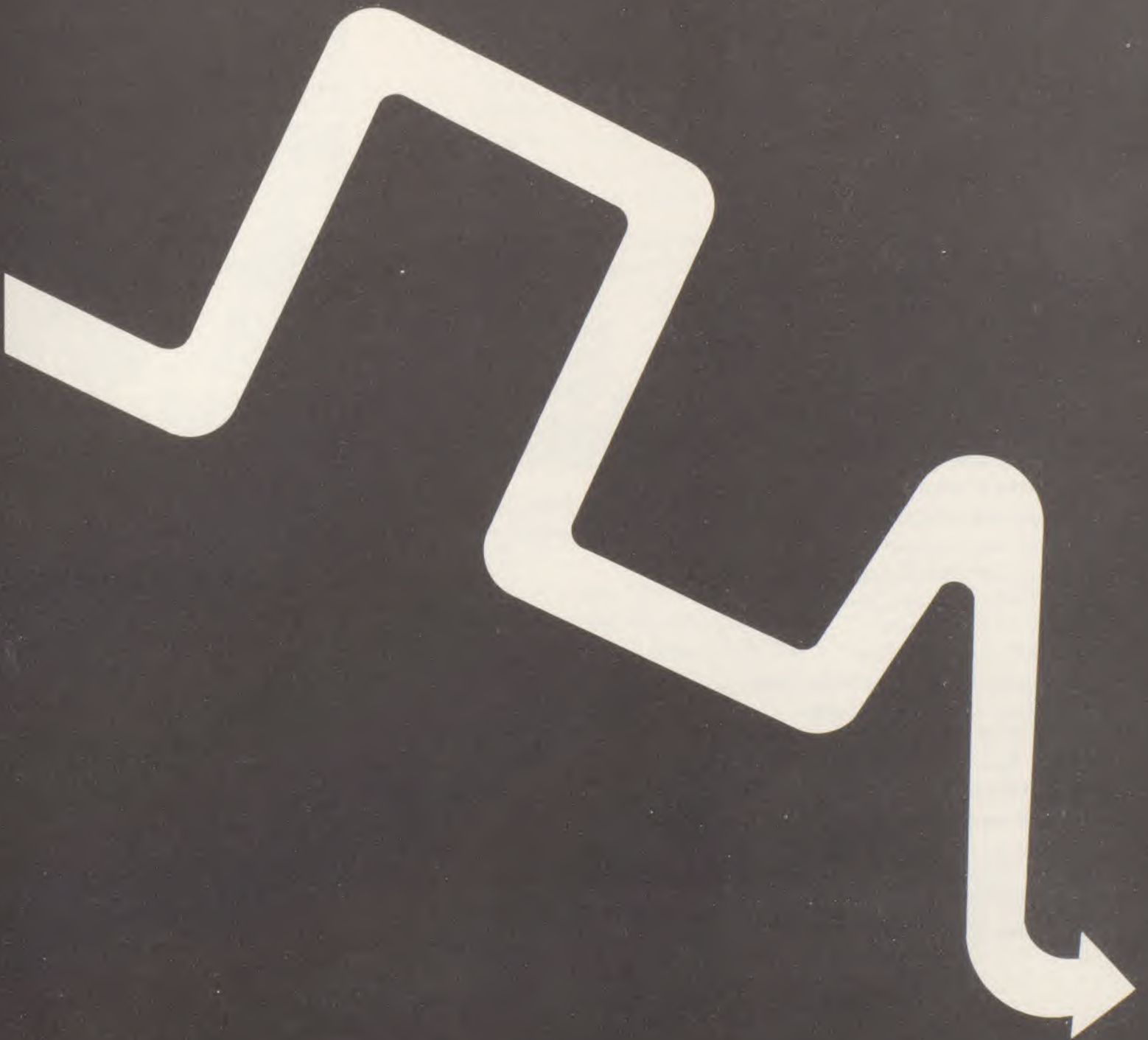

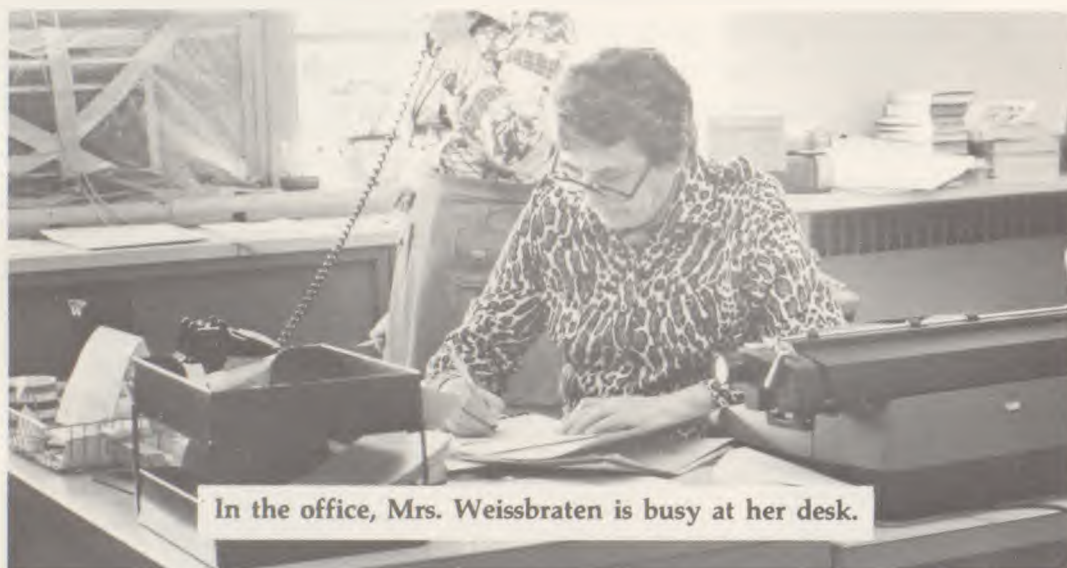

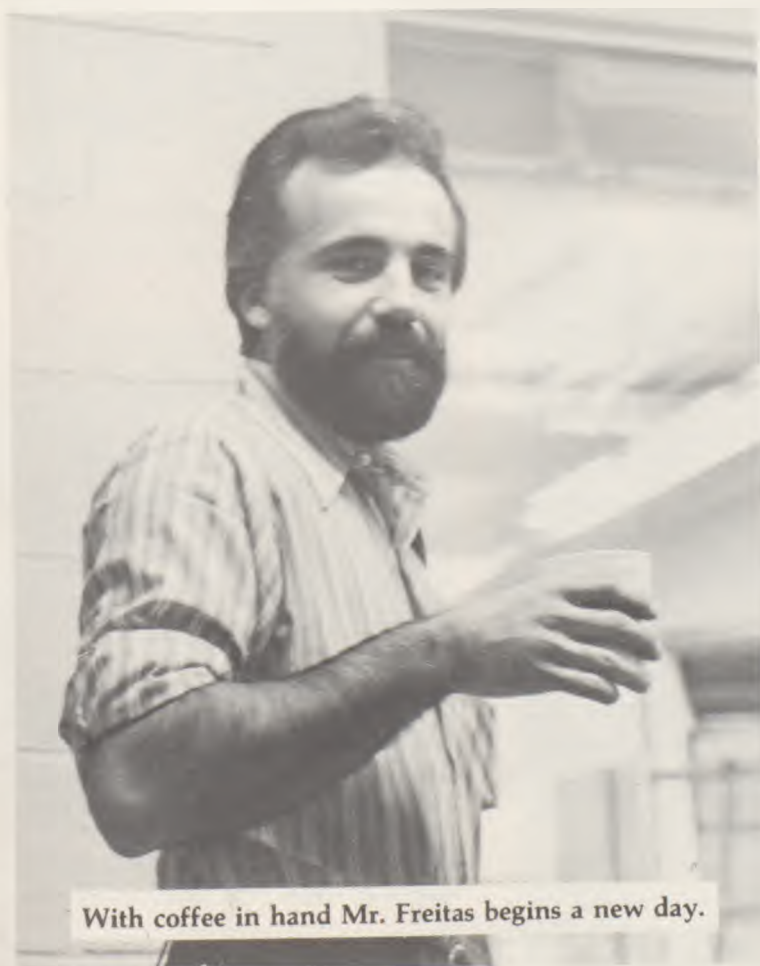
Mr. Metrokotsas (Metro) came to Linden High School with eight years coaching experience. He also played professional football.

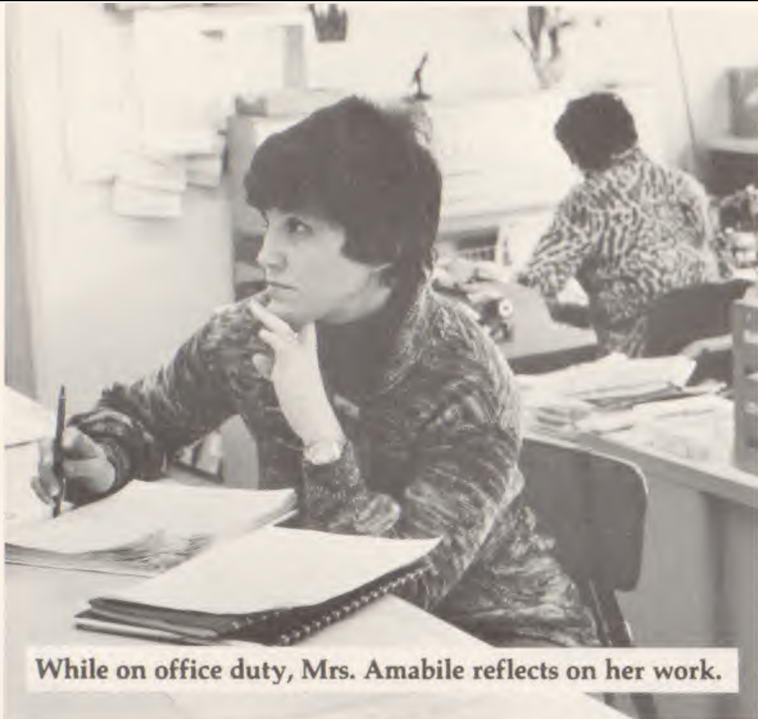

This year's presidential election greatly influenced many history classes. Some participated in election polls, or in devoting free time to the campaign parties.

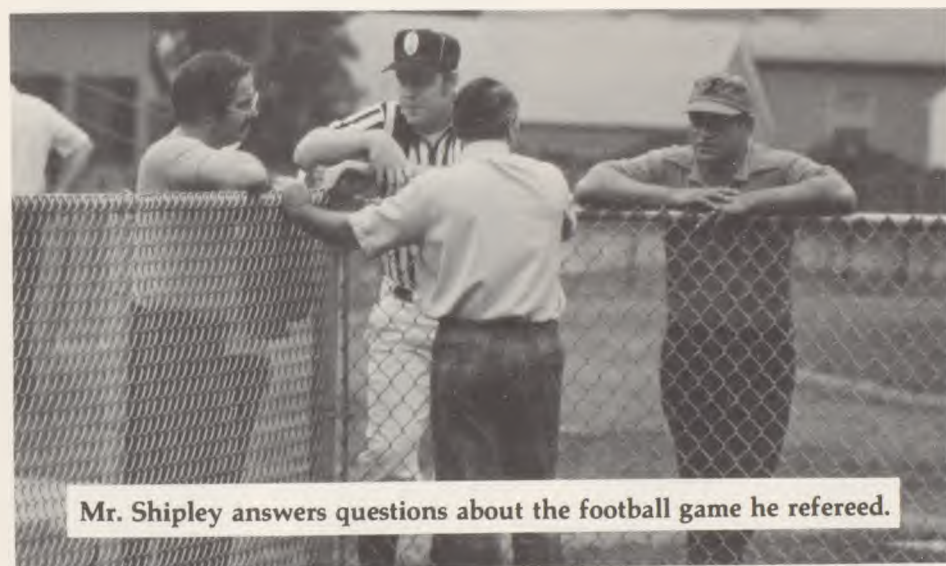

Our Senator Fay

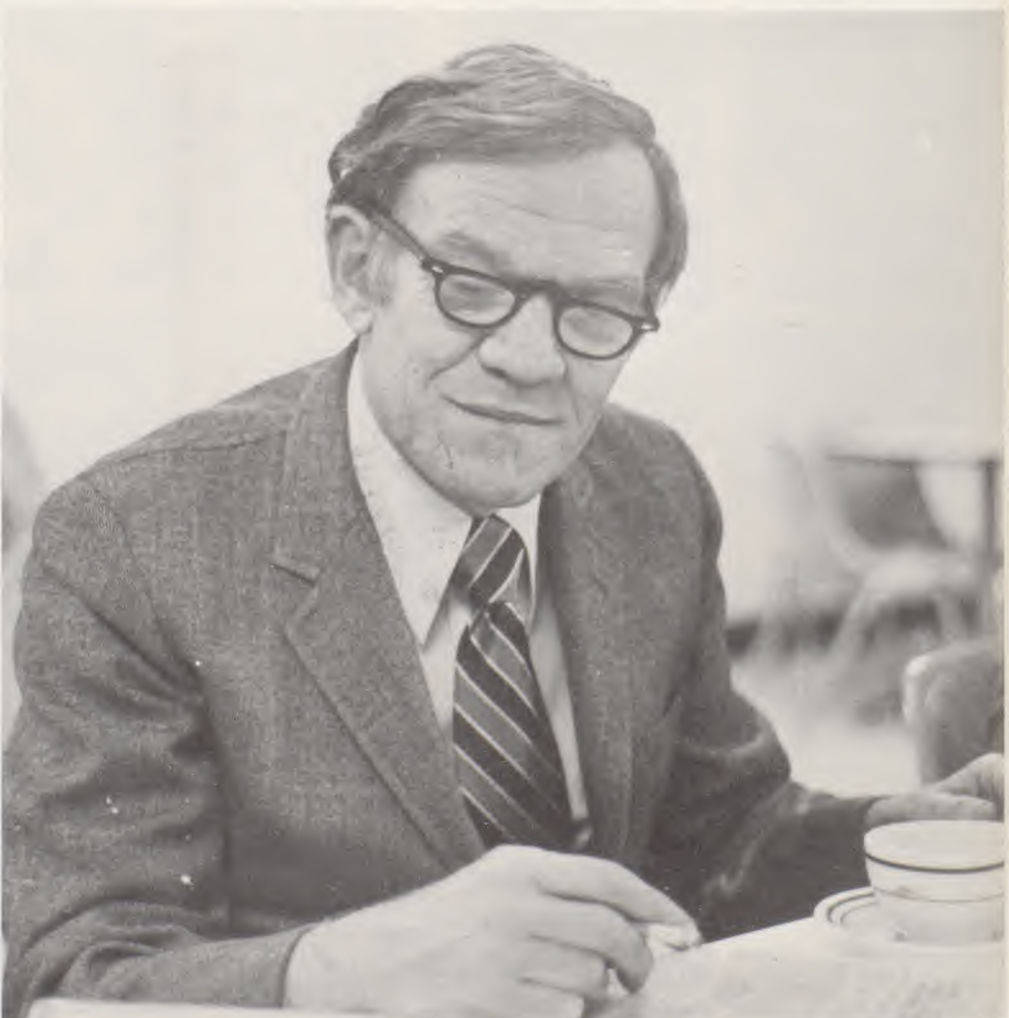
Linden High School's John J. Fay is a State Senator. Everyone has seen him in the office helping out. Some have had the privilege of hearing the Senator lecture in class.

Senator Fay has been associated with the Linden School System for nineteen years. He spent his first fifteen years teaching American History and Government in our high school. During this time, he also served as adviser to the Political Science Club. In the following two years, Mr. Fay served as an assistant to the principal at McManus Jr. High. Recently he has been on hall, cafeteria, and office duties, and is presently doing so on three days of the week.

Mr. Fay is a graduate from St. Patrick's High School in Elizabeth. He attended Seton Hall, where he obtained his Bachelors and Masters Degrees. He furthered his education by doing graduate work at Rutgers and Kean College.

When Mr. Fay finds some free time, which is hard to come by, he enjoys reading and going to the movies. During the summer, he likes to swim and enjoys the beach.

Senator Fay is married and his wife plays an important role in his political career. Her patience and interest in Mr. Fay's job, help him to travel and really do a good job in the Senate.

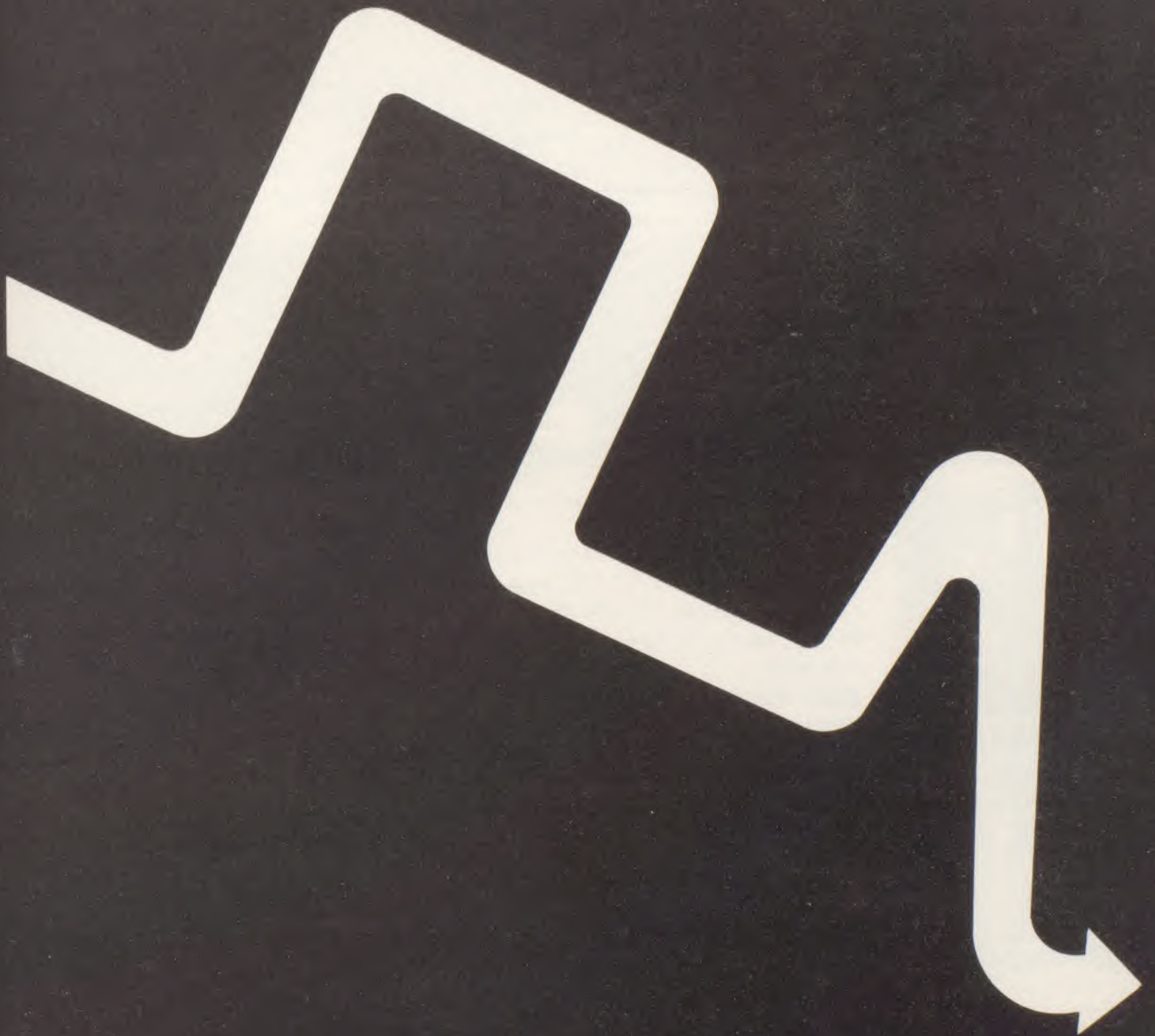

Citizen Band radio is America's fastest growing hobby. CB's are a means whereby ordinary people with relatively simple and inexpensive equipment can talk to each other from car to car, car to home, or home to home. Road and weather conditions, and car breakdowns are popularly broadcast.

CB broadcasting requires a license. Four dollars with an application to the FCC in Gettsburg, Pennsylvania will produce one.

Usually a CB output of 4 watts, will travel 3-20 miles. Occasionally, it will carry up to 30-40 miles.

There are 150 channels available to the public. Some channels have special uses while others carry conversation. On a 23 channel radio, channel 9 is used for emergencies and police. Channel 11 is a national calling channel. Any CB'er can page another and ask him to move to another channel. Truckers usually converse on 19, the most commonly used channel and where traffic reports are most frequently heard. Channel 10 is an alternative channel when 19 is busy.

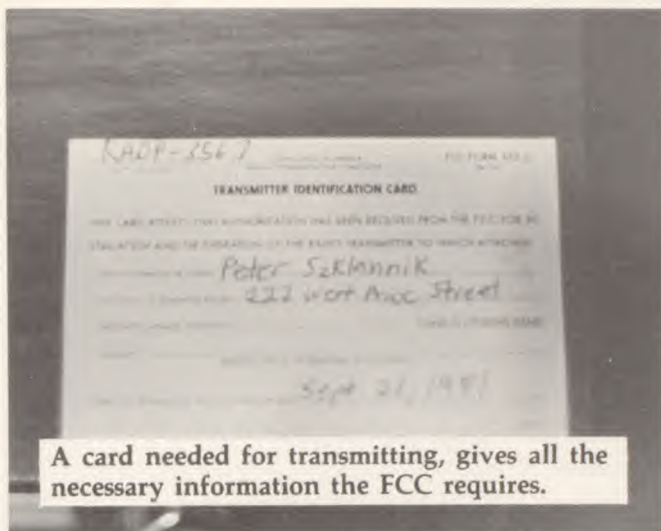
The FCC restricts a CB conversation to no more than 5 minutes at a time. There must be a one-minute interval between each five-minute segment.

Handles are code names used by the person owning a CB. John Muster of 18 Poe. Ave., Somerset, is presently compiling a list of CB handles and call signs to be published in the first Central New Jersey CB Directory. Just send your name, address, handle, or call sign, and the three channels you most frequently monitor.

A Peek At The Past

Located in the publication room are rows of old Cynosures yellowed with age. They don't reveal the long hours spent on them: morning homeroom, seventh period, after school, at home. Pages cannot picture the agony and aggravation involved in their creation. Neither shown is the fighting to get through a deadline on time. Mixed emotions have rampaged through this old publications room over the years.

Cynosure, according to Webster, means a center of attraction or attention. Our yearbook, however, was not always so appropriately named. In 1920, the first yearbook to be published was called The Orange Letter and presented a graduating class of 9. It dealt mostly with the few seniors and their activities, and listed a faculty of sixteen. The next yearbook, entitled Nednil (Linden spelled backwards), was published in 1923. Graduation increased from 9 to 12 seniors. Finally in 1924, the yearbook adopted our present name, Cynosure.

Prior to 1927, grades 1-12 had been centralized in school One. In 1927 students were divided into our present secondary system of two junior highs and the high school.

In 1929, an Aladdin's Lamp of Learning became the seal of Linden High, that seal has been used by many previous staffs including this year's on the divider pages.

Styles of yearbooks have changed, but not the purpose. In the first yearbook, professional photographers took group pictures of each undergraduate class. In contrast, now we take individual photos of each member of the student body. In 1925, a crossword puzzle gained a reader's interest because the questions pertained to the graduating class.

Times for issuing the yearbooks have also changed. Until a few years ago, yearbooks had been distributed at graduation.

Many different types of clubs had been formed which are non-existent today, to say the very least. Following are some of the club listings by year:

1927

The Commercial and Boy's Glee Clubs.

1928

Live Wire Club.

1931

Speed and Home Economics Clubs.

1938

Civil Forum, Rifle, Latin and Geometry Clubs.

1945

Fish and Game, Field Mapping and Surveying, Archeology, Aviation, Knitting, Moving Pictures, Travel Girl Reserves, Indoor Recreation, Printing, Junior Red Cross Clubs, and Cafeteria Corp.

1951

Bible, Typewriting, Crocheting, Shop Foreman, Projection, Studio, Future Homemakers of America, and Forensic Clubs.

Alumni Notes were added to see what past graduates had been doing with their lives.

Jokes brightened the pages of the yearbooks.

When classes were small, characterizations of each member of the senior class had been compiled. In 1930, a classified ad presented the senior

poll predictions. Also in 1930, an alphabet of most of the seniors was funny to those who had been included.

Overcrowding is not only a problem of today. In 1931 an editorial stated crowded classrooms had become a problem because the high school could only accommodate 600, but housed 700. Even the cafeteria had been used as a gymnasium.

Our yearbook will take its stand next to the others. We hope the Cynosure will continue to flourish and never die. The past is too precious to lose, be forgotten, or lost in oblivion.

For those whose memories have dimmed in time, there are extra yearbooks of most years for sale in the publication room. A small charge will maintain Cynosure tradition in perpetuity.

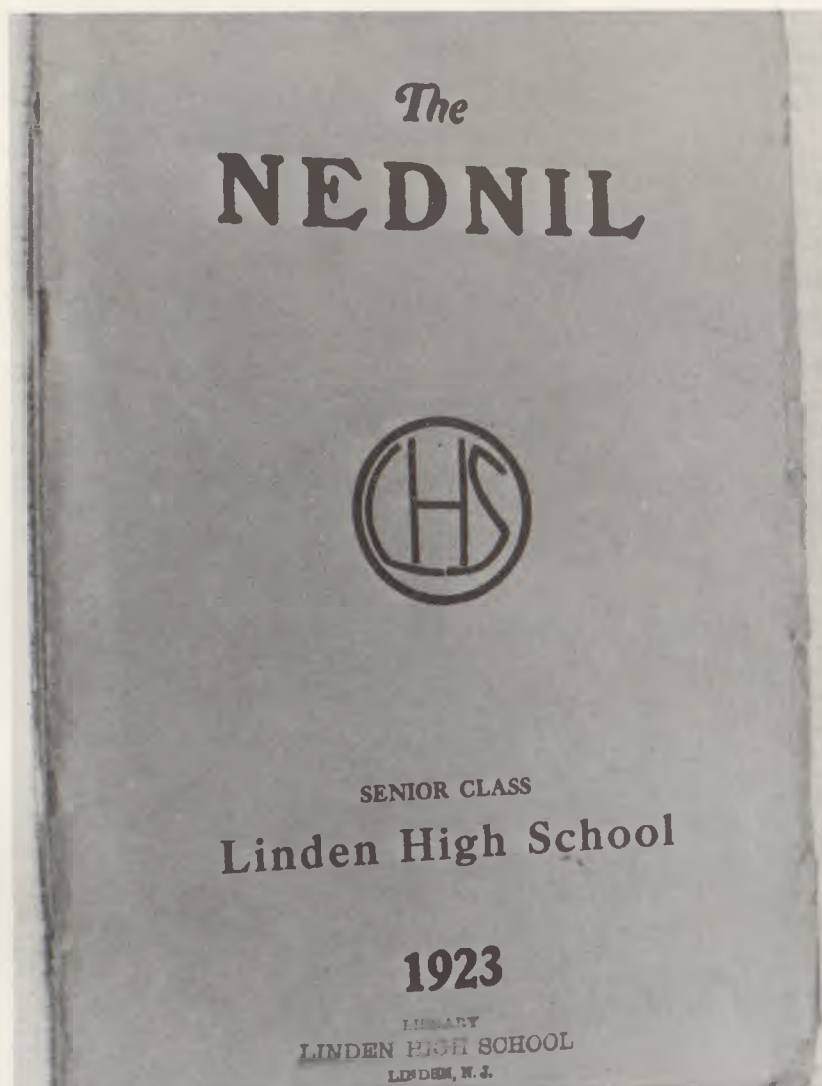

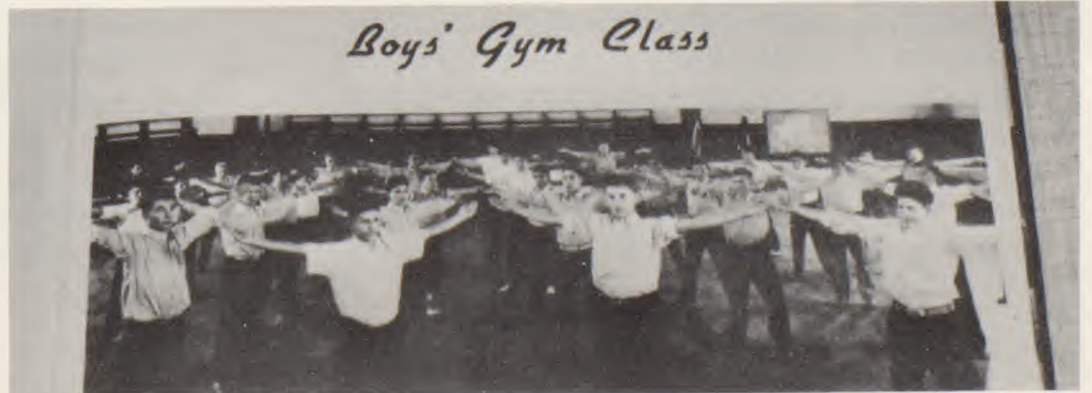

A Teacher Offers One More Lesson

Asside from a normal flow of events in 1977, something has been happening. What is it we have not touched, yet have been touched? What is it we have seen, and then quickly looked away as if we had not witnessed it at all? What is it that gave no detectable odor, but has rankled our nostrils? Its name is apathy.

Anyone who is indifferent, unfeeling, or without emotion to the world about him has caught apathy. It is a socially demoralizing and contagious disease.

Like cancer, it has always existed and taken its toll, but now apathy seems to have spread to epidemic proportions felt in every aspect of our society.

Government at every level has fallen pry to it by corruption, graft, and allowing certain corporate industries to milk already heavily taxed citizens with absurd prices.

Patriotism, once the exuding pride of every American in his country and its leaders, has slipped underground to the silent majority and been replaced by popular skepticism and apathy.

What of the rugged individualism on which our nation was founded and our West won? How has it fared? Apparently not well: self-sacrifice, active compassion, honest hard work, and community involvement are all tradgically missing from the modern version of individualism. Now prevailing is a raw, rude, self-centered conception which utilizes apathy as its strength to avoid getting involved. The new breed of rugged individualist is apparently a loner who avoids involvement by proclaiming he cares, but doesn't want to get involved. Hertiage and common sense, it must be

pointed out, belie his assertion because his degree of involvement is a valid measurement of how much he cares.

Senator Fay takes a very serious stand on apathy. In regard to voting he says "Only 25% of the people vote in primary elections which are extremely important. In school board elections only 5-15% of the voters turn out. Most city taxes depend greatly upon funds needed by the schools and this election should not be taken too lightly."

Senator Fay also says that "Japan has only had a representative government for 30 years and they have a 90% plus turn out for national elections compared to the United States." He also points out that, "In this type of government you also have the right not to vote."

"Apathy," he says, "depends on year to year and issue to issue. The voter should be well educated and informed before he casts his ballot. A well informed vote is negated if a voter who is not up to the issues also votes. The implications are frightening. It's an inherent danger."

When asked where the blame is, he says, "There is enough blame for everyone. Some help might be to motivate people to vote."

Mr. Fay also added that, "The National Political System is covered well in the schools but the coverage is inadequate on the local, county, and state level."

"Linden High," he says, "is one of the luckier shools to cover current events and the American Political System."

Mr. Foley has observed, "The feeling of 'community' within the school is vertually extinct." Mr. Haiko

comments, "Interest and dependability among the members of the Cynosure Advertising Committee was short lived with the exception of a few members who maintained their activity throughout the greater part of the campaign period. For the greater number of members indifference and apathy prevailed."

Is Apathy an Epidemic? "It would appear so," according to Mr. Bunce, "with the Seniors. Fact: 393 Seniors out 525 purchased Cynosures. Inflation may be hitting the pocketbooks of the underclassmen, but not apathy. Fact: 440 Cynosures purchased by Juniors, Sophomores, Faculty and Community members."

Mr. Shipley also agrees that apathy appears to be epidemic because he responds: "Yes, students feel that it is more acceptable to be a non-participator; that something is wrong with the person who is active and interested."

Detective Andy Rose of the Juvenile Aid Bureau feels that "Police in general are ignored until they're needed."

He added, "Too many people are too liberal. What we need is mandatory sentencing. The apathy existing in the courts is so apparent that juvenile offenders leave with smiles on their faces and continue to reappear on police blotters."

When word leaked out that this article was being written and quotes taken from teachers, students were quite defensive, and vocal about it. They felt attacked and blamed; they wanted to counter charge. No such charge is necessary because no such blame was intended. We are all victims as well as the instruments of our

society. This writing has focused on apathy- an ugly characteristic of our (your) time. Students have been raised and lived with it. It has been the deliberate intent of the author to show that apathy is wrong no matter how it prevails. Never, never accept it unchallenged or as the status quo.

Even if the results are argumentative, an attempt should be made to list the causes of apathy. Unfortunately, such a list will act as justification for those who don't want to be involved. On the other hand, it will serve as the stinging truth for those who still care. Therefore, remembering Janus, the following list is offered:

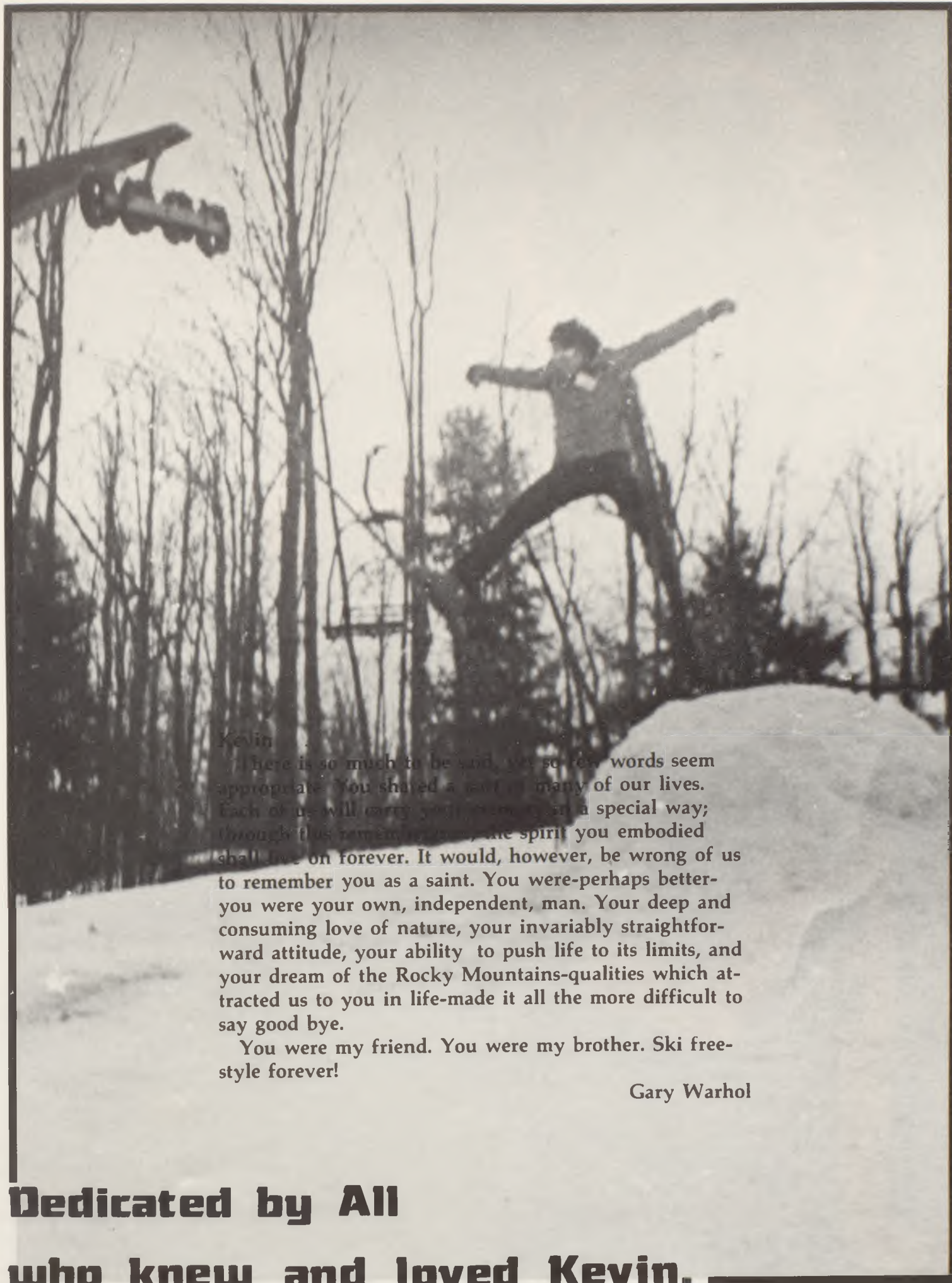
- muggings and danger in the streets

- corruption of prices, especially coffee, heat, and food

- a feeling of betrayal and disillusionment, because now is nothing like "they" told us it would be when we were growing up.

Now, ask yourself, have you caught apathy? Probably not, if you read this whole article. Well, new citizen, what are you going to do about it after you graduate?

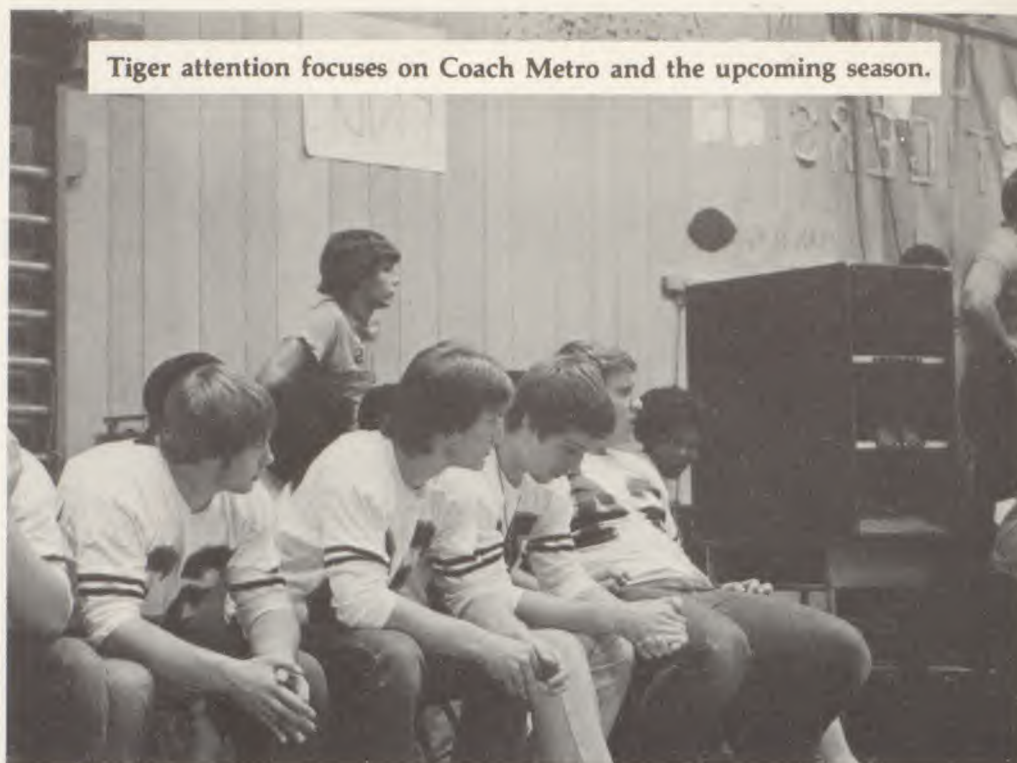




KICK OFF TIME

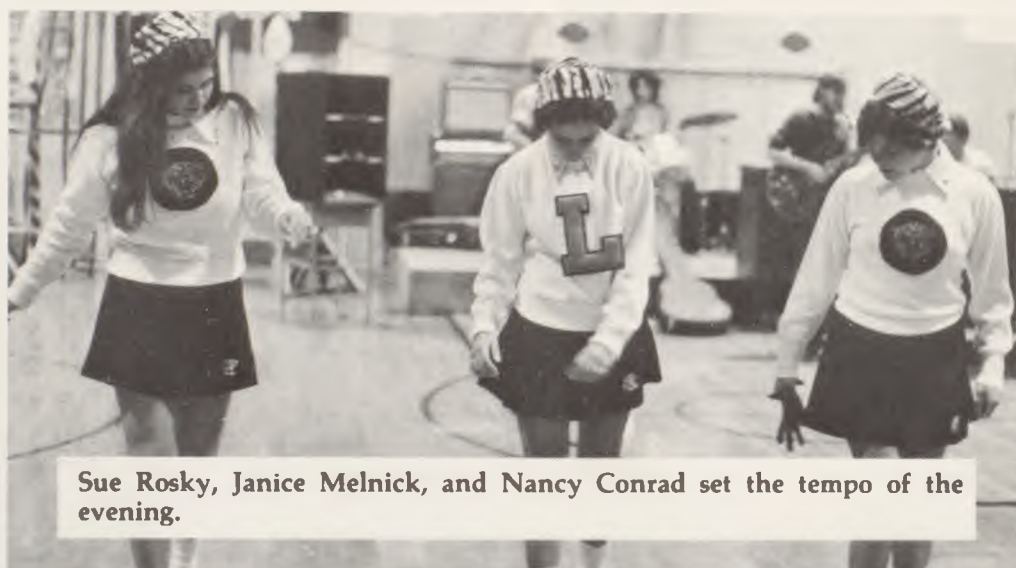

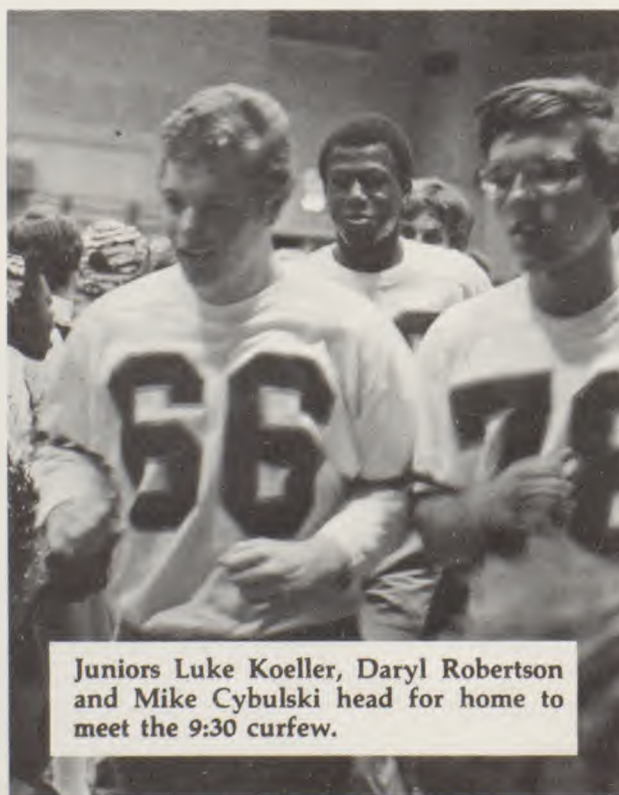

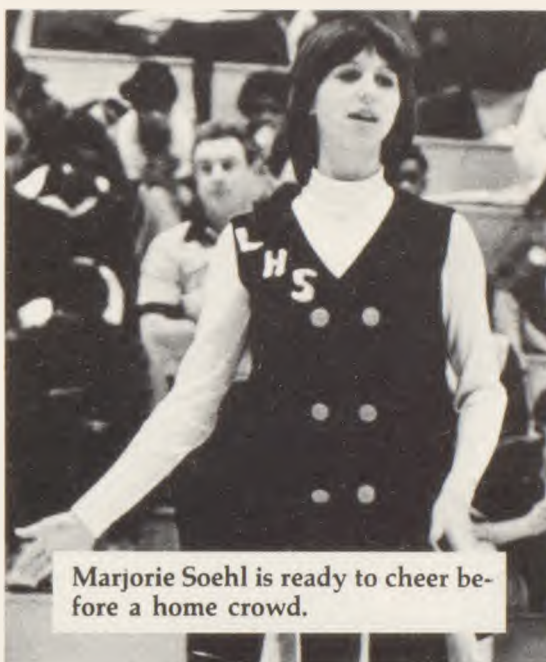

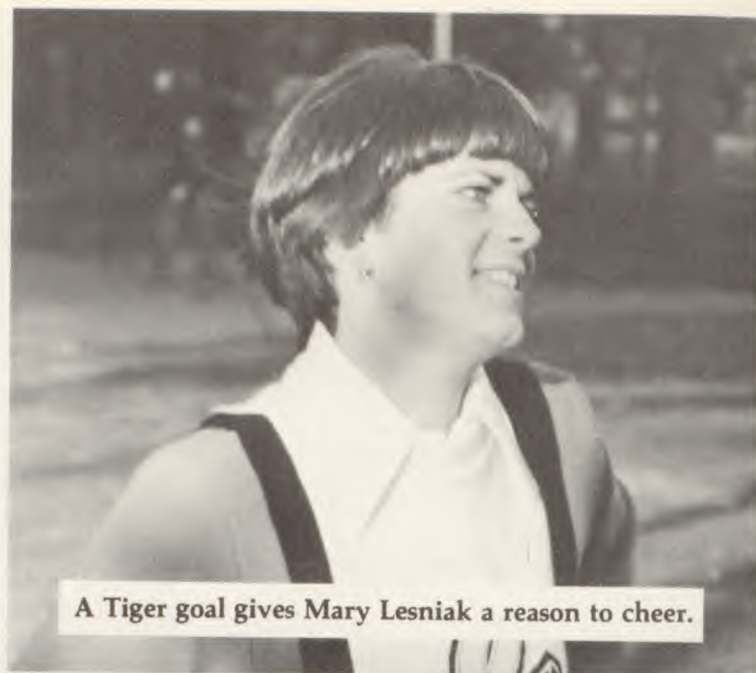

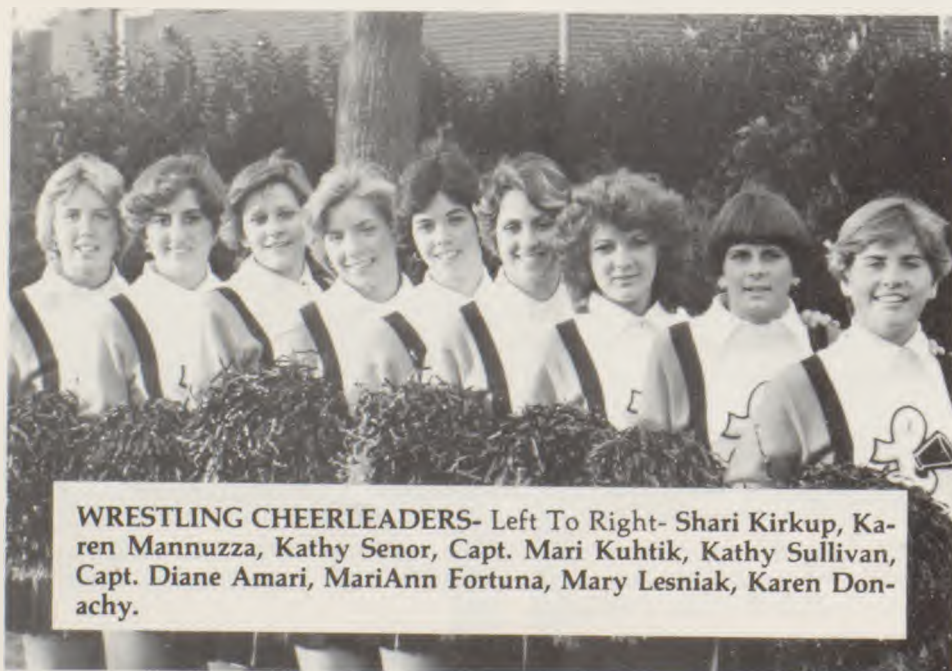

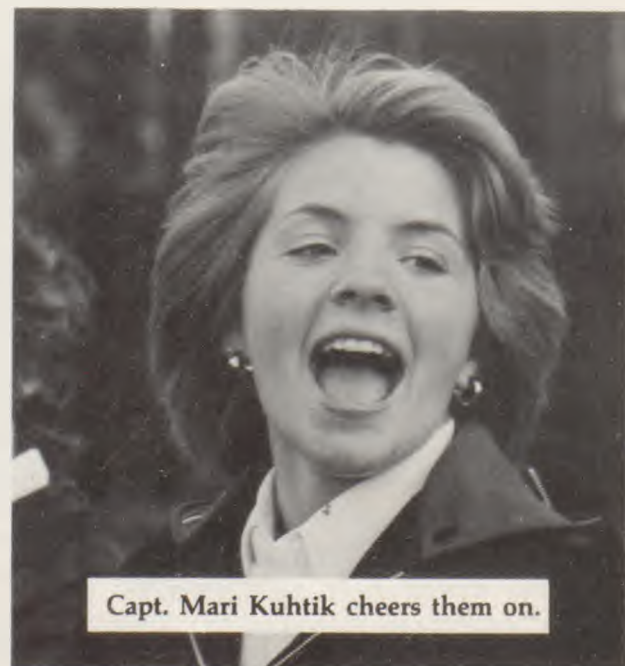

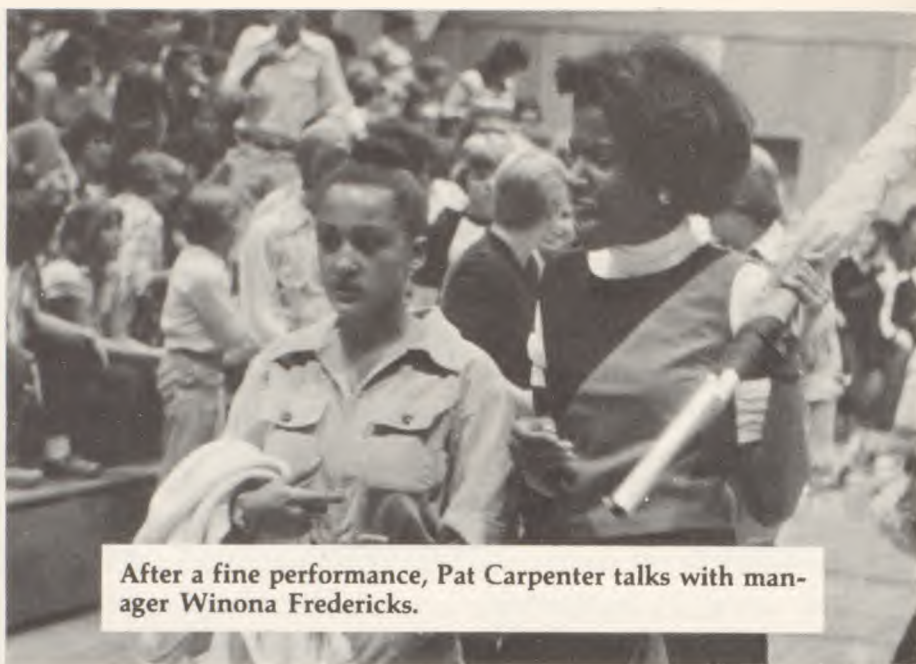

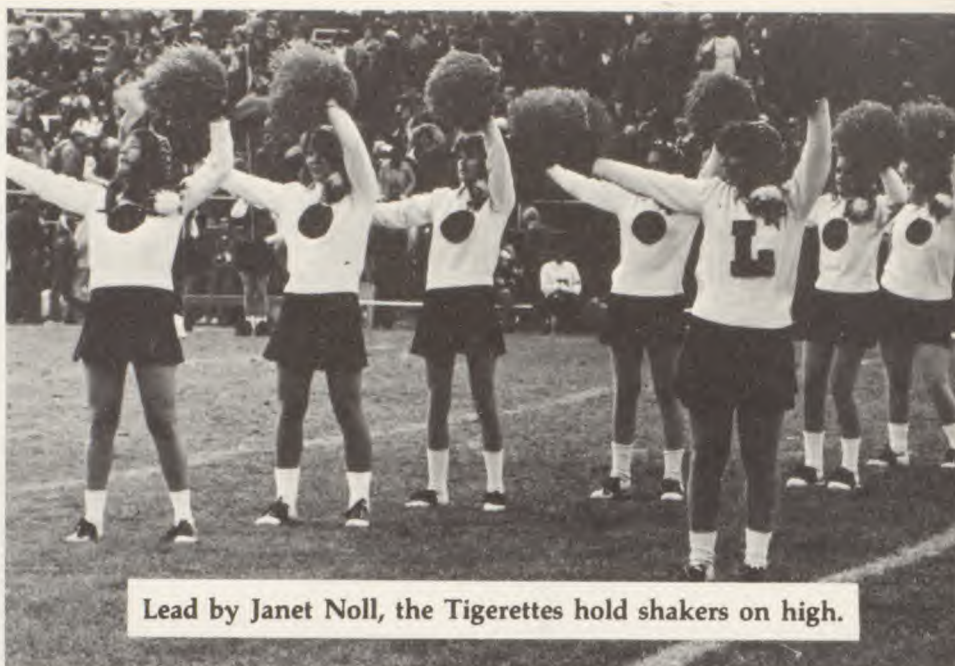

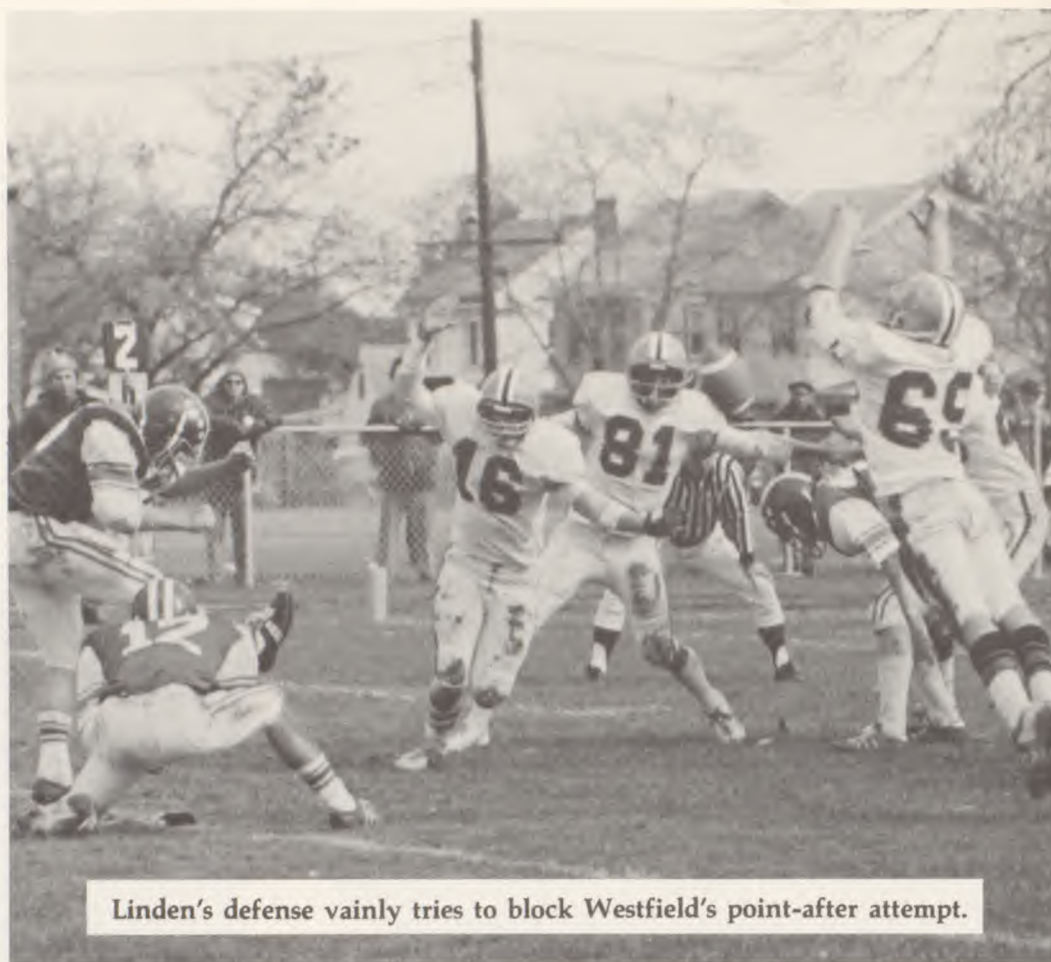

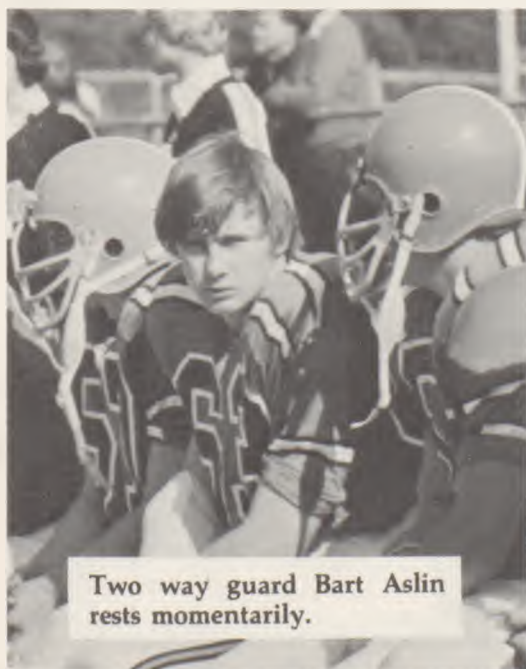

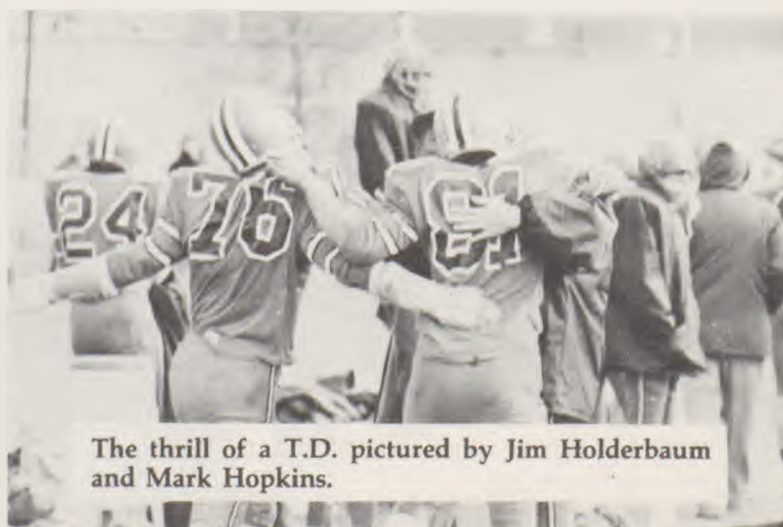

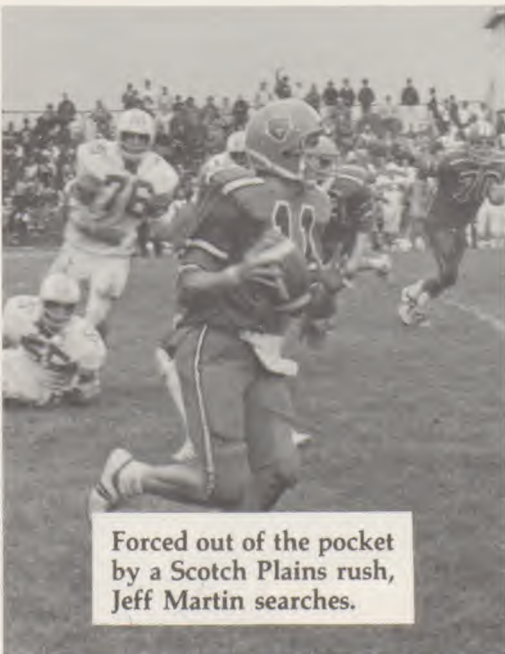
With The Same Ending

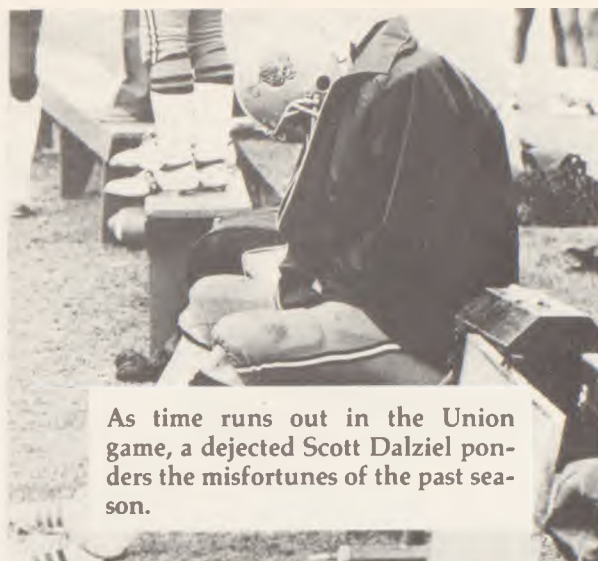

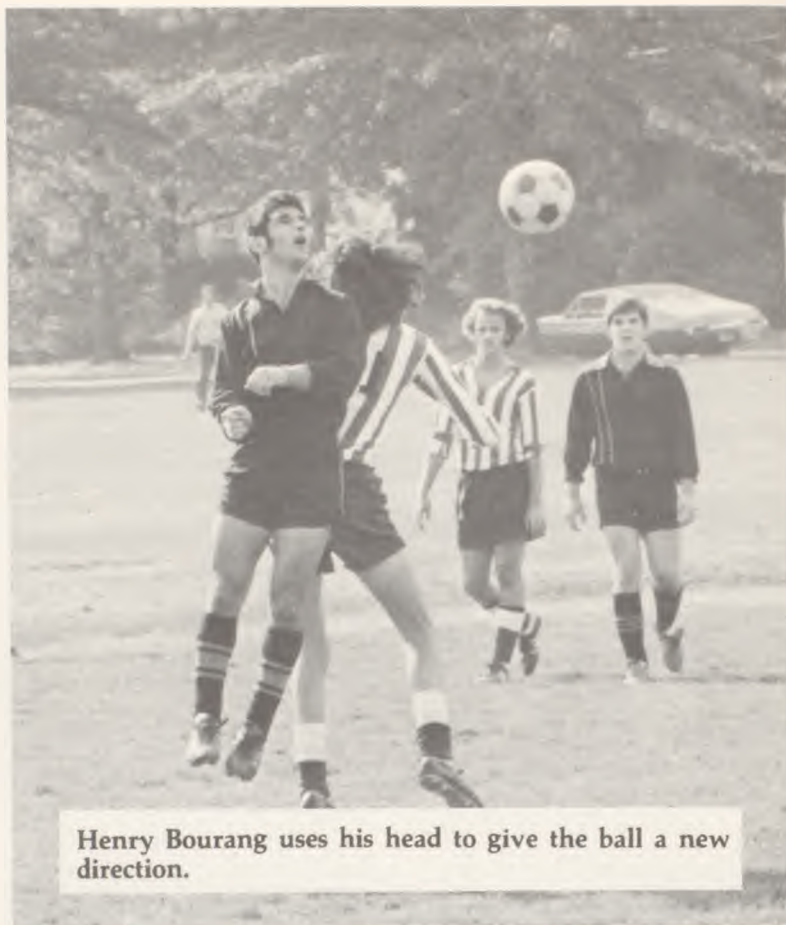

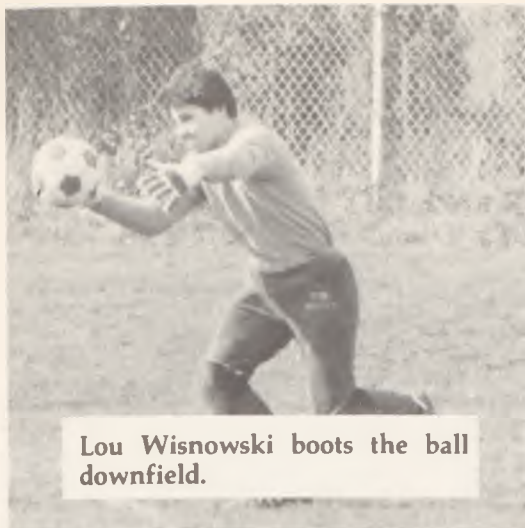

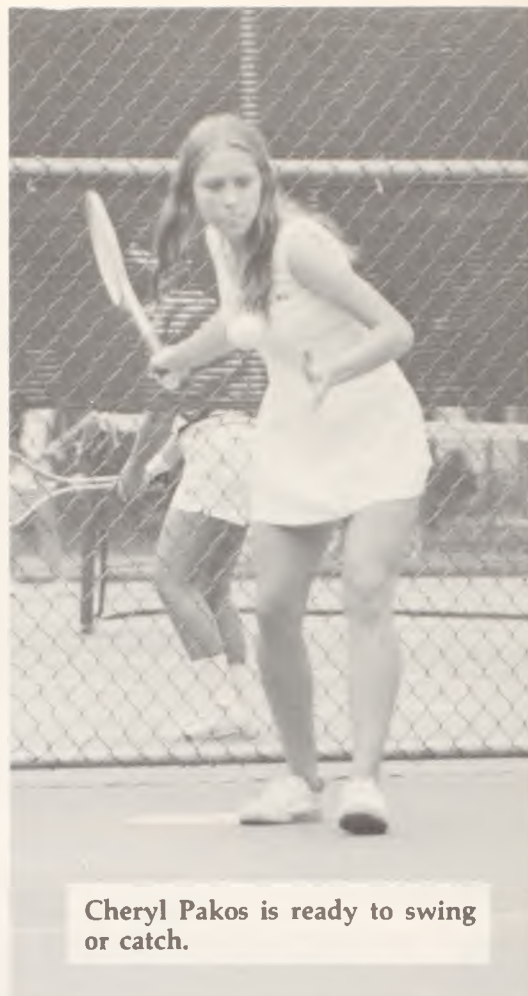
THE SWING OF THINGS

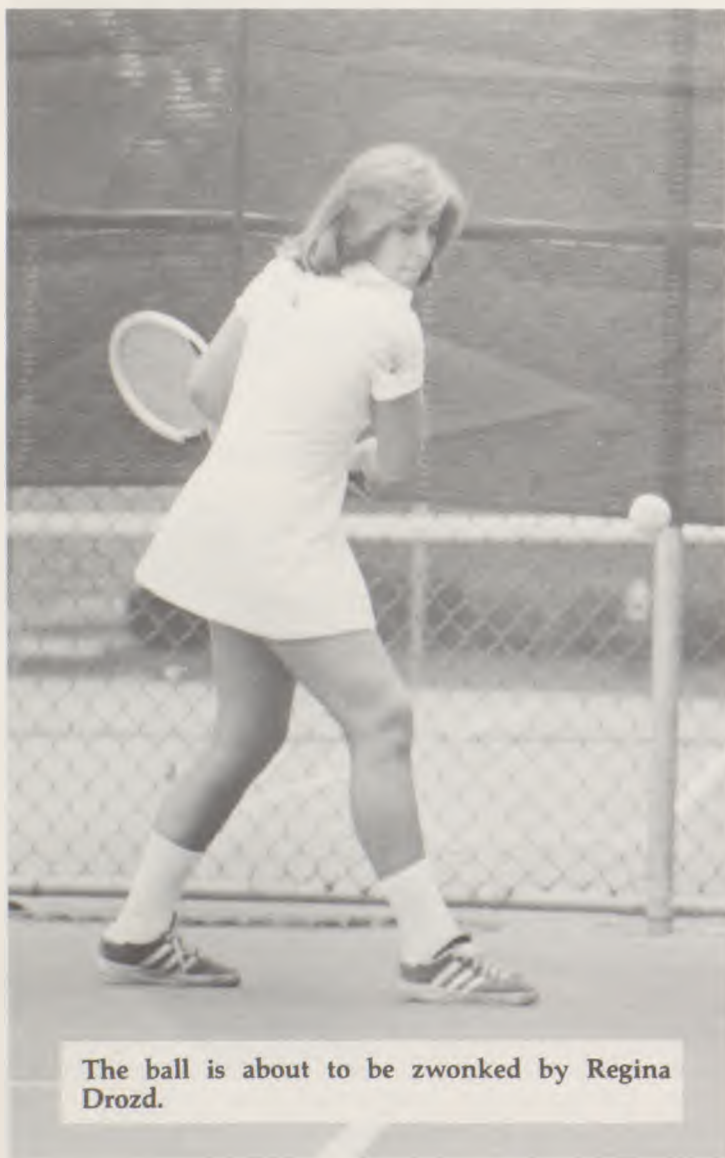
The team consisted mainly of Juniors with main strengths in first and second singles played by Cheryl Pakos and Barbara

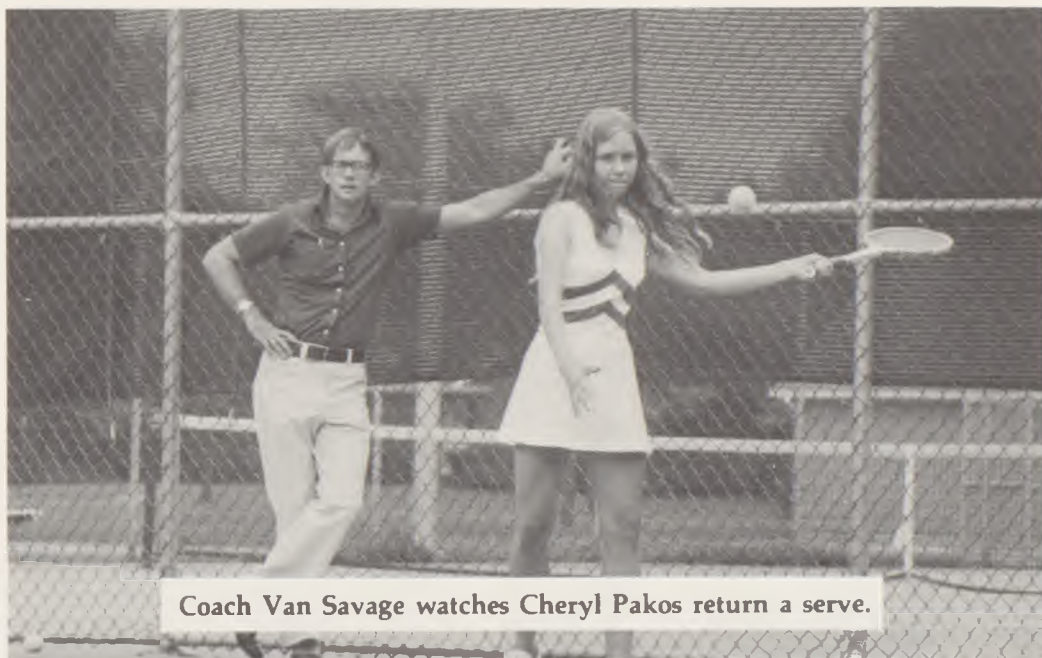

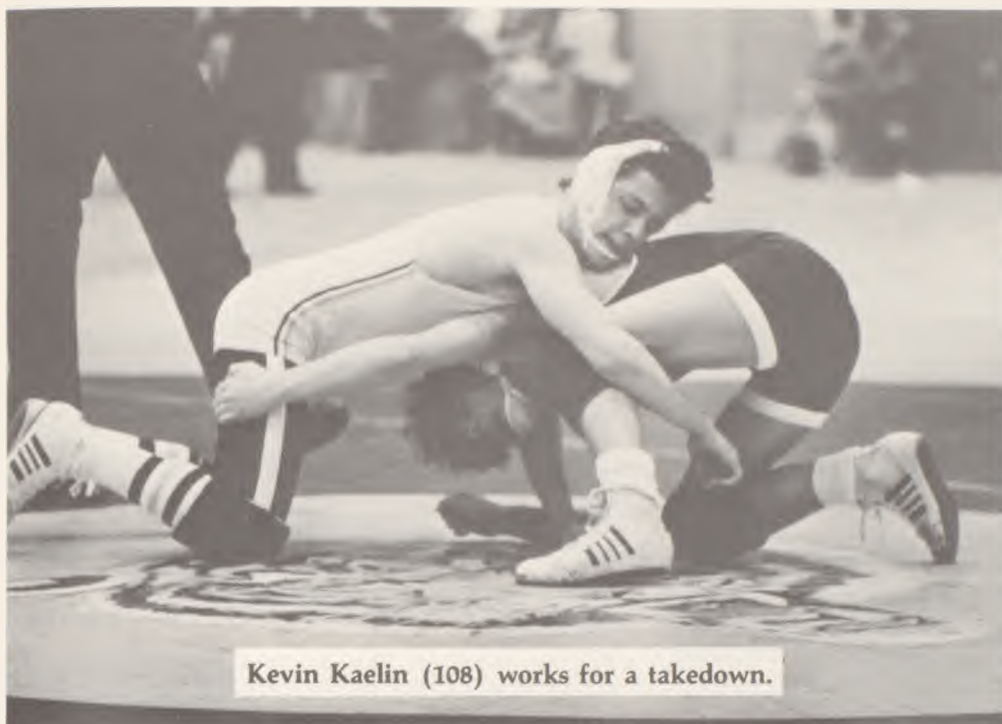

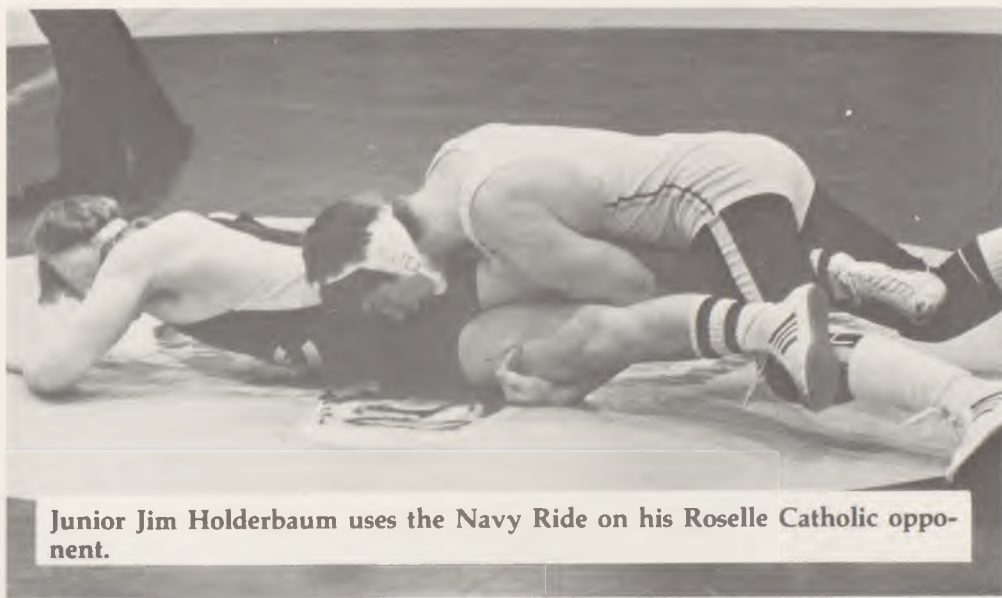

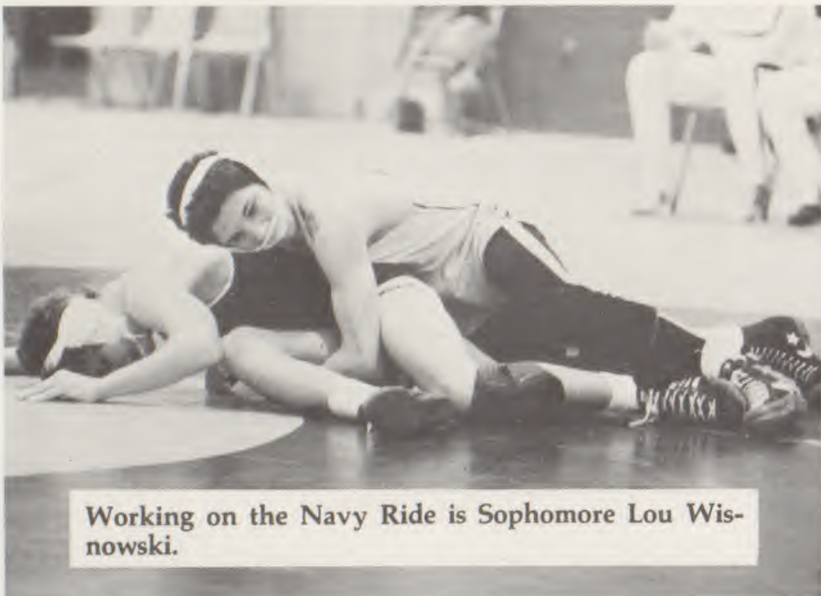

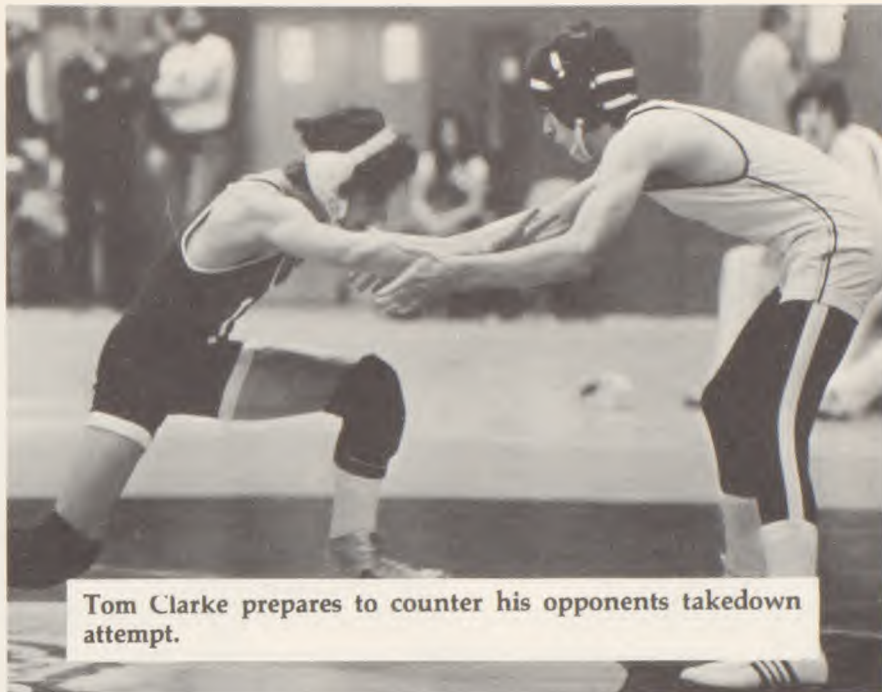

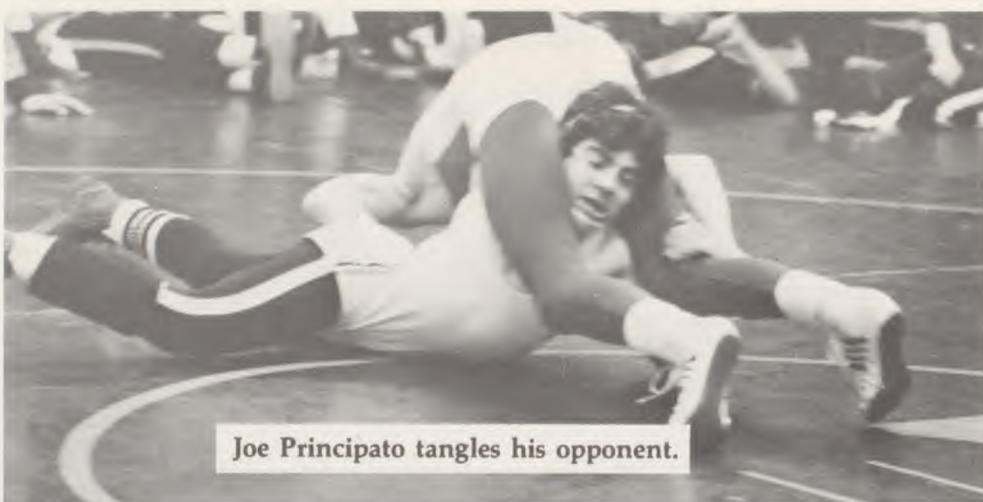
GREAT JV'S

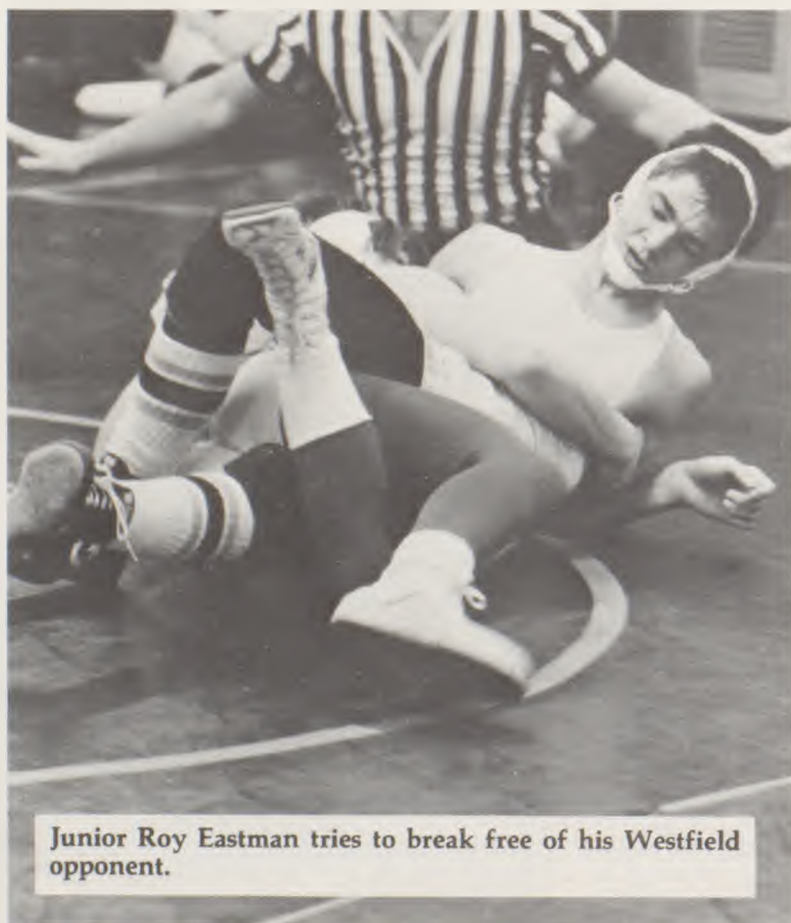

The 1976-77 Linden Varsity Basketball team really proved that "Linden Means Basketball." The team, complete with their new coach, Mr. Jerry Imbriacco, and only two returning lettermen, started their season on December 10 with a big home court victory over Rahway (73-46). Starters Rosey Peeples (6'4"), Aaron Howard (6'7"), and Mike Shreck led the scoring with 18, 17, and 12 points respectively. 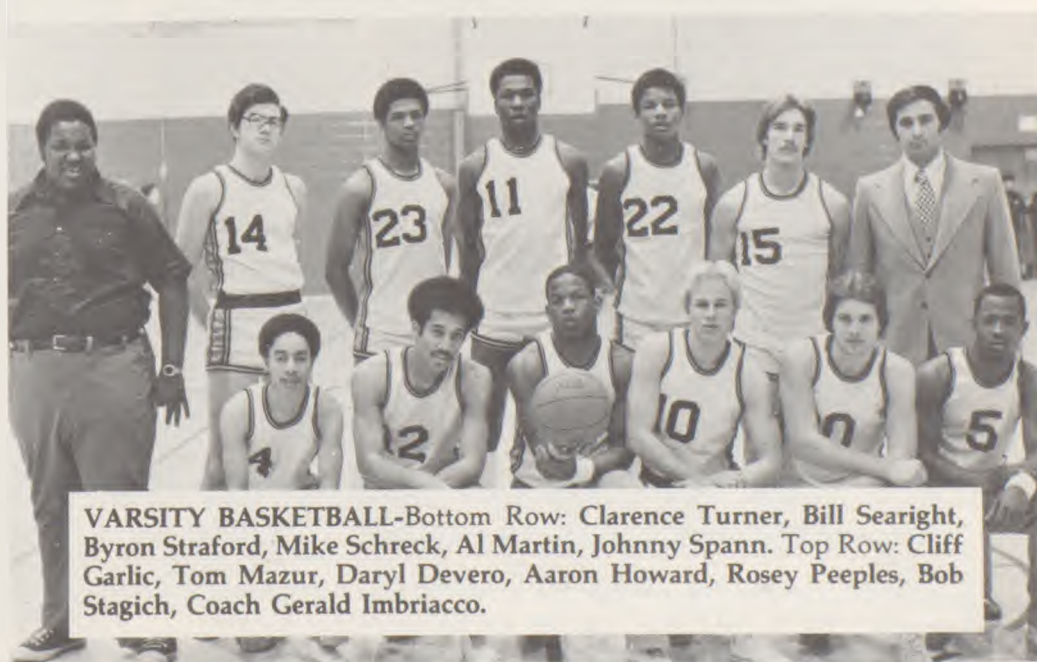

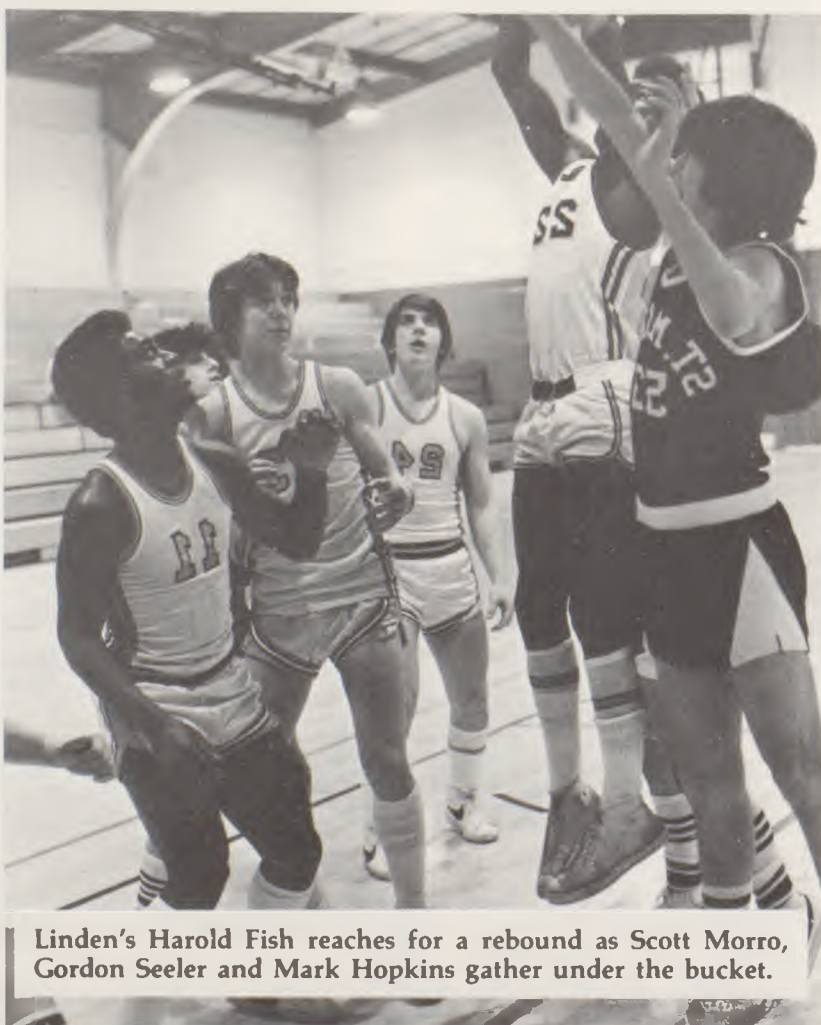

Harold Fish netted 22 points in their next win over Jefferson 70-65. They edged past Plainfield with Koluch's 20 points helping them to a 62-60 victory.

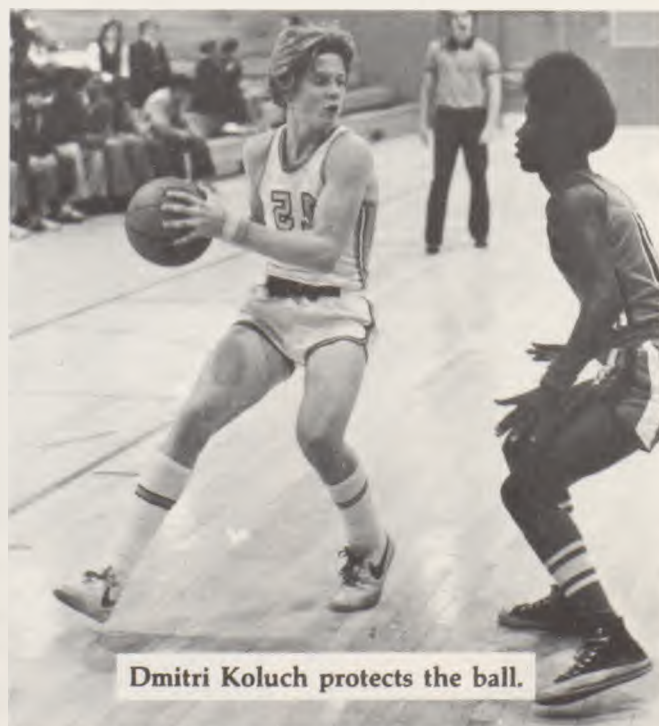

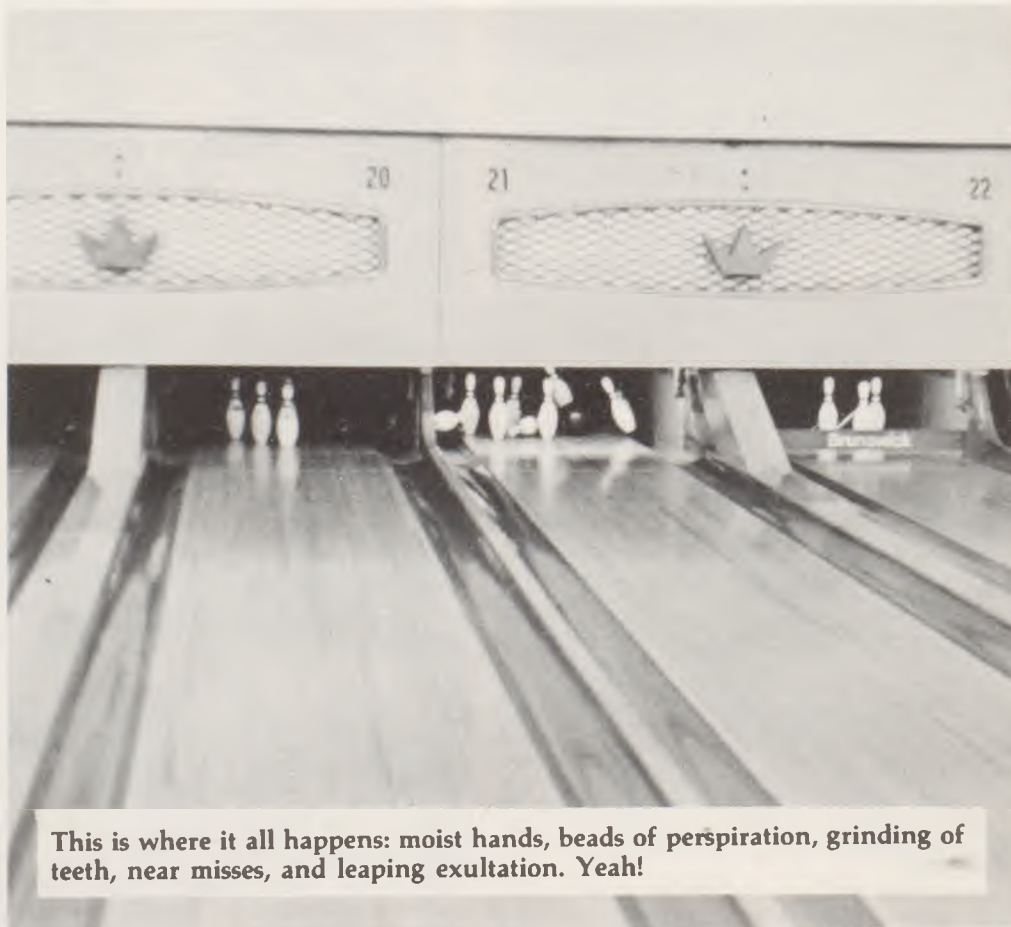

During the season, Varsity Capt. Vinnie Chesnowski had a high series of 636 for the Watchung Conference which included scores of 245 and 243.

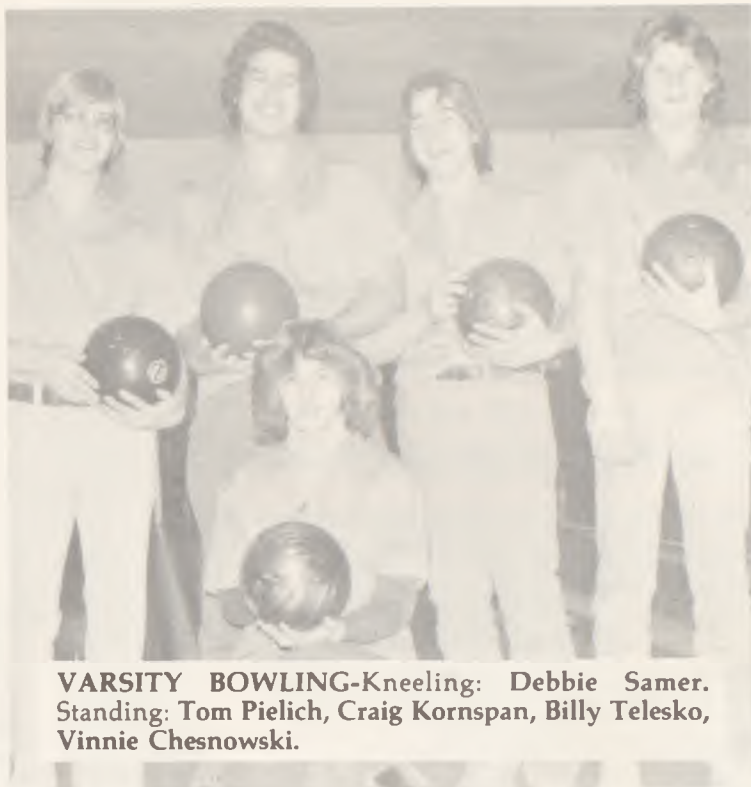

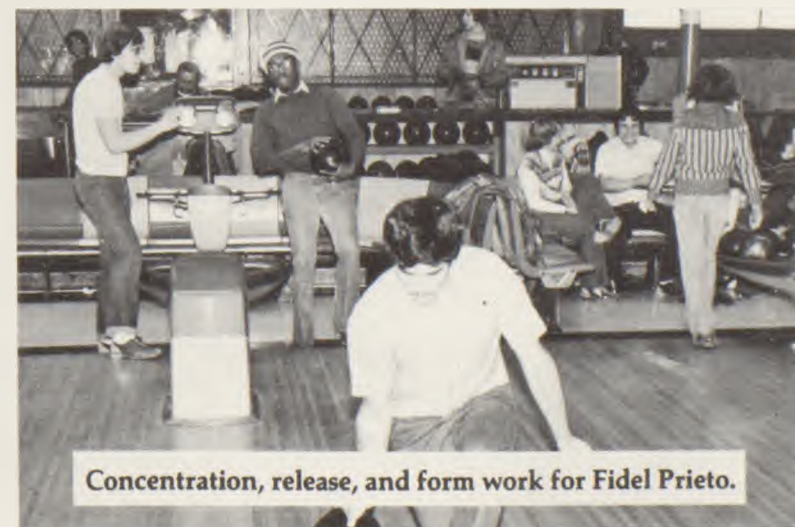

Year In Review

Here in a capsule are some of the events that happened in our year.

Aug. 15

The Democratic Convention nominated Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale as Presidential and Vice-Presidential candidates respectively.

Aug. 18

A large algae mass and numerous dead fish forced beach closings along the New York and New Jersey coasts after health officials witnessed the dead fish and tons of garbage being washed ashore.

Aug. 20

The Republican Convention nominated President Gerald R. Ford and Robert Dole. Ford issued a challenge to Carter for a series of debates to examine in close detail the platform of both sides.

Aug. 21

Pruning a tree caused the death of two American officers and the injury of several others by North Korean guards who resented their actions.

Aug. 24

Two cases admitted to a New York hospital showed signs of a reappearance of the mysterious Legionnaires Disease, which had already killed 26 and struck down 149 others while at a convention in Philadelphia at the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel.

Aug. 25

Rebates became available in an upward tax relief to homeowners. Filing began today as part of the income tax package enacted into law earlier this summer.

Aug. 27

Rumors spread as to the bombardment of microwave rays on the American Embassy in Moscow. The purpose of the beams had been to jam U.S. listening devices on the embassy's roof. The reported ill health of U.S. Ambassador Walter J. Stocssel led to the discovery of the high radiation count.

Aug. 31

State Aids to Roselle Public Schools was denied because of no full desegregation plan for

all its schools.

Sept. 1

Meadowlands, a \$300 million sports complex in Hackensack, N.J., opened its doors to a night of horse racing. Its football stadium houses the N.Y. Giants.

Sept. 3

State officials uncovered a forgery and theft ring at the Air Force Academy. Stolen cadet checkbooks and military identifications allowed criminals to cash checks at near-by restaurants and banks.

Sept. 4

Viking II space probe landed on Mars and immediately began transmitting pictures and data. Scientists expressed surprise at the sharp rocks in desert-like terrain. Analyzed Martian soil samples suggested a possibility of life on Mars, but could have been caused by non-organic reactions in the soil.

Sept. 7

Vietnam sent information to U.S. officials identifying 12 U.S. airmen killed in action but listed as missing. Apparently, this gesture attempted to ease U.S. opposition to Vietnam's application for membership in the United Nations. U.S. officials increased demands for a stepped-up identification program for other M.I.A.

Sept. 9

Chairman Mao Tse Tung, founding father of the People's Republic of China, died at the age of 82 after a long illness. His death intensified the power struggle for the next premier.

Sept. 10

Kathy Denham of Minnesota received her crown and scepter as Miss America. She pledged to portray women in their ever-increasing role in America.

Sept. 11

Croatian nationalists hijacked a Trans World Airlines Boeing 727 holding 52 passengers in demand for independence from Yugoslavia. They also took credit for the bomb burst in New York's Grand Central Station when one policeman was killed and three others injured.

Sept. 13

A plot to kill Sen. Edward Kennedy was

uncovered after offices heard three conspirators discussing plans in a bar.

Sept. 15

In senatorial elections Danial Patrick Moynihan, former U.S. Amassador to the United Nations, ousted Bella Abzug in the N.Y. Democratic Contest.

Sept. 17

The Episcopal Church nullified a centuries-old tradition by voting to sanction women priests.

Sept. 18

State officals met with power company executives to insure that New Jersey will receive a "fair share" of potentially rich oil and natural gas deposits off the Jersey Coast.

Sept. 20

A crowd of 10,000 rallied at the State House in Trenton to demand an immediate repeal of the new State Income Tax.

Sept. 21

David, the boy who had been placed in the germ-free plastic bubble and never touched by human hands, celebrated his fifth birthday waiting for a "space suit" that will enable him to explore the world outside. Since birth David has lacked natural body defenses against disease.

Sept. 24

The first in a series of Presidential debates by President Ford and Mr. Carter and televised on all major networks from Philadelphia went slightly awry. Millions lost sound by electronic failure for twenty-seven minutes. Issues silently covered included economic and domestic policy.

Sept. 25

Patty Hearst, of terrorist fame, was convicted for armed bank robbery. The presiding judge ordered her to serve seven years. In 16 months she will be eligible for parole.

Sept. 28

Syrian and Lebonese Christian troops and tanks launched an all-out offensive against Palestinian positions in the mountains of Beirut.

Sept. 29

In a clash of heavyweights Ken Norton and

Muhammed Ali slugged through a close and highly disputed decision at Yankee Stadium. Ali was awarded victory.

Oct. 1

Governor Edmund Brown Jr. of California signed into law a bill which will give the terminally ill the right to die without medical treatment, the first such law in the nation.

Oct. 6

Controversy over administering the swine-flu vaccine ended with state health officals giving the O.K. to mass inoculation programs.

Oct. 7

The second Presidential Debate set off waves among politicians and diplomats over foriegn and defense policies. Both President Ford and challenger Jimmy Carter dropped restraints and studied politeness in a more aggressive match-up. A poll gave Jimmy Carter a slight edge over President Ford.

Oct. 8

The N.J. State Assembly took a first step toward reinstating the death penalty by voting out of committee a bill which would mandate electrocution for anyone convicted of premeditated murder.

Oct.9

Two members of the American Bicentennial Mt. Everest Expedition conquered the world's highest mountain.

Oct. 12

The re-trial of former boxer Rubin "Hurricane" Carter started today. Tight security measures, including the use of metal detectors, were used in the packed courtroom.

Oct. 14

President Ford came to Union's Town and Campus restaurant in a stop on his nation wide campaign. Large crowds generated enthusiasm for the President.

Oct. 15

A former Rahway resident, Dr. Milton Friedman, received the 1976 Nobel Prize in Economics.

Oct. 15

The N.Y. Yankees on a Chris Chambliss Homer in 9th, captured the American League pennant for the first time since 1964.

Oct. 16

Walter Mondale and Robert Dole clashed in a nationally televised debate, the first ever between Vice-Presidential candidates.

Oct. 19

A peace plan for Lebanon was signed by Arab Leaders in Saudi Arabia calling for a cease fire.

Oct. 21

A Mississippi Ferry capsized after being hit by a tanker. Twenty-four are known dead, 18 survivors with 50 or more persons missing.

Oct. 22

The Cincinnati Reds won the fourth game of the World Series to complete a sweep of the N.Y. Yankees and retain their championship.

Oct. 27

New York State's death penalty law is declared unconstitutional by the State Supreme Court.

Oct. 31

Major conservation laws are pending to protect Alaska's wilderness since the pipeline nears completion.

Nov. 1

A New Jersey mariner was discovered unhurt adrift after being reported missing for 17 days. He had attempted to circle the globe.

Nov. 2

Jimmy Carter won the Presidential election by narrowly defeating President Ford.

Nov. 3

Atlantic City celebrated a victory permitting legalized Las Vegas-style gambling.

Nov. 6

A prisoner exchange agreement has been reached between U.S. and Mexico. This affects some 600 Americans now in Mexican jails and 1,200 Mexicans in Federal prisons.

Nov. 10

Patty Hearst was suddenly transferred to a Correctional Center in San Diego. Sources say she had been throwing tantrums, and refusing assignments.

Nov. 11

Utah's Supreme Court has decided that Gary Gilmore, a convicted murderer, may be executed by firing squad.

Nov. 12

The Vatican reinforced its stand against abortion in a pastoral letter.

Nov. 13

Civil War again flared in Angola causing more than 9,000 refugees to flee.

Nov. 14

United Parcel Service ended an eight week strike.

Nov. 15

Blacks may now attend Jimmy Carter's Baptist Church in Plains, Georgia.

Nov. 16

The separatist Quebec Party, which seeks independence for the province, was swept into power in Canada.

Nov. 17

U.S. vetoed Vietnam's application to join the U.N. because an accurate accounting of missing American servicemen had not been given.

Nov. 20

A 12-hour strike ended as the United Automobile Workers and General Motors agreed on a new 3 year contract.

Nov. 21

The N.Y. Post has been sold to Australian publisher Robert Murdoch.

Nov. 23

A death penalty bill was passed overwhelmingly by the N.J. State Assembly.

Nov. 25

In eastern Turkey, an earthquake, registering 7.9 on the Richter scale, took at least 574 lives and possibly 3,000 more.

Nov. 29

An 18 year old student was arrested for the murder of his parents, Harry and Mary Jan La Roche, and 2 younger brothers at their home in Montvale N.J.

Dec. 2

A state of emergency has been called in Buffalo, N.Y. after record temperatures and snowfall.

Dec. 3

Cyrus R. Vance is selected by Carter to run the State Dept. in the first selection for his Cabinet.

Dec. 8

Kurt Waldheim won approval of a second-five year term as Secretary General of the United Nations.

Dec. 10

Capt. Vittoria Renzullo became the first woman to head a police precinct in New York City.

Dec. 12

Antarctica is being probed by a team of scientists who are drilling into the ice. This project has ten nations participating.

Dec. 14

16 yr.-old Steve Cauthen has made Aqueduct Raceway history by winning more times in a two week period than any other jockey.

Dec. 17

O.P.E.C. has settled the dispute of oil prices for the next 6 months by an increase of 5%.

Dec. 18

The death of the Swine Flu program was announced today by health officials. This stemmed from the association of the program with paralysis cases.

Dec. 19

The canonization of an American bishop, John Neumann, was approved. He will be America's third saint, and this country's first male to be sainted.

Dec. 21

Christmas shopping, which has been sluggish, picked up across the country and retailers predicted modest profits.

Dec. 22

Rubin (Hurricane) Carter and John Artis were convicted tonight on 3 counts of first-degree murder, affirming the verdict in their 1967 trial.

December 23

A tanker broke in half spilling five million gallons of crude oil into the Nantucket River.

December 28

A protest against the skyrocketing cost of coffee resulted in a nationwide boycott by consumers, supermarkets and restaurants.

January 2

Fear of asbestos fibers floating in the air has led to the closing of several New Jersey schools.

January 7

Frank Sinatra's mother was killed in a plane crash somewhere in the San Bernadino Mountains.

January 10

The Oakland Raiders beat the Minnesota Vikings, 32-14, at the Super Bowl in Pasadena.

January 12

Emergency action on the worsening shortage of natural gas was indicated by the Federal Power Commission.

January 16

At least 24 American servicemen were killed in a collision between a navy launch and a freighter in Barcelona Harbor.

January 17

Gary Mark Gillmore, after several appeals by lawyers, , was executed by firing squad at 8:07 a.m. this morning. His ashes were scattered over Utah by plane.

January 18

Subzero temperatures shattered records, closed schools, and stopped travel. A heavy drain on natural gas and electricity supplies was experienced.

January 19

A new bacterium is believed by scientists at the Federal Center for disease control to be the answer to the mysterious Legionnaires Disease.

January 20

President Ford, in his last day of office pardoned "Tokyo Rose" of treason.

January 21

Jimmy Carter was sworn in as the 39th President of the United States.

Jan. 22

A pardon was granted by President Carter to almost all Vietnam War draft evaders, but the status of deserters remains unsettled.

Jan. 23

Americans were asked by President Carter to keep thermostats at 65° or lower in order to save fuel levels.

Jan. 24

California is having its worst drought in years. Water levels are low with communities and farmers beginning to ration water.

Jan. 25

Amy Carter, arriving 10 minutes late, began her first day as a public school student at Thaddeus Stevens.

Jan. 26

The Senate confirmed Griffin B. Bell as Attorney General of the United States.

The State Medical Society of N.J. is the first to adopt a set of guidelines to follow in Karen Quinlan type cases.

Jan. 27

"Roots" resulted in the largest audience ever to watch television.

Jan. 28

Continuing cold weather has caused factories to be closed and thousands laid off. Gov. Byrne declared a state of emergency for N.J. He also ordered all thermostats to be lowered to 65° in public buildings.

Jan. 29

Freddie Prinze, co-star of "Chico and the Man" died from an apparent suicide.

Jan. 31

The National Broadcasting Company announced it had won exclusive rights to televise the 1980 Moscow Olympic Games.

Feb. 1

N.J. Legislature passed a bill prescribing the death sentence for first-degree murder when the crime was particularly vicious.

Feb. 2

Two people were found frozen to death after the gas in their home had been turned off due to non-payment of bills.

Feb. 3

Hardest hit by the winter, Buffalo received aid by a massive airlift of men and machines from New York City and military bases.

Feb. 7

Many people will return to work and school in New York today. In harder hit areas, lessons are being offered over radio and TV.

Feb. 8

Black nationalist guerrillas in Rhodesia raided a Catholic mission station killing seven white missionaries.

Feb. 10

Queen Elizabeth of Great Britain began covering a wide calendar of events for her silver jubilee.

Feb. 11

A physics student at Princeton has received world-wide publicity for his design of an atom bomb that works. It costs \$2,000 and materials can be purchased in stores.

Feb. 12

The New York Jets began negotiations for using the sports complex at Meadowlands as a training camp and home field.

Feb. 16

Mrs. Lillian Carter, the President's mother, went to India as a representative of the United States. She was formerly a Peace Corps nurse there for 10 years.

Feb. 17

The Anglican Archbishop of Uganda and two government ministers have been arrested in an alleged plot to overthrow President Idi Amin. Shortly afterward, their death in a car accident was reported by officials.

Feb. 19

The space shuttle, Enterprise, was flown successfully in a piggy back test with a 747.

Feb. 21

The Rev. Bruce Edwards, pastor of President Carter's hometown Plains Baptist Church, resigned, citing criticism over integration as his reason.

Feb. 23

Mexican coffee growers are drawing in huge profits from their high prices for coffee. Their present earnings are six or seven times greater than in 1975.

Feb. 24

Maintenance workers on strike in New York City have forced schools to close due to cold temperatures and piling garbage.

Feb. 28

New York maintenance workers ratified a new two year contract enabling schools to resume classes.

March 2

American tourists in Uganda were allowed to leave.

March 4

The United States Coast Guard began enforcing the new 200 mile limit fishing zone.

March 5

Hundreds of people in Bucharest Rumania, were reported to have been killed in a strong earthquake that rocked southern and Eastern Europe.

March 6

Pres. Carter held an informal "Ask Me" radio broadcast with a question and answer session.

March 9

A Linden High School student, Kevin Downey, was found murdered at a Bayway gas station in an apparent hold-up. Kevin had been working at the time as a favor for a friend.

March 10

Simulated germ warfare attacks, with live bacteria against American civilian targets, like turnpikes and airports, were conducted in 1969,

according to a report published in the N.Y. Times. A bacterial agent, later suspected of causing serious infections, was used.

March 11

Small bands of gunmen, most claiming to be members of the Hanafi Moslem Sect, invaded three buildings in downtown Washington, killing one person, wounding at least 11 and taking hundreds of others hostage. The raids occurred at the B'nai B'rith headquarters, the Islamic Center and Mosque, and a District of Columbia building.

March 12

The public responded vehemently against the Food and Drug Administration's announcement that it would ban saccharin, which is believed to be a cancer-causing agent.

March 13

Church Bells rang and automobile horns blared upon the release of 134 hostages who had been held by Hanafi Moslem gunmen. Twelve of them were tentatively charged with armed kidnapping and several were freed pending further legal proceedings.

March 14

Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin of Israel rejected President Carter's view that Israel should give up virtually all territory captured from the Arabs in the 1967 war.

March 17

(St. Patrick's Day)

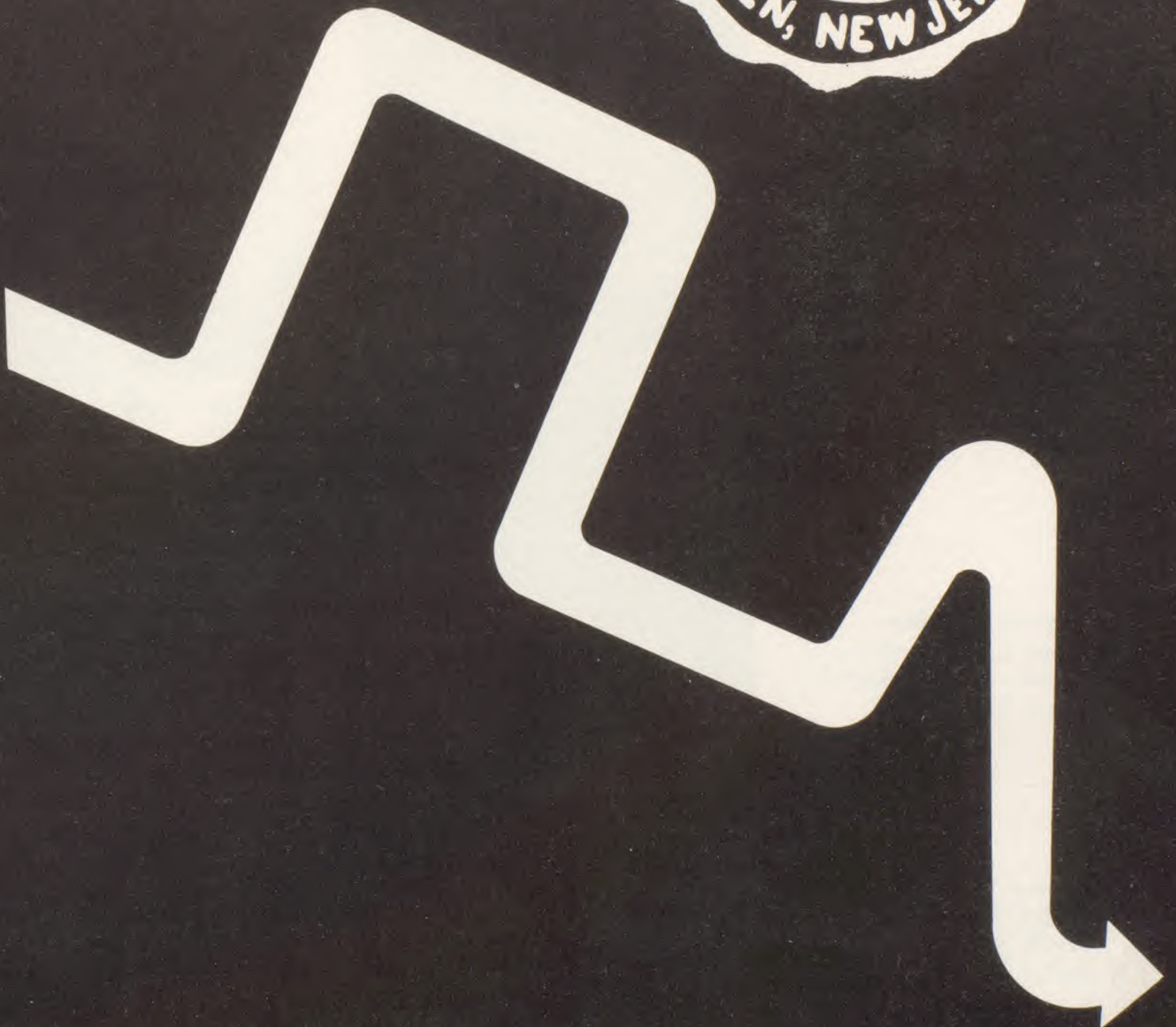
American Indians could virtually govern themselves under a recommended report of the American Indian Commission. It also recommends a policy of preserving Indian culture.

All danced to the music of Milt Davidson and dined on salad, prime ribs, string beans almondine, with baked Alaska for dessert.

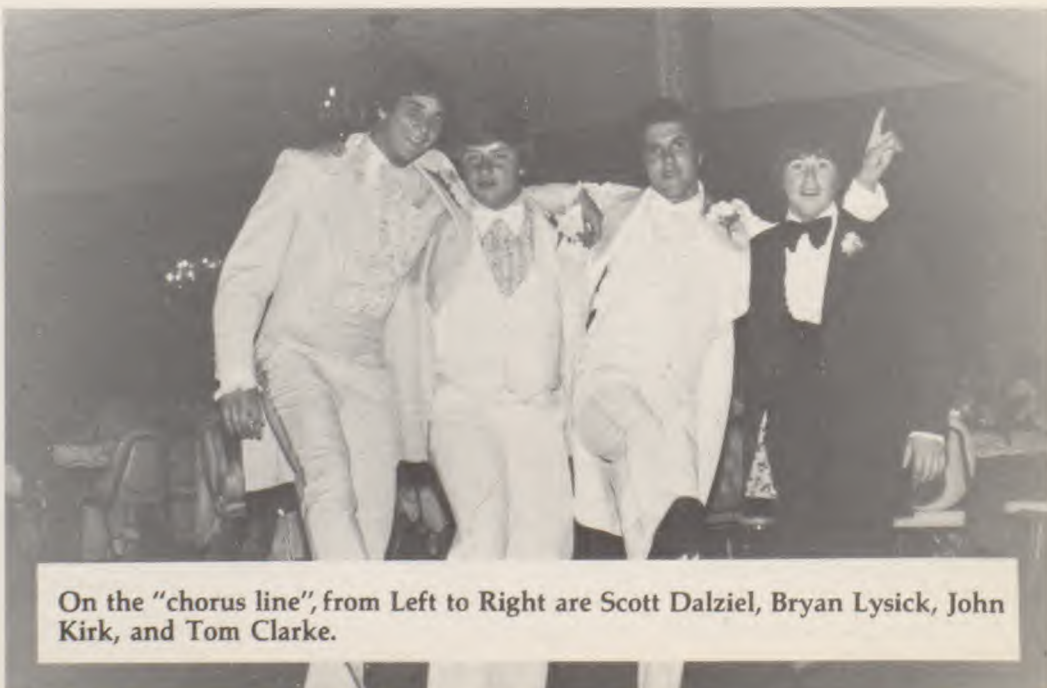

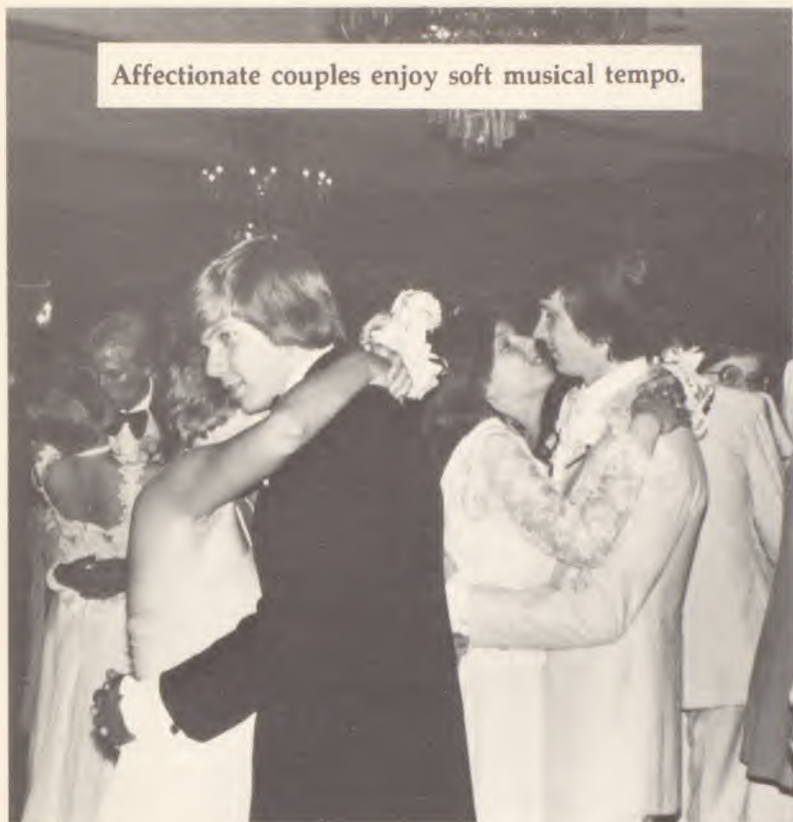

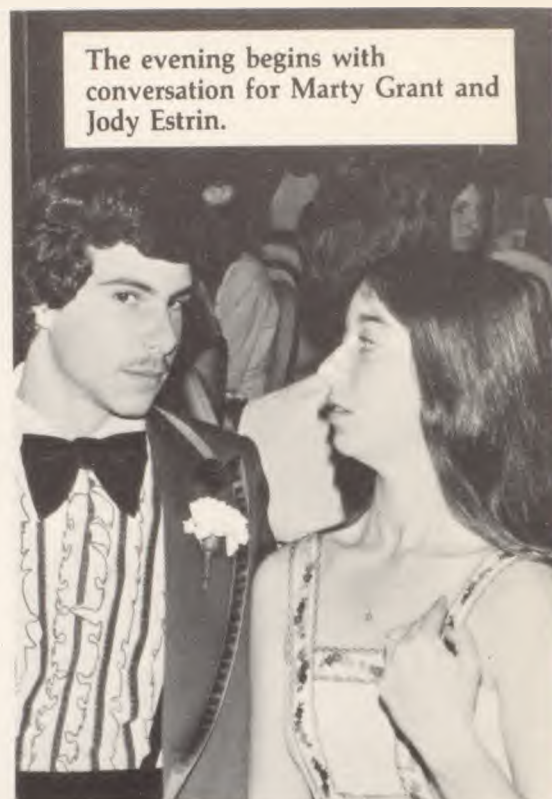
Couples listened and danced to the music of the Shangri La's while delighting in their main course of roast beef, potatoes, and corn.

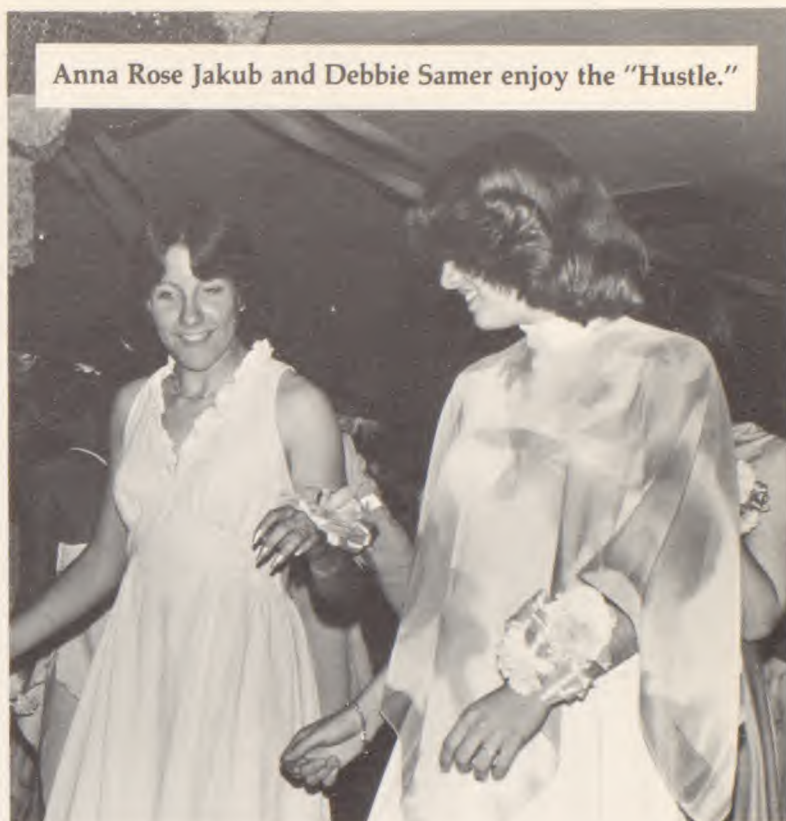

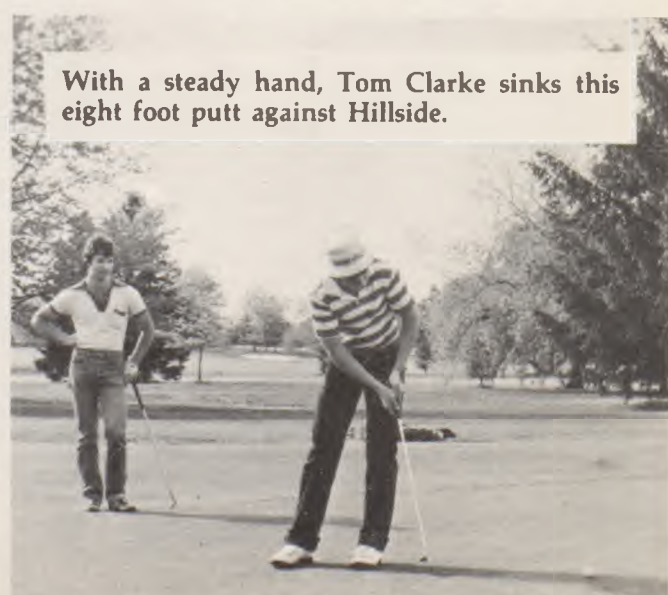

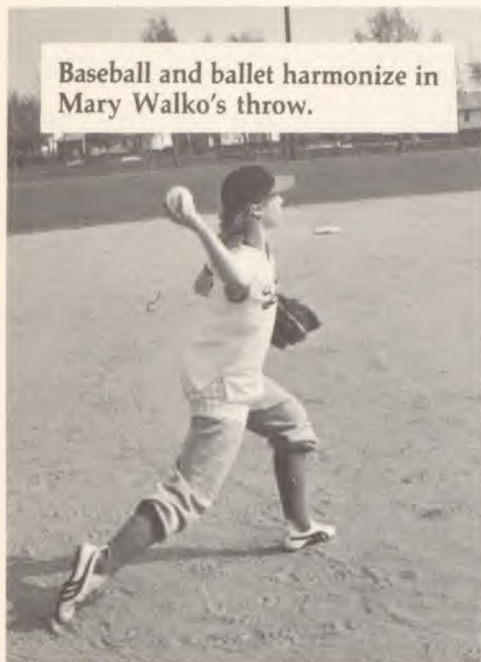

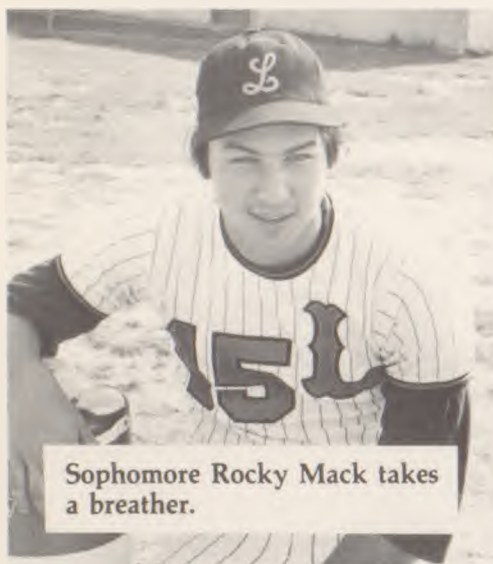

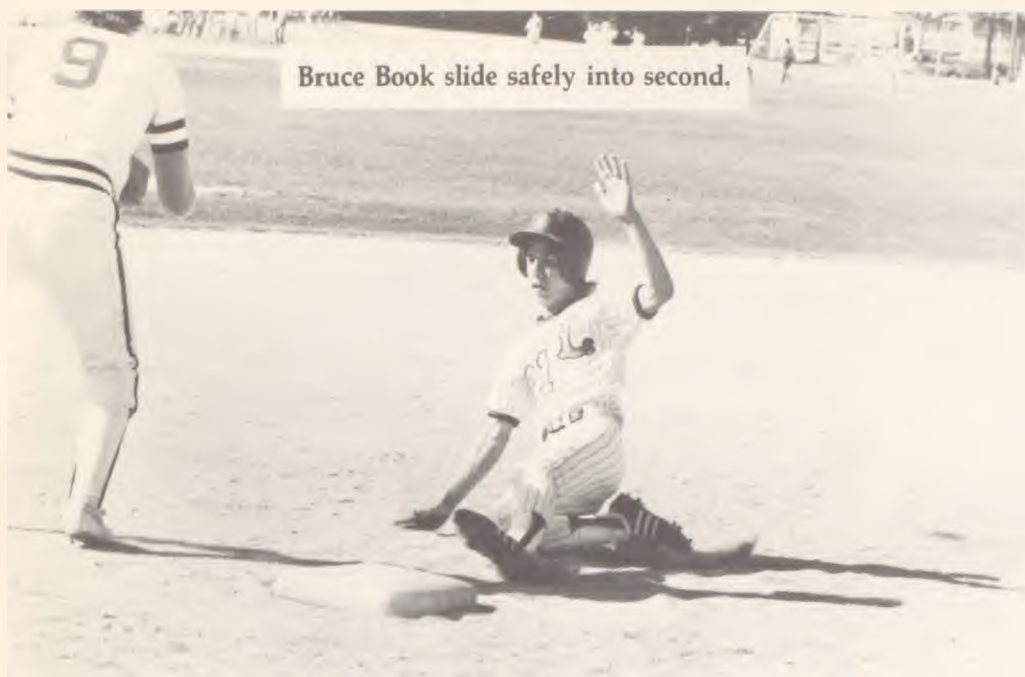
