
on the pages of the yearbook. Commencing with the continuity of the yellow bolt onto the endsheets, power surged through to the dividers and became absorbed within each section.











Guiding the way to a productive year.

An office where students could obtain help with personal or academic problems, guidance offered valuable aid.

Six counselors provided individual attention to teachers, parents, and students with conferences upon request.

Progress reports kept parents up to date on students' work, and they also recommended student and professional tutors to those who needed it.

Guidance administered several tests to various grades: including P.S.A.T., California Achievement, New Jersey Minimum Basic Skills, and Scholastic Aptitude. They also assisted students in course selection and provided information about hundreds of careers from books and pamphlets.

With the Guidance Information System, counsellors obtained information concerning colleges, occupations and financial aid through the use of a computer. They provided transcripts and recommendations to college-bound seniors and advised them about college choices.

A college day when juniors and

seniors could obtain information about New Jersey colleges was also sponsored by the guidance department

In addition to its many other services, the guidance counselors helped students apply for working papers. They also arranged for home instruction and assignment to be sent to those who were ill at home.

His post-war education, subsidized by the navy, included attending the Universities of North Carolina, Notre Dame, and then New York, where he earned a master's degree in diesel engineering. For several years afterward, he taught at Pingry and also taught special classes before coming to Linden High. Commenting on his job, Mr. Young stated, "As long as I enjoy what I am doing, and as long as the kids enjoy coming here, I will always enjoy teaching."

Besides teaching, Mr. Young also enjoys travelling, his worldwide visits include China, Russia, and Europe. From the places of his travels, he collects and carves various types of wood. Several of these have been exhibited in New Jersey museums and have captured competition awards. Others have a permanent home in the shop, presenting a log of both travel and skill.



Taking a step in the right direction.

n an attempt to give students a better physical education program. instructors devised and put into effect a new elective system. Students had a choice of various courses: one activity covering the first half of the marking period, and another completing the remaining half. As many different courses as possible, such as modern dance, yoga, weight training, jogging, basketball, wrestling, floor hockey, soc-cer, and volleyball became available to both guys and girls. First choice went to seniors, second to juniors and finally sophomores filled out the remaining courses left by their upper classmen.

When divided, each group proceeded to the area where their activity took place: in either Gym A, Gym B, the Auxiliary Gym, or outside at Wilson Park. This provided for smaller classes and thereby increased the amount of class participation and individual attention possible in a single period. In addition, it developed more efficient utilization of the gym space available. Mrs. Pagoulatos, commenting on the new system, stated, "We're taking a step in the right direction."

For the first time in Linden High School history, the junior health program included a cardio-pulmonary course in addition to the customary

general health. Commonly referred to as CPR, this program demonstrated rescue breathing and chest compressions to students. By instituting this program, Linden High School became the second high school in Union County to include CPR in the health curriculum. Conventional subjects, such as drugs, alcohol, and their abuse and the hazards of cigarette smoking covered the remaining portion of the marking period.

Sex Education, a controversial subject at the time of its introduction, became accepted throughout the years in coeducational classes. This program enabled students to understand the sexual aspect of the body in greater depth and to then relate the anatomy and psychology to everyday

The sophomore health curriculum. driver's education, presented the New Jersey Motor Vehicle laws and rules. At the conclusion of the program, students took the State Written Driver's test, which counted when the student went for his or her

Changes emphasize BASIC skills

The math department featured changes and developments apparently beneficial to all math students.

Two new programs had been introduced. Mr. Colabelli taught an after school math review program of fifteen sessions to prepare students for the Scholastic Aptitude Test.

Mr. Numes not only took over for Mr. Elowitz, but also taught calculus. With increasing importance of computer programming came a worthwhile computer course, which Mr. Nunes also taught.

Four terminals make up the school's self-contained computer system. Once the fundamentals of programming had been mastered by a student, he could select programs in Math or Science. Students worked at their own pace and selected programs interesting to them. Mr. Nunes felt that "... courses in computer science will bring an understanding of the field of endeavor and an appreciation of the role of the computer in the world around us."

The department had two new members: Miss Fernandes, a graduate of Linden High, and Mr. Dubrowsky. These and other teachers used new textbooks in general mathematics and compensatory education mathematics.

Mr. Nunes guided students who participated in various math contests held in schools and colleges. Mr.

Linden High's supervisor, Mr. Tylicki, commented, "We consider strong basic skills in mathematics a priority in the Linden Public Schools. All eleventh grade students must take the Minimum Basic Skills test of the NJ Educational Assessment Program, and those going on to college in NJ must take the NJ College Basic Skills Placement Test. We are exploring new ways of reaching high school students not currently taking mathematics"



Theory and application stimulate curiosity.

Whether one's interest lay in quantum mechanics or cell theory, the science department offered a variety of courses to stimulate each curiosity.

Mr. Kaplan, Mr. Salzer, Mrs. Meril, and Mr. Gaines instructed juniors and seniors in Chemistry. Only one Chemistry II class existed, which Mr. Salzer guided in advanced study of principles and laboratory work.

Lorraine Wojtowicz and Ron Koenig, also under Mr. Salzer's wing, took on Chemistry III — independent study. With only a textbook to guide them, they delved into qualitative analysis.

An Honors Chemistry class for science-oriented sophomores allowed these students to take maximum advantage of science courses in their following years. These students had an extra period each day which they devoted to the laboratory.

Students taking Biology met with Mr. Czarneski, Mr. Hoffmann, Mrs. Meril, or Mr. Mehalik every day. Two advanced Biology classes under Mrs. Meril and Mr. Hoffman gave juniors and seniors new insights into plant development, dissection, and other aspects of Biology.

A class of juniors studied with extra emphasis on the chemical aspects of Biology.

Field trips to Warinanco Park highlighted the Environmental Science course which stressed the fundamentals of Ecology. Mr. Mehali showed his Earth Sciences classes the forces that influence the earth and its surface.

Physics, a course exclusively for seniors, exposed them to vectors and acceleration. Mr. Gaines and "Super-Senior" covered a variety of topics. Applied Science and Language of Science provided business, general, and vocational students with a background in science.

Mrs. Delores Mazlow, the new head of the science department,

acquainted hreself with the faculty and her different role as supervisor She worked to get speakers from industries such as Bell and Howell and state colleges to expose students to different aspects of science. One of her main concerns became safety in the lab. A good report from the Middle States Evaluation indicated that the department offered a good preparation for science-oriented students.




The student council served as a sounding board for any complaints or requests the students may have about the school. It kept informed on various clubs and class activities and ran many of its own activities.

Programs reach outside the classrooms

Under the direction of Mr. Natalo, the Distributive Education program developed students in the field through marketing, merchandising, and related management in order to prepare them for distributive occupations as well as further their understanding of the free enterprise system.

An introduction to DE, offered to sophomores, taught basic principles of marketing. DE I followed in the junior year and covered such topics as salesmanship and job interviews. The senior year course, Distributed Education II, presented students with the Cooperative Work Experience when students attend school for required classes in the morning and work during the afternoon.

The Distributed Education Clubs of America is a program of activities which students put knowledge gained to practical use. They competed in various DE conferences. 












Tough competition keeps team on toes.





Toward the end of June, 1979, a phenomenon hit the class of '80. Students felt the shock waves daily, and for some the tremors never quite ended. Owning a car can be earthshaking.

Within the ranks of Taylor Publishing Company, a Within the ranks of Jaylor Publishing Company, a change in personnel resulted in Mr. George Franklin replacing Mr. Bill Tilley as our publisher representative. The transition went smoothly for us with no loss in negotiations, color, or quality of the CYNOSURE. The Senior Editorial Staff met every deadline — but one. The Junior Editorial Staff (interested, ready, and willing) salloyed to the result Mr. Colona preed to

willing) galloped to the rescue. Mr. Coplan agreed to permit Junior Staff take-over of the January deadline and freed them from classes for one day to meet the deadline. They did so very successfully. For the final deadline of March 14, Mr. Coplan compassionately freed eleven staff members (senior and junior) from classes for one day.

Every year for the past six years the press run has been cut due to lack of sales, subscriptions, ads, and general student apathy. Over one-hundred seniors did not purchase yearbooks. In spite of these factors, the price of the CYNOSURE has held at \$10.00 — not only for this year but for the previous four years. The press run was for 650 copies — the smallest press run

in six years.

Biem Studios of Irvington, N.J. provided portraits and between 4,000-5,000 candids. Mr. Biem also provided film, chemicals, equipment, and supplies for the new CYNOSURE darkroom.

The cover design was drawn by Mrs. Dapkus of Vo-Tech who utilized lettering invented by Lorraine Wojowicz. Lorraine is also responsible for the lettering and paw prints on the dividers.

Junior Editorial Staff elected Monica Blischok as their chairperson who led them through their twenty page deadline and also designed every single page of the undergraduate section.

A directory listing addresses and phone numbers of all staff members was compiled jointly by Paul Olsewski and Ken Frank.

Many thanks are offered to Lorraine Wojtowicz for her effort, persistance, creativity, and willingness to perform any task which required doing, including


