KRAMER APPROVED

On Monday, May 15, 1995, the Matawan-Aberdeen Regional School District approved, by a 9-0 vote, the appointment of Dr. Steven Kramer as the new Matawan Regional High School principal, effective July 1, 1995. Dr. Kramer will be taking over the position from retiring principal Roger Tuccillo, who has served in the district for 38 years.

Mramer, who is currently employed by the Warren County Vocational Technical High School in Washington, New Jersey, is not a newcomer to this type of job. He has held previous administrative positions at Somerville High School and in the Irvington District. Kramer emerged as the top choice for the job at MRHS over 22 other applicants.

other applicants. Michael D. Klavon, Superintendent of Schools, said of Kramer "We (the Board) were all impressed by his wide background." The new principal's annual salary is set at \$83,340.

Dr. Kramer has visited this school before; he served as Assistant Chairperson of the Middle State Committee, which evaluated our school in November 1994. Hopefully, Kramer's takeover as principal will be a smooth and efficient one that will allow Matawan's daily operations to proceed as usual.



SCHOOL BIOGRAPHY

Since its establishment in 1962, Matawan Regional High School has been serving its students and the community. Both academically and athletically, Matawan has earned a reputation as being the best. The many sport teams, such as basketball, baseball, soccer, tennis, track and football have brought many trophies and honors to the school. MRHS is a member of the B-North division of the Shore Conference, which is also the athletic conference of Holmdel, CBA, Marlboro, and other perennial powerhouses that make competition tough and victory for Matawan

The high school has a renowned academic program, with elective courses ranging from psychology to cosmetology, and advanced placement courses in almost every subject. Students from Matawan often go on to bigger and better things, namely Harvard, MIT, U. Penn., Cornell, Amherst, and many other fine institutions of higher learning. The high school also annually provides several Governor's Scholars and finalists, as well as winners and participants in other award programs.

HUSKY MYSTERY "WILL IT EVER BE SOLVED?"



LIFE IN MATAWAN 1946-1996

In fifty years since the first Pillar was published, Matawan and its high school have undergone many dramatic changes. 



AMERICA EXPERIENCES MANY NEWSWORTHY EVENTS

During the fifty years since the Pillar's inception in 1946, America and the rest of the world have witnessed many newsworthy events; some happy, some tragic. The post-World War II era brought a feeling of comfort and stability to Americans. With the Depression now over, it was time to rebuild. The post-war baby boom gave way to the rapid formation of families during the 1950s, a period of prosperity and status quo. This era of "Camelot" may have ended in 1963, however, with the assassination of the beloved President John F. Kennedy Jr. This brought about an era of internal revolution and tension in the United States. Blacks began to demand the rights that had been unfairly denied to them for so long. When America went to war with Vietnam, many opposed it. Young people across the nation staged both peaceful and violent protests to stop the escalation of the war.

After the turmoil caused by the civil rights movement, Vietnam, and Watergate was over, America began a period of recuperation and prosperous times. People began to take an interest in making more money for themselves. This attitude, most illustrated by the "yuppies" of the early and mid-1980s, led to a massive disparity of income - the rich got richer while the poor suffered. The AIDS epidemic, which began in the early 80s, affected increased amounts of people, and by the 1990s it became a household anagram. This incurable disease is still the number one target of medical researchers, doctors, and government, taking precedence even over the war on drugs which was begun by Reagan during his eight year term.


The types of movies and TV shows that we watch have changed dramatically from the 1940s, "Casablanca" became "Clueless"; "Of Mice and Men" became "People"

HUSKY SPORTS &CLUBS SEE MANY CHANGES

In the past fifty years of the yearbook, we have seen many changes in our extra-curricular activities. In 1951 there was only one sport for girls: cheerleading. On the other hand, football, basketball, baseball, and track were open for boys. However, there were many other activi-

ties for both girls and boys. We had the commercial club, student council, NHS, majorettes, glee club, dance band and orchestra, mixed chorus, journalism club, library club, Block "M" club, and the French, German, and Latin clubs. By the next year, the G.A.A. started. This was an intranual sport for girls to compete in.

In 1956 a few more clubs were added to the MRHS extracurricular roster: an orchestra and brass choir,






junior dramatics, and junior Red Cross council. These were the precedent for some clubs to help in future careers, because by 1961 there was a future nurses, teachers, and mathemagicians club. The boys started a bowling and cross-country team, and the color guard, debate team, biology club, and student activity club were also founded. Then in 1969, a number of new clubs were started. The honors math club, thespian society, spanish club, medical career club, L.S.D. club (let's stop drugs), American field service, audio-visual, VIP club, history club, wrestling, golf and girls' basketball and track were formed.

started a Bowling and Cross-country Team, and the Colorguard, Debate Team, Biology Club, and Student Activity Club were also founded. Then in 1969, a number of new clubs were started. The Honors Math Club, Thespian Society, Spanish Club, Medical Career Club, L.S.D. Club (Let's Stop Drugs), American Field Service, Audio-Visual, VIP Club, History Club, Wrestling, Golf

In the seventies women had even more opportunities to join clubs. Field hockey, Girls Cross-country, Girls Bowling, and Gymnastics were added, and there was even a

girls "Block "M", for all girls with varsity letters. That year also saw the institution of the Marching Huskies, Musically Talented Club, Photography, Future Secretaries of America, Newspaper, Student Advisory Council, Jazz Band, and Boys' Soccer.

By 1985, many of our current clubs had been officially formed, including History and Government, SADD, FBLA, Ski Club, Calculus Club, DECA, Peer Leadership, Building Trades, Graphics, Future Hair Designers of America, Vocational Industrial Clubs of

America, and Co-ed Tennis. Since 1992, many other clubs including: AASU (African American Student Union), Chamber Choir, Chess Club, Environmental Club, Foreign Language Honor Society, Key Club, and SIDE (Students Involved in Drug Education) have been formed.

The sports program and after school clubs have long been part of the Matawan tradition, but although our winning ways have not changed, the types of sports and clubs that Matawan offers have. The Fencing Team, Ski Club, and Future Secretaries of America used to be available to students here. Football, though, has always remained strong. Researchers announce that ithey have isolated a gene in mice linked to obesity. Mice with a mutated OB gene are injected with the hormone leptin, resulting in dramatic weight loss. The public is tantalized at the prospect of leptin as a slimming treatment for use in humans.

The world's first test-tube gorilla is born at the Cincinnati Zoo in October as part of an effort to save the western lowland gorilla, an endangered species that numbers fewer than 450 animals.



Fossils of a jawbone (left) and leg bone (right) found in Kenya in August reveal a previously unknown species of upright hominid that lived four million years ago, pushing the emergence of bipedalism back half a million years. Walking upright is a key adaptation that separates humans from apes.



Media attention focuses on melatonin, a naturally occurring formone used to induce sleep and slow the effects of aging. Lauded as a wonder drug, a kilogram of synthetic melatonin sells for as much as \$10,000.



In a procedure known as tissue engineering, scientists grow a human ear under the skin of a laboratory mouse. Researchers hope the procedure will play an important role in the future of transplant surgery.



As a protective measure against counterfeiting in the era of digital publishing, the Treasury Department redesigns U.S. currency bills, to be issued over the next five years, starting early 1996 with the new \$100 bill.



In June, volcanic eruptions give birth to a baby island. A new member of the Tonga Islands emerges near New Zealand, 900 feet high and 140 feet wide.



After a decade-long search, scientists isolate what may be the most important cancer-related gene. The defective gene known as ATM is associated with cancers of the breast, colon, lung, stomach, pancreas and skin, and may be carried by two million Americans.

Astronomers using the Hubble Space Telescope observe new moons orbiting the planet Saturn, adding at least 2 moons and possibly 4 to Saturn's previously known total of 18.

A team of French and British explorers believe they have found an ancient breed of horse previously unknown to scientists.
