

Edison expanding landfill, cost put at \$10 million

EDISON — The township is going to expand its landfill at the end of Meadow Road at an estimated cost of \$10 million to \$15 million.

Metuchen and Highland Park, which are customers of the Edison landfill, will share in the cost of the work through increased "tipping" fees.

Without the expansion, according to township engineer William Lund, the existing site will be used up in a matter of months and the township will be required to dump its residents' refuse at the Edgeboro landfill in East Brunswick at a greatly increased cost.

As the first step in the expansion process, the Township Council on Wednesday night approved entering into a \$557,000 contract with Kupper Consultants of Piscataway.

Kupper's services will include preparing plans for the expansion and obtaining all necessary governmental approvals and permits, which is expected to take at least a year.

Kupper, Lund told the council at its agenda session Monday night, submitted the lowest figure of the three firms from which proposals were solicited. All of the companies, Lund said, are "highly qualified" in the specialized field of landfills and he

was "well pleased" with Kupper's work when it designed a major sewer project for Edison in the 1970's.

In an effort to "buy time" and extend the life of the existing landfill until the new facilities are available, the township is seeking approval for all "class 13 and 27" waste now dumped locally to be carted to Edgeboro.

Lund said this class of waste includes bulky items such as old appliances that are collected bi-monthly from curbside and commercial and industrial refuse.

However, obtaining approvals for shifting these categories of waste to Edgeboro is not automatic, Lund

stressed. He added that it was a requirement imposed last year that Edison accept at its landfill all refuse, both residential and commercial and industrial, that is generated within the township which has caused the problem. It has tripled the amount of material being deposited in the Meadow Road facility, according to Lund.

Lund informed the council that expansion will be accomplished by using an area of approximately 28 acres to the west of the existing site. This was used in the 1960s as a landfill and will be reactivated by in- (Please turn to page A-12)

Alleged jewelry thief bungles another heist

EDISON — If police allegations are correct, Rafael S. Arroyo should pursue a new line of endeavor.

Arroyo, 34, and a resident of the Park Rest Motel on Route 1 South, was arrested July 7 for the second time in less than two months in connection with a bungled burglary of a jewelry store.

Arroyo's second alleged attempt at being a jewel thief took place at Ganz Jewelers, 1945 Route 27.

However, he plunged through the roof while breaking into the building through an air conditioning duct shortly after midnight and was found hiding under a table inside the store by Patrolmen Michael Muldowney and Joseph Tauriello.

The 120-pound Arroyo, described as unemployed, was arrested on a charge of burglary and held in \$100,000 bail with no provision for posting 10 percent in cash.

Arroyo's first alleged foray into the jewel thief business took place May 16 at Neves Jewelers in Wick

Plaza. Accompanied by his wife, he reportedly smashed a glass door to gain entry and then smashed a display case from which he removed a number of men's and women's watches.

Police said that a Wick Center maintenance worker spotted Arroyos inside the store but he fled, heading toward Plainfield Avenue and leaving a trail of watches in his wake.

Arroyo later was picked up at Dey Place and Wilson Avenue after being pursued by Patrolman Michael Hegedus. He allegedly still had 16 watches in his possession and had suffered during the break-in a gash in the left thumb requiring five stitches.

Patrolman Adam Tietchen reported that when he and Patrolman Joseph Perrotte arrived at Ganz Jewelers at 12:26 a.m. in response to a burglary alarm, they found the building locked but observed that the ceiling of the store was caved in.

Patrolmen Joseph Kenney and Hegedus gained access to the roof (Please turn to page A-12)

White questions state's position in bus bidding

EDISON — If school boards in districts whose transportation coordinators have been charged with bid rigging were "not watching the store" then state agencies involved in monitoring school bus contracts have been out to lunch.

This, in effect, was the response of Edison Board of Education president John White to comments made by state Attorney General Cary Edwards when charges were announced last week against five men including John H. Stanik of North Plainfield, the Edison school district's transportation coordinator.

White and board attorney Joseph Ferenczi announced on Friday after the Board of Education's regular monthly agenda session the previous night that Stanik was suspended without pay from his \$44,500 a year job and the board would not contribute to his legal defense against state and federal charges that he had accepted \$70,000 in bribes between 1975 and 1988 from Robert N. Levay of Piscataway, the former operator of

Nicholas Levay Inc. of Metuchen, a school bus operator.

Obviously galled by the attorney general's implication of laxity on the part of boards in seven Central Jersey school districts, White said that Edison has been informed that Levay has transferred ownership of his company to his wife and the firm is expected to submit a bid next month on a contract for special education bus routes.

White described himself as "dismayed" about Edwards' "watching the store" comments because the district is bound by state bid laws and there is nothing that prevents the Levay firm from submitting a bid even though Levay pleaded guilty to theft by deception and restraint of trade.

Specific allegations to which he pleaded included joining with other bus companies in fixing bids in Edison, Plainfield and Woodbridge, paying a \$1,000 bribe to obtain a Plainfield school district vehicle maintenance contract and joining (Please turn to page A-12)

Action prompted by concrete dust

EDISON - Edward Walker of 45 Rodak Circle likes his neighborhood, "loves" his house but hates the fine gray dust that floats to the bottom of his backyard pool, coats his patio furniture and even infiltrates through the patio doors and into his dining room.

Walker claims the dust problem began when Clayton Block, which operates in a nearby industrial zone fronting on Route 1, moved in a Hazmag unit about a year ago and began recycling old concrete.

He points over his fence to a virtual mountain of the pulverized material spewed out by the Hazmag and

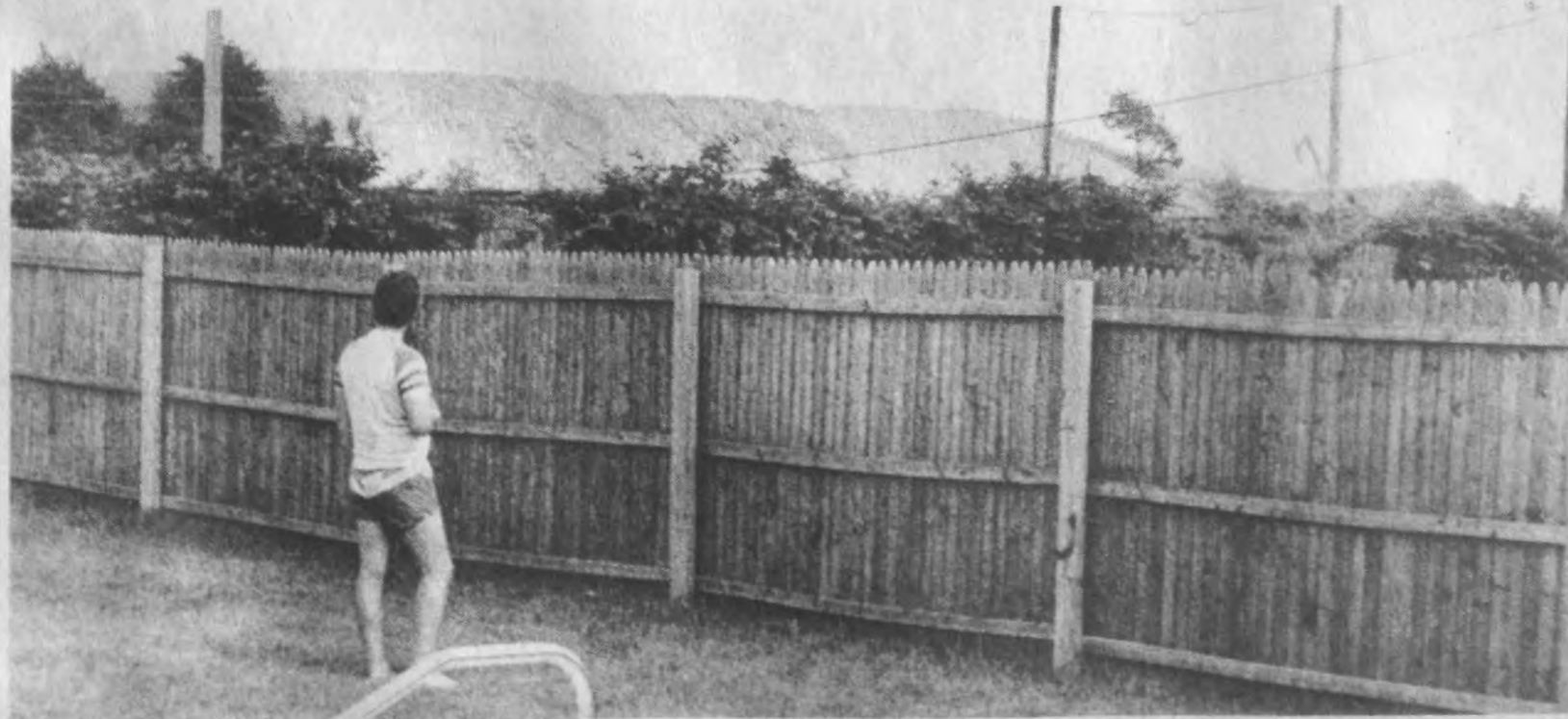
identifies it as the source of what he says is a neighborhood problem.

As a result of Walker's ongoing complaints and an investigation by zoning officer Steven Lombardi, a letter is being sent this week to Clayton Block instructing it to "cease and desist" the concrete recycling as a violation of the zoning ordinance.

Lombardi, who says he was unaware of the presence of the Hazmag — a machine developed after World War II to grind up the millions of tons of rubble in Germany — until after Walker began registering his complaints, is of the opinion that the con- (Please turn to page A-12)

MHS students fail to achieve goals for math

METUCHEN — The borough's 9th graders did not perform as successfully as anticipated on the mathematics portion of the state required High School Proficiency Test administered in April, creating concerns and questions about improving scores.

An analysis of the district's HSPT results presented at Tuesday night's Board of Education meeting by Metuchen High School principal John Novak showed students did well in both the reading and writing portions of the exam.

"I am not surprised by the reading and writing results of the test but I am, however, surprised at the math results," Novak told the board. "I thought we would have passed that area by 93 percent but we didn't."

The math results for the district show that of the district's 108 9th graders, 84.3 percent demonstrated minimal levels of proficiency on the HSPT, 9 percent lower than expected. This means 91 students passed the math portion while 17 students failed.

The 84.3 percent figure compares to 91.7 percent of the 9th graders who passed the HSPT math test in 1987 and 87.2 percent in 1986.

During the board discussion, Novak declined to offer a comparison between Metuchen and Edison, where 95 percent of the 9th graders passed the math portion of the HSPT.

Novak emphasized that in a district as small as Metuchen, one student's performance can affect the statistics dramatically but in Edison, with 10,500 students, a single student's performance on the HSPT will have an infinitesimal impact.

In reading, 97.2 percent of the Metuchen 9th graders passed and in writing, the figure was 95.4 percent. These figures compare, respectively, to 97.7 percent in 1987 and 92.8 percent in 1986. The percentage of 9th graders performing up to standard in writing was 95.4. This compares to 95.5 percent in 1987 and 86.4 in 1986.nts in the 9th grade passing reading in 1987.

Edison ups 1989 goals for HSPT

EDISON — The Board of Education has raised its performance goals for the 1988-89 school year on both the CTBS test and the state required High School Proficiency Test which all students must pass before they are allowed to graduate.

District students in grades 3 through 8 will now be expected to demonstrate and achieve 97 percent proficiency on the Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills. The three-prong test consists of math, reading and language sections.

In addition, for students in grades 9, the board is now expecting 99 percent to pass both the writing and reading components of the HSPT. However, in the math section, the board is asking for 97 percent of the students to demonstrate a proficiency in that subject.

Four variances rejected; house additions approved

EDISON — The Zoning Board of Adjustment denied four applications, including one by Exxon Company for a gas station on Route 1 at Plainfield Avenue, and gave its approval to five homeowners for various additions its last meeting.

Exxon was proposing to tear down the existing Dairy Inn and Stewart's Root Beer stand to construct what was described as a "motor fuel station and convenience shop."

Board member Vincent Meany said that if the board approved Exxon's request, there would be 13 gas stations within a linear mile on Route 1, and added that the ordinance restricts the number of gas stations to three per linear mile.

He also remarked that Exxon failed to prove hardship and presented no special reasons to justify the need for another gas station on the highway.

Board chairman Larry Cimino cast the only favorable vote for Exxon.

Also denied was a proposal by Helen Gazire of 30 Kenmore Road to convert a single family home for mother and daughter use, which is not permitted in the zone.

Gerardo and Marie Calafati of 112 Mount Pleasant Avenue were told that the construction of a deck in their backyard, which would increase the property's impervious coverage to roughly 46 percent from 4.5 percent, would exceed the requirements for lot coverage. Their application was also denied.

Martha Stine was denied permission to convert her single family home at 28 Dobson Road for two-

family use by adding a second story apartment, which would be occupied by her son. Board member Edward Williams commented that renovations can be done for a separate apartment "without turning the house into a two-family."

Constantine Lyssikatos of 102 Gracey Street received approval for an addition to his single family house, which would reduce the front-yard setback to 15 feet, short of the required 25 feet. Meany commented that "the house needs renovating" as he voted to approve the application. Lyssikatos said he is planning to "expand the living space" and add three bedrooms to the second floor.

Getty Petroleum Corp. was given the go-ahead to construct a canopy and two signs over an existing gasoline pump island at Rioute 1 and John Street. A use variance was required because the station is non-conforming in the zone.

William and Barbara Carroll received permission to proceed with plans for a modular sun porch proposed for the rear of their Sunshine Lane residence. Richard Kruger of 33 Lavender Drive testified that his "family has grown," hence the need for an 18'x14' addition onto his house. 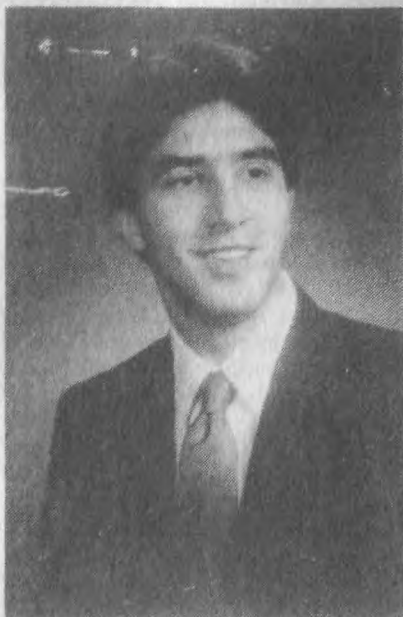
Oil in pan causes fire

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Your Opinion

Decision causes dismay

To the Editor:
I was stunned to read your report of the Metuchen Board of Education voting a plan for our children other than the neighborhood school! I truly thought that there was no way that any other concept than the neighborhood school would be acceptable, especially in Metuchen.

I have never written to a newspaper before but I'm very irritated about this issue. I have a 9-year-old son going into Moss School's 5th grade in the fall. I have stayed in the Moss School district because of the superior educational and social benefits and personnel that he is in contact with daily. He has genuinely benefited from the neighborhood school, the principal, the teachers and even the janitorial staff.

He truly feels that Moss School and the people there are part of his extended, close-by family, not to mention his friends in the neighborhood. He is going to be very upset by this. He has received the stability needed by any child and particularly a child of divorce. As a single parent, I can't tell you what a relief the neighborhood Moss School has been for me, knowing that my son is receiving the very best local support possible.

It is my opinion the Board of Education has surrendered our rights as parents (and the public) to the need to find ways to save money and create a more efficient and uniform system without regard to what's best for the whole child. They have also shown a complete disregard for what I believe is the majority public preference for the neighborhood school. There are only three board members who will receive my vote, literally and figuratively.

What parents want are quality education and prudent fiscal management in a neighborhood school setting. Evidence seems clear in the election of Byron Sondergard, et al. The negatives also are clear in the Princeton system and, in my opinion, outweigh any that can be thrown at the neighborhood school system,

which has worked for many years so well. Brings to mind "if it's not broken, don't fix it."

- Princeton negatives:
1. Increased hazard of transportation of children and cost.
 2. Increased vulnerability to strange surroundings and people.
 3. Less security and familiarity with the area around the school.
 4. Eliminates the logical expansion from family to neighborhood school to community interest inherent in our present system.
 5. Decreases responsibility for and toward their surroundings and other people.
 6. Increased difficulty for and travel by parents on already overcrowded roads at peak traffic hours, again a safety problem.
 7. Grouping students of the same age does not give them an opportunity to help, feel responsible for and teach younger children and also learn from the older children.

It is my opinion that this issue is of great importance and parents should be given the right to express their opinions by voting. We should not be disenfranchised by a few persons, some of whom have the audacity to say that no referendum be allowed "because all parents will vote for neighborhood schools because they (neighborhood schools) make it easier for parents." I could say a lot of angry things about such comments but suffice that I think most parents put the welfare and education of their children first every time!

We parents and public should be allowed to have our say by democratic majority.

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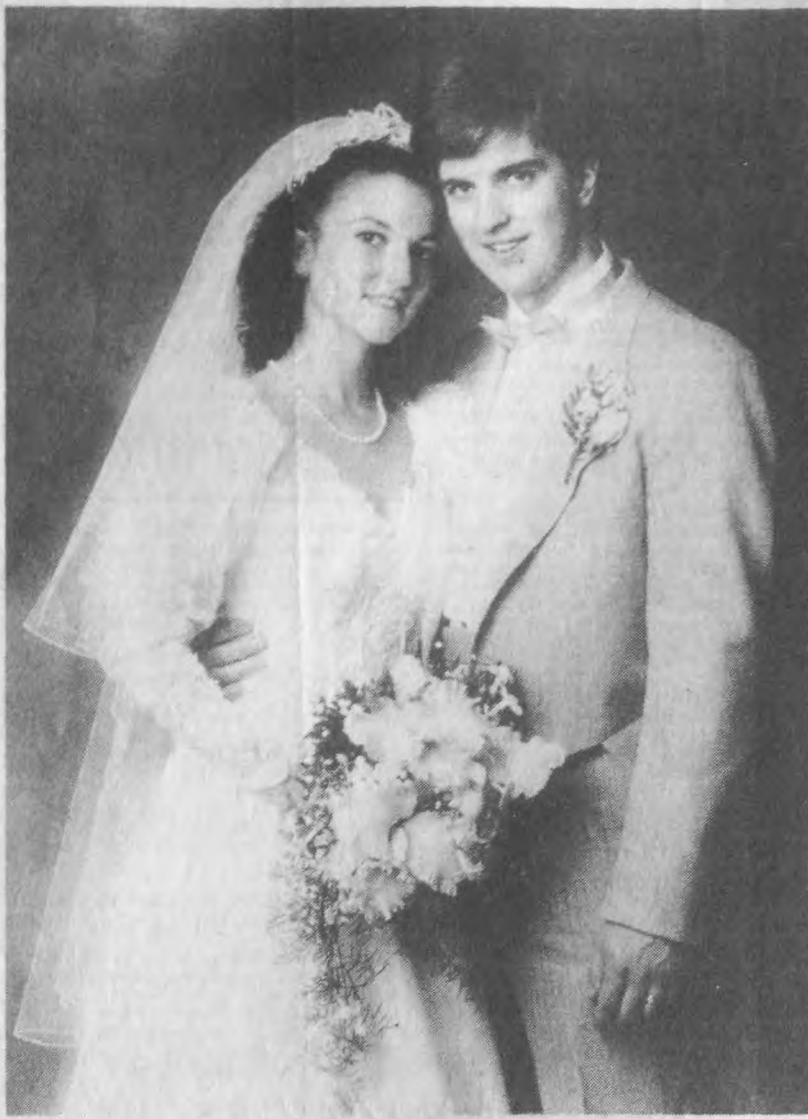

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The Mona Lisa's Sister
RCA Records

In a music magazine about 10 years ago I saw a cartoon called "Rock Anthropology, or the Real Truth About De-Evolution"; a prof was showing his students a parade of musicians in the standard Ascent of Man sequence from high school biology textbooks. First came Springsteen, standing straight up, looking gung-ho and healthy; next was Graham Parker, his shorter and skinnier Brit counterpart, a bit worse for wear and tear but still looking like Bruce's descendant; then Elvis Costello in his angriest, camera-shyest paranoid phase, the stunted bonsai version of Parker; finally a stooping, humpbacked low-foreheaded Joe Jackson, the foul-tempered example of the species' decline.

Whatever wit this 'toon had at the time is certain to vanish when I describe it, but there's an uncanny accuracy about it — move from Il Duce down to the snarling little bald fellow with the bebop and classical pretensions and some vitality has obviously been lost along the way. Maybe Devo was onto something after all.

Following the later careers of the two guys in the middle, however, makes you wonder if that cartoonist got 'em in the right order. Elvis, of course, has endured some weak middle years to re-emerge as our decade's most powerful songwriter, exorcising his more destructive demons and tempering his cleverness with maturity. But Parker has become practically synonymous with faded glory: his solo career has been de-evolving for nearly a decade. After his ferocious records with The Rumour it's been pretty much one fizzle after another. Put on *Howlin' Wind*, *Heat Treatment* or *Squeezing Out Sparks* — just about any song on any of these albums will blow your windows out. Then put on anything he's done since splitting with The Rumour in 1981. Same voice, okay — nobody else has that razor-sharp growl — but it's hard to believe it's the same man. The guy who did "Protection" and "Passion Is No Ordinary Word" also wrote "Anniversary" and "Life Gets Better"? Naaahhh. Can't be. They must've cloned him and left off two highly important parts in the process.

Parker's last three records have followed the same pattern: a handful of good songs, some obvious filler and an embarrassment or three, all buried in the worst case of overproduction since the Ramones tried to work with Phil Spector. Parker keeps putting together huge, powerhouse bands that rock out in concert — Parker has never given a bad live performance, at least not that I've heard — but turn to sap in the studio. A keyboard player named George Small has been the weak link every time, slathering synthesizer saccharine all over the arrangements, a problem aggravated by a series of big-budget producers (Jack Nitzsche, fergawdsakes? They guy once put an orchestra behind Neil Young!) with a penchant for muddy echo and fake depth. What Parker's producers bury sonically, his audience has buried commercially; the last album, *Steady Nerves*, barely paused on the "New Releases" rack before hitting the cutout bin. He's been on three different labels in the past five years. Longtime fans have been greeting each new comeback album with overwhelming yawns.

But things look different this time out. Evidently realizing that the cast-of-thousands approach was watering down his style (as well as costing his labels a mint and making him a pretty lukewarm ticket for record execs), Parker has stripped the sound down radically for *The Mona Lisa's Sister*. Parker and loyal collaborator Brinsley Schwarz have avoided flashy producers and handled the dials themselves; definitely the right move. Where the last three records relied on multiple guitar overlays, dense vocal backups and keyboard Cheez Whiz, now there's just a five-piece, no-synths bar room group, with the guitar leads evenly split between Parker's acoustic and Schwarz' clean, biting Fender. With the return of bassist Andrew Bodnar half of the old Rumour lineup is present on the album; pub-rock veteran Terry Williams handles most of the drumming, and keyboard man James Hallawell sticks with the kind of Hammond organ tones that helped ground the The Rumour in rootsy, boozy purity. Using R&B understatement instead of heavy modern electronics, Parker's new band achieves the sound that's always been the best complement for his scorching voice. His greatest strength is his affinity for soul tradition, and that's what we get here: tasteful purism, not heavy-handed technopop.

All the purism in the world won't help in the songwriting isn't strong, though. Here's where my jury is still out. Parker is the world's most literate ex-gas station attendant: a risk-taking, self-educated wordsmith who's too perceptive either to insult your intelligence with clichés or to

show off his reading habits with arca. He can rock hard without turning into David Lee Roth and he can think hard without turning into Robert Fripp. But qualities such as anger and willpower and motivation have been open to question since he made the leap from angry young man to happily married semi-star. The bitter edge that once animated Parker's best work has often given way to rank sentimentality; of late he has started reaching for awful rhymes, forced points and sloppy sentiment. For fans who consider him a major figure (I've remained one despite strong doubts) there have been too many downright embarrassing songs. The new album wins or loses according to the forms of its emotions: can he purge the wimpiness and reinvent the persona that once astonished us with lines that fused wrath, wit and hope?

Well, he's cut down on the number of love songs — a wise move, since this is the area that has brought him too close to fatuousness — leaving an adept cover of Sam Cooke's "Cupid" and his own declaration of romantic allegiance, the humble "I'm Just Your Man." "Don't Let It Break You Down" presents the Parker his old fans will recognize, the survivor who takes the world's rottenness as a given and worksto hold it at bay: "When the bombs go off on Oxford Street/ And the kids beat up old people/ It's just a soundtrack for your life/ It's just everyday evil/ But don't let it break you down . . ." Almost every lyric offers an outsider's perspective, skeptical toward most of what he sees: nostalgia ("Back in Time"), teen romance ("The Girl Isn't Ready," a bouncy reggae number), his own questionings (the Afro-Caribbean tinged "I Don't Know"). The solid rocker "OK Hieronymus" links his sense of universal depravity to Bosch's famous *Garden of Earthly Delights*, compiling violent images of a world in which everyone's guilty ("I take a shot at bird flying south/ He takes the gun barrel into his mouth/ She takes a rope and ties up the house/ With the kids inside"). Parker seems to be one of the few rock songwriters who understands original sin, and he never pretends to be urbanely comfortable with it.

There are terrific, disturbing lines all over the album: its best songs ("Hieronymus," "Under the Mask of Happiness," "Get Started, Start a Fire") are littered with more bodies than the stage at the end of *Macbeth*. Parker's lyric artillery never runs short on ammo, but there's a depressing sameness to some of his targets: "Don't . . ." skewers lightweight journalism ("Some people are in charge of pens/ That shouldn't be in charge of brooms"), while "Success" mocks the psychology of late capitalism in onanistic terms. He's still got a gift for the accurate line, but these subjects are sitting ducks. When he looks further for material he's on stronger ground. The radio single, for a change, is the sharpest thing on the album: in three inventive verses, "Get Started" gives us three memorable victims:

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The Mona Lisa's unsmiling sister, Marilyn Monroe (who's "gone where the goddesses are sleeping") and Joan of Arc. With Bodnar's fretless bass answering Parker's vocal in subtle, soulful counterpoint, "Get Started" is a low-key masterpiece, as close to anthemic as this album gets. But too little of *Sister* heeds the song's advice to start fires. Awareness of evil used to energize Parker; it doesn't exactly paralyze him here, but much of the time it leaves him distinctly subdued.

It's a tough call. Yes, this is a far better record than *Steady Nerves* or *The Real Macaw* or *Another Grey Area*. On the strength of its instrumental convictions alone it qualifies as a genuine comeback. But for Parker to reclaim his late '70s position — right up there with the Costellos, Springsteens and Lou Reeds — it isn't enough simply to avoid the excesses of his recent albums; he has to make records that stand toe-to-toe with his undeniably brilliant early work. He was a point man for punk alienation before the punks appeared; he didn't sacrifice his commitment to soul, reggae and R&B while the New Wave was breaking all around him; he never diluted his intelligence to win a ticket on the MTV bandwagon. But somehow, between commercial ambition and marital bliss, Parker lost his edge. His kind of edge is nearly impossible to keep sharp. Maybe he needs a colling-out period to recharge the batteries of his talent; *The Mona Lisa's Sister* is nothing if not cooled-out. It's a healthy minor record by a major artist. If his next album retains this one's stylistic and sonic sanity and manages to touch off a real rock & roll fire, his fans and defenders can consider his recovery complete.

Life, love, death, etc.

What's it like, sitting through *Wings of Desire*? Like pulling the night shift at the observatory and waiting for a black hole to appear in the sky. Like waiting for Henny Youngman to crack a joke that can't be carbon dated back to the Pleistocene. That's right: *Wings of Desire* is boring as only a deep dish, philosophical German movie can be, and coming from the nation that brought us Fassbinder and Herzog, that's quite an achievement.

Actually, if you were to dispel the film's mouldering Teutonic overcast and speed up the funeral pacing, *Wings of Desire* would have the makings of a pretty good musical comedy. The main characters are Daniel (Bruno Ganz) and Cassiel (Otto Sander), two angels with funky rat tail haircuts who flit in and over Berlin (the film's original German title is something like *The Heavens Over Berlin*) while bearing witness to the deeds of its inhabitants. The angels play no direct role in mortal affairs, though their touch can lend spiritual strength to those in despair; they spend their days and nights listen to the thoughts of humans as they go about their business. These thoughts, incidentally, consist of philosophical musings and articulations of existential despair, not what to have for dinner, or whether to make a play for the new counter girl at Dunkin' Donuts. This is a German film, after all.

Daniel spends a lot of time hovering around Marion (Solveig Dommartin), a lovely trapeze artist with a traveling circus; when Daniel draws near her, the film's tinted black and white cinematography quickens into garish color. This symbolizes Daniel's awareness of... I mean, it conveys his feelings of... do I really have to explain all this? At the end of the film, Daniel, tired of the unbearable lightness of being an observing angel, forsakes eternity to become an ordinary mortal, the better to pursue Marion on an earthly plane.

The possibilities for catchy tunes and cameo appearances are obvious: George Burns singing "I've Got An Angel On My Shoulder" as he skips along the Berlin Wall, Bette Midler

crooning "Someone to Watch Over Me" as she walks the high wire. However, *Wings of Desire* is co-written by Wim Wenders, the director of *Paris, Texas* and *The American Friend*, and the Austrian playwright Peter Handke, who wrote *The Loneliness of the Long Distance Runner* and last collaborated with Wenders on *The Goalie's Anxiety At the Penalty Kick*. Neither of them go in for singing and dancing, though they do spike the film with extended concert sequences featuring Nick Cave and the Bad Seeds, the kind of band that makes you realize The Doors really are dead and gone, and maybe that isn't such a bad thing.

Not that *Wings of Desire* is without humor or lightness. The angels, we learn, are invisible to all except children, the young at heart and Peter Falk, appearing here as himself come to Berlin to make a movie about the fall of Nazi Germany. When not acting or sketching out bad doodles on a sheaf of foolscap, Falk wanders around Berlin adding his own philosophical musings to the already dense air; bands of youths, their German speech as thick as cold pancake syrup, stop and gawk as he shambles past, then say to each other: "Ko-lom-bo." It eventually turns out that Peter Falk can sense angels because Peter Falk used to be an angel himself; like Daniel, he got tired of just scoping out humans and decided to head where the action is. It's just that one greets this bit of whimsy, arriving after several courses of heavy Teutonic gloom, the way the explosively overstuffed Mr. Creosote responded to that last tiny wafer offered at the end of *Monty Python's The Meaning of Life*. Come on, just one little bite. No, I couldn't, I... arrghh.

Leave it to a German filmmaker to take such an inherently goofy subject and give it a treatment more appropriate to Dostoevsky. Nevertheless,

it's only a matter of time before Andrew Lloyd Webber, in need of a followup to *Phantom of the Opera*, starts thinking about an adaptation. There is, for instance, a continuing refrain (jotted down by Daniel in his post-descent diary) about "When the child was a child" that is probably destined to become a hit song, and after the effort involved in nailing down *Starlight Express* it should be a cinch to build a mockup of Berlin and rig up some flying angels. Laugh if you want to, but in an age when a theatrical version of Stephen King's *Carrie*, with music inspired by Alban Berg's *Lulu*, gets enough backers to make an attenuated Broadway run, stranger things are likely to happen.

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Edison agrees to appeal state inspection takeover

EDISON — Over the vehement objections of member John J. Hogan, the Township Council voted Wednesday night to fight a state takeover of building inspections at two multi-family complexes under construction here.

"I think this case is just a municipal ego trip," said Hogan, who voted against two resolutions related to the appeal in the Appellate Division of Superior Court.

The first authorizes township attorney Peter DeSarno "to take all steps necessary to perfect and prosecute" an appeal from a decision by Superior Court Judge John Bachman, who upheld the right of the state Department of Community Affairs to assume the inspection responsibilities.

The second gives the same authority to Peter A. Massaro, attorney for building inspector Albert Rainford, who is fighting a 300-day suspension imposed by the state and the threatened revocation of his state license.

"The people of Edison are financing a lawsuit against themselves," said Hogan. The state takeover, he continued, is aimed at protecting the citizenry and in opposing the action, "we are turning our backs" on a sworn duty to protect the health and welfare of the people.

"No persuasive arguments have been advanced for supporting this myopic scheme," fumed Hogan, who said that at best the township would win "a Pyrrhic victory."

The township's actions in the inspection controversy, he said, has made it "a laughing stock" but the council had the opportunity to "redeem ourselves tonight" by electing not to appeal.

It is the builders of the two complexes involved — the Halpern Organization in the case of Edison Glen at Route 1 and Main Street and Wick Builders in the case of Aspen at Edison behind Wick Plaza at Route 1 and Plainfield Avenue — that should be financing any appeal that may be brought, according to Hogan.

Hogan's floodgates were opened

when Pat Orzack of Golf Road rose from the audience to express unhappiness with the two resolutions because they set no limits on the amounts of money that can be expended in prosecuting the appeal.

"Any sensible person would agree," Hogan concurred.

"I don't have deep pockets and I don't think anyone else in the township has," said Mrs. Orzack, who was told that DeSarno and Massaro will be compensated at the rate of \$90 an hour.

When Mrs. Orzack questioned if the attorneys will be paying for the services of expert witnesses, she was told by DeSarno that never in his years as township attorney has he made a decision involving a major expenditure without first getting the approval of the council.

"I don't do carte blanche; I never have," he said.

"We've heard enough of your convoluted logic," grumbled Hogan. "You don't have any logic," DeSarno shot back.

"It is a willful and wanton waste of public money," said Hogan. "That's what it is."

He added, for good measure, that it also is "a cockamamie suit."

But Councilman George Asprocolas, who along with the five other council members supported the resolutions, saw the appeal as a test case of home rule and whether "Big Brother" in the guise of the state should be looking over the shoulders of its municipalities.

This prompted Mrs. Orzack to question if the appeal was being financed so "Mr. DeSarno can make a landmark case?"

Councilman George Spadoro attempted to calm Mrs. Orzack's concerns.

Attorneys, said Spadoro, himself a lawyer, are governed by a code of ethics that require they exercise "reasonableness" when incurring expenses in behalf of a client.

If there is "an abuse" then a client, including the Township Council, has a right to dispute a bill and decline to honor it, he said.

But Mrs. Orzack continued to maintain the resolution should specify "reasonableness" and said in legal cases it is easy to reach "a point of no return."

Adding pepper to the boiling inspection stew was Burton Gimelstob of 6 Churchill Road, whose original complaints to the state about inspection procedures at his house brought state building inspectors into Edison, described Hogan as a "mench" because "he's not afraid of the boss," a reference to Mayor Anthony M. Yelencsics. Asprocolas is not "a mench," Gimelstob decreed.

Earlier in the hearing, Gimelstob called for the resignation of Yelencsics, business administrator Lawrence Pollex, DeSarno and Rainford.

"The builders of Edison probably are calling in their IOUs," said Gimelstob, who accused township officials of being involved in "a conspiracy" and said that "a coverup is growing every day."

Responding to comments by James Kuker of Grandview Avenue, DeSarno said the township is appealing because "the state overstepped its bounds."

According to DeSarno, the township has affidavits from architects disputing the state's contention that Edison Glen and Aspen at Edison are in violation because separate stairways leading upstairs in each complex meet at a common landing and are not separated by a wall that would retard a fire in either of the stairwells.

In fact, said DeSarno, the township is prepared to present evidence from experts that the walls that the state wants would create "a safety hazard."

According to DeSarno, 8,000 other apartment complexes have been built in New Jersey using the same design, which caused Kuker to interject: "Eight thousand times once is 8,000 times wrong."

"I say to you," DeSarno predicted, "when it's all said and done, the township will be correct."

crete recycling constitutes "stone crushing," which is not a permitted use in the township.

Lombardi also is taking the position that the height of the "pile of powder" and an adjacent heap of old concrete and cinder block is "excessive" and not screened as required by the zoning ordinance.

Because of the scope of the Clayton operation, Lombardi is giving it "a reasonable amount of time" to cease and desist.

However, if it is determined that the dust does, indeed, emanate from Clayton and poses a health hazard, according to Lombardi, the operation will be stopped immediately.

Lombardi is awaiting official word on the health aspects from the Health Department although inspector Jay Elliot said on Monday he has determined there is an air pollution problem and, by extension, a health hazard.

"It definitely qualifies as an air pollution problem," says Elliot. "There's dust blowing around that doesn't belong there."

And, according to Elliot, what is "blowing around" the Rodak Circle neighborhood is "ground up concrete."

"The code says it shouldn't be there so, in that context, it is a health problem," reports Elliot.

According to Clayton manager John Barr, the final solution to any problem that may exist is getting rid of the pile of pulverized concrete and the company is in the process of doing just that.

"We don't want that pile," according to Barr, who reports Clayton has a potential customer that is interested in buying "one heck of a lot of it."

The recycled concrete blocks also are used by Clayton to make new blocks but a problem arose when the amount of pulverized concrete piling up on the site began far exceeding Clayton's need for it.

"That is the Fedders building," according to Barr, who said when renovations began on the Woodbridge Avenue building to house a new printing plant for the New York Times, the Clayton site became the repository for all of the concrete floor that was ripped up.

As for the "pile of cinders" that also rises against the horizon, that was there when Clayton bought the facility several years ago from Best Block and has been there "for years."

Barr takes the position that Clayton isn't doing anything that Best Block didn't do.

And while "not saying 'yes' or 'no'" to the question of whether Clayton is the source of the dust about which Walker is complaining, Barr said that in addition to selling off "the mountain," Clayton also is acquiring a truck that will be used to water down the property.

If there is a dust condition, he adds, the extended lack of rain has been a contributing factor.

Edison ups goals for 1989 HSPT

Last week, deputy superintendent Dr. Joseph Kreskey reported that the results of this year's HSPT scores showed that of the 705 9th graders taking the test last April, 99 percent passed the reading portion and 98.4 percent passed the writing portion of the test, exceeding the district's goal of 95 percent in both categories.

In the math section, students achieved the goal of 95 percent passing the test.

A passing score on all three segments of the HSPT is a requirement for receiving a public high school diploma in New Jersey.

The 1988-89 plan of action adopted at its meeting Monday night by the Board of Education also includes objectives set for students taking the Scholastic Aptitude Test. The board is expecting students in the graduating class of 1989 to achieve a verbal mean score of 475 or higher and a

math mean score of 515 or higher.

"In order to insure our test scores continue to increase, we must introduce concepts at an early age and put the pressure on for the students to meet these goals," Kreskey told the board.

"We have got to employ effective ways and expect these kids will do better. The greatest disservice you can do to students is to say they can't learn - it is our job to make learning both challenging and purposeful," he added.

The fourth objective set by the board in its plan of action is associated with creating a more positive attitude in disruptive students toward school. By achieving this, the board says a decrease in the drop-out rate in students enrolled in the Crisis Intervention Program will be accomplished as well as improved school attendance and fewer in-house and out-of-school suspensions.

The number of 9th graders taking the test in 1987 was 133 and in 1986 it was 125.

Of the 108 students taking the state mandated test this year, three failed reading, five failed writing and 17 failed math. Of those who did not pass math, seven had scored within 3 points of passing and seven were students new to the district.

Novak attributed the low math scores to "the need for fine tuning adjustments in the math curriculum." He explained that not all 9th graders taking the test have the same math course.

Many of the students who were identified as "at risk" are studying either foundations of algebra or applied math, two of the lower levels of math offered. "At risk" refers to those students who took the pre-HSPT the previous year in 8th grade and scored poorly, according to Novak.

Of the 31 students who were determined to be in this category as 8th graders the previous year, those who failed as 9th graders all came from this group. The pre-test was designed to identify what students might be in need of in-service help prior to the test the following year.

Those students taking the introductory algebra course typically do better on the HSPT because the test includes questions in that area, according to Novak. He recommended to the Board of Education that the applied math program be realigned to include algebra and geometry instruction.

Novak also recommended to the board that by providing additional help for the "at risk" students in grade 8, test scores may improve. In addition to revising the curriculum, he suggested that some teachers may benefit from supervisory support as well as possibly adding part-time help to "remediate grades 8 and 9 before they take the test."

Novak said that all students in next year's graduating class successfully have undergone remedial instruction and have met the HSPT requirements for a high school diploma. In the Class of 1990, there is one student who still has completed the HSPT requirement and two in the Class of 1991.

All three of these students recently transferred into the district, Novak told the board.

creasing the height to which trash can be dumped to an elevation of 75 feet.

This compares to the 95-foot elevation of the nearby and notorious Kin-Buc private landfill that was used for the disposal of toxic wastes.

"Landfills are not cheap," said Lund in estimating the cost of the ex-

pansion project. "They're very expensive."

This prompted Councilman John Hogan to comment that "those who benefit" from the expansion should share the cost of the work. Will Metuchen and Highland Park pay higher dumping charges to help offset the multi-million capital project, he wanted to know.

"Of course," responded Lund, who said the new landfill will require an entirely new schedule of charges for the two municipalities.

When Hogan questioned what would happen if the existing landfill were exhausted before the additional 28 acres are available for use, Lund responded: "I don't know."

with another contractor to eliminate competition for vehicle maintenance contracts in Plainfield and South Plainfield.

"Why are they still on the bidding list?" he asked. "If Levay comes in with a low bid he gets the contract again so who is 'watching the store?'"

White suggested that Edwards should concern himself with determining if school bus companies involved in what has been described as a widening investigation should be approved bidders.

It also was pointed out by White that local boards do not have the sole responsibility to "sign off" transportation contracts.

Transportation contracts are audited annually by the district auditor and they also must be signed by the county superintendent of schools. He added, however, that "in all fairness" to the superintendent, Dr. Virginia Brinson, she probably does not have the size staff needed "to adequately do the job."

"We're following the bidding laws to the hilt," said superintendent of schools Charles A. Boyle.

"If a bidder is certified by the state, meets the specifications and is the low bidder, you must award the contract."

White also questioned how a district that awards \$3 million a year in bus contracts could be expected to detect bid rigging when the amount of payments that Stanik allegedly received from Levay over a 12-year period totaled only \$70,000.

"You're talking about a finetooth comb," he said of the ability to determine that a bid had been inflated to include the cost of a bribe.

White also defended the board's efforts to scrutinize transportation bids.

"When we do recognize bidders coming in higher we do question," he said, pointing out that a few years ago when transportation costs began to spiral questions were asked and the answer that insurance premiums were escalating "proved to be true."

"We don't always rubberstamp these bids," White said, pointing out that the board acts on hundreds of bid proposals a year in areas other than transportation. "We do question them."

The "bottom line," according to Boyle, is that "like banks, industry,"

a school district "must rely on employee honesty."

Ironically, when the board receives bids next month on its special education routes, it will be seeking bids for a second time this year on Stanik's recommendation.

When sealed proposals on the special education routes, which account for \$1 million of the \$3 million transportation budget, were received in the spring, Stanik recommended they be rejected because they were too high and the board go to bid again.

"We certainly concurred with that," said Boyle.

According to Boyle, Levay held most of the district's special transportation route contracts because he specializes in providing the equipment and services needed for such students.

"He has for years," said Boyle.

It is charged that the bribes received by Stanik were in connection with the special education contracts.

Stanik maintains his innocence and his attorney, Steven D. Altman said he "has never taken a penny from anyone relative to the performance of his responsibilities."

Stanik, 47, and Altman met in private with the Board of Education after its public executive session last week. The decision to suspend him without pay was made after he and Altman left the meeting but it was not announced until the following day by White and Ferenczi so that Stanik could be informed before the action was made public.

Before coming to Edison as transportation coordinator in 1969, Stanik filled a similar position in Sayreville.

PISCATAWAY—Mike Burns got a brief glimpse at his future Saturday afternoon.

The former Bishop Ahr High School football standout was one of 80 players who participated in the 10th Annual New Jersey High School All-Star Football Classic at sweltering Rutgers Stadium, a game which was won by Burns' South squad, 12-9.

The hard-hitting 6-foot-2, 225-pound linebacker helped hold the North to just 101 total yards as the South's defense blanked the highly-touted North offense through three quarters of play.

Burns, who led the Trojans in tackles each of his last three seasons, more than held his own against the state's elite before leaving the contest with a separated left shoulder with 10:35 remaining in the game.

"I'm getting a taste of what college is going to be like," said the University of Massachusetts-bound Burns.

BURNS CALLED some defensive signals during the game and felt that he was given enough playing time to showcase his skills.

"Everyone was treated fairly," he said. "It was an adjustment though because in high school you're used to playing all the time."

Like his teammates, Burns spent the week leading up to the game in

two-a-day sessions in the blazing sun on the Rutgers University campus, but felt that those grueling sessions paid off during the game.

"They were brutal," said Burns of the two-a-day practices. "But we all went through it and stayed together as a team. I thought our team played real well. I thought we proved a lot by coming together the whole week. Everyone was very friendly."

Considering the fact that the last scholastic football Burns played was back in late November of last year, Burns was asked it took him a long time to get back into the flow of a hard-hitting gridiron confrontation.

"It comes back to you real fast," he noted. "Once you're hit once or twice, it comes back."

All-Star games have the reputation of not being the hard-nosed affairs that regular season games are, but according to Burns, that was not the case.

"Everyone hits hard," Burns explained. "That's what makes it so good. In high school, some guys hit hard while there were other guys out there that didn't hit hard. This helps prepare you for college."

Burns is planning on majoring in Criminology at the Chestnut Hill-based University and was asked what he felt his chances were of getting some appreciable playing time during his freshman campaign for the Minutemen.

"Some things are still up in the air, but they told me that there's a good possibility that I can come in there and do a lot for the team my first year. One of their returning starters has a hand injury, so it's hard to say what will happen right now. We'll see."

Burns was scheduled to attend orientation on Wednesday and also meet with the team's strength and conditioning coach.

"Their facilities are excellent, very nice," he stated.

To prepare himself properly for the challenge that lies before him, Burns is keeping himself in shape by running six days a week—two days consisting of sprints and agility drills, and four days of distance work. And of course, he'll continue to work hard on the weights as well.

"I'm looking forward to it," said Burns of college career.

Needless to say, the Minutemen are looking forward to having Burns around as well.

Clara Barton squad protests game

EDISON—So when is a loss not really a loss? Just ask the Clara Barton American Legion baseball team.

Despite what appeared to be a 14-8 setback at the hands of first place Iselin Monday evening in a Middlesex County American Legion baseball contest, Clara Barton may not have lost that game at all due to a protest.

Confused? Well, here's what happened.

CLARA BARTON, which entered the game with a 9-7 record, was getting thumped pretty handily, 14-1, entering the bottom half of the fifth inning. With one out, Earl Wallace, a Metuchen High School product, stroked a sharp single into left. Leadoff hitter Charles McCann followed

with a single to center, putting runners on second and first. Iselin pitcher Tim Ryer then attempted to pick off Wallace at second, but threw the ball into centerfield for an error, sending Wallace to third.

Dave Marzano, a former J.P. Stevens High standout who is headed to Wake Forest this Fall, then drew a walk to load the bases. Drew Kirschner followed by flying out to right for the second out of the inning, setting the stage for a controversial play.

Rupesh Shah lined a single to center, scoring Wallace and McCann to cut the lead to 14-3. Centerfielder Chris Swallick's throw home was wild and got past two Iselin infielders before bouncing near the Iselin bench, which is ruled out of play. Originally, Marzano was waved

home, but after the umpires consulted, they told Marzano to go back to third base—sending Clara Barton head coach Tony Pilone out to argue the call. After a five-minute consultation with the umpires, Pilone announced to both umpires that he was protesting the game.

"On any overthrow from the outfield, it's two bases from the start of play," the veteran coach explained. "Originally they (the umpires) called it the right way. I wouldn't have argued unless I knew I was right. You just can't call that the wrong way—Marzano should have scored. I've been in baseball long enough to know the rules."

Rob Kole grounded out to second to end the inning, but Pilone was adamant about proceeding with his protest—and he seemed pretty confident that the protest would be upheld.

"There's no doubt in my mind that I'm right," Pilone added. "I should know by Thursday night (last night)."

If Pilone's protest was upheld, the game will have to be re-started at the time of the protest and Marzano will be allowed to score on the sequence.

However, the real story of the contest was Iselin's powerful offensive attack, which pounded out 15 hits off four Clara Barton hurlers. The game was called with two outs in the bottom of the sixth because of dark-

ness with the bases loaded and Bill Healey at the plate for Clara Barton.

Iselin, which entered the game in first place in the 13-team league with an 11-3-1 mark, simply clobbered Clara Barton starter Kevin DiNuzzo. The southpaw simply didn't have it as Frank Notaro's squad erupted for nine runs on nine hits in the first inning to take a commanding 9-0 lead before a Clara Barton player stepped into the batter's box.

Iselin sent 15 batters to the plate during the uprising, and the first nine hitters to face DiNuzzo scored. DiNuzzo entered the contest with a 2-2 pitching slate. Ten-run explosion powers Edison win

METUCHEN—I'm sure we all know the true meaning behind the old saying, "When it rains it pours."

However, for those of you who don't, just ask St. Joseph's American Legion pitcher Craig Munch. Because after his team's loss to the Edison American Legion team, you get the feeling that Munch has become an authority on this particular saying.

EDISON USED a 10-run sixth inning to power past Munch and St. Joe's by a lopsided 10-3 score in a six-inning game at St. Joe's High School on an overcast and muggy afternoon last Thursday.

The benefit of this scoring outburst was righthander Sean Brown, who pitched his usual type of ballgame according to assistant coach Jim Wiegartner.

"I would say that this was an average game for Sean. He usually gives up about two runs a game," Wiegartner said.

Brown pitched six innings allowing seven hits, while fanning five and walking six. The win raised his record to an unblemished 3-0 on the year, while Edison improved to 10-7 overall.

That looked like it would be enough for Munch, who was buzzing through the Edison lineup. When Munch did find himself in trouble, his defense came to the rescue as Santanna and the rest of the St. Joseph's defense played well behind Munch to help escape Edison rallies unharmed.

Then, just like that, the roof fell in on Munch, who was hit hard in the top of the sixth.

"It was contagious," Wiegartner said. "One kid got a hit, then one kid walked and another hit. If the game had gone on, I think that we would have scored more."

First baseman Ben Lund started the inning for Edison with a bloop single over first. After a passed ball moved Lund to third, third baseman Jeff Kavarski grounded out to short, moving Lund over to third on the play. Edison finally broke through on another bloop single by Brown to cut the St. Joseph's lead to 3-1 with only one out.

EDISON THEN played the hit-and-run to perfection when Josh Suggs singled with Brown running to put runners on the corners with one out. After Suggs stole second, Howard Forman came up and stroked a single to

right to score both runners and knot the game at three, while Forman went to second on the throw home.

Pinch-hitter Steve Austin came in to hit for catcher Chris Hebble and delivered a double down the leftfield line to score Forman and put his team in the lead for good by a count of 4-3. However, Edison was a long way from finished.

With one out and a runner on second, leftfielder Roy Jarrett stepped up for Edison and hit a grounder to Santanna, who mishandled the ball, allowing Austin to reach third and Jarrett to reach first safely. After Jarrett stole second, Edison took advantage of the fielding miscue when rightfielder Todd Forman ripped a long ground-rule double to right to score Austin and Jarrett to make the score 6-3.

At this point a pitching change was made, as Parikh was brought in to try and quell the rally.

"Although we had some poor fielding today that allowed the three runs, I feel that we have been playing good defense of late," Wiegartner said.

If Edison can start clicking on all cylinders, then we could be seeing many opposing pitchers looking for Bartlett's Book of Familiar Quotations to explain this Edison team.

Boy seriously hurt after rink dispute

EDISON — A 12-year-old boy was injured critically and a second youth was hurt less seriously in an incident last Friday night outside the United Skates of America in Oakwood Plaza at Wood Avenue and Oak Tree Road.

Kermes said that Jefferson's right knee was grazed by the Ford during the incident, which took place shortly after 11 p.m.

According to the initial investigating officer, Patrolman Kenneth Dessoir, when he arrived at the scene, Carman was found lying in the rear parking lot and received emergency care at the scene by personnel of Mercy 9 from John F. Kennedy Medical Center.

Dessoir was told that a dispute that broke out inside the rink over a girl spilled into the parking lot. There, the 17-year-old Iselin youth, who was not identified because of his age, allegedly locked himself in his car to escape possible attack and struck and ran over Carman and grazed Jefferson.

The Iselin youth allegedly drove off but informed his father of the incident. The father called police and voluntarily brought his son and his car to headquarters, according to Dessoir.

Coleman said the aluminum siding and windows of the Darezzi trailer were damaged along with the inside wood trim and curtains. There also was heavy smoke damage.

The exterior aluminum and wiring and the insulation of the Bunn trailer were damaged. Interior damage included paneling, wood trim and curtains and there was heavy smoke, Coleman said.

Barbara Griffin, a resident of the trailer park, told Patrolman John Spielman she was outside when she saw gray smoke coming from between the Darezzi and Bunn trailers. Griffin grabbed a garden hose and assisted Darezzi in attempting to control the fire until the Fire Department arrived.

Another resident of the park told Spielman that when he smelled smoke he came out of his trailer and saw flames coming from the driver's side area of the van.

Darezzi was described by Spiel-

man as extremely shaken up by the incident and was taken, along with his wife, Ann, to the trailer of a friend.

Spielman said the Middlesex County Arson Task Force was notified.

The alarm was received at 5:44 p.m. and Engines 4 and 6, Truck 1 and Cars 7 and 101 responded.

Slander suit for Gimelstob

EDISON — Burton Gimelstob of 6 Churchill Road is being sued for slander by a principal in the construction firm that built the 33-home development, Churchill Estates, where Gimelstob resides.

Samuel Lachs, an Elizabeth attorney, has charged in a Superior Court suit that asks for punitive damages that on June 9, 1987, at the Municipal Building Gimelstob falsely and maliciously slandered him when he said that as an attorney, Lachs "is a disgrace to the Jewish people."

Gimelstob on Wednesday night declined to comment on the suit on the advice of his attorney.

Gimelstob and the Churchill Estates builders have been at war ever since Gimelstob mounted a campaign over a year ago because of what he alleged were construction deficiencies in his house.

Gimelstob wound up going to the state Department of Community Affairs with his complaints. A state investigation culminated in the suspension for 300 days of building inspector Albert Rainford, further investigations by the state into other building projects and a currently raging controversy between the township and the state.

During the public portion of Wednesday night's Township Council meeting, Gimelstob said that his original complaint to the state about Churchill Estates had no connection with the state's takeover of building inspections at two multi-unit complexes, Edison Glen and Aspen at Edison.

Two charged after scuffle

EDISON — Robert Mido Jr., 19, of 59 Calvert Avenue, and his brother, 16, were arrested on a variety of charges July 6 after an encounter with police on the Menlo Park School property.

Both were charged with assault on police officers, interfering with police officers, resisting arrest and making terrorist threats.

The 16-year-old also was charged with eluding police and issued motor vehicle summonses for driving an unregistered 1988 Suzuki all terrain vehicle, an uninsured vehicle and being an unlicensed driver.

Patrolmen Andy Nagy and John Halulka reported they spotted the ATV being operated on Jamaica Avenue at a high rate of speed and continue onto the property of the school. The officers followed the Suzuki and reported that as it traveled around the school it tore up sections of grass before being stopped in front of the building.

As they were issuing the tickets, according to Nagy and Halulka, Robert Mido arrived on the scene but despite being told his brother shortly would be released and instructed to return home, Mido refused to leave.

Mido allegedly grabbed Nagy and punched him in the shoulder at which point he was placed under arrest. The officers said that Mido resisted and a scuffle ensued during which his younger brother made verbal threats and attempted to punch Halulka.



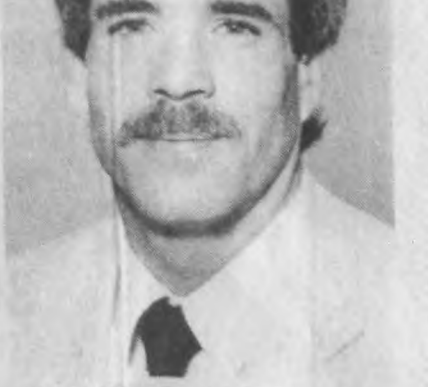

SECTION 1. That pursuant to applicable statutes there is hereby authorized general improvements to fifteen municipal buildings including, but not limited to, electrical upgrade and repairs, plumbing upgrade and repairs, masonry work, carpentry work, painting, heating ventilation and air conditioning repairs and replacements, fencing, roofing repairs and asbestos removal in the Township of Edison, Middlesex County, New Jersey.

All of the above is in accordance with plans and specifications as prepared by William Lund, P.E.

SECTION 2. It is hereby determined and declared by the Municipal Council as follows:

A. That the Capital Budget of the Township as submitted and approved by this Municipal Council includes the improvements described in Section 1 above.

B. That the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued for the purposes stated in Section 1 hereof is \$166,000.

C. That the estimated maximum amount of money to be raised from all sources including the down payment described in Paragraph D below for the purposes stated in Section 1 hereof is \$175,000.

D. That an appropriation was contained in a budget or budget of the Township heretofore adopted and is now available in said appropriation the sum of \$9,000, which said sum is hereby appropriated as a down payment for the purposes stated in Section 1 hereof.

SECTION 4. That pending the issuance of the permanent bonds authorized in Section 3 hereof there is hereby authorized the issuance of bond anticipation notes of the Township of Edison, in the County of Middlesex, New Jersey, in an aggregate principal amount of not exceeding \$166,000 pursuant to the Local Bond Law. The form, method of sale, maturities, rate or rates of interest and all other details of said notes not prescribed herein shall be determined by subsequent resolution or resolutions adopted pursuant to law.

SECTION 5. That if the Township shall receive any grants or moneys from the United States of America or the State of New Jersey, or any agencies thereof, for the purposes provided for in this ordinance, the amount of bonds or notes so authorized herein shall be reduced by the amounts of said grants or moneys received before the issuance of such bonds or notes and in the event that any of such grants or moneys are received after the issuance of such bonds or notes, such grants or moneys shall be applied to the payment of principal of or interest on said bonds or notes.

SECTION 6. It is hereby found, determined and declared by this Municipal Council as follows:

A. That the bonds issued pursuant to this ordinance shall bear interest at such rate or rates as shall be determined hereafter, not exceeding the maximum rate provided by law.

B. That the period of usefulness of the improvements or property described in Section 1 hereof, for which the obligations authorized by this ordinance are to be issued, within the limitations of said Local Bond Law is 5 years.

SECTION 7. That the Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly prepared and filed in the office of the Township Clerk prior to the passage of this ordinance on first reading, and a complete executed duplicate thereof has been filed in the office of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey prior to the passage of this ordinance on final reading. Such statement shows that the gross debt of the County as defined in the Local Bond Law is increased by the authorization of the bonds and notes

Continuance requested in ethics case hearing

EDISON — Clifford Kuhn, attorney for the Ethics Commission, was expected to recommend last night that a continuance be granted in a case involving a complaint that William Lund, the township engineer and director of public works, is in violation of the ethics ordinance.

The continuance was requested by Jeffrey Warsh, who filed the complaint with the commission alleging that Lund's outside work as an engineering consultant is in conflict with his township duties. He also has charged that there is a conflict between Lund's position and his wife's business activities as a real estate agent.

According to Warsh, an attorney, he was notified only on Saturday night that a closed hearing on the complaint would be held last night and that he should be prepared to present his evidence and any witnesses he might want to call.

Warsh, who also questioned why a complainant in an ethics case must act as "a prosecutor," said Monday night that if he was not granted a continuance as requested, he would go to

court against the commission.

And at Wednesday night's meeting of the Township Council, Warsh reiterated his complaint about the lack of notice he was given to marshal his case, the lack of a spelled out procedure for conducting ethics commission hearings and the treatment he has received from commission chairman Joseph M. Ruggieri, retired superintendent of schools.

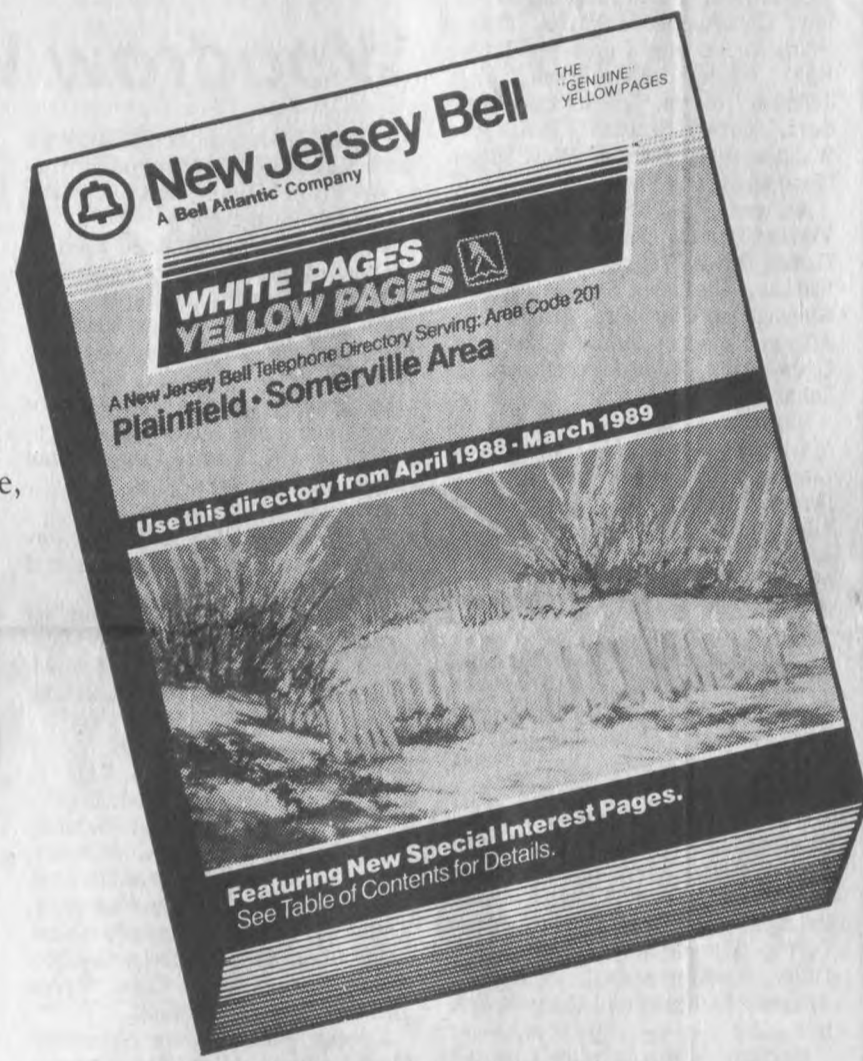
Ruggieri, Warsh told the council, has become "unraveled."

In his dealings with the chairman, according to Warsh, he was "nice and polite" but Ruggieri is getting "ruder and ruder and ruder."

As far as the lack of established procedures are concerned, council president Henry Cackowski reminded Warsh that the commission is a new body that must be given time to find its way.

"We'll try to iron out the kinks in it," said Cackowski of the ethics ordinance, reminding Warsh that as a result of his past comments some changes already have been instituted.

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Agency issues \$87 million in tax-exempt mortgage bonds

The New Jersey Housing and Mortgage Finance Agency (NJHMFA) has issued \$87 million in tax-exempt mortgage revenue bonds to finance between 1,200 and 1,500 low-interest loans for urban and first-time homebuyers statewide through its Home Mortgage and Buy-and-Fix-It programs.

"The New Jersey Housing and Mortgage Finance Agency works closely with the bond community to ensure that it provides the lowest-interest rates possible so prospective first-time buyers in New Jersey can afford the American dream of homeownership," said Leonard S. Coleman, Jr., Commissioner of the State Department of

Community Affairs and the NJHMFA Chairman.

The loans will be offered at two interest rates: 8.15 percent for prospective purchasers in New Jersey's 41 urban target areas and 9.32 percent for first-time buyers in all other areas of the state. Approximately \$45 million will be used to finance the 8.15 percent mortgages and \$42 million for the 9.32 percent rate loans. All loans will carry a fixed-rate term of 30 years, will require mortgage insurance, and will be offered through the agency's network of participating lenders.

"Because only a minimum 5 percent down payment and two points are required, these

loans will be extremely attractive to qualified buyers when compared to the terms of conventional mortgages," said James L. Logue, III, Executive Director of the New Jersey Housing and Mortgage Finance Agency.

Compared to a conventional interest rate of 10.6 percent on a \$70,000 mortgage, the agency's 8.15 percent rate will save the consumer about \$126 per month or about \$45,000 over the 30-year term, while the 9.32 percent rate will enable him or her to save approximately \$65 a month or roughly \$23,000 over the entire loan term.

"In addition to its new interest rates, the agency will also increase its income limits to coincide with those recently established by the Federal Department of Housing and Urban Development," Coleman said.

Falling into five income categories, the new urban target area limits range from \$53,060 to \$60,340, while the increased statewide area limits vary between \$43,585 and \$49,565, depending on the county of purchase.

"We believe that the increased income limits will enable more first-time buyers to take advantage of the agency's low-interest loans," Logue said.

Purchase price limits also apply and depend on the area or county where a prospective consumer plans to buy a house. These limits range from \$54,270 for an existing single-family home in the statewide areas to \$195,470 for a single-family, newly constructed house in the

urban target areas.

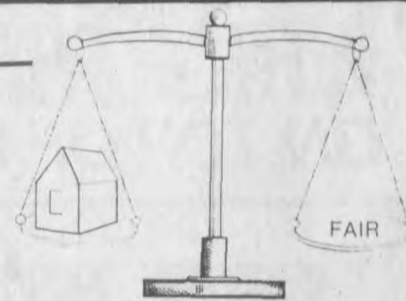

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

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Child care is becoming major corporate concern

Child care was once a sticky issue tabled for future discussion at corporate meetings. Not any longer. Child care is now a serious concern beginning to effect major change in our economy and corporate policy.

Burgdorff Realtors' Relocation Division co-hosted an eye-opening breakfast seminar entitled "The Changing Lifestyles of Today's Transferees" with The Summit Hotel recently. Representatives from 23 major New Jersey and national corporations were in attendance to discuss new corporate attitudes toward child care.

Serving as panelists were Dr. John Fernandez, author of Child Care and Corporate Productivity and Manager of Personnel Services, AT&T Communications, Headquarters Region; Diane Keel Atkins, Director, Child Care Services, Hoffman LaRoche; Florence N. Long, Educational Director, Summit Child Care Centers; and Dr. Anne B. Lovett, Consulting Psychologist, author and specialist in career-related problems.

After Jean T. Burgdorff, Burgdorff Realtors President, welcomed the group, Burgdorff Vice President and Director of Human Resources, Dr. Barbara Keller, began the discussion by quoting Alvin Toffler, who said in Future Shock that the "one thing certain in life is change." Explaining that child care has made significant changes in basic corporate poli- Dr. Keller suggested that the best way to deal with change must be to anticipate it. "Then", she added, "change becomes what we envision; we become leaders rather than followers."

Panelists were introduced by Barbara DeMaio, Burgdorff Relocation Manager. Dr. Fernandez explained that today, child care is very often the motivating factor for employees to reject relocation, even promotions and salary increases. Corporations, he explained, have so far been unwilling to spend money for child care, although pressure to do so is increasing.

Hoffman LaRoche was the first New Jersey corporation to establish a child care model, said spokeswoman Diane Atkins. It was a prototype "started by demand, not by fad" with a surprising 51% of its corporate child care users men, not women. For Florence Long, the most obvious change in child care has to do with parent researching. "Interviewing a child care service used to take 15 minutes—now it takes one hour. Parents have become more demanding and more informed," Long said.

Dr. Anne Lovett suggested that the greatest change she has seen in recent years is that of the woman's role in society. "The female image has gone from that of nurturing, passive, feminine, to assertive, aggressive, almost androgynous." The problem lies in the fact that when women come home from work, they must return to their former function of nurturer, which creates an almost schizoid role.

A lively question and answer period followed, with questions involving such issues as government's possible role in subsidizing child care, the rising cost of insurance coverage, and the idea of pooling monies from the public and private sector to cover child care costs.
