The action on the part of the committee was the result of half dozen residents of the Old Bridge area who alleged that the erection of the gas station is in violation of the Township Zoning Ordinance and that construction of the gas station will lower their property valuations.

Last week the Township Committee held meetings to discuss the problem. On last Monday night at the Browntown Town Hall a executive session of the Township Committee was held.

On last Tuesday night meeting at the Townhall in special session the Township Committee declared the permit, previously issued by Township Building Inspector John Conover, inoperative. The construction firm was notified by registered letter on November 19 that the permit was cancelled pending the issuance of a variance.

Work continued on the gas station despite the letter from the Township Committee.

The local police department said "that nothing could be done about the construction unless they were notified otherwise."

In the meantime controversy over the gas station is building up to a large issue.

Committee Appoints Edgar

At a special session of the Madison Township Committee all semblance of just another meeting ended when Mayor John Chamberlain announced the re-signation of Maxwell Mayer as Municipal Court Magistrate. The resignation was accepted quickly with regrets. Then the Republican dominated committee threw a "bomb-shell".

Township Committeeman Donald Macrae, who also serves as Republican Municipal Chairman, read aloud a resolution appointing Joseph Edgar, Police Magistrate, for a three-year term. The motion was quickly seconded.

Township Committeeman John

Keating of Old Bridge, a Demo-crat, angrily shouted "This is a dastardly political move by the outgoing lame duck administra-

The Committeeman from Old

Begins Study At Union Junior College

Miss Paulette V. Stanish of 403 Matawan road, Laurence Harbor, Madison Township, is among 96 student nurses from Elizabeth and Perth Amboy General Hospitals who have begun their academic studies at Union Junior College's new Nomahegan Building in Cranford.

A graduate of Sayreville High School, Miss Stanish is enrolled in the School of Nursing of Perth Amboy General Hospital.

Under Union Junior College's pre-clinical nursing program, the student nurses earn 19 credits in anatomy and psyciology, English composition, chemistry, orientation, general psychology, sociology and microbiology. They take all their academic and laboratory work at the college.

Bridge continued, "This is an example of the Republican party's tactics, trying to foster off on our township one of their appointees for another three years.

Township Committeeman John Phillips, the other Democratic minority member, agreed with Keating's statement; Phillips added, "The court had been well taken care of by visiting magistrates during the last months of Mayer's hospitalization and the arrangements could continue until the end of the year when it would be the privilege of the Democrats to name a magistrate when they take over control of the township committee.

Both Keating and Phillips issued loud and clear "NO" votes when the roll call was taken on the appointment of the magistrate. Edgar presently serves as Township Attorney.

The resignation of Mayer is effective November 30, Edgar's appointment is effective the very next day and runs to December 31,

In the public portion of the meeting, Thomas Miller of Old Bridge stated that he hated to see Mayer resign and that the Judge

had served the Township well. Miller questioned the legality of the appointment, He said, "He didn't think that it was possible to make the appointment for the three year term."

In other business to come before the Township Committee the Committee adopted on first reading an ordinance establishing a Fire District #3 in the Old Bridge area.

The Committee also adopted an ordinance on first amending an ordinance pertaining to the control of dogs in Madison Township.

Committeemen John Keating and John Phillips will attend a meeting with Dwight G. Palmer, state highway superintendent, on November 30 in Trenton regard-

ing several Madison Township highway problems.

Captain Wallis of the Madison Township Police Department presented a report which was read by Donald Macrae, asking for sidewalks and traffic lights in the vicinity of the new Route 18 near the Miller and Willis School. The report stated that over 500 children with more to come use the walkways; their ages are from 5 to 13 years. The report also urged the conconstruction of sidewalks on the northwest side of Englishtown

The ramp over which many of the children have to walk is 1074 feet long, with two six foot side-

walks on each side.
Wallis urged for "top action" on the erection of two traffic lights when could be operated manually or automatically.

The report was received by the committee and will be brought

to Trenton. A letter was received from the Jersey Central Power and Light Co., who stated that unless the steel strike has some effect on delivery of materials, work on the installation of 78 street lights in the Sayrewood South Develop-ment would start on December 21.

The power company reported that all the paper work has already been completed.

William Baier, Township En-ginner, reported that the Bridge on Bushnell Road should have been completed and that the Township would now be in a position to proceed with work on the road itself.

The engineer also reported that operation at the Manzo Blacktop Plant on the new unit has been shut down for about a month. The older unit will operate for approximately another month and then that will be closed down, Filters will be installed in both units.

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RIGHT OR WRONG

For the past week, storm clouds of gigantic proportion have been gathering in the Old Bridge area over the

erection of a gas station.

Centered directly in the middle of the storm is John Conover, Madison Township Building Inspector who issued the permit for the erection of the gas station on Englishtown Road and Fourth Street. Everyone knows that there are quite a few gas stations on Englishtown Road as it is, probably too many.

The way we get the story from Conover is that he believed that he was acting within his rights as building in-

spector to issue the permit.

The contractor receiving the permit feels that he is within his rights to build the station on the strength of the permit. We do not know who is right or wrong? To further complicate the matter, the way we understand the story it's not that the people involved are against this particular gas station or any other gas station for that matter. It just seems to them that the whole operation had a very bad start to begin with.

Bids received for plumbing, heating and ventilating work for the Madison Township Townhall on Route 9 and 34 were held over for further action at the meeting of the Township Committee on Monday night at the Browntown Townhall on Route 18.

Nine firms submitted bids, Angelo A. Petrone, Ziegler Brothers, Vena Electric Co., Dorson Electric Supply for the electrical work, Richardson Engineering Co., and Robert H. McMahon. The Richardson firm also bid

on the heating contract along with C. C. Hook and Thermal.

Ricardson, Paszament Distributing Co. and Thermal bid on the air conditioning contract.

The bids represented more money than the township committee had anticipated in acquir-

ing the townhall.

The Townhall Project long under fire by Thomas Miller of Old Bridge again drew fire from Miller who stated that when the acquisition of the tavern was announced, the township committee appropriated \$56,000 for the complete job, we now see that by awarding contracts to the lowest bidder, the cost of the TownHall would be \$81,935.60 at the least.
