Hoff Heads Board Of Education

Joseph Hoff of Highway #35, Laurence Harbor was elected president of the Madison Township Board of Education at the reorganization meeting of the Board, Monday night.

Also elected to serve as Vice president was William Joyce of Old Bridge.

Hoff was nominated for president and received the votes of Richard Pine, David Watson, William Joyce, Joseph Hoff and Charles Aumick, John Partridge

was unsuccessful in his bid for the presidency receiving only three votes and his own. Voting for Partridge were: William Kerr, Carol Delbasco, John Partridge and Stanley Kordzinski.

William Joyce was nominated for vice-president. Joyce received his vote and the votes of Hoff, Aumick, Watson and Pine.

William Kerr also nominated for the vice-presidency received the votes of himself and Delbasco, Kordzinski and Partridge.

Hoff pledged that he would work for the speedy completion of the Madison Township High School and noted the various educational problems confronting the Board of Education and the residents of Madison Township in the coming year.

Steel For H. S. On The Way

Members of the Madison Township Board of Education meeting at the Browntown School on Route 18 for their regular monthly meeting were informed by representatives of the architect, that steel for the \$2,000,000 High School is arriving daily and fabrication is underway.

The high school building program has been curtailed due to a shortage of steel resulting from the recent steel strike.

In the report various stages of construction were reported: Time allotted for work - 541 days, Aug. 10, 1959 to February 1, 1960; Time consumed 150 days or 28%. Completion of work: General contract, 13% complete; Structural steel, 0%; Heat and ventilation, 2%; Plumbing, 47%; Electrical, 1%; Site preparation, 49%; Excavation, machine, 36%; hand, 31%.

It is hoped that with the arrival of the long overdue shipment of steel the structural work can be gotten underway.

In other matters to come before the Board of Education:-

Flag Pole to be ordered and erected at the Sayre Woods South School, 3 combination stove-refrigerator-sinks to be ordered for the schools.

The Sayre Woods Maintenance were awarded a contract for the cleaning and daily maintenance of the #2 School in Sayre Woods at \$455 per month for a two month trial period. The service charge will include cost of supplies and equipment.

Mr. Joseph Kaschak was given permission to plan for a Spring Band Concert to be held at the Laurence Harbor Casino, children from all sections of Madison Township will take part in the affair. The first of its kind in Madison Township.

William Bedle of Old Bridge was awarded an additional bus route from South Amboy to Madison Park at \$570 for entire school year, pro-rated from December 7, 1959. Joseph Hoff, transportation chairman announced the dire need of substitute school bus drivers, to drive the Board of Education owned busses.

It was announced that Knollcraft Developers, Stardrive, Inc., will build a 5 1/2 room school at the Madison Park school site. Plans have been submitted to the School Building Services of the State Department of Education.

Charles Aumick chairman of the Building and Grounds Committee announced that an investigation of the heating problem in the Voorhees and Miller Schools had been completed. Aumick stated that five new thermostats had been provided by Minneapolis-Honeywell but that they were of the opinion that was not the trouble. The contractor that installed the heating system visited the school and some work was done on the heating system, after which Mr. Miller, Principal of the Miller School and School pal of the Miller School and School Custodian's advised that there was no further complaint about lack of heat at this time. Mr. Aumick stated we can only wait for a long spell of very cold weather to see if the defect has been corrected.

Aumick requested that the pay of substitute janitors be set at \$8 per day for part-time and \$13 a day for full time work. Miss Carol Delbasco objected to the small difference between \$13 for janitor and \$15 for substitute teachers. She said teachers may even be applying for the janitor jobs.

William Kerr, Chairman of the Health Committee said that the Federal Aid to milk program would be cut by half a cent on March 1st and asked that the Board of Education pick up this difference in cost which would mean \$137.25 per month. The Board agreed to absorb the cost.

Briggs Chevrolet of South Amboy were the successful bidders for a 3/4 ton pick up truck the firm bid \$1,983.41 which was the low bid.

Awarded \$8,500 For Injuries

Arthur R. Brendel of 26 Harvard Road, Parlin, has been awarded \$8,500 in his suit against the Central Railroad Company.

A jury returned the award following a trial before Superior Court Judge Bernard W. Vogel, in New Brunswick.

Brendel sued the railroad for damages after he had been injured in a fall March 7, 1958, while a passenger aboard a company ferryboat, plying between New York and Jersey City.

The prize-winning gown she modeled at the Chicago congress was made of pale green nylon taffeta. Sponsor of her trip was the Simplicity Pattern Co.

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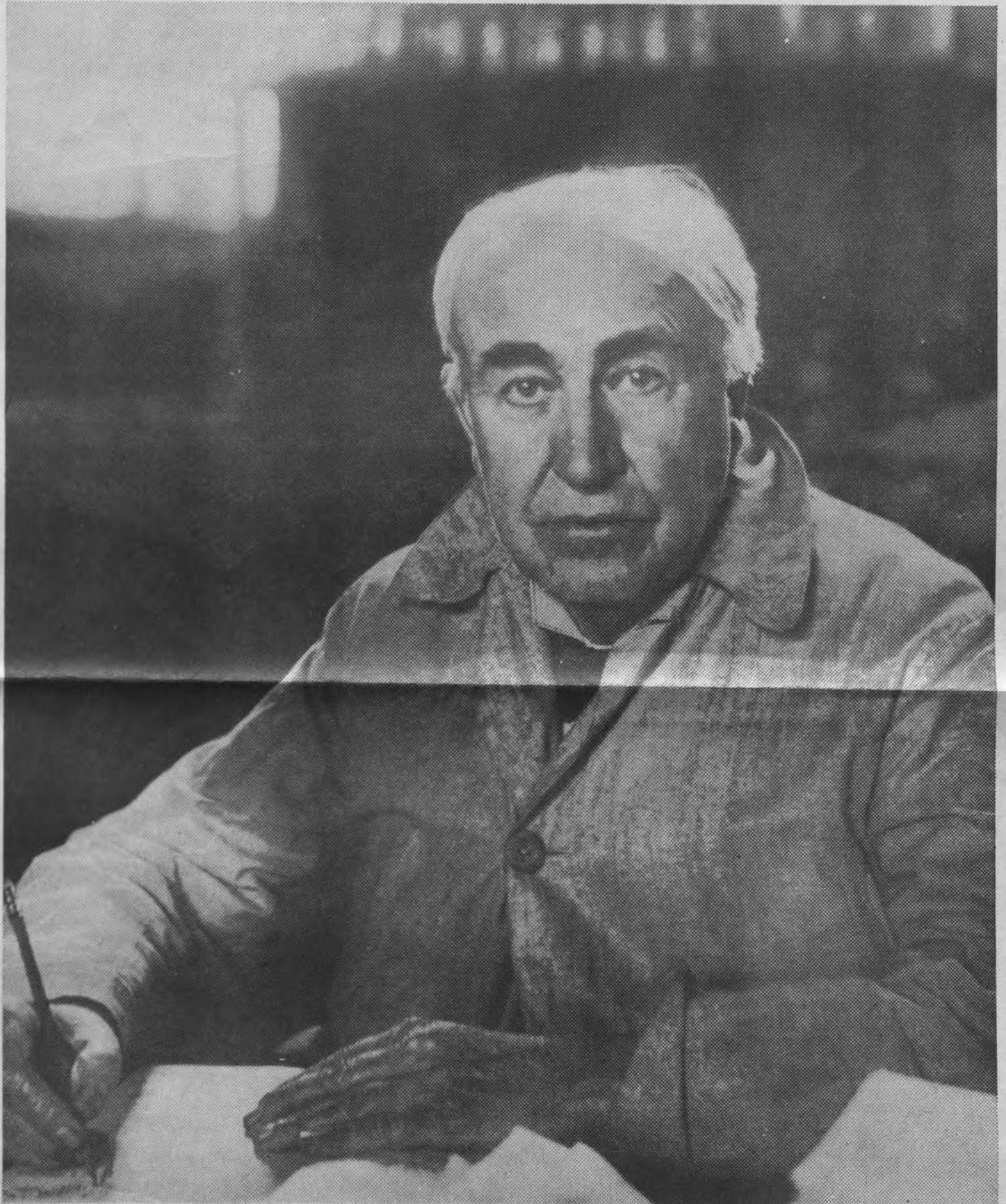
