Committeeman John Keating of Old Bridge added "In all information that I have received about the Saline Conversion Plant, they are interested in a location which has salt water, brackish water and contaminated water. Madison Township has all three.

The plant expected cost is in the neighborhood of \$1,500,000 will have a 250,000 gallon daily fresh water capacity. After several years use for experimental purposes the plant which will be built by the U. S. Department of the Interior will be put on the auction block for public sale.

Other area municipalities applying for the Saline Conversion Plant were Perth Amboy, Sayreville and South Amboy.

Well, Well, Well!

Madison Township officials again were troubled by residents complaint of water problems. At Monday night's meeting of the Madison Township Zoning Board of Adjustment, water and wells seemed to be the main topic of discussion.

The problem started with the Browntown Water Company when they applied to the Board of Adjustments for a variance to install a well on property adjacent to Throckmorton Lane.

Unlike the usual complaints of water in Madison Township, where residents have stormed meetings for lack of water and water rates, residents of Sayre Woods South protested the installation of another well.

The water situation has often

been chaotic in Madison Township, several years ago the residents of Southwood suffered from a severe shortage of water and prompted Township Officials to cause the Madison Water Company to build a water storage tank in the Old Bridge area.

Laurence Harbor and Cliffwood Beach have also had their share

Laurence Harbor and Cliffwood Beach have also had their share of water problems or rather lack of water. Residents of Cliffwood Beach charged the Cliffwood Beach Water Co., with shutting off their water supply several years ago, at a public hearing. Residents in the area presented pictures in evidence that they had to be supplied from fire trucks in order to have drinking

Don't Miss This "First" In Madison Township!

Do you have your tickets for the first public Concert of the Madison Township School Band? Advance ticket sales indicate a large turn-out of family, friends and boosters who are anxious to support the efforts of our township children.

Under the direction of Mr. Joseph Kaschak, who organized the band in December, 1958, and his assistant, Mr. Anthony Bikowski, this group has developed rapidly. Scarcely six months from the time these students first picked up a musical instrument, they played and marched in the 1959 Memorial Day Parade in Laurence Harbor. The thenpresident of the Board of Education, Mr. Richard Pine, remarked that the "children's performance was a stirring reminder of what

can be accomplished in this great township of ours with proper leadership and guidance".

This year the band is scheduled to march in the Old Bridge Memorial Day Parade on May 29th, and will march in the Laurence Harbor Memorial Day Parade on May 30th.

The Band Concert will be presented at the Laurence Harbor Casino on May 14, 1960 at 8:15 p.m. In addition to the band, the program will include selections by the Willis and Memorial School Glee Clubs. Approximately 250 children will participate in the program.

Through the foresight and planning of Mr. Kaschak and Dr. Fred V. Hulsar, Elementary Supervisor, these children will probably form the nucleus of the Madison Township High School Band.

Harbor Little League Marks First Official Opening

Mayor John Phillips doubled in brass for the 120 little league baseball players at the newly constructed Laurence Harbor Little League Field in the rear of Memorial School, much to the delight of all the small fry and the spectators present. Mayor Phillips not only acted as master of ceremonies but also threw out the first ball to get competition under way, and start the Harbor's first official Little League

The league which is composed of four completely uniformed "major" league teams and four

"minor" league clubs play a series of 18 games each, which will terminate in July. The season, however is split into two parts of nine games each with the winners of each part playing for the championship of the league. When the league title is determined, it is hoped that a Madison Township championship tourney will be played between the little league champions of Madison Park, Old Bridge, Sayre Woods Southand Laurence Harbor.

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MADISON TOWNSHIP'S VERY OWN "GIVE-AWAY" PROGRAM!

Madison Township evidently has it's very own give-away program! "Give-away" Programs are the current rage on T.V. and radio and are proving popular, however, when it comes to the taxpayers dollar that's another

Many residents of Madison Township are wondering why Our Town has recently lost almost \$5,000 annually in taxes on second class railroad property located here. We understand that only five (5) municipalities in the county, including Our Town, got hit for such a loss. How come?

It looks as though our Tax Assessor missed the boat, while other assessors in the county managed to avoid such a disasterous loss of tax dollars, so sorely needed by Our Town. How come?

We understand that such a loss was NOT necessary and that it could have been avoided by the use of plain common sense on our assessor's part.

We also heard that the assessor's present practice of assessing sub-divided vacant land in the hands of developers on an "acreage" basis instead of a "lot" basis has also cost the Township thousands of tax dollars (and saved the developers a bundle). How come?

Is it also true that the assessor is only levving a "partial" assessment (50%) against buildings owned by developers but not yet sold by them, where the only things left to complete them are to put the door knobs on or put the window glass in? How come? Our Town could well get to be known as the Town with no door locks or door knobs, if each taxpayer was given the same "break".

What gives Mr. Township Tax Assessor? We think it is about time that our assessor started to cooperate with the County Board of Taxation instead of ignoring its suggestions and evading its orders. Madison Township is in dire need of every tax dollar. We can't afford to miss the boat on ANY source of tax revenue.

Maybe the Township Committee should look into what is going on in our Tax Assessor's Office. The Township needs the money more than developers do! Let's put an end to this "Give-away" program.

WATER SHOULD COME FIRST!

At the recent meeting of the Zoning Board of Adjustment we had to sit back in wonderment over just what

Residents from Sayre Woods South were upset because the Browntown Water Company wanted to install another well in the area, to serve the residents of the develop-

Most of the objection in evidence was not primarily over the well, but centered rather from an alleged promise that a park or playground was to be built in the

We feel that if the residents in the area were told that a park was going to be built in the area and now no park is in evidence, then we feel that the residents were possibly wronged and have possible cause for civil

However, we can not see them protesting the installation of another well in the area.

Water is a vital commodity in the daily life of residents of Our Town, expansion of any water system in Madison Township should be welcomed.

We certainly hope that the residents of Sayre Woods South never have to face a waterless day, you can not imagine the actual value of such a simple thing as water until there is no water. Many of the homeowners in the area have new lawns, imagine the fruitlessness of watching the lawn burn up because of shortage of water.

Other residents of Madison Township can well remember, waterless, days when restrictions for watering lawns and even taking showers had to be enforced.

We certainly hope that the residents of Sayre Woods South clamor not against the installation of another well but rather FOR IT.

WELL, WELL! Cont'd water. The same situation occurred in Old Bridge.

Leonard Paff, a member of the Board of Adjustments stated that the water was so low in the fire hydrants a few years ago, in the Old Bridge area, that an emergency existed and water had to be pumped from Duhernal Lake into the fire hydrants in order

to fight a fire in the area. Henry Sevrin, attorney for the Browntown Water Company, reported that the company was going to install another well in order to ease operation of one pump used by the company at the present time. Sevrin stated that they are permitted to pump only 600,000 gallons of water a day from the ground he added that the second well would be

used as a relief well and in the case of emergency. He stated that the water tank in the area only stores enough water for one day's operation. He claimed that the extra well would ensure smooth operation of the water company, in the event of an emergency.

Residents of Sayre Woods South on Wendy Street were the main objectors to the proposal stating that when they purchased their homes they were told by the development sales people that there was going to be a park in the rear of them, Many claimed that they purchased their homes on the promise of the park in order that their children would have an area to play in.

One resident stated that when he looked at a plot map of the area there were at least twenty trees painted in. What we actually have to look at is a water tank in the back yard.

Henry Delbasco a member of the planning board asked the residents if they were against the well, or was it because they felt a park was to be built in the area. Many yelled back, we don't

want any well, we want a park.

James Tortorice, a member of the Zoning Board and also a member of the Industrial Commission stated that if you have a grievance about the park that this is the wrong meeting to bring it to, and suggested that they (the residents of Wendy Street) take it up with the planning board or the township committee. The residents charged that they had complained to the Planning Board and were referred to the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

Sevrin stated that the Browntown Company would like to install the extra well before the summer season is here and warned of possible dry spells if the well was not installed. He stated that it was recommended that the second well be installed as far away as possible from the existing well because of whathe termed a "cone of influence" and should be at least the distance away as the well was deep.

After consideration it was moved by Henry Delbasco that the variance be denied. Delbasco pointed out that the reason for the request in the variance was that the well would have been 10 feet from the property line so therefore the need for the variance. He added that if the Browntown Water Company wanted to install a well twenty-five feet from their property line it would not require a variance from the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

The board was unanimous in

their decision.

SPEED UNLIMITED!!

It is alarming to note that a major thoroughfare in Madison Township, namely, Ocean Blvd., Cliffwood Beach is without a posted speed limit.

To those of our citizens who do not know of this main artery, Ocean Blvd., Cliffwood Beach, runs roughly three-quarters of a mile east from Route 35 at the Pirate Ship to the township and Monmouth County boundary line at the confluence of Whale Creek and Raritan Bay.

This thoroughfare is a two lane strip of concrete flanked by houses on each side, both new and old. It is no longer a lonely country road. Its present population is heavy and growing more dense as time marches on. This road might be called a side door to Madison Township and is highly important as such.

With the warm weather already here Ocean Blvd., poses a particular problem. It can be safely said that with the exception of perhaps Route 9, 34, 35 and Englishtown Road, Ocean Blvd., Cliffwood Beach carries more than its load of summer vehicular traffic.

Pedestrian traffic is also very heavy during the summer months as this roadway (less sidewalks) with narrow shoulders is the main walk for the hundreds of residents who take advantage of the beach and pool facilities at the foot of this artery.

To further complicate matters and make this a double-dangerous stretch of roadway, Ocean Blvd., has become a mecca for the 'hot-rod racers' for miles around. It is not uncommon to see speeding cars burn up the concrete in improvised 'stock-car races'.

Speed unlimited, traffic both car and children on bicycles plus pedestrians certainly tend to make travel

on the road a risky and dangerous business.

Let's establish and post a sensible speed limit and enforce it by constant police patroling of the area. The dangerous situation existing now is not getting any better, merely making a turn for the worse. Take action now! It may be later than you think?







Population Increased Three Fold

Although the totals are incomplete, the figures reported to date show a great increase in population for the part of Middlesex County included in the Third Congressional District. Over 168,000 people have been enumerated to date. Areas where the greatest increases have been noted are Madison Township and East Brunswick where the population reported is more than triple the figure for 1950. Other areas showing sizeable increases are Sayreville and South Bruns-

wick, reporting totals approximately doubling the 1950 count. Preliminary figures for the entire area, and places of 10,000 or more population, within the area will be released by the District Supervisor, Mrs. Margaret S. Primavara, upon satisfactory completion of the Census in the whole Congressional Dis-

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
