Double Header At Townhall Meeting

Swimming Pool Sunk

Madison Township Municipal Building saw an overflow of residents as many turned out to witness what was described by one "wit" as a gigantic double header. Meeting in the offices of the clerk and tax collector-assessment area the Madison Township Board of Adjustment met in a regular scheduled meeting to rule on several matters brought to its attention.

The proposed swim club for Sayre Woods South was sunk on a legal technicality when Arthur M. Trocoli of 31 Cindy Street, under oath, stated that he did not receive notification of the hearing 10 days prior to the meeting. John Reilly of 61 Cindy Street, also under oath testified that he had not received his until August 1st, when he returned from his vacation to find it in his mail

Amid cheers and applauds from a score of residents the Zoning Board of Adjustment voted that the application for the swim club be denied because of improper notification.

The Swim Club proposal was presented by Art Tendler, president of the Green Dolphin Swim Club and L. J. Robinson. Robinproposal to the Board of Adjustment in his plea for granting of the variance Robinson stated that "this is not something new. There have been dozens of swim clubs built and established in various towns and municipalities all over the State of New Jersey." He termed the swim club "as beneficial not only to the residents of Sayre Woods South who would benefit from the recreational activity and a health asset but that the residents of the township would benefit because it would be a tax ratable, even though it is a non-profit organization the Swim Club would still pay taxes to Madison Township.

Robinson continued "that the swim club would not lower property value in the area but would tend to increase the value. That the swim club would maintain strict control over parking facilities and require that all members and guests park in the designated parking area, so that there would be no off-street parking." The consultant pointed out that the swim club would be over 500 feet from the nearest home and that a buffer zone, which could never be removed, of 50 feet of trees would be provided to the nearest

The consultant stated that as far as noise was concerned there would be little "there would be no

Philips Unhappy About Electric City

The Madison Township Committee conducted its regular meeting in the local Municipal Building, Mayor Phillips presided at the meeting.
Scores of residents heard

Township Committeeman John Keating request that the state highway department establish a maximum speed limit on Route 18 near the Willis School and install manually-controlled traffic signals near the school. Keatingfelt that it was up to the state to take care of this situation, he had previously recommended this some-

time ago.
Middlesex County Freeholders will receive another request on Keatings motion to look into several flooding conditions on Englishtown Road and Ernston Road. Keating also moved that the developers of Southwood and Ideal Homes be notified that if they do not start repairing several of the streets in the newer sections, then the Township Road Department would move in and repair the streets and bill the cost to

the developer. Harry Messenger, Chairman of the Street Lighting Department announced that steps are underway to conduct a survey in Madison Park in an effort to provide more lighting facilities for that development. Messenger who is also chairman of the recreation department announced that some of the playground equipment previously ordered by the commit-tee had already been installed and hoped that the rest of the equipment would be installed this week.

David Watson, Township Tax Collector announced tax collections for the period from January 1, 1960 until June 30th were set at \$1,132,162,18.

Several letters regarding the much publicized "Electric City" were read off. General Electric said it "apologizes if we have caused any annoyance. We are merely the supplier. We had no intention of ignoring the Town-ship Committee," Jersey Central Power and Light stated that the "public officials have a right to be annoyed. It didn't occur to us to notify officials. We are sure, Madison Township will be happy about Electric City."

The township committee also heard from W. J. Happel and Company 'who termed it a pleasure to sit down and talk to officials of Madison Township when plans are completed."

Mayor John Phillips was not happy and didn't think it would be any pleasure. Phillips again stated his stand on Electric City, "When they get ready to talk, I will be very hard to find, I can't bring myself to meet with these people." Mayor Phillips was soundly applauded by the scores of people in attendance at the meeting.

In other business to come before the township committee Mrs. Leonard Booth of Madison Park suggested that a referendum be held to construct sidewalks in the development. Mayor Phillips stated that there would be no objections and explained that the first step in getting it put on a referendum would be to have 20 percent of the Madison Park population vote "yes" for the construction of sidewalks, then they would be installed and the cost assessed against the individual

This past week we have received scores of telephone calls in support of our editorial recommending sidewalks, enforcement of ordinances and street parking. We also received several phone calls from some people that felt that installation of sidewalks would be too costly. To these we would say that "Concrete is a lot cheaper than the loss of one life".

We understand that various residents of Madison Township are interested in side walk construction as a result of the tragic accident and the Madison American editorial. We certainly hope that they continue their drive for sidewalk construction, as we will continue to urge for sidewalks and other safety measures for the protection of the residents of Madison Township.

We suggest to the Madison Township Committee that a white cross or gravestone be erected at the site of each fatality in Madison Township or serious accident. That this cross or other markers bear the number of dead and the number of injured in the particular accident and the date. Let's start back ten years ago.

This would not be an expensive program but would be a grim reminder to the residents of Our Town, that on this spot a death or serious accident by auto took

Perhaps as the residents of Madison Township continued to see the white crosses or markers grow, perhaps, then they might realize that speeding is dangerous and that IT CAN HAPPEN TO YOU. Maybe this would help?

Plenty Of Decent Kids Too!

Sometimes with all the newspaper, television and radio reports and stories of murders, rapes, muggings and other sorrid crimes committed by teen-agers, many adults are all too quick to place all teen-agers in the same category. This is not so, there are plenty of decent kids too!

True many crimes are committed by teen-agers, and of course these get wide spread coverage, more so today than an adult, who commits the very same

We feel that more newspaper space and radio and televison time should be used to point out some of the things that are being done by the decent kids.

How about some praise for the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts or the Harbor Cadet Corps, or children of the Madison Township Band Program? You will very seldom find any mention of any of the activities of these decent kids! Let one of them get caught doing something wrong, and overnight they are front page

Let an adult go out and have a few beers and have an accident and you might find the story buried in the rear of the newspaper with a headline that might read "DRUNK DRIVER ARRESTED". Let a teen-ager have an automobile accident and the headline on the front page will read "TEEN-AGER ARRESTED IN AUTO ACCIDENT" with banner headlines.

Why not treat the adult accident in the same manner, with the same size headline and put it on the front page to read "ADULT DRIVER ARRESTED IN AUTO ACCIDENT", You haven't seen it happen?

Let's get rid of this attitude that Teen-agers are nothing but a bunch of beatniks or freaks. There are many decent kids who work, study and have fun. Let's not put them in the same category with some teenagers who manage to go astray.

If one adult male or female gets into trouble, all the adults aren't classified in the same category,

so why is this done with the teenagers?

Many teen-agers in Madison Township are brought into an entirely new town, with entirely new surroundings, they attend new schools. These teen-agers are faced with many problems. They have to adjust themselves to the new neighborhood, the new schools, new teachers and they have to make new friends. This they do with greater ease than many of their adult

Look around adults, examine their problems, help them and trust them for they are the future leaders of Madison Township and our nation.

more than 650 people in the swimming area at any given time, 1/3 would be pursuing sun bathing near the pool, 1/3 would be near the pool playing cards or other social games and 1/3 would be in the water," Robinson continued "that strict rules and regulations would permit the Board of Directors to enforce all rules and regulations to the letter of the law and if a member was too loud they would be able to refund him his money at any time.

Robinson described the pool in every detail and explained "that in most cases it exceeds the limit as established by the State Code for Swimming Pools. The water would be filtered every six hours and continuously clorinated and treated and buffered to make it purer than drinking water. This is no "Coney Island" facility and there will be no illuminated signs or public address systems, the pool will be equipped with complete bath and

sanitary facilities.

The zoning Board of Adjustment denied the variance on the grounds that proper notification was not give. Before the vote for the denial of the variance Leon Arrowsmith was asked "Mr. Trocoli claims he did not get the notice in time, what if we produce a witness that would swear under oath that he (Trocoli) did get the notice on time, what would that prove?" Arrows mith replied with a chuckle, "That one of them is lying." Following the hearing it was announced by Art Tendler that Mr. Trocoli after arriving home remembered that he had received his notice on July 29th and not the 30th of July as he had testified. A special meeting to reconsider the swim club was then set by the Zoning Board of Adjustment for August 22.
