Much of the traffic using the various roads seem to have the idea that the roads are their own "privately owned race track".

We have witnessed traffic on Thorctmorton Lane that is traveling at Turnpike Speeds, yes there is certainly speeding in Sayre Woods South.

The local police department on several occasions have erected "radar traps", you guessed it right the first time. Many of the tickets issued were to residents of Sayre Woods South.

We think that the Sayre Woods South Civic Association and other civic groups in Sayre Woods South should get behind a drive to reduce speeding in Sayre Woods South.

It's not only the job of the Madison Township Police, all they can do to enforce speeding regulations, is just what they have been doing, issuing tickets, but tickets alone can not and will not stop the speeding in the development.

We feel that a driver education speed program conducted by the various civic groups in the development would tend to have better control over the situation than the local police department,

Most of the speeding is done by residents of the development, we feel that it is up to the residents to put an end to the speeding. Much more can be accomplished by a few posters or perhaps a news letter to the residents of Sayre Woods South to perhaps slow it down just a little.

The problem of speeding has existed in other sections of Madison Township, over in Madison Park one of the local organizations is working on the formation of a Citizens Safety Committee, to work out various safety ideas and present them to the township committee for their action, however we feel that action must be taken first by the residents of Sayre Woods South.

Many of the residents never have need of the services of the First Aid Squad, we certainly hope that they never will, however, if the squad is needed, we hope that they will be able to answer the call and that they have the proper equipment on hand to perhaps save a life.

Equipment costs money and we are well aware of the rising costs of living, taxes have increased, food costs are at an all-time high, gasoline and oil prices have climbed--everything seems to cost more today.

The Madison Park First Aid Squad is faced with the very same increases, equipment cost more today, gasoline and oil and the many extras needed in the operation of a squad have increased. It has been estimated that the average ambulance call averages around \$ 16. per call, the Madison Park First Aid Squad is handling between 30 and 35 calls per month. Much of the operating capital of the Madison Park First Aid Squad was derived from collections along highways, recently the State Police have seen fit to enforce the regulations which forbids first aid squads from soliciting funds on the highways, to the Madison Park First Aid Squad this is catastrophic. You can readily see the need for a fund drive. The Madison Park First Aid Squad will start their annual Fund Drive on September 17. The members of the squad will call at your home for a donation.
