## MANY PROBLEMS FACE COMMITTEE

Mayor John Phillips, recently re-elected to the Madison Township Committee by an overwhelming majority is again expected to be named Mayor of

Madison Township, at the re-organization meeting which will be held in January.

It is expected that there will be no major changes in the local

committee setup. Hoff who was recently elected to the Township Committee will take office on January 1, 1961, he will probably head the Buildings and Grounds

Committee, word from the "upper brass" claims that no major committees will be changed.

It was reported from "unofficial sources" that work on the 1961 budget for Madison Township has already been started. The Democrats who now have complete control of Madison Township are now faced with the problem of trying to keep the taxes at a level keel, yet at the same time provide more services and other facilities in the township.

It is expected that several new appointees will be made to the local police department, and rumor has it that the Police Radio and Dispatch Desks will be manned by regular police personnel rather than specials. In the road department there will be no major change in personnel and the Road Department foreman will be renamed. The local budget will again show an increase in the road department expenditures due to increased labor costs and material costs which have continued to climb.

Several of the major problems facing the Township Committee in the 1961 year will require much study and work. In the 1961 term a referendum will probably

be introduced to cause a change in the local form of government with perhaps an expanded Township Committee to better enable area representation on the Township Committee.

Another major problem facing Mayor Phillips will be the completion of the tax map and the Master Plan for the Township, if the work isn't pushed up soon, the Master Plan which started a few years ago will be obsolete by the time it is completed, there are already discrepancies in the Plan in regards to Board of Education matters, the longer it takes them to finish the Master Plan the more obsolete it will be.

The Township Committee will probably seek revision and revitalization of the township ordinances, to better enforce and control the various aspects of local government.

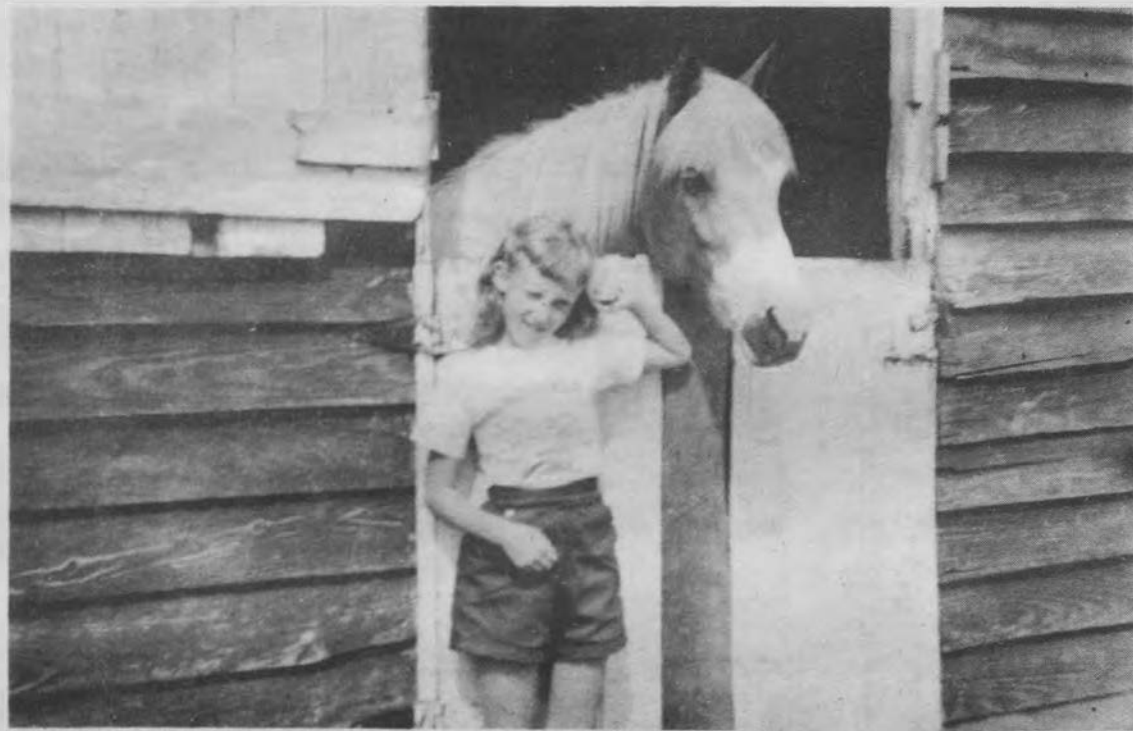
The township is still faced with the problem of obtaining a suitable sanitary land fill operation, many residents of Madison Township have been complaining of the clouds of smoke and the smell from the garbage dump off Route 9.

The Township's recreation program will be expanded in the coming year and more equipment added to the present playground equipment, the work this year will be a little easier.

Street Lighting plans are already in progress and several of the older developments including Madison Park and sections of Southwood will be slated for brighter and more lights in the developments.

Road problems will still continue to trouble both the township committee and the residents of Madison Township, many of the roads will have to be re-built before they fall apart completely. The township will also seek Federal and State aid for the Laurence Harbor and Cliffwood Beach area on the problem of storm and water damage at the local waterfront.

These and many more problems face the township committee and the residents of Madison Township in the year of 1961, we certainly hope that Mayor Phillips and the Township Committee will be able to cope with the situation.

## Voorhees School Students Hope To Obtain Right Name For Colt

It is Children's National Book Week and approximately 120 students of the Raymond E. Voorhees School, Liberty Street, Old Bridge began the week by entering a nation wide contest with the hope that one of the entries will be chosen as the grand winner. The prize is a thousand dollars' worth of new books to be given to the school library.

All the contestant has to do is submit the winning name for a colt!

It all started when Misty gave birth to her first foal last April 6. Misty is the heroine of Misty of Chincoteague, by Marguerite Henry, one of the favorite horse stories of all boys and girls for the past twelve years.

Misty is a descendent of the Spanish ship-wrecked ponies found on Assateague Island early in the 16th century. She is a foal of the Phantom and was sired by the Pied Piper, both famous ponies of their native, deserted Virginia island.

Each year on the last Wednesday of July a number of the wild ponies are rounded up on their island and are made to swim across the channel to the inhabited island of Chincoteague. The following day the colts are sold at a public auction. The Phantom always managed to escape the roundup men until one year when young Paul Beebe succeeded in bringing in not only the wild Phantom but a baby foal, which he had at first mistaken for mist through the bushes. Paul at once affectionately named her "Misty".

Misty makes her home at the Beebe Pony Ranch on the southern end of the little seven-mile long Chincoteague. For several years she lived at the home of Marguerite Henry in Wayne, Ill. where she was a constant at-

traction for boys and girls in her neighborhood. Each year her birthday was celebrated by 300 to 500 children who came to play games, feed Misty carrots and sugar, and eat birthday cake baked in the shape of a horse-shoe. Two years ago Misty was sent back to the Beebe Ranch.

This past April 6 Misty gave birth to her first foal, a fawn-colored colt with four white feet and a blazed face. The baby stood 24 inches high when born. The name of the colt's father is "Wings".

The fact that the colt's birthday was right in the middle of National Library Week, plus the fact that Misty herself bears the distinction of being the only four-footed member of the American Library Association persuaded Mrs. Henry to ask the boys and girls of America's libraries to help her select a suitable name. She immediately thought of the hundreds of boys and girls who have been writing letters asking: "Will Misty ever have a colt? What will you name it?"

As a result, the publishers of the book is providing the prize. Mrs. Arnold Von der Porten, Voorhees Library consultant, has announced the contest will open on Monday and all children in the fourth, fifth and sixth grades are asked to suggest a name for the colt.

The children of the school will, individually, submit names to the librarian. A committee of judges will select one name on the basis of its originality and aptness as the single entry of the library. That name will be submitted on the entry blank supplied by the publishers together with a statement of no more than 50 words on the reason for the name.

The Voorhees P.T.A. will award a gift to the winner of the

school contest and Mrs. Theodore Pytlar, president announces that all entries must be in to the judges on Monday, Nov. 21.

One of the school students who is ineligible to enter the contest because she is only in the third grade, eight year old Mary Lou Quackenbush, has visited the famous Misty during the past two years at what is known as Pony Penning Days on the island.

During the past summer she also had the pleasure of meeting and chatting with the author, Mrs. Henry, and has an autographed copy of the book to her from Mrs. Henry. Another highlight of the last visit was the petting of the little nameless colt, subject of the contest, during a visit to the Beebe Ranch. Pictures, facts and snapshots are posted on the walls throughout the halls in the school, and on Monday, Mrs. Von der Porten and Mrs. Quackenbush visited in the rooms of the eligible students speaking briefly to acquaint them with Misty and her colt. There are several copies of the Misty of Chincoteague book available in the classrooms.

Another note of interest to the contestants is the fact that during the last Pony Penning Days cameramen from the Twentieth-Century Fox Studios were on location taking shots for the movie which is now being filmed of Misty.

### Hole-In-Wall Work Started

Work was started this week on the long-awaited "Hole in the Wall" widening project at the intersection of Bordentown Ave. and Ernston Road. The intersection has been the scene of several accidents in the past few years.

Several years ago the Middlesex County Board of Freeholders placed four way stop signs at the intersection to prevent accidents. The "hole-in-the-wall" presented serious traffic problems from the start, but the situation was greatly aggravated recently due to the influx of housing in the area both in Sayreville and Madison Township and the building of the SayreWoods Shopping Center.

The project to widen the roadbed is a joint undertaking by the Pennsylvania Railroad, the Borough of Sayreville and the Middlesex County Board of Freeholders. The railroad is expected to pay most of the cost of construction at the overpass.

The project is entirely within the boundaries of the Borough of Sayreville which has been negotiating with the railroad and the Board of Freeholders for sometime.

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### We Certainly Hope Not!

Several residents of Madison Township have shown keen interest in perhaps occupying part of the high school building which is expected to be completed by January 1, 1961. We certainly hope that the superintendent of schools and the Board of Education can hold their ground and insist on the complete finishing of the high school building and site before any children are permitted to attend the school.

We fully realize that many of the students of Madison Township have some extremely trying conditions to put up with in order to receive an education. Many of the children are attending school in firehouses or sub-standard classrooms.

We ask them just be patient for a little while longer.

The partial finished high school is like receiving a Christmas gift, several days prior to Christmas with the usual sign "Do Not Open Until Christmas". We'd all like to take a look inside the package to see what we were getting. Much the same with the high school, the students would certainly like to move in.

Let's think of the safety problem involved in the picture!

The building is not complete and scores of workmen and various equipment will be in the area during the school hours, the noise from the workmen and equipment would certainly interfere with the students.

Most of the students that would use the partially finished high school would have to be transported to the site from Madison Park, Old Bridge and the Laurence Harbor Cliffwood Beach areas of Our Town. This alone would represent a dangerous situation because there is no finished road into the high school site at the present time.

We have spoken to several superintendents of schools in surrounding areas and they are of the opinion that it would be unwise and unsafe to move into the partially finished high school. Let's wait just a little while longer, after all Madison Township has waited for a long time for a high school of our own, Let's wait just a little while longer!

### Light Needed For Highway 9

With talk of the Madison Township High School nearing it's final completion and expected to be ready by the opening of school in September 1961, we certainly hope that Mayor John Phillips and the Township Committee will again press for a traffic light at the intersection of Highway 9 and Throckmorton Lane.

Previous attempts by the township committee to obtain Traffic Signals at the intersection from the State Highway Department have failed. We take this opportunity to remind the mayor and the Township Committee that with the opening of the new Madison Township High School this intersection will be one of the main crossing points for children of the SayreWoods South development on their way to and from school.

From previous experiences with the State Highway Department installation of a traffic light usually takes some time, we are of the opinion that one is needed at the present time. However, let's not forget the traffic that will increase as a result of the opening of the new high school.

We realize, Mayor Phillips and the Township Committee that you have tried to have a light installed at this intersection, won't you please try again and this time point out to the State Highway Department that the new high school is expected to open in September of 1961, perhaps, this will aid the situation, we certainly hope so. Let's also ask the State Highway Department to lower the speed limit in the area to perhaps a 40 mile an hour speed zone, after all this is really a built up area and there have been enough accidents in the area to warrant such a change in the speed law. How about it Mayor Phillips and the Township Committee?

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## Hoff Resigns As Board Head

Joseph G. Hoff, president of the Madison Township Board of Education living up to his campaign promises that if he were elected to the Madison Township Committee he would render his resignation as a Board of Education member.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Madison Township Board of Education Hoff, resigned as president of the Board of Education, named to fill the vacancy caused by Hoff's resignation as president was William Joyce who had served as vice-president, John Partidge of Cedar Grove was named as vice-president, Hoff's resignation from the Board of Education is effective December 31, 1960.

On January 1, 1961, Hoff will be sworn in as Township Committeeman, Hoff who was elected in the Democratic Landslide as Township Committeeman, was under heavy fire from G.O.P. candidates and was termed as "wearing three hats. Hoff also serves as Township Building Inspector. During the heat of the Election Campaign, Hoff was criticized by his opponents as having three hats, one as the Building Inspector, one as Board of Education president and one as candidate for Township Committee.

Hoff was elected for two terms to the Madison Township Board of Education. He has resided in Madison Township for nearly 31 years. He is married and has 6 children, he hails from the Laurence Harbor area of Madison Township.

Hoff graduated from Matawan High School and attended Newark College of Engineering, he was a veteran of World War II and served with the U.S. Navy. He has served as superintendent of construction on many large construction projects in the New Jersey area.

Hoff is a member of the Harbor Lions Club, the Madison Township Rotary Club, member of the Laurence Harbor Democratic Club, Madison Park Democratic Club and the young Democratic Club of Madison Township. He is a member of the Local #16 BMPIU-AFL. He attends St. Lawrence R. C. Church, Laurence Harbor and is a member of the Holy Name Society.

The resignation of Hoff opens the school election and may effect control of the local Board of Education. The school board annual election which is held in February will now have four vacancies up for grabs. Coming up for election will also be the seats held by Mrs. Henry Kosibucki, Mr. Charles Aumick and Mr. David T. Watson.

Watson serves the township as Tax Collector for Madison Township and is not expected to seek re-election.

It is expected that several candidates will come forth shortly, many of the candidates that will seek election to the Madison Township Board of Education have been defeated on several occasions. It is expected that at least one woman will be in the February race. Qualifications for candidates for the local Board of Education may be obtained from the County Superintendent of Schools.

POLICE DEPARTMENT: Understand that several more policemen will be included in the new 1961 budget, Madison Township's police department could stand a few more personnel to round it out and give better police patrol to all sections of Madison Township. One police car should be assigned to the SayreWoods South area just to handle that area alone. With the 2,000 houses, three school buildings, a medical center and more stores to open in the area shortly. The police department should assign at least one police car to the area. We'd still like to see Police Patrol Cars manned with two police officers, especially at night, we think it is foolish to send one man out in a patrol car at night.

ROAD DEPARTMENT: How about repairing some of the holes in the road on Southwood Drive, Old Bridge? Some of the holes are getting deeper, pretty soon

they will be truly "spring busters" now they are only "jaw shakers". Cheesecake Road is still in poor condition, this is due to the heavy trucking on the road. How about restricting the size of trucks on the roads up in SayreWoods South before some of the heavy trucks that are using the area roads for short-cuts, ruin the roads altogether? Some stop street signs are also needed in the SayreWoods South Development.

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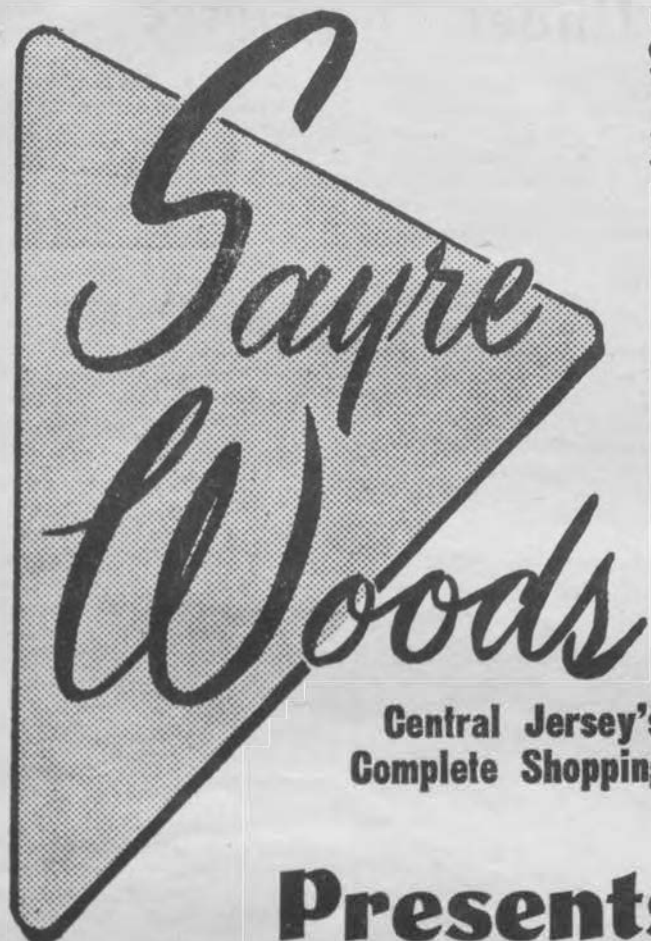

## Mark Opening Of School Library Facilities

Book Week is celebrated during November, but a double celebration was held in the Memorial School, Laurence Harbor.

The school library has opened its doors in a new location. The school library was created as a project by the Laurence Harbor-Cliffwood Beach Parent Teacher Association in 1958. Last year, the library was dedicated in a converted boiler room and now it has moved to one of the offices formerly occupied by the administrative staff on the first floor of the building.

James Maloney, principal, is the advisor of the group and PTA library committee members are Mrs. Joseph Deerin, PTA president; Mrs. Vincent Applegate and Mrs. David Wat-

son. During the summer months other PTA members who helped catalog the new books were Mrs. Joseph Mollis, Mrs. Russell Macdonald, Mrs. Douglas Weston and Mrs. Charles Deveck.

The students make an important contribution to the efficient operation of the library. In each classroom, a pupil is chosen to serve as class librarian. The class librarian helps her classmates select books, collects fines on over-due books and assists the teacher when the class goes to the library. Every other Wednesday, the library committee instructs four honor students in library procedure. Boys in the upper grades help to deliver the books to the library.

The library will be open to the students on Thursday and Friday of every week.

Faculty members who assist Mrs. Noneschein are Mrs. Walter Scherer, Mrs. Clara Crimmins and Raymond Wiza. Mrs. Scherer selects books for the first and second grades; Mrs. Crimmins for the third through the sixth grades and Mrs. Wiza for the seventh and eighth grades.

In November, 1959, there were 1,600 books. Mrs. George Mon-

chein, library chairman, reported 2,500 books are now available to the students.

## Civilian Defence Meeting Held

The Madison Township Civil Defense Council held its regular meeting recently at Township Headquarters, Highway 9.

A special meeting to discuss plans for a Civil Defense drill will be held on November 17.
