Route 9 Merchants To Seek Action Against State

Merchants operating businesses along Route 9 will soon form a Merchants Association. The group will seek action against the State Highway Department in an effort to obtain highway open-

ings along Route 9.

The State Highway Department closed island openings on Route 9 over a year ago. Jug-handles were installed at the intersection of Route 9 and Ernston Road and

just south of the intersection of Route 34 and Route 9.

At the present time there is only one opening along a section of highway approximately 1.5 miles long. Businessmen in the

area claim that since the closing of the islands business has fallen off 25%, over fifty merchants are affected by the island closing.

A spokesman for the group stated that the group will incorporate and hire an attorney to take the State Highway Department to court to force opening of the islands.

Earlier this year Township Committeeman John Keating urged that the State Highway Department install at least four left hand turn lanes on this section of the highway. The Madison American contacted Mr. Keating. He stated "that the officials of Madison Township are deeply

concerned about the loss of business for the local merchants on Route 9 and we are taking every step within our power to have the State Highway Department open up the highway."

Township Attorney Harold G. Smith of Madison Park stated the "Closing of the islands on Route 9, not only hurts the businessmen of the area but also the residents who must travel long distances out of their way in order to reach their homes. Some word is expected from the State Highway Department concerning this matter very shortly. We certainly hope that the State Highway Department will co-operate with the officials of Madison Township."

Some merchants on Route 9 feel that they should seek tax reductions from the Township because of the loss of income since the closing of the highway islands. At least 6 openings had been closed because of the State Highway Department. The only opening along the highway is near the Municipal Building and this is supposed to be used by official cars. (police and emergency vehicles). Despite warning signs that this opening can be used for official use only, visitors to the Madison Township Municipal Building have constantly used this one and only opening.

Merchants in Madison Township are concerned over the loss of business and point out, it seems funny that the State Highway Department didn't start their project in South Amboy or Sayreville, why did they settle for Madison Township?

Madison Teacher Awarded \$45,000 As Result Of Unusual Accident

Richard Clement a teacher in the Madison Township School system residing on Oak Street, Perth Amboy, N. J. received a \$45,000 verdict against David Taylor of Rahway and Gary Molyneux of Watchung after a four day trial before Hon. James Guiliano, Superior Court Judge in New Brunswick.

At the time of the accident

in June, 1958, Mr. Clement was employed as an attendant in Ruddy's Service Station, Rahway. The defendant Molyneux brought his car to the station and told defendant Taylor to service the car. Mr. Taylor a co-employee at the station attempted to drive the car into a bay for service and place it on a lift but the brakes failed to hold and the car

pinned Clement against the wall of the station, seriously injuring his right leg.

The verdict was entered against both Taylor and Molyneux on the theory that Molyneux failed to warn Taylor of the defective brakes and that Taylor was also negligent in his operation of the car.

Clement was represented by Henry Spitzer and Harold G. Smith of Perth Amboy. Taylor was represented by William Little of Rahway and Molyneux was represented by Bernard Seidman of South River.

It's that time of year again, and for the 2nd year the Madison Township School Band will present their spring concert. Those who attended last year were pleasantly surprised and somewhat amazed at the finished performance given by these youngsters who have been taking lessons such a short time.

This year the concert will be held at St. Bernadette's Hall in Madison Park on May 25th at 8 P.M. Owens Heads Mental Health Fund Campaign

Mr. Richard G. Owens, U.S. Post Office Department, today was named chairman of the 1961 Mental Health Fund Campaign in Madison Township.

The appointment of Mr. Owens was announced by Dr. Irvine L. H. Kerrison of the Middlesex County Mental Health Fund Campaign, who said the drive will be conducted during the month of May.

It is being coordinated with the National Mental Health Fund drive sponsored by the National Association for Mental Health, and affiliated state and county Association for Mental Health, according to Mr. Kerrison.

In accepting the chairmanship of the local drive, Mr. Owens called for volunteers and said he would appoint division leaders and other chairman at a later date.

He explained the funds will be administered by the county, state, and National Mental Health, associations, the only group of citizen volunteers in the country dedicated to the fight against mental illness.

"I know the citizens of Madison Township will rally to this cause", Mr. Owens declared, "which is one of the most pressing in our country."

Mental illness has been called the "nation's number one health problem" by Dr. Jonas Salk.

"And statistics bear this out, for it is a fact that one of every two hospital beds in our country is for a person who is mentally ill."

Mr. Owens explained that there are three quarters of a million persons in mental institutions throughout the country, and almost as many more needing, but not receiving, attention because of shortages of personnel and facilities.

"In New Jersey alone there are more than 21,000 mentally ill persons in institutions, and it is costing us \$34,000,000 annually in taxes", he declared, adding:

"We cannot let this scourge continue unchecked, we must make every effort to combat it. And the first step which we in Middlesex County can take is to join this local community effort to raise funds to help finance the nationwide war on mental illness."

Mr. Owens resides at 96 Athens Ave., Central Park. He is a member of St. Bernadette's parish, Parlin and is active in the K of C Council # 4504 in Union.

Mr. Owens is associated with the District 11 Democrats Club and the Madison Township Young Democrats.

He also served with the U. S. Air Force during the Korean Campaign.

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Political Pot "Boileth" Over!!

Despite the general outward appearance that there is nothing but peace and harmony among the five Democratic Township Committeemen, rumors bouncing around the town, say it isn't so.

Many close supporters of Township Committeeman Joseph Hoff, who heads the Township Road Committee, claim that "Joe" is getting a "raw deal". Mr. Hoff in the past has been an advocate of Township Jobs for Democratic Party Workers. Hoff has done a tremendous job since taking over the Road Department and was responsible for the fast and efficient removal of the heavy snowfalls that struck the New Jersey area earlier this year.

The only sign of a "break" in the solid Democratic front, came at a recent meeting of the Township Committee, when Hoff voted a loud NO, against the proposed Salary Ordinance for Township Employees. More fireworks can be expected at the hearing on the ordinance which is scheduled for the Monday evening meeting of the Township Committee.

Apparently, the main reason for the rift, has not yet been made public and rumor is rampant. Some of the rumors claim that Hoff will resign as Chairman of the Road Department. Some claim that he has already resigned. Others that Mr. Hoff will quit the Township Committee altogether.

Some circles claim that the Township Engineer Frederick Kurtz may be one of the reasons for the split between Hoff and Phillips, Kurtz has continually disregarded the recommendations of the Road Department Chairman to the Committee and has fostered his own recommendations.

Whatever the reason, some effort must be made by the local Democratic Chairman, Walter Staeger to put an end to this feud, before it really gets out of hand.

Mr. Staeger has been in politics for sometime and readily knows that it is easier to replace an Engineer than it is to elect a candidate to Township Committeeman. The people of Madison Township elected Mr. Hoff to serve on the Township Committee, not the Engineer. Mr. Hoff should be left to run his department, he is the person that is responsible to the voters of Madison Township.

Hatred Is The Order Of The Day!

Our recent editorial in the Madison American concerning Dr. William Sample, Mr. C. Ridgeway and Mr. Vito Pace brought scores of telephone calls of protest from residents of Our Town that "they can't do it, they won't do it and they wouldn't dare".

The fact of the matter is that they can do it.

The Board of Education members will have to give no reason whatsoever for not rehiring the superintendent of schools or for that matter any teacher or employee of the school system who is not under tenure.

We feel that the Madison Township Board of Education has already committed a grave mistake, by not rehiring the Assistant Administrator and the Co-ordinator of Special Subjects. This alone would be enough to discourage a superintendent of schools. Dr. Sample originally recommended both of these gentlemen to the Madison Township Board of Education. They moved from New York State to New Jersey and presently live in the area.

When Dr. Sample was employed by the Madison Township Board of Education it was by a two year contract. Originally Dr. Sample requested \$12,000 for the first year and \$13,000 for the second year. The Board of Education offered \$12,500 per year. When Dr. Sample moved to Madison Township he purchased a home in Our Town. He became a member of Our Community, one of the few Superintendent's of Schools in the history of the township to live in Our Town.

Dr. Sample has an active interest in Madison Township, he has aided on various fund drives in Middlesex County, appointed a member of the Juvenile Delinquency Committee, he is an active member of the Madison Township Rotary Club and above all Dr. Sample is a Madison Township Taxpayer.

When Dr. Sample entered the Madison Township School System less than 100 teachers were employed by the Board of Education. During the 1961-62 school term this number will reach almost 200. We don't think that there is a resident of Madison Township that doesn't feel that a pay increase is in order.

Out Of Line

At the recent meeting of the Township Committee the members present moved for the adoption on first reading an ordinance amending an ordinance established to regulate and license the installation maintenance and operation of automatic or mechanical coin operated machines.

We feel that basically the ordinance is a good ordinance, as far as the licensing of all coin operated vending machines is concerned, however we do feel that the license fees are entirely out of line.

For example automatic Soft Drink or Soda Dispensing Machines for coins up to 5¢ the fee is set at \$5.00 per machine. For coins over 5¢ the fee jumps up to \$20. We wonder how many soda vending machines are still using a nickel? The five cent soda machine went out with the five cent subway ride.

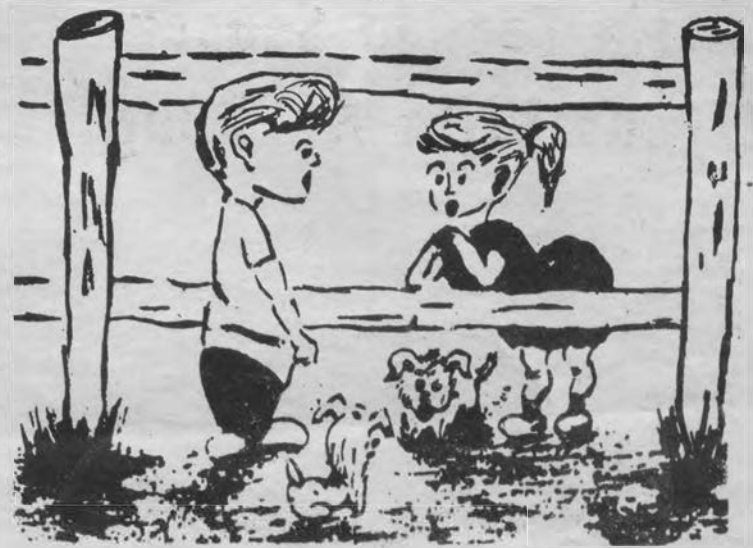
Automatic Vending Machines the price ranges from \$2 for 1¢ coins to \$10 for coins over 5¢.

Evidently the ordinance is aimed at Skill Games, Pin Ball, Bagatelle Machines and similar devices because this fee is set at \$35 per machine.

We think that the ordinance once again hurst the businessmen of Madison Township, license the machines but by all means lower the rate of fees.

The ordinance covers launderettes, ball point pen machines, pin ball machines, soda machines, milk machines, juke boxes, stamp machines and practically any kind of a machine using a coin.

Who is going to pay for the increase in the license fees? That's right the residents of Madison Township, the taxpayers.

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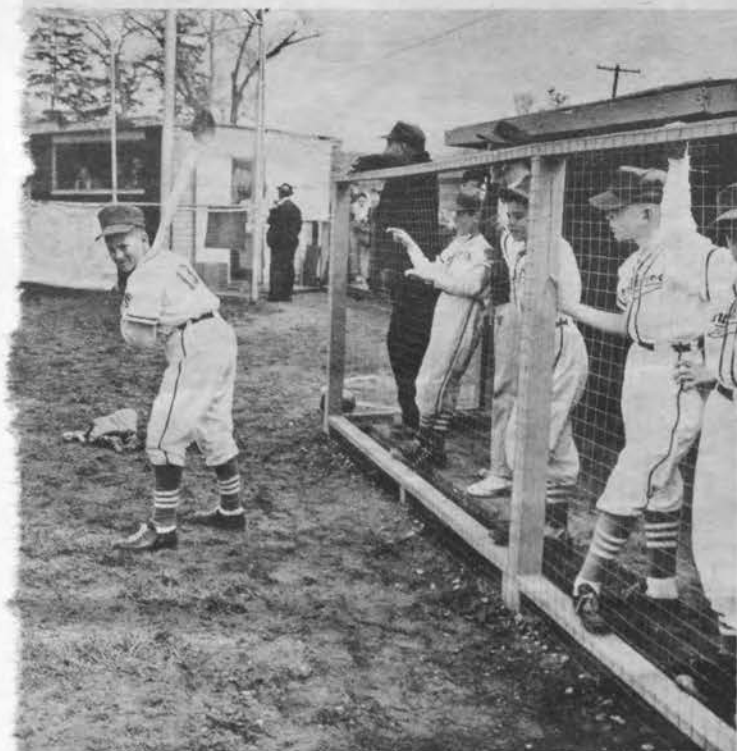

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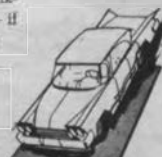

vacation and sick leave

(1) Vacation - Each full time employee of
the Township of Madison shall be entitled
to vacation time as set forth in the
following schedules:

1. Police Dept.
(a) Each superior officer shall be en-
titled to 18 work days a year

(b) Each patrolman shall be entitled to
15 work days a year

2. Administrative, Assessment and Col-
lection of Taxes
(a) Township Clerk, Tax Assessor and
Tax Collector shall be entitled to three
(3) weeks per year.

(b) Full time personnel - each full time
employee shall be entitled to two (2) weeks
per year.

3. Road Dept. and Sanitation
(a) Road Supervisor and Sanitation fore-
man shall be entitled to three (3) weeks a
year.

(b) Each full time employee shall be
entitled to two (2) weeks a year.

4. The foregoing schedules shall apply to
all personnel on the payroll as of January
1 of the current year. Personnel, an
employee between January 1 and April 1,
shall be entitled to one week vacation for
that year. Personnel employed after
April 1 shall not be eligible for vacation
period for that year. Vacation time can-
not be carried over from year to year.

(2) Sick leave - Each full time employee
shall earn one (1) sick day for each
month of employment accumulative to
a total of nine months.

III. Holidays.
All full time employees of the Town-
ship of Madison shall be entitled to the
following Holidays: New Year's Day,
Washington Birthday, Good Friday, Mem-
orial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day,
Thanksgiving, Christmas. The foregoing

Department.
