Young Dems Hear Doren

Middlesex County Assemblyman Joseph Doren was guest
speaker at the recent meeting
of the Madison Township Young
Democratic Club over 50 members attended the meeting held at
the Penquin Club on Route 34.

Doren termed the candidacy of James Mitchell as the G.O.P. candidate for Governor as a hoax to the residents of the State of New Jersey.

Doren, who was affiliated with the firm of Wilentz, Goldman, Spitzer and Sills of Perth Amboy, New Jersey as an attorney handled many workman's compensation and labor relations cases. Some circles consider him an authority on labor relations and other labor problems. Doren has introduced several labor bills to the assembly.

The Middlesex County assemblyman stated that 'Mitchell must think the voters of New Jersey as just morons. Mitchell represents big money he was against the minimum wage law. Many manufacturers are moving their plants down South where the labor market is cheaper, why should they pay residents of New Jersey and New York \$1.25 per hour when in the South they can get away with less."

Doren continued 'his refusal to debate publicly with Richard Hughes on any issue before television or on the radio, will cost him heavily in the November election. Why does this man refuse to debate any issue on the problems of New Jersey? What

Aid Squad Reports

Captain John DiGiovanni of the Laurence Harbor First Aid and Safety Squad has issued the squad's report for June.

There were l4l calls answered, requiring 474 man hours from squad members. There were 25 transports, 18 emergency transports, 18 house calls, 21 accidents, 9 calls at the building and 50 miscellaneous calls.

Calls by area were: Laurence Harbor 58, Cliffwood Beach 17, Central Park 5, Cheesequake 5, Knollcroft 6 and 50 others.

Car #34 traveled 1,035 miles, car #35 traveled 309 miles and car #795 traveled 334 miles, for a total of 1,678 miles.

THE RAINS CAME-THE DEBRIS REMAINS

In case anybody didn't know Madison Township was hit by a record rain storm on Saturday. The weatherman had predicted fair and warm weather for Saturday but evidently Mother Nature didn't get the prediction. The weather started out Saturday kind of moody. In the middle of the afternoon a heavy down pour hit the area causing extensive flooding and other storm damage in the area.

With the outburst of the flooding conditions, scores of telephone calls 'flooded' Madison
Township Police Headquarters
reporting various road conditions
and floods in the area.

Hardest hit was Knollcroft in the Cliffwood Beach area where rains caused streets to turn into canals. Laurence Harbor fire officials had fire apparatus in the Cliffwood Beach area because recent flooding conditions on Route 35 might prevent fire apparatus from reaching the area.

Residents of SayreWoods South were alarmed with flooding conditions, worst hit in the area was Adams Street near York Avenue. Streets in the area became one mass of water measuring over a foot. On Route 516 a drain near the Browntown Shopping Center was unable to handle the tremendous flow of water, water erupted over the road and a large section of ground in an openfield became a pond.

Road Foreman Theodore Bastedo was called out to various areas as the storm increased in density. He reported that a huge drain pipe under Cottrell's Road

near the Browntown Apple Jack Distillery was completely washed out. The Road Forman erected various road blocks in Madison Township.

Bordentown Avenue, near the American Billets Company, was completely under water. Ernston Road near the 'Hole-in-the-Wall' was a raging torrent. Stalled automobiles caused traffic jams in both areas.

Old Cheesequake Road at the rear of the Madison Township Police Headquarters was unusable because of flooding conditions. Water poured out on Cheesequake Road, completely flooding the area near Water Works Road. On Cheesequake Road (Madison Park) a barricade erected by the Madison Township Road Department to prevent damage to the road was washed out.

Heavy rains at the Runyan Waterworks (Perth Amboy Water Company) caused a section of ground near the dam to wash away releasing gallons of water and practically emptying a man made lake. Water officials reported at the height of the story they had opened the flood gates to eliviate the situation. Water rushing over the sluice gates at the dam lifted up a huge cement slab weighing over a ton. The water department workmen attempted to dig a ditch near the dam to relieve the tremendous flow of water, the opposit side of the bank collapsed and millions of gallons of water rushed out before the ditch could be dug.

Traffic was snarled on Englishtown Road in Old Bridge where automobile wreckers towed several cars out of the water. In nearby Sayreville, traffic was detoured because of flooding conditions on Route 9 near the A&P Shopping Center. Flood conditions were reported on Routes 34 and 35 of Madison Township.

Several washouts were reported on Morristown Road in the Cheesequake Section, Ernston Road. Near Madison Park the

Study Needed

Madison Township roads which were in pretty poor condition to begin with suffered extensive damage due to recent heavy rain storms in the area.

Obviously, there must be something wrong with the drainage in the area. You don't have to be an engineer or scholar to figure that out.

We recommend that Mayor Phillips and Township Committeeman Joseph Hoff, Chairman of the Road and Highway Department order a complete survey of the water drainage problem.

We feel that the Township Engineer should make this study on a Township wide basis. There isn't much sense in fixing any of the Township Roads until the problem of better and more adequate drainage is solved.

We grant you that recent rainfall has been out of the ordinary; however, the situation is becoming so aggravated that even the slightest amount of rain turns certain roads into rivers.

It's Only A Start

The recreation program in Madison Township is only five years old and is still in it's infancy stage. We feel that quite a bit has been accomplished in the five years.

The original program was started under the Jurman administration when Michael A. Staats, who served as chairman of the Road Department at that time contacted officials and obtained use of the Duhernal Lake area as a park and playground site.

The program was continued under the Chamberlain administration and is now being broadened under the Phillips administration. We are fully aware that the play-ground areas could stand improvement, but it is the hope of Recreation Chairman, Harry Messenger, of the Township Committee that the recreation program in Madison Township will continue to grow.

There are many, many things needed in Madison Township before we can really go to town on recreational facilities. We need sewers, we need schools, we need roads, additional policemen just to name a few.

The recreation facilities have continued to grow and the recreation committee is working on several ideas, to promote youth activities for the youngsters of Madison Township.

Madison Township parents should devote more of their own personal time and effort into recreational activity for the youngsters, afterall, we can't expect the township officials to do everything for the youngsters.

Not to mention that sewers are vital to the health and welfare of any growing community.

Cliffwood Beach and Laurence Harbor are very nice places to live, how much nicer they would be with proper drainage?

Dear Nameless:

We agree with you that Laurence Harbor and Cliffwood Beach is a nice place to live, in fact Madison Township is a nice place to live.

However, we can't close our eyes (or nose) to certain conditions existing in Madison Township.

Let's face it the ground is similar to a sponge and will absorb only so much water. When the ground reaches a saturation point that's the end of proper drainage the water then has no place to go and builds up in low lying areas. Laurence Harbor and Cliffwood Beach have long passed this saturation point. The only answer as you point out is sewers.

True sewers cost money, but certainly the longer we keep putting off the problem of sewerage disposal. The more costly the program will be.

Five years ago a referendum for sewerage disposal was voted down by the residents of the Laurence Harbor-Cliffwood Beach area, Prices for materials, labor etc., have continued to increase and the cost of sewerage has also increased.

has also increased. We certainly hope that sewers and proper drainage is installed in the Laurence Harbor - Cliffwood Beach as soon as possible. As long as the condition exists in this area of washing machine water draining in the streets and highways, septic tanks and cesspools overflowing creating various health menances. We will continue to write about Smells-In-The-Night. Perhaps in this way the residents and officials of Madison Township can be shamed into obtaining the proper and much needed sanitary disposal services so urgently needed. Thank you for your letter.

Flames were visible from a mile away as the flames spread through a 30' x 60' building which at one time housed a refreshment stand and shooting gallery. Firemen confined the blaze to the utility building and prevented it from spreading to the main ball room.

In 1947 the building housing the original Beach Casino and Ball room were completely destroyed by fire in a blaze which caused an estimated \$250,000 damage.

Police reported that residents in the area had seen people loitering about the building earlier in the evening. Police are investigating the fire which they feel could have been of "suspicious" origin.

Traffic was re-routed by Police Sgt. William Burlew who directed operations from a loudspeaker equipped police car, several hundred residents of the area remembering the 1947 blaze, flocked to the scene of the fire.

Early arrivals at the fire stated that the flames were bright orange and leaped at least fifty feet into the air and had a very good start before firemen arrived rival the Laurence Harbor Fire Company had the fire under control, many residents in the area felt disappointed.

The Laurence Harbor First Aid and Rescue were on standby call at the scene of the fire.

The fire was declared out at 10:30 p.m. only the gutted remains of the building gave evidence of the fire.
