Plan Fire Headquarters For Fire District 1

Robert O. Allen Jr., Clerk of the Board of Fire Commissioners, announced plans for a two bay fire house to be erected on Ocean Boulevard, Cliffwood Beach.

Allen stated "that the proposal will be placed in the hands

of the voters of Fire District #1, which includes, Laurence Harbor, Cliffwood Beach and Genoa on February 17, 1962. The fate of the proposal will be up to the legal voters of the district. The residents and voters of Fire District #1 have always been

kind when it comes to proposals by the Board of Fire Commissioners.

The new building will be of Colonial Type design and would be an asset to the area and would blend in with surrounding homes. The property was obtained by

the Board of Fire Commissioners from the Township Committee several years ago.

Allen noted that the polling places for the February 17 election will be at the Pirate Ship on Route 35, Cliffwood Beach for registered voters of Election

District #4 and at the Laurence Harbor Fire House on Laurence Parkway for registered voters of Election District #3. The polls will be open between the hours of 3:00 p.m. and will close at 7:00 p.m.

The Board of Fire Commissioners are of the opinion that the proposed location of the planned Fire House will allow better service to the residents of Cliffwood Beach, Knollcroft and Genoa. During recent years during several heavy rain storms and hurricanes Route 35 has been practically impassable and the Cliffwood Beach area has on occasion been stranded from fire protection from the Laurence Harbor Fire House. The new location would provide quick response to any alarm from the Cliffwood Beach area and would shorten the distance to the Genoa section of Madison Township. In order for the fire apparatus to reach Genoa, equipment must leave Madison Township and enter County Road in Matawan Township or must backtrack to the intersection of Morristown Road and Matawan Road. The proposed location would offer the residents of Genoa more adequate service.

Fire officials report that the most critical time of fire is during the first few minutes, if fire apparatus is able to get to the scene of the fire in a shorter period of time, damage by fire and water is lessened and there is less chance of loss of life.

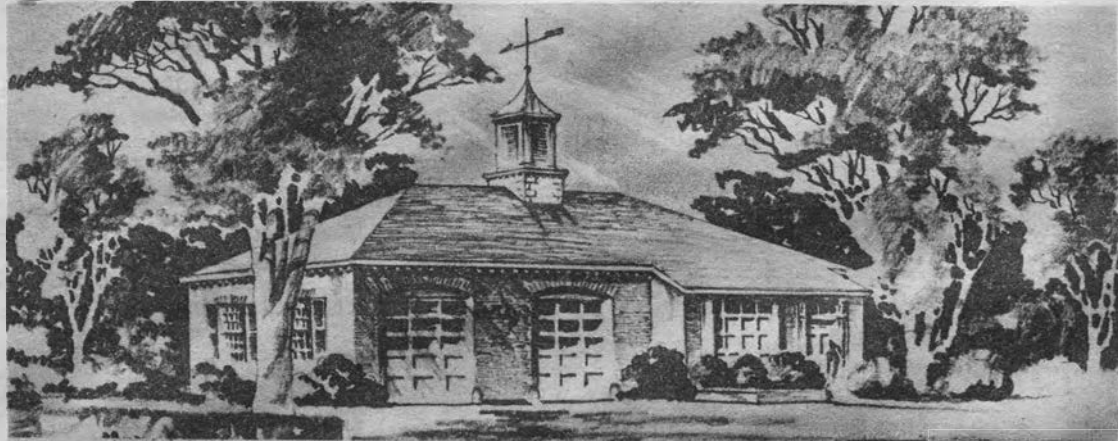
At the present time in order for apparatus to reach Cliffwood Beach and the Knollcroft area, fire equipment must use Route 35. During the summer months and during certain hours, especially during the early evening hours, Route 35 is one of the most heavily congested roads in the area and fire equipment rushing to a fire in the Cliffwood Beach-Knollcroft or Genoa areas, must traverse through this heavy traffic which often delays the early arrival of fire equipment. The new proposed location would allow apparatus to arrive at the scene in a shorter period of time, without "bucking" traffic. Fire apparatus would be stationed at the new proposed fire house and also at the Laurence Harbor Fire House.

The referendum which will be place before the voters calls for the issuance of bonds not to exceed \$37,000 to finance the construction of the two bay Fire House. Also on the referendum will be the Fire District Budget which is in the amount of \$19,895.00. The budget includes expenses for new fire equipment, maintenance to buildings, gasoline, insurance, hydrant rentals and bonds and interest.

Also to be selected at this election will be two candidates for the Office of Fire Commissioner. One for a term of three years and one to fill the unexpired term of one year.

Any legally registered voter of the Fire District may obtain a petition from the Clerk of the Fire District at his home at 432 Laurence Parkway. All petitioners must file their petitions with the Clerk, Robert Allen Jr., no later than 12:00 midnight, February 2, 1962.

It was also reported by Robert Allen, Jr., Clerk of the Board of Fire Commissioners Fire District #1, Madison Township that the Fire District has been rated a E District by the National Fire Insurance and will mean a reduction in fire insurance premiums.

Announce Changes In Township Firm

Saul Cantor Associates, Inc., one of the East's largest diversified building organizations, has purchased the twenty-five per cent stock interest in the firm held by Paul Goldman, with a resultant major realignment in corporate ownership and

management.

The announcement was made by Saul Cantor, company president who prior to the acquisition owned seventy-five per cent of the corporation's stock.

At the same time, it was made known that Mr. Goldman, hitherto first vice-president and a director of Saul Cantor Associates, has severed all connections with the company.

David Dickson, the firm's chief financial officer and a vice-president, has been elevated to first vice-president, Mr. Cantor disclosed.

The company's present policy of developing major commercial, industrial, and residential properties remains unaffected by the corporate changes, said Mr. Cantor.

However, the firm's program to erect, purchase, and lease back industrial buildings will be stepped up to place the industrial phase of its real estate operations on a part with its residential and commercial work, it was stated.

Projects completed within re-

cent years by the Cantor organization, which maintains its own staff of engineers and land planners and owns its own heavy-duty construction equipment, include the Sayre Woods Shopping Center, Route 9, Madison Township, consisting of thirty-four stores, including two national variety and supermarket chain outlets, plus a bank, and office building; the Brownstown Water Company, a complete sewer system, and three schools at Sayre Woods South; a store center containing an A & P supermarket in Bernardville; and such residential communities as Fleetwood Park, Raritan Township; Fairfield, New Shrewsbury; Robin Homes, Linden; Midway Homes, Fanwood; and Hope Homes, Pershing Park, and Sayre Woods, Sayreville.

Among its other achievements, the Cantor organization is noted for an assembly-line method of building which, coupled with mass purchase of materials, enables the firm to decrease costs and offer quality construction at major savings.

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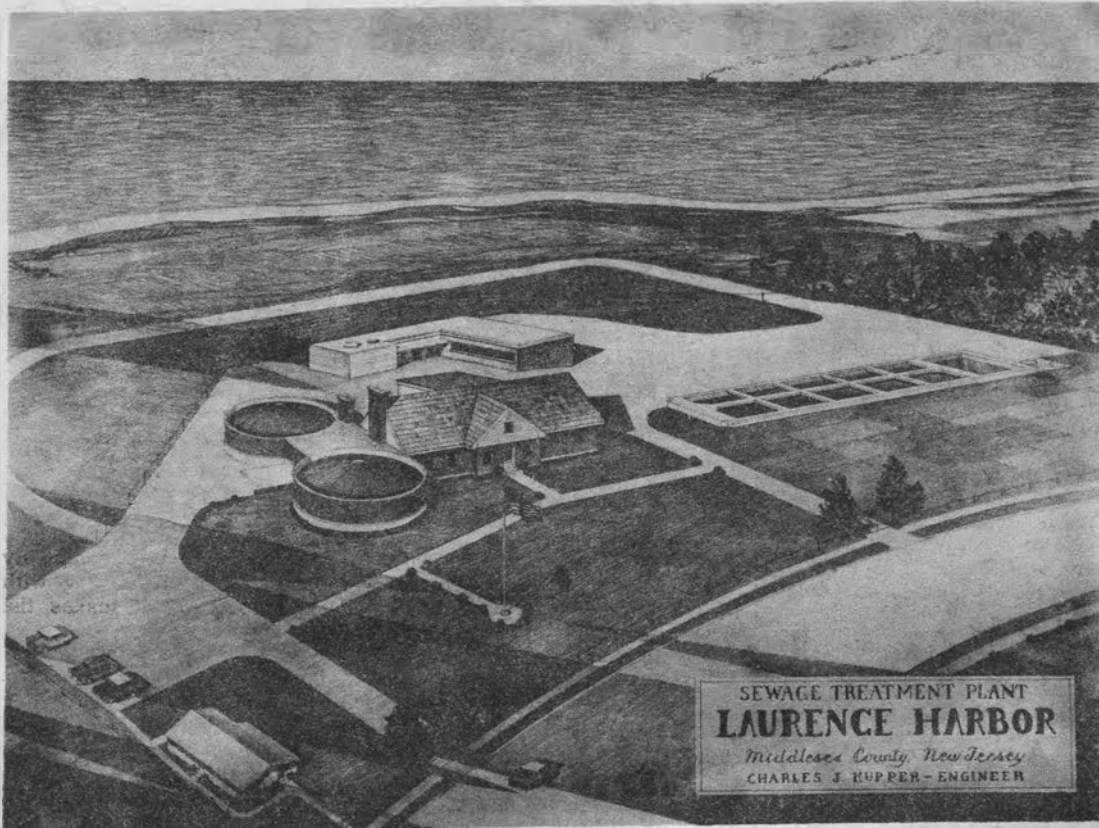
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Within the next two months, the Madison Township Sewerage Authority will receive bids for contracts for the construction of a comprehensive sewer system to sewer all of the Township's more densely populated sections excepting Madison Park. These sections will include the entire Old Bridge area, the Laurence Harbor area, and the Cliffwood Beach Area.

The Old Bridge area will be serviced by the Middlesex County Sewerage Authority via a connection to the South River Interceptor Sewer. Due to the natural topography of the Township, both the Laurence Harbor and Cliffwood Beach areas will be serviced by the Township Authority's

Sewage Treatment Plant, which will be constructed during the impending sewerage construction program. The proposed Sewerage construction in the Old Bridge, Laurence Harbor, and Cliffwood Beach areas, estimated to be completed within one year's time, will immediately benefit some 3000 homes, schools, and commercial establishments, and will cost approximately \$4,000,000.

Within the past 7 years, the Madison Township Sewerage Authority and its Consulting Engineer, Charles J. Kupper, working cooperatively with subdivision developers, the Township Committee and the Township Planning Board, has already installed sanitary sewerage facilities with

a value of approximately \$4,000,000, sewerage approximately 3,000 homes, schools, and commercial establishments.

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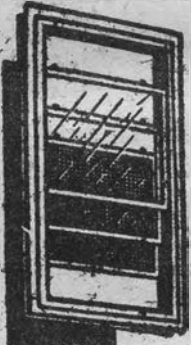

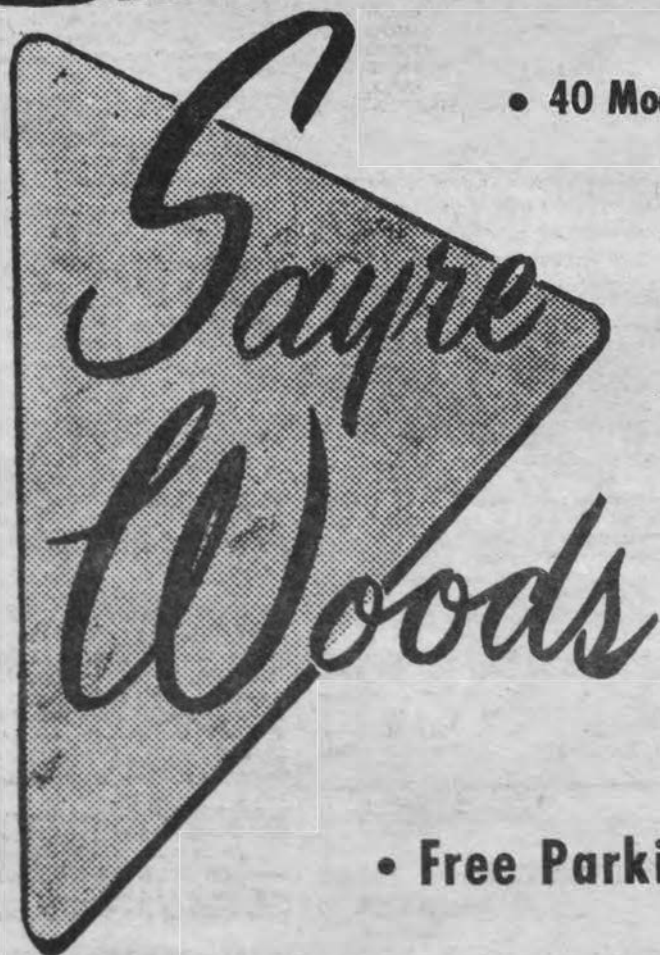
