The budget calls for appropriation of funds in the amount of \$70,000 and the local Tax Levy is set at \$1,804,489.35, State Aid shows a slight increase to \$765,283.00 and Federal Aid at \$2,000.00.

Total current expenses show an increase of \$139,358.35 for the new school budget.

It was also learned from a Board member that the Board of Education might expand its fleet of buses. The Board of Education maintains that they can operate the buses more economical than a contractor. The pro's and con's of the argument have been issues at Board of Education meetings on more than one occasion.

Board of Education Budgets in Madison Township have not faced too much opposition and have been approved by the voters in the past several years.

At the budget hearing the line items are either increased or decreased or remains the same. The budget is then submitted to the voters of Madison Township. If the budget is voted down, another hearing is held and the budget resubmitted to the voters of the district. If the budget is voted down the second time it is then submitted to the Township Committee. The last time this happened the Township Com-mittee "chopped" the budget by \$50,000 and the Board of Education still wound up with a healthy "free balance" at the end of the school term.

The 1962-63 budget calls for a anticipated increase in the en-rollment figure of 733 pupils for a total of 7,449 pupils (antici-

The Fire Tax in Madison Park is \$.77 per hundred while the garbage tax is set at \$.86 per We're paying more for garbage collection than fire protection.
