
Pine is no new comer to the field of athletics. He started his athletic career when he was a student at the University of Kansas, a long time ago, where he played on the football and track and field teams.

He is manager of the Cahill Pirates of the Laurence Harbor Little League, coach of the Loyola basketball team of the CYO Little Bigger League, South Amboy, a member of the Madison Township Junior Football League, member of the Madison Township Recreation Committee and is the Board of Education's representative to the Recreation Committee.

He is also a member of the Hoffman-Prince Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Laurence Harbor American Legion Post.

Full Time Engineer Needed

Several weeks ago in an editorial the Madison | the St. Michaels Hospital in American urged that the Mayor and Township Committee appoint a full time engineer.

We feel that this should be of prime concern to the Township Committee at a time when taxes are ever spiraling.

Recently the Township of Woodbridge passed an ordinance which is well worth looking into Mayor. The ordinance adopted in Woodbridge calls for a full time engineer in order that no conflict of interest arises and in oder that he best serve the interests of the residents of Woodbridge. The ordinance also prohibits private practice.

The amazing part of the ordinance is that the salary for this position is fixed at \$13,000. Woodbridge is more densely populated than Our Town. Engineering problems are almost identical.

The Madison American urges that a similar ordinance be introduced in Our Town.

The Township Engineer for Madison Township received over \$15,000 for various services in Our Town in 1961. We wonder what is going on? Let's have a full time engineer.

More Business Needed

At a recent meeting of the Madison Township Zoning Board of Adjustment several residents of Our Town appeared and objected to various businesses that were seeking variances in the ordinances.

Some claimed they didn't want "gasoline Alleys", some felt that the business would "hurt" their privacy.

Madison Township needs business. We need every gas station, every store that can be built in Our Town.

Stores and gasoline stations must substitute for heavy industry. Every store and gasoline station built in Madison Township means tax relief for the "home owner".



To meet the great growth in phone service, a new numbering system (All-Number Calling) is being introduced throughout the nation. With the new plan, numbers replace letters in telephone numbers. For example, a number like 555-2368 might take the place of KL 5-2368.

WHY ALL-NUMBER CALLING?

Today, with more and more people needing phone service, there soon won't be numbers enough to go around, under the present setup. All-Number Calling is needed to open up hundreds of new numbers, to provide more service for more people.

Many New Jersey communities have already switched to all numbers. Thousands of other people are also changing over, one-by-one - as phones are installed or moved to new addresses. Eventually, every phone number in the nation will be all-number. Then, letters will disappear from dials, making dialing simpler.

PLEASE KEEP A RECORD OF CHANGES More and more numbers you call will be all-numerals. It's a good idea to note them in your personal numbers list. If you'd like a handy booklet for numbers you call often, just call the Telephone Business Office.



The First Aid Squad will conduct a series of special fund raising events to pay for the ambulance. The new ambulance now replaces an obsolete model that had been used by the First Aid Squad. The new model enables squad members to stand while ambulance is in transit and is more modern, carrying additional equipment.

Captain John Callahan of the Madison Park First Aid Squad announced today that additional members are being sought by the squad. Special consideration will be given to shift workers or night workers that can be utilized on the daytime duty crew. Any man over 21 interested should contact Capt. Callahan or any member of the squad.

It was also reported that the group plans to sponsor an adult group plans to sponsor an adult standard First Aid Course, provided that enough interest is shown by the adults in the area. If enough adults respond, plans will be completed. Persons interested should contact Al Anslinger of Madison Park.

Since January 1st the Madison Park First Aid Squad has answered 60 first aid calls. The ambulances of the squad have travelled a total of 488 miles and a total of 250 man hours have been recorded.
