# Water, Water, Water..... And It Costs To Much To Drink

The Madison Township Committee has received many complaints of water in the past several months. Most of the complaints were about water and flooding conditions and the general washing away of the Laurence Harbor - Cliffwood Beach waterfront area due to hurri-

canes, high tides and the like. At the Monday night meeting of the Township Committee, members of the committee heard complaints of a different nature concerning water. Residents of the Laurence Harbor area were complaining about new water rates instituted by the Laurence

Harbor Water Company. Committee lashed out at the increases being charged by the water firm. Mayor John Phillips a resident of Laurence Harbor area called the increases "ridiculous, exhorbitant and unheard of". Phillips said "he could see

no reason for the increase as it

was the same old water and the worst water in town, the recent increase resulted in a hike to some customers of over 25 per cent." Phillips urged that residents serviced by the water company protest the actions of the company in writing to the Public Utilities Commission at 1100 Raymond Blvd., Newark.

The Madison Township Committee went on record unanimously to condemn the action of the water company and to urge a formal hearing before the PUC.

Committeeman Joseph Hoff (also of Laurence Harbor) charged that the system of billing was unclear and certainly unsatisfactory. Hoff challenged the water company to defend the rate increase. According to the Laurence Harbor Township Committeeman a family of two could end up paying more for water--just because they added a few extra faucets for their own comfort and convenience-than a family of eight. He also stated that in the summer months there "is never enough water".

Phillips and Hoffwere strongly opposed to the water increase and William Lambert, chairman of the township Water Authority said "that the authority has received several complaints about the water supplied by the company." Lambert said "that one complaintant brought to the authority samples of water that was rusty and had some objects floating in it."

Mayor Phillips agreed with the Water Authority head and said "I complained once of the rusty water and was told that all I had to do to stop it was tie handkerchiefs around the faucets." This comment brought quite a bit of laughter.

Editor's Note: (Rusty water conditions have plagued housewives in Madison Township in more than one area. Residents of Central Park recently were complaining about rusty water and copper colored wash. Madison

Park residents have also felt the effects of rusty water.)

In other business to come before the Township Committee payment of \$8,500 in legal fees to Township Attorney Harold Smith was approved by the committee. Smith successfully defended the township in 'the Midtown court action last year. At the last regular meeting of the committee Thomas Miller a candidate for Freeholder on the G.O.P. ticket asked if Mr. Smith had been paid for his services in the Midtown case.

The committee held over action of the installation of storm sewers in the Old Bridge area. The bids came in much higher than

were anticipated.

The township committee again moved that an appeal for a 35 mile per hour speed zone on Route 35 be established. Several area pedestrians have been killed while attempting to cross the dangerous highway. Township Committeeman Victor O'Brien who serves as police head termed the highway "as one of the most dangerous spots in the state and urged the state highway department to reconsider the township's request for the "lower speed limit".

## Motor Vehicle QUIZ

Q. I have been informed that I as a licensed driver accompanying a student driver driving with a valid learner's permit, am equally guilty of any motor vehicle infraction that the student driver may incur. Is this true?

A. New Jersey motor vehicle law provides that the licensed driver as well as the holder of the learner's permit shall be held jointly accountable for all violations that may occur while the vehicle is being operated by the permit holder.

Q. What is the law governing the use of out-of-state registration in the State of New Jersey and its time limit?

A. A non-resident may operate a motor vehicle that is properly licensed in his resident state in and through New Jersey indefinitely, providing it is not used in an intrastate commercial movement. However, if you become involved in an intrastate commercial operation, that is the picking up and delivering of goods, wares, merchandise within the borders of New Jersey, you would then be required to license yourself and register your moter vehicle in New Jersey immediately.

Q. I have been informed, that if one of the license plates on my motor vehicle were to become lost, I could put a temporary cardboard license plate in its place until a duplicate plate could be secured from a Motor Vehicle Agency. Can this

be done?

A. A person who displays a fictitious license plate, that is one which is homemade, in lieu of a lost plate which was issued by the New Jersey Division of Motor Vechicles, would be in violation of New Jersey motor vehicle law. A person violating the preceding law would be subject to a fine not exceeding \$100.

LEGAL NOTICE ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN OR-DINANCE ESTABLISHING A CODE REGULATING THE INSTALLATION, MAINTENANCE, REPAIR AND CON-TROL OF PLUMBING AND THE CONNECTION THEREOF WITH OUTSIDE SEWERS, CESSPOOLS, OR OTHER RECEPTACLES: REGU-THE PRACTISE OF PLUMBING AND THE ISSUANCE OF LICENSES IN PRACTICE PLUMBING AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR

Be it ordained by the Township of Madison, County of Middlesex, State of New Jersey that an "ordinance entitled an ordinance establishing a code regulating the installation, maintenance, repair and control of plumbing and the connection thereof with outside sewers, cesspools, or other receptacles: Regulating the practise of plumbing and providing penalties for violations thereof adopted June 21, 1957 is hereby amended to read as follows:-

VIOLATIONS THEREOF"

Section 2: The said code established and adopted by this ordinance is discribed and commonly known as the "Plumbing Code of New Jersey (1953) with following changes:

4.3.7. Joints between wrought-iron, steel, brass or copper tubing, and cast-iron shall be either caulked or screwed joints with an approved adapter.

7.4.1. Water - closet bowls may be siphonjet, reverse-trap, or blowout type with floor outlet, or siphon-jet, or blowout type with wall outlet. Water-closet bowls and traps shall be made in one piece and shall be provided with integral flushing rims so constructed as to flush the entire interior of the bowl. Watercloset bowls for semi-public or public use shall be of elongated type with open front seats.

7.17.4. A washing machine outlet shall be provide for each dwelling unit. 8.3.1. Every building for human occupancy

or habitation in which plumbing fixtures are installed shall be provided with an ample supply of hot and cold potable water.

8.8.3. Water service pipe to any building or premises shall be of sufficient size and in a condition to maintain the minimum required residual pressure at each water outlet. In no case shall the diameter be less than three-quarter (3/4) inch. The minimum depth of a water service shall be fourty-eight (48) inches. No tubing lighter than K shall be used. Every building for human occupancy or habitation shall | all.

have a separate water service. 8.9.1. Water distributing piping shall be made of brass, L copper, lead, cast-iron, wrought-iron, open-hearth iron or steel. All threaded ferrous pipe and fittings shall be galvanized or cement lined. When used underground in carrossive soil, all ferrous pipe and fittings shall be coal-tar enamel coated and the threaded joints shall be coated and wrapped after inspection.

9.1.1. Soil and waste piping for drainage. systems within a building shall be of cast-iron known as medium, galvanized wrought - iron, galvanized openhearth iron, galvanized steel, brass, type DWV copper, or class D lead. The pipe and the fittings for each type of pipe shall comply with the specifications as given in Section E-300, Table 3.4.

9.1.2. Underground piping within buildings shall be of medium cast-iron soil pipe,

type K copper tubing.

9.1.3. (a) Building sewers installed in a separate trench from the water service pipe shall be of medium cast-iron soil pipe or five (5) foot asbestos cement sewer pipe. The asbestos cement sewer pipe shall be placed on a six (6) inch bed of bank run gravel. After the pipe has been laid, an additional eight (8) inches of bank run shall be placed over the pipe. Joints shall be water tight and rootproof.

(b) Building sewers installed in the same trench with the water service pipe, shall in addition to the requirements of 8.6, be constructed of medium soil pipe or five (5) foot asbestos cement sewer pipe. The asbestos cement sewer pipe shall be placed on a six. (6) inch bed of bank run gravel, After the pipe has been laid, an additional eight (8) inches of bank run shall be placed over the pipe. Joints shall be water tight and rootproof.

11.2.8. The permissible distance of a fixture trap from a vent fitting shall be two (2) feet.

12.1.2. (a) Class A waste shall include all waste from a bar or soda fountain; wastes from a dish-washing machine,

clothes washing machine and clothes dryers whether of a commercial type or of a type used in a dwelling unit, and other similar wastes. All fixtures more than three (3) feet from the slop-sink, floor drain or other receptacle, measured through the developed length of the drain, shall be trapped. 14.1.2. A permit may be issued to a person to do plumbing in a single family dwelling

used exclusively for living purposes, including the usual accessory buildings and quarters in connection with such building, provided that person is the bonafide owner and occupant of such dwelling and said owner purchases all material and personally performs all labor in connection therewith. In exception to the above, sewers connecting to a public sewer and water service piping connecting to a public potable water supply shall be installed by a licensed, bonded, and isured master

plumber. 14.8.1. The Board of Plumbing Examiners shall issue a master plumbers license to each applicant for such a license who successfully passes the examination given by the Board, provided that each applicant displays to the Board a certificate of public liability and will

engage in the plumbing business as a master plumber full time, 14.9.1. Master plumbers licenses shall expire on the last day of December of each year and may be renewed at any time within thirty (30) days of

their expiration date without re-

examination of the licensee. Licenses

not renewed within thirty (30) days of their expiration date may not be renewed until the applicant has been reexamined. Section 3; Three (3) copies of the said "Plumbing Code of New Jersey (1953)" and the above changes have been placed on file each in the office of the Clerk of the Municipality and in the Office of the Secretary of the Board of Health and will remain on file in such offices for the use and examination of the public.

Section 8: In the event that any section, clause or sentence of this ordinance or code or changes shall be declared unconstitutional by a court of competant. juristiction, such declaration shall not in any manner prejudice the enforcement of the remaining provisions.

Section 9: This ordinance and the code and changes established herein shall take effect 30 days after the first publication of the ordinance in accordance with the provisions of R. S. 26:3-69.
