## JCPL Open Madison Headquarters

OLD BRIDGE -- County and municipal officials toured Jersey Central Power & Light Company's new Old Bridge District headquarters Monday during an open house at the facility, 999 Englishtown Road.

Speaking at a luncheon at Forsgate Country Club, Jamesburg, after the tour, Jack R. McGalliard, manager of the electric utility's Bay Division, said the new building is in the heart of an expanding area and will afford the company a greater efficiency of operation. The new headquarters represents JCPL's latest step in a continued expansion program aimed at staying ahead of growth in its service territory.

Mr. McGalliard said ll municipalities, or portions of them, in eastern Middlesex County and parts of western Monmouth

County will be serviced from the new headquarters. They are Jamesburg, Spotswood and Helmetta and Madison, Monroe, South Brunswick and East Brunswick Townships. Also, parts of Sayreville and Cranbury and Manalapan and Marlboro Townships.

He said the Old Bridge District will permit a reduction in the time required for service calls in those communities. Previously, crews operating from Union Beach serviced the area.

Madison Township Mayor John Phillips was a guest speaker at the affair. Phillips hailed the construction of the Jersey Central Power and Light headquarters as the start of something new for Madison Township. Phillips stated that the Madison Township committee would be willing to aid the company in any

way they could and cited the close cooperation given by the various local governing bodies of Madison Township.

The Bay Division covers the area from the Raritan River south to the Navesink River and from the ocean west to the New Brunswick area.

The new headquarters was constructed at a cost of more than \$350,000, including equipment and landscaping. It is the first JCPL district headquarters to incorporate operating and business offices under one roof. It has 19,480 square feet of floor space and is electrically heated and air conditioned. There is off-street parking space for 63 cars.

The district office section of the building includes the superintendent's office, general foreman's office, space for the engineering and clerical staff, radio alcove, meter storage room, utility and locker rooms. The district garage has 12 bays with a platform to accommodate 10 line trucks. The garage also houses the district's equipment storage room. M. Paul Goble is district superintendent.

The business office area contains an appliance display, bookkeeping section, meter readers' office, conference room, fileroom and drive-in window for customer convenience. Hillary J. Cummons is the office

manager. A feature of the new building is the combination meeting room and fully-equipped kitchen. The room will accommodate 78 persons and will be used primarily for home service and other sales department demonstrations.

The structure was designed by Bernard Kellenyi, Red Bank architect. Thomas S. Beers, Red Bank, was the consulting engineer. Norman K. Lanterman, the electric utilpty's building manager, supervised and coordinated construction. William L. Blanchard Co., Newark, was the general contractor.

## May Deduct Storm Damage

Internal Revenue Service announced today that the new law signed by President Kennedy on March 31, 1962 permits taxpayers who have suffered property damage from storms and flood earlier this year to deduct the casualty

losses on their 1961 returns. Horbor Taxpayers who have already filed their 1961 returns can file amended returns to claim their losses, IRS said. Internal Revenue said that the new special treatment is limited to taxpayers whose property is in an area determined by the President to warrant Federal disaster assistance.

So far 11 states have been determined to warrant such assistance and tax relief for disaster victims. The states are: Idaho, Nevada, Colorado, Delaware, Maryland, New Jersey, Virginia, West Virginia, Kentucky, North Carolina and New

Back in 1956, George Otlowski was a candidate for Freeholder in Middlesex County. He suddenly took an interest in the shore area of Madison Township which was severely damaged by hurricanes that struck the area in 1955. He spent many hours in conferences with the Township, State, County and Federal officials in regards to the problems of shore erosion. You were successful in your campaign and you were elected as a Freeholder.

The Laurence Harbor - Cliffwood Beach problem became more acute as subsequent hurricanes and storms hit the area. The situation was desperate but we didn't notice you visiting our town anymore, except around November when you made election speeches. There wasn't any mention of the shore problem in Madison Township.

In 1961 you once again became interested in the shore erosion problem. This was about the same time that you announced that you were a candidate for Congress. You certainly must be aware of the drainage problems on these two locations.

Maybe "minor flooding" conditions haven't got enough prestige or glamor, or perhaps they don't make very interesting reading from a politician's point of view. They are however, problems of interest to the many residents that use these county roads.

LEGAL NOTICE AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN OR-DINANCE ESTABLISHING A CODE REGULATING THE INSTALLATION, MAINTENANCE, REPAIR AND CON-TROL OF PLUMBING AND THE CONNECTION THEREOF WITH OUTSIDE SEWERS, CESSPOOLS, OR OTHER RECEPTACLES: REGU-LATING THE PRACTISE OF PLUMBING AND THE ISSUANCE OF LICENSES IN PRACTICE PLUMBING AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF"

Be it ordained by the Township of Madison, County of Middlesex, State of New Jersey that an "ordinance entitled an ordinance establishing a code regulating the installation, maintenance, repair and control of plumbing and the connection thereof with outside sewers, cesspools, or other receptacles: Regulating the practise of plumbing and providing penalties for violations thereof adopted June 21, 1957 is hereby amended to read as follows:-

Section 2: The said code established and adopted by this ordinance is discribed and commonly known as the "Plumbing Code of New Jersey (1953) with following changes:

4.3.7. Joints between wrought-iron, steel, brass or copper tubing, and cast-iron shall be either caulked or screwed joints with an approved adapter.

7.4.1. Water - closet bowls may be siphonjet, reverse-trap, or blowout type with floor outlet, or siphon-jet, or blowout type with wall outlet. Water-closet bowls and traps shall be made in one piece and shall be provided with integral flushing rims so constructed as toflush the entire interior of the bowl. Watercloset bowls for semi-public or public use shall be of elongated type with open front seats.

7.17.4. A washing machine outlet shall be provide for each dwelling unit.

8.3.1. Every building for human occupancy or habitation in which plumbing fixtures are installed shall be provided with an ample supply of hot and cold potable water.

8.8.3. Water service pipe to any building or premises shall be of sufficient size and in a condition to maintain the minimum required residual pressure at each water outlet. In no case shall the diameter be less than three-quarter (3/4) inch. The minimum depth of a water service shall be fourty-eight (48) inches. No tubing lighter than K shall be used. Every building for human occupancy or habitation shall

have a separate water service. 8.9.1. Water distributing piping shall be made of brass, L copper, lead, cast-iron, wrought-iron, open-hearth iron or steel. All threaded ferrous pipe and fittings shall be galvanized or cement lined. When used underground in carrossive soil, all ferrous pipe and fittings shall be coal-tar enamel coated and the threaded joints shall be coated and wrapped after inspection.

9.1.1. Soil and waste piping for drainage systems within a building shall be of cast-iron known as medium, galvanized wrought - iron, galvanized openhearth iron, galvanized steel, brass, type DWV copper, or class D lead. The pipe and the fittings for each type of pipe shall comply with the specifications as given in Section E-300, Table 3.4.

9.1.2. Underground piping within buildings shall be of medium cast-iron soil pipe, type K copper tubing.

9.1.3. (a) Building sewers installed in a separate trench from the water service pipe shall be of medium cast-iron soil pipe or five (5) foot asbestos cement sewer pipe. The asbestos cement sewer pipe shall be placed on a six (6) inch bed of bank run gravel. After the pipe has been laid, an additional eight (8) inches of bank run shall be placed over the pipe. Joints shall be water tight and rootproof.

(b) Building sewers installed in the same trench with the water service pipe, shall in addition to the requirements of 8.6, be constructed of medium soil pipe or five (5) foot asbestos cement sewer pipe. The asbestos cement sewer pipe shall be placed on a six (6) inch bed of bank run gravel. After the pipe has been laid, an additional eight (8) inches of bank run shall be placed over the pipe. Joints shall be water tight and rootproof.

11.2.8. The permissible distance of a fixture trap from a vent fitting shall be

two (2) feet.

12.1.2. (a) Class A waste shall include all waste from a bar or soda fountain; wastes from a dish-washing machine, clothes washing machine and clothes dryers whether of a commercial type or of a type used in a dwelling unit, and other similar wastes. All fixtures more than three (3) feet from the slop-sink, floor drain or other receptacle, measured through the developed

length of the drain, shall be trapped. 14.1.2. A permit may be issued to a person to do plumbing in a single family dwelling used exclusively for living purposes, including the usual accessory buildings and quarters in connection with such building, provided that person is the bonafide owner and occupant of such dwelling and said owner purchases all material and personally performs all labor in connection therewith. In exception to the above, sewers connecting to a public sewer and water service piping connecting to a public potable water supply shall be installed by a licensed, bonded, and isured master plumber.

14.8.1. The Board of Plumbing Examiners shall issue a master plumbers license to each applicant for such a license who successfully passes the examination given by the Board, provided that each applicant displays to the Board a certificate of public liability and will engage in the plumbing business as a

expire on the last day of December

master plumber full time.

of each year and may be renewed at any time within thirty (30) days of expiration date without reexamination of the licensee. Licenses not renewed within thirty (30) days of their expiration date may not be renewed until the applicant has been reexamined. Section 3: Three (3) copies of the said "Plumbing Code of New Jersey (1953)" and the above changes have been placed on file each in the office of the Clerk of the Municipality and in the Office of the Secretary of the Board of Health and will remain on file in such offices for the use and examination of the public.

Section 8: In the event that any section, clause or sentence of this ordinance or code or changes shall be declared unconstitutional by a court of competant juristiction, such declaration shall not in any manner prejudice the enforcement of the remaining provisions.

Section 9: This ordinance and the code and changes established herein shall take effect 30 days after the first publication of the ordinance in accordance with the provisions of R. S. 26:3-69.


