# "Kill The Engineer Night" Mayor Quips

Mayor John Phillips at the | regular meeting of the Township Committee held at the Municipal Building on Route 9, Monday evening, had more than a toothache to contend with as residents of Madison Township complained about water problems, drainage problems and sewerage

problems.

The mayor visibly under some pain announced on several occasions that he had received several "shots of novacaine" prior to the meeting and the main reason for his appearance was the importance of the meeting and that four members of the township committee must be present if contracts involving money are to be awarded. Township Committeeman Joseph Hoff was not present at the meeting which was attended by Phillips, Committeemen Keating, O'Brien and Messenger.

The regular business portion

of the meeting breezed by with bids on various storm sewer projects held over for further study. Several offers for the purchase of land in the Cliffwood Beach area were turned over to be valuated by the appraiser.

Township Committeeman John Keating passed a resolution praising the efforts of the various volunteer fire companies both in Madison Township and out of town that answered the recent emergency alarms as hundreds of acres of wooded land in the township was burnt by wind-swept flames. The fire was one of the worst in the history of Madison Township firemen and volunteers managed to restrict the fire to the wooded areas and no loss of homes or life were reported.

At the public portion of the meeting the "fireworks" started when Gary Murtha of SayreWoods South questioned Madison Township's Engineer Frederick Kurtz. Murtha a G.O.P. candidate for Township Committeeman asked if there had been a possible con-

flict of interest involved in the drainage condition in the Old Bridge area, Murtha fired his question directly at Kurtz who seemed to be annoyed at the questioning. Murtha asked "Mr. Kurtz who did the engineering work at the Jersey Central Power and Light building in Old Bridge?" The Township Engineer explained that he had worked in conjunction with the architect on the building. Murtha then shot back "this work for the utility company did not constitute a conflict of interest". Kurtz answered with "this was a private arrangement that did not conflict in any way with my position as township engineer-I would have not taken the job if there was any conflict of interest involved. The work was

# Rehired As Superintendent

In a special meeting forced upon the Madison Township Board of Education by three of its members, William Joyce, Louis Horvath and Richard Pine, Doctor William J. Sample was rehired as Superintendent of the local school system.

Prior to this meeting the Board was reluctant to proceed with the business of rehiring the school head, whose contract was due to expire on June 30. Reluctance was due in part to a difference of opinion on the retention of Dr. Sample by some of the Board members.

With time growing short, the intrepid three, Joyce, Horvath, and Pine, decided it was time to act. They took the bull by the horns and called for the special meeting. It takes at least three Board members to call for a special meeting for any specific purpose according to state law.

Dr. Sample's new contract calls for \$14,500 per year. His old contract called for \$13,500.

Leonard Booth made the motion to rehire the school head. Pine seconded the motion. In addition to Booth and Pine, Horvath, Joyce William Rice and William Schladebeck voted in favor of Ur. Sample's retention, giving the superintendent his job by a 6-3 vote. Voting against Dr. Sample were William Kerr, Board president, Mrs. Carol Kosobucki, and John Partridge. In voting against the motion, Kerr stated that the salary was "a little out of line."

In casting his ballot for Dr. Sample, Pine, a former Board president, was high in his praise for the superintendent. Pine said, "The Board of Education is doing the children of Madison Township a great service by rehiring Dr. Sample. Pine further stated that Dr. Sample was a great educator, a fine scholar, and a peerless leader.

Booth also said that Dr. Sample had much ability and was a great value to the Board.

#### Urge Appointment Of Full Time Engineer

At the recent meeting of the Madison Town. ship Committee it was brought out that the Township Engineer Frederick Kurtz had engineered at least a portion of the work for the Jersey Central Power and Light sub-station located on Englishtown Road, Old Bridge.

Many of the residents of the area attending the meeting felt that because of the drainage planned at the utility project, surface water was shunted to their development. Several felt that this approached being a "conflict" of interest.

The Madison American has strongly urged that the Mayor and Township Committee name a full time engineer. We once again urge that the Township Committee study the appointment of a full time engineer.

As a full time engineer a person would receive compensation for his services solely from the Township Committee. He would be responsible only to the Township Committee. He would then be serving only one master.

The Township Committee could pass an ordinance creating an Engineering Department and specify the exact duties of the Town-The office of the engineering ship Engineer. department should be in the Municipal Building or some other Township owned building.

The person named as Engineer, whether it be Mr. Kurtz or any other qualified engineer should be compensated in an amount that is fair and reasonable for his services.



replied that "there were no approvals necessary".

Phillips hastened to the defense of Kurtz saying "I think Kurtz fine engineer. I am satisfied with his work. I'm personally glad that the Jersey Central built a \$400,000 tax ratable in the area. I understand that at first they were not quite pleased with the drainage until the job was designed. They even carted in loads of fill to help

Mayor Phillips might have been satisfied with the work of the Township Engineer but residents of the Old Bridge area voiced displeasure at the Engineer. Some of the residents charged that the drainage design for the property of the Jersey Central Power and Light Company on Englishtown Road by the Township Engineer Frederick Kurtz caused the water to drain over in the development. This angered the Township Engineer and he retorted to the complainers that "I didn't tell you to buy those houses." There has been water in that area for years why do you think the developer raised the homes six feet above the groundbecause he knew that the drainage was poor.

Murtha asked for immediate action to correct a drainage condition on Piedmont Drive. He stagnant waters constitute a dangerous health hazard in the area, which could cause a possible epidemic in the area. Mayor Phillips pointed out that the water was a problem of the local Board of Health but that he would see to it that the situation is corrected as soon as possible.

The attack of the Township Engineer because of drainage problems in the Old Bridge area continued and Mayor Phillips remarked "it looks like tonight is "Kill the Engineer Night."

Edward Olshefski of Diane Court Old Bridge urged that the Mayor and Township Committee take action on the bids received at the meeting for storm sewers in the area. He stated that he had talked to one of the developers (Sidney Paley) and was told that the drainage could not be provided until the township committee awarded the sewerage contract.

Mayor Phillips denied this stating that "the township committee was doing everything possible to correct the situation but we must work within the limits of the law when it comes to the expending of taxpayers money. It's not our money but belongs to all the residents of the town.

Mrs. W. Simon made a passioned plea to the Mayor and Township Committee "please Mayor act not from your pocketbook but from your heart. There are little children involved in the area who must live with these terrible conditions, nothing but dirt, mud and water. Please don't forget the effect that this has on the homelife of residents. Women are not smiling--men are not happy. "What have we got to show for the money we pay in taxes? We have no lights, no sewers, no roads. You manage to collect our taxes. Is this fair. All we want is to stop living like pigs. Is that so much to ask for in America."
